Morning glory... a growing city peopled with lovingly-animated characters waking up to a world fraught with danger, knowing there's a benign force out to protect them - that's you, you clot.

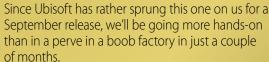
What do we know?

Alone In The Dark



Shedding light on the dead of night...

What's the story?

Reprising your role as Carnby in a modern day New York, an Earth-splitting evil stalks you. And it's very dark. Running and some mild crying may well be involved.

What do we know?

Taking its cues from TV series' such as 24, Lost and probably about 35 copycats in development, Alone In The Dark promises episodic gameplay in chunks of 30-40 minutes.

Switching from first- to third-person views, you'll blast your way past gruesome deamons in 20 such episodes, each linked with a teaser trailer and a catch-up clip to fill you in when you duck out of the action or return to the fray.

Point-and-click staples such as combining items to solve puzzles are set to be seamlessly incorporated into real-time gameplay that sees you swinging from cables, dangling from roofs and generally giving your medical insurers palpitations.





When do we get more?

The shots we've grabbed here are the first new snippets about the game for nigh-on a year, so we're hoping this atmospheric, ambitious and potentially ultra-accessible adventure will be previewable in the next couple of months.

Anything else to declare?

Survive the bundled episodes and Atari is promising you more downloadable chunks of gameplay. Here's hoping they don't want money in exchange – we're skint.

CALL OF DUTY 4: MODERN WARFARE

Go fourth and diversify...

e've been embroiled in this bloody conflict for too long poured too much time, energy and manpower into fighting a seemingly endless battle, using primitive weapons against a determined foe.

Now Call Of Duty developers Infinity Ward have done what certain world leaders can only dream of – they're

pulling out of a gruelling war before the public turn against them...

It's not that they're sick of fighting – on the contrary, two WWII CODs (Treyarch did the third) only seem to have increased Infinity's lust for blood and the bitter bite of combat.

But they've done WWII to death, and the guys behind one of the most accessible and immersive shooter series

of all time have trained their itchy trigger fingers on new horizons.

Enter COD 4, a modern combat sequel that will enable developers and gamers alike to stretch their legs literally as well as metaphorically as the environments look enormous.

COD 4 will enable us to grasp a whole range of new weapons as we spill crimson over locales that will deliciously contrast with the muddied battlefields of the 1940s Hitler-bashers with which we've become so familiar.

So far only snippets of gameplay have been revealed, with no official document to accompany the short, but tantalising trailer we've snaffled for your viewing pleasure.

It's clear from the atmospheric and busily peopled action sequences, however, that the game has lost none of its frontline feel – placing you on the cutting edge of battle like no other shooter can ever seem to manage.

And while the core appeal of the game will doubtless be camaraderie, stunning visuals and bitter close-

combat scrapping, it's also sure COD has had a shot of adrenaline powerful enough to turn a cowering wimp into a marauding Rambo...

There are hints at a character class system that will pit you as a stalking sniper or a spec ops hardass infiltrating enemy compounds, vessels and even terrorist-held aircraft. Screeching planes and skylines filled with swarms of

attack choppers suggest you'll be dropping into the fray a la Medal Of Honor: Airborne Assault.

Our intelligence officers haven't had much to work with, but we've pieced together some information about a game that has reignited our interest in a series whose tactics had become a little predictable...

Clearly the game will mimic real-life by pitting the US against, well – pretty much everyone else on the planet.

Middle East shanties and semi-urban landscapes that have a distinctly eastern European feel suggest that, like Battlefield 2 and a clutch of other shooters, COD4 will pit the sophistication and firepower of Uncle Sam against the guile and determination of terrorist organisations.

Plot-wise, it seems certain weapons of mass destruction will play a part. Aside from the ominous sight of what looks to be a long range missile delivery systems turret scraping open, scenes of melee combat are cut into barren wastelands watched over by hulking mushroom clouds.

And what about those squadrons of advancing troops? A hint of squadbased action? And are those tumbling walls part of embedded cut-scenes, because that scenery certainly looks destructible?

Ok. Ok. There's little doubt the snippets we've glimpsed of Call Of

Spec Ops hide and Duty 4 raise more questions than seek - one way to kill those lonely

answers, but they do confirm the news that the series is on the eve of a fresh dawn in a whole new era.

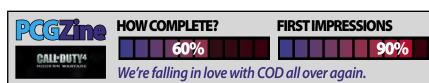
It's about time Activision slogged out of their Second World War comfort zone and put their boot through a modern combat genre that has overlooked the single player experience for too long.

Somethin magical up Blizzard's sleeve...

hile much of their time has been spent feeding the World of Warcraft monster over recent years, there's clearly been an sci-fi ache nagging the wizardly beards at Blizzard.

It was with barely contained glee and a glint that said 'we're relishing every damn minute of this' that they announced Starcraft II and vowed to settle some unfinished business...

Since 1998, Starcraft and it's generous expansion pack, Brood War, have been carving up friendships as millions of armchair generals waged

nuts bent on warmongering and total destruction..."

war in a game tilted unashamedly towards multiplayer action.

For those who don't know, Starcraft is a far grittier, spacier RTS than it's stablemate Warcraft. Here it's your command of hundreds of twitching units that is likely to turn the tide of battle, not the lumbering destruction of super-powerful hero units.

It's a game characterised by the perfect balance of three warring factions – the Protoss, Zerg and Terran, all of whom return once more for this souped-up sequel.

Blizzard is retaining the symmetry of the armies at the core Starcraft, reimagining the battle weary universe in a rebuilt world for modern times.

To this end, we're promised an updated version of the Battle.net online gaming service that will make hooking up with rivals easier than scoring with the bridesmaid on a drunken hen party.

It'll probably be less messy too – thanks to smartened visuals designed







to showcase the mass brawls and ultrafast gameplay that made the original Starcraft a bona fide legend, and which we only expect to be ramped up for this bold and relentless sequel.

Scratch beneath the surface paintwork of hissing units spewing hot laser death, and you'll find Starcraft II isn't short on depth either.

As well as a fully-fledged story mode, the game is being prised open for modification by those of us who like to tinker with map and unit design.

It's on the battlefield, however, that Starcraft II promises to deliver it's

decisive blow to boredom. Blizzard is dusting off some familiar units, bolting upgrades onto others and has commissioned an army of new recruits to give us more playthings that Hugh Heffner enjoys on his birthday.

All three races are promised a major makeover, though Blizzard has only revealed details about the new, improved Protoss to date.

This advanced clan are in the know when it comes to manipulating time and space, powering their structure by forming a daisy chain of energy pylons (think Perimeter, RTS fanboys), beaming reserve units through gateways and straight onto the frontline.

Their roster of killing machines is diverse and intimidating, especially

when they come swarming in the general direction of your rearguard.

Ferocious Zealots, for instance, are religious nuts bent on warmongering and the destruction of all who stand in their way. Some of them can transform themselves into glowing fragments of pure energy, enabling them to dart through space and land a killing strike before their enemies can aim their weapons.

Immortals, while not quite as indestructible as their name suggests, are shielded veterans – broken bodies bolted into heavy-blasting exoskeletons, capable fo fending off large units and providing covering fire for their niftier comrades.

Take the Stalkers, for instance, fastmoving units that hunt most efficiently in packs. Mind, given their ability to

'blink' from one location to another, they don't always need brawn to protect their advance...

How Football Manager is going Live

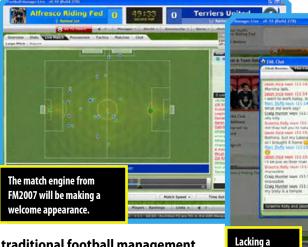
he dangerously addictive Football Manager series has merely dabbled with multiplayer action over the years with hotseat play and network games. Now SI has announced a full-on MMO, created from scratch to give you the chance to prove your managerial mettle against all the other Joses, Rafas and Fergies. We caught up with Sports Interactive's Miles Jacobson, who was waiting in the dugout to explain the developers' gameplan to us...

Why develop FM Live and not expand the multiplayer experience in Football Manager?

We are always looking to improve all areas of all of our games, but FML is a very different game to FM, made by a separate team, and while elements and areas of the game are the same to FM, the overall package is very different.

Would you say the FM Live experience is more of a high class fantasy football game than a





traditional football management video game?

No, because traditional Fantasy Leagues are based around real world games. It borrows elements from there, and also the US Fantasy Sports games, which are very different to their European counterparts. The best description would be a cross between Football Manager, an auction site, fantasy sports and social networking.

Why did you opt for fictional teams rather than leagues of real sides?

Because leagues of real sides would have lead to incredibly empty game worlds, as too many people would want to be the big clubs, and having game worlds of 20 teams would have been rubbish.

This is FM stripped of its bells and whistles - how did you decide which elements to leave out and does it keep the FM experience?

No, it's not. It's a game designed from the ground up that utilises elements

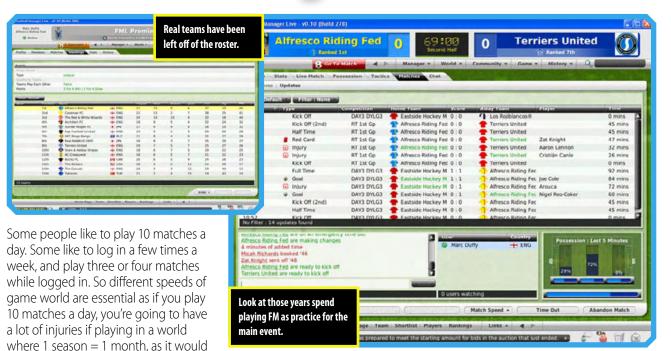
of FM. So it's more a decision making process on what to add into FML from the FM series. The match engine and tactical engine are taken straight from FM, but the rest is new.

Is it true matches are played out in real-time?

Matches are not in real time as in the matches are not 90 minutes. They are played out using the key highlights mode from FM, so last around 10 minutes on the slowest speeds.

You're looking at different timescales for different worlds – how will this work?





be the equivalent of players playing 300 games a season!

Any plans for real-life prizes for successful managers? Will there be community support, such as manager of the month awards?

There will be lots of community support, and lots of in-game rewards, but, initially, there aren't plans for real money prizes.

This game has Ov written all over it – is he the driving force behind it? If so, how close are you going to be able to get to his vision of a Football Manager MMO?

We've been very clear that FML is Ov's baby, and he is not only the initial creative force behind it, but is lead coder and lead designer on the project.

The team is very small, which is how Ov likes to work, and they've been working on the game for a few years now. However, we all realise that, when the game is out, the players will have lots of ideas of what they'd like to see in the game, so it will constantly evolve over time, with constant updates.

During testing how has the way people play the game surprised you? And how has it forced you to rethink the game?

At the time of writing, we're still in alpha stage, with beta due to start in mid-June. The alpha feedback has been invaluable, particularly at closing exploits. We expected most to play the game differently, and they are, but we constantly re-think things as the game evolves. It's the best way to work.

Given your community focus, is the development of FM Live the most fan-driven SI game?

Initially, no, but once it out in the real world, yes, it will be.

Please tell us something about FM Live that no one else knows.

It was originally a massively multiplayer lacrosse management game. But that might not be entirely true.

Finally, do you expect managers to be open to bungs, with deals being done between friendly bosses during player auctions to hike up the wages a rival will have to pay?!

Bungs would lead to banning. People teaming up to hike up wages is already happening in the alpha, but has backfired on many occasions too!

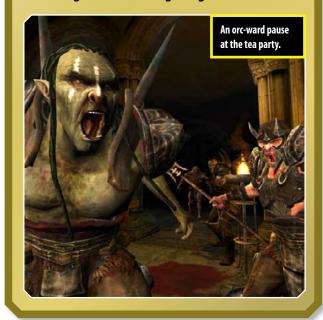
It's amazing.

os Angeles, May 2003, and Xbox FPS sequel Halo 2 is unveiled to the world in an amphitheatre full of games journalists. The crowd goes wild. Grown men scream like teenage Elvis fangirls at sights like the game's star, Master Chief, dragging enemies off their vehicles and taking the wheel himself, or a giant spider-bot stomping through city streets. Then the Chief's shown wielding two guns at once, and these same men just *lose* it. They're

yelling "oh my god, oh my god," waving hands in the air like they've just been cured of blindness, standing up in their seats then immediately collapsing back into them, knees weak, eyes clouded with ecstatic delirium.

This, dear reader, was the exact moment Halo died.

Former glories

While the first Halo game defaulted to painful repetition in its twilight hours,

its first half was a triumph of fauxopenness, scale, sci-fi imagination and thoughtful reconsideration of how an FPS should work. With such an unhinged response to the sight of dualwielded weapons, it was clear that such things no longer mattered. Only the shooting mattered, the dumbest of action, and Halo 1's more cerebral achievements were abandoned. Meatheaded reviews and the first major online console FPS thrills bought

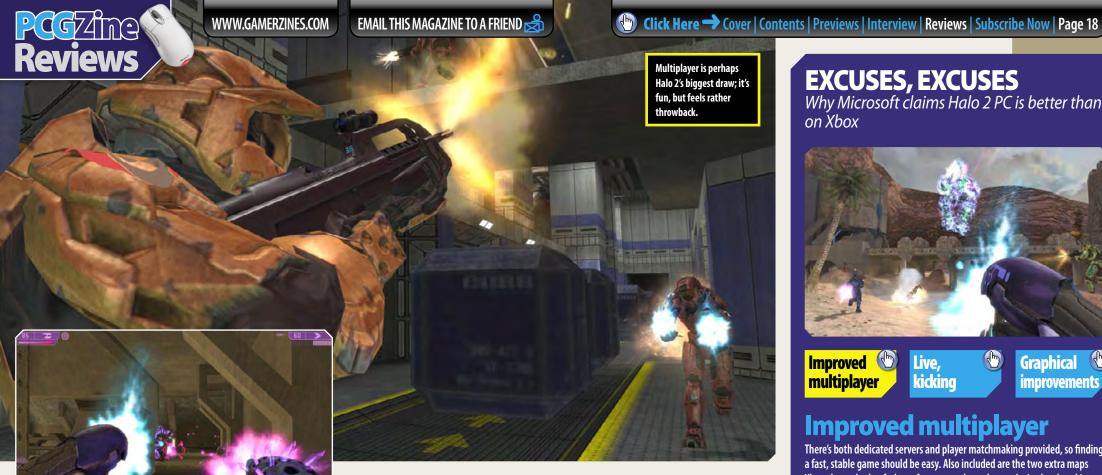

Halo 2 to a massive audience. Three years later a barely modified version is being offered up to Vista-only PCs, and to gamers who now know full well the game's a bit rubbish and are spoiled by Half-Life 2s and STALKERs. Really, it's like offering a man who's just dined on the finest five-course meal a piece of dry, stale bread.

'Halo 2 For Windows Vista', to give it its ludicrous official name, looks and

plays like a game much more dated than the port of a three-year-old console shooter it is. Often incredibly ugly, it's an hilariously wrong-headed method of demonstrating Vista's gaming clout; its many warts are only worsened by the crispness of high resolutions. Yes, you can fire two guns at once (by pressing the left and right mouse buttons simultaneously, if you can bear the excitement), but only to access the next corridor full of unopenable doors a little more quickly. Most encounters are trigger-based, one of those doors unlocking only once you've gunned down every wave of mysteriously respawning enemies.

There's only ever one way to go, yet sparse and similar level design means it's nevertheless possible to get lost, hitting multiple deadends or accidentally backtracking.

Man and machine

The regular vehicle sections are just as limited – give a man a plane and he'll want to explore. Give a man a tank and he'll want to plough through walls. But no, you just get to follow this corridor, bucko. Even the outdoor areas are narrow canyons, bridges or high-walled one-way city streets, while a return to the hoop-shaped planet of the game's name is a huge disappointment.

There's both dedicated servers and player matchmaking provided, so finding a fast, stable game should be easy. Also included are the two extra maps Xbox players had to fork out for separately, and an exclusive level-making app provided to create your own dated-looking masterpieces.

Remember the initial awe at just how big the surface of the ringworld looked in the first level of Halo? This has none of that.

It's generally a competent shooter, just rarely a thrilling one. There's a wide range of weapons on just the right side of silly, and it tries, sometimes successfully, to regularly rotate its halfa-dozen or so types of skirmish rather than overplay a single hand. Particularly interesting is the switch in perspective

on occasion from the Master Chief to the Arbiter, a disgraced member of the Covenant aliens that constitute the game's main baddies. While his abilities are essentially identical to the Chief's he's even fighting the same enemies most of the time – he adds some much needed depth to what was formerly a faceless, jingoised foe.

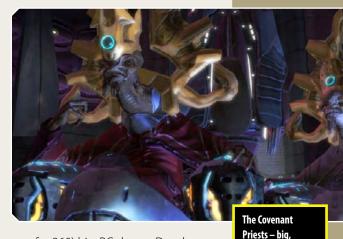

hat it should come to this. Barely a decade after the original Tomb Raider changed the face of gaming forever, we're staring down the dual barrels of a remake, released to celebrate the game's, er, 11th anniversary. So is it a worrying portent of a dearth of originality, or a welcome tribute to an iconic heroine?

As is the modern way, it's being billed as a 're-imagining,' the term

coined by Tim Burton when he did a great big monkey shit on the memory of the already peerless The Planet Of the Apes. Games are a very different beast though, and whereas a 40-yearold film is still perfectly watchable, the early Tomb Raider games are little more than glorified cave paintings, which makes the lascivious response to the pneumatic Lara Croft character all the more baffling now.

Lara has a couple of fresh moves in her canon, namely the perch, whereby she teeters precariously atop a pole, and the wall-run, which is executed with the aid of the ubiquitous grapple hook, as introduced in Legend, her comeback game in the hands of new developers Crystal Dynamics. Lara's legions of fan boys have already been spitting hate over the fact that she never used a grapple hook in the original game, although Crystal Dynamics have countered this argument by pointing out that she is briefly seen using one in a cut scene.

And the end of the day, it's their game and they can stick what they like in it. In the event they have been largely faithful to the original, without hampering themselves with the barelyformed gameplay constraints of the day. As such, it's almost like playing the nostalgia-tinted version of Tomb Raider that resides in your memory, as opposed to the twitchy, ponderous, frustrating reality that renders it all but unplayable to anyone but the most hardcore of devotees.

Using the Legend engine, it's a largely identical experience, with all the ledge-hanging, pole-swinging gymnastics that entails. And while it



gives the impression that you're instinctively marauding through the tombs, the reality is a little more linear, with negotiable areas clearly marked. In many ways it's a great game to watch, as it appears that Lara could plunge to her death at any time, despite the fact

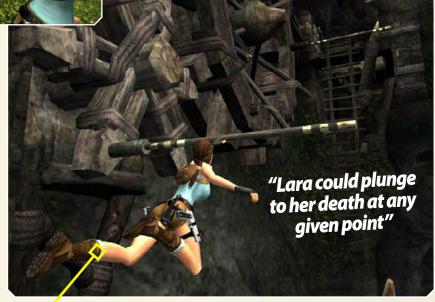

intelligence. Most of the time the traditional method of frantically circling while pumping lead into the poor critter's cranium is effective. However, some of the bigger beasts require a new technique whereby you enrage them (by shooting them in the head) to the extent that they charge at you. Some keyboard gymnastics then enable you to dramatically leap out of the way while unloading your weapon between their eyes. In the latest Spider-Man film, everyone's favourite photojournalist simply has to battle with the symbiote, tackle Venom, beat up the New Goblin, lamp the Sandman, and he's saved the day. 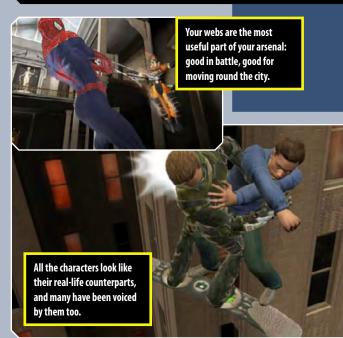

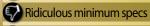

A free game with groundbreaking physics – what's not to like? Almost everything, sadly.

e find it a little hard to take Cellfactor seriously. Originally billed as the game to really demonstrate what the Ageia PhysX physics processing card could do, it rather lost its edge when enterprising hackers modded its beta to perform its Newtonian tricks without a PhysX board. Now, it's rather like a stage magician who got rumbled, with the mundane secrets behind his greatest stunt revealed to the world. Everyone knows it's all trickery done with wires and magnets – why should we believe him this time?

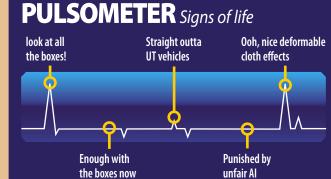

They didn't build Rome in a day, the same may not be true of Great Battles

s if movie tie-ins weren't bad enough, over the past few years we've seen a slew of tv shows vying for a stake in gaming's prosperous tie-in territory. The Sopranos, 24, even Desperate Housewives have joined a cash-in culture that rarely creates a game worth removing from the shrinkwrap.

Great Battles of Rome follows the spin-off tradition of being a very basic genre title. In this case a very uncomplex RTS. Position your army on the battlefield, charge, leave victorious, upgrade or buy new units, and it's back to the battlefield. Hardcore strategy fans will find little to keep themselves busy, but in all fairness it seems as though Slitherine's target audience here is largely History Channel viewers who aren't necessarily accustomed to a great deal of gaming.

The tutorial is simple but informative, and there's a pretty gentle learning curve which eases the newcomer into RTS basics.

One of Great Battles of Rome's main tactical considerations is that of terrain. Unfortunately, while it's obviously apparent when you're fighting within

woodland, it's not so easy to distinguish rough ground from open ground without mousing over the terrain, an inherent problem with the game's already aging graphics.

As easy as it is to adopt the "it's gameplay that counts" approach, there's no getting away from the fact that Great Battles of Rome is visually rather disappointing. In fact, it's difficult to see any great visual advancement over the likes of Shogun: Total War, a seven year old game, something of a relic these days. While we're at it, gameplay-wise, Great Battles of Rome isn't even in the same league as Shogun: Total War, and generations behind Rome: Total War.

To be fair, this is a budget title and considering the 50-odd minutes of footage from The History Channel,



covering the factual basis for the game that covers everything from the Samnite period to the invasion of Britain, it's probably not a terrible educational tool. But then again, neither is Rome, Civ, Empire Earth or any other historically-based game.

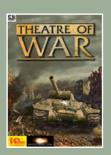

Historically accurate, but at what cost?

s an RTS from the makers of IL-2 Sturmovik, Theatre of War is as niche a game as you're likely to find. Taking the same approach to the RTS genre as they took to the flight sim, the team at 1C Company have tasked themselves with producing the most accurate WW2 RTS ever seen. Only problem is, their strategy (pun intended) hasn't worked quite as well as we'd have hoped.

If you're a fan of statistics and number crunching, Theatre of War is the RTS of your dreams. Every soldier, tank, gun emplacement and vehicle has numerous statistics and properties that affect their every move, giving Theatre of War a level of historical

accuracy that other games can only dream about. With five individual campaigns to play through, and a whopping 40 missions in total, each of which is based around a historical battle, from Operation Overlord to the crushing German defeat at Kursk, there's more than enough to keep your average armchair general happy.

But sadly, despite its emphasis on realistic combat, there are just too many times when Theatre of War manages to provide the exact opposite. For a game that prides itself on realism, there are certain things you expect – like your soldiers engaging the enemy, taking cover, and, you know, generally trying to stay alive. The problem is, in

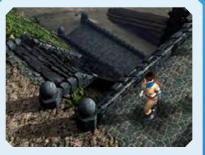

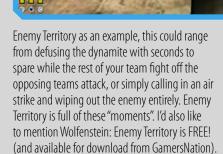

SOUND ADVICE

I've just joined an online gaming clan and have invested in a head-set so we can chat via Team Speak. I'm having a hell of a job getting it working properly - any tips would be greatly appreciated.

> Setting up your headset is a bit like being a rock band roadie – testing the mic and getting the levels right is all part of



the job. The first job is to ensure your headset's microphone is enabled within Sounds and Audio Devices in the Control Panel. Click on the Audio tab and under Sound Recording click the Volume Button. *If microphone doesn't appear in the* Recording Control box that pops up click Options and then Properties to tick its box from the list. Ensure the volume is set up to a reasonably high level and make sure you tick the Select box directly underneath to enable it. Note that below that is an Advanced button. You can use this to access the Mic Boost box if your microphone is still quiet once you're set up - it really helps especially if you're using a budget end microphone. All being well your friends should now be able to hear you once you've powered up your chosen voice communications software.

Beyond this it's also worth ensuring you've got the latest sound drivers installed on the off chance it could be a driver issue. You'd be amazed at the number of PC gaming related problems that can be fixed by keeping your system drivers bang up to date.

Finally, and rather annoyingly, by default Windows sets the microphone to play back through your own speakers.

commands for the best CS framerates. Volume button under Sound Playback. Simply drag the volume slider to zero or click the mute tick box underneath to sort it out. If – once you're online and chatting you're still experiencing problems with sound quality it's worth checking through your sound hardware's dedicated control panel. 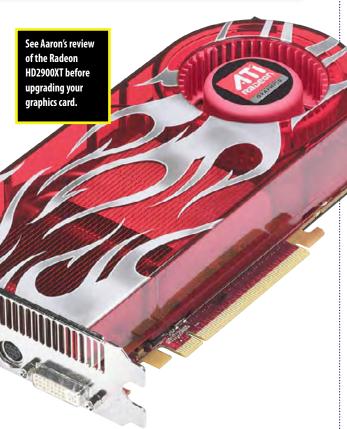

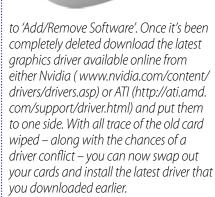
EASY UPGRADE

ATI Enters The DX10 World With R600

It's (finally) here: ATI's answer to the GeForce 8800

ix months ago NVIDIA unveiled its DirectX 10 series G80 in the form of the GeForce 8800 GTX and GTS. In the interim ATI has delayed its answer again and again, fooling even NVIDIA into launching spoiler attacks with their 320MB version of the 8800 GTS in February, figuring that ATI

was ready to launch R600, which ATI again delayed into May.

Last month, NVIDIA made its third DX10 offering in the form of GeForce 8600 and 8500 cards. Having struck first, NVIDIA has a hat trick with G80, G84 and G86, and it seemed to be game over for AMD/ATI. Today, we finally get to see ATI's counter strike against NVIDIA after the long hiatus.



ATI is launching three distinct graphics chips for desktop and three for the mobile space. There will be different versions for each product with identifiers like Pro and XT. The moniker for each will depend on clock speeds and memory densities. The first card to hit shelves is the Radeon HD2900XT based on the R600 processor.

In time to come we will see the HD2600 and HD2400 in the desktop space for June, and parallel mobile products. The HD2600 and HD2400 products are based off of RV630 and RV610 processors respectively.

As with the G8x series from NVIDIA, R600 marks many technical departures,

innovations and improvements for ATI as their new architecture is primed to take advantage of DX10.

For example, according to ATI, the command processor (CP) for the R600 series is a full processor. Not that it is an x86 processor but it is a full microcode processor. It has full access to memory, can perform math computations and can do its own thinking. Basically what this means is that rather than having the driver do all of its math on the main CPU, it will perform the number crunching on the graphic cards own CP. This will take roughly 30% of the driver load off of the CPU, apparently.

That does not mean applications will run 30% faster, it simply means that the typical overhead of a driver in the CPU will be decreased. Still, it's a good step in the right direction.

Another area getting a makeover on R600 is AVIVO, which will see the R600 cards giving us better video performance with HDMI in particular.

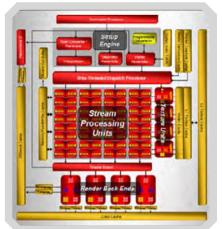

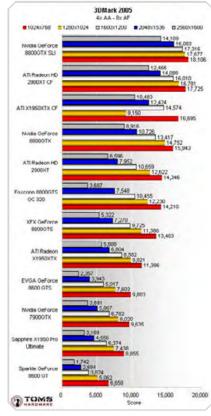

end of the day how does the HD2900XT perform and compare to its GeForce companions? Well, the short answer for now is that HD2900 is largely on a par with the £250 GeForce 8800 GTS it is priced to compete with. We see some performance increases with CrossFire over SLI, but individually the cards are largely neck and neck in the benchmarks on Windows XP.

The future

Windows Vista raises some issues for both ATI and NVIDIA. These cards are DX10, designed specifically for

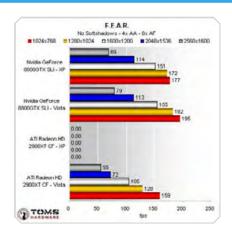

Windows Vista, yet any card being benchmarked on Windows Vista takes around a 10% performance hit, sometimes more – NVIDIA lost 40fps in F.E.A.R. on Vista compared to XP.

Under the hood of the HD2900XT, things are very different to the G80. On paper, at least, it looks a lot like ATI should blow all competition to away with ease. A 750MHz core, 320 stream shader units (compared to NVIDIA's 128) and a massive 512Mb of memory bandwidth to play around with. On top

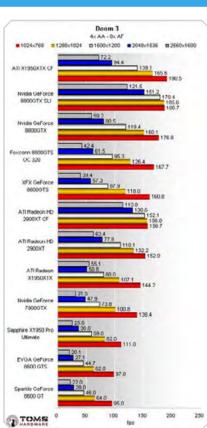
of that, the card draws enough power to kickstart a dead sun.

Overall, HD2900XT is more forward looking than GeForce 8800 and it should be; it took an extra six months getting it to market. If you are leaning towards longevity of a card, R600 looks more attractive with a dedicated tessellator, programmable filters, highclock speeds and crazy amounts of bandwidth.

Doesn't deliver

Unfortunately, those last two paragraphs also translate as the card running very hot, and requiring a lot of noisy cooling. Hot and loud are always best avoided.

What's worse, though, is that despite the greater complexity of the R600 over G80, the fact AMD couldn't make it compete with the highest end 8800GTX doesn't bode well. Looking ahead, and there's a die shrink in the near future which may help to make up

the difference, but who knows what NVIDIA's response will be by then?

Right now, NVIDIA already has a spread of GeForce 8x00 cards on the market, and will be able to react to ATI in terms of pricing and performance by releasing different models into all the low, mid and high-end product segments. ATI has the advanced tech and NVIDIA has the market lead... At least consumers will now have a wider range of choice when deciding on DX10 hardware, but certainly there is no crowned "King of the Hill" out of the R600 launch.
