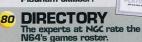

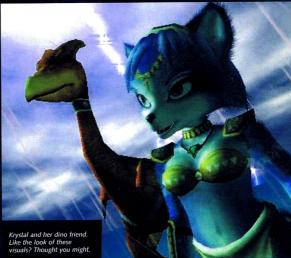
fter the initial massive influx of new media for Starfox Adventures last summer, things have died down a little. Still, this latest batch of new shots and info is enough to convince us that Rare are continuing their good work on a title that already looks

absolutely top-notch.

The first piece of info to grab our attention was the fact that, contrary to what we previously thought, Starfox Adventures doesn't take place on multiple planets. Instead, Dinosaur Planet has been torn to pieces by the invading General Scales. Using the power of things called SpellStones, Scales rips the planet apart, sending small pieces into orbit around the main planet. Using his Arwing, Fox can travel to each individual section. Quite what these SpellStones are is anyone's guess, but we're keeping our fingers crossed that Rare won't plump for the clichéd 'all-powerfulartefacts-that-must-be-retrieved-atall-costs' storyline.

Anyway, if Rare put as much effort into the plot and characters as they have into the crisp, jawdropping visuals then we have nothing to worry about. With each and every sneak peek we get at Starfox, the excitement builds. Whether it's the stunning real-time weather system – with clouds casting shadows on the grassy plains – or the beautiful water effects on the streams, it's all too clear that Rare are lavishing particular attention on the visual side of things. The massive temples, in particular, are a real sight to behold, giving some indication of the size of Fox's new adventure.

Those who are a little miffed at the idea of Nintendo's new 'short-'n'-sweet' strategy should do well to remember that it need not necessarily include the masters at Rare. In the meantime, check out these new pics. NGC

April? May? September?

ollowing a month of fevered speculation, gossip and wild guessing, Gamecube's European release date has been nailed down as sometime in April or May – although rumours inevitably persist that September or even Christmas could prove a more likely date.

The April/May date comes from a

Nintendo spokesperson, who told the Reuters news agency that final details of the launch would be revealed in January – possibly even by the time you read this. Two separate Nintendo Europe press releases had reasserted the 'Spring 2002' promise a week earlier.

European gamers had knotted their brows earlier as Nintendo magically discovered an extra 520,000 Gamecubes for an unspecified market – machines that were widely rumoured to have been originally allocated for Europe. In the same week, a Japanese website claimed that only

300,000 Gamecubes are being

prepared for the European launch. If these figures are accurate, it means that even the biggest of Europe's 40-odd countries can expect a maximum of just 50,000 Gamecubes on launch day.

However, Shelly Friend, Nintendo of Europe's head of PR, claims such numbers have merely been plucked out of thin air. "We haven't announced a thing about European numbers. As far as I can see, people are just taking all the rumours and doing some backward maths to come up with these figures."

Number crunching

Shelly also denied that the extra 520,000 Gamecubes were siphoned from Europe's stockpile for US or Japanese use. "Nintendo have obtained these new machines simply by increasing production in their Japanese factories, and we haven't revealed whether they're going to America, Japan or Europe. That decision will be based on sales over Christmas. Anyone who thinks the announcement of these extra Gamecubes means a delay for the UK is simply putting two and two together to make 20."

Indeed, a limited number of European launch machines contradicts what Shelly told NGC in November, that Nintendo "have to launch with enough Gamecubes for everyone." But industry sources claim that with Microsoft's Xbox launching here in March, and Star Wars: Episode II and the World Cup liable to be hogging everyone's attention in summer, Nintendo have only a small launch window for Gamecube if they want to bring it to UK shops before autumn.

Interestingly, the home shopping company Grattan features the Gamecube in their Spring/Summer 2002 catalogue as being available only after 1st April – suggesting Nintendo have already briefed retailers not to expect a March release. NCC rang Grattan's customer helpline and had the date reconfirmed, but was told that "it doesn't mean that Gamecube is actually out on that date."

Spin the console

According to Shelly, Nintendo are "continuing to decide on an exact date for Europe." At the time of writing, she confirmed that an official announcement is likely in January."

Meanwhile, in the US, Nintendo and Microsoft are engaged in a fierce war of spin that's made judging Gamecube's performance there increasingly difficult. According to Nintendo, the console is the fastest-selling of the last two years, with 800,000 machines bought by mid-December, and 100,000 new Gamecubes being shipped to stores every week to satisfy demand. Luigi's Mansion was claimed to be

the fastestselling launch title of any console ever – and that was just before Super Smash Bros Melee went and sold a brain-bending 250,000 copies in a mere nine days.

In Japan, too, Gamecube is performing well – as expected, Super Smash Bros Melee helped send sales of the machine soaring, with 130,000 Gamecubes (now available in funky orange and black in the Far East) shifted in the week following the launch of the hugely anticipated beat-'em-up. Penasonic's Gamecube-DVD hybrid, Q, was also well-received upon its 14th December

launch (see page 12). And regardless of Gamecube's continually shifting UK launch date, Game Boy Advance still proved to be one of the festive season's hottest toys, seeing off stiff challenges from the likes of Lego's Harry Potter Hogwarts Set, the Miracle Baby and Nutcracker Barbie to get crammed into thousands of stockings on Christmas Eve.



SHORT CUTS

PRESIDEN' PRECEDEN



Nintendo of Japan's stony-faced president Hiroshi Yamauchi has engaged in some ffling share transactions and made a profit of 20 billion yen (just over £100m), which will be used to set up a fund for new game ideas. Coders from anywhere in the world with ideas for Gamecube or GBA titles will receive a low-interest loan from the fund, in an effort to "revitalise the games industry. Looks like old Yamauchi's icy heart has finally melted.

PIKMIN PRIZE



Nintendo's bizarre Pikmin has bagged itself a gong at the Media Arts Festival in Japan, held every December by the Agency of Cultural Affairs. The garden-based RPG was awarded the **Excellence Prize for** Game Industry Interactive Digital Art. Other winners included Namco, whose animation 'Anjyu' bagged the Grand Prix in Non-Interactive Digital Art, and Sega, who won an Examination Committee Special Prize for the Gamecube-bound Phantasy Star Online v2. apanese electronics giant Matsushita – better known as Panasonic over here - have enjoyed a surprisingly successful launch of their eagerly-awaited DVD movie-playing Gamecube, or Q, on its Japanese releasé

The sleek silver machine, which costs ¥40,000 (£260 - just £100 more expensive than Nintendo's own Gamecube) plays all Japanese GC games and Region 2 DVD movies, pitting it directly against Sony's DVD-enabled PlayStation 2. Japanese stores reported high demand for the machine unexpectedly, queues formed outside Akihabara's most popular games stores on the morning of launch day.

"The furore here for Q was similar to when PlayStation 2 was launched," claimed a store assistant from Laox, the biggest and most popular games store in Akihabara, Tokyo's infamous 'electronics district'. "There were big queues for the machine,

with many people arriving before the store opened. We sold out of our initial indication of Qs within the first couple of hours, since when we've been receiving a steady flow of Q units - and as soon as we can get them in, they leave the store in the hands of a happy customer.'

Laox was one of the luckier stores, however. Interestingly, because the Laox chain sells electrical appliances such as televisions and DVD players, and therefore has a longstanding contract with companies such as Matsushita, the Akihabara branch was able to bag several hundred Q machines on launch day. Shops dedicated to videogames who lack a previous relationship with Matsushita - including the popular Tokiwamusen and Medialand shops in central Akihabara - were unable to get their mitts on any Qs whatsoever. Once that



situation is rectified, though - which is likely to be as soon as production of Q gathers pace - the brushed chrome console is all set to attract the kind of mature Japanese gamer who's so far been steering clear of Nintendo's standard-issue Gamecube. True to The Big N's plans, the majority of the Akihabara shop assistants we spoke to in December viewed Gamecube as a 'family appliance', which was ideal for children to play with their mum and dad. Q should give the more adult-focused PS2 and Xbox a real run for their money.

The hybrid console is not expected to be launched in the United States or Europe but even so, impatient American gamers have already 'modded' the Panasonic machine to play American Gamecube games (but not Region 1 DVDs). Stick around for next issue, where we'll have a hands-on test of the shiny Panasonic wonder. MG Special thanks to Allan Ang.



After committing to Gamecube with Soul Calibur 2 and Smashing Drive, Namco have revealed plans to bring Pac-Man World 2 to Nintendo's purple wonder machine early this year. Unlike its predecessor, Pac-Man World 2 will feature fully-3D worlds, Mario 64-style, each combining freeroaming areas with fenced-off mazes that maintain the original Pac-Man pill-gobbling theme. CONFUSION IN CAMP CAPCOM

re leading coders about to tch PS2 for Gamecube?

he rumour goes like this: Capcom are jumping the PS2 ship and are climbing aboard the SS Nintendo Naturally we're sceptical, but we're also firm believers in the old adage "where there's smoke there's fire"

Capcom have made no secret of their problems with the PlayStation2's architecture. In an interview, one of Capcom's programmers complained about the PS2's toolset libraries - programs that allow developers to tap into a console's processor. "With PS2, there is no library," he complained. "We need to create our own, which poses its own set of problems in that there are so many ways to achieve the same



effects." Two of Capcom's leading coders, Keiji 'Onimusha' Inafune and Shinii 'Resident Evil' Mikami, both reiterate these complaints about the machine, saying "PS2 is tougher [than Sega's Saturn], hands down". But while the Resident Evil franchise is definitely heading Cube-wards, both Onimusha and Devil May Cry have sequels confirmed for PS2, so it hardly sounds as though Capcom are ready to ditch Sony just yet.

This time it's personal

But as our source close to Capcom recently revealed, the root of the confusion may boil down to something a little more personal. Mikami has always found it difficult to convince Capcom executives to approve his ideas. Dino Crisis, Resident Evil and DMC all proved to be problematic despite eventually becoming some of Capcom's strongest titles. Meanwhile, Inafune has little problems with his own projects, with Onimusha allegedly

wooing Capcom bosses into throwing whalesuffocating amounts of cash at it without batting an eyelid.

Now, we're certainly not insinuating that Mikami is about to leave Capcom or anything like that. But we may well find that his focus will shift exclusively to Gamecube he has after all publicly proclaimed his love for the purple box. Either way, with rumours of a new controller for GC and the stillunder-wraps CAS RA waiting in the wings, future developments from Capcom should prove to be very interesting indeed. We'll keep you posted. GE

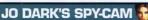

ort, conversion, translation — whatever you want to call them, the Gamecube is swimming in them. Dave Mirra BMX 2, Crazy Taxi, Batman: Vengeance and Tarzan Untamed are all games that were hatched, developed and brought to fruition on a rival console months ago, then transferred — with a few tweaks here and a couple of

minor changes there – to Nintendo's purple box.

Seeing Gamecube play host to quality games such as SSX and XG3 is great. But why did more than 50 per cent of Gamecube's US release day line-up consist of second-hand titles that PlayStation 2 owners have been savouring for ages? As always, it's partly about the cash. Even if sales of a

Gamecube port are relatively low, it can turn out *more* profitable for the publisher than the original version. Dollars, pounds and euros have already been thrown at research, development, advertising and packaging design for a long-in-development PlayStation 2 version; carrying the existing code over to the Gamecube is relatively cheap, and the reputation and marketing of

far more porting opportunities than either DC or PS2.

No give and take

But even taking that into account, there are still worryingly few games making the journey from a Nintendo console to another platform. Why? According to EA – responsible for ports of SSX, Cel Damage and so on – the decision about which machine will see a particular game first is a question of reaching the maximum number of punters.

"A perfect example is Harry Potter," a spokesperson told us. "The reason we'll release that on PlayStation first is because it's the console owned by the greatest number of Harry Potter fans." Similarly, an 'EA Big' title such as SSX Tricky finds its natural first home on the console perceived as 'cool' by the public – PlayStation 2 – while a majority of other publishers choose Sony first simply because it offers the largest installed user base.

Luckily, most games have a broader demographic – FIFA 2003, for example, is being developed on every platform simultaneously, because, hey, everyone loves football.

Of those games that aren't considered primarily 'Nintendo', it's frustrating when they do eventually arrive, far too late for comfort. Road Rash: Jailbreak, and Rogue Spear are all planned for mid-to-late 2002, years after first winging their way to other consoles. But this is likely to prove a

temporary phenomenon – as Louise Gabriel at Ubi Soft explains.

"Rogue Spear on Gamecube is a unique case," she says. "It's not a direct port of the old PC game, it's something new – we're just including it in the Rogue Spear 'brand'. But ports in the immediate future are a case of giving Gamecube owners something to play while we create new games. We

Acclaim's Product Development Manager, makes clear.

"At our Cheltenham studios, ports like Crazy Taxi are treated independently of secret new games," he says. "And knowledge gained is shared between the many sets of teams, so you end up with a pool of programmers who know each machine inside-out."

games won't ever knock on Gamecube's door – "only quality games that we're happy with would be considered for conversion to the Cube". But it's often the quality of the port itself that's the issue. EA's conversion of SSX *Tricky* (which arrived just a little too late for review this issue)

has slightly inferior visuals to the PlayStation 2 original – whether that's down to EA's inexperience in programming for Gamecube, or a rush to get the game on the shelves, it's something we won't stand for in future.

So for now, lap up the likes of Extreme G3, Crazy Taxi, and SSX Tricky – and remember, nothing

So, despite appearances, Gamecube isn't necessarily playing second fiddle to PS2 or Xbox. In the years ahead, plenty of games will be 'tested' on a Sony machine first before the go-ahead's been given for a Gamecube version – but, behind the scenes, as-yet-unannounced new titles with long gestation periods are already in the works for the Cube.

After all, ports might require the undivided attention of a single group of developers within a studio, but it's very rare for an entire development team to be devoted to them, as Jeremy Chubb,

regardless of financial issues - it's often down to experience and personal preference as to which console sees the freshest fruit of a developer's loins. Now that coders have a choice other than the pigto-program-for PS2, Gamecube's coder-friendly innards are winning it many fans. So while ports might be two-a-penny this early on, expect unique new Cube games to seemingly pop up from nowhere over the next couple of years.

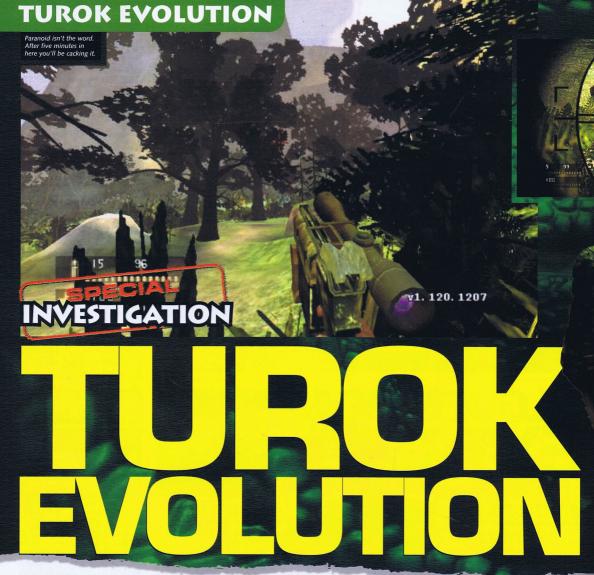

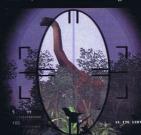

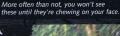

One of the most important elements in Turok Evolution is the way you can manipulate the environments around you. The developers have taken great pains to ensure the levels were as organic as possible - what this means is that everything around you can move and react to any activity that takes place within a particular space.

By creeping through bushes, players can keep themselves hidden from any enemies who roam the level - but on the other hand, any sudden movements are likely to give away your position by causing leaves to sway and rustle. This can also be used to a player's advantage. If you concentrate on the surrounding area, you may notice birds being disturbed by nearby raptors, or bushes being forced aside by hiding enemies. Whipping out your sniper scope to take a closer look can often reveal threats you wouldn't otherwise have noticed.

The Turok Evolution team are certainly eager to keep you on your toes. While you can approach the game's various scenarios any way you want, it's a good rule of thumb to refrain from wading in spraying precious ammo all over the shop. Making inventive use of shadows to creep up on enemies will be integral to this kind of strategy – as well as employing some of your more silent weaponry, such as the club and the bow.

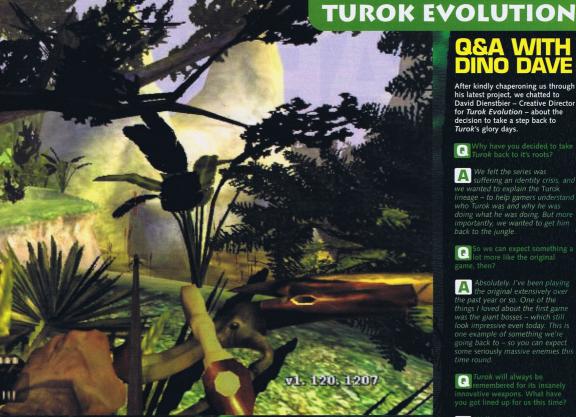

But, somehow, it does. And brilliantly so. Casual observers, staring at Smash Bros Melee over someone's shoulder, invariably moan that it all looks 'too confusing'. But thrust a joypad into their hands, and though their eyes might be bulging out of their sockets in an effort to keep up with everything that's happening on screen, and their fingers might be screaming in pain as they hammer at the buttons like engine pistons, they're likely to come away with the niggling feeling that this might just be the best fighting game they've ever played.

Why? Because it's sheer, undiluted, capillary-popping mayhem. During every second of every fight - and on the default setting, battles last just 120

seconds - you'll be treated to a giddying mix of punches, kicks, legsweeps, sword swipes, somersaults, gunshots, explosions, moving platforms, shifting scenery, and more. Moves are exchanged in the blink of an eve: items can be picked up, used, then thrown away in an instant; you can escape an attack and be taunting your foe from over the other side of the arena before anyone's realised what's happening... fights aren't totally out of control, but they feel as if they are, and the feeling of exhilaration you get from a two-minute Smash Bros Melee fight is hard to match.

It wouldn't be the same, of course, if it wasn't for Mario and his merry band of Nintendo cohorts. If Smash Bros had starred Nameless Spiky-Haired Japanese Guy 17 or Yet-Another-Generously-Busted-Lady-Fighter, this would just be a great game, not a

superb one. But having Nintendo's biggest names beating each other to a non-bloody pulp gives Smash Bros a character, and characters, all its own.

Mario triple-jumps and chucks fireballs; Yoshi sucks up opponents with his tongue and bleats just like he did in Yoshi's Story; Link whips out bombs, boomerangs, the hookshot and just about every other weapon from Zelda: Ocarina of Time - every character is so instantly recognisable, and almost bursting out of the screen courtesy of Nintendo's impeccable character design, that you'll become your chosen fighter. You'll forget your friends' names - it's all "Come here, Yoshi" and "Have that, McCloud" - and once you've broken in your favourite Smash Brother, woe betide anyone who thinks they can choose them, too...

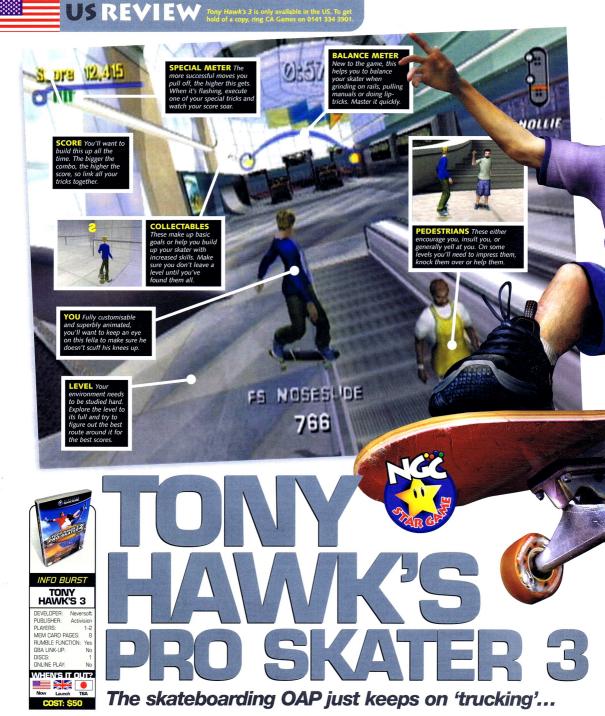

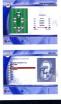

e've been here before. This isn't the first time a game based on the Disney film has appeared on a Nintendo console - that dubious honour is held by Activision's original Tarzan, which vine-swung on to the N64 in a flurry of brain-killing tedium and funmincing difficulty. It was a side-on platformer of half-hearted ambition and zero originality, but at least it looked pretty.

Ubi Soft's stab at making a game out of the apeman fares remarkably better. Graphically, it replicates the mossy greenness of the animated

jungle with pleasing accuracy. It's closer in spirit to the film than you'd believe - a testament to the power underneath Gamecube's purple bonnet - and it is, at times, a rather enjoyable little affair. Of course, it's rigidly linear, seeing you swing through the jungle collecting baby monkeys, film reels and other such random items - but what ultimately saves it from platforming obscurity is its speed.

Tarzan Untamed realises that the best way to maintain interest is to keep things moving - hence, you'll be sliding along immense tree branches, leaping from vine to vine, and even surfing through rapids on a plank of wood. There's no tedious backtracking, and no scratching your head over where to go next - this game is all about reactions, hammering the jump button and

But it's still fun to play, once you've put in the hours required to learn the course layouts, and its trick system has some cracking ideas. There are 70 basic stunts, which doesn't sound like much, but by hitting the X-button and a D-pad direction during any move, you can modify and link it to the next one, giving a massive range of twists, flips, stalls, grinds, or whatever. Despite being designed for the PS2 joypad, it feels like the Gamecube controller is its natural home.

Tricks of the trade

So if tricks are the essence of the game alone, then it might sound like Dave Mirra has the better of

THPS3. Sadly, the dodgy camera scuppers its chances of extreme sporting supremacy, at least until the next sequel arrives. It's all too easy to lose your biker behind a wall, or to wind up facing in an unexpected direction thanks to a camera that flies all over the place when, as often happens, it gets caught under a bridge or on a rail. You don't get the same sensation of vertigo that THPS3's aerials provide, and it's much harder to link a really smooth, flowing move over several objects, largely because the game's wide open spaces mean you've got to spend too much time balancing 'manuals' (the standard method of extending a combo over empty ground) and not enough actually doing new tricks.

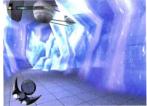

light then, let's get one thing straight. Batman: Vengeance really isn't anything special. In fact, chances are you've all played this countless times on a number of platforms before. It's basically your standard run, jump, punch, kick and flick switch affair - but then, that's exactly what we were expecting.

So it won't win any prizes for originality. But that's not to say it's all bad. For once, the developers have actually made a concerted effort to capture the

cartoon series. Rather than just bash out any old tripe, a great deal of attention has been paid to the movement and design of the characters, the simplistic, artdeco stylings of the architecture and environments that you play in and, more importantly, the story and voice-acting played out in the cut-scenes. Now, while the visuals should never really influence how you feel about a game, licensed titles are another thing entirely - it could be the best game in the world, but if the details aren't right that doesn't matter a scratch. Ubi Soft deserve a pat on the back here - it's all been done perfectly.

So, we've established that Batman is true to it's origins, but what's wrong with it? Well, gameplay-wise, it's uninspired stuff. It's simply a matter of

moving through the short-lived levels, leaping from building to building, flicking switches and dispatching identical goons before the inevitable boss encounter. It's pretty good fun for a while, but there are plenty of pointless niggles that will make you cringe. The camera mechanics, for example, are dire in places. One example of this is when you go through a door into the next area. Quite often, on entering a new room, the camera faces the caped crusader. which means you can't see what's in front of him - which, in most cases, is a team of goons firing at you. In order to remedy the situation you have to run to the centre of the room to get your bearings, by which point you've needlessly lost a third of your energy. Thankfully, the option to toggle between first

third-person modes helps to a certain degree, but considering your movement is somewhat hampered in first-person mode, it's still frightfully irritating.

Lastly, despite the game having a number of 'special' levels such as driving the Batmobile, flying the Batwing, and diving off skyscrapers to catch falling children, these welcome diversions are poorly realised. Instead of providing an amusing break from the standard Bat-action, they often end up being an exercise in frustration.

Still, Batman: Vengeance is an enjoyable enough adventure. If you're a fan of the series then this is well worth investigating otherwise it might be prudent to wait until a better platformer runs and jumps onto GC

Nhat is a gridiron anyway?

he Madden franchise is by far the longest-running and most successful American football series around, and unlike the soccer equivalent, FIFA, has achieved its position because it's consistently the most enjoyable game of its type.

There are few surprises to be found in this first Gamecube edition, which is pretty much a straight port of the PS2 version. Years of honing Madden's AI, playbooks and handling have resulted in the most comprehensive gridiron game ever, and the slim instruction manual

barely scratches the surface of this highly evolved sports sim.

Madden 2002 offers an impressive range of moves on the field. You can perform hand-offs. jumps, spins, blocks and custom Cstick jukes, along with a bewildering array of on-the-fly tactical switches that will only make sense if you're a keen follower of the sport, or the series itself. If there's a weakness here, it's that the game's complexity will be off-putting to newcomers.

The passing game is done as well as vou'd expect, with intelligent blocking from the defence, and receivers running in very clear patterns. Running plays are harder, requiring the ability to look for openings while avoiding tackles and selecting special moves. Luckily, there's a training mode that shows

how to run plays against different defence formations.

On the downside, Madden 2002 is distinctly ropey when it comes to presentation. Dodgy, sub-PSOnestandard FMV clips, loading bars, unrealistic textures, and stadiums filled with cardboard cutouts don't make for an impressive start.

While this is the pick of the Madden series to date, it isn't the world's greatest American football title right now. That accolade goes to Sega's NFL2K1, which is easier to play, more intuitive, and due a GC update next year. With a potentially superior game on the horizon, you might want to wait, but if you must have a gridiron sim right this minute, then Madden 2002 is here and definitely worth checking out.

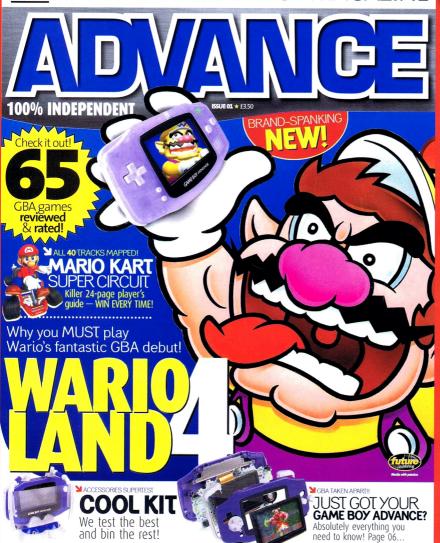

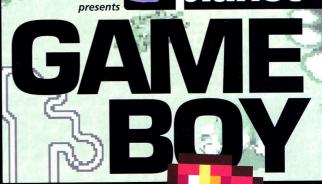

To activate it you need to press the A button to tell the device to get ready to accept a card – and this is where the smart bit comes in.

The E-Cards themselves are pretty much identical to normal Pokémon cards. The only real differences are the tiny E-Card symbol in the bottom left-hand corner and the data strips on the edges. The longer strip on the left-hand side of the card holds the bulk of the information – graphics, sound and game data – while the bottom strip holds the information about the Pokémon on the card itself. These data strips act like barcodes, only instead of black lines they're made up of thousands of tiny little dots, and can hold up to 3K of data.

With such a small capacity, it's unsurprising that each card has nothing spectacular to offer individually, limiting itself to simple Pokémon information, pictures, animation and sound effects. When the cards are combined, the results are far more rewarding. For example, scanning and combining three cards from the starter pack – Machop, Machamp and

Machoke – creates a minigame where you have to punch as many tumbling rocks as you can before getting hit. While the minigames and animations are hardly ground-breaking, the E-Card unit's potential far outweighs what it lacks in raw power.

Carrying the card

The trading card phenomenon is big business, especially in Japan, and so the prospect of being able to unlock new features, secrets and games opens a whole new dimension. Almost anything (within reason) could be stored on these cards. Game tips, bitestized strategies and pictures could all be traded and distributed quickly and easily, and be given away with magazines or roadshows. At this year's Spaceworld, a handbook was handed out to punters with a free Celebii E-Card – so millions have been itching to buy a Reader and give it a go since.

Whether the E-Card reader will revitalise the world of Pokémon TCG is one thing, but we're keen to see exactly how Nintendo exploits this innovative gadget. With Game and Watch, Mario Party and Kirby cards planned for the not-too-distant future, we're going to have a whole lot of fun finding out.

Back in '91, this level took us two hours to complete. And, er, it did this time, too Mario vs Sonic wars, you might mistake the contents of this cart for just another update of a retro Nintendo game. What you're actually looking at is Shigeru Miyamoto and his band at the peak of their superhuman powers, and a game so meticulously-designed, so compulsively playable, so perfect that you can almost feel its brilliance crackling through your finger-tips

It is just a 2D platformer - to complete the game, just run to the right. THE MAKING OF...

Days after the N64's UK launch, a FPS arrived that put its PC cousins to shame in terms of graphics, speed and spectacular enemies. Producer David Dienstbier reveals how this memorable sequelspawner came to life...

efore 1997, we had a fairly good general idea of what to expect from a Nintendo console. On a machine from a company that had long specialised in primary colours and family fun, the last thing anyone anticipated was the kind of cutting-edge first-person shooter that was previously the sole preserve of expensive gaming PCs.

expensive gaming PCs. Turok changed all that, and established a system-selling franchise that would eventually continue long after the N64 itself had been superseded, Iguana Entertainment's brief was simply to create an N64exclusive title based on Acclaim's Turok comic series, and producer David Dienstbier was hired to decide how it was all going to be done.

3D powerhouse

David explains the reasoning behind opting for a first-person game: "The N64 had some graphic capabilities that were not possible on the PlayStation. It was quite a powerful machine in terms of its 3D capability, and 3D games – first-person shooters specifically – were just coming to fruition on the PC. It was time to make the transition to the console, but in many ways to make it better than it had been on the PC."

Acclaim's influence as a long-term third-party supporter of Nintendo meant Iguana enjoyed Dream Team

WHY TUROK: DINOSAUR HUNTER WAS A CLASSIC

DINOSAURS There aren't actually all that many dinosaurs in the game – raptors are the only common ones. Their scarcity makes the occasional unexpected appearance of monsters like the triceratops particularly scary and impressive.

CONTROLS Variations of the control system pioneered by Turok can be seen in just about every console-based FPS. The default settings in GoldenEye and Perfect Dark are a little different because of the R-button targeting feature, but most others have Turok-style controls.

SPEED Turok moves like greased lightning. It's almost overwhelmingly fast and smooth, causing some players to complain of headaches and motion sickness. It's still the speedlest console FPS, with most new games opting for a slower, more realistic pace.

CHAINGUN There was a chaingun in Doom, but it certainly didn't look this good. The way the spinning barrels slow down after unleashing a deadly volley is very satisfying. It mysteriously vanished in Turok 2, before returning for Rage Wars.

ever actually developed," reveals David. The talented but inexperienced team put in months of gruelling overtime in order to learn the tricks of the trade, and design the tools required to produce a videogame.

Walking with beasts

One thing for which Iguana was grateful was Acclaim's prowess in motion-capture technology. The company was regarded as something of a pioneer in the techniques used to create lifelike 3D animation, and at a time when the expensive process was only just beginning to filter down into the wider wideogame world, already had its own dedicated motion-capture studio up and running.

Consequently the humanoid characters could be smoothly and characters could be smoothly atoo much trouble – it was simply a case of cutting down the large amount of data generated, in order to squeeze it onto a

64Mb cartridge, and cleaning up any rough edges by hand. Animating the dinosaurs was much harder, though, since there was so little reference material available. "If you look at the older films and things that had been done with stop-motion, they lacked the sort of detail, the weight, the subtleness that current computer-generated films depict in their creatures," explains David. "The animators spent some time looking at existing material such as Jurassic Park and other dino-themed films from the past. They also looked at wildlife footage, and tried to create motion that they felt looked realistic for creatures that we obviously couldn't go and look at first-hand."

MAGIC MOMENT CHEATEL

The game's numerous inventive cheats were included after a final brainstorming session. Various members of the development team suggested ideas, such as the ability to combine cheats for different effects, and everything lead coder Rob Cohen considered feasible was included. Personalised cheat modes were even created in honour of the team's longsuffering girlfriends, providing some light relief after months of punishing 18-hour working days.

above the other bosses, and remains the game's defining scary moment. "Its size created certain kinds of nightmare situations in terms of how collision detection works and the amount of space you need to interact with the thing properly. One of the biggest challenges was getting a creature that large in close proximity to the player, without having the entire thing break down into monotony," says David. Putting the enormous dinosaur into a very large open arena proved to be a simple, and very playable solution, to the problem.

"The weapon design process was simple," says David. "Everyone knows about the BFG in Doom - we thought that was neat, but we could take it much further than it had ever gone before.

The team decided what they wanted the weapons to do, then designed individual pieces of code for each one to achieve unique effects – such as the gunsmoke drifting from the barrel of the pistol.





The guns are positioned to the side of the screen, as if held in Turok's right hand - something that's now a standard FPS feature. Previously, games like Quake had placed the gun directly in the centre.

Blood money

Surprisingly, Nintendo had no qualms about allowing a title with so much graphic violence to grace their console. In the past, the company had insisted that Mortal Kombat be cleansed of gore before they would allow the SNES version to be released, but times and attitudes had changed since then. "We were kind of concerned [about Nintendo's reaction]", says David, "but they knew we were aiming to create something that was geared towards the older gamer, and they knew that was very important for any platform if it

was aiming to appeal to the widest possible market. So we had no censorship from Nintendo.

A lack of time, technology and cartridge space had forced the abandonment of large parts of the original design document. Hundreds of pages of material ended up on the cutting room floor – for example the cave-dwelling Leaper enemies were originally supposed to be able to scuttle along walls and ceilings, and an entire scene featuring a vast brachiosaur during the Treetop Village level had to be cut. "The original design was quite

different, but interestingly enough it's very similar to what people are going to see in *Turok Evolution*."

"We were extraordinarily pleased with the reception Turok received," says David, recalling the game's critical and commercial success. "There's no way you can't be - you create a game, you work so hard with a group of very talented people that you get to know very well, and it bursts out and becomes a multi-million seller. It's the best feeling in the world. And did he expect Turok to become

such an enduring series? "Quite

honestly, no. I don't think any of us expected it to continue for so long, but I think that's also something that's changing with videogames these days - coders become attached to franchises. They want to create the next chapter and players want to experience it. So it's nothing but a thrill. Many people ask me if I ever get tired of working on Turok games, and the simple answer to that

question is no." NGC

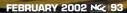








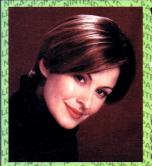

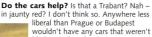
