The Lowerkit II is the original true lowercase and special symbols generation system for the TRS-80 Color Computer. A simple hardware plug-in module, the Lowerkit fits inside the case. replacing the Radio Shack inverse video with Lowerkit's true lowercase characters. It takes up no memory (software lowercase grabs 7.5K!), no soldering or special wiring is necessary, and there is absolutely no loss of high-resolution or color. The unit can be in place and operating in just 15 minutes. A cut-out switch restores the former Radio Shack display whenever desired (Audio Spectrum Analyzer and some other programs actually look better in the original Radio Shack mode). A Scripsit-compatible wordprocessing module is standard with the Lowerkit, but character display plug-in modules are also available in Kata Kana, Green, APL. math symbols, gaming characters, generalized European, Cyrillic, Arabic, and Hebrew. Special character sets can be programmed on request: character-creation software CHARIT and the Color Burner can be used to develop your own specialized character sets.

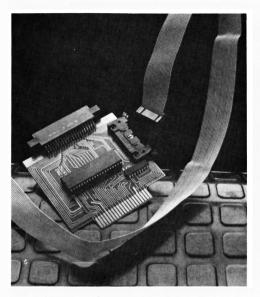

Custom character generators are always in demand for the Lowerkit. The cost of Green Mountain Micro developing these is prohibitive for a one-time use, so Charit has been created to fill in the user gap. Fonts developed using Charit can be programmed at low cost by Green Mountain Micro, or can be used with the Color Burner EPROM programmer.

The CoCoPORT



The CoCoPort is an interface from your computer to the real world: It is an input/output port arranged as a cartridge plug-in for the TRS-80 Color Computer. Your computer already has two dual ports built into it, dedicated to a wide variety of familiar tasks, including input from the keyboard, controlling the video graphics modes, sound output, joystick input, cassette motor, serial printer output, and RS-232 communications.

The CoCoPort adds 50% more of this input/output power to the Color Computer, power that is your own because you can decide exactly how you want information to flow to and from your computer. It is ideal for data acquisition and control applications such as measurement, switching and timing, signaling, and laboratory experimentation.

A cable and 3M-style header connector (optional extra) make interfacing to control signals, sensor, etc., fast and simple.

...**Process Control.** Use all 18 control lines: connect output lines to low-cost driver transistors, output logic blocks, optical isolators; connect input lines to optical sensors, logic devices, switches. Replacement Parts

Replacement parts for your Color Computer are available from Green Mountain Micro. We stock 6809E processors (the CPU), 6847 video display generators (the VDG), 6821 peripheral interface adaptors (the PIA), and 6883 synchronous address multiplexers (the SAM), as well as small logic parts found inside the computer (voltage regulators, memories, capacitors, resistors, etc.). We do not stock Color Basic or Extended Color BASIC.

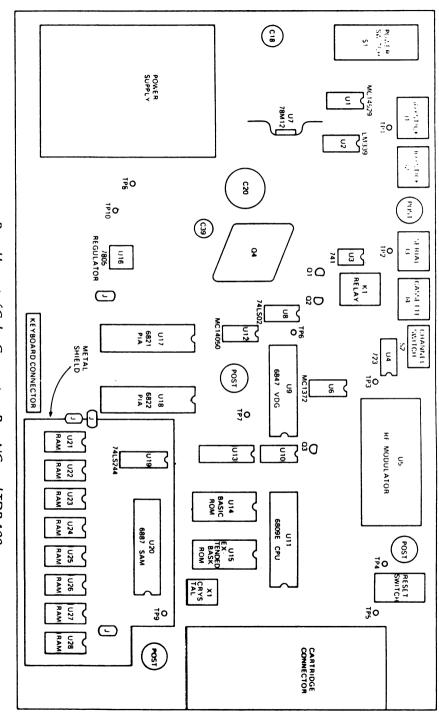

Using a Monochrome Monitor??

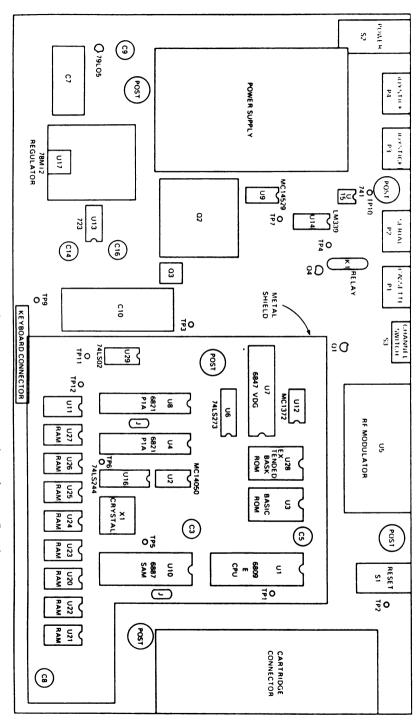
A monochrome monitor — green, amber, black-and-white, etc. — reacts a little differently to a color signal. Expect to see a slight grid-like effect on the screen, a result of the unnecessary color information being displayed. It doesn't take long to get used to it, and adjusting the contrast on the monitor can reduce its appearance. The only way to eliminate the grid effect is to modify the computer itself, and build the monochrome display circuit provided by Motorola. We have the Motorola 6847 data sheets (\$1 plus 2 ounces postage) if this interests you.

Additional Notes

- 1. On most color monitors, the best video image is achieved with the control turned fully clockwise. On black-and-white monitors, anywhere over the full range of the control may result in the best image.
- 2. There are many so-called "video monitors" beings sold, especially surplus black-and-white or green computer pullouts. Be cautious with surplus monitors, or with any bargain machines. In some instances, it may be necessarry to put a capacitor (0.22 mF, usually) in series with the yellow output wire (between the yellow wire and the connection jack you are using) to obtain a stable image.
- 3. To minimize any "glimmering" when using a color television along with or instead of a monitor (with the TVBuff II installed), make the wires to and from the TVBuff II as short as possible. This is particularly important on early (through revision E) computers.

The BackPack

At last...battery backup for your TRS-80 Color Computer. The BackPack provides 5 to 15 minutes of power backup to your Color Computer, enough to save valuable program or text material. Using rechargeable batteries, the BackPack stays at full power until you need it. Manual reset ensures that power is restored before the BackPack is turned off. BackPack plugs into edge connector but leaves space for your ROMpack or diskpack.

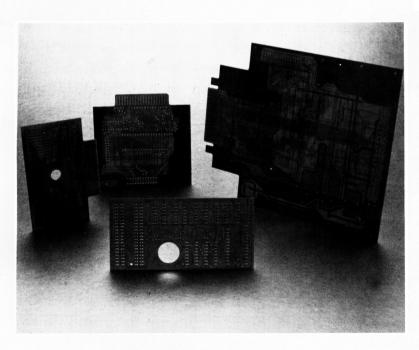

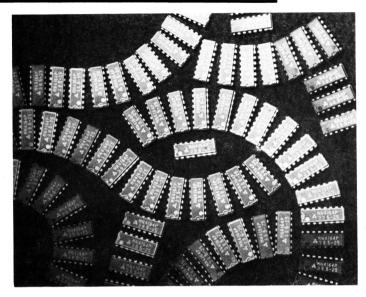
