THE CHAMPS


Well we did it! A stunning first in the under-25 section of the World Pac-Man championships and a third in the Over 25's. Not bad eh?.

Feelings ran high at Atari Control as we learned that sixteen year-old Craig Heap from Salford, had Manchester, managed to score an amazing 29,511 in a thirty-minute run on the most difficult of the home Pac-Man variations. And father of two, Trevor Yardley, managed a great score of 13,458 over the same period. Thank you for keeping the side of the 'old-uns' up Trevor!

The whole of the Pac-Man championships did not pass without incident. The most notable being the fact that we had to switch the event from

Monte Carlo to Paris at two
days' notice. Monte Carlo has
featured rather heavily in the news just
recently and you will all understand
why the championships were suddenly
re-sited in the famous Captain Video
discotheque just off the Champs
Elysées.

Here Pac-manians from all over the world descended to chat, laugh, have fun and meet some of the thirty-three contestants from such glamorous places as Hong Kong, Puerto Rico and Venezuela. But all very much aware that it would soon be their chance to pit their skills against those infernal gobbling ghosts to become the World Pac-Man champion.



The championships lasted for about three nail-biting hours with the UK visitors leaping up and down at the side of the stage, making a huge nuisance of themselves and willing on Craig and Trevor to score the results they've been dreaming of ever since they both became the UK champs. Obviously our encouragement helped because a score of practically one thousand points a minute on that level of difficulty just has to be special.

The evening ended with a river trip down the Seine. We glided along a smooth-flowing Seine with the stars twinkling overhead, tuck- ing into chilled lobster, beef, fruit flans, and cheese and watching the silver cup placed proudly in the bows of the ship. As we sailed page

lights reflected off Craig's huge bows of the ship. As we sailed past the river, the whole of the island of multi-coloured fireworks. Magic! weekend.



David Willis from Tameside, Manchester writes:

"During the 1981 Summer holidays, me and my friend lan Wilkinson made an AVCS/TV unit which enabled me to play Space Invaders, etc, in my bedroom with a portable TV in the same unit as the AVCS.

Recently, we modified this unit to incorporate new features such as wheels, a small canopy, and better stylised paintwork."

David says they made it with odd pieces of wood, paint from the garage and wheels from a neighbour, so they found it very cheap to make. Well done to David and Ian. Perhaps some of our other members have ways of making their own VCS units.

ATARI CONTROL has received quite a few Red Alerts from members about unusual things happening on their cartridges, like this letter from Paul Dudfield of Dudley, West Midlands:

"Recently while playing on the super new zapping cartridge DEFENDER I found myself blasting at a wall.

This started when I went to land a human. After landing it, I went straight through the bottom of the screen and found myself with a ship which only showed up when I fired against a purple screen with a green wall at the end. This amazed me and I was wondering if it had happened to any other ATARI owners. (It went back to normal when I switched the reset switch)."



A Word from our Product Support Team

Throughout the world there are several television systems, and for this reason there are several versions of the Atari Video Computer System. If you are going abroad for a holiday, or have present-giving relatives or friends overseas, please give the following information careful consideration.

The United Kingdom has a PAL-I television system, and the Video Computer System for use in this area has a transformer with a three-pin mains connection.

Most of the European countries have a PAL-B television system, and their transformer has a two-round-pin mains connection. PAL cartridges will function correctly on both systems.

The United States has an NTSC television system. Units designed for use in this area have a two-flat-pin mains connection. NTSC cartridges will not function on either the PAL-I or PAL-B systems.

Please be certain when buying abroad that the items which you purchase are designed to function in this country. Do not allow yourself to be fooled when a salesman tells you, "all it needs is a 240 volt adapter and by the way we sell those here!"

Although we cannot convert your NTSC or PAL-B Video Computer Systems or NTSC cartridges, we do offer an exchange scheme. For prices and further information, 'phone Atari Product Support on Slough (0753) 24561.

Atari have installed a Nationwide Network of Independent Service Centres to service Atari Video Computer Systems, in or out of Warranty. There are over 50 Centres in the U.K. — One of which will be local to you — Local Service means FASTER SERVICE.

Each ISC has been inspected and trained by Atari, to ensure that it is able to Service Atari VCS Consoles, to the highest possible standard and receives our full technical support.

For your local Independent Service Centre ring us on Slough (0753) 24561.
