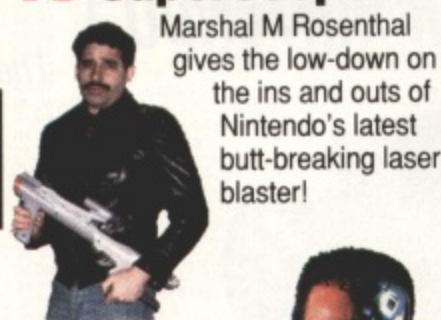

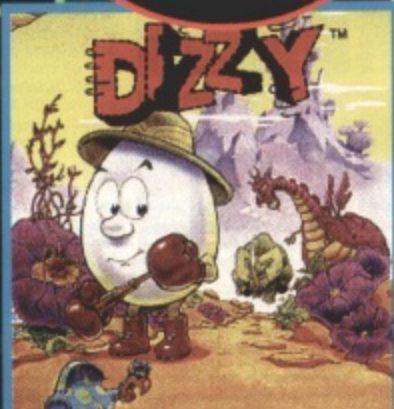

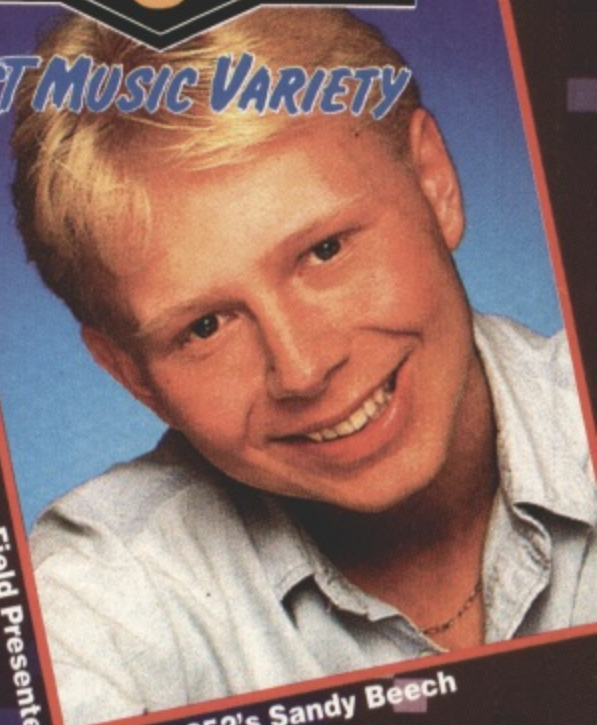

RENTALS: FACE OF THE FUTURE?

Nintendo machines owners should soon be able to rent games, if predictions from the industry are correct. Leading UK games company Acclaim is currently looking at renting a range of titles. Although no firm decision has been made, marketing director Larry Sparks said the matter was under careful consideration.

In an interview with N-FORCE, he said he believed games rentals were only a matter of time, and that it would provide a boost to the industry in general.

'We're looking at the overall situation — the matter is being discussed internally at the moment,' said Sparks.

'The industry has to continue to move with the times and grow if it is to maintain its position. The sooner rental comes on board the better.

'I believe it'll take only a matter of months before rental is in place. I can't see it taking longer than that.'

Rentals would give Nintendo games fans a chance to look at titles before they bought them. Sparks said this would force software publishers to bring out quality products.

But he doesn't believe that a rental market would stop people buying games.

'If people are paying two or three quid per night to rent a cartridge and it's a good game, they won't finish it in that time so they'll think they might as well buy it,' he said.

'Rentals will stimulate demand to purchase products and can only have a positive effect — not a negative one.'

'I think the days of bringing out sub-standard games are numbered. You can't fool the public forever.'

'At the moment we stand publicly alone in this view, but in private there's a lot of people who agree with us.'

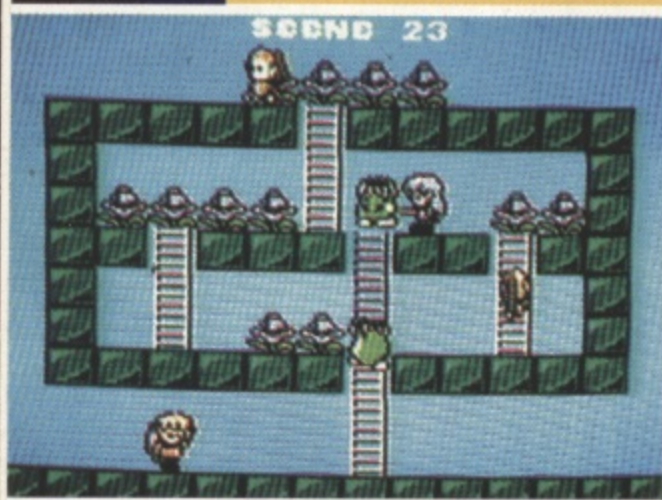

The £149.99 16-bit console is tipped by Nintendo's UK distributor Bandai, to sell 650,000 units by the end of the year — and a million software sales in the same period. That'll mean a staggering 3.25 million households with 4-15 year-olds will own an SNES, NES or Game Boy! Despite the recession, the SNES is already off to a great start with 25,000 sold in the first 10 days since its release!

Mike Hayes, Nintendo's British marketing director, confidently proclaims: 'These products are recession proof. Parents will never let their kids suffer.' Right on! Their confidence will be strengthened now that top electronic retailers Dixons have done a massive U-turn. They had originally refused to stock the machine. But the two appear to have settled differences and Dixons are now going full steam ahead on the SNES front, with a high profile official launch in London.

The chain are converting the £149 *Super Marioland* pack into a £169 bundle of the hardware and the SuperScope peripheral (see page 16).

There are only 100,000 units available initially, so if you want the most powerful console money can buy, better get down the shops pronto! Everything about the SNES smacks of super. 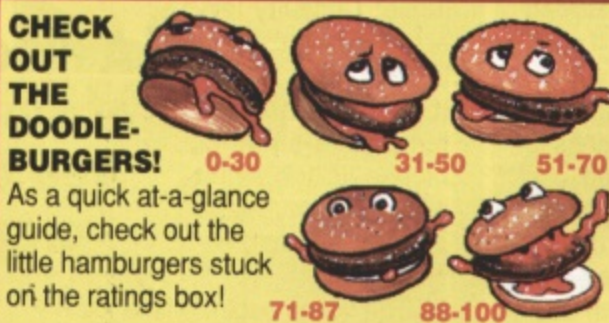

Streetfighte



Being mean, fighting dirty and never showing any mercy — MARSHAL and the latest from Capcom have a lot in common...

No preamble, no cutsey little story of maidens in distress, and no more Mr Nice Guy. Forget it — it's just you, *Streetfighter 2*, and a whole packet of pain.

You're in for the biggest hammering of your life, with more violence, mauling and arse-kicking than you can ever imagine. If you've still got teeth left after this there's something diabolically wrong.

It's one of the latest offerings for SNES owners and boy is it bad. Just like the coin-op — only meaner and nastier. Eight fighters in six countries — each with awesome speed and specialized martial arts skills. Each

out to kill, using feet, fist, head, special powers. Are you man enough for this (er... 'fraid not — Ed)?

No pansies allowed

We'll soon find out. Select a character, pick a country, and cut loose. Difficulty level? — forget it. There is only one — HARD. If you're a banana milkshake-sipping, blouse-licking kinda wimp, go play *Mario* and stop wasting our time.

The action begins with a loud digitised 'FIGHT' screamed out from your machine. There's no turning back after that, buddy — you're on your own.

Nothing to hide behind, nothing to pick up and toss (although a few boxes and signs do come in handy for battering people against).

Three tries to be the winner, each match complete unto itself. Drive your opponent's energy meter up at the top into the red, then finish 'em off with a

butt to the head, or a swift kick in the you-know-whats. Hitting below the belt is a good way to bring tears to their eyes. Don't even think about being nice.

Just like in the arcade version, that final blow causes the loser to crash

spectacularly to the ground in slow-mo, chewing up dust clouds before lying still in defeat.

A nice piece of work with well defined graphics

Balls of fire

Ryu and Ken — Perform super uppercuts (flying upwards and delivering a mighty blow), and helicopter kicks (levitating up and spinning about). They can also toss blue fireballs from a distance. (These cancel each other out when hit).

Guile — A fireball (small and yellowish), and a flank kick.

Chun Li — This broad's hot with her upside-down kick, and also has the thousand foot move (not as nice as it sounds).

E Hondo — He has quick hands (similar to Chun Li's feet — only with fingers instead of toes), and can propel himself like a torpedo for a flying head butt.

Zangief — Besides a combination of powerful throws, he can grab a foe

and upend him for a powerful (and painful) piledriver. For those who don't know what this is — imagine head-butting a flat-to-the-boards Intercity 125.

Blanca — This beast turns into a rolling ball and strikes with great force. He also electrifies himself, so keep your distance.

Dhalism — He not only spews fireballs from his mouth at opponents, but also surrounds himself with flame. Aargh!

Each fighter has their own way of dealing with things, and learning these moves takes time but, unlike the arcade version, this information is provided in the manual. There's the usual, leap, crouch and punch, together with the short kick, forward kick, and the slow but powerful roundhouse kick.

A real kick up the...!

My favourite's Chun Li's flying kick. She levitates and turns completely upside-down before rotating and doing serious GBH. To really get her buzzing — jump, push forward on the joystick and punch.

After three opponents there's a bonus level. Trash a nice, clean automobile to bag a bonus. Good way

Now who do you battle?



■ **KEN** — American. Similar to RYU. You'll find him at the shipping docks in the States.

■ **E.HONDO** — Japanese. This big Sumo guy can grab and squeeze the life right out of you. Not to mention banging your head repeatedly. The Bath House is where he's at.

■ **ZANGIEF** — Russian. Another big guy with a lot of moves. His mini piledriver will give you quite a headache, and he'll take your breath away by squeezing your face or stomach. He hangs out with his friends at the construction site in Russia.

■ **BLANKA** — The Beast from Brazil. He loves to bite off your head. A residential village is his home.

■ **DHALISM** — From India. He can do some mean tosses, and likes to bat your head with his. The quiet monastery's where he can be found.



■ **RYU** — Japanese. He can throw opponents and kick toss. Look for him in the Japanese Temple.



■ **GUILE** — American. Does a mean air toss (up and off you go), as well as a backbreaker that makes the



opponent's head feel like it's popping off. Guile hangs out on a USA military base.



■ **CHUN LI** — Chinese and the only female. She's also got good tossing abilities. Her turf's the marketplace in China.

to practise those moves as you turn the metal into mulch. Time limit here too, so exotic moves are out — go for those quick punches and flashy footwork.

Just say you get through Guile's fearsome fireballs, Chun Li's thousand feet and your piles are still intact after being driven by Zangief's drivers, don't puff that chest out too hard, cos there's a bucket-load more headaches to be had yet.

First there's Bahlrog in Las Vegas, a guy with fists like flamin' steam engines. Then there's Spain and Vega, a dude with sharp fingernails and a number of nasty habits (No — one of them is NOT wearing apricot nail varnish).

Thailand's the final stop for a cheery interlude with Sagot and Bison. These guys won't remind you of your mother, and will give you nightmares.

Blaaarghgh!

To put it plainly, *Streetfighter 2* is a nice piece of work with well defined graphics, strongly drawn backgrounds with sharp edges and good definition. There's plenty of those lovely OOOMPH, CRRRACK and EURGHHHG sounds when you land a big one on a baddie.

In the background, awed onlookers watch the battle — but they're like wallpaper to be ignored. The



backgrounds are nice and colourful — who cares? Who has time to admire the art spent in drawing scenes of America, Brazil, Japan? Or the limited, almost comical animation of the background cast? Not when there's some gorilla-faced yob built like a brick cack-house to pummel into submission.

That goes for the music too. It sounds nice, has a good feel to add to the action — and changes with each scene. But again, if you love music, go fondle a juke box.

What I like about this game are the digitised battle sounds; the grunts, groans, and the sound of a body being compressed into something the size of a sandwich tin. I also like the 'intermission' screens that display the broken, blood-drenched puss of the meathead you just massacred. But then, I never was home-made apple pie sort of dude.

What it all comes down to is this. If you're a big frilly woozer, don't bother with *Streetfighter 2*. But if you've got a king-sized set of gonads and aren't scared of plastic surgery without anaesthetic, you just might be OK.



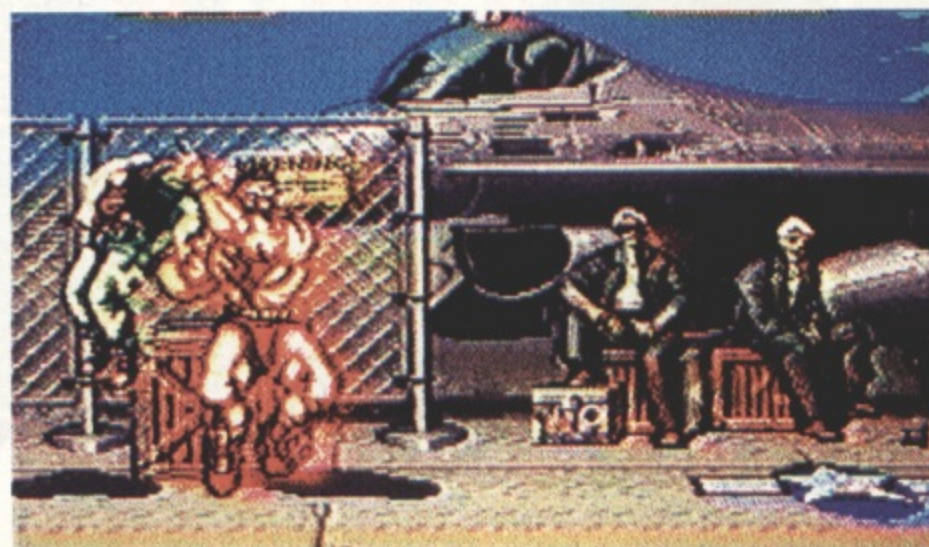

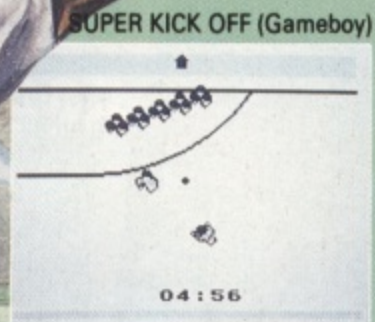

TAKING AIM WITH THE SuperScope



MARSHAL decided to upgrade his weapon, but found there's a lot more to handling a bigger piece than meets the eye. Firstly, which shoulder do you sling it over?...

Sly Stallone's got one, but Jason Donovan hasn't. Arnie was born with a seriously big one, Bruce Willis has a small but effective one, and Jonathon Ross would like one but probably wouldn't know what to do with it.

What are we talking about? Guns. Big-barrelled pulsating muthas of destruction. Dude-stomping grenade launchers, forest-clearing machine guns and kiss-your-bottom bye-bye missile chucks.

You can forget school, work, who has the fastest car, the nicest girlfriend or the smallest cellular phone. It's the size of your weapon that counts. Everything else means didley.

How big's yours?

For those SNES users feeling a tad self-conscious about the size of theirs, don't despair. Nintendo have come to the rescue with the Super Scope, a battery-powered high-accuracy 23-inch big banger.

True, it's not going to be a lot of use holding up the local bank, or dispersing those funny people with magazines and bibles who come callin' on

Sunday morning, but it sure as haddock can create mayhem on the screen.

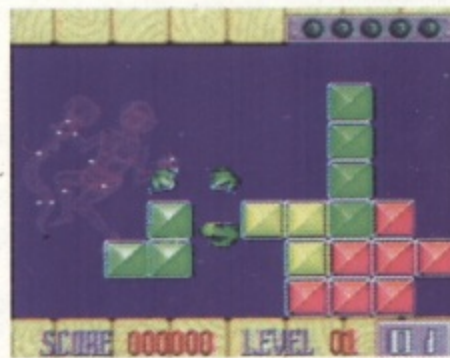
And to give you something to use your new-found weapon on, Super Scope comes complete with six games as part of the package (well, two, actually, with three distinct variations).

Roll on the carpet

The new Scope puts its 8-bit little brother to shame, with accuracy down to pixel level and a look that'd make even Arnie smile.

It snuggles into your shoulder, either left or right, and has side-swapping sights. There's a cursor button which gives a pencil red laser beam for aiming on certain games, a pause button which doubles as an onscreen target for checking aim, and a fire button (no need to explain that one, fellow maulers).

The power switch gives you rapid



fire when in the turbo position in some games. The six AA batteries fit into the shoulder mount — just like loading ammo — and it's surprisingly easy to use.

For those partial to diving and

rolling around on the floor with their weapon, feel free. Because of the scope's infra-red signalling, there's no cords to get tangled up in (it would sort of take the fun out of being a Herman, wouldn't it?).

The fun starts when you turn your SNES on. Press Fire to get the sight setting/target screen. Align the front sight with the centre of the target and press Fire again. A red dot appears on the target screen indicating where you hit the screen.

A word of advice — you need to see the Super Scope symbol on the screen when you turn on your cart. If you don't, either the game's not Scope compatible and the gun won't work, or someone's pulled the power plug on your monitor.

Carting around

The cart *Super Scope 6* contains what's called a *Blastris Series* and a *laser Blazer Series*. Each series has three games.

Blastris A — or blocks in space — is a traditional *Tetris*-type stack-the-blocks set-up 'cept you shoot 'em rather than spin 'em around. There's only a limited number of bullets, so don't think Uzi here.

The one criticism is the screen's not really exciting. Considering the graphic power of the SNES, the patterns are a bit too childish, and the twinkling stars don't cut it.

But then you can always go for *Blastris B* — more blocks but with a different background. (Really, it's not as bad as it sounds.) The scoring's good and the block colours are really neat — they seem to bubble and bulge within and without. (Too much curry perhaps? —Ed.)

But eventually the call of the wild takes hold and you'll want to kill something (naturally —Ed). What better than friendly and cute blue and pink little moles. In a very accommodating fashion, they stick their heads out of craters. The secret's to kill the blue ones. Hit a pink one and there's a slap on the wrist and a very much faster game.

A hint — the Molians seem to 'snuffle' before popping out of their holes — it looks almost like the exclamation lines that appear over a cartoon character's head when he's upset.

This gives you a bit of warning,

and lets you pop 'im just as his head starts out. Don't know why they quack when hit however, or why when you lose, they sound like a snoring elephant.

Making a score

When you're ready for some serious butt-kicking action, move onto the laser *Blazer Series*.

Intercept involves a volley of missiles launched by the enemy. Who knows where they're heading. You must shoot 'em down. Let five past and you're history!

The top displays High Score and yours, lower left: stage number, enemy missiles remaining, total stage missiles and shots taken.

The bottom middle shows the number of shots loaded and the radar screen (trés important). Use the formation of white dots here to gauge the firepower coming your way and



missiles both in and out of range.

You have to lead a bit into the shot and there's a 3-D effect as your shot zooms towards its target.

Now the bad guys have a flying Robot Armada. They must be stopped from landing — you just happen to have an anti-aircraft cannon on hand.

Choose a level and the onscreen info's similar to *Intercept* — with the



bottom reading [L-R] Player's Ship, Number of Stage, Damage Meter and Radar. Continuing finds number of enemy robots left, total number of robots for the stage, and number of shots taken.

The best bit here is watching them robots GROW, then hover, and finally LET RIP. Best bet's to take 'em out when they're off in the distance — not

Intercept places you in a spacecraft facing incoming enemy fighters, or over a planet's surface, with loads of missiles to knock out. Whether it's your explosions, or theirs hitting you, the effects are big! And when the fuel runs low (left), there's always the supply craft to dock with.

easy, but better than letting them hit you!

Once you get used to the Super Scope, you'll find it easy to use — though I agree with Nintendo about the need to take a break (say every 10–15 minutes or so). 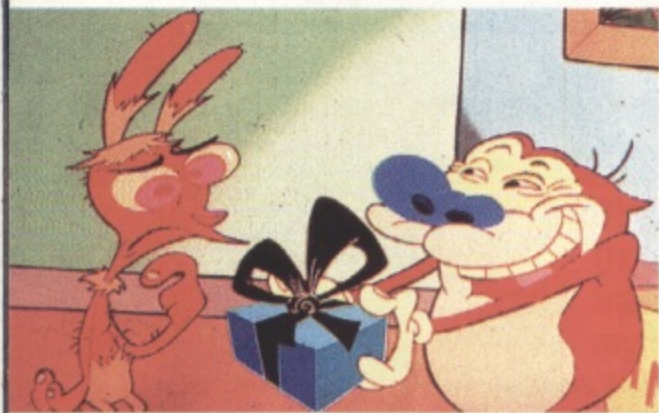

Acclaim's Larry Sparks reckons they will become a force in the land. Ed talked to him to find out why they deserve so much...

Thundering action in all the main scenes from Terminator 2: Judgment Day

Great oaks from little acorns grow — or so the saying goes. But only if you slap that little nut in the right kinda ground and nurture it carefully.

Switch that image to Nintendo games licences and the fastest growing tree that springs to mind in the proverbial forest is Acclaim.

With the use of clever marketing, a whole heap of strong film and TV tie-ins and a careful watch on changing trends, these guys have the equivalent of 10 tonnes of prime fertilizer on their side — and so far have come up smelling of roses. But can it last?

According to Acclaim's UK marketing director, Larry Sparks, the key to the company's success can be summed up in one phrase — be first, be best.

Everyone knows that consoles — Nintendo in particular — have taken over the games market faster than a road-runner with a rocket up its jacksee.

Cashing in corkers

And lately Acclaim have come up with some absolute corkers, cashing in on a pile of the biggest names and milking them for all their worth.

Capturing the *Bart Simpson* and *Terminator* licences were major coups for the company, and more recently, snaffling the defunct Mirrosoft title, *Aliens III*, set to hit the streets around Christmas.

One of the latest and biggest film tie-ins scooped by the company is *Spiderman 2*. The movie, produced by *Terminator 2*'s producer, James Cameron, is all set to be converted onto the NES and GB in a multiple-level, webby romp in November.

Sparks said Acclaim have two other major film tie-ins in the pipeline and three major characters they hope to get their mitts on — but he's keeping schtump as to what they are till they're in the bag. 'For the next 18 months, we have one of the best line-ups in the industry,' he boasted.

'But in this game you can't afford to get complacent. You have to be on the ball all the time, always keeping a close eye on changing trends.'

Rent-a-cart?

Acclaim already look set to pioneer rentals for their Nintendo game line-up (see news item, this ish). Although no firm decision's yet been taken, Larry said the company is looking at the situation very closely.

'We have to move with the times and grow if the business is to maintain its position. The sooner rental comes on board the better. I believe it'll take only a matter of months before rental is in place.'

Sparks reckons rentals will

stimulate demand to purchase products and can only have a positive effect.

'At the moment we stand publicly alone in this view, but in private there's a

lot of people who agree with us,' he said.

Another thing Acclaim are diving into with guns blazing is Compact Disc Interactive (CDI) — which Sparks predicts will shortly take over the games market as we know it.

'One has to look at where technology is going and the next obvious stop is CD development on Nintendo and Sega.

'When CD games come out they'll be priced around £25

and I believe they'll only really take off when the price comes down to the price of music CDs.

'We believe we will become a strong force in the field.'

He said the wheels were already in motion with CDI games already being developed in the US. But quelle surprise, they're not letting on what the games, scheduled for release in 1993, actually are (but one can make an educated guess!).

The winners

On the Sega/Nintendo battle front, Sparks reckons Nintendo won the 8-bit battle hands down but, although he thinks the SNES is: 'A far superior machine to the Mega Drive,' he believes Nintendo will have a hell of a job catching up on the 16-Bit front before CD takes over.

All in all, Acclaim are grappling

their way to the top of the pile — and intend to keep it that way.

'We don't see ourselves as just video game publishers — we're a lifestyle entertainment company. We believe it works and will continue with that overall strategy.'

Anyway, enough of the waffle, let's have a butchers at what's out and coming up on the Acclaim games front:

WWF-Wrestlemania — NES

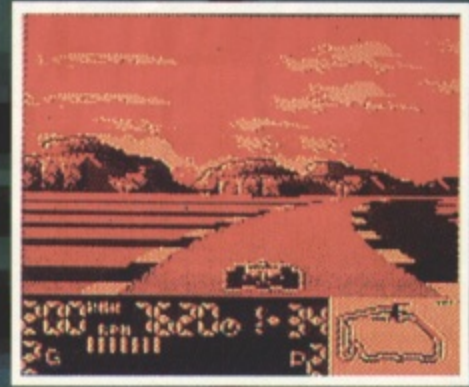
Put on your leotard, grab your opponent in a headlock and smash and crash your way through a bout of WWF Wrestlemania. Six top superstars to choose from, including the legendary Hulk Hogan. One to six can play. Compete against friends or create your own tournament.

Over-hyped and under-researched, this title bears little resemblance to its SNES counterpart. Poor gameplay and graphics make it a 24-stone flop. Only for the die-hard WWF fanatic!

Terminator 2: Judgment Day — NES

T2: Judgment Day — what can you say that hasn't already been said — apart from paraphrasing Julius Caesar, I came, I saw and got my ass severely terminated. Which just about sums up *T2*. It's real tough but damn addictive. The presentation's sharp, animation neat and gameplay a real bitch! The only quibble is the lack of moves available, basically just punch everyone until they keel over while





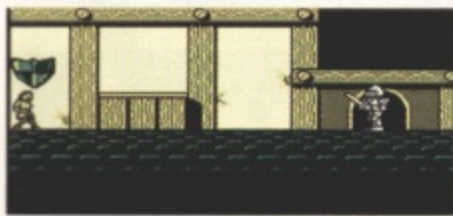
Good looking: Ferrari Grand Prix on NES and Game Boy

running left, right and jumping about a bit. However don't let this put you off, under the fairly inane first level there's one brutal phall of a game waiting to kick yer butt.

Wizards and Warriors 3 — NES

Wizards and Warriors 3 has all the components of a great game — engrossing storyline, massive playing area, straightforward gameplay and loads of things to find and people to talk to. However these parts have not been put together into a viable whole. The graphical content's poor,



animation's for the most part nonexistent and the collision detection's exceedingly dodgy. It doesn't live up to the rather good introduction sequence and leaves the player feeling let down. As an arcade adventure it really doesn't make the grade simply because the initial high standard of presentation has not been maintained throughout.

Bart Simpson's Escape from Camp Deadly — GB

We need more kids like Bart who are prepared to push back the boundaries of hair fashion to a far future date when we can, once and for all, do away with that dodgy breed of perv' known to society as the hair stylist. But for now Bart's still a kid and he's trapped in that summer camp from hell — Camp Deadly! It's down to you to help Bart to escape to keep the world free from perms and highlights so that whenever skateboards are

menaced by international communism, he'll be there. So much for the plot, how does it play? Absolutely brilliant! No new ideas on gameplay but the execution is superb. The sampled speech is a particular favourite. Well worth the cash.

Ferrari Grand Prix — NES

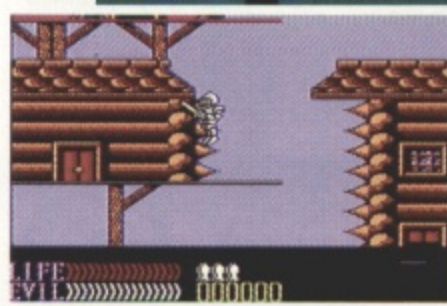
Ferrari Grand Prix looks to be a great arcade racer with some excellent touches. It's an into the screen scroller but appears to suffer from none of the problems afflicting other games of this genre. The graphics are delightfully smooth and impart a real racing feel. We've only seen a pre-production cart but even the unfinished product leaves a lasting impression. Definitely one to look out for. More news when we get it.

George Foreman's Knock Out Boxing — NES

Three, two, one, yer out! Well you really will be knocked out by this all new face-bashing, bell-ringing boxing sim. *George Foreman's Knock Out Boxing* takes the massive 250lb powerhouse of American boxing and thrusts him into the NES for an action packed challenge.

View the fun from a ring-side perspective and control the living legend as he takes on six of the best from the world of boxing. Between fights George has to cram as much food into his mouth as possible without being violently sick!

Bitz 'n' Bobs

Everyone wants to make playing games easier for you — or perhaps they're so hard you need help! Here are two very different gadgets to take the Nintendo fiend's fancy...

Handy stuff!

Got blisters from constantly pounding your Nintendo control pads, or a closet full of games which you're bored with?

We'll take an ogle at this. Action GT has introduced bit of kit which could bring back all the excitement into your games playing.

Called the U-Force, it's described as a power field controller for the NES games machine. What it is, in fact, is a cross between a joypad, joystick, and a trouser press.

U-Force opens up like a lap-top computer and has a lead which plugs into the joypad port. You then control the game through it, with a number of powerfields translating movement into directional commands

Putting it bluntly, you want to punch some git on the screen, you just punch in front of U-Force. A superb idea which can add a lot of new excitement to old and tired games. But how does it play?

Action GT say it's not easy to use, and they're right. It's very twitchy to start with and it's a bitch trying to set it

up for games which aren't on the official compatibility list (like *Bignose*, *T2* and *Micro Machines*).

But once you've got past that, it is a hell of a lot of fun. You'll be waving your hands around like an Italian family at a reunion trying to get Mario jumping around the screen. Keep an eye on Issue 2, when we'll give you a complete rundown on the U-Force...



Gangway gadget

Hornby Hobbies, manufacturers of the Game Genie for the NES console, is developing a similar gizmo for the Game Boy and the new SNES.

A device which plugs in between cart and the console, the Game Genie gives you more speed, more lives, higher jumps and the ability to start at any level, to name but a few of its features.

Developed by Codemasters, it works by intercepting signals passing between cart and machine and alters or ignores them depending on the codes entered.

When you fire up the NES you're presented with an option screen to enter cheat codes which you can make up yourself or better still pick from more than 680 pre-tested codes for over 80 games (see

Marshal Mania!)

If you want to be a real he-man and play straight, there's no need to remove the Genie. Just don't enter any codes and press start! Cinch! And the best bit is, the Genie, it's makers claim, doesn't damage your NES or your games!

We've had the Genie here at N-FORCE for some weeks and it's excellent. GUNNS is specially keen

on it cos it gives him bucketloads more bullets to kill and maim with.

More genies!

Hornby Hobbies says initial response to the device has been great, and are already working on one for the GB and SNES. The company's also developing a Genie for the Mega Drive (Spitt!! — still I s'pose them Sega-oids need all the help they can get!)

Our informers tell us that the GB and SNES Genies should be out round late '93/early '94. The NES Game Genie, however, hits the shelves in July priced at around £40.

Is it worth the money? You bet!

While Luke's the one to be, occasionally let Han Solo or the Princess take charge. From the

selection screen pick weapons and shields carried, who's the leader, and the score.

So go and play the game cos here's some handy hints on how to do it!

Tip off

Hop aboard your landspeeder and chug around the desert avoiding Banthas, auto cannons and flying droids, but ducking into one of the many caves whenever you can. I know it's dark inside but ya gotta go cos there's stuff ya gotta find — energy shields, Lightsaber and maybe even your bizarre mates.

Explore all the caves an' speed on. Ignore the sandcrawler and head for the spaceport. Snatch Han Solo from the Cantina without getting Luke's ass lasered off by imperial troopers, bounty hunters or slighted aliens just lookin' for a good time.

With Han and Chewy in tow, search the hangers until you find the oldest, slowest pile of scrap in living memory — Han's ship the Falcon. Except for the bounty hunters it's best to let Han take over now — but be careful cos he's only got one life.

Okay now blast off! The planet you're headed for has been zonked into bite-sized pieces by the Death Star. So now it's 'dodge the asteroids' part of the game but even if you do, a tractor beam still drags you on to the Death Star.

Take out the tractor beam (if R2 is along) by plugging the mobile dustbin into a computer terminal to locate the control room, then race through the

maze of halls and elevators to blow the crap out of it. Done? Okay, find the cell block and rescue Princess Leia. Cinch!

Back to the hanger, into the Falcon, up, up an' away, jinking to throw pursuing Tie fighters which 'dog you from behind'. My advice here's to man the lasers and blow 'em to hell.

Leia guides you back to the rebel base but you lead the Death Star there too!

Okay, time to take that sucker out. Cram Luke into an X-Wing, use R2 to regenerate shields and you're away. Take on the Tie Fighters, blasting their energy balls as fast as you can.

Then it's the final conflict — you versus the Death Star. Dive into the trench, bomb along very fast indeed (brown trousers time) find the exhaust port, torpedoes running hot an' steady and blast those slime balls to hell! Head for the horizon as the

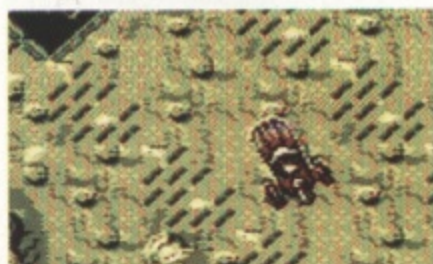
death star vanishes into rad dust. Hurrah!

It's the presentation that makes a Bart cart worthwhile — animated titles for each level and amusing story lines across the screen.

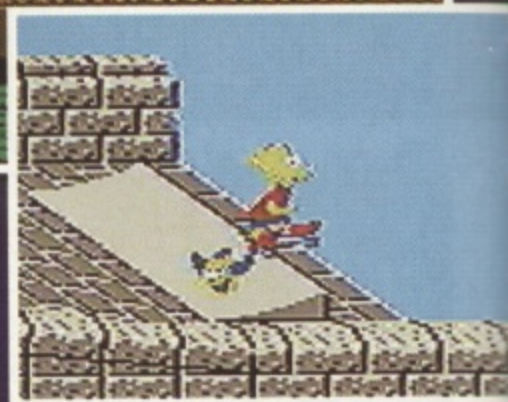
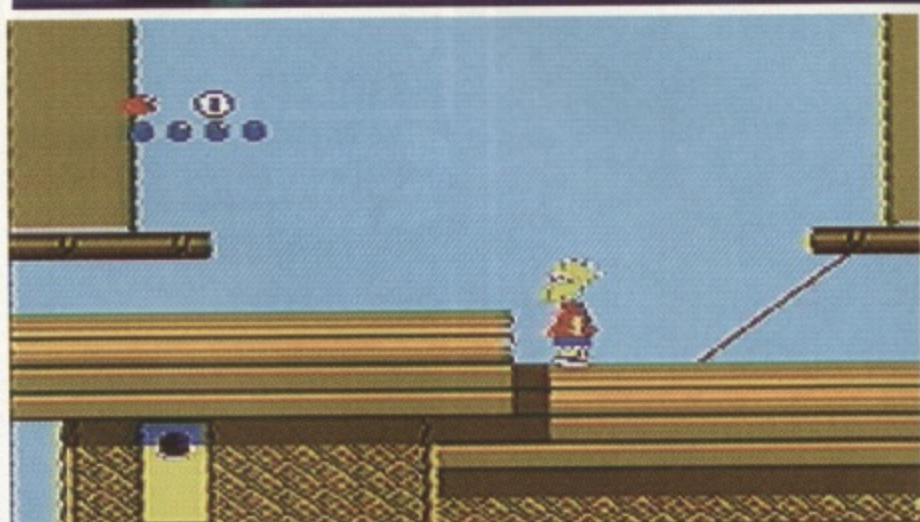

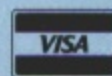

since they can't climb more than a block high (the Fun House is built along pretty bizarre lines as far as architecture goes) it's tough to get them from where they are to their doom.

Klowning around

So as Krusty you must use your brains (remember them?) to accomplish this task.

Blue blocks are handy to place in a hole, allowing the rats to climb out and head onward. There are also pipe pieces to fit in place, air blowers that propel rats horizontally and vertically, plus many amusing methods of rodent e-rat-ication, one employs such diabolically low cunning that you could put a tail on it and call it a weasel!

Krusty can only carry one device at a time, but stacking objects together's a good strategy. Once he's gotten those rats into the machine, that level's cleared and he can take a

break, give us the code to the door we just entered, and continue. However, don't cheat yourself by not watching how the machine does its jobs on the rats, it's enough to put you off rat pie for life!

Pig out!

There are pies to toss at the creatures in the way, toys and food to add points and restore strength. Krusty jumps around pretty high and can fall almost two screen lengths with no worries. But energy must be replenished, as this is one out-of-shape klown. So don't pass up any chance to scoff nosh you might find, especially those juicy burgers (barf, barf).

Control's easy and graphics really great — fun to view with no blending between the action figures and the background to worry about. The rate of animation's silky smooth and very cartoonish with flicker-free parallax scrolling.

Krusty's Super Fun



Everybody loves a clown, or so the saying goes. With this in mind, MARSHAL dons a red shiny nose and greasepaint, falls over a lot and totally disproves this theory...

Krusty the Klown has major problems. No he hasn't had his TV show cancelled, been held upside down in a vat of warm custard or had to eat Bart Simpson's shorts. It's much worse — his Fun House is infested with rats — dozens of the furry fuzzballs. And Krusty hates rats almost as much as the kids he entertains.

Krusty's Fun House is a weird place. Filled with elevators and escalators, strange creatures roaming about, hidden passages, mystery rooms and disintegrating blocks.

Start your extermination extravaganza in the main hall then pratt-fall into the five sections via fireplaces (Santa Claus complex? — Ed) and such like. Some sections are padlocked and can't be entered until tasks in other areas are completed.

Each section has up to 14 levels with a choice of doors. The big problem's finding hidden levels, since

sometimes a hidden bonus block must be discovered before revealing a secret passage — which could return you to your previous location (life's a rat race, but I don't care).

Roast rats

It's your task to aid the 'happy' klown in ridding the Fun House of rodents.

But you have plenty of help. Sideshow Mel, Bart Simpson, Corporal Punishment and others waiting inside — manning various insidious machines of destruction. Krusty must get those rats into the machines.

Then his helpers do the rest, as the machines pummel, electrify, and inflate them to death (watching a furball swell up like a balloon is quite entertaining, and also zoologically educational).

But these rats are brain-dead and here's the big problem. They leave their holes, march about stupidly and,

Keep an eye on the screen to monitor what objects you've picked up. Seeing the various bits added — Krusty teetering on an edge with his big shoes wobbling, and groaning when he's hurt as stars fly around his head is a scream.

The best effect is how he gets tired from all the exertion of moving around and doing things. This is the first animated figure I've seen that looks like he needs to lie down and rest more than I do after playing and eating all that pizza!

Sound's excellent too. Krusty's digitized voice (taken from the Simpsons) exhorts you to greatness. Hitting enemies and destroying rats are all handled with appropriate (and funny) sound effects that you'll enjoy.

The music sets the mood, then you pretty much forget it for the muzak it is — who has time to listen to tunes when there's work to be done?

Regardless, this is a fun and challenging game — with plenty of rewards for succeeding. Now if we can only find a way to get outside and take on those space aliens!

Pit Fighter



With knuckles gleaming and 12-bore confiscated, GUNNS wades into a dark and seedy underground carpark with one thing in mind — knocking some brain-dead yobbos senseless...

Clucking Bell! (spoonerisms eh? Shining Wit!) I've seen many conversions of this coin-op, some bad, some worse but none as mind-numbing and generally unpleasant as this game. But before I recount the comedy of errors that is *Pit Fighter*, a quick recap of the thinking behind the game is in order.

Pitiful

For reasons best known to the American Law Enforcement Agencies there's a community beneath the city streets, a realm not travelled by the common man, where delinquent dregs of a sick society spend all day beating the living crap out of each other for no readily-apparent reason.

As one of the three less than intelligent characters, Buzz, Ty or Kato

(I thought he was Inspector Clouseau's little yellow mate), your life's ambition is to enter as many fights as possible against various mentally disadvantaged opponents, paying frequent visits to a forklift truck for mindless posturing and flexing between bouts.

Having clubbed ten thugs into unconsciousness you face the ultimate challenge against a chap called, strangely enough... 'Ultimate' (well shock me Sherlock!)

Dodgy digitising

The best bit of the game's the digitised photo-graphics and, I make no bones about it, they work really well in the intro sequence. The problems start when you discover the same digitising techniques are used in the game. This worked just fine on the 16-bit coin-ops but when transferred

the difference between the boys and the girls!

Centipede is the first of a number of arcade classics Accolade have converted for the Game Boy. If you're young enough not to know the scenario, (or so old you've forgotten it!) I'll give you the low down on this spine-tingling shoot-'em-up.

You're the exterminator. As commander of a real swish spacecraft, it's up to you to defend the planet from a gigantic mutant centipede, hell-bent on your destruction.

If that's not enough, there are suicidal spiders, kamikaze creepy-

crawlies and dozens of dive-bombing dead-heads to contend with. Once hit, the indestructible insect splits and continues its attack.

Blast the boots off the big-footed bacteria bandit and the corpses become barriers. Clear a path quick because it's straight on to the next round, with even more bug-uglies determined to prevent you drawing your pension!

Classic controls

Whack in the cart and an impeccable illustration of the infamous insect greets you. Choose either one- or two-player mode and the fun begins.

Controls are basic 4-directional joypad, and fire and play like a dream. Older games players will remember the trak-ball on the original coin-op. They'll be pleased to know the Game

Boy arrangement is equally as playable.

Graphics remind me of a ZX81 but then again the arcade version was no Picasso. Sonics are typical early '80s — lifeless and uninspiring. Tinny tunes and bog-standard bleeps had me begging for cotton wool — I was hoping Accolade would have up-dated the conversion rather than faithfully reproducing it!

Bug blaster

Having said that, from the word go it's non-stop bug-blasting action. This game spawned a million rip-offs (remember *Millipede*) and it's easy to see why.

Forget the poor graphics and sound, *Centipede* oozes playability. The early levels are so easy even Ed could get thru them. But persevere,

Ahhh! This takes me back. Remember the early '80s? Thin leather ties, New Romantic haircuts, playing *Phoenix* and *Defender* down the arcade?

Accolade must have their rose-tinted Aviator specs on cos they're attempting to recreate those glorious years, when a pound really was worth something and you couldn't tell

to a double 8-bit console running at an extremely pedestrian 3.58 MHz, no amount of custom chips can bridge the gap, and boy does it show.

Jumpy jumpy

First off, the animation suffers — although the components of a move are nicely stylized, there aren't enough of them so you get jumpy, flickering, slow action.

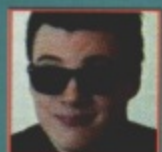
This, coupled with poor use of the custom sound chip, and what you have is enough to make you lose your lunch. Add to this a bizarre attempt to beef up the amazingly shallow gameplay by making it incredibly hard.

Buy? bye bye!

Presentation's very limited too, with only a few character selection graphics. *Pit Fighter* is a cart I would not buy.

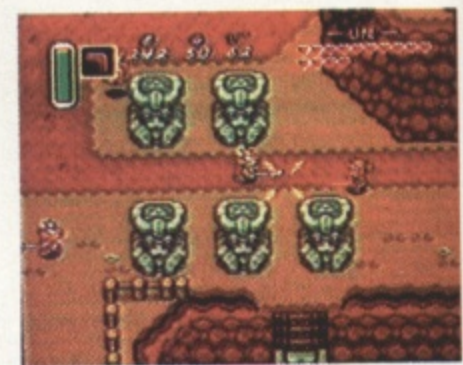

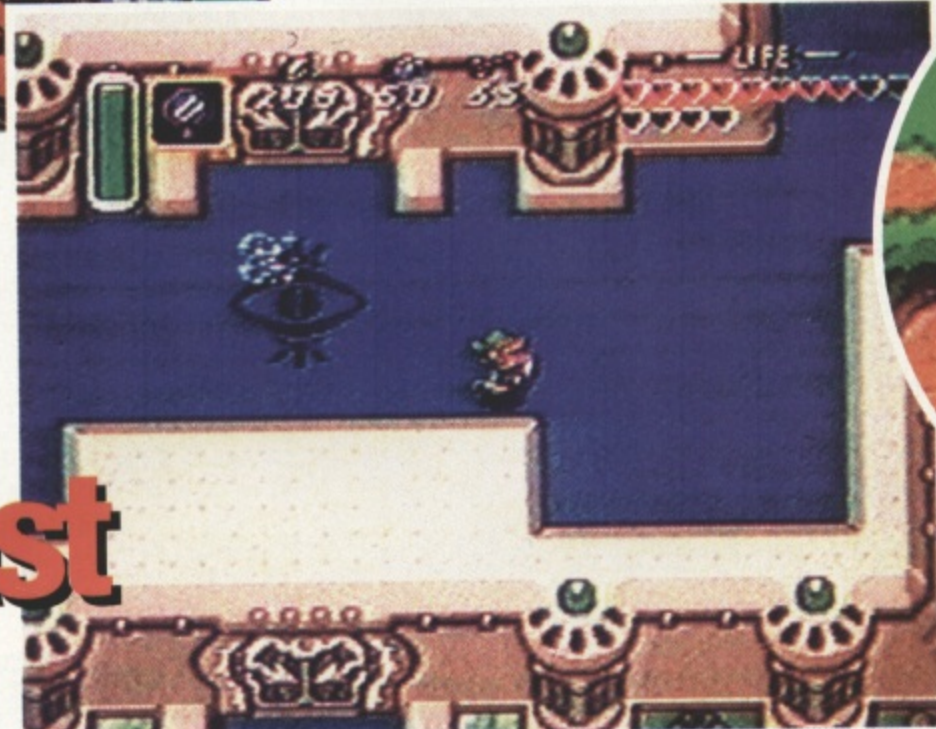

Zelda:

A link to the past



MARSHAL would like it be known that he has never played dominoes, hates soufflé and does not have a poodle. But he does like rescuing princesses and throwing boomerangs. So we fed him some soufflé anyway and sent him off to play **Zelda: A link to the past.**

This is a story about a guy who, until very recently, was a boring little tit. Not meaning to be in any way derogatory, but Link was a general waste of space as a human being.

He drove a Lada, dental-flossed his teeth twice a day and even listened to Radio 4. He had an extensive selection of cravats. He played dominoes every Thursday night, and lost.

But all this was about to change. Link, after accidentally lobotomising himself with an eggwhisk while preparing a soufflé for his poodle, Graham, finds himself thrust back in time.

To his horror he's become a fearless rescuer of a beautiful woman known only as Princess who, for some inexplicable reason, loves him. Captured by the evil and bile-like Gannon, Princess is pinning her hopes on her hero.

Meanwhile, totally bewildered and

still with a slight headache, Link wanders into the local village to talk to the friendly folk. This may sound strange behaviour when there's a lusty young wench waiting to be snatched from the arms of an ogre, but it's important (and a lot less dangerous for Link). The information picked up comes in handy when the village folk get sick of him and turf him out of town. It also helps with directions.

So off he goes, striding out with a determined and purposeful look — well more of a reluctant, wimpish look actually. Not only is he a bit low on power and general balls at the start, he has to contend with two separate worlds — Light World and Dark World, and Link's a bit afraid of the dark (isn't there anything going for this guy? —Ed)

Starting in the Light, Link moves through the land, talks to folks wandering about, searching for objects and treasures. And fighting off attacks by monsters and magical beings, of course. The overview Map shows Link's position.

Get lost!

Speaking to people is very important in this game. They often give you directions (ie. tell you where to go!) and this information shows up on the overview map. So expect to be loquacious, or you'll never find your way around.

Items abound — many are magical, all are useful. Swords and armour, potions and magic mirrors. You name it, it's findable.

Now about those enemies. There's P-Hats, swooping Buzzards, bomb-tossing Cyclopes and the usual assortment of sword-wielding guards. Link's going to wish he was back playing dominoes.

We're talking about a massive world here...

Feeling flutey

If you want to give our fearless hero a hand, look out for a magic flute that calls up a bird (with feathers) who flies Link between locations. This saves time, shoe leather, and makes Link happy.

Gannon's Castle's the ultimate destination, but don't be in too much of a hurry to get there. If you're not powerful enough, Link's going to be back making soufflé faster than Gunns in a drinkathon.

The mother of all castles is ever-deep and has more dungeon levels than you can imagine. Each filled with monsters and end bosses — all more powerful and as energetically evil as they can be.

Zelda: A Link To The Past follows the tradition set in the 8-bit versions. Graphics are well drawn, with that cartoony look and violence is limited to losing/gaining hit points — there's no graphic representations of broken bodies and bloody parts (shame, shame).

Now remember we're talking about a massive world here — figure on getting through it in about a month if you play seven hours a day, seven days a week, if you're lucky...



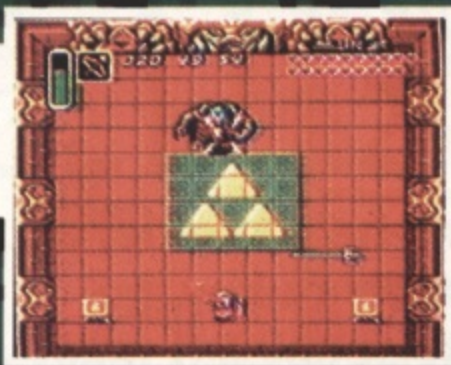
Monster Maulers

- SWORD** — Makes a nice grating sound as it cuts into monsters and other uglies.
- SHIELD** — Will protect you if they decide to fight back (you should be so lucky).
- BOW AND ARROW** — For maximum safety, allows you to stand safely in the distance and still make a killing.

When you get far enough into the game, your hit power increases and so can your weapons. Your sword, shield and boomerang do a good job - but there's a way to make them even more powerful. Remember that magic is a prime ingredient.



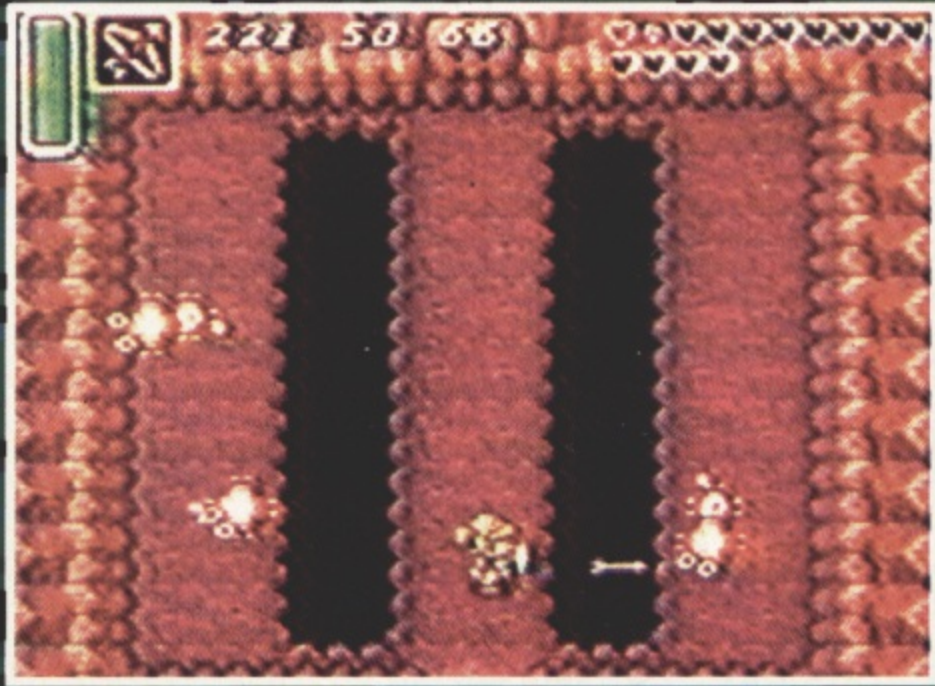

Is it a hot dog? Is it Pinnochio on acid? Nope, it's Big Nose — star of stage, screen and tissue commercials. SHADES takes his honker to a plastic surgeon and has a snip or two done himself...

There are terrible goings on in the tiny prehistoric village of Lud on the Low. All the juicy wild animals are fed up of being hunted and killed (well you would, wouldn't you?) and have gone on vacation. This leaves the hungry people of the village with a major prob.

Thanksgiving's just around the corner and all they've got to eat is mouldy lettuce! But there are rumours of a great peanut butter mine on a

neighbouring island, so Big Nose sets off to have a few jars (probably the boozy kind). He soon gives up this quest when a tasty looking pterodactyl flies overhead, though — that'd be much more of a feast — and you get a parson's nose too!

Nosing around!

Big Nose The Caveman is splattered over four islands packed with strange creatures and dark, dank caves. Special power-up shops are hidden about and bones collected along the way can be exchanged for extra lives, more club power and stones for throwing at any prehistoric Percy.

Mr Big certainly nose where he's going to. Each level includes some horizontally-scrolling section where he bashes creatures and scampers along

into creatures with special powers. For example, drinking the "W" potion transforms him into a Werewolf, allowing him to run quicker and jump further. Other potions allow Gomez to swim and become a Vampire.

Platform souls

Although the scenery alters as you change locations, gameplay remains fundamentally the same, which I found disappointing. There are a good variety of options, allowing you to customise the difficulty setting according to your ability (Absolute genius level for me!). Controls are standard left, right, jump and fire and respond well to touch. But the sound track is lifeless and uninspiring. More macabre melodies and haunted harmonies would improve the overall ambience. Opening sequence aside, graphics are average throughout. Gomez is badly defined and the rooms need the services of a good interior decorator.

With the vast resources at Ocean's disposal I was expecting a top-notch title. Unfortunately, *The Addams Family* doesn't live up to my expectations. This conversion offers nothing new in format or gameplay. Nonetheless, it's a slick game that hooks you from the word go!

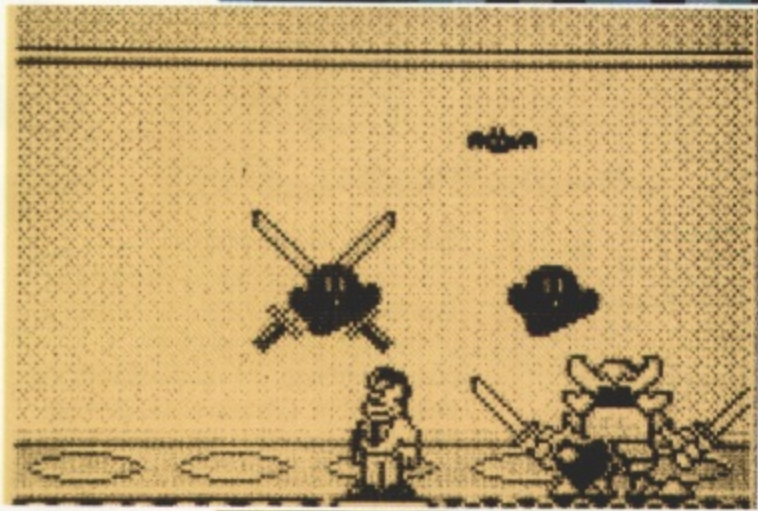

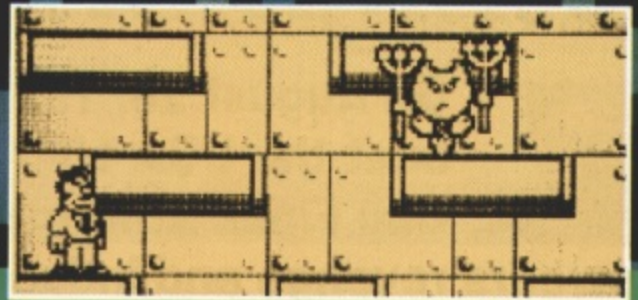

Then return to the 21st Century and get changed for the global thermo-nuclear lads versus dad's game! What could be easier? (Chewing your toenails without any teeth perhaps? —Ed)



Although it doesn't follow the movie storyline too closely, this game's a right royal ripper. In the first couple of levels jump into John Connor's shoes to shoot up as many nasties as possible and save the earth a couple of times. Then become Arnie as the Terminator and ride around on the Harley Davidson! As you might expect there's lots of shooting so anyone who isn't a shoot-'em-up fan will soon find the game tedious. 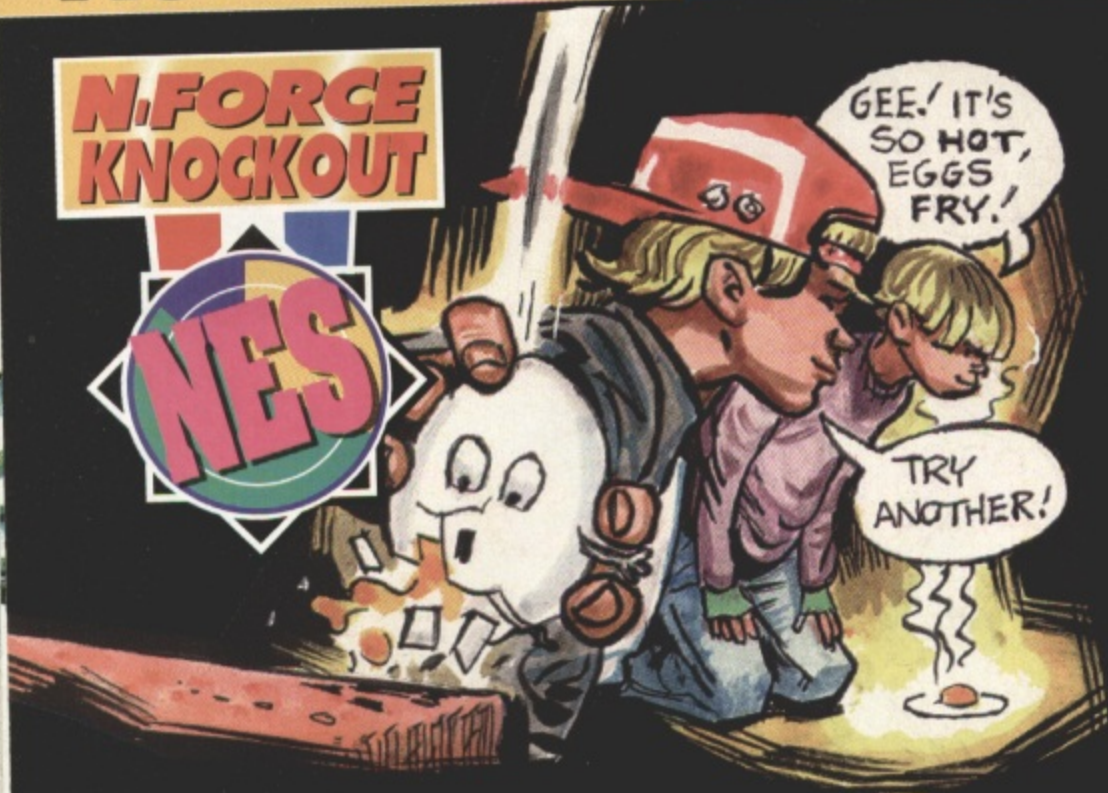

Survive that and along come the Klingon war ships ready for a spot of mass murder. They zoom towards ya

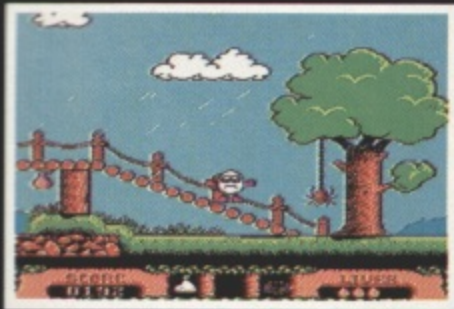

Okay, listen up. This game's for one or two people but you need a partner to get the most out of this money-wise, and basically to save your skin.

I figure three continues with five lives a go's ample, but some less gung-ho, pump-'em-full-of-lead, well-adjusted dude might need more to get past the first screen.

The unlimited ammo's a real help, along with the auto pick-up, but the biggest help's the map to the level provided once they've cleared: **Arena One!**

The story so far

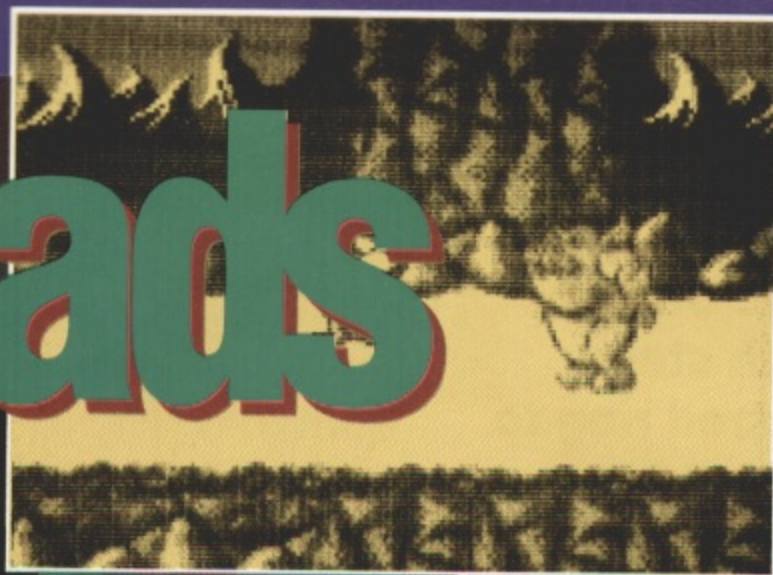

I remember when I used to stay up till three in't morning (cos we couldn't afford a video — it's grim oop North!) just to watch my fave WWF stars. Finally, everybody else is catching on to the wonders of wrestling, and grapple fans everywhere are coming out of their collective canvas closets!

Hard-hitting and ear-bashing, WWF's a blend of gaudy showbiz and heinous heavy metal. A kind of Jimmy Tarbuck meets Eddie Van Halen! It's crude, rude, rowdy and raucous (bit like N-FORCE) and kids everywhere absolutely love it!

Control those hunky heroes in their super go-fast clingy shorts — Hulk Hogan, The Undertaker, The Million Dollar Man, Jake the Snake and Earthquake etc. In one-player mode your sole aim in life (or death) is to win the coveted WWF belt.

Using skill and skullduggery, pummel your opponent into submission with an assortment of fiendish manoeuvres. Soften him up using flying dropkicks, headbutts and suplexes (potato masher optional) or wear him down with bone-crushing bodyslams and pulverising elbowdrops.

For the grand finale, leap off the top turnbuckle for a super splash, guaranteed to crush the morale of your opponent (not to mention his manhood!) The aim of the game's typically American — win at all costs! Be nasty, fight dirty and above all,

show no mercy!

There are masses of moves available, though sadly my favourite, The Boston Crab, is missing. However there are plenty of others to perfect, including the spectacular clothesline.

The game's beat-'em-up based (gasps of surprise all round — Ed) with the emphasis on throwing rather than punching and kicking. If you find the ring too small, climb over the ropes and continue your combat amid the cheering crowd.

Careful, though — stay out too long and you're counted out!

Knobbs and Saggs

With ten wrestlers to choose from you should have no problem finding one to suit your personality. Gunns prefers the uncontrolled destructive capacity of the 6ft 8ins, 325lb Undertaker. Shades is more of a Randy 'Macho Man' Savage fan. Ed raves about Jake the Snake for obvious reasons!

I'm a total Hulkaholic. Not a day goes by without me following the Hulkster's three demands — train hard, say your prayers and spend two hours a day on the sun bed!!

Unfortunately, some classic wrestling legends are missed. Among them Sgt Slaughter, Colonel Mustafa — The Iron Sheik, Brutus 'The Barber'

Beefcake and my all-time favourite tag team, Knobbs and Saggs — The Nasty Boys.

One of WWF's best features is the wealth of play options. Choose between one player v the computer or two players against each other.

The number of wrestlers you select is determined by the type of contest you choose. Either one wrestler in standard head-to-head, two in Tag Team or four in

the spectacular Survivor Series.

Against the computer, the game's lively if not a little too easy! But in two-player mode, WWF really comes into its own. Fighting your mate provides no end of laffs.

Digitised delights

The control method really suits the SNES joypad, making WWF an absolute pleasure to play. Some of the more difficult moves, like the clothesline, take a while to master but it isn't long before you're prancing round the ring with all the grace of a rabid rhino!

Digitised animation's amazing and the sprites huge. Acclaim have done a brilliant job of capturing the thrills and spills of WWF Wrestling and transferring them to the small screen.

The heavy metal sound track injects real atmosphere into the proceedings and the intro screen's

one of the best I've ever seen! Mixing and matching tag partners is a nice touch.

Natural disasters

I guarantee you'll find the gameplay addictive — it'll be a long time before you get bored of inflicting GBH with intent on your mates!

Did you ever wonder who would come out on top if the Natural Disasters fought each other? Now you can find out! My only quibbles are that in one-player mode the game's a little disappointing.

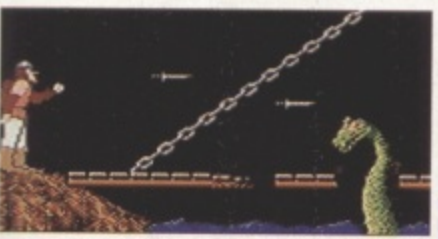

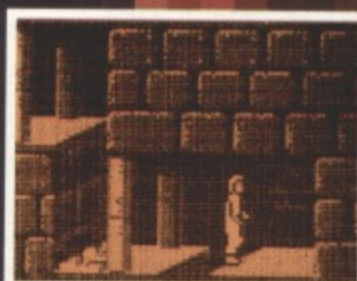

With flexed pecs and well-oiled torso, it's fun with GUNNS and his enormous beam weapon. Watch in awe as he alters from meek and mild executive into a muscle-bound HE-hero.

As the sun sets over what looks disconcertingly like Canary Wharf, a bunch of alien property developers arrive and in an act of unusual compassion for off-worlders, flatten the whole carbuncle,

replacing it with much more aesthetically-pleasing oil refineries and ghettos.

'Enter our two heroes, dashing Yuppie quantity surveyors, who in a desperate bid to save Docklands for

wine bars and cell phones, rip off their shirts to reveal abnormal Arnie physiques, grab a couple of guns and proceed to blast the slime out of all and sundry so humanity's free to use personal organisers.'

My Japanese is a little rusty (unlike my weapon which is trusty) but that's how I translated the intro.

Self control

Getting down to brass cartridge cases, the first thing to grab you by the gonads and tug, are the explosive sound and visual FX which roar though the game like a shuttle exploding on the launch pad.

They get louder and more complex by the level, giving a great sense of panic and mayhem to very real panic and mayhem. Ear-splittingly good!

Couple this with a ruck of options, including three difficulty levels, variable life numbers, a choice between one or two players and already this master-blasters up there with a select few.

Hard one

Gameplay's unusually good (amazingly as stonking for one-player as for two) no finger-bending fire control, just hold the button down for an endless stream of shells and control movement and fire with the joystick. One button flips between

special weapons, another activates bombs collected. It's so simple... But why?

Safety off, clear your guns, round in the breach, blink and you're dead. Ahhh! That's why. It's official — this one's fast, smooth, strong, long (and thoroughly absorbent) and flamin' hard!

The sprites are well animated

with a whole stack of moves, but it's the sheer amount of stuff going on — attacks, bullets and power-ups zooming in from every

The game's slick and professional

direction — that makes the speed even more surprising. The difficulty level's pitched just right, although you need to play each level several times to gain maximum benefits.

Self abuse

After a couple of goes at stage one you feel decidedly masochistic and throw yourself with gay abandon on any alien who happens along. This doesn't work either. You just have to shoot 'em (suits me!).

They're hidden behind cars, atop tall buildings (which, you can leap in a single bound, courtesy of a neat somersault) and gun sites pop out of the tarmac. There are armoured self-propelled guns to ride and a giant

Transylvania's not known for its hospitality. The neighbours are dead rude, in fact they snuffed it ages ago! Count Dracula decides to hold a bit of a bash to cheer the place up so he invited all his fave ghosts and ghouls around and plays music so loud it could wake the dead — and it does!

This party goes on for yonks! Old fang face finally decides enough is enough — he's gasping for a bit of a kip in his designer coffin and a bit of the tasty red stuff! So he kidnaps one of the gatecrashers, a gorgeous girl by the name of Gwendaline and threatens to mince her up and turn her

into a kebab if her fella doesn't clear his house of underworld scum.

Rescuing wimps!

So guess what quest lies in store for the unsuspecting adventurer in *Castlevania 4*? Kill anything that moves, romp around a spectre-ridden castle, collect lots of power-up thingies and rescue anyone who looks vaguely wimpy!

Our brave hero starts with nothing but a feeble leather whip (and a sadistic smile) to crack at passers by. Uncover bonuses by whipping candles (whatever turns you on honey — Ed). The most common is a small heart

which restores a smidgen of energy.

Food, extra lives, dosh and extra weapons also turn up occasionally. The leather whip upgrades to a metal chain whip (ooh, whip me whip me, call me names — Ed) that gives ghouls the fright (or frill) of their lives (not my cuppa cha, I'm afraid — might spoil the hairdo). Use knives, axes and shurkens with the whip to deliver a real good thrashing.

Swing to the beat

Castlevania 4 is one massive game. The journey to rescue the hero's girly takes him through the castle, underground waterways, slimy bogs and strange lands. Fortunately there's a code system that gets you back to where the daring hero last died.

From the main menu select a weird password made up of hearts, axes and potions — not the easiest of codes to remember (specially if you're a wet haddock).

Castlevania 4 really shows off the

3-D scaling and sprite-manipulation abilities of the SNES. One level's played inside a rotating pipeline with the whole background made up of one sprite that's been twisted to give the desired effect.

Outstanding presentation and excellent graphics

My biggest moan is that the action is so slow. Most of the level is spent whipping the odd evil being that crops up and

collecting endless hearts. Then suddenly things hot up with an end-of-level smeg 'ed that's tougher than Gunns' sarnies diped in the N-Force veggie soup!

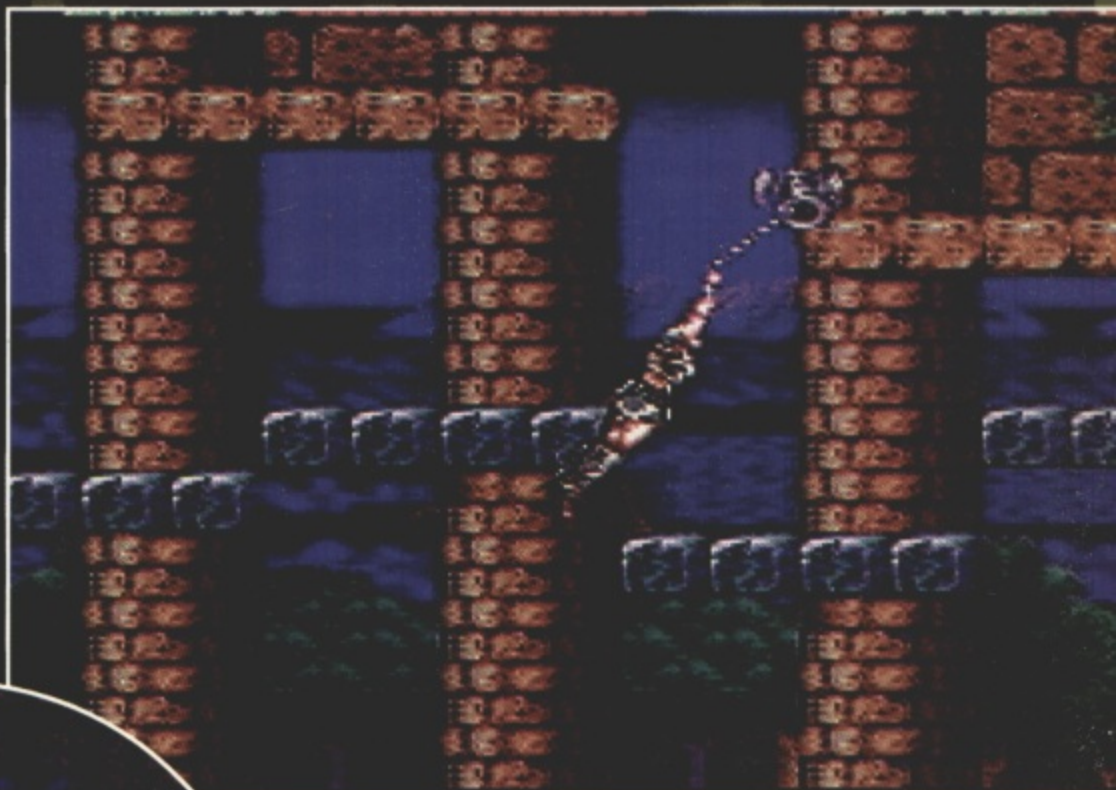
Fans of the slash 'n' bash-style platform game should love *Castlevania 4*. It just could've done with a little more action during the levels to supplement its excellent graphics, but that's not the end of the world. Wouldn't it be great being a lemming? No worrying about your house being repossessed or the wife running off with the milkman. Oh no, all you care about is finding a nice, respectable cliff and splattering yourself at the bottom of it.

If I was a sad rodent, I'd lay a massive guilt trip on any bloke who'd ever racked me off, by leaving a note saying I couldn't live with the strain he'd put me under (I'd also add that his father's a hamster, his mother smelled of elderberries and his wife's a man in drag).

The stars of this game are seriously hideous — if I looked like that I'd probably top myself as well. Wow, what a horrible thought, imagine going through life *ugly*. (You seem to manage fairly well Shades, anyway, stop waffling, and get on with it —Ed).

Hokey-kokey. We're talking pukey cutesiness personified here — cuddly little creatures with with big noses, blue dungarees and massive green wigs plopped on their bonces. To top it all, they've got an average IQ of three

below a tomato!

The aim's to guide these idiots from the entrance of each level to the exit. Sounds easy, but it's what lies between the two doors that causes havoc!

The powers that be have set traps for our numbskulls and the landscape's plastered with Lemming-licking dangers — high hills to leap from, rivers of lava to cross and icy plains to freeze their cotton socks off!

Gi'us a job!

So how d'ya guide a hundred tiny Lemmings through the perils in store? Easy! Take a leaf out of Ed's book, get out yer whip and make the rat-finks work!

Pick a job icon, with [X] and [Y] or move a cross-hair over the screen to get 'em climbing, floating, digging, bashing and building bridges. But, get the timing wrong, and all you're left with is an ex-lemming. Move along the rambling landscapes with the cross hairs or use [L] and [R].

The game suits players across the



Heave-ho! It looks like the bridge is stuck fast. Why don't the little fellas save time and just shoot themselves through the head?

board with 100-plus levels, split into four difficulties — FUN, TRICKY, TAXING and MAYHEM.

The first few are so easy even Ed got her head around them — and that's a major achievement believe me (careful dog-breath —Ed)! These easy-peasy levels don't last long before things heat up with lashings of tricky layouts and mind-bending puzzles to leave your brain in a soggy mess!

Either battle against the clock in one-player mode, or annihilate a mate in a two-player head-to-head which splits the screen down the middle and creates two free-scrolling play areas. You get your own set of suicidal-maniacs but

instead of concentrating on saving your team, sabotage the other's rescue attempts by placing bombers on bridges, digging deep pits and other horrors!

I've been addicted to this game since it first appeared on the Amiga (cut the blasphemy —Ed). This version seems identical, except the screams of the dying lemmings are terribly muffled — but this hardly makes the game any less playable.

It's just so downright original!

Lemmings will always have a place on the computer game honours list for being so downright original. If you haven't experienced the *Lemmings* invasion yet, it's about time you did!

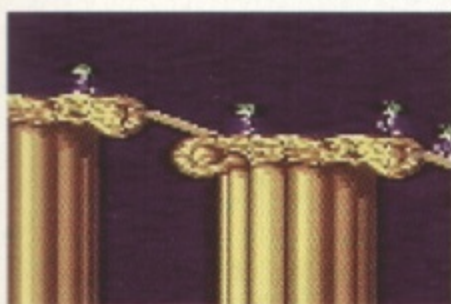
