

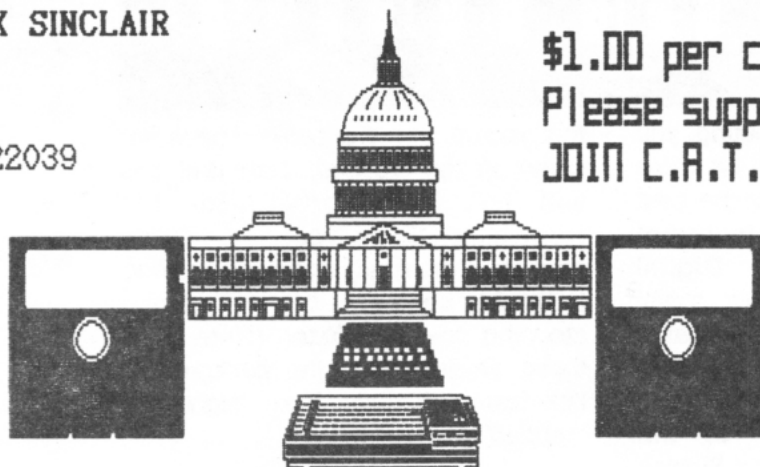

FROM THE EDITOR

I've endured its many shortcomings because I felt that, as a Sinclair user group, it was our duty to demonstrate the utility of the hardware and versatility of the software being developed for Sinclair machines.

Several months ago I bought an Atari ST, because it looked like a real winner for desktop publishing, with a program called Publishing Partner. After playing around with that program, I realized that there were many things I didn't care for (and this goes for the Atari in general), so I used the machine very little. Then came Publisher ST by Timeworks. Concurrently, I began to realize how much time I was putting into the CATS newsletter. As I've said before, using a dtp program doesn't necessarily save time but, hopefully, insures a better looking product. Useful information for the users of Uncle Clive's newest computer

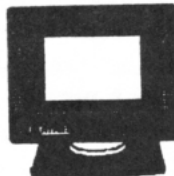
Transfer of files from the Z88 to the QL.

The following program can be used to transfer files with the Z88 Export menu to the QL. The file can be shown on the QL screen when being transferred. The program reads the incoming characters and sends them to a QL file. When a chr(13) is received a newline is generated. The control sequences from Import all start with chr(27) and are handled with the Select statement. For the codes see the Z88 Manual, page 190. The procedure SKIP is used to skip over the file name sent by the Z88. For next month, I will have the program for transfer from the QL to the Z88.

TELECOMPUTING WITH TIMEX SINCLAIR COMPUTERS

I will be presenting a talk at the October meeting on how to get into the world of telecomputing using Timex/Sinclair computers. This article is a "teaser" of what's in store. If something seems confusing, don't worry - I'll cover this in more detail at the meeting, and you can always ask questions!

Other sources of good information are most of the major T/S and non T/S computer magazines. COMPUTER SHOPPER is a good source for general information and ads for suppliers. PC Magazine's July 1988 issue has an in-depth article on telecomputing.

WHAT IS "TELECOMPUTING"?

"Telecomputing" is a conjunction of the words "telecommunications" and "computing". Roughly translated, that means "using computers over great distances". In practice, you will need four pieces of equipment to participate in telecomputing: a computer, a modem, a telephone line, and special software for the computer to manage the whole ball of wax!

WHAT DO THESE THINGS DO?

The computer can be virtually anything - from a ZX-81 or TS-1000; through a 2068, QL, or Z88; a PC "clone" or Macintosh; up through a VAX or IBM mainframe (I'll stick to the T/S and other small personal computers!). The modem is a piece of hardware that translates the digital voltage signals used by the computer into multi-tone audio signals compatible with the telephone system. The modem MODULATES the signal from the computer to the phone line and DEMODULATES the signal from the line to the computer (hence the name, "modem").

The telephone line provides the physical connection between the telecomputing computers. You don't always have to have a phone line -

telecomputing via radio was demonstrated at a recent CATS meeting.

Probably the most crucial part of the setup is the software that manages the operation at each computer that's connected. Communications software programs have to control the modem's operation, control how information is sent to and from the computer and modem, handle the display of text and graphics, and allow the computer's user to easily supervise the operation without too much effort on his or her part.

Communications software can range from very simple "terminal emulators" that only allow displaying and sending plain text, to sophisticated programs allowing automated transfer of messages and files, to "computer bulletin board" programs that allow a computer to telecompute with other computers with no human intervention at all!

WHY SHOULD I BE INTERESTED IN TELECOMPUTING?

Why go to all this bother just to connect a computer to the telephone line? The whole reason for being for computers is to process information. The ability to connect your computer to other computers next door to thousands of miles away places an entire world of information within your grasp.

While telecomputing hasn't reached the scope of what some futurists have predicted, several benefits from telecomputing have already been achieved:

- o readily transfer data and programs from one computer into another;
- o exchange documents, pictures, and other data and programs in the time-span of a phone call;
- o create public forums for exchanging information and viewpoints on an

unlimited number of technical and social topics;

o make large databases of information on finance, news, business, literature, and other subjects accessible to anyone who can afford a computer;

o of particular interest to T/S enthusiasts, get help from and keep up-to-date with the latest news and software available for our computers with fellow enthusiasts all over the country.

You can use even the old ZX-81 or TS-1000 to explore the world of telecomputing. The more powerful 2068 and QL are extremely capable hardware for telecomputing, with features on a par with the popular MS-DOS systems.

WHAT'S "OUT THERE" ESPECIALLY FOR OWNERS OF T/S COMPUTERS?

Most of the T/S telecomputing activity is centered on T/S computer bulletin boards (BBS). A BBS is a computer with a modem running a special software program that allows it to operate without a human being present.

Like a paper-based" bulletin board, a BBS can be used to "post" messages for everyone to read and respond to. A BBS can also be used to exchange messages more-or-less privately between specific individuals, and to transfer programs and data files between computers.

Many different combinations of computers, modems, and software can communicate via a BBS - they only have to be able to communicate with the BBS itself. In effect, the BBS becomes a "universal translator" for the "Tower of Babel" that makes up the world of computers.

There are several BBSs that cater specifically to the T/S community. Unfortunately, none of them are local to Washington, DC. Most of them serve as electronic meeting places for metropolitan-area clubs (such as the

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WHAT A WIERD PROGRAM!

or, Fusion Power in Your Own Living Room for the 2068

Want real excitement bunky? How about a program that produces two matching random-dot grey screens? Pretty exciting, huh? Well, yes, in a way. This program doesn't just make speckled screens. It then takes one of those speckled screens, and subtly shifts part of it. No visible change has occurred, but it is possible to use the organic parallel processor on top of our spine to decode the shift, and show us the shape, as either a raised or sunken contour.

♦ Theory

You have good vision if your eyes work, right? Wrong. You have good sight if your eyes work. If an Ophthalmologist puts drops in your eyes to measure acuity, he is



evaluating the performance of your eyeballs. Vision involves massive "image processing" by your mind. The twin images from the eyes, already processed to some extent, are analyzed to generate an internal three-dimensional model of your field of view. Various subtle cues are used to generate your internal model - the most important of which are the

differences between the two eyes' view of the scene. This stereo effect is familiar to anyone that has used a stereopticon or seen "Jaws 3D". Randot patterns, as Optometrists know them, depend upon the brain's ability to correlate millions of data points, and generate a simple theory to organize them. The random dots within the shape are shifted to the right in the rightmost image. To the mind, when comparing the two images as two views of one object, this would only occur if a smooth patterned surface were moved towards the viewer. When the mind has finally correlated the positions of all the points (in this program, up to 21,875 of them) your perception of what you are looking at will change radically, and the shape will appear. No amount of image analysis within one of the screens could generate the image. Only the mind's ability to imagine the shape of what is "really" out there allows you to see it. For you techo-buffs, try this: cut the screens apart, then after getting fusion, and seeing the shape, try rotating one of the screens SLOWLY. You should be able to fuse the two screens with up to a five degree skew! Try that on your optical character reader!

♦ Practice

If you have access to an old stereopticon, simply replace the photographic print slides with the printouts from this program. However, a viewer is not necessary. Stereo perception depends upon the fusion to the two images. That is, the eyes are pulled in until the images "overlap". This pulling-in is called convergence. In normal use of your eyes, you do this all the time.

By holding a finger 5" in front of your nose, you will notice that it takes a definite effort to shift your gaze from

this page to your finger. You may also notice that there were two transparent images of your finger when you looked at the page, which came together as you looked at the finger. If you hold a finger up at a greater distance, and pull in with your eyes in the same way, you will now see two fingers; the images from each eye are no longer superimposed. Now, if you hold two fingers up, it is possible to pull in in the same way, and see four fingers. By moving the fingers together, or by varying the "pull" you exert with your eyes, you can cause the two inner images to overlap, and end up "seeing" three fingers! The fingers will be blurry at first, but by thinking of the center image and relaxing, they will clear up. It is this same skill which will let you perceive the hidden shape. Holding the printout up, or regarding the screen, pull in until the third screen is clear and sharp. If one image is higher than the other, tip your head slightly to the side until they are at the same level, then fuse them.



Observe the individual pixels - scan from one corner to the other. There will be an area of "wrongness", that will gradually clarify into a clearly defined shape, raised from the background. By cutting out the printouts and reversing them, you will see the same pattern, but with a

significant difference. You'll notice that I haven't told you what shape to expect -if you can get fusion, you'll see the shape. If you find the above directions easy to follow, try to look through the sheet to the far distance. Hold the cards farther away than you would expect, and use reading glasses if you have them. If you can fuse the two screens now, you will see a subtle change in the appearance of the pattern.

♦ The program

I've been free with REM's in the program, but there may be some areas that don't make sense. The program sequence is not obvious - I've moved the least used routines to the upper end, and the most often called subroutines to the front. Program flow is as follows: Upon loading, the program autostarts at 9800, setting up and loading the printer driver. RUN then transfers control to the expected sequence. The 7000's contain the setup lines and the main menu. At 7020, I load a prepared sample screen, then print the titles over it. Just drop this LOAD to simplify operation. You are offered the option of scanning the instructions (held in lines 8000-). The rather peculiar spacing of the instruction lines assures that they will land on the correct parts of the screen. Line 7050 establishes the line numbers of the various subroutines. (If you want to look at one of those subroutines after the program is loaded, just type "LIST move" for example.) Line 7180 keeps you from setting up a screen until you've selected a shape. Here the user is asked for a grain size. This variable determines the coarseness of the "pixels" used in the grey tone. Values of 1-3 produce useable screens for fusion, while values of 10-20 let you check the operation of the program quickly. At lines 7220-30, a screen is either drawn (6000) or LOADED (5000). If a new screen has been drawn, you are offered the option of SAVEing it. Files will be SAVEd as "grain5.scr", for example,

for a screen of grain 5, to remind you to set the grain value correctly. Once you have taken the considerable time to generate a grain 1 or grain 2 screen, there is little need to generate another. It is much quicker to reLOAD a screen, then try a new shape on it. Then control passes to the "shift" sub (4000). Here, you must decide how far to slide the shape. This distance is expressed in pixels: if you select a value smaller than the grain size, nothing will happen. The farther the shape is slid, the farther it will stand out from the background - but it will also be harder to clearly fuse the image. The particular shape chosen is determined by the variable "shape" which is used as a subroutine vector (1000-). The "move" sub (2000) takes care of the mechanics of PLOTting and UNPLOTting on the 2068. The attempt is to exactly move each "pixel" within the shape. When the shape has been moved, you will have the option to print a hard copy, SAVE the screen, or try again. The SAVE routine at line 4110 generates file names such as gr-5shp.scr as a reminder of the correct grain size.

SAVE and LOAD commands are tailored for the AERCO disk system. If you're using tape, you'll have to change the lines that now contain either CAT or MOVE.

Likewise, COPY is invoked on my system with "RANDOMIZE USR 64628". There is also a corrected version of my "renum" program at 9000, and a short routine at 9500 to set up my printer for LLISTings.

Have fun, and don't strain your eyes! (You needn't worry about getting your eyes stuck crossed.)

two Boston Computer Society T/S boards). Several T/S boards are special-interest conferences on larger systems (such as the Passaic, NJ BBS).

The biggest T/S board of all is the T/S conference on CompuServe. CompuServe is an "information utility", accessible for a fee based on the amount of time you use it. The T/S conference is a nation-wide meeting place for T/S enthusiasts. Recently, planning for starting SNUG (a North-America user group for T/S computers) has been the main feature of the weekly T/S conference. This illustrates one of the biggest advantages of telecomputing - enabling people across the U.S. to work together on a project for the price of a phone call! (Can you imagine trying to coordinate starting an enterprise like SNUG if all you had was the US Postal Snail or worse, had to fly to every meeting!?)

One of the biggest features of BBSs for non-T/S computers are the megabytes of software you can download. While there is a relative lack of similar software for T/S computers, there's still some pretty good stuff out there. Additionally, BASIC programs for other computers can be downloaded and modified to run on T/S computers.

Finally, T/S telecomputerists can participate in many non-T/S activities.

For example, many BBSs in the Washington area feature nation-wide conferences on subjects from Astronomy to Zoology, and almost anything in-between.

WHAT SPECIFICALLY DO I NEED TO BRING MY T/S COMPUTER INTO THE TELECOMPUTING AGE?

There are several options for telecomputing with T/S computers. For the ZX-81, TS-1000, and TS-1500, the simplest (and oldest) approach is to use the Westridge 2050 or Byte-Back modems. Both plug into the expansion port, and come with a limited communications software program. Another option is the Comlink I interface, which allows you to connect any "standard" external modem to the expansion port. The Comlink interface also includes a very basic terminal program in ROM.

The above options have two major limitations - they are slow speed (limited to 300 baud), and they use the standard 32 column screen. Since most non-T/S systems are set up to use 64 or 80 column screens, it can become VERY difficult to read what the BBS is sending you! The most recent option for the smallest T/S is the Z-Term 64 program from Silicon Mountain Systems. It fixes both problems. With the addition of an RS-232 interface, faster modems can be used. And 64 column displays are supported, making it far easier to read messages.

Options for the 2068 include the 2050 and Byte-Back modems. They have the same advantages and limitation as with the TS-1000 - easy to use, but slow and limited. The combination of the Z-SIO interface board and Specterm-64 communications software gives 2068 owners access to faster modems and better displays. This is probably the "standard" for 2068 telecomputing.

QL owners have plenty of choices. The QL comes with serial ports (although they are not-quite "industry standard"). Many different modems have been successfully used with the

QL, although sometimes a special interface product (the Modaptor) is needed to accommodate the idiosyncrasies of the QL's hardware.

The other item QL owners need is a good communications software program. Several are available from the usual QL accessory suppliers. The best programs support wide screen displays, faster (1200 and 2400 baud) speeds, and the ability to send and receive to tape or disk. These programs are as capable as the "big names" in the MS-DOS world.

I've used a ZX-81 (with a "real" keyboard) with the Comlink I interface and a 300 baud external modem I picked up at a computer flea market for \$15. The Comlink I costs about \$50. This is probably the least expensive way to sample telecomputing. I quickly found it fascinating and frustrating. The fascination came with my realization that I was entering a whole new world of information and ideas. The frustration was caused by my limited set-up. Trying to scan through a lengthy list of messages at 300 baud, with a 32 column display, and no ability to store the messages to read later "off line" takes a long time and is tough on the eyes!

A SHOPPING LIST FOR T/S TELECOMPUTING.

I don't have a 2068 or QL, so I cannot comment on first-hand experience with their capabilities. But based on my experience with CP/M and MS-DOS systems, here's what I would consider a solid set-up for T/S telecomputing:

For the 2068:

- o An external modem capable of at least 1200 baud (2400 baud is even better and doesn't cost much more).
- o An RS-232 interface (2068) that supports at least 1200 baud.
- o Communications software with at least 64 column display (80 column preferred), can capture text displayed

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ASK MANNIE—Chapter 3

Transcribed and reported by Hank Dickson

NOTE: The following is a continuation of the Q-and-A session originated in July by CATS member MANNIE QUINTERO, the reporting of which began in the August, 1988 CATS Newsletter.

Q: How do I get rid of "retrace lines" in RGB monitors?

A: According to Past President Tom Bent, the answer is to turn down the master gain in your monitor until the screen is black (a la Dan Rather), then "crank up" the gain on the three colors until the desirable combination is achieved. This is essentially a "level problem" which needs to be "balanced out". Also, it is a monitor problem, not a computer problem. Bring in your monitor sometime to a hardware session, and Tom can demonstrate how to do this fix. A certain amount of "diddling" is required, it always best to leave this in the hands of an expert diddler.

Q: What modifications do I need to be able to use a monitor with a TS-1000 or a 1500?

A: An excellent question, indeed!! Let me repeat: because of this request, CATS Newsletter Editor Vern Smith reprinted Mark Fisher's full-page article, "Driving a Monitor from the TS-1000", in the August 1988 issue. This article, featuring two illustrations, originally appeared in the April, 1985 CATS n/l. (I guess old classics never die!!) Fortunately, we all now have this information again for our own personal reference and use.

Q: Is there a way to use a floppy disk drive with a TS-1000 or a 1500?

A: Yes: get a Larkin or AERCO disk drive interface, the best remaining entries on the commercial market for linking floppy disk drives and the Sinclair family of computers. The newsletters we exchange with other user groups are kept in two or three large blue 3-ring binders and are available for you to look at during the

meetings. People who have reviewed these books recently say there is a wealth of information and opinion there about Larken and AERCO. It might be a good idea to check this source out yourself sometime soon.

EDITOR'S NOTE: If you are interested in Larken info, let me know. The Canadian groups with whom we exchange newsletters are full of Larken info. If there is interest, I will reprint it. Drop me a line and let me know.

Q: How can I connect a 2068 to a hi-fi system in order to listen to computer generated music?

A: Tom Bent says one option is to take the sound off a chip on the expansion board. Or, it is possible to take it right off the speaker by removing the speaker and jumping its wires to the input of the hi-fi system. The best, though, is to capture the sound chip output. It should be possible to set up a pin-out at the back of the 2068 to make this as painless as possible. We're not certain what adjustments might be needed with your hi-fi rig to be able to accept the 2068's output, but minimal amplification would no doubt be one of them.

on the screen for later review, and allows transfer of text and binary files to and from your computer. Specterm-64 is the state of the art.

o "Serial" cable to connect the modem and RS-232 interface - make sure yours has the correct number of pins (9 or 25 are standard) and socket type (male or female) for your hardware.

For the QL:

o External modem - get a 2400 baud model if you can afford the extra \$25-\$50.

o Communications software. Most QL programs display 80 columns of text, can capture text displayed on the screen for later review, and allow transfer of text and binary files to and from your computer.

o Modaptor (if needed). Early QL communications software required one. I've read reports that the newer programs eliminate the need for it.

o "Serial" cable to connect the modem to your computer - make sure yours has the correct number of pins (usually 25 at the modem end and 9 at the QL end) and socket type (male or female) for your hardware.

For the Z88:

o External modem. The large number of MS-DOS laptop computers has spawned a number of small, lightweight, battery operated external modems. Most will work with the Z88.

o Serial cable to connect the modem and computer. Most of the new lightweight modems have a 25 pin connector, while the Z88 has a 9 pin connector.

o The Z88 has at least a limited communications program built-in. Hopefully, a full-featured program will become available soon.

There has been an "explosion" of availability of modems over the past year. I've seen decent 1200 baud modems for under \$100 and 2400 baud modems for \$120-\$150. See ads in almost any computer magazine, especially COMPUTER SHOPPER. Make sure you buy an EXTERNAL MODEM! Many of the least expensive modems are designed to be installed inside MS-DOS (PC "clone") systems, and are completely incompatible with anything else!

I recently purchased a good 2400 baud external modem from an advertisement in COMPUTER SHOPPER for \$120. It works with my ZX81, my NEC laptop, or any of the PC's at the office. The advantage of an external modem over the T/S-

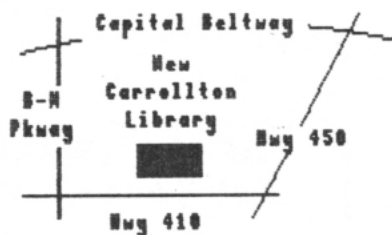
