The title of 'national' champion, the **Atari Player of the Year**; a trip to Munich in Germany for an 'international final' and the chance of watching the Olympics live in Los Angeles, USA — all of this is yours for the taking!

But first you must prove yourself to be the greatest Atari player in the United Kingdom.

Phoenix in the early stages in May, Ms Pac-Man at the Regionals in July and Centipede at the national finals in August are the cartridges which will test your dexterity, skill and Atarian determination. Not only will you have to master these three dynamic and devastating games but you must also triumph over other deadly keen and serious Atarians from all over the country.

How do you start? Before your mind begins to race with dreams of glory, fame and jet-set travel, you must enter the competition. Go to your local Atari dealer which may be a branch of one of the larger stores or an independent shop, which is displaying the special Atari competition posters, and find out when the competition is to be run. Then enter and have a go at tackling the fabulous Phoenix game under supervised, timed conditions.

As an added bonus all those entering the competition will receive a £5 voucher redeemable against selected Atari hardware and software — you just can't lose!

After your single game entry the competition supervisor will take your form, sign it and send it to Atari along with other fellow hopefuls. The top Phoenix players in each of the six competition regions will then be invited to battle with Ms Pac-Man at a series of six regional heats at the venues below:

Newcastle — 2 July — North East
Glasgow — 9 July — Scotland
Manchester — 16 July — North West
Birmingham — 23 July — Midlands
Bristol — 30 July — Wales and the West
London — 6 August — The South

If your playing ability wins through at regional level and you become a regional champion, you will be invited to London for a week-end and the opportunity of an attempt at the title of '**Atari Player of the Year**'. Camden Palace, the futuristic night spot and space-age disco will be the venue for the national final and the day, **20 August**, will be surrounded by all the razzamataz and glamour of an exciting 'finale' to a testing competition.

The **Atari Player of the Year** will then go to Germany to Munich for the Atari World Video Championship to play Centipede against Atari 'greats' from all over the globe. The prize? — a seven day trip to the Los Angeles Summer Olympics for two, a special gold-medal and an Atari 800 and software.

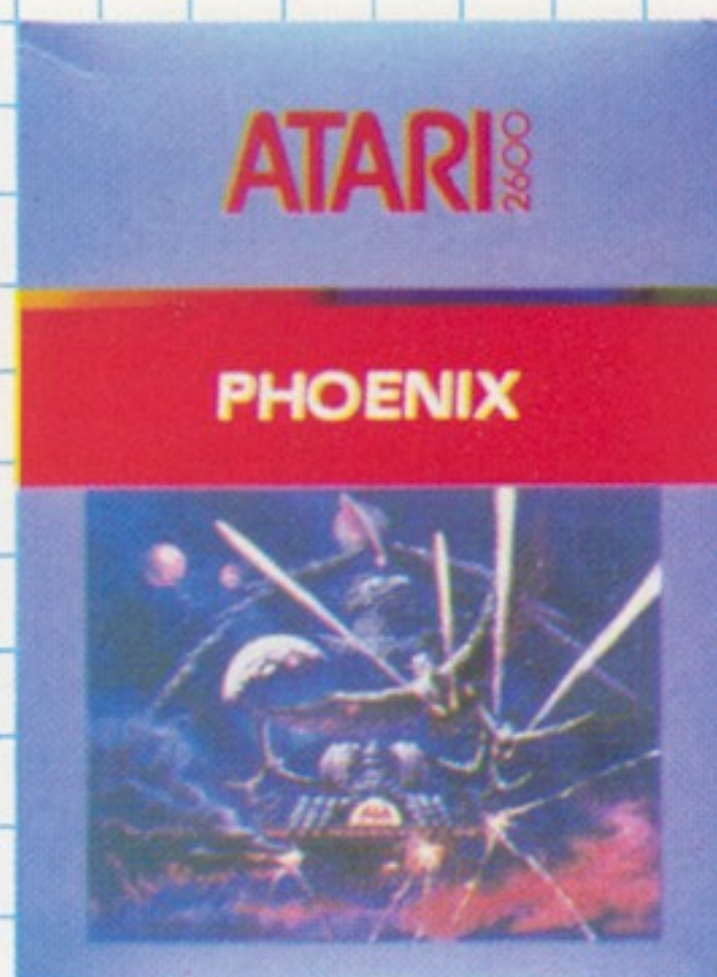

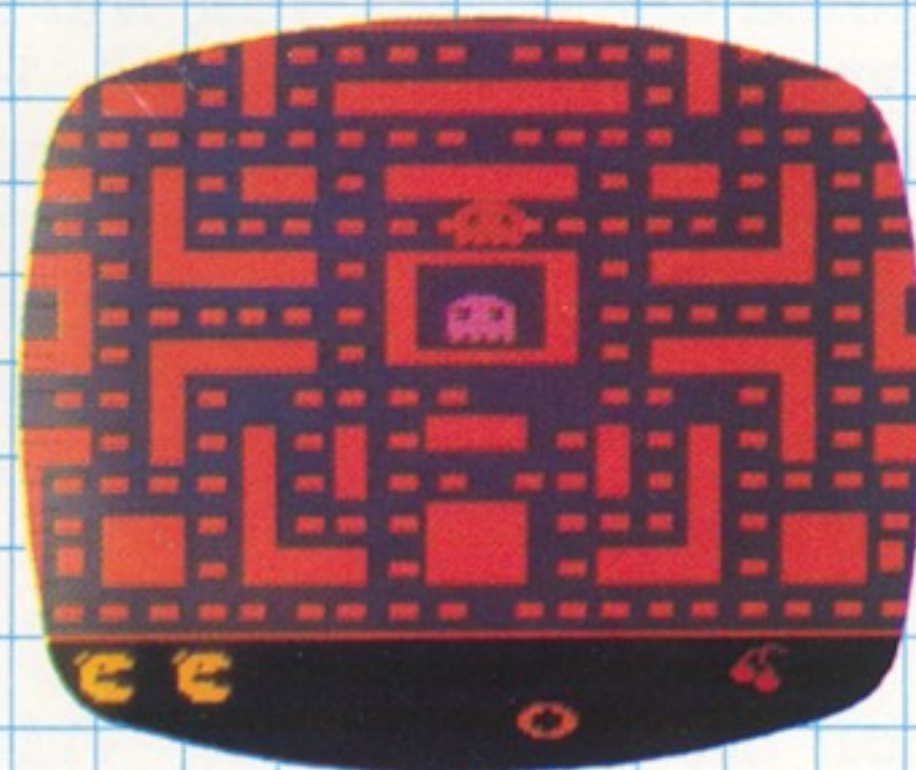
As commander of the desert crawler 'the Phoenix' you are faced with another demanding Atari challenge.

At last, everybody's favourite little yellow gobbler has a friend who's just as intrepid as he is, especially when it comes to gobbling ghosts. MS PAC-MAN, the new Atari video game, arrives in the UK in May.

Guide the bold beauty around the maze as she gobbles up everything in her way: dots, fruit, pretzels, energy pills and ghosts. But remember, she can only gobble a ghost when she's eaten an energy pill, otherwise the ghost will get her and you'll lose one MS PAC-MAN life. You get three MS PAC-MAN lives for each game and a bonus life each time you score 10,000 points. Every time MS PAC-MAN clears the maze, it flashes momentarily and a new maze of dots appears.

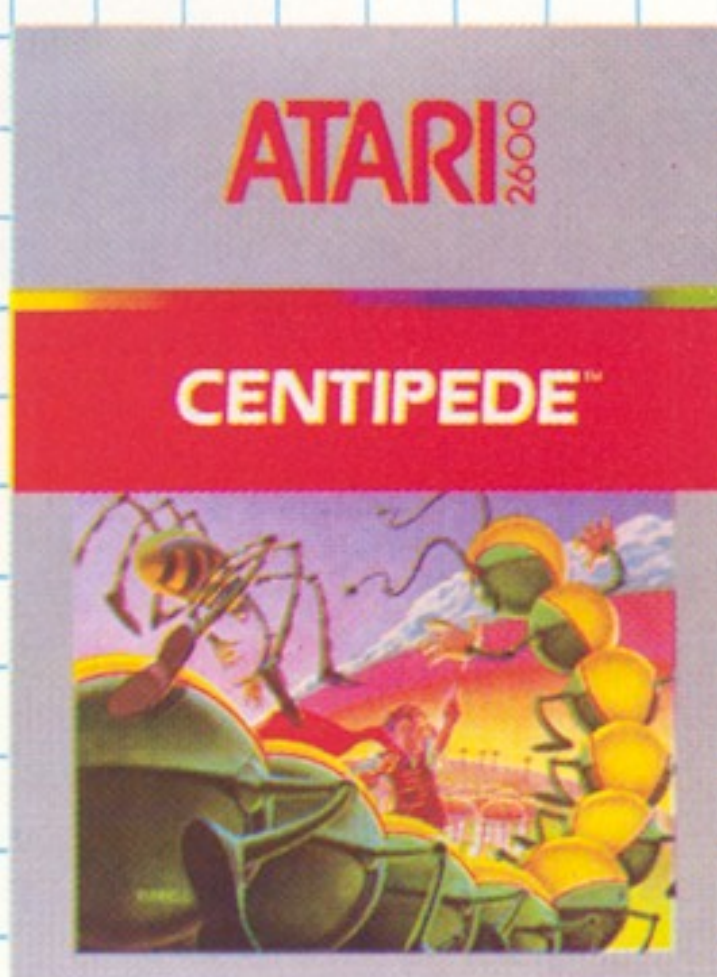
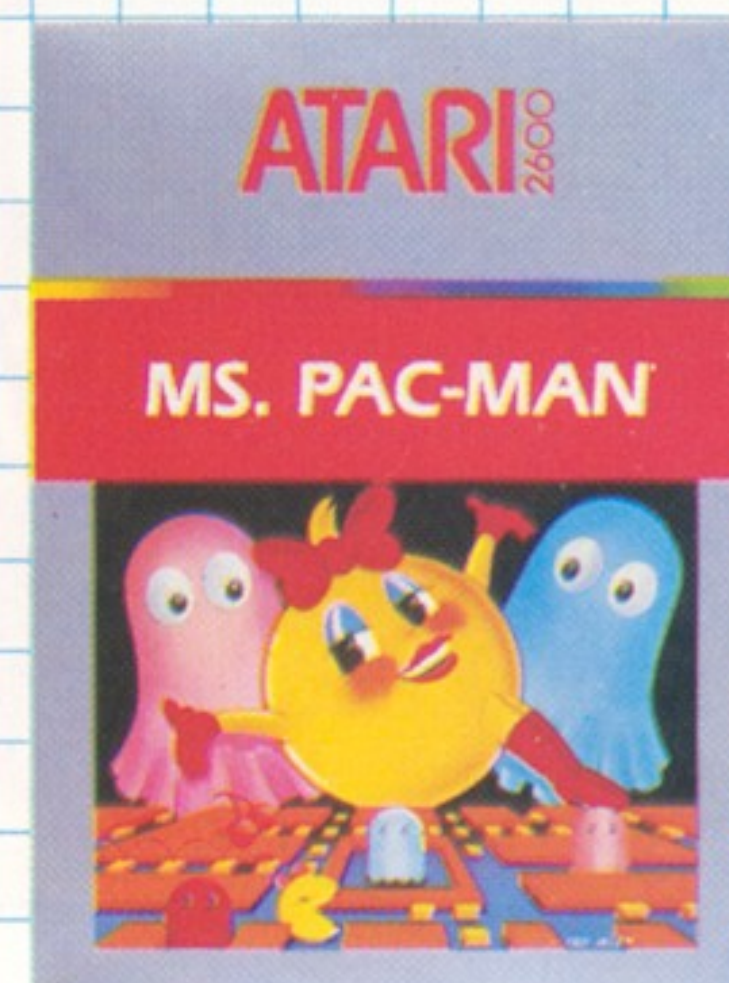
MS PAC-MAN is a one player game using the joystick controller. There are four game variations, where between one and four ghosts chase her.

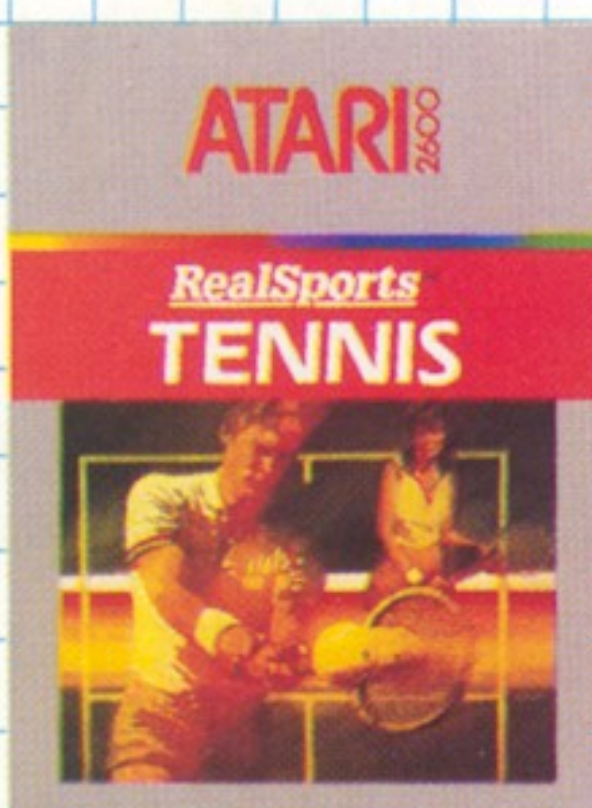


CENTIPEDE — JUNE

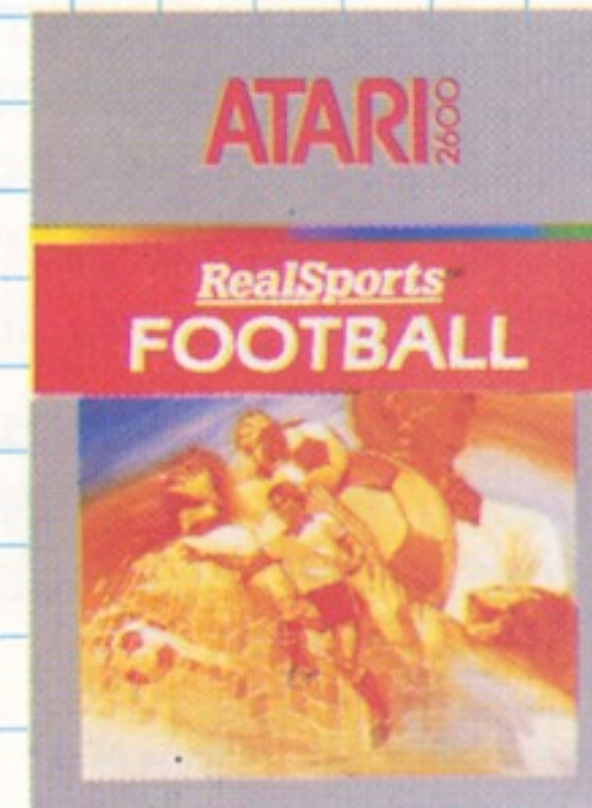


REALLY SUPER FOOTBALL — JULY

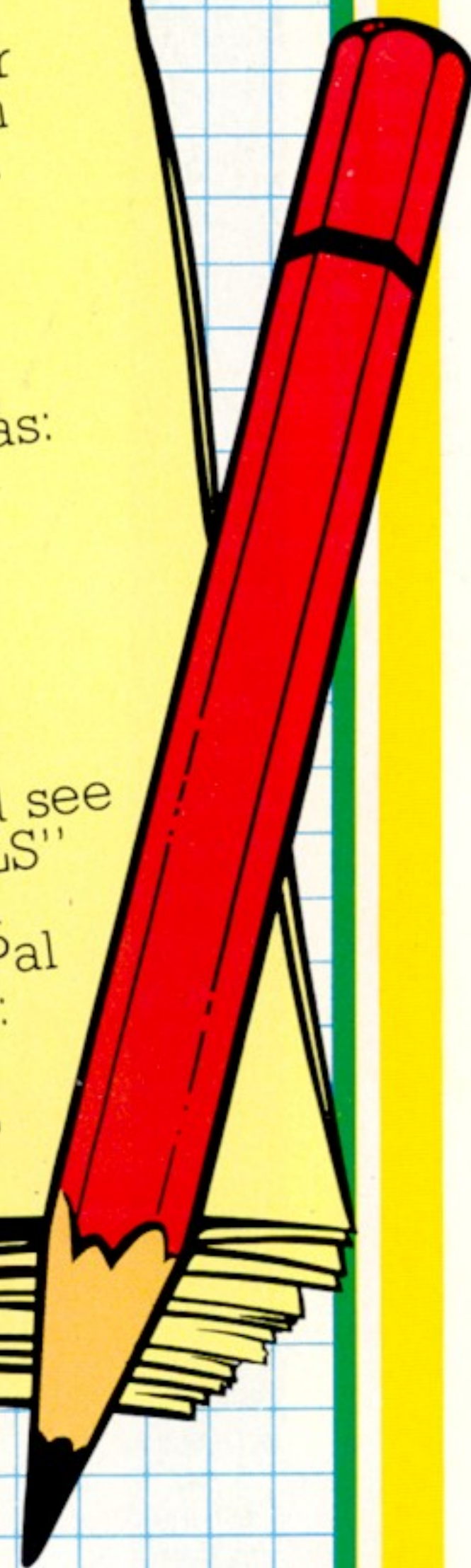

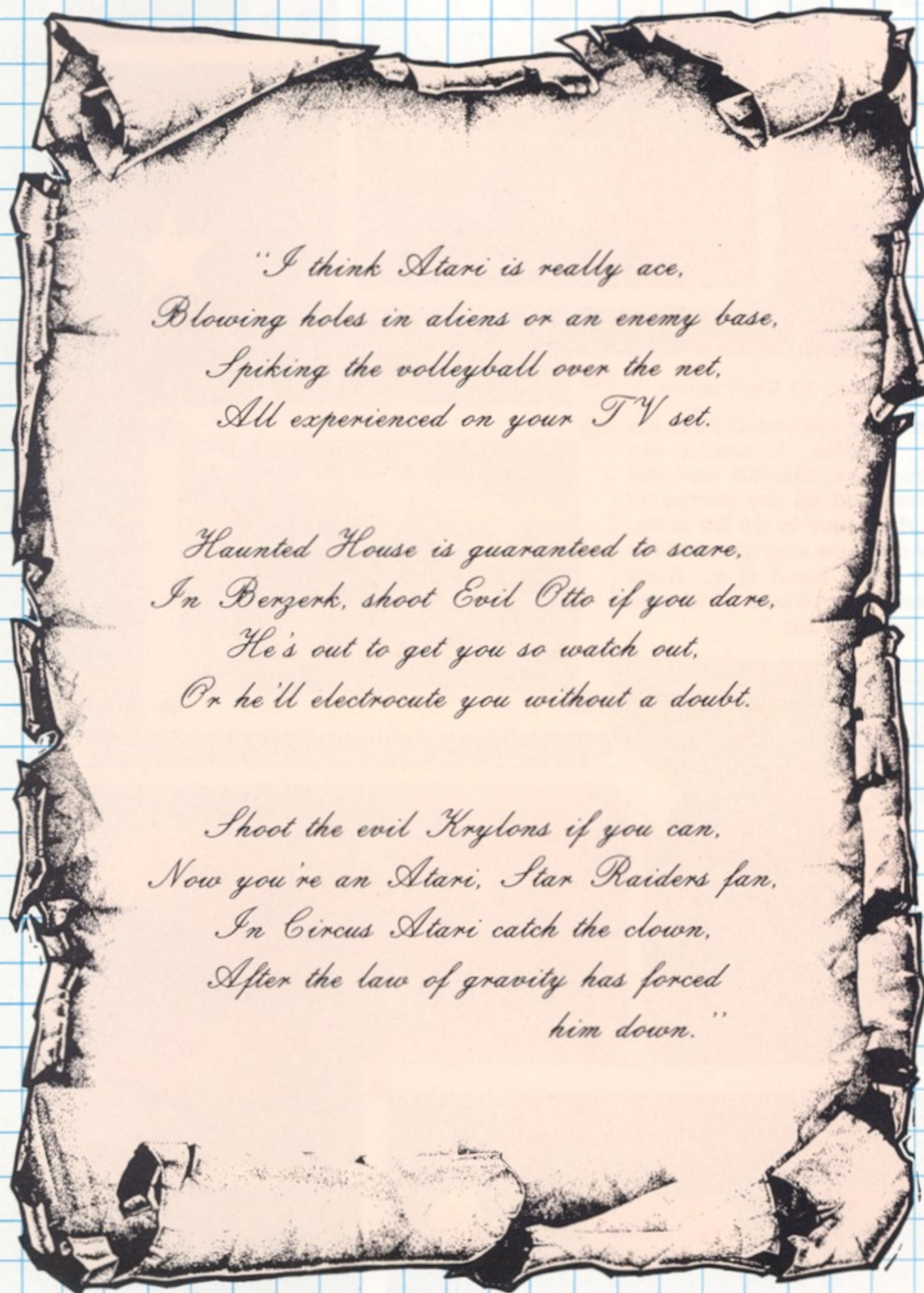

Everyone had a really great time at the Atari Soccer Six Championship at the Birmingham National Exhibition Centre on 25 and 26 January with all the razzmatazz of exciting football, a marching band, dry ice, electronic score board, giant Diamond Vision Screen and of course a chance to try out all the latest Atari video games and home computer programs.

Atari's sponsorship of the event attracted eight First Division teams to take part in the Championship and they rose to the occasion by providing skills and goals in abundance. In the fifteen matches, Arsenal, Ipswich Town, Swansea, Everton, Southampton, Birmingham City, Manchester City and Nottingham Forest scored a staggering total of 76 goals at the rate of one every three minutes. The highest scorer in one single game was Mick Harford of Birmingham City who scored five out of the eight goals in a Group 2 game against Ipswich.

If you're not familiar with the game, Atari Soccer-Six is very like the outdoor game, but there are, of course, only six players in each team on the pitch at any one time. However, the use of substitutes is unlimited, due to the extremely tough pace of the game. One of the big differences is naughty players are punished immediately with a couple of minutes in the "sin-bin". The electronic score board displays the sinner's name and a cartoon of him being given "six of the best" by an irate schoolmaster!

The referee has special hand signals to stop the clock or give a two-minute penalty and chief ref., George Courtney of Spennymoor, Co. Durham, became quite a favourite with the capacity crowds with his dramatic signalling.

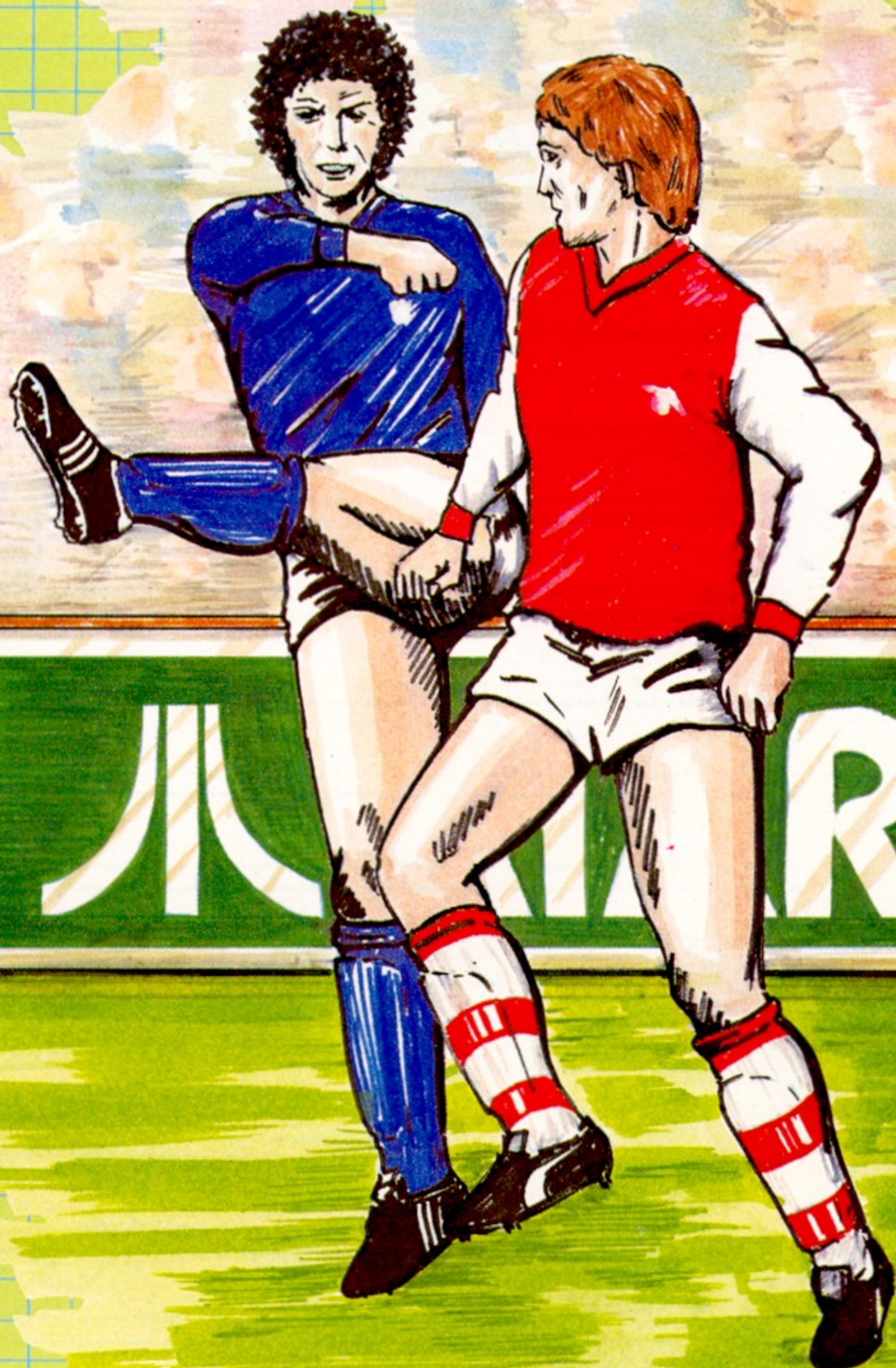

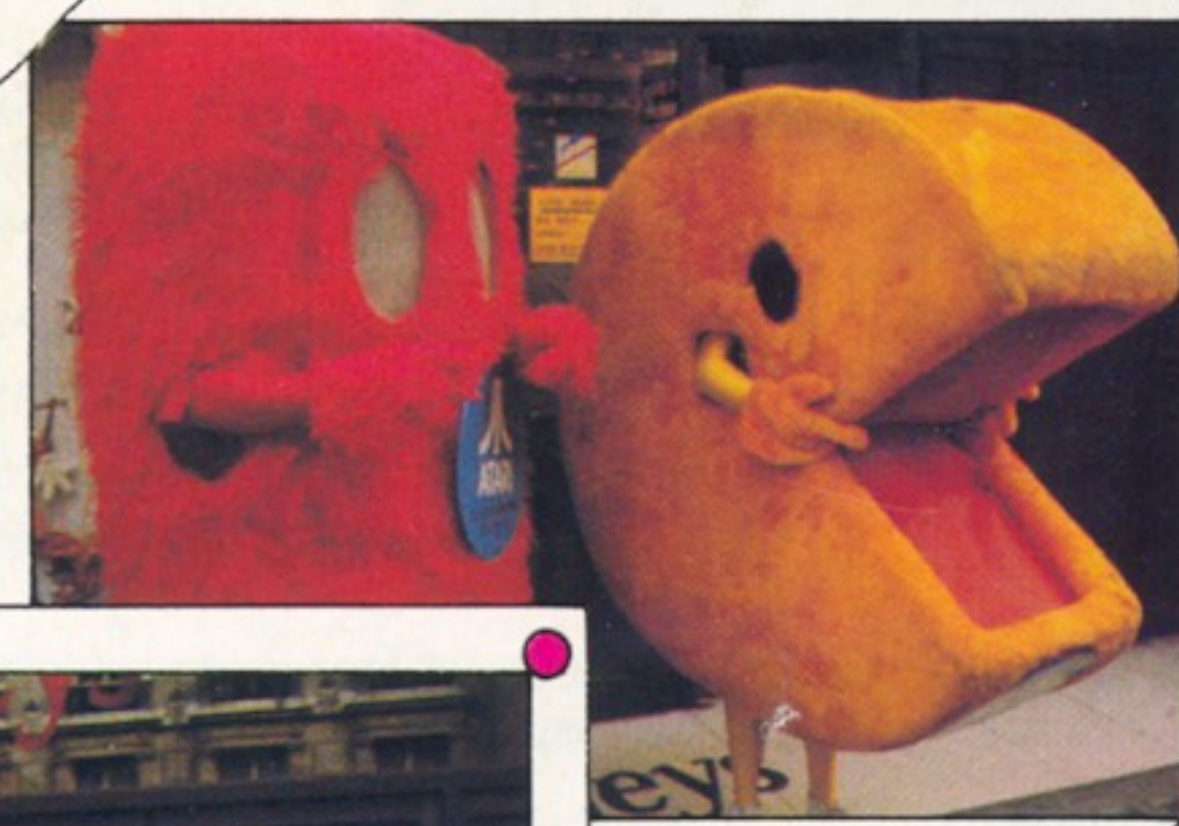
