Last month we told you about how the redesign of *Jet Force Gemini's* two main characters had caused the game's release date to slip. This month everything is back on track, and Rare invited us to their frighteningly well protected new HQ to see the finished article, complete with new 'adult' characters.

Thankfully, the tweaking worked. The characters look far better in their new Battle of the Planets guise than they did as cute little kids, and all the violence seems to make a lot more sense with grown-up characters as the perpetrators. The rest of the game hasn't been altered, but having only played a few sections of it at E3, we were pleasantly surprised to see just how huge the whole thing is.

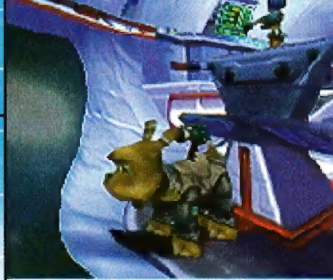

The game seems to allow quite a bit of freedom in choosing your own way to play it. You can rescue all the captured Tribals like you're supposed to (it is your mission objective, after all) or you can blow them into pieces and face the consequences at the end of the level. You can even take diversions through alien territory by disguising yourself as a bug – the aliens will give you funny looks, but they won't attack unless you actually open fire on them. With environments ranging from tropical jungles to alien barracks, rocket backpacks, hover bikes, 16 fantastic weapons, and some of the finest graphics we've ever seen, *Jet Force Gemini* is likely to be one of the biggest and best games of the year. We'll know for sure in a couple of months.

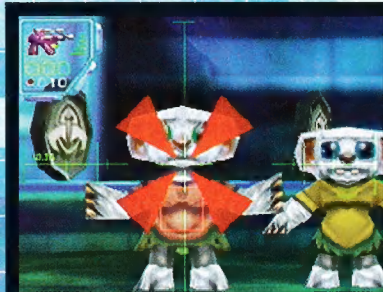
The most striking thing about the game is the way it looks and sounds. Special effects like reflective surfaces (mirroring every single object, including bullets and explosions), real-time shadows

At times, it plays like an old fashioned shoot-'em-up, with waves of flying aliens swarming overhead in *Galaxian* formations. At other times it's more like a 3D adventure – *Banjo-Kazooie* with guns and gore. You have quite intricate control over your character of choice, using a combination of the *GoldenEye* and *Turok* styles. Most of the time you'll run around using the joystick, strafing with Left-C and Right-C, and using Top-C to jump, Bottom-C to duck, and the remaining buttons to change

If you're not too bothered about completing the game the legitimate way, or if you just find the idea of dismembering furry animals amusing, you can turn on your cute little bear friends, the Tribals. Lob a grenade at them and they'll run for cover. Sadly their little legs aren't quick enough to speed them out of the way in time, and all that'll remain after the explosion is a thick layer of bear paste on the walls. You can also decapitate them with a shuriken and collect their lifeless bounces for the end-of-level head count, or pick them off with a sniper rifle as they waddle towards you.

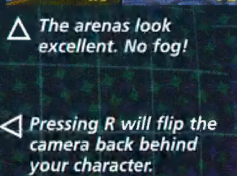
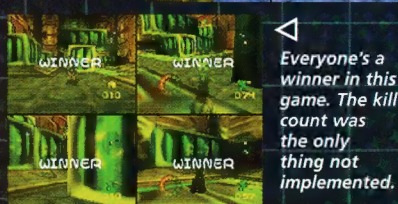

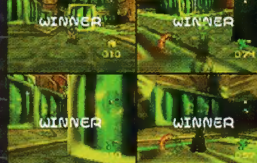
Jet Force Gemini has multiplayer games in abundance. The four-player battle mode is where you'll spend most of your time, with a set of options and stats on a par with the mighty GoldenEye. The battle arenas are great, with trenches to hide in and places to snipe from, and you can play as some of the alien bugs as well as the three main characters (Lupus makes an excellent whining noise whenever he gets shot). Then there's a target shooting game, which is like a more playable version of Knife Edge, and the two racing games you win in the one-player mode. The computer keeps a running total of your scores in all competitions, so you can have a lengthy and varied tournament with a few friends. Not bad.



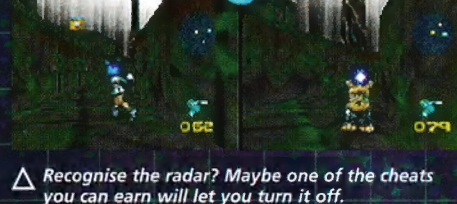
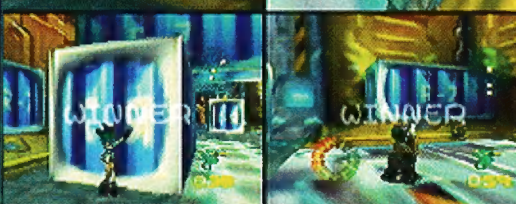

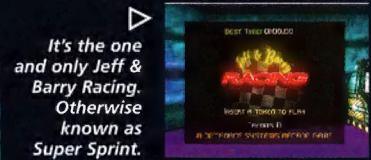

The artificial intelligence in *Jet Force* can be startling at times. Rare's programmers based it on the PC game *Half-Life*, and came up with something even more advanced. Every enemy knows the position of every object in the level, and will dive for cover behind walls and crates if you run at them with your guns blazing. They're afraid of fire and explosions, but they'll swarm all over you if you're weakened. Some of them even lose the will to fight, surrendering and begging for mercy. But as you can see from these pics, N64 is a mercy free zone.

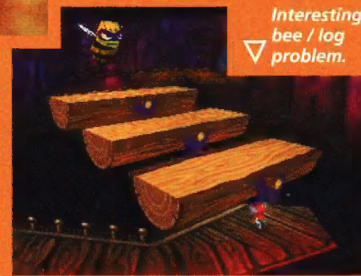

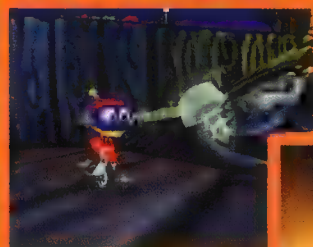

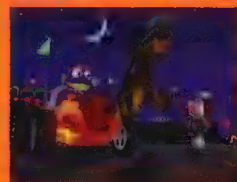

I magine a cross between *Glover*, *Banjo-Kazooie* and *Uniracers* on the SNES.

Throw in an ultra-realistic physics engine, add a range of bizarre vehicles, spice the whole thing up with an impressive array of sub-games and you've got a fairly good idea of what Sucker Punch's new platformer, *Sprocket*, is all about.

Sprocket himself is a limbless maintenance droid who, despite having a unicycle wheel where his legs should be, enjoys leaping around in the best 3D platform game tradition. The major difference between *Sprocket* and similar titles is in

the way you can interact with the environments. Every object has a mass and every surface has different properties, from bounciness to solidity. This means that you can pick things up, throw them around, and they'll behave exactly as you'd expect them to in real life.

To compensate for his lack of arms, Sprocket has a handy tractor beam mounted on top of his head, which can be used to lift small items or catapult the plucky robot onto high platforms. But there's a lot more to the game than jumping and chucking. There's painting and driving too. Hop in a paintball tank and you can colour the game to your liking, spraying just about everything with your favourite pastel shades. There's a point to it all, thanks to some nifty colour-based puzzles, but messing around in *Sprocket's* weird world is

great fun whether or not you involve yourself with the game's plot.

It's set in an amusement park of the future called (cough) Whoopie World, with seven giant levels filled with all sorts of challenges. But before you even *think* the word *Starshot*, bear in mind that an early version of *Sprocket* wowed audiences at E3, with its mixture of silky graphics and varied gameplay. For example, one level involves finding parts to build a rollercoaster. Nothing revolutionary in that, but once you've collected all the elusive nuts and bolts (which have an endearing habit of burrowing into the nearest soft object to avoid

capture), you get a rollercoaster construction kit to play with. Build 'coaster and you then get to ride it, collecting power-ups along the way. Not bad for a sub-game.

And don't forget the vehicles, which add a new dimension to previously explored areas. On air, sea or land, *Sprocket* finds new forms of transport in just about anything that moves. Wacky Racers-style cars, speedboats, trucks, gliders, dolphins... Sprocket will ride them all.

The game is due to hit the shelves this Christmas. Hopefully it won't get trampled by Nintendo's big guns in the way that *Body Harvest* and *Silicon Valley* did last year, because *Sprocket* looks like being the most unusual and original platformer since *Glover*.

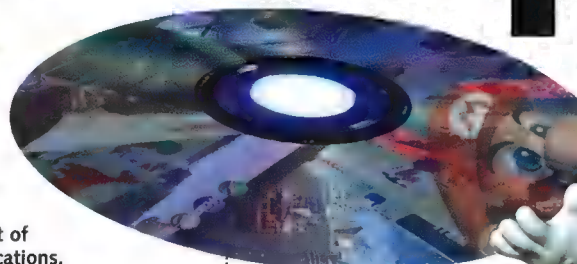

Howard Lincoln declared that the console would be released at the end of next year, and would out-perform and undercut Sony's hardware. Codenamed Dolphin, the system would use Matsushita's DVD technology to enable software houses to produce vast games at a fraction of the cost of a cartridge – you could fit around 256



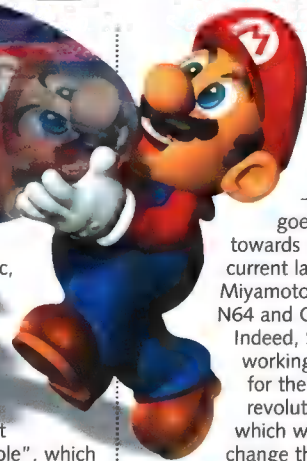

copies of *Zelda* on one disc, without compression.

A couple of months on, and what do we know for sure? Well it isn't called Dolphin any more. The name has been dropped in favour of "next generation Nintendo console", which obviously won't be the name of the finished article. And in Japan some of the biggest names in software have been involved in secret talks with Nintendo. Namco, Capcom, Konami, Square and Hudson have all been invited to sign development deals, although Namco and, in particular, Square, refuse to commit themselves until they see a proper development kit. Indeed, Namco's long-running feud with Nintendo and Square's loyalty to Sony may mean that there's a chance we'll never see a *Tekken* or *Final Fantasy* game on the new hardware.

But while Japan's big hitters weren't allowed to see the machine



in action, Nintendo's own coders, including Rare, have already begun work on next-gen games – a fact which

goes a long way towards explaining the current lack of new Miyamoto games on the N64 and Game Boy.

Indeed, Shigsy himself is working on the design for the new machine's revolutionary controller, which will no doubt change the face of gaming in the same way the pads for the NES (D-pad), SNES (shoulder buttons) and N64 (analogue stick) did.

As for DVD movie-playing abilities, the next-gen machine won't be able to play films. At least not in its basic form. Nintendo intend to remain a games company, first and foremost, and they want their next console to be affordable for the average gamer. Instead, Matsushita will produce a high-quality movie-playing version of the console aimed at people with expensive home cinemas, while Nintendo knock out the basic unit at a projected price of \$100 to \$200.

With clueless Americans still helping to make *Superman* a huge money-spinner, Titus have bought the rights to Robocop. Expect the bionic law-enforcer to strut around on the N64, Color Game Boy and Dolphin, in a series of games due for release well into the year 2000. "We believe Titus is the ideal software provider to take Robocop into the 21st Century," said a spokesman for MGM. Has he seen *Superman*?

HELLO GOODBYE

It seems we confused a few of you with 'What If...?', our back-page spoof game feature (which has now made way for the spanking new 'Wish You Were Here'). Shopkeepers have reported customers vainly searching for a copy of 'Beatles Adventure Racing', the Fab Four-based version of *Beetle Adventure Racing*... which we completely made up in N64/30. Still, if there's that

much interest in a racing game starring John, Paul, George and Ringo, perhaps EA should get to work.



SMASH BROS FIGHTS BACK!

It seems that our "We Want *Smash Bros*" campaign has been a success – thanks to you, of course. *Smash Bros* (N64/26, 90%) is finally going to get a PAL release. There's only one snag, though: we're going to have to wait until December. But at least UK N64 owners will finally get a chance to own Nintendo's superb beat-'em-up, and see Link smack Pikachu around the lofty roof of Hyrule Castle. Top news, isn't it?

DEAD CERTS

So who's going to be developing for the next-gen Nintendo machine? Amazingly enough, Namco and Square are the *only* dissenting voices in Japan, with absolutely every other major games company, bar Sega and SCE, committing themselves. And we reckon Namco are pretty certain to return to the fold if and when Nintendo offer them a favourable deal. So which games will we all be playing in a few years' time? Let's take a peek into the crystal ball...

Super Mario

Shigsy's sequel to *Super Mario 64* now looks almost certain to appear on the next console, complete with two-player mode.

Metroid

As reported in N64/28, a new *Metroid* game, based on the *Zelda* engine, is already in development – quite possibly for the next machine.

Mickey Mouse

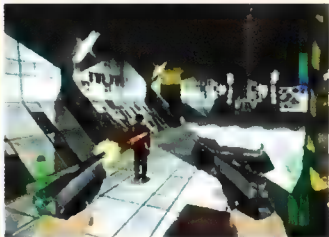
Yes, that's right. Mickey will be singing and dancing in a series of 128-bit games from the makers of *Banjo-Kazooie*.

Street Fighter 3

The game that's way too big to squeeze into a cartridge could fit 20 times over on a single DVD. Capcom will see it as a priority.

LEFTFIELD

Sports sims

Part-owned by Nintendo, the people behind *NBA Courtside* and *Excitebike 64* will be producing sports games to launch the next-gen machine outside of Japan.

RETRO STUDIOS

Launch games

An unknown quantity, comprised of former members of several development houses, including Acclaim. They're working on N64 titles as well as next-gen launch games.

Jason Moore ponders the future value of your *Zelda* cart...

The games industry is now huge and the older it gets, the more significant its roots will become. In a few years time you'll wish you'd kept hold of that SNES game or limited edition Game Boy title: they'll remind you of hours of fun and also be worth more than the latest next generation console games.

I get most excited about stuff from the early eighties, but there are plenty more recent gems. When Nintendo released *Zelda* they sent a storm through the collecting community. The first Japanese Famicom version came on disk, and is worth around £50, while the later Japanese only cartridge version is now worth nearer to £100. The original NES classic, complete with shiny gold cartridge, has shot up from around £10 in value to £30, and its NES sequel will fetch almost as much as the N64 version!

Nintendo covered a resurgence of interest in the Game Boy version with the new DX release, and a re-issue of the original. Nintendo Game & Watch machines are easily the most over-valued and collectable of them all. The original *Zelda G&W* was released in 1998 and is currently trading at £25-30 with boxed examples fetching up to £40.

These items are only a few years old; in five years time, when we're all drooling over *Zelda 128* (or whatever it turns out to be), they'll be worth considerably more. Bear that in mind before consigning old classics to the waste paper bin.

PILOTWINGS
 Nintendo • 1991
 If you own a Nintendo console, you expect to be treated to some of gaming's most unique experiences, and the original *Pilotwings* was no exception. Bursting at the seams with genre-busting originality, it tended to be shoe-horned into the category of 'flight sim'. But although it was based around floating around in the clouds, *Pilotwings* was infinitely more enjoyable



than your average WWII biplane simulation. Four vehicles to pilot – rocket pack, biplane, hang-glider and parachute – meant four different control styles, each as finger-twistingly tricky as the last. Utilising the SNES' fancy Mode-7 effects (which allowed the twisting and turning of two-dimensional shapes to create 3D landscapes), the craft were plonked into worlds of rolling green fields and vast lakes, creating a

brehtaking sense of freedom. It's a tribute to *Pilotwings* that while the N64 version gave the graphics a spangly proper-3D update, it left the mission styles largely intact. Back in the days when games were obsessed with platforms and horizontal scrolling, *Pilotwings* offered the experience of soaring through rings, bouncing on trampolines and sky-diving at frightening speeds in the vain hope of landing on a giant red-and-white bull's-eye. Meanwhile, the deliberately fiddly controls gave the whole game a satisfyingly challenging air. Great though *Pilotwings* was, we do prefer the N64 version, if only because there's so much more to do and see. But the original still manages to impress, and it's an example of the marvels that could be achieved with the SNES' relatively limited hardware.



YOSHI'S ISLAND
 Nintendo • 1995
 Appearing late in the SNES' life, *Yoshi's Island* was a semi-sequel to the superb *Super Mario World*, and a reminder of why no-one can touch the great Mr Miyamoto when it comes to platform games.



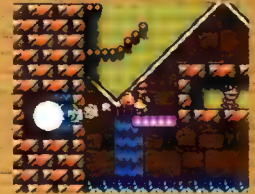
One glance at the two-foot high, nappy-wearing Mario in *Yoshi's Island* was enough to confirm that the game was set before *Super Mario World*. Yoshi travelled through each side-scrolling level with baby Mario clinging to his back – a feature that was abandoned for the N64 update. Colliding with an enemy meant being subjected to the kid's unbearable wailing as he floated off in a bubble, and losing a life if he wasn't rescued.

Despite possessing all the usual rotating platforms, coin-blocks and giant bosses, the levels avoided repetitiveness by throwing up a new and exciting set-piece at every turn. Where other tedious

game heroes merely ran around and jumped up and down, Yoshi could chuck eggs to activate switches and open doors, magically transform into trains and helicopters for bonus-collecting, and get 'drunk', causing the screen to fluctuate dizzily.

The vibrant pastel-style backgrounds were a revelation, and Nintendo enlisted the help of the Super-FX chip to conjure up some eye-goggling visual magic. The sudden, nerve-wracking appearance of giant Chomps eating into the scenery wouldn't have been possible without it.

Much like *Yoshi's Story*, the game was disappointingly short, but the real fun came from

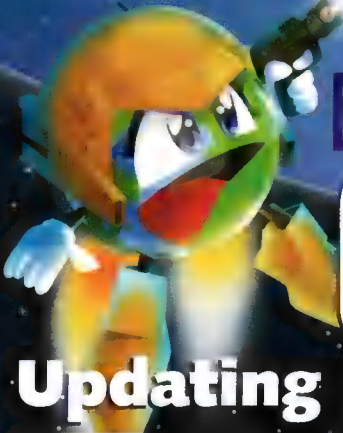


tracking down each level's carefully-placed nooks and crannies. It's well worth hunting down a copy, to see exactly where all the ideas in *Yoshi's Story* originated – and to find out just how irritating Mario was before he grew sideburns.

Thanks to the cash-laden presence of FIFA stalwarts EA, though, T•HQ have had to relinquish their grip on the WCW licence and instead take up the reins on the WWF games, shunting previous tenants, Acclaim, towards the lesser

known Extreme Wrestling Organisation in the process. Fortunately, despite switching rasslin' companies, T•HQ are using the same developers, Asmik, and an advanced version of the WCW engine for their new game, so fans can look forward to a similarly deep spandex-clad rumble.

WWF Wrestlemania 2000, then, is set to become the greatest wrestling game yet. Although it won't boast Attitude's astonishing hi-res visuals, it will improve upon that game's wrestler entrances (rumour has it that some of Wrestlemania's entrances run to a couple of minutes). It'll also feature stacks more hidden weapons, television-style replays (which kick in when you

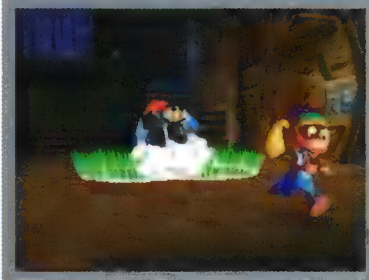

PRETEND WE'RE DEAD

One of the most plucky features is the resilience of the zombies. They just won't stay down. Fill a guy's skull with lead and he'll fall to the floor, apparently dead. But within seconds, he'll spring back to life and continue his attack - not good news if you were just shoving into him, as he'll mean a good few trousers. To truly finish him off, you'll need to complete a special 'kill' (the 'kill' is a special move) until he's got a full moon and his head dangles in a shower of brains and skull fragments. Mmmm.



This is the one. Resident Evil 2 is shaping up to be the game that finally proves the humble Nintendo can do everything Sony's grey box can - and, naturally, a whole lot more. Packed into the game's monstrous 512Mbit cartridge is a slap in the face for every "Can't be done" and "Just not possible" you'll have ever heard aimed at the N64. And, as zombie-laden, blood-spilling adventures go, it looks set to be a spine-tingling corker.

Resident Evil 2 has been available on the PlayStation for a while, shifting over one million copies in its first two months on sale in Japan alone. This success relied on

the games carefully-crafted movie-style thrills, which - unlike in so many other 'interactive movies' - didn't come at the expense of actual gaming fun. Resi 2 (as it's affectionately known) is plot-heavy and hugely atmospheric, and in a few short months, you'll be able to buy it in loading time-free, bonus-packed cartridge form.

The plot is classic thriller fare. Leon S. Kennedy, a promising young police officer, has been recruited by the Raccoon City police force to help ease the citizens' fears after a spate of mysterious accidents. When Leon arrives in the City, he finds, not the

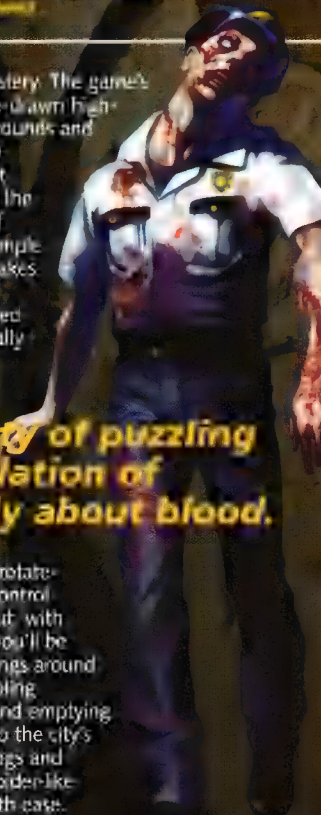

bustling neighbourhood he'd expected, but a ghost town populated by lumbering zombies, who openly feed on the bodies of the town's dead. Unsurprisingly, as soon as they clap eyes on our friendly policeman, they get a hankering for copper kebab.

Leon's quest to uncover the truth behind Raccoon City's shocking turnaround takes him from the ravaged streets, into the city sewers, and finally to the mysterious mountain-top laboratory that's at the heart

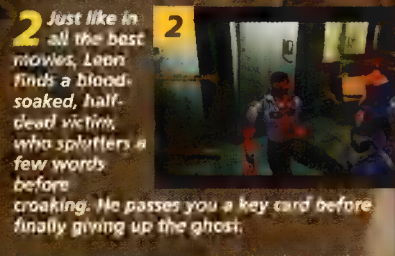

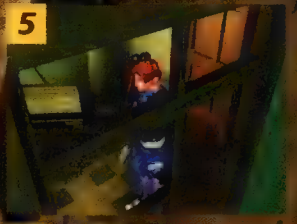

While there's plenty of head-scratching, puzzling and manipulation of objects to be done, Resi 2 is mainly about blood - and lots of it. Zombies grab your leg and chomp away at the flesh, pools of the red stuff seep from headless bodies, and dying monsters practically explode in a cascade of blood and sinuous tissue. The violence is tempered with a sense of foreboding - camera angles, sound and shadows are

employed to make turning each corner a nail-biting experience, maximising the jump-out-of-your-seat value of every sudden event. If all goes to plan - and Capcom is at the stage of applying the finishing touches - Resi 2 will be one of the most involving, disturbing and exciting games you're ever likely to play. The Nintendo version looks set to have

PlayStation owners getting blood, with its high-res graphics, surround sound and multitude of hidden extras, and it's certainly welcome as one of the N64's more grown-up experiences. We're trembling already.

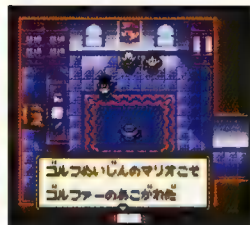

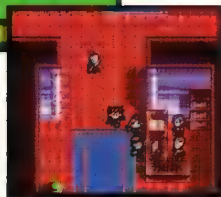

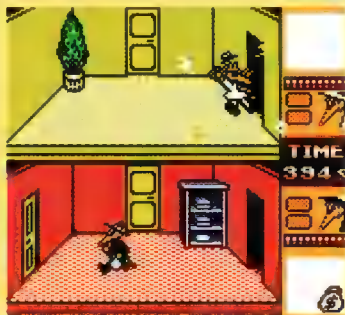

Another month, another blast from the past. *Spy vs Spy* was one of the many games that Commodore 64 owners used to demonstrate the superiority of their machine to Spectrum fans.

It was always an acquired taste, because a newbie player would stand no chance of beating a real pro. Absolutely none. Which was a shame, because *Spy vs Spy* only really came to life as a two-player game. The same thing is mostly true of this new GB version – you really do need a friend of the same standard to play against, because a

veteran of the original 80's game will thrash you stupid. Every time.

Luckily the tutorial mode will help refine your tactics. Controlling either of Mad Magazine's black-and-white spies (remember them, by any chance?), you have to find five items hidden around each level. Unless you keep one eye on your opponent's screen, you won't know whether you'll find what you're looking for or get blown to pieces by a booby trap. You get weapons to fight with if you bump into the enemy, and dying means that all the items you collected get scattered in random rooms. It's a



brilliant concept – no complicated controls to remember, just you against a mate or the lethal computer, and some devious weapons. This is the best version yet, with loads of humorous touches, and it's well worth seeking out for retro fans and battle addicts alike. This truly is a forgotten classic.

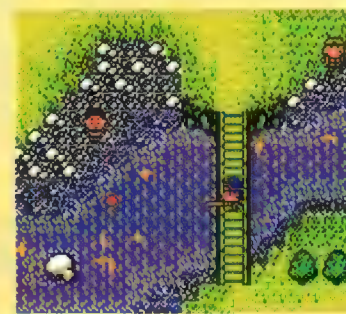
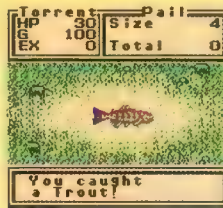

Like *Harvest Moon*, this is a game that the producers, Pack In Soft, think that only the Japanese and Europeans will really appreciate. The Americans might have *Pokémon*, but we're lucky enough to get some truly amazing RPGs of our own.

Legend of the River King is the tale of a young lad's quest to find the Guardian Fish, a slippery beastie that can heal his bed-ridden sister. You can forget about that goal for a good few weeks, though, because there

are countless hours of fishing, shopping and battling before you'll even get a sniff of the prize. You have to catch fish after fish, selling them at the local market in order to buy improved tackle. Other characters can be persuaded to part with information and vital goodies in exchange for particular species of fish, but there's also wandering animals trying to steal your catch (although we're not sure how a spider and a wasp managed to rob us of three hefty lunkers).

Waiting for the fish to bite is the best bit about *Legend of the River King*. You stand by the river bank, along with other fishing characters, just watching the fish sniff at the bait (which could be anything from a maggot to a whole frog), listening to the soothing oriental music and waiting for one of the dumb things to bite. It's lovely. Perhaps not as involving as *Harvest Moon*, but sweet enough all the same.

They don't always work that well on the Game Boy, though. With the exception of *Gradius* and *Twinbee*, which are both great on the GB Pocket, the action tends to look messy on the small screen. Thank

heavens for the GB Color, then. *R-Type DX* shows just how well the new machine can handle a real top-notch shooter. It's an enhanced special edition of two old mono versions, combining *R-Types 1* and *2* in one almighty kill-fest.

There can't be many gamers who don't know at least something about *R-Type*. It's the most recognisable shoot-'em-up after *Space Invaders*, and still one of the very best. The bosses and weapons have been shamelessly copied by countless other games, and they're all here in *R-Type DX*. It's a real visual treat, developers Bits Studios having worked wonders with some of the scrolling backdrops. The bullets and enemies are always easy to pick out too, because the background graphics fade out during boss encounters and set pieces.

Since it's basically two older games mashed into one, you can play both *R-Types* in their original monochrome forms, or as updated colour versions. The DX version combines all the levels, and is incredibly difficult. A real old-school

thumb-grinder. Even if you were an expert at the arcade version all those years ago, we bet the hardest difficulty setting will have you begging for mercy. 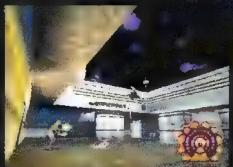
Shadowman basically takes place in two worlds: Liveside and Deadside. Mike LeRoi exists in Liveside, and his dark alter-ego, Shadowman, prowls the afterlife. Opening up Coffin Gates will allow you to access levels in Deadside, and once a certain level is open, you can warp back and forth from it at will. And the game is structured so that you'll be nipping back and forth to find new things all the time, opening up massive secret areas in the process. Here's a brief rundown of all the levels in the game – bear in mind that they're huge – with some hints of the route you should take through them, to get to Legion, the ultimate aim of the game...

SERIAL KILLER LAIRS

The Five are all located Liveside, and the only way to get to their respective hideouts is via the Schisms, found in the Asylum Schism Chamber. However, as Mike LeRoi, you can't harm them, so before you try to stop them you're going to have to find some way of getting Shadowman out of Deadside and into the real world...

GARPELLE COUNTY JAIL

You'll find three of The Five here, causing chaos in the midst of a full-scale prison riot. The prison is vast, though, and you'll have to contend with decapitated zombies and exploding heads as well...

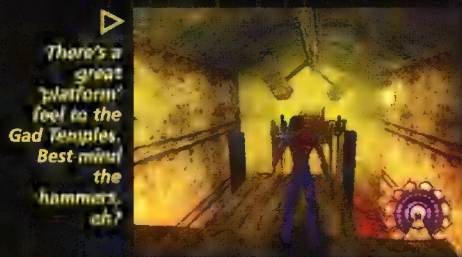
DEADSIDE

GAD TEMPLES

Deep in the Gad Temples you'll find arcane machinery that will burn powerful tattoos into your body. And the reason why? The Gads themselves grant Shadowman special abilities that come in very handy.

TEMPLE OF FIRE

Home of the Gad Toucher, which allows Shadowman to push red-hot blocks and hang from flaming ledges. The simplest Gad Temple, this gives you the merest hint of what's to come.

TEMPLE OF PROPHECY

TEMPLE OF BLOOD

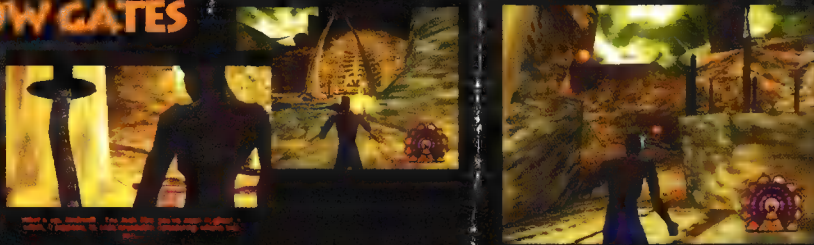
The trickiest Temple, thanks to some nasty jumping and swinging action. The Gad Nager allows swimming through lava, an ability which can lead you to some huge secret areas.

Home of Jaunty, a huge, top-hatted Irish snake with a skull for a face. He's your second friendly contact in Shadowman, and guards the rib-like Marrow Gates, which lead the way deeper into Deadside and, eventually, the Asylum.



THE WASTELAND

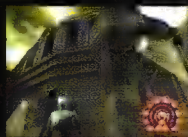
This desolate area holds, amongst other things, the huge Temple of Life, where you can trade in 100 Cadenix for an extra chunk on your health meter. The Wasteland also holds the entrance to the Paths of Shadow, wherein the Coffin Gates wait.

ASYLUM STATIONS

The mile-high Asylum, home of Legion, is so large that the only way to reach connecting areas inside it is to use transport – hence the Asylum Station levels, which are linked across vast distances by a shuttle system.

GATEWAY

There are two routes through the Gateway, the second being unattainable until you have the Gad Toucher. And you're treated to an awe-inspiring close-up of Asylum's breathtaking size...

CATHEDRAL OF PAIN

It's here that you can get to The Live. The Chambers hold five Schisms, grimy warp points that are linked to a particular killer's Liveside hideout.

The Asylum is powered by a giant contraption called the Dark Engine. You'll find, later in the game, that it has to be shut down for you to succeed in your mission, and proceed to Legion. But how do you do it...?



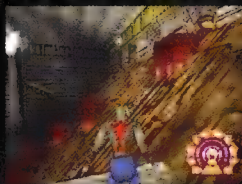

ASYLUM HUBS

These disparate areas of the Asylum are rich in Dark Souls, and must be searched thoroughly if you want to get through any of the later Soul Gates. You'll be re-visiting the Hubs many times once you've got all three Gads...

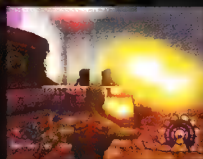
CAGEWAYS

To get to the level proper, you're transported via a wonderfully gothic, wrought-iron dream of a train. Plenty of ropes, moving cages and other such obstacles await you.



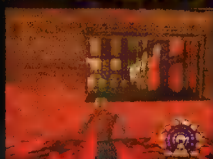
PLAYROOMS

One of Shadowman's most disturbing levels. A flesh-creeching lullaby tinkles in the background as you move warily through white-tiled rooms smeared with blood.



LAVADUCTS

The Gad Marcher and Gad Nager are essential here, as the Lavaducts are – obviously – full of red-hot magma, and many of the Dark Souls here require you to cross, or swim, under the stuff.



UNDERCITY

Located deep beneath the Asylum, the Undercity is dark, gloomy and swathed in atmospheric misting. As it's one of the later levels in the game, finding all the Dark Souls is very tricky...



NETTIE AND JAUNTY

There are two characters in *Shadowman* who are on your side, so to speak. Nettie, the voodoo priestess



has had a vision of the apocalypse and it's her who sends you on your quest in the first place. If you go back to see her during the game she'll give you hints on what you should do next, and the names of items you should be on the look out for.

Jaunty is the Irish snake who guards the Marrow Gates in Deadside. He tends to give you a bit more detail than Nettie and even offers the occasional piece of specific information.

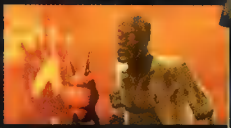


NOISES OFF

As we've said elsewhere, *Shadowman* features over an hour of speech, which is quite something. In fact, it's the main reason that the game was bumped up from a 128Mbit cart to a massive 256Mbit one.



And the voice acting is, in the main, splendid. Nettie's cod-Caribbean accent takes a little getting used to, as do Jaunty's Irishisms, but they're actually remarkably good. *Shadowman* himself is suitably gruff and dark, and Doctor Victor Batrachian, voiced by Acclaim Teesside's very own Guy Miller, is tops. You won't forget "I am the Lizard King!" in a hurry. Or even some of the other, unprintable phrases.



THE ARSENAL OF THE DAMNED

Nothing is what it seems in *Shadowman*. Each of the sprawling levels hides equally as sprawling secret areas, there's more to the serial killers than there first appears to be, and *Shadowman*'s arcane voodoo weapons have concealed powers....

THE DESERT EAGLE/SHADOWGUN

Given to Mike LeKoi by Nettie at the start of the game, the Desert Eagle pistol is a trusty weapon. But in *Shadowman*'s Deadside-based hands, it becomes the Shadowgun. Kill an enemy with it, and you can consume their life-force for health. It can also be charged with the energy of any Dark Souls you've gained, thus becoming more powerful as you get further in the game.

THE ASSON

The Asson is the only voodoo weapon that doesn't have an alternative use. Described as the sacred rattle of the



Mambo, it's constructed from the skull and spinal cord of an undisclosed victim, and fires a powerful ball of fire that incinerates enemies.

FLAMBEAU

Another fire-throwing weapon, the Flambeau's constant burning flame can be used as a torch, casting a gorgeous flickering glow on surrounding doors. It can also burn away the flesh doors adorned with the red flame-symbol, to reveal hidden items and areas.



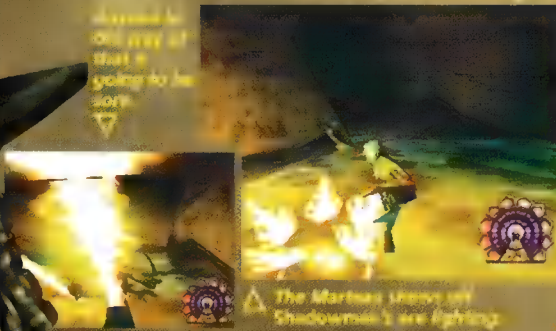

MARTEAU

This ancient jawbone, when struck, sends multiple jets of flame to engulf the enemy. Also, hit any Rada Drums with the Marteau - they're a bit like bongos, usually arranged in threes - and you'll uncover an adjacent, boarded-up room.

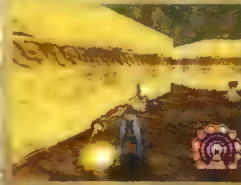

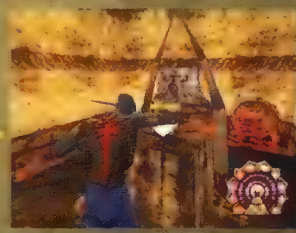

BATON

Found in the Temple of Life, the spear-like Baton actually fires a bolt of flaming energy. But its uses are, again, twofold: plunging it into the small altars dotted around each level will warp you to another altar, usually in a hard to reach location.

CALABASH

Resembling nothing as much as an arcane bomb, the eye-searingly explosive Calabash is a deadly weapon. If you detonate it on areas marked with the Calabash Veve you'll uncover hidden items and Dark Souls.

ENSEIGNE

Not a weapon, the Enseigne is a leather-bound shield (at least, we think it's leather...). Holding down the button it's assigned to will create a golden energy barrier that'll protect you from most enemy attacks. It eats up ammo, though.

LIVESIDE WEAPONS

There are also several secular weapons that can only be used Liveside, but nonetheless come in very handy when mowing down headless undead and angry serial killers.

O.9 SMG AND MP.909



A pair of delicious automatic machine guns. The MP is the more powerful of the two, while the SMG bears a remarkable similarity to GoldenEye's ZMG (itself an Uzi wannabe).

SHOTGUN

No game that involves guns would be worth its salt without a shotgun. It's slow, and it takes ages to reload, but shoot something point blank with this and they won't be getting up in a hurry.



THE VIOLATOR



Now this is class. Although not strictly a Liveside weapon, as it's found Deadside, this evil-looking beast can be used in both places with impunity. Fitting snugly onto Shadowman's fist, the Violator revolves menacingly, and is ringed with three vicious blades. Best of all, though, it'll shred an enemy in seconds, leaving nothing but a cloud of red mist.

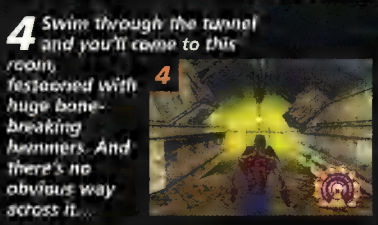


SHADOW SECRETS

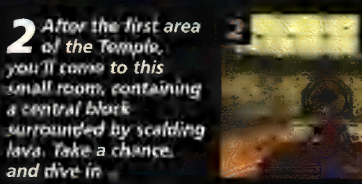

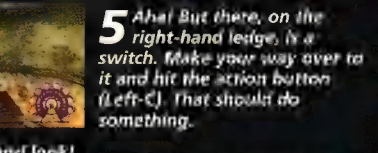
1 Once you've got the Gad Neger from the Temple of Blood, come back to the Temple of Fire. The Gad Neger allows you to swim through lava, which is incredibly handy later in the game, when you'll be searching everywhere for hidden Dark Souls.



4 Swim through the tunnel and you'll come to this room, festooned with huge bone-breaking hammers. And there's no obvious way across it...
5 Ah! But there, on the right-hand ledge, is a switch. Make your way over to it and hit the action button (Left-C). That should do something.



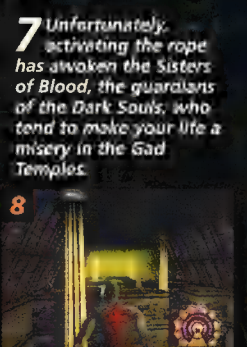
2 After the first area of the Temple, you'll come to this small room, containing a central block surrounded by scalding lava. Take a chance, and dive in...

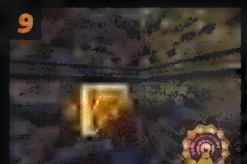
6 And it does. A rope extends widthways across the room, allowing you to reach the platform that leads to the exit. Jump up and swing across it.



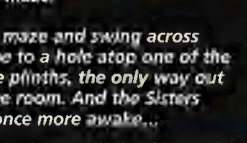

8 Finish them off and exit the room - you'll come to this area, containing a maze punctuated by shafts of light that fall from the ceiling.



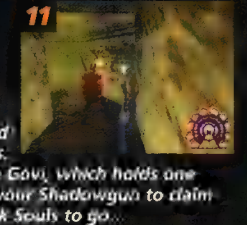
9 Make your way through the maze. At the end of it, you'll find another switch. Activating it will cause another rope to appear, high above the maze.



10 Go back through the maze and swing across the rope - you'll come to a hole atop one of the maze plinths, the only way out of the room. And the Sisters are once more awake...

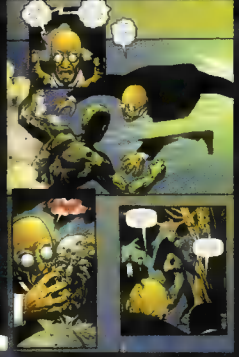

COMICALLY SPEAKING

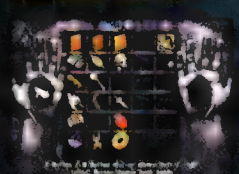

1999 is turning out to be quite a year for horror on the N64. First we had *Castlevania*, now *Shadowman* and there's *Resident Evil 2* to look forward to in November. We've yet to play a finished version of *Resident Evil 2*, but one thing's for sure: *Shadowman* kicks the living daylight's out of *Castlevania*. Konami's game was good, and full of

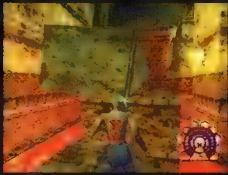


vamp-filled fun, but it also came chock-full of annoyingly pin-point jumping, which became increasingly unfair as the game progressed. *Shadowman* simply does everything far, far better.



JUMP AROUND

Shadowman features its fair share of jumping, climbing and swinging, as any 3D game worth its salt has to. What's amazing, though, is that there is only one instance in the game where it gets a little irritating, and a little unfair, and that's in the third Gad Temple, the Temple of Blood. There's a quite-tortuous route to



where you get the Gad burned into your body, and when you do get there, you have to fight the Sisters of Blood whilst skipping over sinking platforms that are surrounded by lava. It's not bad going, though, considering just how much there is to the game.



FIVE ALIVE!

Check out Nettie's File and you'll find FBI profiles on The Five, the unhinged serial killers Legion has employed to bring about apocalypse. They're a nasty bunch, as you'll find when you eventually get to them. Here are a couple of our favourites.



**AVERY MARX
(THE HOME IMPROVEMENT KILLER)**

Avery is a truly disturbing and frightening creature, as you'll find out when you confront him in his dilapidated New York Tenement, which is cold and dark because the power's out. Avery earned his nickname from making furniture out of the bodies of his victims...

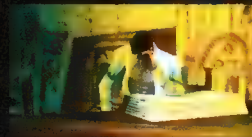

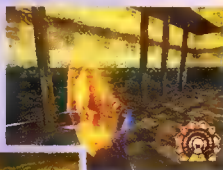
SHADOW MOVES

Mike LeRoI and *Shadowman* are equipped with a flexible and extensive set of moves. The control system is much like *Zelda*'s and includes a lock-on that enables you to strafe around the enemy. Here are a few details...

AMBIDEXTERITY

Brilliantly, you can equip Shadowman with an item in either hand, with the left and right hands bound to Z and B respectively. It's a superb system, especially in combat, where you can decimate an enemy with a double-weapon attack.

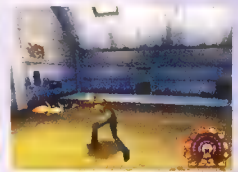
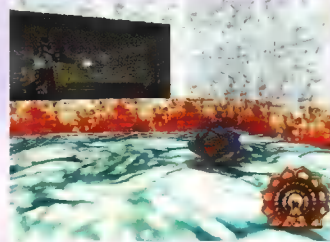

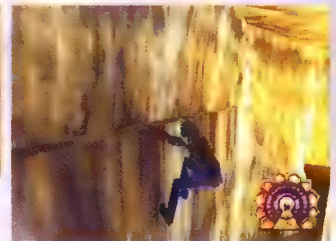
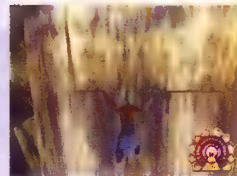
SWINGING

Shadowman can grab onto a rope or pole and monkey-swing his way across it, which is especially useful in the Gad Temples, as such obstacles are in abundance.

BACK-JUMPING



A great move, this. At times you'll see tiny ledges - which Shadsy can grab onto by his fingertips and slide along - with platforms opposite them. Push up on the analogue and Shadowman will bring his legs up against the wall, then press jump, and our hero will leap backwards, hopefully onto the platform.

THE RETRACTOR FACTOR

There's plenty to do if you're going to succeed in *Shadowman's* quest. One of the more important items in the game is the Retractor, a grisly item used to open the Schisms. There are three hidden in the game – here's how to find one of them...

6 ...To the Retractor Chapel, impressive, no? You may remember the design sketches for this from last month's *Shadowman* diary.

1 One of the Retractor Chapels can be found in the Asylum Playrooms level. To get into the Playrooms, you first have to swim through a lengthy, blood-filled tunnel complex.



2 You'll surface into an ambush. Vanquish the bad guys, head towards the door on the same level, and keep on going.

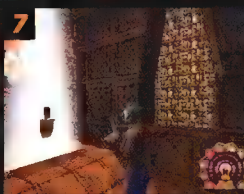


3 Follow the walkway over the blood lake (which, when you explore the level properly, holds submerged doorways to later parts of the level).

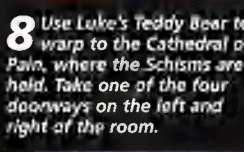


4 In the next tunnel, turn left and follow the grimy brick corridor down...

7 Inside the Chapel is a Retractor. Simply walk up to it to grab it. There are two more in the game and you'll need them both to get to other members of *The Five*...



8 Use Luke's Teddy Bear to warp to the Cathedral of Pain, where the Schisms are held. Take one of the four doorways on the left and right of the room.



9 In this instance, we've gone towards Jack the Ripper's Schism. You'll come past his 'shrine' on the way up.

10 And here's the Schism itself, a skinned torso that, when ripped open, becomes a gruesome warp portal to Liveside.



11 Equip a Retractor, use it, and *Shadowman* will plunge it into the Schism's chest. It's not pleasant, but it has to be done.



12 Press the Action Button (Left-C) and you'll be sucked, impossibly, into the Schism. Best get ready to meet old Jack, then...

AMMO WHAMMO

While the *Liveside* weapons in *Shadowman* are the regular ammunition – the *Wraith* included – the Retractor weapons (including, of course, the Retractor) are all one of a different type – ammo that can only be found in *Deadside*. Taking a huge of small, golden woodoo skulls, these power your woodoo weapons – but the more powerful the weapon, the more skulls are used. The Flamula, for example, may only shoot



the *Wraith* (and in some cases even the *Calabash*), and based on flesh-meat painted with low-level spells, it's used to lock on on skulls.

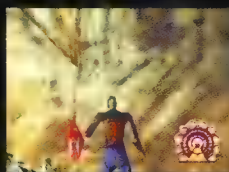


CADEAUX

The *CADEAUX* are the red crystals that float about *Liveside* and *Deadside*. We'll have a closer look at these in a few weeks, but be sure to collect them all, as they're used to increase *Shadowman's* health to a maximum of 100. *CADEAUX* found in the temples of *Liveside*



in the *Wraithland* and you can trade them in for an extra "crank" on your health meter. *CADEAUX* are the only way to deal all the health, and you can get your hands on them in the game.

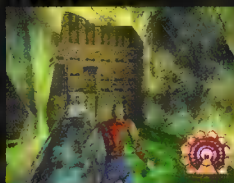

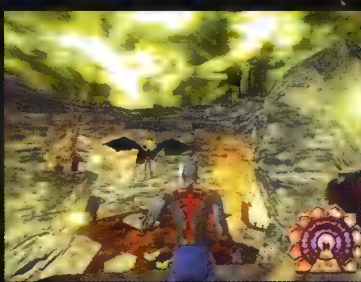


Three years in development, a massive 256Mbit cart, and a truly epic sense of scale. Those are three things that *Shadowman* has in common with the mighty *Legend of Zelda*... and there's also a fourth: *Shadowman*, quite simply, is a wondrous example of videogaming at its creative and innovative best.

Of course, we always knew that *Shadowman* was going to be good, but just how good was a question that only playing the game completely through would answer. Acclaim's dark adventure is so thoroughly complex, sprawling and laced with such rich and splendid gaming flourishes, that merely explaining the game can't convey quite how much there is to do, and see, and enjoy. That *Shadowman* is a third-person adventure along the lines of *Zelda*, and, to a lesser extent, *Tomb Raider*, is true. That it is plot-heavy, with reams of cut scenes and over an hour's (an hour's!) worth of speech is also correct. And Acclaim's reckoning that it could take 70 hours to really, utterly, complete the game, too, can be believed.

But it's the vast, yet tight, structure of the game that needs to be understood. Each of the game's 20 "levels" (although,

again like *Zelda*, the game doesn't progress through them in a traditional linear fashion) is huge. Technically, they're all marvels; when you first stop out in front of the Asylum, you'll gasp at its size. The crunch on the horizon in the opening Louisiana Swamp level can be reached, and entered. And you'll lose count of the times that you'll enter rooms so cavernous you'll wonder how Acclaim managed to do it with no fogging. *At all*. Make no mistake, this game is gigantic, in every respect, from the length of the challenge it presents to the areas that you'll be making Mike LeRoil – and his dark alter-ego – explore.

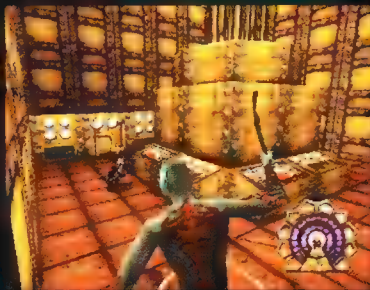

The first time you visit, say, the Asylum Gateway, you'll see perhaps half of it. Everything has been designed to be revisited; once you've got the Gads – themselves housed in sprawling temples – whole new areas open themselves up to you. Swimming beneath a lake of lava may reveal a tunnel; an unreachable door lurks tantalisingly beyond a walkway of red-hot coals; and fiery blocks prevent passage to places unknown.

Everything in the game has been placed with the player's inquisitiveness in mind, right down to the smallest detail.

And yet, the game is not simply about picking out every tiny secret. Although, early on in the game, things can get a bit lonely as you ferret out enough Dark Souls to open more Coffin Gates, the threat of The Five offers an ever-present air of

and tweaked and balanced to near-perfection. At no time do you feel completely lost, or stuck – there's a way out, and a way in, to everything. Acclaim know that the player will want to see what's beyond what they can reach: how to get to the doorway accessible only by an inch-thick ledge; why exactly a Dark Soul has been placed in plain sight yet with no visible means of getting to it. This is a game as cerebral as it is action-packed. You'll be constantly thinking and wondering as well as making the odd glorious leap of faith. *Shadowman* is engrossing, challenging, immensely rewarding and presents endless, joyous possibilities. It's an achievement of which Miyamoto would be proud, and demands that you enjoy every single moment of the game as opposed to simply getting to the final screen.

And there's just so much to do. As well as scouring the Asylum and Deadside areas for Dark Souls, and re-visiting them once you've got the Gads and the Poigne (spiked armbands that allow you to climb the Blood Falls), you need to find – for example – the Retractors that will crack open the ribs of the Schisms, the three parts of the l'Eclipser dagger (you'll have to find out for yourselves what *that* does) and so on.

dread and urgency. Once you've progressed to the point where you're in with a chance of beating them (and here's a hint: you won't, as Mike LeRo, and Shadowman can't travel Liveside...), *Shadowman's* much-trumpeted 'mature' side comes to the fore. The prison plot is superb, especially when you get to the three serial-killing perpetrators, and the New York Tenement level is astoundingly atmospheric. Taking a cue from *Silence of the Lambs*, the resident evil (excuse the pun) hunts you down in the dark with the aid of night vision goggles. Perhaps best of all, though, is the London Underground, which is simply cracking, fantastically communicating what it would be like to roam the deserted Tube at night, hunting down a serial killer.

Which brings us to the game's horror-based content. Yes, it is violent, much as many videogames are, but it's not gratuitous for the sake of it. You will find zombies with exploding heads, but the main thrust of *Shadowman's* more adult style is bound up in the atmosphere. The game's exceptionally strong plot – there's a killer of a twist when you finally get to Legion – is responsible for this. It's a psychological horror that *Shadowman* presents, rather than a visual and graphic one, taking in elements from films such as

Sewen, *Hellraiser* and *Jacob's ladder*, as well as nods to comics like *Preacher*, *Hellblazer*, *Sandman* and more. The game manages to present dark and disturbing subject matter without resorting to crude shock tactics. Be warned, though: there is swearing, (and it is completely in keeping with the characters in the game – Mike LeRo isn't exactly a saint) and that's why there's a certificate on the front of the box. Please take note of it.

Elsewhere, there's so much more to the game that we just don't have room to talk about it all. The suitably evocative FBI casebook, with psychological profiles and histories on all of The Five, the book of *The Prophecy*, which is full of indirect hints and tips about *everything* via a deck of excellent Tarot-style voodoo cards, a glorious hi-res mode – the list just goes on and on. Any criticisms are few. In both hi-res and regular resolution, the game gets a little bit jerky, but never enough to spoil things – and both modes run at pretty much the same rate anyway. The control isn't quite as fluid and intuitive as *Zelda's*, but it's light years ahead of Lara Croft's clumsy posturing.

What we have, in the end, is the first game to follow *Zelda's* path and it stabs, with a dark and rusty blade, towards brave, new directions. We've made many comparisons between *Shadowman* and Shiggy's masterpiece in this review but don't be mistaken, they're very different games. Whilst *Shadowman* can't quite live up to Link's majestic exploits, what they have in common are vast, believable worlds and an unparalleled sense of both freedom and interaction. *Shadowman* puts its own pitch-black spin on it, making a game that we thought we'd never see – something that, on gameplay terms alone, is superbly crafted but also offers a gloriously dark and serious storyline.

Shadowman is a dark and glittering jewel in the N64's gaudy crown. Open the door, step into the night, and revel in its bloody charms. You won't be disappointed.

This is turning out to be an absolutely fantastic second half of the year for the N64. Think of what's coming up: as well as *Perfect Dark*, *Donkey Kong 64* and *Jet Force Gemini*, there's the superb *Shadowman* (turn to page 46 of this very issue), *Hybrid Heaven*, *Quake II* (page 66), *Resident Evil 2* (page 30), *Turok: Rage Wars*... and this, the biggest surprise of the year so far.

We've been following the progress of *World Driver Championship* with gusto since the first screenshots were released, about, ooh, a year ago. It always looked promising, but other than that, not much was known about. Well, we've played it to death now. And the verdict? Read on...

Res limit

World Driver Championship, it has to be said, is a thing of graphical wonderment. Unlike *Top Gear Rally*, which Boss Games used as the basis for their *Gran Turismo*-like, *WDC* is absolutely jam-packed with plentiful background detail, strong, bright colours, moving reflections and endless other smile-inducing touches.

The best news, though, is that there's also a high resolution mode... which runs, incredibly, *without* the aid of an expansion pak. You're forced to play the game in a widescreen letterbox, unfortunately, but the result is something that can easily hold its head high with the likes of *Turok 2* and *Zelda*. Marvellous stuff.

TEAM 64

The main aspect of *World Driver Championship* is the emphasis on your own career. At the start of the game you'll be ranked 30th in the world; it's up to you, by winning races and accruing points, to ascend through the ranks with the aim of getting to number one. As you get more successful, various racing teams will try to entice you to race for them, with the glittering temptation of new and faster cars. At the start of the game, two teams are available for you to choose between, both armed with bottom-of-the-range vehicles.



SPEEDCRAFT

These cheery, confident Americans will offer you the '97 Stallion SRC to begin with. It's a heavy old beast, though, despite a reasonable top speed, and proves to be difficult to control with accuracy.



KOHR RACING

These companionable Mexicans put emphasis on friendship, and despite their cars being lightweight and not quite so good as the competition, offer a more human team than the mostly ruthless others.

There are 15 racing teams in *World Driver Championship*, all of which you'll eventually get to play around with. Here are some of our favourites...

VIEWPOINT

They may be incredibly arrogant, but the Italian Viewpoint team's Lotus-like Elan TTs are fast and handle well, even if they don't have the tightest of turning circles.



REEDS

Run by Reginald Goldsmith - driven to make his father proud of him, or so he says - the Reeds R12 Mantas turn like small countries, but hardly ever slide out of control.

EUROSPEC

Eurospec's Ram Venom GTR'S possess both pleasing acceleration and top speed, plus a comfortable compromise between nippy handling and powersliding slipperiness.

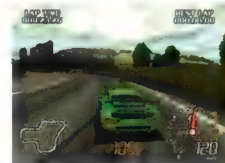


TOTALSPORT

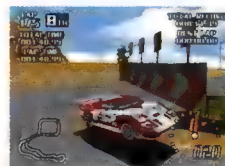
WELL TRAINED

There's much more to *World Driver Championship* than simply racing the, erm, championship. There are a plethora of other modes, including two-player, time trial, practice laps and arcade race. There's also a training mode, too, which is incredibly helpful when getting to grips with the game's demanding physics system, as it shows what speeds you should be travelling at on what parts of the course, how much you should decelerate on certain corners, and so on. Great stuff.



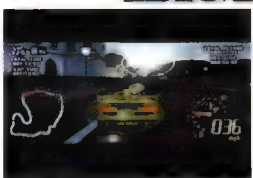
CRASH YAN-DIEOOT

There are some top Crash-mandu style car-knackery shenanigans to be had in *World Driver Championship*. Although the cars themselves can't be damaged, we've spent an unfortunate amount of time trying to flip our cars into the air. The only time we've managed so far to get all four wheels off the ground is by driving head-on, at well over 100mph, into a wall on the Sydney track. Think you can do better? You know what to do...

TRIAL OF CHAMPIONS

World Driver Championship is divided into two main championships, GT2 and GT1. Completing GT2 – which consists of ten cups, each requiring you to race on an increasing number of tracks – will allow you to access the GT1 championship, with all-new teams and cars to race against and acquire. Following is a potted run-through of the GT2 championship.

Novice Cup

Tracks: Rome A, Hawaii A (two laps each)

A gentle start to proceedings, consisting of two short laps apiece on *WDC's* two most straightforward courses. A great starting point.



ROME A



Although Rome A is the game's gentlest track, it's also the experts Time Trial choice. Once you've got used to the game's slide-happy physics, it's possible to whip through the track with nary a touch on the brakes. The only corner that requires serious speed-sapping is the evil turn just before the house-lined street; otherwise, learn to whip through the other chicanes on a fairly straight line.

Spider Cup

Tracks: Hawaii C, Kyoto A (two laps each)

Another relatively simple cup, despite the presence of the evil Kyoto A track, which requires *plenty* of practice, plus a new route through New Zealand.



HAWAII C



The other 'easy' track in the game, Hawaii C is for the most part a relaxing succession of gentle bends, only a couple of which require a stab of the brakes. Graphically, it's one of the most colourful environments in *WDC*, and the moment where you hurl out of the tunnel near the finish line into some blindingly gorgeous lens flare is one to be treasured.

Emperor Challenge

Tracks: Rome B, Kyoto B, New Zealand C (three laps each)

The difficulty gets ramped up in the Emperor Challenge, with three, three-lap races, two new routes through Rome and Kyoto, and New Zealand making its first appearance.



NEW ZEALAND C



The contrasting lush greenery and parched earth of New Zealand make for a bright, visually compelling and interesting track – cornering skills are really tested here. A couple of sharp corners are bordered by spin-inducing sand, making astute braking essential, and it's possible to slingshot yourself around the final circular bend at over 100mph without hitting the grass or overturning. If you're good.

Seasons Cup

Tracks: Rome B, Hawaii B (reverse), Kyoto B (three laps each)

Despite the by-now reassuring reappearance of Rome and Kyoto, the Seasons Cup wrongfoots you by asking you to drive around a reversed Hawaii B.



KYOTO B

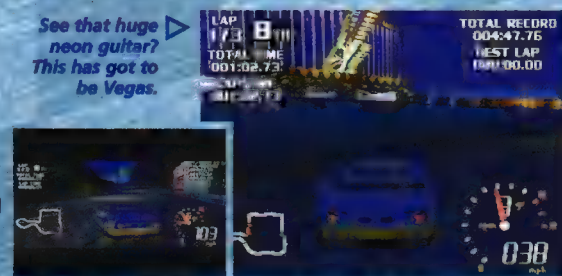


The first time you encounter Kyoto, in any of its incarnations, you'll find some fine gentle bends sprinkled liberally amongst a nightmare of right-angled corners, three of which lead up to the finish line. And there's a corner halfway around the track that'll lose you the race unless you slow *right* down and hug the inside of the bend. Nasty.

Driver's Challenge

Tracks: Las Vegas A, New Zealand C, Lisbon C (three laps each)

Two new tracks are thrown at you in the testing Drivers Challenge, with success requiring plenty of practice laps and a good qualifying position on each.



LAS VEGAS A



A confusing mix of night-driving and dazzling neon-garishness, Las Vegas won't allow you to make a single mistake. The first corner is a right angle, surrounded by swathes of sand that will both slow you to a crawl *and* send you spinning. Two more follow, with only the final loop offering any respite.

Despite the presence of Lisbon C, which, whilst not easy, has at least been raced on before, a reversed New Zealand and the all-new Black Forest conspire against you.

Orca Cup

Tracks: New Zealand B (reverse), Lisbon C, Black Forest A, (three laps each)

When you test drive a car, Black Forest A is the track you can try out your prospective new motor on – and with good reason. Despite being by far the shortest track in the game, it's a riot of incredibly harsh, twisty-turny corners, replete with the fatal sandtraps already seen in New Zealand, making it almost impossible to get near top speed.

The Endurance Cup is well-named, consisting of four races at a stamina-draining four laps each. It's just a taste of things to come, though...

Endurance Cup

Tracks: Las Vegas B (reverse), New Zealand A, Rome B (reverse), Lisbon C (reverse), (four laps each)

The reversed Rome B is almost as hectic as its right-way-round brother. Some of the chicanes that could be hurtled through before now require a lighter touch, but it still remains one of the fastest courses in the game. Try and beat our top speed of 163mph on the final straight leading up to the finish line...

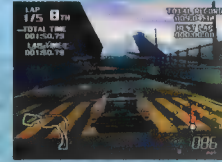

Despite the lengthy races, the Ring of Fire Cup is one of WDC's finest, as it throws in some of the game's very best courses along with the brand-new Zurich.

Ring of Fire Cup

Tracks: Zurich A, Lisbon A, Rome C, Kyoto C (five laps each)

As well as providing a superbly-designed raceway, Zurich is an absolute graphical marvel. Exquisite detail, reflective lakes and planes that fly terrifyingly close overhead when you reach the airport are all impressive enough, but it's the translucent mist – used in one section to brilliant effect – that really stands out.

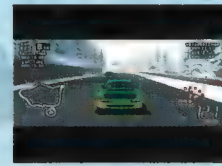

A tremendously difficult, but richly rewarding cup, throwing in two fiendish reverse tracks along with the slippy-slidy ice world that is Les Gets.

Ultimatum Cup

Tracks: Les Gets A, Hawaii B, Las Vegas A (reverse), Rome C (reverse), (five laps each)

A winter wonderland, Les Gets is a fairly straightforward track, with two exceptions: the problematic circular turn three-quarters of the way round, and the vicious hairpin just before the finish line. Tremendous speeds are attainable on the initial straight that leads to the small incline.

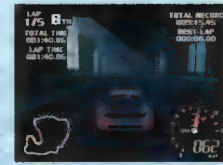

Yup, one track, 15 laps. The Invitational Cup is the course that the word 'gruelling' was invented for. Your only hope is to get an early lead and keep it.

Tracks: Lisbon B (reverse), (15 laps)

A fittingly tricky course to end the GT2 championship on, but yet another graphically stunning one; it takes place at dawn, and the piercing early-morning sun makes for some truly blinding lens flare. Otherwise, the narrow streets and plentiful turns are the stuff of the true World Driver professional.

KANGAROO COURT
World Driver Championship contains ten tracks, each with a possible three routes and also playable in reverse (not Mirror Mode, à la Mario Kart). The GT2 event only takes place over nine of these tracks; the tenth, Sydney, is only encountered when you make it through to the GT1 event. And what's it like? Fantastic. Wide roads, some superb corners and a bewildering amount of extraneous detail – jet fighter formations stream overhead, skyscrapers and bridges tower over you – make it one of the best tracks.

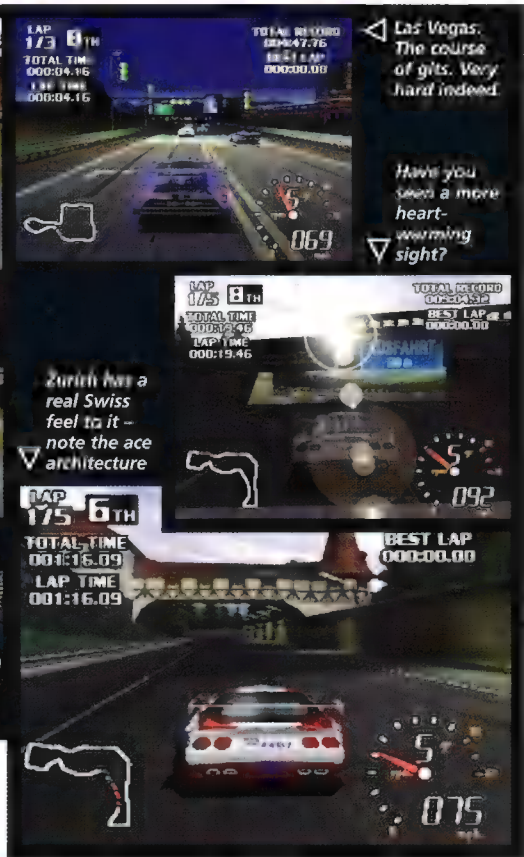
This has come as an utterly pleasant surprise. Boss Games are to be heartily congratulated on bringing us their latest: a bionic, supercharged regeneration of *Top Gear Rally*, which was butchered, stripped apart and rebuilt from scratch so that *World Driver Championship* might exist. It's the perfect counterpart to Video System's *F1 World Grand Prix* (and its sequel) and *V-Rally* – both games that stand on the N64 as definitive representations of their genre – quite simply because it's a superlative racing game.



The reasons for this are many, but it's not something that grabs you immediately. *World Driver Championship* is a game that requires perseverance, and effort, but the rewards repay your time investment

fold. The chief reason for this is the cars' handling: it's incredibly slide-happy. Whereas most people might prefer a mite more grip on the roads, *WDC's* cars are quite happy to skid wildly out of control should you take a corner too sharply. It's highly frustrating at first; you'll spend your first hour or two with the game spinning in circles, shouting at the telly and wishing the cars handled a bit more 'realistically'. But... you'll get the hang of it. Eventually. And it's then that the game shines brightly. Like *Top Gear Rally*, but to a lesser extent, *World Driver* puts emphasis on the powerslide. That is, you'll slide sharply into a corner, and then push in the opposite direction to control the skid, bringing you out of the turn lined up in the correct direction. And it's essential to brake on corners – you'll learn to slide around bends at speeds over 100mph eventually, but sharper turns absolutely demand that you slow right down, take the turn, and accelerate out of the bend. You'll come to realise that the physics in *World Driver Championship*, despite their exaggerated nature, are actually expertly constructed; there's a steep learning curve, granted, but the whole thing's designed so that you will, in time, get better. With practice, whipping around the chicanes of Rome becomes second nature and once you have got the hang of it, it's an incredibly exhilarating ride.



The various cars in the game – numbering over a splendid 33 in total – all handle markedly differently, and demand different approaches to cornering. For instance, the two cars you can choose from at the start of the game – Speedcraft's Stallion and Kohr Racing's Rage – both require a different touch. The Rage feels like it's made of tin sheeting in comparison to the hulking Stallion. The earlier cars are agonisingly slow, too, but things speed up considerably once you've won the first few cups in the championship.

And the championship mode itself is another stroke of casual genius. Opening up a new track or completing a tough cup is thrilling, and having different racing teams compete for your skills is nothing short of genius. As your ranking increases, teams will 'headhunt' you with the promise

You can also save an entire race (up to five laps) onto a controller pak, should you have driven in a particularly faultless manner and wish to keep your efforts for posterity. We've found the best use for the replay is to point out Martin's many mistakes in the two-player game, where he invariably embarrasses himself with terrible driving. Brilliant stuff, and three cheers for Boss Games for implementing such a novel feature in such a marvellous manner.

of better and faster cars, allowing you access to the better machines in the game. However, stay loyal to one team and you'll get to their advanced machines, perhaps quicker than you would by leaping to another team; and if you join and leave too many teams, this could have an adverse affect on how some others see you. For instance, joining Eurospec will bar you from joining Lassiter later in the game, purely because the two teams hate each other's guts. It's up to you to balance the need for better cars with loyalty to the teams that have helped you, and putting this emphasis on your very own career adds a splendidly personal touch to proceedings.

Elsewhere, the ten tracks in the game – each containing three individual and different routes through them – are faultlessly designed, mixing high-speed straights with gentle bends, right-angled

manner, with no slowdown at all – even when there are eight (yes, *eight*) cars on the track at one time. Unfortunately, the two player game – which is excellent if two of you have got completely to grips with the handling – cuts out a lot of the background detail to keep the speed and smoothness up. But it's a small price to pay.

In fact, *World Driver Championship* is, overall, nothing less than graphically stunning. Even disregarding the hi-res mode, everything is crystal clear, sharp, detailed and magically coloured. Reflections pass over the cars, smoke churns from spinning tyres and the skies overhead are beautiful. But the letterbox hi-res mode itself is incredible,

corners and chicanes that the skilled player can hurtle through in a straight line. You'll soon have your favourite tracks, ones that you'll learn to whip around flawlessly; Rome B is one of Team 64's, with the gorgeous Sydney and Zurich coming close. And the background detail on each track is staggering: houses, churches, windmills and forests border the tarmac; planes fly overhead; you can race through airports, city centres and Japan on a dusky evening. And despite the mind-boggling amount of detail, the game runs in a silky-smooth

and it doesn't use the expansion pak, which is quite a feat. Things do tend to get a bit jerky, though, but – as you can see from the screenshots over these pages – the visual result is worthy of a high-spec PC complete with 3DFX card. Quite wonderful indeed. Also, quite how Boss have also managed to squeeze in the exemplary replay mode is baffling. But they've done it, and it's superb – playback your race and you'll find it re-enacted in the hi-res mode, from a number of cinematic angles, allowing you to see how

well or badly you've driven, and thus allowing you to learn from your mistakes.

There's so much in here that, if you're even the slightest bit interested in throwing a wheeled metal box recklessly around a right-angled corner, we'd advise you to buy this game immediately. It's beautiful to look at, wonderful to play, frighteningly engrossing and will take you plenty of time to finish. Bear in mind that it's a game that takes time to love but, when you've tamed the beast, you'll have the greatest time. It's perhaps not quite as complete as it could be – there's no engine tinkery, unfortunately, which would have been nice – but, yes, the N64 finally has its *Gran Turismo*. It's that good.

World Driver Championship is plainly the result of lots of hard work, care and attention from Boss Games, and the end result is a tyre-squealing, rubber burning, powersliding thing of wonderment. Get in.

Everything, from fighting moves to arena appearance, is customisable, and there's a staggering 15 game types to throw your big-muscled buddies into - 21 if you include the multiplayer modes. Although most of these are simply variants on the theme of 'let's

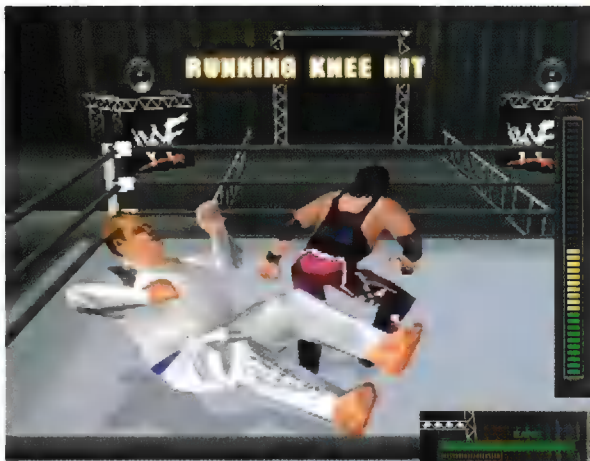

Warzone, is an acquired taste. With only three buttons assigned for fighting moves, all the impressive bone-cracking stunts are available as combos, accessible by rapid sequences of button-presses and D-pad rotations. It works in fighting games like *Fighters Destiny*, and it works in *Attitude*. But if you've grown used to *WCW/NWO Revenge*, where everything starts with the two fighters linking arms and even the most complicated throws are only a couple of button presses away, it's bound to prove frustrating.

Stick with it, though. The two control systems each have their strengths and weaknesses, but *Attitude's* is less of a hit-and-miss affair, creating fast, varied, free-flowing bouts as soon as you begin to get your fingers around the combos. *Revenge's* wrestlers often seem to have a mind of their own – arm-twisting and head-locking manoeuvres take ages to complete, despite the outcome of the move being pretty much fixed from the start – while *Acclaim's* fighters can reverse, block and dodge moves with ease.

Despite *Attitude's* fighting being hugely enjoyable and breathtaking to watch, it's the host of extras that really

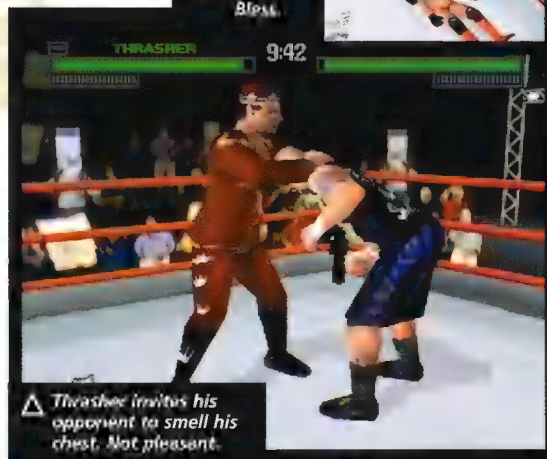

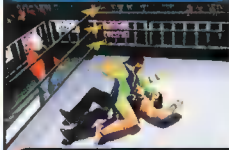

We had good reason to be more than a little worried about *Quake II*. Earlier instalments in the series – *Quake* and its prequel *Doom* – were quick-and-dirty translations of the PC originals, with ropery visuals and curiously soulless gameplay. *Quake*, in particular, managed to capture the brilliance of the PC's Internet-based deathmatches in much the same way that watching *The Phantom Menace* on a pocket TV would recreate the thrill of being at the cinema.

Thankfully, *Quake II* glows with the amount of sheer work put into it. Originally designed for up to two players at a time, the game's been delayed to

allow time to squeeze in – huge sigh of relief – a simultaneous four-player deathmatch. And the problems of mimicking a £1500 PC have been partly avoided by incorporating a colourful new set of N64-specific levels. In fact, even John Carmack, the brains behind the monstrous success of PC *Quake*, is excited, describing N64 *Quake II* as "the best console *Quake* ever".

So, is it? Well, despite the spit and polish, it's certainly not perfect. But although we've got 'issues' with some

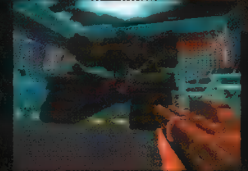

One of *Quake II*'s greatest moments is the 'halfway boss' on Level 10. After scooting through a stage comprising mainly of suspiciously easy-to-kill bad guys, a switch is triggered to make a laser beam destroy the locks of the floor panel leading to the next level. But, horrifyingly, as this happens, a huge tank-like robot rises up from below and starts throwing missiles at you. In the panic, you'll invariably stumble into the laser beam and die instantly. It's a brilliant, heart-stopping moment, which will have you genuinely shaking as you restart the level, knowing your next rendezvous with the imposing automaton is only a few moments away.

Boom! Clink-clink-clink. Eurrghhh! In case you don't recognise it, that's the sound of a grenade launcher being fired, and an unfortunate mutant being blown to smithereens. Pleadingly, in *Quake II*, hearing the death of your enemies is just as satisfying as seeing it happen – a sure sign that the people behind this N64 conversion of arguably the PC's most popular game, have put a great deal of time and effort into its development. By and large, it's paid off – although, as we'll see, *Quake II* is very much a game of two halves.

Quake II injects a much-needed dose of big gun action into the first-person

shooter genre. Playing the game *GoldenEye*-style – tip-toeing through rooms and miserly conserving ammo – means neatly side-stepping all the fun. Instead, it's best to switch your brain off and storm into areas with all missiles blazing, and only half an idea of what horrors lie ahead. You'll be amply rewarded with a cacophony of screaming mutants, eye-blinding fireworks and ear-deafening explosions – it might not have *GoldenEye*'s subtlety, but it more than makes up for it with eye-gorging speed and adrenaline-pumping violence. And we mean violence. The accuracy of your shooting in *Quake II* isn't reflected in the position of a bloodstain on your

enemy's uniform. Oh, no. Strike into the heart of an enemy Strogg with a railgun shot and he will – quite literally – explode. And not in a disappointing, red-and-yellow way – *Quake II*'s bad guys are wrenched apart in an orgy of body parts and blood, with their strangulated screams giving way to a truly sickening squelching noise as chunks hit floor. It's stomach-

But once the novelty of the blood-letting wears off, the one-player game starts to pall. Graphically, it's a mixed bag. The polygonal monsters are detailed but jerky, and while some levels are impressive, the drabness of the walls and crates which make up most of the scenery is eye-numbing. It might be fast, and more colourful than the PC version, but it's galling to have to tread around dreary, identical-looking dungeons for hour upon hour. Interesting level designs – like the reddened torture chambers or the glistening ice world – are few and far between.

Meanwhile, despite the developer's best efforts to spice things up with a set of N64-specific mission objectives, the majority of your time is spent searching for switches and meeting one or two monsters at a time – the gameplay's pre-GoldenEye origins are plain to see. Quake II's little tricks become depressingly predictable – the tiresome 'enemy spontaneously generating behind you' prank is used time and again in a fruitless effort to fool you, and every set of stairs

in the game has a flying beastie lurking just above eye level, waiting to pounce.

Most of the real fun is concentrated into the early levels, where fast-but-vulnerable enemies and a lack of switches maximise the fast-paced, one-shot-to-kill thrills. By level five, you're being asked to pump multiple rockets into one hugely resilient baddie after another. It's still frantic, enjoyable shoot-'em-up fare, but the repetitiveness really starts to weigh you down. And by the last level, the game has resorted to an astonishingly misguided

So, that looks like the end of Quake II. It isn't. With three friends and a quartet of controllers, the game really comes alive. True, it doesn't quite match the excitement of the 20-player Internet-based deathmatches that PC owners have become accustomed to, but it comes surprisingly close. Certainly close enough

to make a monstrous computer and an upsetting phone bill a waste of anyone's money.

The multiplayer's greatness largely has the controls to thank. With the analogue, the view swings back and forth with elegance, while the degree of player movement with the C-buttons is tuned to perfection, allowing your man to pull off sweeping defensive arcs while keeping his sights firmly trained on the opposing player. Aiming fiends haven't got it all their own way, though, thanks to the

addition of a jump button, even super-accurate shots can be avoided, which

default pistol gives new players more of a fighting chance than GoldenEye's karate chop. And the levels couldn't be better, offering nerve-wracking corridor stalking one minute and sprawling open-plan mayhem the next – even if the darker arenas occasionally make it a tad tricky to see where you're going.

With all this, and a generous range of game modes to choose from – including tag tournaments and capture-the-flag games – Quake II has provided us with some of the biggest lunchtime laughs we've had in ages. Whether we're rebounding a grenade around a corner for a sneaky gibbing, narrowly avoiding someone's carefully-aimed rocket, or using the invisibility power-up to creep up on some unsuspecting fool, every deathmatch bout is sheer joy from start to finish. In fact – whisper it – it's probably even more enjoyable than four-player GoldenEye.

So, that's Quake II. A commendable, but by no means world-beating one-player game, accompanied by some of the best multiplayer death-matching on the N64. If you're growing tired of GoldenEye's tense, softly-softly sneaking thrills, Quake II offers the perfect remedy of adrenaline-pumping, ear-deafening carnage. Buy it, we say – but, if necessary, be sure to buy some friends first.

There's no hiding it, *F1 WGP 2* is that most dreaded of things – the console sports sequel. You'll know the drill by now: ice hockey sim *Pucks Up* is launched to critical acclaim, the current season comes to an end, a new one starts, *Pucks Up 2* is launched six months after the original with a new set of in-game statistics to bring it up to date. The price? Another £40 to you,

squire, thanks very much indeed. Done. And why not, you certainly have been. It's the tactic that keeps companies like Electronic Arts and Midway in business.

Does *F1 WGP 2* follow this unfortunate rule of thumb? Let's compare it to the original game in several key areas, and take a look at the effect of adding an expansion pak.

GROOVE IN

F1 WGP 2 clearly fancies itself in the simulation stakes. Most of the details of F1 are here – advertising hoardings in the right place, differing car shapes between teams, the roar of the crowd as you pass a grandstand – it's all very impressive.

And this attention to detail goes right down to the new tyre mouldings introduced in the 1998 season. The two deep grooves cut into each of the front and back tyres, reduce the grip of the cars and (so the plan went), limit their ever-increasing top speed. In practice, the rule change has just made all the cars far more difficult to drive – harder to handle under braking (essential for overtaking manoeuvres) and twitchy through corners.

It's fortunate, then that *F1 WGP 2* draws the line at simulating the effects of the grooves, keeping instead to the same kind of handling that appeared in the first game. As it was already one of the hardest driving games available on a console, this can only be seen as sensible decision.

The story of *F1 World Grand Prix* has always been a strange one. It arrived, seemingly out of nowhere, last September, the product of a partnership between Japan's Video System and America's Paradigm – the guys that created the technology for *Pilotwings 64*. There was no pre-release hype or build-up of any kind, it just arrived. And of course, the major surprise was just how brilliant it was.

Considering that at the time, it looked as if the N64 would never play host to a decent racing game, *F1*'s smooth, pop-up free graphics and astonishing attention to detail came as a bit of a bolt from the blue. Without doubt, it was the best F1 console game available anywhere. The only surprise was why it took so long to arrive.

And here we are again. Sort of. *F1 World Grand Prix 2* is the follow up and it's arrived barely nine months later. If only Rare could work to such a tight schedule, we'd have had our hands on *Perfect Dark* last October. However, it's this lack of

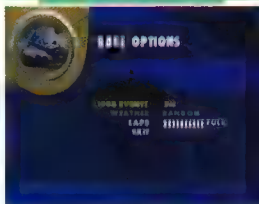
Realism has its limits when it comes to Nintendo, and in advance of the ban on tobacco advertising in F1, all cig-related propaganda has been expunged. TUNE IN TO BROADCAST MODE

F1 WGP 2's main addition to F1 WGP mix is Broadcast Mode – a main game option that sits beside Exhibition, Grand Prix, Challenge, Time Trial and Match Race. To be cynical, Broadcast is little more than an advanced replay option with the dubious bonus of not having to record a race before you use it.

The claim of the game is that if "1998 Events" is selected and the number of laps put up to full race distance, what the

game will show you will in effect be a replay of the 1998's actual F1 races. The selling point here is that you can watch the action from inside any of the participating cars or from any of the trackside cameras – the same way that Bernie Ecclestone's fledgling digital TV set-up is supposed to work. However, closer inspection shows Broadcast Mode to be a little bit of a cheat. Read on, as we explain things in more depth for you...



■ First of all, turn on 1998's events and rack the laps up to full race distance. Weather changes are optional.

■ Now select ■ Grand Prix. We've decided to take the final race of the Grand Prix year at Suzuka in Japan.



■ Remember what happened? Schumacher needed to finish ahead of Hakkinen to win

the championship. Sadly (ha!) starting from pole position, his car wouldn't go into gear and the rest of the field sped past him.



● What's this, though? In Broadcast Mode, Schumacher starts normally but then just goes backwards through the field.



■ By the end of the first lap, Schumie is in the same position he was back in 1998, but



the way he got there was radically different. Hardly a 'replaying' of the 1998 Grand Prix, now is it?

■ Another example for you. The Canadian Grand Prix always starts with a lovely pile-up and 1998 was no exception.



Now, let's see how Broadcast Mode remembers it, shall we...

■ Nope, nothing. No collisions. No flying debris. No euphemistic referrals to Jean Alesi entering the corner 'optimistically' as we see pictures of him walking back to the pits. Con.

The major change, and you know you're in trouble when you find yourself writing this, is that the teams and stats have been updated for the 1998 season. That's last year's season of course. Hill drives for Jordan, the Tyrrell team are still racing and no-one's yet heard of the British American Racing team. For the two major players – McClaren and Ferrari, the personnel are at least the same as the races we're enjoying on TV right now. However, in the fast-moving, contract-ripping world of F1, 1998's licence is hardly a massive selling point for a game

out in time for the British Grand Prix – the eighth race in the 1999 season. What else is new? It's a long search before you come across the 'Broadcast' mode and when you do find it – see the box at the top of the page – it's not an enormous thrill. You could say the original

game had every conceivable option already in place, and that wouldn't be stretching the point too much – F1 WGP had almost everything you could ask for in a racing sim, so you can almost appreciate the struggle that the programmers had when it came to making the sequel.

TEACH ME!

Okay, so the main event in Broadcast Mode might be a bit of a let-down, but tucked away elsewhere is a far more useful option called 'Tutorial'. This is something that F1 games have

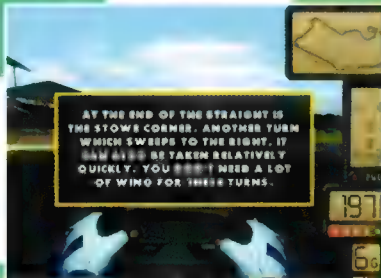
needed for ages and it's great for getting used to all the circuits you'll need to master to become a F1 champion. There's even handy little notices that appear to help you, read on...



Choose the track you want to learn about – your choice of car doesn't really make much difference here.



Before you go into each corner, a helpful notice will pop up explaining how to take the bend. Read it, press A and then watch how it should be done – correctly.



Every major corner has advice. It won't be enough for some (there's no gears or speed info), but it's a step in the right direction. Let's hope for a fuller version next time.

BRAKE DANCING

While F1 WGP 2 offers the same automatic braking and acceleration assistance in Rookie mode as the original, the addition of an optional braking light at the bottom right of the head-up display has added another dimension to learning how to drive like a pro. One of the hardest parts of F1 driving is knowing just when to apply the brakes before a corner, and this handy little light will pop on to indicate exactly the right moment for you to brake.



● The first straight at Monza. Near on 200mph and there's a left-right chicane coming up. Arrive here too fast and you'll just end up crashing into the gravel pit.



■ And there, just at the optimum braking point, the light in the bottom right-hand corner comes on to tell you to apply the brakes. Best adhere to what it tells you.

Except, except, except – we're being charged money for this. Which slightly grates. The original game is available for £30 on Players' Choice, so why should anyone buy F1 WGP 2 when the designers haven't provided a compelling reason to do so? Even a significant technical advance in frame rate or resolution would have been enough, especially now the N64 has the expansion pak at its disposal. Instead, playing the game with 8Mb of video RAM is an almost identical experience to playing it with the bog-standard 4Mb. It's slightly smoother and slightly quicker but nothing to consider exchanging £40 for.

And while all the menu screens have been tidied up, and the car set-up and telemetry screen improved over the surprisingly amateurish original version, you can't help but think that PC gamers get such upgrades released as free 'patches' for their games. Why should Video System think that they can get away with selling what is, essentially, the same product twice on the N64? Even the FIFA football games – favourites of video game recycling – offer their fans far more than this in each reincarnation that reaches the shop shelves.

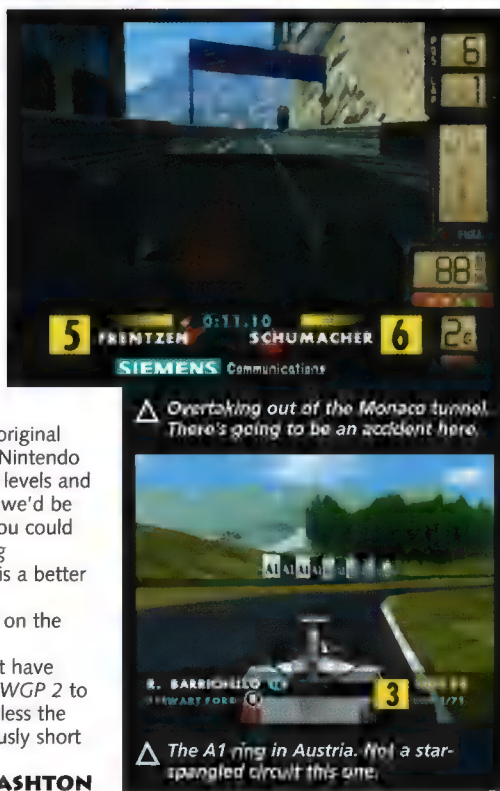
To add insult to injury, there weren't as many races in the 1998 season as there were in 1997, meaning that F1 WGP 2 actually has one track less in Grand Prix

mode than the original. It remains to be seen if there are any other secret codeable extras – there was one extra track in F1 WGP set in Hawaii – but it's not going to be enough to make F1 WGP 2 the outstanding prospect that its older brother was.

We're all big F1 fans at N64 Magazine and we can understand the fanaticism that Video System hope to tap into to sell this version of last year's game. It seems odd not to give, what is clearly the best F1 game on any system, anything less than the 93% the original achieved back in N64/20, but if Nintendo re-released Mario with the same levels and only some very minor tweaking, we'd be forced to do exactly the same. You could even argue that Ubi Soft's Racing Simulation: Monaco Grand Prix is a better buy, as it at least offers another programming team's perspective on the world's largest spectator sport.

With 1999 stats, it might just have been possible to recommend F1 WGP 2 to real hardcore F1 fans. As it is, unless the original game runs into mysteriously short supply, stick with that.

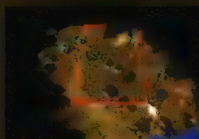

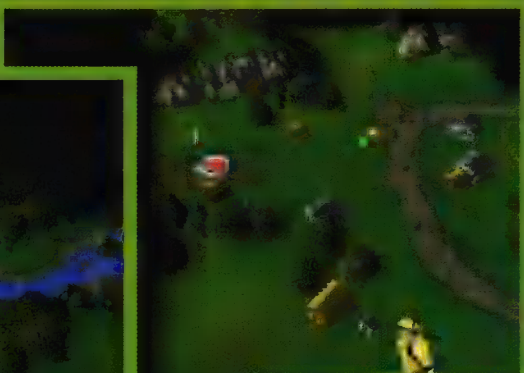

Of course, *Yoshi's Island*, like all of Nintendo's 2D platformers, is still fantastic, but with games like *Zelda* now doing the business, it's firmly found its place as a top bit of retrogaming.

So, imagine if it returned to the N64, with hardly any changes at all, and Nintendo charged you £40 for the pleasure of playing it. Ha! Yeah, as if. Et, except that's exactly what's happened with *Command & Conquer* on the N64. Barely four years after it appeared on the PC, we're finally getting this, a direct conversion of the original, with only a couple of N64-specific missions, and, well, not a lot else, if truth be told. So, whilst PC owners love C&C's three-part *Tiberian Sun* (and PlayStation owners can happily pick up sequel *Red Alert* for twenty quid), we've presumably got to be happy that we've finally got C&C.

Naturally, a good game never becomes a bad game simply because it doesn't look that cutting edge anymore. So, regardless of its age, C&C should still play a mean game. And it *killin'* does. Trouble is, it was designed to work with a mouse, and until you actually try to play the game with the analogue stick (which is, admittedly, better than the PlayStation's D-pad), you

abbreviate, using tanks, grenade launchers, air strikes and death; and crucially making use of Tiberium, the precious spice which, when mined, earns you oodles and oodles of cash.

You can take control of either one, but the objective of the game remains the same: to take your troops and whip the other side into

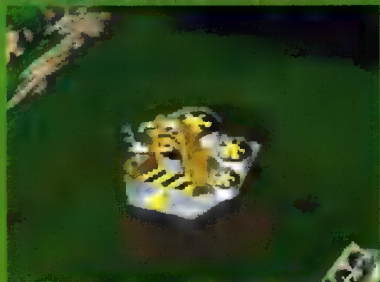

you have to drag and select your men. Explained in more depth in the "What a drag" column on page 76), and because a lot of the time different sections of your men are fighting different enemies, it's almost impossible to select just, say, three soldiers and send them somewhere else; with the PC's mouse it's simple,

it's definitely still engaging in spells, but because it's been cloned so many times since its original release – with the forthcoming N64 StarCraft only one example – you're just left expecting more than you actually get given.

But, even given that, there's just an underlying feeling that this first N64 C&C is a tad lazy. If Raster can spend the time rebuilding *Quake II* from the ground up (see page 66), then C&C developers, Looking Glass, could certainly have done the same. And why, when the N64 is currently responsible for some of the most innovative, eye-gorgingly amazing games the world has ever seen, should we have to put up a four-year-old PC conversion?

Still good, then, but not good enough.

Star Wars Episode I and *Zelda* would be like without the addition of silky smooth movement, the analogue stick does nothing more than replicate C&C. 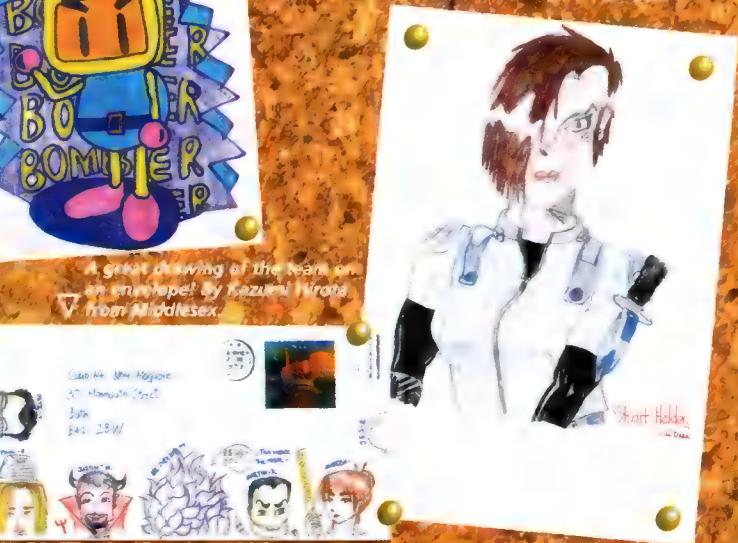

GALACTIC POD RACING CIRCUIT

Executioner

The usual zero-gravity action awaits you on Oovo IV. The floating chunks of ore that are being transported through the tunnels will prove to be hazardous, but, with a little bit of practice, you'll soon learn their complex layout. You'll also need plenty of practice before attempting to take the shortcut at full speed, but it's invaluable for time-trialing.

1 As you go into the first tunnel, keep to the right-hand side to stay in front of the opposition. The bridge ahead is quite narrow and bends a little, so push Down on the analogue to help you scrape your engines against the sides.



2 Just around the corner lies a perilous situation for

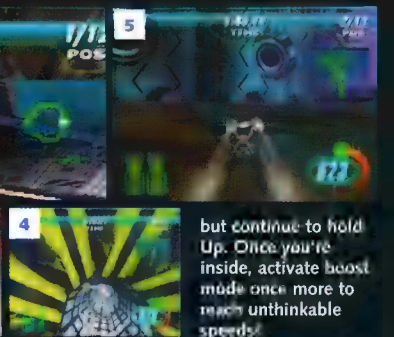


everyone: 12 podracers are all trying to squeeze through a tiny gap. If you line yourself up and refuse to be knocked aside you'll sail through with ease!



3 There's a shortcut at the end of the next tunnel that cuts out one of the trickiest parts of the track. While you're racing inside the tunnel stay on the left then, just as you're exiting and about to enter the next one, push Left on the analogue. You'll dodge out and into a secret passage a little further on.

4 Disengage boost mode before you enter the zero-gravity tunnel (you'll crash into the roof if you don't).



5 Boost across the open area and get your craft into position for the rotating door in the distance. Don't worry about smashing into the wall – you'll make it through intact. As for the four tunnels afterwards, take the third one on the right as it sets you up perfectly for the zero-gravity section on the other side.

6 Hug the last bend as you approach the finish to avoid dropping a place or two as you cross the line.

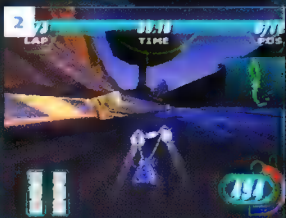
Sebulba's Legacy

This course is fairly short but that doesn't necessarily mean it's easy. There are a few very difficult corners that you need to prepare for, and it's advisable to use Z to skid around them. Don't be surprised if Sebulba leads the race – rumours are that he designed this track himself!



1 Make sure you're ahead of everyone else as you reach the first bend because you'll need some space to skid around it. You'll need your boosters to cross over the water at high speed; use the bright lights to guide you back onto the track.

2 Look around here for a path on the left that leads up a hill. This is the easiest route through this part of the course, but you'll have to use the hand steering method to stop yourself from crashing into the sides. And don't think you'll be the only driver taking this route either!



3 Soon after this shortcut, there's a hole in one of the mountains on the right which allows you to avoid the tight corners around the other side. You'll have to be quick to turn into it, though. This is also the preferred route for the CPU craft.



so use short boosts to stay in front of them.

4 When you see the tall rock jutting out of the ground, push hard Left to get yourself around the corner. Set on the swamp planet of Baroonda, Grabvine Gateway is surely a track designed by the devil himself, with narrow turns, overgrown paths and a deadly swamp section that can take you from first to last in no time at all. Thankfully, though, there are some good stretches that you can boost along.



1 When you reach the pillars, get to one side of them and briefly boost. This will give you an extra bit of space ahead of the rest of the pack, and on this course you'll need all the space you can get – believe us!

2 As soon as you leave the city there's a hard turn so push Down and stay close to



the stone wall. If you're having difficulty with this, it's time to upgrade your craft's handling, as things only get worse from here onwards.

3 The sand dunes are extremely tricky to get through without losing your lead. The key is to slam on the airbrakes and really turn into the corner, then accelerate on to the next one. There's not an awful lot of room for skidding and you often come off worse if you hit the side of the track. So be careful.



4 The overgrown jungle area will have you swearing. Tim-style, time and time again. Try to

stick to the beaten track as you speed along, and when you reach the devilishly-difficult 'S' bend (the bit where you can't see anything for the vines and long grass obscuring the view) slow down, turn Right into the bend, and then use the map to guide you safely through. Your opponents will, naturally, zip past you and into the swamp.

5 This part of the course is even harder than the last, but you

can, with lots of practice, get through it. It's extremely important to press Z while pushing Down to point your

podracer in the right direction. Also, brake hard for the narrower turns otherwise you'll crash and lose your valuable position.

6 Now's your chance to regain first place! Boost across the bridges, keeping to the right, and continue to use short bursts along the straights to overtake the leading podracer. Lovely stuff.

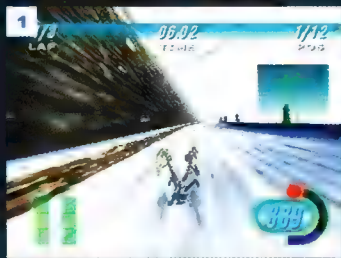

Andobi Mountain Run

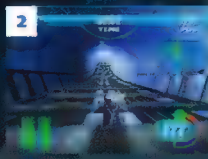
Yet another token ice level, but the only one to feature such a large outdoor area. There are plenty of alternative routes for you to choose from, but we believe that our way is the fastest of them all (providing you don't continually crash, of course).



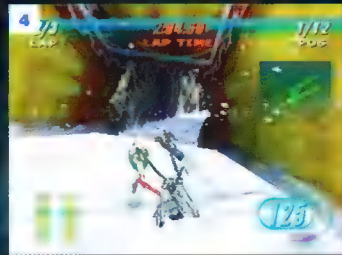
1 After the statue at the beginning of the race, you can boost for quite a distance before the track branches off

inside the cave. Stay on the right, but beware of the indestructible chunk of ice in the middle of the next cave because it'll take out your engines.

2 Race across the wooden bridge to get outside and skid around the 90 degree corner before boosting up the hill. Hold Down to shoot through the air and onto the ice across the other side of the large ravine (this looks dead flash when overtaking a friend in two-player mode).



3 The bridge inside the underground tunnel splits in places so keep to either side to avoid smashing into the junction. At the other end is vast open terrain, but rather than follow the usual route, use the map to locate an alternative path that leads to a canyon. This means you



avoid a chunk of the track, although many other racers will also use this passage too. Cut your engines as you go around the corners to save on repairs later.

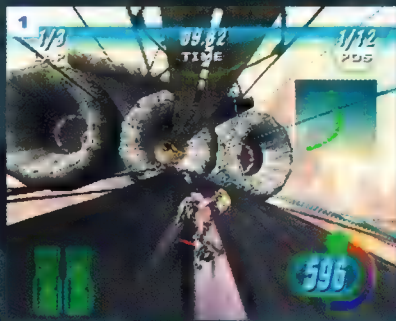
4 The tent to the left of the statue will be open for the remaining laps, so you can use the secret route behind it. This will almost always guarantee you first place and a big pile of nuggets.

Dethro's Revenge

Like all the courses set on Ord Ibanna, Dethro's Revenge is extremely fast, resulting in high speed races across the floating platforms that hold the gigantic Tibanna gas containers. What doesn't help is the way the track often narrows, proving dangerous for any craft boosting through it.

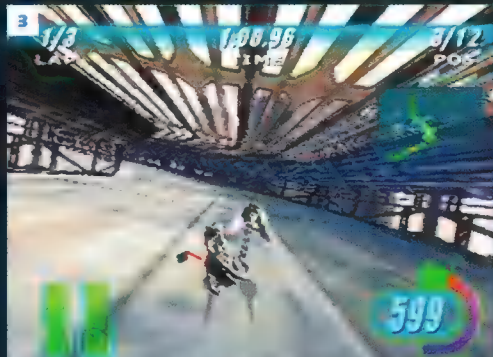


1 If you manage to stay on the top route, remember to push Down as you cross the gaps in the track to avoid dropping down.

Should you fall off there's no need to restart as there's hardly any difference between the two paths.

2 Don't boost into the low passageway as you'll smash right into the wall instead, disengage your boosters and hold Up to dip sharply, then accelerate as soon as you touch down.

3 The bends up ahead may seem easy, what with the track being as wide as it is, but they're most certainly not. Make sure you turn early and use the airbrakes to get around them smoothly. Skid around the last one (with the black



and yellow design) and boost up the ramp. Hold Up to land early on the next platform to provide yourself with sufficient space for speeding up the next ramp. Push Down to stay in the air for longer.

Fire Mountain Rally

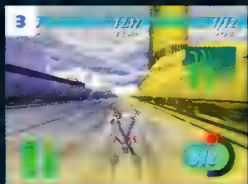
One of the great features this stage has to offer is the giant plane flying overhead; it's well worth slowing down to watch. Just remember not to take your foot off the gas to examine the lava inside the volcano - unless you want to push your pit droids exceptionally hard, that is!



1 You always know you're in for a tough race when the first corner proves troublesome. Steer around it while pushing Down, but don't use Z to slide - it won't do you any good.

2 Use short bursts of speed afterwards, and release A whenever you go around corners. Hold Down to drive through the waterfall and land on the other side of the hole safely. Reduce your speed around the next part and then keep the throttle open.

3 Just before you reach the volcano you've got to navigate some very awkward twists and turns along a part of track that wouldn't look out of place in V-Rally. The best advice we can give is to apply your airbrakes and skid around the bend, then accelerate to the next one. Also, hold Up as you go over the fallen trees so you land quicker and can prepare for the next turn. Don't worry if you drop a place or two here as there's ample



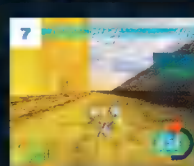
opportunity to get back in first place before the end of the race.

4 Boost down the long straight into the volcano and aim to stay above the lava at all times. The intense heat will cause your engines to catch fire and even explode if exposure is prolonged. Steer clear of the rocks as well, because even podracers travelling at fairly low speeds will be turned into scrap metal after a collision with one of these large stones.

5 Once you're outside, stick to the middle of the track as you go up the slope and into another of Baroonda's overgrown areas.

Fall into the lava, and you'll be forced to back up and try again!

6 The sand dunes require careful braking and skidding techniques to get through without suffering too much damage. When you see the stone pillar, go up the hill but keep to the left of the rock, then brake and skid while in mid-air to avoid crashing into the stone wall. Now boost along the bridge and enter the city.



7 From here to the finish use short bursts of speed to get ahead of your opponents and claim first place!

The Boonta Classic

This is a long race with danger lurking around every corner in the form of rocks, pits, flames and sandcrawlers. Follow our guide to get through in the quickest time and once you've achieved first place you can play as Sebulba - complete with his very own flamejet!

1 The first part of the track is relatively easy to boost along, but after the second big rock, drive onto the sand and look out for a narrow pathway that allows you to jump further on up the track ahead of your opponents.



2 There's a nasty 5' bend around the next corner so hit the brakes to skid, pushing Down to turn tighter into the corner. Head up the slope and over the ravine, taking care not to fall into one of the deep pits by the side of the track.



3 There are three paths to choose from here, but we favour the right-hand one as it's faster and easier than the others. Weave between the rocks, keeping to the right, then once you're on the straight road you can use this to pull away from everyone else. Although you'll have to keep re-engaging boost mode to compensate for the all bumps in the undulating track.

4 For the arches, keep to the extreme left and go easy on the accelerator for the long bend just afterwards. Head down the middle of the next set of arches to make it easily into the dark passage.

After the simple corner, boost along the short straight leading into the trench. Use short bursts of speed here, but watch out for the flames on the other side of the cave. They'll

cause your engine to burst into flames and hamper your steering. Go up either one of the slopes to avoid the flames below to keep your pod racer engines intact.



5 There's a sandcrawler taking a shortcut through the trench immediately afterwards, but by keeping to the sides you can avoid it with ease. Boost wherever you can and line yourself up for the

narrow gap at the end which leads to familiar territory. Engage boost mode and swerve to dodge the rocks littering the track, making sure no one pips you to the finish line.

INVITATIONAL POD RACING CIRCUIT

Ando Prime Centrum

The multiple routes available to you here make racing through the city a great pleasure. But the most satisfying thing about Ando Prime Centrum is the last part of the course, where you can boost to your heart's content all the way to the finish line.

1 Take the right path in the ice cave but don't drive through the small passage leading back onto the left route. Instead, apply the brakes and turn to keep to the same path. You should find yourself further ahead than everyone else.

2 At the three-way junction with all the billboards, the fastest route is the one on the left, although it's pretty difficult to get into. The trick is to start braking and skid with Z so



you're facing in the right direction, although when to apply the airbrakes ultimately depends on which upgrades you've purchased.

the road below, drive across the bridges and into the narrow passageway that leads back onto the main track. This route is a lot faster, but the second bridge has no barriers so stay in the middle of it.



3 You'll soon emerge out on the rooftops, but instead of going down the slope to

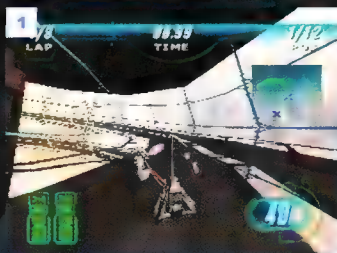

Abyss

Very fast, but also very irritating as slipping off the top route in the first part of the course always sets you back a long way. And due to the extreme speeds you'll be travelling at, the easiest of corners becomes potentially fatal. You have been warned.

1 It's essential that you stick to the top route through the first part of the



course and don't fall to the lane below. This alternative path has lots of tight turns and is also a lot longer. In fact it's sooooo much longer that even if you're miles out in front you can expect to be in at least fourth place by the time you

rejoin the rest of the group. To stay in the fast lane you have to slow right down and turn, making sure you speed up a bit for the short straights. Don't worry about your opponents overtaking



you – you'll catch them up fairly easily.

2 Boost until you get to the Tibanna gas containers, but brake sharply and go around the first one to your left. In the distance you can see the next part of the track leading off to a platform, by speeding towards it you will find yourself back with the race leaders.

3 If you're skilful enough to keep to the top lane, you can drive along the roof of the next tunnel to avoid the

difficult corners inside. The real bonus comes from steering your craft between the two flags and across the two small platforms onto the final part of the course!

4 Use your airbrakes to get around the corners and push your engines to the limit as you jump across the gaps to the finish line. Land early for the first one, but pull back for the second, keeping in a straight line to avoid crashing on another part of the course. If you can do this, you'll avoid having to do half the lap again.

The Gauntlet

Whenever said prison colonies couldn't be fun? At least you're given the chance to leave the complex and venture out onto the planet's surface. You'll find one of the game's simplest shortcuts here.



1 When you reach the outside, racing across the

planet's surface, feel free to cut across the corners, but be aware that your speed will drop the moment you leave the beaten track. Some corners will still prove a little difficult, so release the accelerator to glide around them. Just before the entrance that leads back into the complex there's a shortcut that proves to be very useful for slipping ahead of your rivals. Use the map to find it and activate boost mode to help you cross it quickly (but be careful, otherwise your engines will invariably overheat).

2 As you rejoin the track, keep your craft near the side wall to make things easy and engage your boosters until you get to the next bend. Go around the outside of the bend to keep from dropping into the trench

and boost through the tunnel afterwards, dodging the large rock in the middle.

3 Go around the outside of the next rock, but swing in early so you can drive down into the narrow passageway. Staying wide means you'll have to go around it again!

4 Boost through the zero gravity section, weaving between the many boulders that litter the tunnel, and use short bursts of speed until you reach the final bend. Stay close to the wall on the left as you come up to the finish line and no one will be able to get past you and your trusty pod racer.

Inferno

By coming first on Inferno you are awarded Ben Quadinaros' pod racer – a real beast with four engines to master. The volcanic ash makes it hard to see, but after a few attempts you'll instinctively know which route to take.

1 Keep to the centre of the track and boost through the arches into the next chamber. Steer left past the rock and

drive across the bridge, using your airbrakes to slow down for the long bend on the other side.

2 Stick to the left and nip through the gap to leave the volcano for a second. Once back you're back inside and have speed around the tricky corners, take the low path in the following chamber so you don't have to worry about the small rocks.

3 Leave the volcano once more and turn hard to get around the last bend. If you want to be daring and boost through the narrow crack to the finish line, straighten up as soon as possible and use one of the C-buttons

to tilt your pod racer on its side to make sure you get through. And there you have it, the last track of the Fantastic Star Wars Episode 1: Racer successfully completed!

We've taken a quick break at the Hotline from thrashing each other on *Quake II*, to bring you some top tips on Nintendo's fabulous, and long-awaited, **Players' Choice range**.

Back in April, Nintendo announced that they were dropping the price of five of their top-selling games to just £30 – that's half the price the games were when they first came out!

The games in the range are *Mario Kart*, *Lylat Wars*, *Snowboard Kids*, *Wave Race* and *F1 World Grand Prix* and for all those of you who've rushed out to get your hands on a copy as a result of the new budget-friendly price tag, here are some of the very best tips...



Players' Choice games

COMMON QUESTIONS

Q Please can you help me out on *Wave Race*? I've only just bought it from the Players' Choice range and I'm finding it just a little tricky. Have you any general tips?

A The best way to succeed in *Wave Race* is to practice. Use the Time Trial mode to learn the layout of the course, then race the computer when you're ready. Here are three top tips to guarantee better lap times:

1. Power boost

At the beginning of each race, the announcer will say, "Three, Two, One, Go!" As soon as the announcer says "Go!" press A. If you time it correctly, you can start with maximum power but this will take some practice.

2. Quick recoveries

If your rider falls off or loses his or her grip on the Jet Ski, quickly tap B for a speedy recovery. This will allow the rider to jump back up on the Jet Ski and continue racing.

3. Avoid jumps and take advantage of the shortcuts

Jumps slow down the speed of the Jet Ski, so avoid them where possible. Also, several courses have shortcuts. Watch the other racers, because they'll always take them.

Once you've figured out how to shave valuable seconds off your lap times you'll certainly be a real contender for some well deserved first place victories.

As for which mode to start with, well, Championship mode's your best bet. It begins with Sunny Beach,

which is full of slalom buoys. The course always takes place during the day, and it's a gentle introduction to the game, with easy straights and widely spaced buoys. Watch out for the hairpin bends at either end, though, as they can easily spell disaster! There is a small amount of leeway to be gained by clipping the beach at either end, so use this to your advantage when racing against the CPU controlled players.



Q I've just got hold of a copy of *F1 World Grand Prix* and it's absolutely fantastic. Any chance of a few cheats?

A *F1 WGP* has one bonus track and two bonus drivers and to access them it's simply a case of entering the the following: Go into exhibition mode, then select 'Driver Williams'. Now select 'edit name' and, using the analogue stick, change the last name to one of the codes listed below.

(Note: You must not use the D-pad as the code only works with the analogue.)

Hawaiian track: change last name to **VACATION**. Silver Driver: change last name to **CHROMED** (only works on UK version).

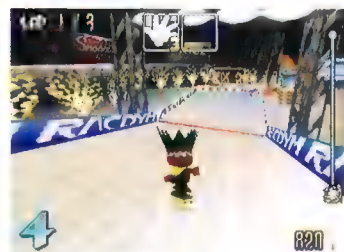
Gold Driver: Change last name to **PYRITES** (only works on UK version).

Q My friend and I have been playing *Snowboard Kids*. Have you got any cheats?

A There's one excellent, but tricky, code that enables the hidden character, Sinobin, new Sinobin snowboards, and all of the courses including Dizzy Land, Quicksand Valley, Silver Mountain and Ninja Land.

On the title screen, quickly press the following: Down, Up on the analogue, Down, Up on the D-pad, Bottom-C, Top-C, L, R, Z, Left on the D-pad, Right-C, Up on the analogue, B, Right on the D-pad, Left-C, Start.

If the code's entered correctly, you'll hear a voice say 'yeah!' It's difficult, but well worth it.



Q Would you happen to have any hidden secrets for *Lylat Wars*? I'm stuck.

A You can re-fill your life to maximum anytime during the battle on Sector Z by flying into the docking bay at the back of Great Fox (above the engines). You'll instantly get all your life back and end up coming out of the front of the ship.

class fighter appear. They actually fight back, so it's a true battle simulation.

If you shoot down a certain number of enemies in a stage, and all of your characters are alive at the end, you'll get a medal. If you get a medal on Venom, you'll get to use the Landmaster Tank in the Vs Mode. If you get medals on every stage, you'll be able to play on Expert Mode!

If you manage to get medals on every stage in Expert Mode you get to play as the Star Wolf team, on foot, with rocket launchers in Vs Mode. Nicely.

I've got some questions on *Mario Kart 64*:

1. Who's the best racer?
2. Is there any reason I should beat 50cc or 100cc? Why not go straight to 150cc to get the 'Extra' option?

A 1. The racer you should use really depends on how skilled you are and it's best to practice with all of them to find the one who suits your skills and style. Beginners will usually be better off with Mario or Luigi. More advanced racers should use either Toad, Yoshi or Wario and if speed is your game, take Princess Peach.

2. You should beat the 50cc and 100cc challenge levels to get really good at the courses so you have a chance at winning the 150cc level. You don't need to, but it's a good idea. Honestly.



Q Have you got any cheats, codes or advice on *Mario Kart 64*?

A **Mirror Tracks**
If you complete the 150cc cups and get a first place each time you'll be rewarded with reverse tracks. These are mirrored versions of all the cups available. When the extra tracks are available for selection, the title screen will change, and the characters will face the opposite way.

Ghosts

On three courses of the game, there are special 'ghosts'. If you manage to beat set times on these courses the ghosts will challenge you to beat them. The courses and rough approximates of the times you need to beat are listed below. In all cases, the 'powerslide' technique is vital. The times needed on the Ghost course are:

Mario Raceway:	1'46"00
Luigi Raceway:	2'12"00
Royal Circuit:	3'10"00

Powersliding

Powersliding is essential if you want to gain truly exceptional times. When preparing to turn into a corner, hold R to begin sliding. When the cloud of smoke begins to emanate from your kart, quickly hold the analogue stick in the opposite direction from the way you are turning, then pull back in the direction of the bend. This should turn the smoke yellow. By repeating this technique, the smoke will turn red, after which, releasing R will give your kart that extra kick of speed as you come out of the bend.

Roll The Credits

Most people have one reaction when the credits begin to roll on their favourite TV programme: flick to another channel. It's the same for games – the spangly end sequence might be attention-grabbing, but no-one takes the slightest notice of the rota of words scrolling in front of it. It'd be like reading the telephone directory for pleasure.

But it's a shame those end credits are ignored, because they're often a glittering treasure trove of gaming's best-kept secrets. By uncovering teams

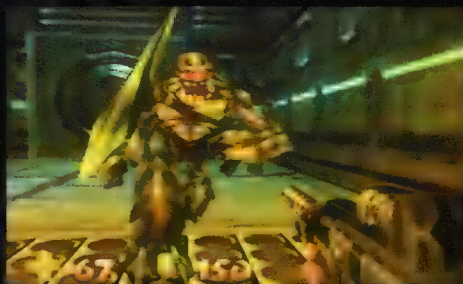
like Rare and Nintendo as the seething mass of individuals they actually are, a whole host of interesting facts are revealed. If you want to know who the eminent Mr Miyamoto turns to time and again to bring his visions to life, or find out the guilty past of today's best developers, the credits will invariably spill the beans.

Of course, you could spend months re-completing old games in order to reach the credits, so let **N64** do the hard work for you. Here's our big guide to those big lists.

MAIN PROGRAMMING

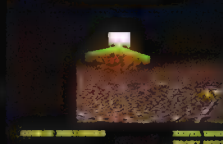
Right at the very top of the credits you'll find the people who, between them, create the real guts of a game. They know how to coax the best from the N64, so they'll show their faces in a wide variety of titles – Nintendo's Shigeru Miyamoto brought together the talents of *Mario 64* programmer Toshio Iwawaki and *Lyfard Wars* developer Takamitsu Kuzuhara to help make *Zelda 64* a reality.

Although game sequels are often vast improvements on the originals, the programming teams are usually made to exactly the same recipe as the prequel. *Turok 2*'s gorgeous dinosaur-hunting mayhem and *Turok 1*'s slightly-less-gorgeous equivalent were both the product of Bob Cohen and his merry band, while *Extreme G* and *XG2* were designed by Ashley Bennett. Surprisingly, even flat, feeble *Quake* shared its lead programmer, Aaron Seeler, with the much-improved *Quake II*.

LEVEL DESIGN



Scan the credits and you'll find them choc-a-block with level designers, whose job it is to conjure up a game's maps, tracks and dungeons. The bigger the game, the

more level designers you can expect; *Star Wars Episode 1: Racer* and *V-Rally '99* boasted seven course designers, *Wipeout 64* required one designer for each track, while *Glover's* more complicated 3D worlds needed eight level editors to put them together.

Mr Miyamoto only trusts a few individuals to wield Nintendo's level editing wand. Makoto Miyanage designed the stages for *Mario 64*, *Mario Kart* and *Zelda*, meaning that Tick-Tock Clock, Koopa Troopa Beach and Ganon's Castle were all products of the same feverish mind. Meanwhile, Yoichi Yamada's level designs for *Mario 64* so impressed Shigsy that he was given the imposing task of designing *Zelda 64*'s entire game engine, and Naoki Mori – also a *Mario 64* and *Mario Kart* level designer – went on to conjure up *Zelda*'s epic cut scenes.

3D MODELLERS

Scrolling up the screen here are the developers who mould lumps of virtual plasticine into 3D worlds, and the characters that leap around inside them. This is one of the few areas where credit is often given to individuals who don't work within the company that actually produced the game – largely thanks to Nintendo's habit of dragging old characters from their graves, dusting them down, and using them in their new games.

So, Rare's David Wise, who designed the 3D model for the new-look *Donkey Kong*, is tucked away in the end credits of both *Mario Kart 64* and *Mario Party*, thanks to the lolloping ape's appearance in both. DK also crops up in *Smash Bros*, along with namechecks for Shigeru Miyamoto (designer of *Metroid*) and Game Freak



(inventor of Pikachu, everyone's favourite Pocket Monster).

We've got these boys to thank for such delights as *GoldenEye*, *Banjo-Kazooie* and *Diddy Kong Racing*.



David Dienstbier

The Creative Director at Iguana is responsible for dragging Acclaim out of the gutter with blockbusters like *Turok*, *Turok 2* and *South Park*. He's got an understanding of the hardware that's equalled only by Rare and Nintendo themselves, and has helped to provide some much-needed gore on the N64.



Minoru Arakawa

A regular at Nintendo since they first entered the games business, the mysterious Mr Arakawa works as an advisor to the bigger Nintendo developers, including Rare, Acclaim and Factor 5. Rare, especially, always thank him in their game's closing credits, as it's his advice and assistance that helps make that special Twycross magic so very sparkly.

3D ANIMATORS

Coming just under 3D Modellers in the developers' pecking order are the animators, whose task it is to give life to static 3D models, making them run, jump, roll or slide. Interestingly, *Zelda 64*'s credits reveal that Link's movements were based on Yoshinari Tsujimoto from the Japan Action Club – a martial arts school which has provided stuntmen for countless movies and launched several film careers.

As well as utilising the JAC's talents, Miyamoto chose Yoshiaki Koizumi and Yoshiki Haruhisa to

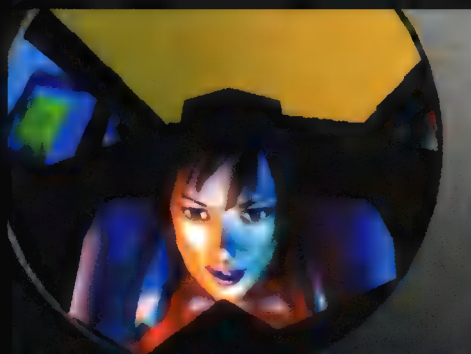

animate *Zelda*'s characters – they'd previously breathed life into the cartoony stars of *Mario 64* and *Lylat Wars*.

Both *Zelda* and *Mario* featured their own dedicated 'camera programmers' – which could explain why they're the only two N64 games where the camera isn't toe-curlingly inadequate. Miyamoto must have been particularly enamoured of *Mario 64*'s near-perfect camera – Takumi Kawagoe, the man responsible for Lakitu's movement, went on to create the sweeping pans and zooms of *Zelda*'s majestic cut scenes.

CHARACTER DESIGN

Before the 3D models can be built or animated, someone needs to put pencil to paper and sketch a rough idea of what they should look like. John Taylor took the bike design honours in *Extreme G*, but by XG2 it had become an outside job – two bikes were designed by competition winners Daniel Hoppe and Bill Porter. And, talking of XG2's design, Matt Cooling is to blame for the disturbing gremlin lady in the game's intro. Odd that we haven't heard from him since...

If we've read the credits right, Kevin Bayliss was responsible for Timber the Tiger's disturbingly large eyes in *Diddy Kong Racing*, yet a quick glance at his character designs in the earlier *Killer Instinct Gold* doesn't hint at his burgeoning love of massive peepers. Meanwhile, over at Nintendo, a job on

Mario 64 was again a ticket to even greater things – Satoru Takizawa began by animating everyone's favourite plumber in *Mario 64*, then designed the graphics in *Lylat Wars*, before going on to help put Link's elfin form together in *Zelda 64*.



TEXTURE ARTISTS

A quick shuffle at the credits of most games shows that the term 'Texture Artist' is falling out of fashion – the task of creating 'skin' to wrap around colourless buildings, bodies and faces is now part of the general artist's job description. Still, *Glover* seems to defy the trend – a staggering nine people spent their days painting the textures that make up the glove's colourful world.

Interestingly, the man responsible for Mario's chubby face in *Super Mario 64* was Giles Goddard – the only non-Japanese programmer at Nintendo, and one of the main brains behind *1080°*

Snowboarding. And, while we're on the subject of the team behind *1080°*, it's worth glancing way back at *N64/2*, where we noticed that the tunnel in *Wave Race*'s Port Blue course shared a wall texture with the basement in *Super Mario 64* – could that be Mr Goddard cutting corners?

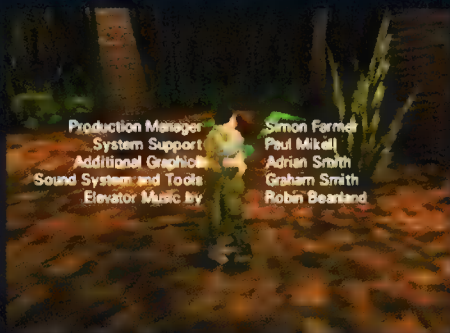


MUSIC AND CREDITS

Zelda 64 was one of the first games to tick its musician near the top of the credits list, and rightfully so – try turning the volume down on *Zelda* or *Quake II* and see how much fun you have. Koji Kondo is arguably the best-known musician – you'll find his name in the credits of *Mario 64*, *Zelda*, *Starfox 64*, as well as most of the older *Mario* games.

In fact, most development teams re-use the same sound artists, as it saves them the job of repeatedly explaining what kind of music they're looking for – Acclaim's Darren Mitchell pops up as the musician for *Turok*, *Turok 2* and *South Park*, and Hideaki Shimizu has bashed out the sound effects for most of Nintendo's biggies.

It's obvious from credit scanning that professional musicians are becoming more popular. *V-Rally* credits music outfit 'Rhapsody', *Vigilante 8* uses 'StrayLight', and *Wipeout* is full of established bands like Fluke and The Propellerheads. It's not all fame and fortune, though – Robin Beanland was responsible for *Killer Instinct Gold*'s music and sound effects, but, come *GoldenEye*, only managed to squeeze his cheesy elevator music into the game.

VOICE ARTISTS

Sitting in front of a microphone, reading from a script and yelling phrases like "It's-a me, Mario!", are the voice artists. In fact, it's the tones of Mr Charles Martinet that you hear every time Mario opens his mouth – he's roped in whenever the portly plumber needs to speak. Similarly, Leslie Swan is always Peach – although she turned up as 'Screen Text Writer' in the original *Mario*, suggesting she got the voice job simply by being in the right place at the right time.

David Dienstbier obviously couldn't keep his mouth shut as *Turok 2*'s main programmer, as he also crops up as the voice of Oblivion. Meanwhile, it's a family affair at Rare, where K and S Stamper supplied the children's singing and chuckling in *Diddy Kong Racing* (they're likely to be the kids of head honchos Chris and Tim Stamper). For *Wipeout 64*, an old-skool Commodore Amiga 1200 with built-in speech synthesis ability spat out the game's robotic voices.

PRODUCT TESTING

This is the name for the kids who sit around playing the games to make sure they work. Again, developers often take an early version home to their families – Stephen Stamper, a relation of the Stamper brothers, tested *GoldenEye* for his folks.

This is the place where you'll see 'Super Mario Club' crop up time and again – that's Nintendo's huge in-house team of testers. But quantity of testers isn't necessarily quality – the woeful *Gex 3D* had 17 people who didn't notice the sheer rubbishness of the game they were playing.

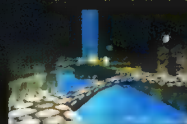
Keep an eye out, too, for Technical Assistants, the folk who know the N64 inside out and stick their ear in when the main coders hit rocky waters. SCI took this role for early games like *Mario 64*, then passed the baton to Takao Sawana. He helped iron out problems for *Mario Kart 64*'s programmers. Elsewhere, *Lylat Wars*' technical brilliance called on the expertise of an astonishing 12 Technical Assistants.

Pilotwings

Pilotwings was the first game I ever reviewed for N64, two-and-a-half years ago. Sitting amongst boxes full of office kit, scattered bits of paper with magazine ideas scribbled on them, and discarded



memory cards, playing it provided some unlikely peace amid the chaos of an office move. Thirty months on, and it's still exceptional.

It's hard to explain exactly how Pilotwings can possibly be good, though. When you tell someone it's got hang-gliding in it, the reaction tends to be less a frenzied nod of agreement and more a wide-eyed look of disbelief and fear. Plainly, anyone who can eek out anything approaching enjoyment from jumping around a cityscape in springy boots must be a bit, you know, odd. But, play Pilotwings just

once, and you'll immediately begin to understand.

Created in conjunction with American flight specialists Paradigm (who, among other things, put together training programmes for the US Air Force), Pilotwings 64 was a stunner to look at. Four 'maps', each effectively a world in its own right, and each full of gorgeous scenery (still very, very impressive, even as we look back with misty eyes). Add secret coves, canny sub-levels and brilliantly original touches like the shambling metal man who you had to take down in your gyrocopter, and you had a game that defied description, but which kept you constantly enthralled.

There was no real plot to speak of (well, there was no plot at all), and you weren't even required to do anything in any particular order. But, like its SNES predecessor, Pilotwings was more of a competition, based around your abilities to garner licences, with set objectives and the individual characteristics of your vehicle

being the only things that stood between you and gold medals across the board. Nintendo being Nintendo, though, ensured Paradigm's stunning achievements didn't turn out to be just a flight sim.

Typically wonderful Nintendo moments were sprinkled liberally: swooping through a miniature Central Park; changing Mario's Mount Rushmore-carved face into arch-rival Wario; burning your behind on the smoke from the factories on Everfrost Island; guessing the right trajectory using the fabulous human cannonball; the



mysterious relaxation of just being the Birdman; and, most of all, the wonderful, never-ever-matched feeling of flight – made even more sublime by the analogue stick.

Because so few people actually bought Pilotwings, those who did tend to feel like they're part of a club, still worshipping it even now. Those who didn't fancy it, can only look on and wonder why. But, give it a chance and you'll realise there's no inside joke, just a majestic N64 game.

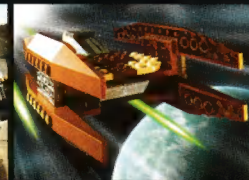
