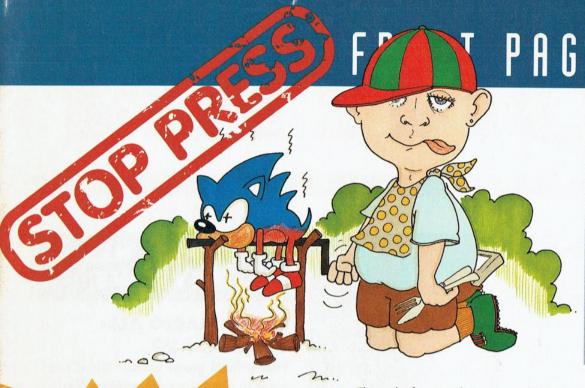

NINTENDO UNVEILS 64-BIT, 3D CONSOLE!

JUST WHEN THE CD RUMOUR MILL WAS BEGINNING TO PEAK, NINTENDO HAS BLOWN EVERYBODY'S EXPECTATIONS OUT OF THE WATER WITH THE NEWS THAT IT WILL BE DEVELOPING A 3D, 64-BIT CONSOLE BASED ON REALITY IMMERSION TECHNOLOGY WITH VISUAL COMPUTING WHIZZES, SILICON GRAPHICS (THE PEOPLE BEHIND THE ACE VISUALS IN MOVIES LIKE JURASSIC PARK AND TERMINATOR 2.)

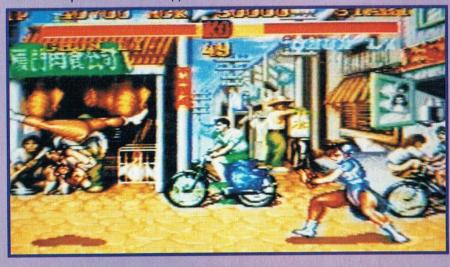
SFII TURBO TEN STAR CHEAT!

HES. Like a Volvo, the Tank is big, strong, practical, functional and erm... square. But while you can't play Street Fighter II with a Volvo, you can with

the Tank, and you can play any other game with it, too. The direction stick is firm, yet springy, and fits perfectly in your hand. (Ooo-err!!) The buttons are the same as you would find on a

good arcade machine,



and can certainly take a beating, as anyone who has seen Rod lose his cool after being whipped on Street Fighter II will testify. Also subjected to the rigours that our grubby mitts can dish out are the SN Programpads, or Digital Action Learning Systems, available in joypad and joystick form. As well as auto-fire and slo-mo, these 'pads have three extra buttons with

30 pre-programmed special moves for Street Fighter II and

Fatal Fury (you only have to press one button to get the moves out, and there is room to program in your own moves as well). You will have to read the user manual to get the most out of your SN Programpads. Basically, these are perfect for any inept baboons unable to learn the special moves in fighting games.

Another joypad we felt compelled to try was the oddly





pad has all the usual auto-fire and slo-mo options, and is also see-through. It looks quite cool, with all its electrical innards clearly viewable. There is also a knob-type thingy sticking out of the direction pad, and this gives more precise control, especially in Street Fighter II. Best of all, are a couple of fortune cookie type messages printed on the back of the circuit board, — 'Use this Owl Pad' on one side, and on the other 'You will be a winner' Hmm... That should instill a dose of confidence in you.

The bleeding thumb syndrome (ie, we've spent too much time playing SFII Turbo).

To remedy this situation, we've put together a few short reviews and overviews of games that are in the shops as you read this.

SUPER SWIV

- By Storm

After a rock-hard two player shooter? Well, look no further, for Super SWIV has arrived. And rock-hard it most certainly is! Wave upon wave of enemy attack craft mercilessly launch themselves upon your jeep or chopper, and the bosses seem to take months to die!

The graphics are big and well drawn, and the sprites move around very smoothly. The music is nothing special, and neither are the effects. While the action is fast

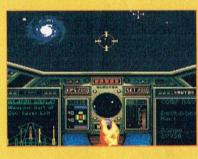


and furious, it's all rather repetitive. So while Super SWIV will take most players ages to finish, some people might become a bit sick of it

after a while.

WING COMMANDER

You are a young recruit in the 27th century war between Earth and the Kilrathi and must fly in a series of missions against the Kilrathi's best as a part of Terran's elite space combat force.

Those who are familiar with Wing Commander on PC will

probably be quite excited to learn of its arrival on the Super NES, but, unfortunately, things seem to have gone astray during the translation. The graphics are very close, and the animation sequences are great, but the 3D space action is

rough and jerky. The music has an atmospheric military feel to it, but the effects come across as being a little too weedy. Cap it all off with a lack of action and a complicated control method and that puts Wing Commander in the 'also ran' category.

GADS

Gods is an old Amiga platform game that casts the player as a gladiator-type hero and, not surprisingly, is set in ancient Greece. You find yourself in a demon-infested city and, to escape ,you must kill a huge number of monsters for the viewing pleasure of the Gods, who put you there in the first place.

Yes, all the usual boring platform elements are there, and the graphics and sound are nothing to get worked up over. Not only that, but control of the main character can be frustrating at times (especially when trying to climb up a ladder)

Surely Sthe majority of Mario fans know his success story by heart. But for those who don't, here's a brief re-cap. In 1977 Nintendo hired Sigery Miyamoto as an apprentice in their planning department.

However, it soon became apparent that Sigeru's talent lay in designing video games. By 1981 he had produced the **Donkey Kong coin-op featuring** an anonymous carpenter dressed in red overalls and sporting the largest of noses.

His task was to rescue a girl named Pauline from the clutches of a gorilla named Kong.

After a brief outing on Nintendo's 'Game and Watches' this carpenter went through some development at the hands of Miyamoto. He was renamed Mario, given a skinny brother called Luigi and, in 1985, was placed in the starring role of a game entitled Super Mario Brothers - the flagship game for Nintendo's home entertainment

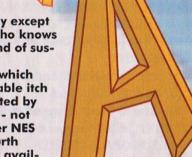
system. By some stroke of genius the brothers set out as plumbers and not carpenters, a profession which has subsequently given rise to all kinds of intriguing possibilities. Tree stumps give nothing away except perhaps their age, but who knows what awaits at the far end of suspicious-looking pipes?

It is Mushroom Land which beckons this moustachioed Italian and his incurable itch for adventure! Time and again Mario, ably assisted by Luigi, rush to the aid of the Mushroom Kingdom - not knowing what they might find there. Sadly, Super NES owning devotees currently have only Mario's fourth adventure to play as the previous three are only available for the 8-bit NES. Yet Mario's 16-bit, revitalised

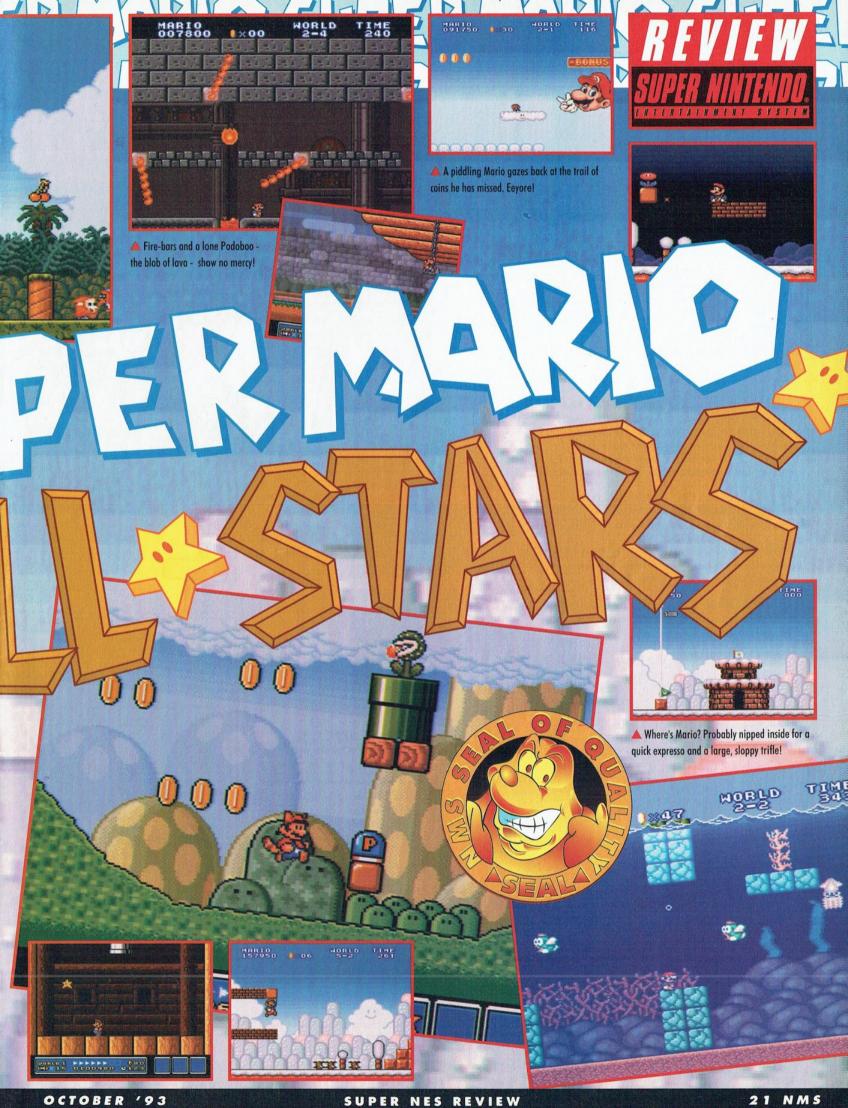

1-Up Mushroom: Mario gains an extra life each time he discovers one of these.

Fire Flower: With the exception of Super Mario World II, these flowers bestow Mario with a fireball-throwing ability.

Star-Man: Star-Man is of great help as he offers Mario complete invulnerability for a brief period of time.









This is where it all started and the time when Bowser, a powerful sorcerer, begins his Mushroom Kingdom takeover plan. Together with his army of Koopas, the scheming Bowser filches the royal throne room and turns almost all the Mushroom people into strange items such as rocks, beanshoots, bricks and horse-tails! Princess Toadstool and her most loyal subjects are the only ones who escape this disaster and the Princess, who is magically inclined herself, is the only person capable of returning things to their original state. Unfortunately, Bowser has

Bowser's troops are small in size but large in number and extremely good tacticians, in spite of their tiny brains. Here's a brief introduction to a quintet of the most common.

Little Goomba: These mutant, mush-room-types are the weakest of all Bowser's army and the form his front line. One stomp on the head or shell to their features stops them instantly.

Koopa Troopers These tortoise-like adversaries are very slow and deliberate in their attack. Green Koopas head towards Mario whereas the red variety patrol small, specific areas. By jumping onto their backs Mario causes them to hide in their shells at which point they are ripe for a good kicking!

Pirahna Flowers Much to Mario's dismay these plants prosper in the many pipes of Mushroom Land, often blocking Mario's access to exciting bonus rooms and secret worlds! They hide when Mario is in close proximity and frazzle nicely at the touch of

account of each character having his or her own special abilities listed below.

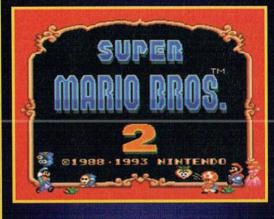
MARIO: Mario is the most well-rounded of the four. Only his jumping power suffers when he carries an item.

Luigi's long legs afford him tremendous jumping ability. The only problem is that lifting stuff isn't his forté and so hinders him terribly.

TOAD: Toad's legs are fairly weak, which makes jumping rather hard for him. However, he's quite used to the odd spot of manual labour and is unaffected by extra loads.

THE PRINCESS: She may look like some kind of loo-roll holder, but the Princess's flouncy dress lets her float for a second or so after each jump.

Built on the premise of some terrible nightmare, Mario's second adventure takes place in a dream world. One night Mario dreams of a long stairway at the end of which is a door.

Land! No sooner does he step into this place than he is greeted by a mysterious voice, telling him that this

world of 'Sub-Con' is cursed by a character named Wart who apparently hates vegetables! As it turns out, Wart's choice of cursedom is entirely misguided since the whole of this land is riddled with potential weapons such as parsnips, spring onions and pumpkins. Idiot! The very next day Mario, Luigi, Princess Mushroom and Toad set out for a picnic. Upon reaching the site, Mario discovers a cave beyond which lies this very same world of his dream! True to form Mario trundles off to the rescue.



COMMENT

It goes without saying that this package houses three of the most popular videogames ever! The fourth - The Lost Levels - is simply a great bonus. Mario has earned his status as the character synonymous with Nintendo, indeed videogames in general, because the depth of his games are

beyond compare. Each title is perfectly designed and all, excepting the Lost Levels, have perfectly-graded learning curves. Through this players get accustomed to the central character, then freely take him above and beyond the initial expectations of the game. And just look at those graphics...you've got to have this!

Bowser is now a veteran villain. But despite previous failures he is quite the carnivorous casanova with reptilian females. It is with these children that Bowser now returns to Mushroom Land, allowing them free reign throughout its seven realms with Bowser taking a back seat in a far-off castle. Of course this situation brings misery to the Mushroom people as their beloved King's wands are stolen and used against them turning each and every one into pathetic animals! Mario! Where are you?!



Combining and updat-ing all the Mario games for the super **NES** is an excellent idea, and the

revamped versions feature all aspects of the NES originals which earned them their classic status. t sixteen locations around the world, men surrender to their urge to SPEED. The grand prix tracks of the World Championship are where the ultimate synergy of man and machine takes place - for money, acclaim, honour and the sensation of SPEED.

Any one of these events is gruelling enough, but as a rolling season of races they take their toll on the driver's and the cars. Is it any wonder that the stars may have the occasional tiff with their manager? In the case of Nigel Mansell, it's sadly ironic that his F1 game finally motors onto Super NES, just as he's powering into the Indy league. But, chin up. As

F1 Challenge is meant to be a racing simulation, there's no reason not to grow a quick moustache and play out the 1993 season that could've

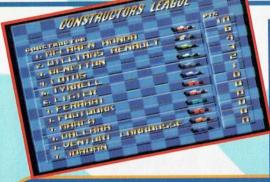


You choose either to drive a single race (practice or full) on any of the sixteen championship courses, or take part in the full driver's championship. The prize is awarded at the end of the season on the basis of points gained in each race. Race winners get ten points, second place earns six and so forth. Retiring earns you 'nil point'.

The Grand Prix consists of a cut-down field of some twelve drivers, which is bit limiting, but Mansell's biggest rivals are there to race. The main challenge comes from Brazilian, Ayrton Senna, Germany's Schumacher and Italy's Alesi. Racing against them feels different from the usual driving games, as they exhibit a strong sense of character. Senna is a daring driver, but tends to judge pitstops badly. Schumacher is a dogged efficient driver, but less likely to take risks.

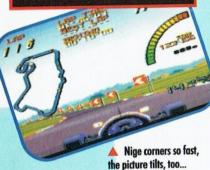

the simulation mode gives a truer feel, but this has to be one of the easier racing games available. But the feel of the game is immense, catching the sensation of speed and excitement perfectly. The best parts of this game are the nerve-jangling neck-and-neck laps with Senna, when the points difference is vital. For moments like that it cannot be beaten. NEW ZEALAND STORY

One of NMS' more fanatical readers is the ubiquitous M. Ahkram Subroto from the Department of Biotechnology at the UNSW,

WARP ZONES
