BRINGING YOU NEWS FIRST



Iwata promises diversity, disruption and low cost downloads via Virtual Console.



atoru Iwata, President Of Nintendo has confirmed that more than one thousand games from the Sega Mega Drive and the NEC Turbo Grafx systems will ready to download

on Revolution's Virtual Console. Speaking to an audience of fellow developers, publishers and the media at the Game Developers Conference, he confirmed what many had suspected for some time - that the Virtual Console would cherry pick more than just the best retro games from Nintendo's own NES, SNES and N64 back catalogue.

This list of titles to be offered has yet to be revealed but he did say it would be more a "best of" selection taken from both machines. Going on to call the service "the video game version of Apple's iTunes music store" lwata-san also hinted that while the "future Zeldas and Marios and Metroids are going to be bigger

masterpieces than ever before" the Virtual Console would also promote innovative software, keeping costs for developers as low as possible.

Sega for their part in the deal will be hoping that getting their back catalogue onto Revolution will introduce more gamers to their long and largely distinguished history, even reinvigorating a few forgotten faces perhaps in time for a next-gen revival. Touchable Ecco The Dolphin anyone?

While pre-show speculation had focused on the expected revelation of the final name for the nextgeneration console, lwata was keeping his card close to his polonecked chest. Instead he talked about Brain Training, soft drinks and how Nintendo are promising to 'disrupt' the console market with their quest for innovative gameplay, and not just graphical power.

But at least the Revolution

machine itself, on show in a nearby case, was giving away a few more secrets. Looking slightly thicker than previously seen, it was also missing the mysterious rear port that had appeared in the plans submitted on the patent. No formal specs were released, but it seems increasingly likely that Revolution will be basically an enhanced Gamecube - Hollywood and Broadway, the GPU and CPU of the new machine, are said to be faster versions of Gamecube's Flipper and Gekko chips. Judging by the screens we've seen (sorry, but we'd be kicked in the 'nads if we printed

them) which look very much like GC games, this seems to be the case. Here's hoping Rev's gameplay renders graphical comparisons with PS3 irrelevant.

e knew a DS Zelda was on the cards, but we had no idea it would look – brilliantly! – like The

Wind Waker. Unveiled by Satoru Iwata

at the Games Developers Conference in March, it's going to be out this year, and looks set to use the DS to its fullest advantage. We've no idea what the story might be about – could it be a sequel to Wind Waker? The graphical style is certainly the same, and it features sailing. Here's what we know so far, from the footage that was shown...

A Sailor's Life For Me

Looks like there's lots of sailing and islands involved, giving credence to the theory that this is linked to Wind Waker. But please, Nintendo, no Triforce quest this time. Or, at least, make it shorter.



△ When you're at sea you can, again, put the map on the touch screen and draw the route that you want your boat to take.





△ Once your ship is on its way, the map moves to the top screen, and you'll follow the boat in real-time.

Map Mania!

The game map is shown on the top screen – amazingly, it appears that you can drag it down to the touch screen, and with the stylus, annotate it to help you with puzzles and monsters.

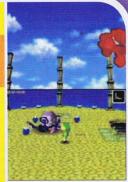

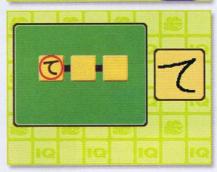

nable to make up its mind, Second Sight is a poor amalgamation of a shooter and a stealth game. However, where other titles (such as

Metal Gear Solid) have succeeded, Second Sight makes a hash at both genres.

The stealth sections are badly designed and unforgiving, needing pinpoint precision to navigate in the manner intended but hampered by the two poor camera choices and twitchy controls

The archaic implementation of the psi-powers feels rigid and unresponsive. You need only to look at Psi Ops (a game released at the same time, though sadly not on the Gamecube) to see how fluid and intuitive the controls could have been. Instead, simple object movement becomes confusing and awkward.

The much heralded plot is actually nothing special. Changing present events via past scenarios is neither original nor creative, I wonder if those who think it's 'teh b3st St0rY ev@!!11!' have ever picked up a book?

Second Sight was supposed to be a triumphant break from the norm for Free Radical. I can't help but think that unless they markedly improve on this distinctly average attempt, their efforts would be better focused on another Timesplitters game.

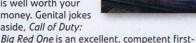

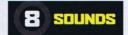

HOW TO WRITE A REVIEW!

Whether you disagree with something our resident writer-snooglers have said, or whether you simply want to tell the world how much you love a game, you've got your chance here (see below for address). You never know, we may even print your carefully considered thoughts right here in black and white and some colour. For anyone who's a little uncertain about putting fingertips to keyboard, here are some Do's and Don'ts to help you out...

- Remember that, ultimately, you're telling the reader whether the game is worth their valuable money
- Double check your copy for correct grammar, spelling mistakes, and so on. Exdellent English is a must.
- Justify and explain all your criticisms. Why is the game poor? Tell us exactly why it's not good, if that's the case.
- Be enthusiastic and passionate. Games are brilliant! And if they're not, you can still be passionate about telling us why that is.
- Pick out a favourite review from NGC and analyse it; why is it a good

- review? What does it do that makes it successful? Does it get you excited about the game, or tell you exactly why it stinks?
- Think about what you want from a review. If you were a reader (which, er, you are), what do you expect from an NGC review? Try to reflect this.
- Remember that games usually loosely fall into a particular genre; if the game's a Zelda-style adventure, how does it stack up against, say, Wind Waker? You don't need to talk about this, but it will help you conclude how good or bad the game is.

- Don't use clichés, eg, "If you like bananas, you'll love this", or "it's got great graphics", or "war? What is it good for?"
- A little creative license is good, but try not to use rubbish non-existent words like 'addicting' or 'lastability'.
- Humour is great, but don't use it to the exclusion of useful criticism. Cheap gags are no substitute for cold, hard knowledge.
- Remember that people want to read about the game, not about you. Avoid saying 'I' and what you had for breakfast.
- Don't waffle on for ages. Make your sentences as short, manageable and to-the-point as possible.
- Don't divide your review into categories; it's easy to talk about the graphics, and then the sound, and then the gameplay. How does the game make you feel? This is much more important than robotically talking about visuals and lifespan. Focus on the good points and the bad points.
- Remember that if something's unique, it's literally one-of-a-kind. There's no 'quite unique' or 'sufficiently unique' (a pet hate from Mr Cooke).

As such, despite a single-player game that mostly (more on that portentous 'mostly' in a moment) holds true to

about exploration, this is as close to Quake as it's possible to get. And on a handheld, no less.

It's a remarkable technical achievement, and at times we could barely believe that it was running on a handheld console. For the most part it's smooth and slick, the only barriers to full enjoyment being the discomfort of holding the DS for an extended period of time, and the inevitable wrist cramp that comes from pushing the stylus all over the place with one hand, and supporting the DS and using the buttons with the other.

In fact, for all the technical genius of the control system, there's something not quite perfect about it. Mainly it's the

aforementioned discomfort. Then again, you can use the thumb strap instead of the stylus, but if your hands aren't big enough that proves to be equally as painful in the long term. In fact, for the extended play that reviewing the game demanded, we found that using the D-pad in order to look was a perfectly adequate solution. It's not as precise or quick as using the stylus or thumb strap, but it works well enough. Having said that, though, we reckon using the D-pad in online games is going to be virtual suicide. It's too clumsy a tool to tackle the deathmatch elite, once they've mastered the game. But for the single player game, where the CPU-controlled beasties

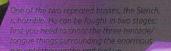

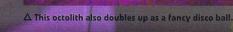

spikes. The first half of the game offers both a battle with a rival bounty hunter and a boss encounter on each world. On the icy Arcterra, once you've killed the boss, a countdown begins; before you can get to the safety of your ship, you'll have to fight the insectoid Trace, followed by a final encounter with some gun-happy Guardians. It's no exaggeration to say that at this point the game almost went out of the window. It's a hard, unforgiving and unfair sequence that feels cheap and lazy. For the most part, however, we thoroughly enjoyed Samus' first 3D handheld jaunt and, while it can't compete with the splendour of Prime or

Echoes' single-player efforts, and is quite repetitive at times, it's still very absorbing.

But it's the multiplayer that'll keep you coming back. It's *brilliant*, and online options

offers online options and depth that *Mario Kart DS*, as magnificent as it is, simply doesn't. The combination of the various game modes, arenas and hunters – who all have their strengths and weaknesses due to their alternative forms – makes this as complete a package as we could have hoped for. have access to all modes and levels if you're playing with Friends (the same goes for between-game voice chat). If you're playing strangers, you only get a straight-up deathmatch... which is disappointing.

This aside, however, it's ace. The various modes all offer distinct twists to the gameplay – one of our favourites is Bounty, a free-for-all ruck to grab a single Octolith – and the option for team games means there's a wealth of permutations for face-shooting fun. It's here that the *Quake* influence becomes really apparent – specifically, *Quake III Arena*. There's a good proportion of bounce pads to fling you to higher levels, and a few levels that couple

these with low-gravity areas and deadly drops into outer space. But while the influence is glaringly obvious, it works, and it works brilliantly. The controls are superb, the action (mostly) fluid and smooth, the weapons balanced, and the arenas wonderfully designed. Some of the hunters are certainly more useful than others in a given scenario -Weavel's ability to turn his legs into a gun turret while his torso wanders around separately give him an advantage in the Defend scenario, for instance - but they all

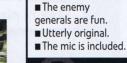

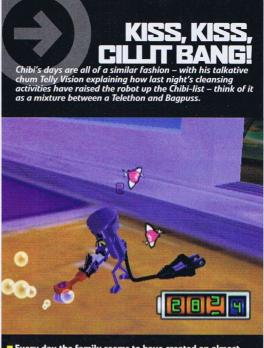

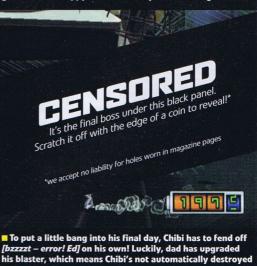

with El Chibirino's delightful animation that almost make even the most mundane jobs worth persisting with.

This Mr Sheen of delight also insulates you against the game's little failings. Charmed by Chibi, you'll forgive the camera showing you the inside of a lampshade rather than our hero shinning up a flex. You'll claim it doesn't really matter because you have plenty of time to adjust the angle with the Cstick. You probably won't mind the slowly scrolling dialogue as there has been real care lavished on the lines - particularly for the Buzz Lightyear-alike, Space Hunter Drake Redcrest. Anyway, why would your eyes notice that the most of the backdrops are slightly bland and the character models chunky when

the soapy story is nourishing your very soul?

However, most of *Chibi-Robol's* more noticeable problems actually stem from its greatest strengths: the scale of our hero, the day/ night cycle and the open-ended gameplay. 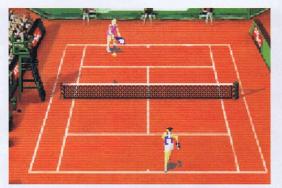

Our first hour with Top Spin 2 left us incredulous and pretty much pointless. We took it to people who are better than us at gaming, in the hope that some genius would be

ignored by the computer... That's special.

There seems to be a brief window of opportunity for activating the shot animation. Press the button too early or too late and absolutely nothing happens - there's no visual feedback to let you know the computer

understood your instructions or why it opted to disregard them. Finding the sweet spot is down to good old trial and error, and is made no easier by the slightly jerky graphics.

It could be that our trouble with Top Spin 2 stems from its hardcore difficulty level, because on the rare occasions we did manage to get 'in the zone' there were some decent moments. But you shouldn't have to wrestle with a game in order to squeeze a little fun out of it. For 30 quid, it's not unreasonable to expect some proper entertainment. Yes, it's only a GBA, but if Mario Tennis can be immediately accessible and still provide players with a long-term challenge using the same tools, there's no excuse for the likes of Top Spin 2.

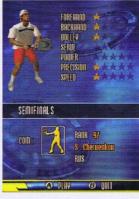

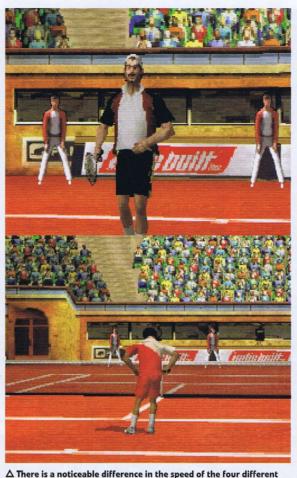

ecoming addicted usually involves some kind of intense joy, a dizzying high or

an inflated sense of self worth. There has to be an 'up' before the 'down' comes. Not with *Top Spin 2*, however. Its habit-forming hook comes from the way it grinds you buttons. Press any one and run towards the ball, and your player will lob, stroke, backhand or smash it to your opponent automatically.

But, in order to earn points, you'll need to draw your opponent into the net, or bounce a passing shot down the line, and that demands real precision. Instead of

into the clay, chafes your knees on the concrete and kicks clods of grass in your face, singing "I'm better than Federer/Ner-ner-naner-nerrr."

It's hard to win. It's not hard to rally, run, volley or serve – just hard to win. All you need to get the ball across the net are the four face timing the button presses for when the ball reaches your racquet, this impressively realistic game demands that you watch a rising power bar and add D-pad direction to the stroke. It's a skill that can be tricky enough to master in the heat of a tiebreaker, but one that is made even more difficult by the game's refusal to include any training levels or tuition beyond a few novelty options.

It isn't the complexity of the stroke selection that fails this game. In fact, the high demands on your dexterity imbue every set-winning success with a feeling of elation, and even single point gains make you sigh with satisfaction. But what these fleeting moments of delight don't mask is just how thin the options are. Apart from the decent Exhibition or Career modes, there is almost nothing else to stop you feeling frustrated by your inability to replicate those incredibly elegant drop-shots with the robotic precision the game requires.

Top Spin 2 is a rewarding, challenging and compelling sim, but once you come off the grass, it can be as punishingly serious and uncharismatic as an Andrew Murray interview.

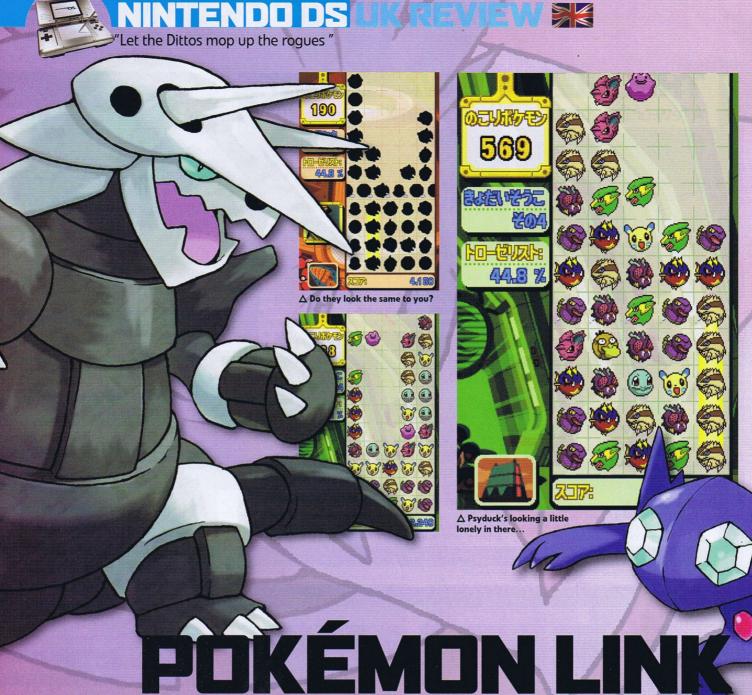

n contrast to their ease of play, explaining the rules of a puzzle game is usually akin to debating the causes of World War One through the medium of dance. But not with *Pokémon Link*, for this *Puzzle League*-alike has less twists and turns in it than the Second Battle of Ypres. And yet this very simplicity is also the game's greatest weakness.

In Link, a number of amputated Pokémon faces are poured into a jar and, by sliding the vertical columns and rows of creatures around, you are expected to create four-long lines of matching 'Mon, which then disappear. But here is the twist: reaching this vanishing point triggers a mode known as Link Chance which allows you to

temporarily clear lines of three. And if you can create and clear one of those, you'll then get the chance to purge the screen of lines a mere two faces long.

While crafting these chains boosts your score somewhere into the stratosphere or beyond, you only have about two seconds to shuffle this Poké-marmalade about and create a new line before the mode ends and the jar is topped up again. And as you master this skill, *Link* makes a demanding diversion, dragging and slapping the creatures about, allowing you to concentrate on creating chains rather than merely surviving.

But this addiction is ephemeral because there isn't anything more to see or suss out. Okay, so a few bosses crop up to provide a nasty

"Large number of gameplay altering glitches"

What did you play? Here's our guide to the changes made to games after their release.

id you know that there are in fact six different versions of the sublime *Metroid Prime* on shelves around the world? Or that Capcom made major alterations to *Resident Evil 4* after it was originally released?

It's not uncommon that even after slaving away for years on their gaming masterpieces, Nintendo makes late changes, long after the product is on the shelves.

But why would anyone bother when they could just as easily be enjoying the spoils of their hard work? From an endless, Lucas-style quest for perfection, to the legal implications of offending German sensibilities with graphic scenes of Goomba-killing, a variety of factors dictate whether a developer is going to spend the time and effort to edit a finished game.

All differences mentioned are in comparison to the UK versions, and while games like *Wind Waker* and *Mario Sunshine* have also undergone tweaking, we kind of ran out of steam after playing through the entire output of those retcon specialists at Retro. Enjoy!





METROID PRIME

Over 50 alterations were made to *Metroid Prime* after its original US launch in 2002. While no official reason has been given by Retro or Nintendo for these changes, **NGC** has it on very good authority that they were joint decisions by both Retro and Nintendo, in a bid to correct crashes and a large number of gameplay altering glitches that many hardcore *Metroid Prime* fans were constantly abusing. The most notable changes include:

The Geo Thermal Core – home to the game's most significant alterations. The original American release allows you to skip the Spiderball and Grapple Beam easily and has no Bendezium blocking the door to the Plasma Beam. The USA Player's Choice release had an unbreakable lock added that could only be removed once the Grapple Beam was collected.

The Japanese version also has the stalagmite near the door removed (as this was as a stepping stone to reach the spinners without the Grapple Beam).

The room holding the Grapple Beam also felt the pinch, as the Bendezium blocking access to it isn't there in the USA versions. Also, the Grapple Beam animation is significantly different in the original and Player's Choice USA releases.

Magmoor Caverns and Phendrana drifts are known as 'Lava Caves' and 'Ice Valley' respectively in the Japanese version, and the male narrator introduces each new world.

The incredibly rare Korean version has its own special 'feature'. If you happen to have an American Metroid Prime save file on the memory card, it will 'speed read' the data on it and will permanently corrupt the file, leading to many

crazy and ridiculous things happening in the game. These things include adding new enemies to rooms (such as an Elite Pirate in Phendrana!), removing enemies from rooms (such as Thardus), removing major items (such as the Grapple Beam, Thermal Visor and Spiderball) and removing vital scan points, preventing you from ever finishing the game!



METROID PRIME 2: (DARK) ECHOES

There are two known differences between the American and European versions of *Metroid Prime 2: Echoes,* the first one being that the Ghetto Jump for Early Seekers was removed. The second is that an Ing Cache was removed from venomous pond, designed to prevent you from reaching Chykka without the Grapple Beam. The American and Australian versions of *Metroid Prime 2* also came with a reflective cover, which wasn't used in Europe.

The Japanese version, however, has had the most alterations to it (which includes the two mentioned above), the most significant being the name change. Known as *Metroid Prime 2: Dark Echoes* in Japan, it has had a large number of the tricks and glitches removed (eg the Jump Guardian trick, as seen in **NGC** issues 103/104) in an effort to force players through the game's intended route. Retro also made the jingle played when collecting a key in the Dark World sound more sinister.

RESIDENT EVIL 4

After the American release of *Resident Evil 4*, Capcom set about making a number of alterations to it for the European market. Such changes include correcting the lack of an Easy mode in the American version and the decrease in money pickups (both size and frequency) which made it slower to upgrade weapons. Ammo pickups remain higher in the USA version, though. Also, more than one First Aid spray can be carried at once, but they cost double the price at 10,000 ptas. And if you dump the El Gigante into the molten magma, exit and return to the room, the 15,000 ptas

Then there's also the German version of *Resident Evil 4*, which has some major elements of the game removed in a bid to comply with Germany's 'Youth Protection Law'. Both Assignment Ada and the fantastic Mercenaries minigames cannot be accessed, meaning that the Chicago Typewriter and the Handcannon are also unavailable to use in the game.

- 5. Chrono Triggernometry. Epic triangle-based RPG from Square (of the hypotenuse) Soft.

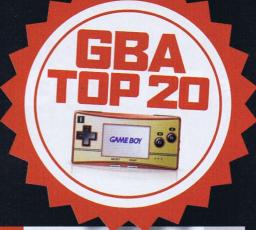

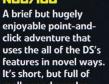

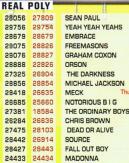
