NINTENDO CONFIRMS NET AND TV ON DS

It's a June release for Opera in Japan.

It's the news we've been expecting for some time: Nintendo have finally signed a deal to bring dual-windowed web browsing to DS owners in Japan this June, although no date has been confirmed for the system's release over here just yet.

Using a recent press event in Tokyo initially designed to show off the glories of the newly unveiled DS Lite, Masaru Shimomura, Deputy General Manager of Nintendo's R & D department, revealed that they had decided to use the Opera web browser to allow gamers to surf the net wirelessly by including the technology on a DS cart: "Opera exceeded our expectations with its user-friendly interface, quick access to sites and ease of use, as well as making the best use of the Nintendo DS system's unique double screens and touch screen features".

The browser is expected to be released in Japan around June and offers the choice between viewing pages across both screens or or else surfing around the lower screen with the stylus, zooming in on certain sections of each page. And while the browser will cost 3,800 yen (about £18) in Japan, what it will cost in these islands remains a mystery.

Also, using the same game slot as the browser, there will be an external

TV tuner and aerial. Created in conjunction with Japanese audio and digital provider 1Seg, the TV signal will be broadcast in screen-filling 320x240 resolution using MPEG2 technology. However, if the product is to appear over here, then Nintendo would need a similar UK partner to provide the pictures.

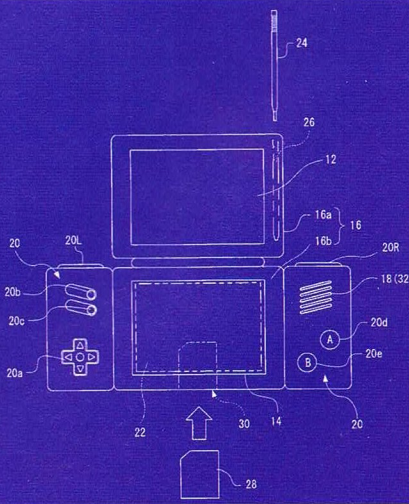
With the audience still captivated by those two devices, Nintendo also took the chance to reveal that DS versions of Konami's *Pro Evolution Soccer*, *Super Robot Wars* and *Dynasty Warriors* are also in development. While that trio remained in seclusion, *Children of Mana* and *XenoSaga* were shown in video form, and a *Brain Training* based spin-off called *Calligraphy Training* was also confirmed. Sadly no release dates were forthcoming, which just leaves us wishing our lives away until E3 shimmies into view with all the answers to our questions.

A TOUCH FAMILIAR

Mere days after unveiling the new DS Lite, Nintendo trundled down to the US patent office to register another sexy shape for its handheld. But somehow it looks very familiar, especially when compared to our 2003 mock-up of the original DS. Is it a case of great minds thinking alike? Probably not, as Nintendo's DS patent is for a machine that can read two styluses touching the screen at once and calculate the distance and angle between them. Probably in readiness for a trigonometry round in the sadly inevitable *Mario Party DS*.

MOTHER 3 ACTUALLY EXISTS

Long lost RPG loses a dimension in GBA form.

A mere nine years after first appearing in issue 1 of *N64* and less than a month before it hits Japanese shelves, Shigesato Itoi has decided that it is once again time for the world to see his turn-based GBA RPG *Mother 3*.

As you might guess for a game that has been delayed, then cancelled, then resurrected, then delayed once again, things have changed since we first caught a glimpse of the turn-based adventure. For a start, it's obviously changed from a 3D adventure on the N64DD to become 2D once again on the GBA. So far, it also seems to be

devoid of any of the familiar faces such as Ness and Jeff, although that may change.

We say 'so far' because Itoi-san has decided to taunt us all by drip-feeding information through his website, so far revealing only the motto (Strange, Funny, Heart-rending), the music in ringtone form and the *Mother 3* 18,000 yen GB Micro included inside the Deluxe Box.

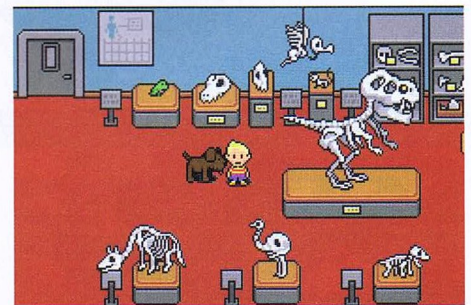

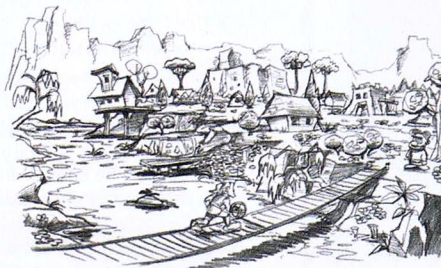

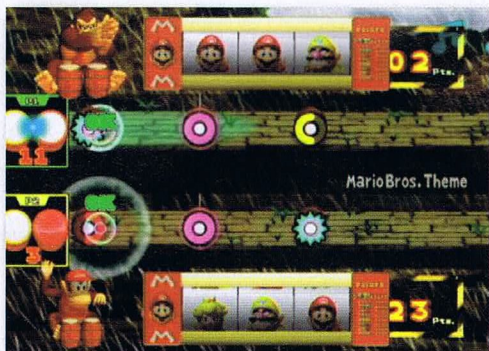

STAR FOX: ASSAULT



Star Fox has always been known for intense action, fast-paced flying levels and fun-but-shallow multiplayer. And what does *Assault* do? It gets them the wrong way round! All of a sudden, the multiplayer is brilliant fun, offering a decent level of depth for those willing to explore it, and a shallow, not to mention short, single player game.

The single player removes Fox from his Arwing, but at least he has a gun rather than a stick, right? Wrong. While Fox has his blaster, and many other weapons, the game feels loose and lacks any feeling of impact, enemies die pathetically, and pose little to no challenge. The flying levels are a step up, but are too few and far between to save the experience.

In contrast to this, the multiplayer offers

a nicely customisable game. When only one vehicle is available, it is fairly drab, but when offered the choice between weapons, vehicles and power ups the game comes alive. And if *Smash Bros* can get away with being considered brilliant several years since release purely on multiplayer, why can't this?

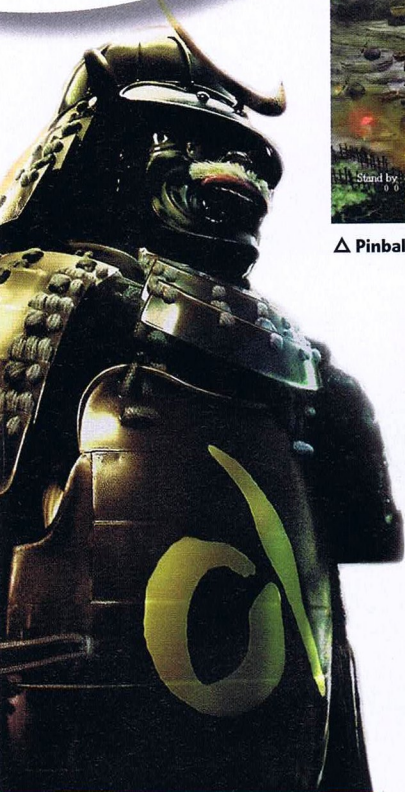

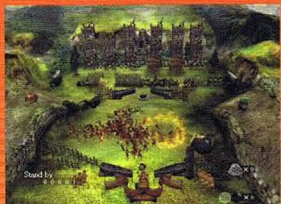

We've seen some odd sights in our time. Babies in a pram being pulled along by a giant Chain Chomp in *Mario Kart*? Didn't bat an eyelid. Cleaning the teeth of a giant underwater eel in *Mario Sunshine*? As normal as a cup of tea. Whacking bongos to make a virtual gorilla slap a giant chicken silly? As regular as *Coronation Street*. But *Odama*... well, *Odama* is just really frickin' weird.

It's essentially a military strategy game, pitting one massive army against another – with a gigantic pinball. This pinball – the eponymous *Odama* – is naturally used to crush the enemy via giant flippers, but the catch is that it can flatten your own troops as well as the bad guys. Which is where the Gamecube microphone comes in: it'll be bundled with the game and you can use it to shout 11 different orders at your own men (mostly "get out of the way!", we assume) in order to attack the enemy and swamp their encampment. To do this you use the *Odama* to shatter the enemy gates, which lie at the far end of the playing area. Complexity is introduced here, in that you need to get

a squad of men carrying a giant bell (of course) through the breached fortifications, whereupon victory awaits, like a particularly delicious cake.

Splendidly, the game will also come with a clip, so you can attach the microphone to the Gamecube controller. It's activated by pressing X, and having to hold both the mic and controller at the same time would be madness, as full use is made of the controller: L and R are used to control the flippers, the analogue stick tilts the playing field, and

two very different things: marshal your men and use them strategically in a *Pikmin*-style fashion, and flip the *Odama* around as if you were playing a regular pinball game, while of course attempting not to squash your own army into a bloody mess in the process.

It's unusual, exacting, and a lot of fun. The fact that the game is set in feudal Japan makes it all the odder; and yet, somehow, it all makes a curious kind of sense. While it's not the most visually advanced game we've ever seen (check

pressing Z calls for reinforcements. It'll be a little like using the mic that attached to the N64 controller for *Hey You, Pikachu*, we imagine (although *Odama* will surely work properly with the mic, as anyone with memories of Pika's stubborn refusal to do anything you ask may recall).

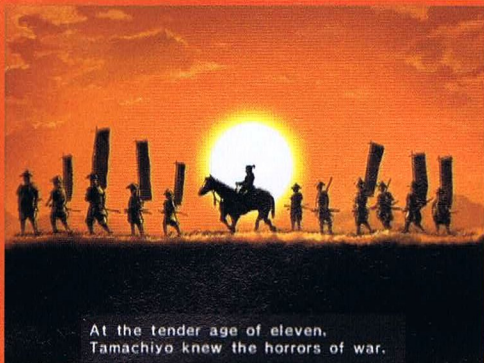
Ultimately, the game splits your brain down the middle by asking you to do

out the little stick men), the style of the game is certainly individual and atmospheric, and it throws lots of soldiers around with aplomb.

We never thought a game this unique would make it over here, but a June release has been confirmed. We'll hopefully have a review of the Japanese version in the next issue. Frankly, we're very excited indeed.

LEGO STAR WARS II: THE ORIGINAL TRILOGY

The original *LEGO Star Wars* was a real treat; a kid's game that could be enjoyed by adults, full of charm and big, brick-based fun. This sequel goes back and gives us what we all wanted – a game based on the original trilogy, rather than the patchy sequels (or, er, prequels, to be accurate. It's still so confusing).

The game follows the same format as before – pleasing fighting and jumping with a vast cast of characters, each of whom has their own particular ability – but throws in the *Star Wars* equivalent of the kitchen sink and possibly the rest of the kitchen as well, even down to the Kenwood Magimix (made out of Lego and waving a lightsaber, natch). Now you can look forward to riding a huge variety of vehicles and monsters, more than 50 new characters, new special attacks and best of all, the ability to mix and match body parts from

different characters, so you can make your own Frankensteinian Greedo/Chewbacca hybrid, who we'd dub Greebacca, or possibly Chewdo. And for those who found the first *LEGO Star Wars* a little on the easy side, there's an 'advanced mode', which presumably ups the challenge ante, although we're not quite sure how as yet.

It's all looking great, then, and there's even talk of the ability to unlock 56 extra characters by plugging in a memory card with a save from the first game, although LucasArts have said this facility will only be available on certain platforms. We're hoping, of course, that this will include the Gamecube version. There's also a DS version where, sensibly, this option won't make an appearance, although you'll be able to have four-player wireless co-op play, which kind of makes up for it. In a word: exciting. Sadly, we have to wait until some time in the Autumn for it. Bah.

NEW SUPER MARIO BROS

A plum new outing for our plummiest plumber playmate, pleasingly presented for your pleasure

sliding and enemy-bopping we've come to expect, but it's all done with huge panache, and it looks splendid. The action may take place on a 2D plane, but the 3D graphics are a treat, and fancy new physics make the world much more interactive than it has been in a 2D *Mario* before.

The only fluff on the Murray Mint, as it were, is the fact that this doesn't take spectacular advantage of the DS. Yep, the action moves to the touch screen when you're underground, and the touch screen can be used to select items, but the unique capabilities of Ninty's handheld seem disappointingly under-used. Nevertheless, it's the gameplay that counts, and on current evidence that gameplay is creamier than the creamiest cream pie you ever did see. Mmm.

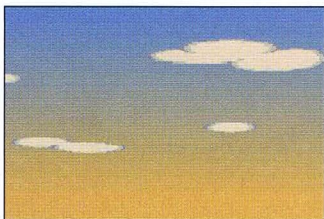

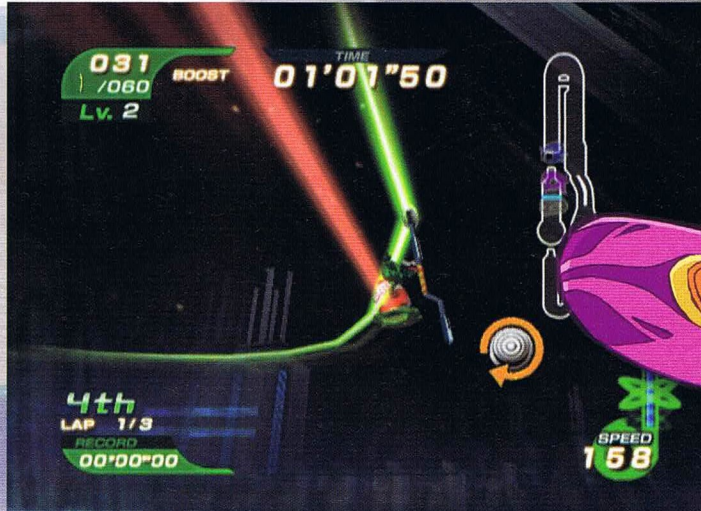

It can be a genuinely thrilling experience; an elemental force that leaves you breathless and shaking,

a kaleidoscopic whirlwind of motion that is, perhaps, a properly logical extension of Sonic's particular talent. Even if that means he has to ride a hoverboard, which is perhaps a little odd for the fastest hedgehog

games, *Sonic Riders* is straight racing. There's no exploration and none of the distractions that have marred most of Sonic's 3D games. It's basic, first-one-to-the-finish-line-wins action, and this simplicity

Sadly, we found this last option to be about as much fun as pulling dirty teeth from a putrefied corpse, but at least it all runs smoothly and quickly when four players are involved.

A little bar on the right hand side of the screen shows how much 'air' you've accrued, and it's constantly falling as this is obviously what keeps your board – or 'gear', as it's called here – suspended. So, as well as racing as fast as you can, you've also got to keep your air meter topped up, and this can be done by pulling stunts or stopping at handy air-refreshing pit-stops. Stunts are dead simple – Sega wanted to make *Sonic Riders* as accessible as possible, so as long as you've charged your jump (by holding A) to get enough height when you spring off a ramp, moving the joystick is all you need

to do to perform a number of board-based stunts. The air meter is also used to boost (via B), which is absolutely necessary if you want to be in spitting distance of winning but, naturally, this saps your air reserves significantly.

It's a system that works, and it certainly adds a little depth to proceedings. Which is a good thing because, as is so often the case with the 3D *Sonic* games, *Sonic Riders* leaves you with the nagging feeling that you don't really have too much control over what you're doing. Acceleration is automatic, as in *Kirby's Air Ride*, and there's a cornering system that slows you down, by holding R, and then gives you a boost when you release it. As

the game isn't on rails – though it often feels like it is – this system also powerslides you around corners, letting you take bends in a tighter fashion than the restrictive steering would otherwise allow. On-screen prompts tell you when to use this cornering technique, and if you don't use it at exactly these moments, you'll generally career off the track if there's no border. It's hugely frustrating, especially because the Gamecube's cruel digital

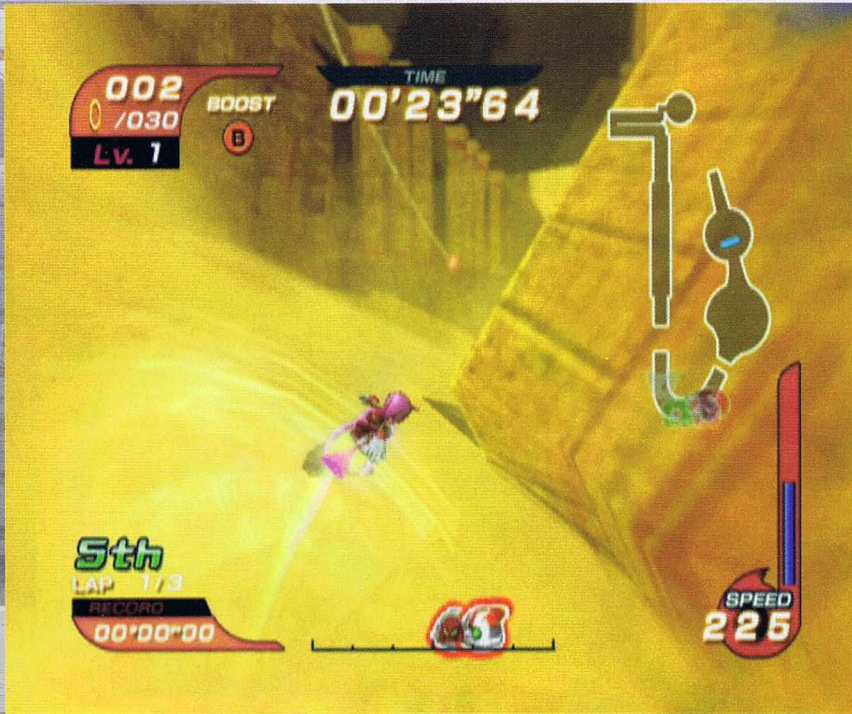

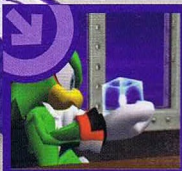

to succeed. 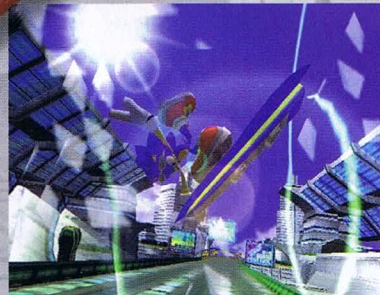

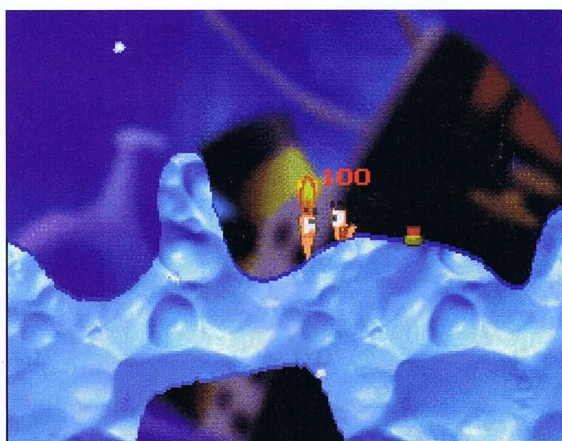

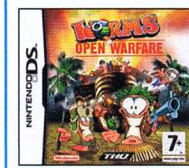

If you're one of the two people that's never played *Worms* before, *Open Warfare* will probably come as a very pleasant surprise indeed. If you're one of the many trillions that grew up with the game and have seen it evolve into 3D and grow cluttered with novelty, then it will either be a refreshing move back to basics or seem thoroughly old hat, and contemptible through familiarity.

We're seeing it as a refreshing move back to basics. Yep, it's true that we've played *Worms* to death over the years, but age seemingly shall not wither the beautiful simplicity and peculiarly British silliness of its concept.

So essentially, yes, this is *Worms*, but on the DS. The premise is the

same as it's always been – wage war across a destructible landscape with a team of worms, utilising a vast array of weapons and equipment, from humble bazookas and shotguns to, yes, sheep, jetpacks and holy hand grenades. The game's turn-based, and you've only got a set amount of time in which to move and fire. Power-ups drop from the sky, giving you life-saving health and other, more offensive items.

And as far as DS-specific changes are concerned, the news is mixed. The additions are tiny but well-judged, and this certainly isn't a brave new

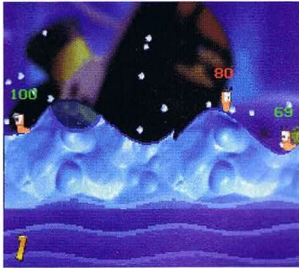

way of playing videogames in the way that, say, *Nintendogs* is. 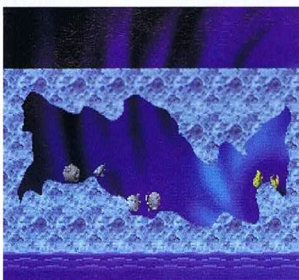

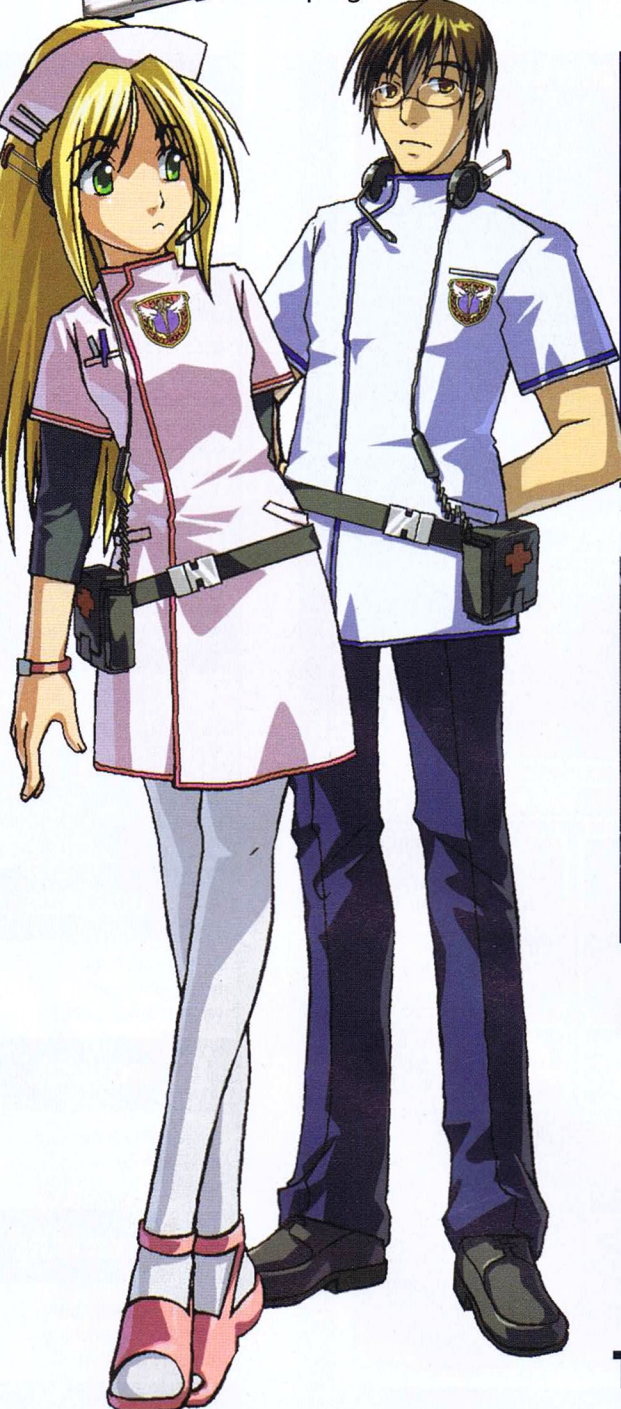

Five points linked by one line. To most nimble fingered people it would be nothing more than a swish of the stylus, but for us it was the moment that our initial adoration of *Trauma Center* turned into steamed loathing. And the reason for this venting of theatre-rage? Our total inability to draw a bloody star.

Such pathetic pentagram-based penmanship can only be attributed to pressure and *Trauma Center* piles it on relentlessly. While the 30 operations are mostly routine, everything in this ER has to be performed without hesitation: the clock is ticking, a vein is throbbing, a heart is pounding and the only pressure that is falling belongs to the ailing patient.

But it isn't just the constant spurts of claret, weeping wounds and massive internal haemorrhaging that keep you cutting, it's also the soapy lathering of your fellow quacks, the thought of your patient dying skewered on the operating table and the scene of utter solitude and failure shown by the 'Game Over' screen.

Trauma Center is a joyfully inventive but vastly frustrating game. For example, initially a nurse holds your surgical gloves, explaining how to open wounds, drain pus and stitch without leaving a scar, but after that, trial and error become an integral part of each operation. Complex procedures have to be guessed at or dredged up from memory, and in surgery the last thing you want to do is

To compound these small problems, the game is also infected with some nasty design flaws, one of them being that there's no replay option to scrub up again after any screw ups. Instead you chat, you cut and you repeat the routine part of the surgery. Phenix Wright is really extremely good indeed, but we can't help but feel that it doesn't give a particularly accurate depiction of the world of the law. For instance, in the real world we're not sure that senior partners in law firms buy their own office PCs, or that psychics channel the spirit of their murdered sisters so as to help their lawyers. This silliness also extends to pocketing evidence from crime scenes and then dramatically unveiling it in the courtroom, which we're sure isn't quite the done thing. As such, the game never quite follows the line of cold, hard logic that you really want it to.

Nevertheless, give into its warped notions and you'll have a whale of a time. It's often

laugh-out-loud funny – "I'll get to this woman's bottom!" – and the thrill of solving a case by pinpointing the contradictions in witness testimonies and offering case-solving evidence at the right time is palpable. It is, quite simply, yet another reason why the DS is absolutely brilliant, and another exemplar of the format pushing developers to create new and unique software.

That being said, unless you use up the five 'lives' you get in court, there's only one solution to each case, which you can get to simply by exhausting your options. But the fun of the game is in thinking about what you've seen, and cracking a case before you've meandered your way to the solution by exhausting the dialogue trees.



THE LAW

Although the game has been translated wonderfully for the DS, you don't actually have to use the touch screen or the mic if you don't want to. We suggest you do though, as the game is much more fun if you can shout "objection!" at every possible opportunity. Maybe not one to play on the bus, though.

It's split into two halves, really: the splendid courtroom scenes (we had no end of fun shouting "objection!" into the mic) and the Columbo-esque detective work. At heart, the game is a point and click adventure, allowing you to move between locations and examine your surroundings by tapping the touch screen. Items can be added to your Court Record inventory and then presented to both characters and the court. There are reams of text to wade through and, as such, it is thoroughly old fashioned in many ways, but it's also gripping, amusing, and a refreshing reminder that, as with *Advance Wars*, dusty old genres can be revitalised simply by being brilliant.

First things first: this isn't the *Rainbow Islands* that you remember. Rainbows, used to kill enemies, are created by stroking anywhere on the touch screen, and the game trades on the tension that exists between the need to move and the need to kill monsters, as you can't do both at the same time. It's a neat system that fits the DS well, and special rainbows can be drawn that have different effects – triangles Hoover in enemies while five-pointed stars act as smart bombs.

Sadly, the top screen is rather neglected, simply offering you a view of what's ahead, but otherwise this is good fun. It's no *Yoshi's Touch and Go* or *Kirby Power Paintbrush*, games which feature similar mechanics, but if you can tell yourself that this isn't *Rainbow Islands*, it's a new game called *Rainbow Islands Revolution*, then you'll find much to enjoy. And you can't say fairer than that.

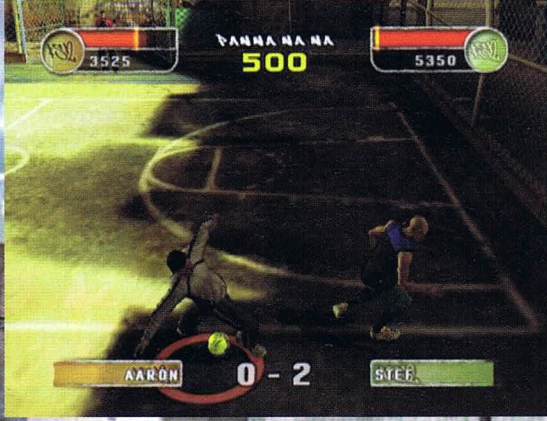

Goals win games. 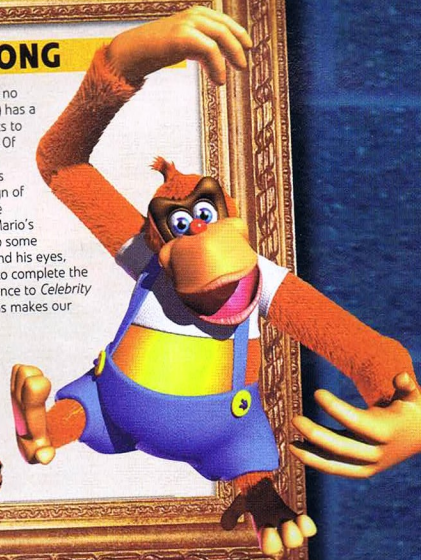


LANKY KONG

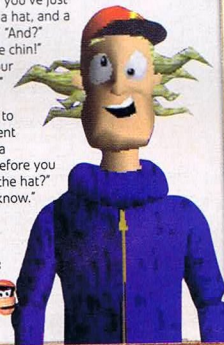

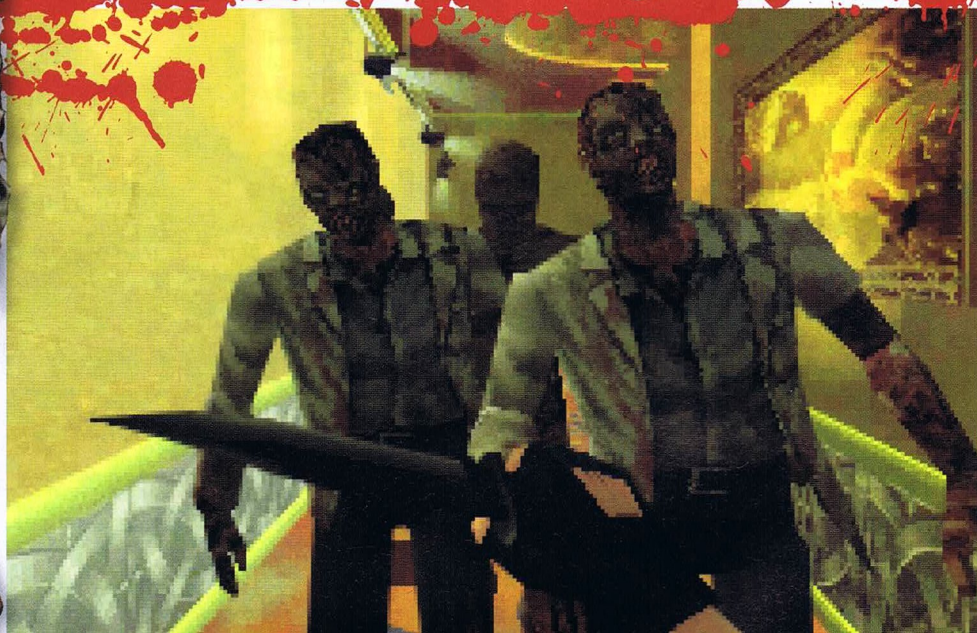

THE BEGINNING

JILL:

Use the door by the fireplace and take a left to meet your first zombie. Kill it and search Kenneth's body for two clips of **Handgun Bullets**, then return to the dining room.

Go back to the front hall and go upstairs. When you come back down, Barry will give you the **Lockpick**.

CHRIS:

Use the door by the fireplace and take a left to meet your first zombie. Stab it in the legs to knock it down and kill it. Search Kenneth's body for **Handgun Bullets**, then return to the front hall to find Jill's **Handgun**.

Go upstairs and west to the dining room balcony. Leave to the north and go downstairs. The door under the stairs is the infirmary, where you'll meet Rebecca. Take the **Sword Key** off the bed.

FINDING THE MAP

Return to the lobby and go east via the statue room; you can push the stepladder over to it to reach the **Map of the First Floor**. Otherwise, unlock the eastern door and go down the infamous "dog hallway"; if you push the second empty display case, you'll find **Handgun Bullets** underneath.

HALL OF DOORS

Past this, you'll find a hall full of doors. The first leads to a small garden full

KNIFE FIGHTING

You'll find your first knife fight in the statue room. Knife fights are "random encounters," frequently but not necessarily triggered when you enter certain areas via certain doors. If you can win without taking a hit, you'll often find two or three rounds of **Handgun**, **Shotgun**, or **Magnum** ammo or a **Green Herb** afterwards.

Tap the touchscreen for a quick stab, and drag the stylus for a slash. Slashes are slower, but knock enemies off-balance and prevent them from attacking you. If you stab or slash an enemy right before they attack you, you'll counter the attack and instantly kill a standard opponent. This is a vital tactic against Hunters.

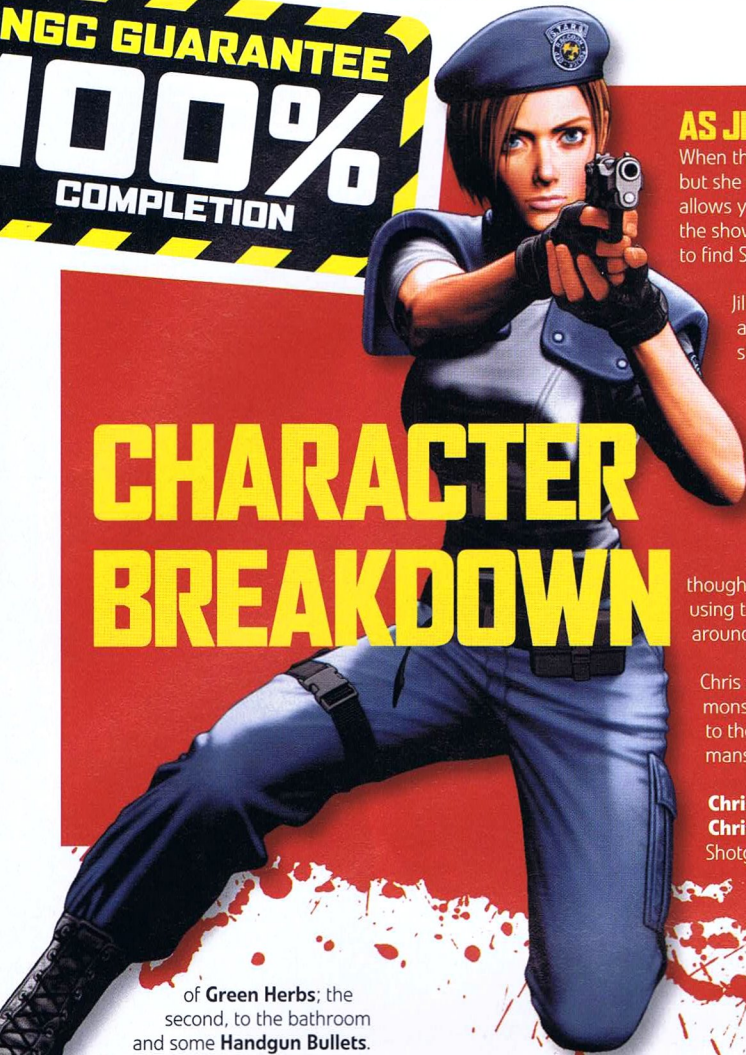

CHARACTER BREAKDOWN



AS JILL:

When they say "Easy," they aren't kidding. Jill has more item slots, but she also gets more ammunition and easier puzzles. The Bazooka allows you to exploit enemies' weak spots, rapidly ending fights like the showdown with the Yawn. Jill's Lockpick means she doesn't have to find Small Keys or the Sword Key.

Jill's low health means you'll want to always leave room for a healing item, such as two mixed Green Herbs. She's also slower than Chris, so you'll need to kill more enemies.

Jill's Starting Items: Handgun, First Aid Spray x2

Jill's Item Chest: Handgun Bullets x60, Shotgun Shells x28, Green Herb, Red Herb, Blue Herb

AS CHRIS:

Chris has roughly twice as much health as Jill, and he's much faster. Only having six item slots costs him, though; you'll have to use Green Herbs more like power-ups, using them as you find them rather than carrying them around.

Chris also gets much harder puzzles, less ammo, more monsters, and the Magnum is surprisingly weak compared to the Bazooka. He must find the Sword Key to explore the mansion, and must use Small Keys to open locked drawers.

Chris's Starting Items: First Aid Spray

Chris's Item Chest: Handgun Bullets x60, Shotgun Shells x14



of Green Herbs; the second, to the bathroom and some Handgun Bullets.

The third is a study, where you cannot yet take the Shotgun off the wall without activating a deadly trap. Instead, leave via the end of the hall. There are four doors here; the ones at the end of the room lead to a gallery and the path to the mansion's guardhouse. The guardhouse door is locked and requires four Crests to open; this is your first goal.

IN THE GALLERY

In the gallery, you'll find a puzzle. Check the larger painting by the entrance, then press the switches underneath the following paintings, in this order: newborn, infant, lively boy,

young man, middle-aged man, bold old man, and "The end of life." This opens a secret compartment containing the Star Crest.

Leave the gallery, then unlock and go through the green door. You've just reached the east safe room, near the stairs; there's a Green Herb outside and a Chemical inside.

Backtrack via the 2F east hall to the west wing of the mansion.

AS JILL:

When you return to the balcony above the front hall, you'll get Acid Rounds from Barry. Visit the southwestern door

to find the Bazooka on Forest's body; watch out, as he'll reanimate.

AS CHRIS:

Visit the southwestern room to find a Small Key. Forest is holding Handgun Bullets.

IN THE GREENHOUSE

Return to the dining room's balcony, and push the statue through the hole in the railing. Go through the northern door and downstairs, then past the infirmary to the end of the hall. In this greenish area, your goal is the east exit, which leads to the greenhouse.

(You can also open the southwestern door in the green hallway with your Sword Key/Lockpick. Inside, you'll find **Handgun Bullets**, **Shotgun Shells**, and the **Keeper's Diary** file.)

In the greenhouse, use the **Chemical** on the open pump to kill the plant. The **Armor Key** is waiting politely behind it, as are four **Green Herbs** and two **Red Herbs**.

USING THE PIANO

Return to the green hall and unlock its southern door, and cut through the 1F west hall to the dining room. Take the **Emblem** and **Blue Gem**, the latter of which is in the wreckage of the statue.

AS JILL:

In the 1F west hall, unlock the easternmost door with your Lockpick to reach the bar. Push the bookcase in the corner to find the **Music Notes**, and use them on the piano to open a secret door. Enter, and swap your Emblem for the **Gold Emblem**.

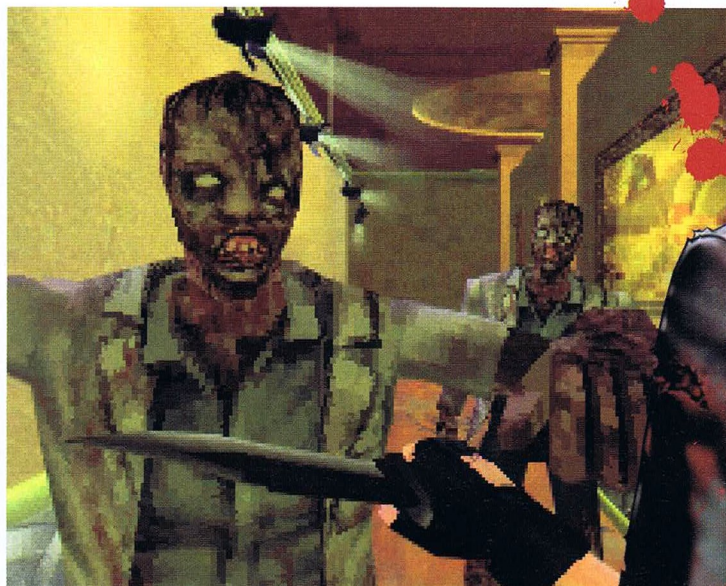
Return to the dining room and install the Gold Emblem over the fireplace. Set the grandfather clock to 3:00 to reveal the **Shield Key**.

AS CHRIS:

In the 1F west hall, unlock the easternmost door with your Lockpick to reach the bar. Push the bookcase in the corner to find the **Music Notes**, and use them on the piano. Rebecca will show up; let her mess with the

piano for about ten minutes while you go do something else.

USING THE TIGER STATUE

Go to the green hall, and as you head north, take a right into the small side room. Install the Blue Gem in the tiger statue to get the **Wind Crest**.

AROUND THE EAST HALL

It's time to cover some ground. Open the door around the corner from the infirmary, and take the **Broken Shotgun**, **Handgun Bullets**, and **Shotgun Shells** (inside the locked drawer). Now you can go to the east hall's study and swap the Broken Shotgun for the **Shotgun**.

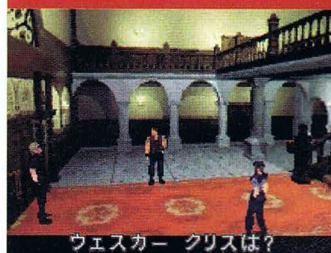

She'll ask you to fetch the **Serum** for Richard, which is in the infirmary. If you do so, Richard will stay alive long enough to tell you about the dining room clock secret and give you the **Comm. Radio**. If you use the Serum on Chris or waste time returning to the attic, Richard will die and Rebecca will distrust you.

A VERY LARGE SNAKE

Moving on after the death of Richard (having mourned him appropriately first, of course) the room straight past him leads to the attic. In the small dining room, check the corner cabinet for **Handgun Bullets**, then use the **Lighter** on the candlestick and push back the bookcase. You'll find **Acid Rounds** (Jill)/**Shotgun Shells** (Chris) inside the pantry.



△ Oh look, there's another wound here, and here, oh and another up here...

Finally, unlock the door to the attic. Inside, you'll find **Shotgun Shells** and, in the far corner, the **Moon Crest**.

There is also a very large snake. Don't bother fighting it. Instead, fake it away from the Moon Crest, grab the crest, and get out of the attic as fast as you can. What happens next depends on whether it bites you or not.

AS JILL:

Jill will collapse and wake up in the infirmary with full health. Onward!

AS CHRIS:

You'll take control of Rebecca. You must race across the mansion to get the **Serum** out of the infirmary, then return to Chris. You can make Rebecca's job much easier if you, as Chris, wipe out all the monsters between the attic and the infirmary before you go to face the snake.

Once you've been treated, or if you somehow niftily manage to escape without getting bitten at all, you can go and install all four crests in the guardhouse door.

EVEN MORE SNAKES

In the storage shed, take the **Crank** off the shelf (Chris will also find a **Small Key**). In the garden proper, you can find three **Green Herbs**, two **Red Herbs**, and two **Blue Herbs**. Take what you need, then head north and use your Crank to drain the waterway. Cross, but move quickly, as snakes will drop out of the trees.

Cross the garden courtyard to the only other available door: the guardhouse entrance. Dodge the dogs and crows; they won't be here when you leave, but the two **Green Herbs** will be.

IN THE GUARDHOUSE

In the guardhouse's front hall, push the statue over the hole in the floor. Then, ransack the hall; you'll find two **Blue Herbs** and a **Green Herb** by the door, **Explosive Rounds** (Jill)/**Handgun Bullets** (Chris) and a **First Aid Spray** in the safe room. **Handgun Bullets** are in the guardhouse lounge. The **Red Book** is in the northern dorm room.

TREASURE CHESTS

In Rebirth Mode, there are **blue treasure chests** inside each of the game's safe rooms. If you solve the puzzle attached to each one, you can get at the valuable items inside. How many pirates can say they battled past zombie dogs to get to these, eh?

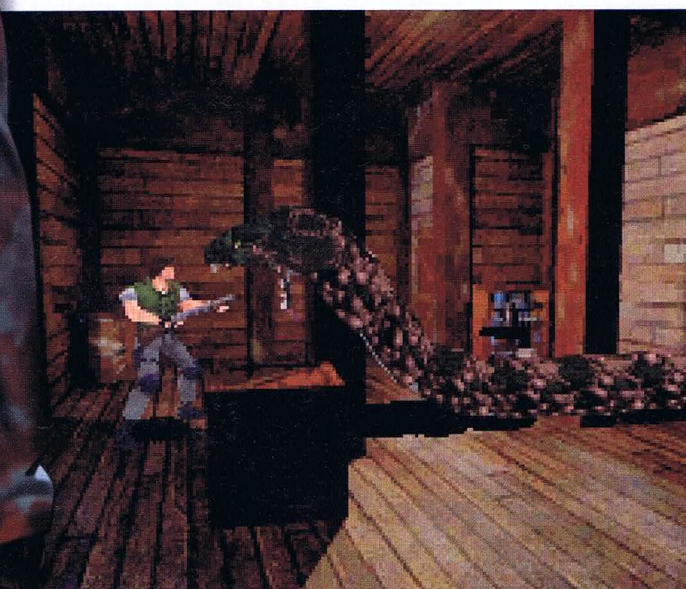

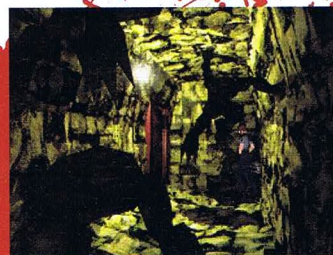

IN THE DORM

Chris will find a **Small Key** in the dorm, and there are **Shotgun Shells** inside the locked desk. Enter the dorm's bathroom and unplug the drain, then take the **Comm. Room Key**.

Finally, go south, and follow the hallway around to the first door. Grab the **Dormitory Key** off the table under the beehive, then run like hell back to the hall. Your new key unlocks the hall's north door; if you're hurt, push the statue first to find three **Green Herbs**.

THE NORTH DORM

There are **Handgun Bullets** in this dorm's bath, the **Guardhouse Map** is on the wall, and the **Plant 42 Report** is on the bed. Unlock the desk for **Shotgun Shells**, then push the bookcases to find a ladder and descend.

Push the first crate against the far wall, then shove the next two into the water. Now you can shove the third in with them to form a makeshift bridge. Take the two **Green Herbs**, then descend into the Aqua Ring (Chris should visit the northeastern room for a **Small Key**; also note the roots here).

THE AQUA RING

Once you cross to the west side of the room, run for the southwestern door ASAP before the Neptune eats you, and throw the switch. Use your stylus to

close the valve, thus draining the water and immobilising the Neptune.

Check the wall by the control room door for a puzzle. The solution is, from left to right, 8 4 3 5 9 1 2 6 7; input this to unlock the Arms Room. There, you'll find **Handgun Bullets**, **Shotgun Shells**, and another **Dormitory Key**.

PAST THE BEEHIVE

The last locked door is back in that room with the beehive. Unlock it: there are **Flame Rounds (Jill)**/**Shotgun Shells (Chris)** in the bathroom, and the **V-Jolt Report** is in the bookcase. Replace it with the **Red Book** and leave via the secret door for a boss fight.

PLANT BOSS FIGHT AS JILL:

There are two ways to do this. The fast way is to circle the room, pausing in each corner to fire a single Flame Round at the plant. Barry will arrive shortly thereafter to finish the job.

The slow way is to visit the chemical locker directly opposite this dorm room. Solve the simple puzzle to unlock the door, then grab three **Empty Bottles** off the shelves. Fill one bottle with No. 2, then fill a second bottle with Water. Mix Water and #2 to make #3. Get #4 from the shelf and combine it with #3 to get #7.

Mix #4 and #2 to get #6, and mix it with #7 for #13. Finally, recreate #3 by

mixing Water with No. 2, then blend #3 and #13 to get **V-Jolt**.

Return to the Aqua Ring and use **V-Jolt** on the roots to make Plant 42 wither. Return to the dorms and destroy the plant with your Bazooka.

AS CHRIS:

If you told Rebecca to come with you, you'll take control of her at this point. Go to the chemical locker and mix up **V-Jolt**, as above, then head to the Aqua Ring and use it on the plant's roots. You, as Chris, will then have to finish Plant 42 off with Shotgun blasts; it'll take roughly twelve hits.

If you told Rebecca to stay put or if you failed to save Richard Aiken, you'll have to kill Plant 42 on your own. This will take a long time and about twenty Shotgun shells.

BACK TO THE MANSION

Afterwards, take the **Helmet Key** from the fireplace and return to the mansion. It's now infested with Hunters.

Open the study by the guardhouse

exit to find **Magnum Rounds**. In Rebirth Mode, there's also an **MO Disk**.

USING THE HELMET KEY

The other two doors the **Helmet Key** opens are in the hall above the infirmary in the west wing, and on the west end of the balcony above the east safe room (notably, you'll find **ammunition** and a **First Aid Spray** waiting for you in that safe room).

Go to the former room first; inside, you'll find the **Orders** file, **Magnum Rounds**, and **Shotgun Shells**. Blow out the candles on the table with three quick exhalations into your DS's mic. That'll allow you to see and take the **Red Jewel** from the deer head.

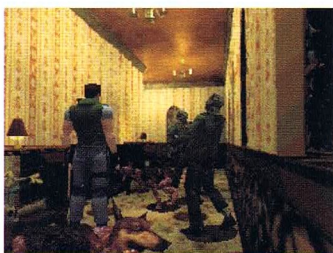
Return to the green hallway and install the **Red Jewel** in the tiger statue to get the **Magnum**. Pump your fist once in the air. Move on.

BALLROOM BOSS FIGHT.

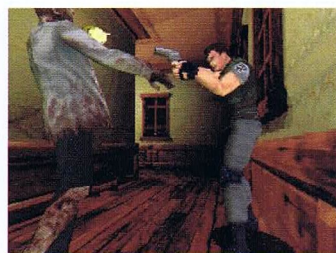
The final **Helmet Key** door leads to a ballroom. Spin the record with your

DOOM BOOK I

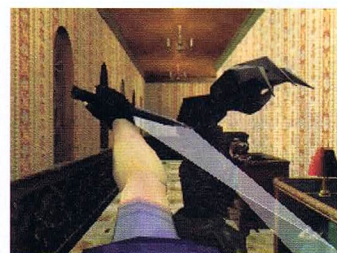
The big difference between Classic and Rebirth Mode is where you'll find the first **Doom Book**. In Classic Mode, it's in the study in the mansion's east wing, and can be found once you have the **Helmet Key**. In Rebirth Mode, you must find **Eric's Letter** in the mansion's west library; this will trigger a special boss fight in the room where you fought Plant 42. Winning that fight will allow you to find the **Doom Book**.



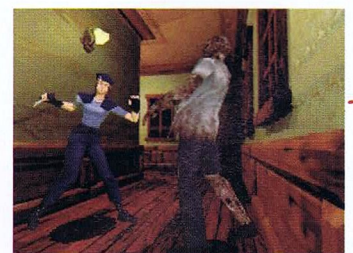

RESIDENT EVIL: DEADLY SILENCE

Win, win, win... get those snakes and dog-type things

BESTIARY



△ It's weird – the wind just changed and he was stuck like this... Poor Kevin.

HUNTERS

These killing machines have been decapitating *RE* fans for a decade. If they catch you at low health, they'll finish the job with a flying rake that'll take your character's head off. Otherwise, watch out for their quick slashes, and a flying jump attack that can cover a deceptive amount of ground.

The moment you see a **Hunter**, level it with a Shotgun blast. When it's back on its feet, fire again, repeating the process until the Hunter's dead. It'll let out a characteristic scream when it does so. You may also want to use the Magnum for a one-hit kill.

When knife-fighting Hunters, keep them off-balance with slashes, much as with zombies. If it pulls back and pounces at you, wait for its arm to go back before slashing; with the right timing, you'll counter the attack and kill it with one hit.



CROWS

Crows are most dangerous when encountered in conjunction with other monsters. Wait for a crow to rush you, then run a step forward. It'll often settle to the ground briefly, allowing you to finish it off with a single knife stab or Handgun bullet.

When knife-fighting crows, remember that – in some ways – they're the most dangerous foes, in that they can appear anywhere on screen. Wait for one to establish its position, then go for a quick stab to kill it.

CHIMERAЕ

The most durable standard enemies in the game, **Chimerae** can cling to ceilings, use a dangerous pounce attack that'll knock you flat, and absorb up to three Magnum bullets before kicking over. And even worse luck – if they appear at all, there are at least three of them.

There is never any good reason to fight a Chimera, and their speed makes doing so difficult. If you see one, run.

BEEES

Pull out a Shotgun and fire the moment you see a **Bee**. They're very good at staying just close enough to you that they'll hit if you ready a weapon. It makes them easy to avoid if they're found alone, but dramatically annoying if they appear in conjunction with another enemy.

DOGS

The **Cerberus** bioweapon is dangerous, particularly in packs. If one's found alone, knock it down with a single Handgun bullet, then stab it to death while it's on the floor. If you encounter multiple dogs, put your back to a wall and keep knocking them down with Handgun shots.

When knife-fighting dogs, you must hit one right as it pounces at you. There's a peculiar timing to knife-fighting dogs that is difficult to master.

ZOMBIE

The humble zombie comes in four flavours: standard, sleeper, crawler, and "naked."

A **standard zombie** is best dealt with at long range with a Handgun. In Rebirth Mode, you have a chance of killing a zombie instantly with Handgun fire. Once it goes down, look for the spreading pool of blood.

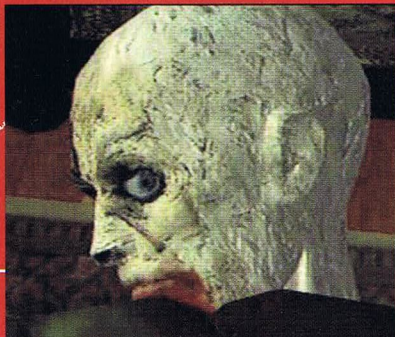
Otherwise, stab it to death while it's prone.

A **sleeper zombie** looks dead, but is only faking, and will glom onto your character's foot if you step on its head. Stabbing or shooting it, if it doesn't kill it, will turn the zombie into a crawler. Your character will autotarget sleeper zombies, but not dead zombies.

A **crawler zombie** is an undead land mine, as with sleeper zombies. Run around behind it, if possible, and stab it to death before it can turn around. Otherwise, shoot to kill.

Finally, "**naked**" zombies are the skinless, more powerful versions found in the Underground and Laboratory. These do a lot more damage than their weaker companions, but are otherwise identical.

When knife-fighting zombies, keep them off-balance by slashing at their chests, preventing them from attacking. If one goes for a "puke" attack, the only way to interrupt it is to knock it down before it finishes. To instakill a zombie, wait for it to try to bite you and stab right before its mouth closes.

stylus until the song finishes, and prepare for a boss fight with... the giant snake.

Jill can simply wax it with five **Acid Rounds**; Chris will have to empty 12-14 **Magnum Rounds** into it before it dies.



AS JILL:

Barry will arrive at this point to give you the **Pass Code** file. If you want Jill's best ending, drop into the hole, then wait for him to bring a second rope. Whether you do or not, check the tombstone, then rapidly hit the blue dots with your stylus to open a secret door.

AS CHRIS:

Check the tombstone, then rapidly hit the blue dots with your stylus to open a secret door.

THE FLAMETHROWER

Go round the corner to get the **Flamethrower** and a box of **Shotgun Shells**. You'll need to use the **Flamethrower** as a "key" at the end of this hall, but there are two **Green Herbs** nearby as consolation prizes.

IN THE KITCHEN

In the mansion's kitchen, Chris will find a **Small Key**. After finding this, use the kitchen's elevator to reach the second floor. Up here you'll find a **Green Herb** in the hall and the **Battery** in the closet, alongside two cases of **Explosive Rounds** (as Jill)/**Shotgun Shells** (as Chris).

You can find a short hall west of this area that leads back to the hall above the infirmary, but only Jill can unlock that door, and she can only do it from the other side. Visit here for the **Green** and **Blue Herbs**, then backtrack to the elevator hall and open the double doors to find the west library.

THE WEST LIBRARY

Open the locked desk for another load of **Magnum Rounds**, then read your way through the **Scrapbook**. You can wiggle the sword out of the door here and find **Handgun Bullets** within, but it's skippable.

Instead, go west. Hit the switch on the bust on the wall to turn on a spotlight, then push the statue into its beam to open a secret room. Check the desk for **Eric's Letter** (or an **MO Disk** in Classic Mode).

Dodge past the newly-arrived and somewhat aggressive Chimerae and ride the elevator back down to the kitchen. Use its side door to return to the 1F west hall, and from there, head into the garden. You must now go back to the guardhouse and the room where you fought Plant 42... for a knife-only (yes, knife-only) showdown with the giant snake.

SLASHER SNAKE FIGHT

This may be the greatest challenge in Rebirth Mode. You can do mild damage to the snake when its mouth is open, but that's pretty mild. To really hurt it, you'll have to counter its long lunges. When its head goes back, slash at its soft underbelly. Once you have the timing down properly, you should cancel its lunge and do big damage to the Yawn.

Nine or ten countered lunges should kill it, and let you take the **Doom Book I** off the floor. Check the **Doom Book** in your inventory screen and rotate it; you'll be able to open it and find the **Eagle Medal**.

INTO THE UNDERGROUND

Return to the garden and install the **Battery** in the deactivated lift. Ride it up and use your **Crank** to refill the waterway, then ride the lift back down. You can now enter the Underground. Take a right at the base of the ladder.

AS JILL:

You'll run into Barry again. To get the best ending, go first, and allow him to cover you. He'll knock out a Hunter or two for you.

AS CHRIS:

Don't take the **Flamethrower** here. Doing so locks the nearby door, and you don't want to have to futz with it on your way back, as you're dodging Chimerae.

ENRICO MARINI

Leave via either eastern door. Check the generator room for a **First Aid Spray** and **Explosive Rounds** (Jill)/**Shotgun Shells** (Chris), then go south to meet with the unlucky Enrico Marini. Search him for **Handgun Bullets**, then pursue the gunman. You'll find a new and different **Crank** on the floor.

Go back to the base of the ladder and round the corner. Use your new **Crank** to rotate the passage so you can pass.

AS CHRIS:

Once you've rotated the passageway, take the **Flamethrowers** off the wall and use them to save a bit of ammo. You'll need to use them as "keys" to open the doors you pass by.

BEHIND THE BOULDER

Approach the boulder, then run back the other way and duck into the doorway. It'll smash the wall and allow you to move on, but check where it was to find **Flame Rounds** (Jill)/**Magnum Rounds** (Chris).

SPIDER BOSS FIGHT

The next door leads to a boss fight. Run around the giant spider to dodge its venom blasts, then hit it from the side with a single **Shotgun** blast or **Flame Round**. Upon its death, leave the room to avoid its baby spiders, then reenter and use your **knife** or **Flamethrower** to clear the webbing off the door.

The path branches here. Go east for a safe room, which contains a **First Aid Spray** and **Blue Herb**. Go west to find a lift and another boulder trap. Trip it off, as you did last time, and you'll find the second **MO Disk** where it was.



HEX-SHAPED HOLE

Further on, there's a part of the floor in the boulder's path that looks different. Check the wall nearby for a hex-shaped hole, then use the **Crank** to rotate the passageway and reveal a secret door.

Enter, then push the statue just to the right of the hex-shaped hole. Crank it up to push the statue out, then retract the wall and push the statue onto the pressure plate. You'll reveal the **Doom Book II**; open it to find the **Wolf Medal**.

Ride the lift up, and put the **Medals** on either side of the fountain. Grab the **Green** and **Red Herbs**, then ride the lift down to find the Laboratory: the final stage.

TO THE LABORATORY

The door on B1 won't open 'til much later. Go down the ladder, then cross the safe room to the stairwell: the third

RESCUING YOUR TEAMMATE

Either Chris or Jill is being held captive in a cell on the west side of Laboratory B3. You can open the door to their cellblock by finding three special codes. To get them, you must first find the three **MO Disks** in the mansion, the underground, and the laboratory, and use them on the three disc **decoders** scattered throughout the Laboratory B3.

If you don't care about rescuing Chris or Jill, go to the power room.

If you do care, visit the OR via the door near the final safe room. Take the **Shotgun Shells** and **Red Herb**. Push the crates over the gas valves on the floor. Now move the stepladder underneath the air vent to reach the morgue. Watch out for the sleeper zombies, take the **Magnum Rounds** off the shelf, and use the decoder.

Leave, then go to the study next to the cellblock. The decoder's on the desk; you can also get three bullseyes on the dartboard to open a compartment containing the **Fax** and **Magnum Rounds**.

Finally, the last decoder is in the maze leading up to the power room, directly ahead of you as you come through the second door.

MO Disk is on the desk outside the locked Visual Data Room.

Go downstairs and hang a right (your left). The first door on the left contains the **Researcher's Letter** and **Handgun Bullets**. Turn on the lights, push the bookcase and hit the switch to decode the letters on the painting.

Leave that room and this hall, then go east and into the northern room. Take the **Slides**, then use the computer. Log in as JOHN with the password ADA, then unlock the doors on B3. You'll need the password MOLE to unlock the Visual Data Room on B2.

Go back upstairs and into that very room. Use the **Slides** on the projector for an ominous slideshow, and take the **Security System** file from the corner bookcase.

Check the panel on the wall by the screen for a puzzle. If you're playing as Jill, hit the buttons in the following order: #4, #3, #1, #5, and #2. If you're Chris, hit #2, #5, #4, #1, then #3. You'll reveal the **Lab Key**.

This opens the eastern door on B3. Directly across from it is the final safe room, containing a **Green Herb**, a **Blue Herb**, and **Flame Rounds** (Jill)/**Magnum Rounds** (Chris).

IN THE POWER ROOM

In the power room, take a right as you enter and use the power computer. Draw a line between two conduits to place a circuit.

As Jill, place the circuits at the bottom between 6 and 8, and at the

bottom between 7 and 5; as Chris, place them at the bottom between 7 and 5, and at the top between 1 and 2.

Make your way to the generator room and use the computer on the side. Place the circuits at the bottom between 1 and 7, and at the bottom between 8 and 5 to reactivate the final lift. Return to the hall outside the safe room, then hit the switch next to the lift to turn it back on. Ride it down.

Whatever happens next, you'll have to contend with the Tyrant. Fortunately, it's slow. Run away from it and plug it with six Magnum rounds to knock it out. Chris will now have to open the door with the computer console.

FACING THE TYRANT

Leave it, go rescue your teammate if you desire, and return to B1. The door is now unlocked. Grab a full load of **healing items** and your **Magnum**, then head through the door and down the tunnel. Take the **Battery** and install it to power the lift, then ride it up to the helipad.

Take the **Flare** and use it in the center of the LZ to get Brad's attention. If Barry or Rebecca is still alive, you'll now have to face the Tyrant for a final time.

ENDINGS FOR THE OTHERS

Your actions determine whether Barry or Rebecca survive the game, although it's not that obvious.

AS JILL:

When you encounter Barry in the underground, either refuse to go with him or tell him to take the lead. If you want him to die, don't follow him; instead, go and talk to Enrico. Afterwards, Barry will be gone, and later in the game, after your showdown with the Tyrant, you'll find Barry dying in Laboratory B2. He'll give you **Barry's Photograph**.

AS CHRIS:

If you meet Rebecca in the infirmary and tell her to come with you, or if you save Richard Aiken, she's in no danger.

If you tell Rebecca to stay put, or if you fail to save Richard Aiken, she won't appear to help you against Plant 42. When the Hunters appear, Chris will become concerned for Rebecca. At this point, you can go to the hall outside the infirmary to find Rebecca being menaced by a Hunter. If you want to get her killed, then just leave; to ensure her survival, you'll need to kill the Hunter.

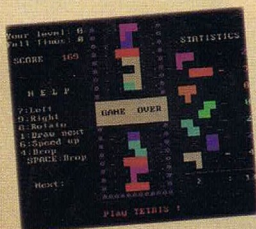

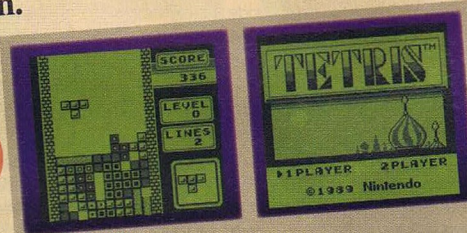
Tetris DS is getting everyone excited about bricks again. History here. Learn.



TETRIS (1985)
Created in two weeks by engineer Alexey Pazhitnov. So popular in offices that bosses destroyed discs.



TENGEN TETRIS (1989)
Original NES *Tetris* made by *Asteroids*' creator. Withdrawn after 32 days by new license-holders Nintendo.



TETRIS (1989)
The definitive *Tetris*: 40 million sold, and the black-and-white obsession that made the Game Boy an international smash. The music was later turned into a top 10 chart smash by Andrew Lloyd Webber. Yup.

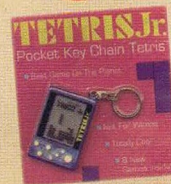


THE NEW TETRIS (1999)
Vying with the original GB version for title of 'Best *Tetris*', this N64 beauty was probably the first half-decent home version of the block-tumbler we'd seen since the NES days. No distracting backgrounds, no needless 'variations', no attempt to graft a story on (THQ, we're looking at you) - just pure brick-rotating pleasure (or pain, depending on if you were waiting for the long one).

In addition to a strange but compelling reward system that involved unlocking 'Wonders' like the Hanging Gardens of Babylon, *The New Tetris* brought one of the slap-yourself-in-the-face obvious ideas to the series: a little 'well' for storing bricks in. Rather than having to shoehorn the thin yellow fella in somewhere it wasn't welcome, you could store it and bring it out when it was Tetris Time. We haven't experienced so much coloured brick-related fun since some Blue Peter presenter knocked the head off a Lego model of a human being in 1985.

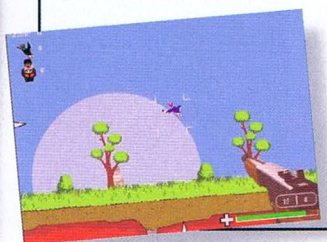

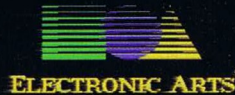

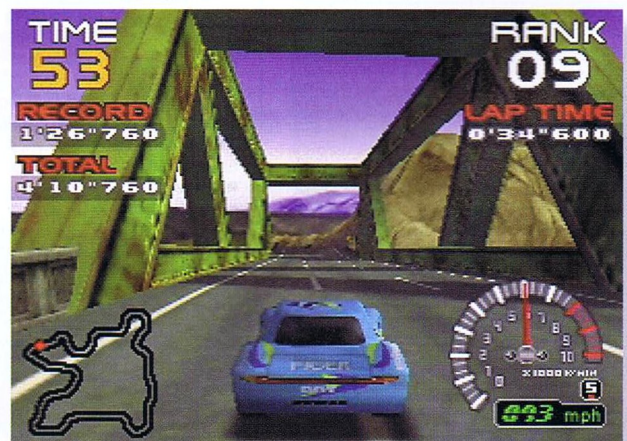
wrong way to make the corners – was expertly recreated.

Eventually, *Wave Race Blue Storm* and *1080 Avalanche*. But, at the time, NSTC was as new as a freshly-popped bairn.

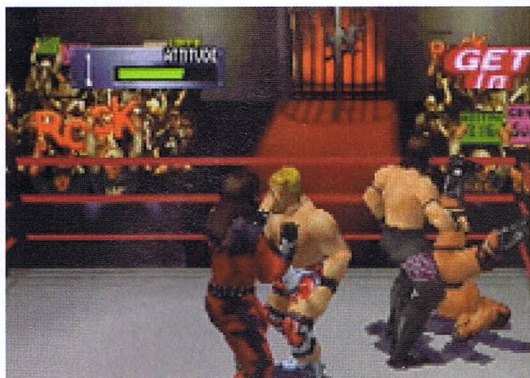

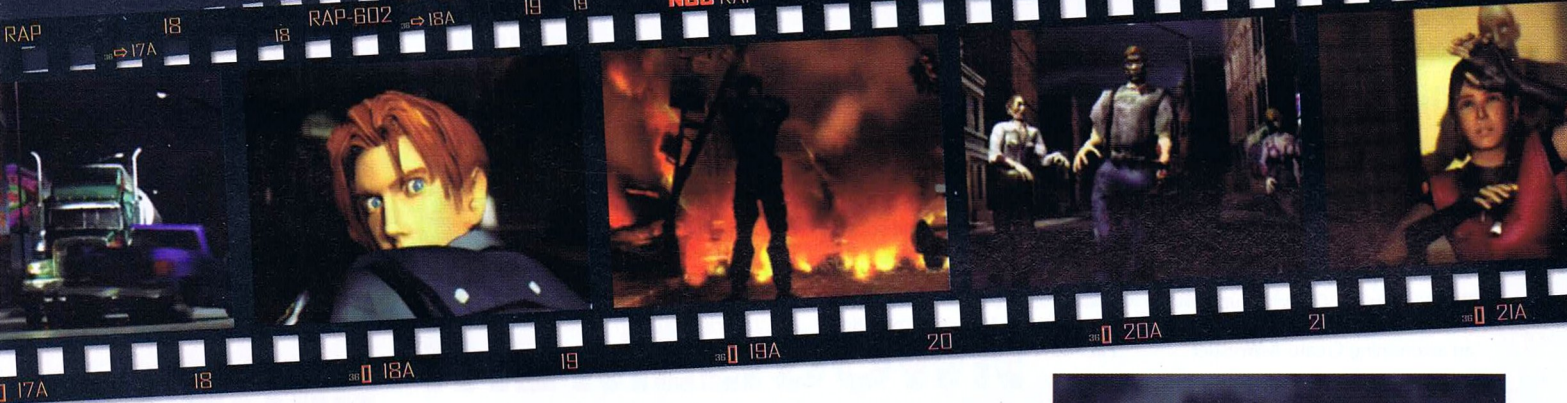

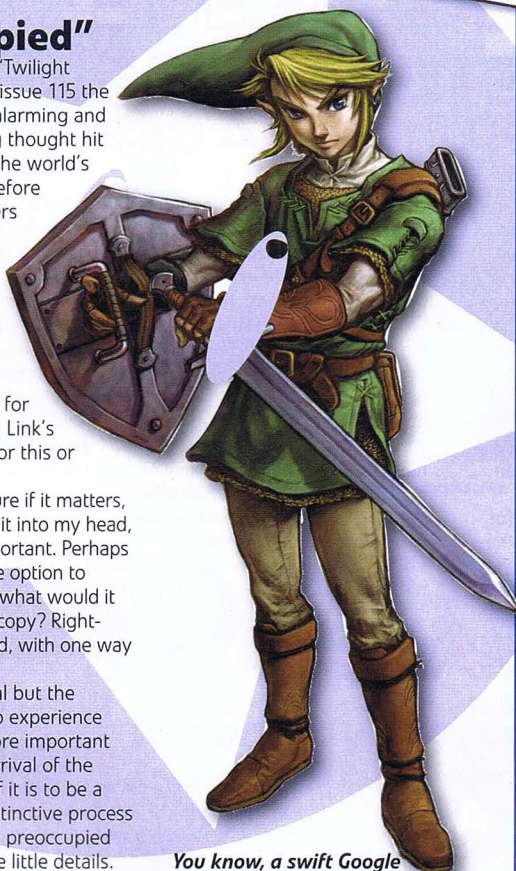
"Preoccupied"

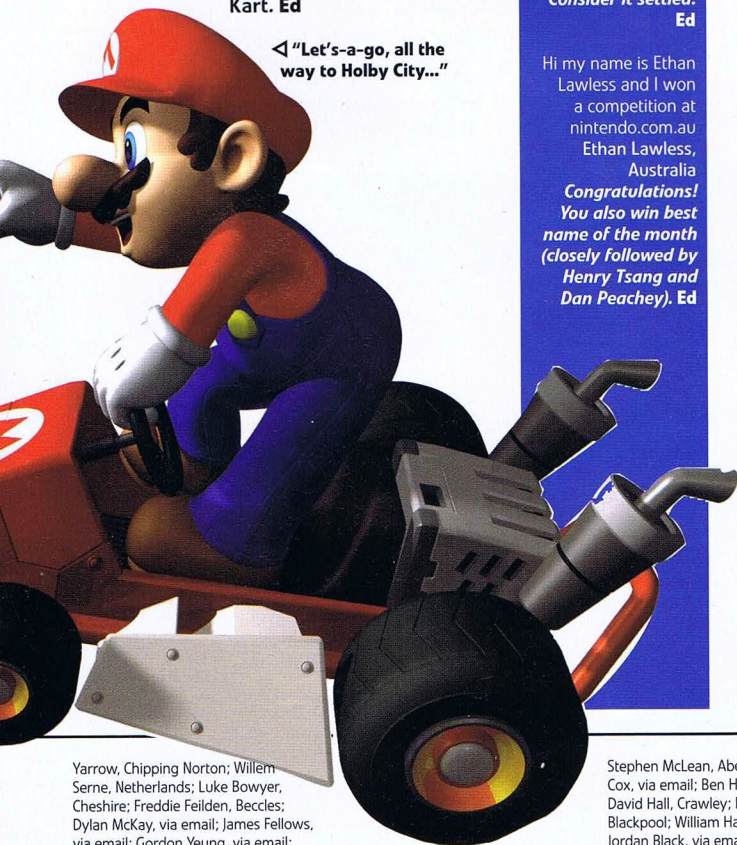

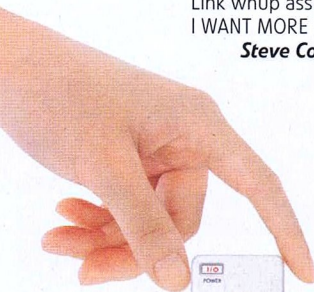

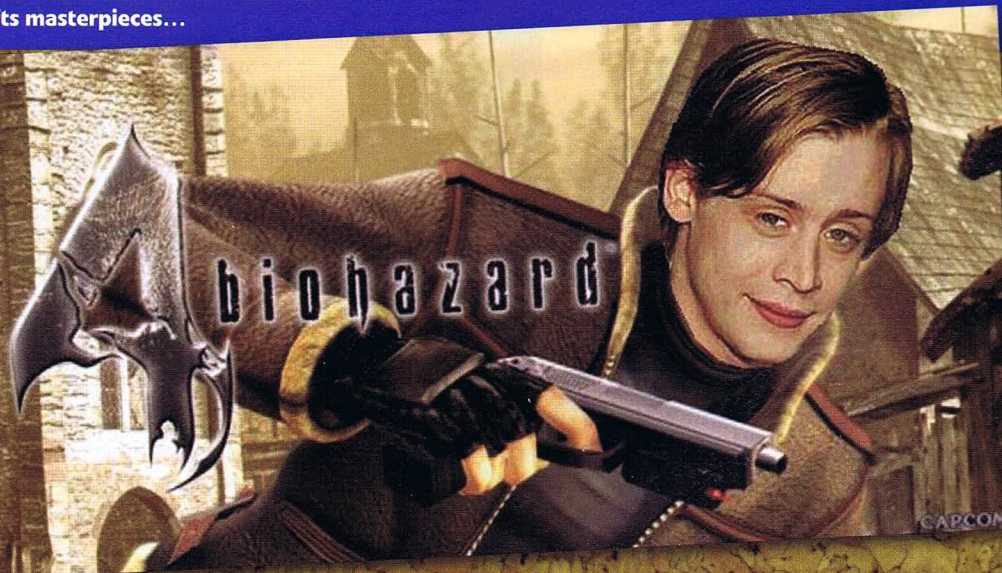

49 DEF JAM: VENDETTA 87

EA ■ NGC/82

Famous rappers get together to give wrestling games a kick up the booty. Start off as a rookie and fight your way through the likes of DMX, Redman and Ludacris, and then you'll have the pick of the ladies - though their blokes won't be too happy. Need we mention the great hip-hop soundtrack?

50 TONY HAWK'S PRO SKATER 3 87

ACTIVISION ■ NGC/67

Absolutely stinks of PS2 - go on, smell it - but it's such good fun that it doesn't really matter. You'll find masses of grinds, stunts and a huge range of locations. Come on guys, this is Tony Hawk - before he got in with Bam Margera and started clowning around in cars. You know exactly what this is like...

51 LOST KINGDOMS 2 87

ACTIVISION ■ NGC/81

Although nowhere near as good as *Zelda* and *PSO*, *Lost Kingdoms 2* is a beautiful-looking card-based RPG - statophiles are going to love building up their decks, collecting new cards to add to it and crunching numbers. It's nicely broken up into a series of small and easily digestible pieces.

52 STAR WARS ROGUE LEADER 87

LUCASARTS ■ NGC/68

Without a doubt the best *Star Wars* game on Gamecube, both in the way it looks and the way it plays. Take part in the battle of Hoth and whizz your ship down the trench to destroy the Death Star. Note that the whole thing has since been included as a two-player co-op game in *Rogue Squadron III*.

53 VIEWTIFUL JOE 2 87

CAPCOM ■ NGC/105

The original *Viewtiful Joe* wowed us all with its original mixture of 2D and 3D fighting. This instalment is more of the same in terms of gameplay, but there have been some slight tweaks, like the inclusion of Sylvia, a new playable character whose different FX powers alter the style of the puzzles.

54 BEYOND GOOD AND EVIL 86

UBISOFT ■ NGC/90

Wonderful-looking action adventure that has you finding rare animals and tackling an alien invasion. The visuals are stunning and the speech and effects make the grade too. Even the mini games are fun! The world is huge and detailed, but it's slightly easy and won't last as long as you'll want it to.

55 FINAL FANTASY: CRYSTAL CHRONICLES 86

SQUARE ■ NGC/91

Multiplayer RPG for up to four players, but each one will need a GBA and link cable, making this expensive if you're going to play it properly. The order in which you pick up spells can be a bit random and the players' shared air bubble can be claustrophobic, but all in all, this is good looking and ambitious.

56 WARIO WORLD 86

NINTENDO ■ NGC/83

Punching, pounding, portly fun. That's fun with a capital F (and U and N). The meths-swilling anti-Mario gets his very own game, and it's every bit as mad as you'd expect. Gather garlic to boost your strength and embark on a (too short) escapade that combines platforming and fighting. Wah-hah-haaaa!

Only Shigs could have come up with a real-time strategy game set in a garden. Olimar's first visit to Earth is a resource-management revelation. You have 100 Pikmin to carry out your commands as you try to rebuild your ship before you run out of air. It looks as wonderful as it plays, but it's just too short.

60 XIII 86

UBISOFT ■ NGC/88

Unusual graphics, cel-shaded characters and scenes, plus comic-style effects (there are guns that literally go 'bam'...) set this FPS apart from the gun-toting crowd. Your sixth sense and a bit of stealth help to vary the pace, and when that's all over there's a great Multiplayer mode.

61 POKÉMON XD: GALE OF DARKNESS 86

NINTENDO ■ NGC/113

Pokémon XD is all about 'snagging', which basically means filling your Pokédex with 'mon that have been sneakily snatched from other trainers during battle. It sounds simple, but the strategic combat is as addictive as ever and beautifully realised, making this a must for Pokémon fans.

62 NFL 2K3 86

SEGA ■ NGC/79

Possibly not as much fun as *Madden*, owing to the amount of work you have to put in to get your 11 bruisers playing together effectively. However, the enormous franchise mode and great sound and graphics make this a decent enough game of American football, if a tad out of date.

Underneath the polished EA Sports surface lies the expected, impressively deep layer of substance. The licensed music and players are supported by a strong bedrock of stats, facts and character creation tools. Overall control has been improved and you've got more offensive options too. It's soulless but slick.

65 RESIDENT EVIL ZERO 85

CAPCOM ■ NGC/78

Controlling two characters (Rebecca and Billy), you shoot your way through the usual hordes of zombies and monsters, solving puzzles to progress. Great cutscenes and in-game visuals mean this looks a treat, and it's got bags of the old *Res* atmosphere (a coppery, bloody, fear-filled atmosphere then...).

66 MARIO GOLF TOADSTOOL TOUR 85

NINTENDO ■ NGC/95

For a *Mario* game, there's a surprising lack of Ninety in many of the courses - it's just not as wacky as we'd like. And there's plenty of room for sensible in, say, *Tiger Woods*. That aside, it's easy to pick up the controls and the graphics are crisp and shiny. Plenty of modes and unlockables add longevity.

67 IKARUGA 85

ATARI ■ NGC/80

Its toughness is the stuff of legend, even on the Easy setting. Your little spaceship fires white and black projectiles, and you have to hit the black and white nasties with their opposite colour. There are only five of the well-designed levels, but it will take you a while to see them all. A splendid space crusade.

EA ■ NGC/87

Continuing the healthy rivalry between *FIFA* and *Pro Evo*, *FIFA 2004* is the best football sim you can get on Gamecube (unless you import *Winning Eleven* from Japan), with around 400 licensed, face-scanned players, teams and stadia for the ultimate in realism. The free kick system has been tweaked, and the corner kicks are menu-driven. It's all here in a beautiful version of the beautiful game.

69 EXTREME G 3 85

ACCLAIM ■ NGC/67

This is an underrated gem. It's very, very fast, the tracks are huge and well-designed, the bikes are cool and the inventive weapons are stunning to use. This time there's an upgrade system too, with bike and weapon enhancements available, and this adds a much-needed tactical element to the game.

70 SPLINTER CELL: CHAOS THEORY 84

UBISOFT ■ NGC/106

This was the game that was supposed to give the *Splinter Cell* series a kick up the arse. Unfortunately, that didn't happen. What did happen was a thorough spit and polish job - for example, the levels are no longer linear - and as a result it feels much fresher. The addition of a co-op mode is also very welcome.

74 POKÉMON COLOSSEUM 84

NINTENDO ■ NGC/93

The Pokémon series gains an RPG! Your task is to save the Shadow Pokémon from Darkness and destroy the powers of the people corrupting the poor critters. There's an awful lot of fighting here and you'll need a GBA Pokémon game to get the most out of Colosseum mode, but if you're a fan, you'll love it.

75 TALES OF SYMPHONIA 84

NAMCO ■ NGC/100

This is very much a traditional RPG, and a very good-looking one at that. The characters are beautifully designed and the locations are all, without exception, stunning. The only downer in the visual stakes is the relatively ugly overworld. The rubbish, clichéd dialogue will have you gnawing your arm off, too.

76 RAYMAN 3: HOODLUM HAVOC 84

UBISOFT ■ NGC/78

Rayman somehow manages to create a fun platformer, despite the fact that he seems to be stuck in an age when this kind of thing was revolutionary. However, it's bright, it's solid and it's got some enjoyable mini games. It doesn't get boring and the difficulty curve is scaled just right.

77 ISS2 83

80 BATEN KAITOS 83

NAMCO ■ NGC/103

Role-playing adventure with card-based battles. This game is unique and delivers a wonderful, magical and fantastical world – the stunning vistas, towns and interiors are awash with lavish colours. Even the card system works well. Unfortunately, it's let down by some stilted and painfully wooden voice acting.

This is a new idea and a new direction for *PSO* card-based battling. You now have to choose a side (the Arkz or the Heroside) and do battle with dice and cards. It's best if you're familiar with the original *PSO* though and, unfortunately, you'll need a broadband adapter to play this.

88 SSX ON TOUR 82

EA ■ NGC/114

More downhill slick tricks and stunts, in the same vein as *SSX 3*. This time you can speed down the slopes on skis, and there are over 100 tough challenges for you to complete. It's demanding, enjoyable and satisfying, but it won't give fans of the series anything new.

89 THE SIMS: BUSTIN' OUT 82

EA ■ NGC/89

Having spent the previous game imprisoned in their own home, this instalment sees your virtual people released into the real world to work. It still doesn't exactly look brilliant or sound that great, but as with all games that have no absolute goal or plot, it will last you for a very, very long time indeed.

90 NFL STREET 2 81

EA ■ NGC/103

This game tears up the rulebook and gives you licence to run like hell, boasting a new ability that lets you run around the walls, *Prince of Persia*-style, to gain height when catching or passing a human pile-up. A quality package, though probably without mass appeal outside the US.

This game is nothing short of a bargain. Although the graphics haven't been updated, that doesn't mean the gameplay isn't up to scratch. This version has tougher dungeons and different puzzles from the original *OOT*. Forget the graphics (it's an old game) and immerse yourself in Rinkydink's earlier outing.

92 TIGER WOODS 06 81

EA ■ NGC/112

Tiger Woods's almost perfect swing system has had a few tweaks for 2006. The ball is now controlled by the C-stick and putting is now on the analogue stick. Despite being tricky to get used to, the classic *Tiger Woods* gameplay remains intact, making this one of the best golf sims available.

93 TONY HAWK'S AMERICAN WASTELAND 81

ACTIVISION ■ NGC/114

Skate fans can kiss goodbye to their social lives when they get their hands on this massive, sprawling game. There are loads of missions to complete, an optional BMX to try, a vast Los Angeles-themed skatepark, and no loading screens to distract you from your grinding.

94 AGGRESSIVE INLINE 81

ACCLAIM ■ NGC/72

A top-class rollerblading sim. Having wheels that stay attached to your feet when they're off the floor means you can pull off moves like swinging around lampposts. There's even a Career mode. On the negative side, the soundtrack is rubbish and the graphics are a little bland.

95 THE SIMS 81

EA ■ NGC/79

Your Sim has to do all the things a real person would: leave home, make friends, find a partner, eat, sleep and go to the lav. Yet it's all done in a bizarrely addictive way. There's no point to it and there are no objectives, but that's life for you – entirely meaningless, but you want to keep doing it anyway.

96 F1 CAREER CHALLENGE 81

EA ■ NGC/83

Ever wanted to indulge in the life of an F1 driver? Now you can. This is part of EA's *F1* series, but with the addition of an extensive Career mode. There's a series of trials to prove you can handle the *F1* disciplines, then you can get on with the racing part, which looks good, shifts well and handles nicely.

97 NHL 2005 80

EA ■ NGC/99

This is a slick, quick game of hockey. The action's quick and the AI and graphics have been improved. However, if you dislike the sport, there simply won't be enough here to convince you that it's worthwhile. For the fans, though, it's easy to learn and you can rack up huge scores. Good fun.

98 CALL OF DUTY 2: BIG RED ONE 80

ACTIVISION ■ NGC/114

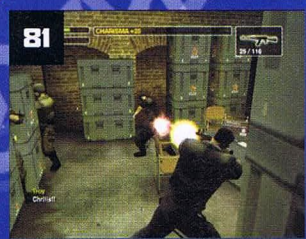

The result was a remarkably in-depth and well-presented version of virtual soccer. Along with the correct names and kit, the movement of the players and flow of the game are vastly improved.

83 SPARTAN: TOTAL WARRIOR 82

SEGA ■ NGC/112

You take control of Spartan, a conveniently named Spartan warrior, as he sets out to dismember every single Roman in the world. With up to 200 people on-screen at any given time, this is hectic, violent and bloody, and just how war should be. With historical accuracy put to one side, this is great fun.

84 TONY HAWK'S UNDERGROUND 2 82

ACTIVISION ■ NGC/100

This time the graphics have a more cartoony feel, and Story mode unfortunately features a lot of Bam Margera, so if you find him annoying, there's a good chance you won't like this. The rest is great, keeping the classic *Tony Hawk* gameplay and including parts of the first three games – with a timer!

85 SUPER MONKEY BALL 2 82

SEGA ■ NGC/78

If games teach you one thing, it's this: out of balls, monkeys probably carry guns and want you dead. Inside balls, however (a monkey's natural habitat), the little creatures are an absolute delight. The format is the same as the first in the series, and there are new mini games and over 100 levels.

86 METAL ARMS: GLITCH IN THE SYSTEM 82

VIVENDI ■ NGC/88

As hard as Ray Winstone in a steel top hat, this robot shoot-'em-up is tough right from the training level.
