How I Became a Pokémoniac

As a writer of strategy guides, I find myself playing a lot of games—but rarely for fun and entertainment (as is often the case when a pastime becomes a job). But in March 1998, my writing partner and I found a place where we could order copies of a Japanese game called *Pocket Monsters*. With rumors floating around about a possible American release, we picked up this mysterious little game not knowing what we were in for. In fact, it sat unopened on my bookshelf for almost a month until I found myself on a plane from Michigan to California with nothing to do. By the return flight, I was hooked and found myself playing this game everywhere and anywhere, from my bedroom in the wee hours of the morning to the checkout line at my local grocery store. There was something about Pokémon (as it's now called), that sucked me in and kept me playing even when I was supposed to be doing other things.

So what is Pokémon, and why is it so addictive that more than eight million copies of this game have been sold in Japan? Ultimately, Pokémon is a role-playing game, but it's also much more. It's a game that is both simple and complex at the same time. It's a game about collecting monsters (150 of them, to be precise), which encourages you to look to others for help in getting the missing pieces. Pokémon is also about raising monsters and about strategy and fighting for a cause.

Its appeal lies in the fact that there's always something new to do or accomplish. It's never boring, and there are always new challenges waiting on the horizon. You can fight against established Trainers for Badges that will boost your abilities in some way or explore caves for treasure or rare, legendary Pokémon. Even those "Random Battles" prove helpful when you're scouring the countryside for new Wild Pokémon or trying to get a favorite monster to its next evolution point. And the portable size of the Game Boy® means you can take it with you anywhere!

So, sit back, relax, and enjoy your stay in the world of Pokémon. And don't be concerned if it takes over your life. It's supposed to!

How to Become a Master Pokémon Trainer

Welcome to the world of Pokémon! Once you start this game, you'll find yourself immersed in a world that is as challenging as it is fun. Your mission: To become the world's greatest Pokémon Trainer. To do this, you'll have to wander down many streets and through cities, towns, and dungeons—and defeat many Rivals, including the one who used to be your best friend. You also have to find and collect 150 Pokémon and raise some of them to be your bestmost fighters. It takes skill and determination, not to mention a bit of luck. But if you follow the advice given in these pages, you should have no problem!

Note

It's highly recommended that you read the game manual to familiarize yourself with the basics of gameplay. The purpose of this chapter is not to repeat the instructions, but rather to expand on them and give you more advanced techniques.

The Red vs. Blue Question

So, what's the difference between the Red and Blue versions of the game? In a nutshell, the two games are very similar. They have the same characters, the same plot, and the same map. The differences are in the assortment of Pokémon that each version of the cartridge contains.

I. Each version of the game contains 11 unique Pokémon.

You'll also find that some species of Pokémon appear in one place in the Red version, but somewhere else in the Blue version. For example, you'll find Horsea and Seadra in the Seafoam Islands in the Red version of the game, but Krabby and Kingler in the Blue version.

Also, certain Pokémon appear more frequently in one version than the other. There are more Beedle and Kukuna in the Red version and Caterpie and Metapod in the Blue. More female Nidoran roam the thickets of the Blue version of Pokémon than male, while you'll be beating male Nidoran off with a stick in the Red version of the game. Get the picture?

Should these differences affect the color of the game you buy? Well, that's a matter of personal taste. If there's a certain unique monster that you must have, then pick up the version that contains that monster. If you like the color red more than blue, grab the red one. The monster sets in both version of the game are equal in terms of strength and elemental mix. And if you're planning on finding all 150 Pokémon, you'll get to see every single one of them eventually anyway.



Getting Started

When you first boot up Pokémon, you'll be faced with three immediate choices: what to name your character, what to name your Rival, and which Pokémon to start the game with. Of the three, it is the later question which is the most important. Once you've found Prof. Oak, he'll take you back to his Lab, where you can choose one Pokémon from his remaining group of three. Your Rival gets to choose next and then the remaining Poké Ball goes to Prof. Oak (although he'll leave it where it is for the entire game).

But which to choose ...? Conventional wisdom says that the Bulbasaur is your best bet. It levels up more quickly than the other two and, being a Grass type, it's extremely effective against the Ground and Water types of Pokémon in the first two Gyms. The Charmander, with its fire and ability to equip strong offensive skills and two of the five Hidden Skills, is my personal choice but it takes the longest to raise and is not very strong against the first two Trainers. However, if you team it up with an Electric Pokémon, like a Pikachu, then you'll have a powerful team that can take on most anything in the game. The same goes for the Squirtle. This character is strong against the Ground Pokémon in the first Gym and can also equip the powerful water-based skill machine given to you when you defeat Misty at the Cerulean City Gym.

Ultimately, you should choose the one that best suits your personality. There really is no correct choice here, so don't worry about making a mistake. Besides, you'll have the opportunity to capture up to 10 more types of Pokémon between Pallet Town and your appointment with Brock at the Pewter City Gym, and you'll want to fill out your team with some of them.



Note

The Pokémon you choose has a direct bearing on which one your Rival ends up with. If you choose the Charmander, your Rival will most likely end up taking the Squirtle. Choose the Bulbasaur and he'll take the Charmander. If you want the Squirtle, he'll settle for the Bulbasaur.

The Art of Capturing Pokémon

You have to know how to capture Pokémon if you want to succeed in this game. There's just no way around it! First, you have to have a Poké Ball, which you can buy at any of the Poké Marts in a town or city near you. Then you have to get into a battle with a Wild Pokémon. The rules of the game state that you can't steal Pokémon from other Trainers, so don't try it or you'll end up wasting a Poké Ball. The only fair game is what you find in the patches of long grass on the routes between towns or in dungeons, forests, ponds (once you have a fishing pole), or caves. You'll also have opportunities to trade people for rare Pokémon, but we'll deal with that later on.

Once you've flushed out a Wild Pokémon, you must weaken it before you can capture it in a Poké Ball. Ideally, you'll want to bring it as close to the point of fainting without actually defeating it before using your Poké Ball. This means that you have to be careful. If you find yourself battling a Pokémon that you really want to capture (especially if they don't appear very commonly, like a Pikachu or Clefairy), don't send your strongest fighters against it or use skills that are sure to defeat it in one round. Choose tamed Pokémon of a similar experience level who you are confident will survive the battle and who can inflict a controllable amount of damage. Skills that produce paralysis or sleep are also good ways to ensure that you don't miss.

As you progress through the game, you'll be able to buy more effective versions of the basic Poké Ball that will work better against the more powerful monsters. Don't expect to have an easier time capturing Pokémon, though. The contents of Poké Marts change to correspond with the level of Pokémon and challenges that you will meet up with in that section of the game. Using an Ultra Ball, which is the most effective Poké Ball that you can buy in a store, on a LV2 Spearow will certainly guarantee your chances of capturing that creature (unless you let your LV30+ Pokémon attack it), but don't even consider using a basic Poké Ball against one of the legendary bird trio or that LV70 Mewtwo! In fact, extremely rare and powerful Pokémon like the bird trio of Articuno, Zapdos, and Moltres; the awesome Mewtwo; or even the sleepy Snorlax will often require you to toss somewhere in the neighborhood of 50 Ultra Balls before you can capture them! This game is less about strength than it is about patience and cunning.

The Care and Feeding of Your Pokémon

For the most part, taking care of a troop of Pokémon is pretty easy as long as you remember to heal its wounds and take it for regular checkups at the many Pokémon Centers throughout the land. Still, there are a few extra things involved in raising a Pokémon that is more than just "fighting fit."

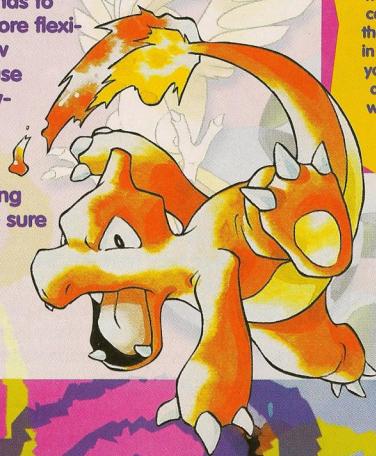
There is a reason why people say that a trained Pokémon is stronger than a Wild Pokémon of the same experience level. When you train a Pokémon of your own you have a great amount of influence over its development. You decide whether or not it evolves at certain points, which skills it learns, etc. Captured Pokémon also receive bonuses to their attack and defense strengths, speed, and special skills from the Badges you've collected. You can customize your Pokémon further by equipping them with skills from Technical Machines (TMs) or Hidden Machines (HMs) and by feeding them attribute-raising vitamins and minerals like Calcium, Iron, Carbos, etc.

It's also better, whenever possible, to raise Pokémon from a young age. A Chansey caught in the Safari Zone at the relatively low level of 23 and raised to LV 50+ will have better overall stats and be much stronger than an LV50+ one caught in the Unknown Dungeon. When presented with the choice of keeping a self-taught monster or replacing it with a newly caught version with a slightly higher experience level, be sure to check out its stats and collection of skills—I think you'll be surprised by what you find.

When you raise a Pokémon from a lower level, you also have more control over when it evolves. Pushing the B Button during an evolution sequence will prevent the Pokémon from changing into the next form. There are pros and cons to doing this however. A first-form

Pokémon has the ability to learn skills much faster than its more evolved cousins. For example, a Squirtle can learn the powerful Hydro Pump skill at LV 42, while the Wartortle will have to wait until he reaches LV 47 and the Blastoise until LV 52—10 levels later! If you're raising a Pokémon that evolves by means other than leveling up (i.e., with an Element Stone or by trading), there is a chance that evolution will keep them from learning any new skills at all or will make them learn a whole new set.

On the other hand, evolution tends to make Pokémon stronger and more flexible. Many times, reaching a new stage will allow a Pokémon to use different TMs or learn more powerful skills. There are a few Pokémon, like the Magikarp, that evolution will change from a weaker creature to a frightening and all-powerful monster. Make sure that you know your Pokémon before deciding how to raise them!



Note

You don't have to raise all of your low-level Pokémon if you don't want to. But if you decide that you really want a certain Pokémon in your main group of monsters, it's better to grab one while it's young than to wait until you can capture it at a higher level. Also, there are some Pokémon that appear in the later stages of the game where you won't have that luxury; there are also some Pokémon that you won't want to use regardless of what level you can capture them at.

Evolution

Most Pokémon change forms as they grow more experienced. Some Pokémon will even evolve twice before they reach their final form, while others won't evolve at all. There are three types of evolution in the world of Pokémon—leveling up, use of an Elemental Stone, and trading them to another cartridge—and since a Pokémon's method of evolution does have an effect on how often they appear in the game, it's a good idea to understand the fundamentals of Pokémon evolution.

Leveling Up

There are 36 species of Pokémon that reach their second or third form through the simple act of gaining experience and leveling up. This is the most fundamental way that Pokémon evolve and also the most time consuming. It should come as no surprise then to find out that you'll find the majority of these 36 species and even many of their evolved cousins roaming about in the wild. If you're trying to collect all 150 Pokémon, raise only those that you want to play an active role in your party and try to capture as many forms of the others as you can.

Elemental Stones

Many Pokémon can be coaxed into evolving with the use of an Elemental Stone. Four of the five stones (Fire, Water, Leaf, Thunder, and Moon) can be found in Item Balls in dungeons or bought at the Celadon Dept. Store. The Moon Stone is the rarest of them all and is found in dungeons only. Because your quantity of these is limited, use them wisely. You won't be able to evolve all of the Pokémon who need them! Seventeen species in all grow with the use of Elemental Stones.

Note

Evolving a Pokémon with an Elemental Stone is risky business. The majority of creatures who evolve this way will either lose their ability to pick up learned skills or will learn different skills than those set for the first or second form. Because you can use the stones at any time, it's a good idea to wait until the Pokémon is well trained and then upgrade the monster.

Note

Unlike Pokémon who evolve through the use of Elemental Stones, the four Pokémon brought about by trading aren't penalized when it comes to learning new skills. In fact, they retain the same learning rate as their second-form counterparts.

Trading

There are four species of Pokémon that evolve suddenly and mysteriously when you trade them with a friend at the Link Cable Club. All four species (Abra, Machop, Geodude, and Gastly) have three different forms, the second of which is reached by leveling the Pokémon up. Once they've reached that second form, you can trade them at any time. Once the Poké Ball has traveled through the Link Cable, the transformation will begin!

Pokémon That Don't Evolve

There are 24 Pokémon that don't face evolution, and they are all rare and precious creatures. Most of them only appear once in dungeons or in in-game trade scenarios, while a few can be found only in special areas like the Safari Zone.

The Importance of Trading

If you want to become a Master Pokémon Trainer, you have to be willing to trade your Pokémon. This is the only way that you'll be able to collect all 150 Pokémon. Within the game itself you'll find four people who are willing to trade their rare Pokémon for your more common ones. When you run across these people, make a note of their location and come back with the Pokémon they've requested. Because they're only looking for common Pokémon, get two and trade them the extra one.



Getting the unique Pokémon from the other version of the game, as well as the Pokémon that you didn't choose in certain parts of the game, requires you to link up with a friend at the Link Cable Club. Remember each version of the game has 11 Pokémon that you will only find on that particular cartridge. So if you want a Meowth and you're playing the Red version of the game, you'll need to find someone with both a Link Cable, a Blue version of the game, and an extra Meowth. You perform trades by going to the Link Cable Club counter at any local Pokémon Center. Enter the Trading Room and sit down at the table to negotiate possible trades. Once you trade a Pokémon, it's gone from your cart until you trade it back. You still retain credit for capturing it in your Pokédex, which opens up the floor for possible "temporary" trades. This works especially well if your friend needs credit for a certain Pokémon that you're unwilling to part with.

Trading Pokémon also has the added benefit of increasing the amount of experience that the traded Pokémon earns in battle. A Pokémon traded to you from another cartridge earns 1.5 times more experience than a normal Pokémon. There are also four types of Pokémon that evolve into their final form only when they're traded across a Link Cable.

A Few Do's and Don'ts Before Playing

Play this Game with a Friend—or Better Yet, Two!

Trading is an integral part of Pokémon, so the sooner you get used to it, the better off you'll be. If you don't want to deal with friends and you have an extra Game Boy and a Link Cable, then buy both versions of the game and trade with yourself.

Regardless of which you choose, getting all 150 Pokémon requires a carefully orchestrated and planned effort and is best done between three people. Here's a list of the points at which you'll need to make plans ahead of time and decide who gets what:

1. The official choosing of starter Pokémon at the beginning of the game.
2. Dome Fossil or Helix Fossil at the bottom of Mt. Moon?
3. Porygon for 9,999CR (Red Version) or 6,500CR (Blue Version)?
4. Hitmonlee or Hitmonchan at the splinter Gym in Saffron City?
5. Evolve Eevee with a Thunder Stone, Water Stone, or Fire Stone?

If you assign each partner a role, then you'll have a much easier time collecting Pokémon without duplicating rare ones.

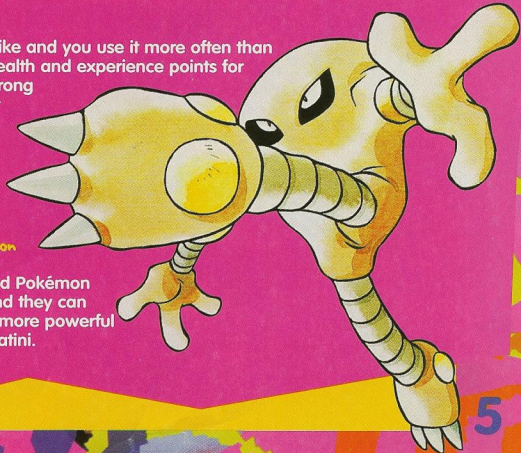
Don't Concentrate on Raising One Character Over the Others

We all know how it goes. You get a Pokémon that you really like and you use it more often than any of the others. That's fine, but it's better if you share the wealth and experience points for several reasons. A well-balanced team made up of equally strong Pokémon will fare much better against the Elite Four and your Rival. It also guarantees you backup in case your favorite Pokémon runs out of PP or is incapacitated in battle.

Remember, as the game progresses the number of Trainers you'll have to defeat in any one area increases too, as does the challenge they present.

Take Advantage of the 1.5 Experience Bonus of Traded Pokémon

If you find yourself with a Pokémon that you need raised in a short amount of time, try trading it to another cartridge. Traded Pokémon receive 1.5 times the experience points of regular Pokémon and they can add up in hurry. This is an especially effective way to level up more powerful Pokémon who evolve at higher levels than normal, like the Dratini.



Don't Try to Play the Game From the Beginning with Your Friend's LV70 Mewtwo

It sounds like a good idea, doesn't it? But, unfortunately, Pokémon has incorporated a system of checks and balances with the Badge system that will encourage you not to do this. As you'll find out from a citizen of Pewter City, Pokémon can choose not to obey a new and inexperienced Trainer. In fact, it is not until you reach Cerulean City and win the Cascade Badge that you are guaranteed mastery over all Pokémon up to LV 30. The Rainbow Badge extends that mastery to LV 50 Pokémon, and the Marsh Badge to LV 70 Pokémon. When you defeat the final Leader and acquire the Earth Badge then all Pokémon, regardless of level, will obey you without hesitation. Until then, traded Pokémon, in addition to captured Pokémon, are very susceptible to this little rule and you'll soon find that the LV 70 Mewtwo that you thought would help you win the game in no time, actually spends most of its time sulking and refusing to perform.

Save Often

Saving has its advantages. If you're defeated by a Trainer or one of the Gym Leaders, you'll be resurrected at the last Pokémon Center visited. But, it'll come at a price—namely, half your money!

We also recommend that you save the game before important battles or when you run across one of the legendary Pokémon like Zapdos or the Mewtwo. Because you only get one chance to capture them, saving allows you to restart if something unforeseen happens, like you run out of Ultra Balls or accidentally defeat them.

Don't Be Fooled; Trading Your Pokémon Doesn't Have to Be Permanent

When you trade a Pokémon, you automatically get credit for having captured it. You won't lose this credit if you trade the Pokémon back to the original owner. So, for those of you who are squeamish at the thought of losing one of your precious monsters, remember to stipulate this as a term of agreement before you trade with your friends.

Remember to Buy Antidotes and Other Curatives Before Entering Dungeons

The worst thing in the world is to lose a fight to a monster who fights by putting your Pokémon to sleep because you didn't have a bottle of Awakening potion. Always stock up on potions, antidotes, and other curatives before venturing into unknown locales!

Don't Forget that Pokémon Can Be Afflicted by Only One Negative Status at a Time

However, if your Pokémon do end up paralyzed or poisoned, think twice before healing them during battle. A paralyzed Pokémon is a hindrance at times, but that status anomaly prevents the enemy from hitting it with something worse, like sleep or ice.

Do Try to Match Pokémon in Battle to Maximize Their Effectiveness

The manual for Pokémon provides you with a chart illustrating all the relationships between the different types of Pokémon. Whenever possible, you'll want to sic Pokémon that have a special affinity against the enemy that appears. If you match your Pokémon well, you'll find that Pokémon that are weaker than the enemy have a fighting chance at beating them because of the attack bonus they receive.

More importantly, the chart will keep you from wasting your Pokémon's time fighting against enemies that it'll have no effect on.

Don't Be Afraid to Change Pokémon in the Midst of Battle

Yes, the old bait and switch is perfectly legal here in the world of Pokémon. If you pick up a Pokémon that is much weaker than your current favorites, don't be afraid to level it up by letting it spend a quick round in battle. In fact, moving it to the top of your list and then swapping it with a more powerful fighter is one of the quickest and safest ways to raise a Pokémon. After all, experience points are equally divided between all of the battle's participants!

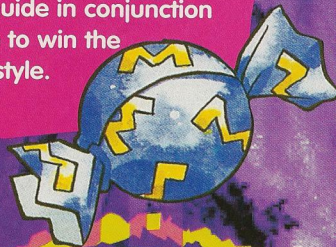
Experiment

You won't know what's possible until you try it out for yourself. So don't be afraid to mix and match TMs or raise interesting sounding characters. There's no right or wrong way to become a Master Pokémon Trainer, so just enjoy the game.

Note

Once you've gotten the Town Map from your Rival's sister, you can use it to get clues as to where to go next. Pushing up on the D-Pad will move the cursor to the next town or route that you should take and, for the most part, will describe the path you must journey before you meet the Elite Four from the Pokémon League.

2. Prof. Oak?

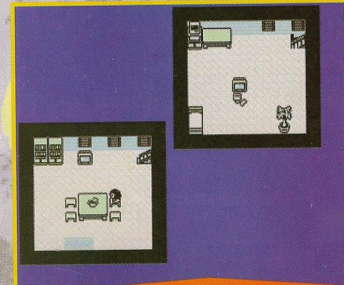
Wanna jump start the game? Then just try leaving Pallet Town. That will make Prof. Oak come running in an instant!

Hmmmm Will you take the flowery Bulbasaur, the water-squirting Squirtle, or the fiery Charmander? Whichever you choose, be prepared to defend yourself against your Rival from next door. That bully just won't leave you alone. Later on, once you've delivered a certain Parcel to Prof. Oak, you'll get your Pokédex and be able to buy Poké Balls and start your collection of Pokémon! Happy hunting.

1. A Little Bit of Home-Cooked Goodness



Inside your house, you'll find the usual luxuries that will remind you of being "home." Upstairs is your SNES and computer, where you'll find a Potion tucked away for just this occasion. Downstairs in the living room, you'll find your mother, who's always willing to provide comfort and a healing dose of chicken soup when you need it. If you're in the neighborhood, pay her a visit and she'll heal your wounds for free!

4. Why Should You Visit Your Rival's Home?

I don't know, maybe his sister has a crush on you or something. Pay her a visit after you get your Pokédex and she'll give you a copy of the Town Map. This item is awesome and will help you get from town to town!

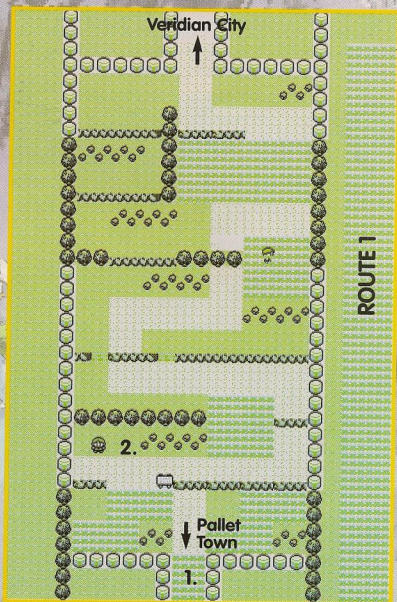

The roads here in the world of Pokémon can be pretty dangerous if you aren't prepared. The first time you'll walk down this road, it'll just be you and your first Pokémon. But after you gain the ability to capture wild Pokémon, you can use this as a breeding ground. Take this road north to Viridian City.



Route 1

1. The Dangers of Long Grass

Wherever you see these thatches of long wavy grass, you'll find Wild Pokémon. It never fails and, with the exception of dungeons and the water, you won't find Wild Pokémon anywhere else! So ... if your Pokémon is low on Hit Points or you don't want to fight in any more random battles, stay out of the grass.

2. The Rewards of Being Friendly

Whenever you encounter a person in a town or on a road, take the time to talk with them. They usually have helpful words of wisdom to share or even, in the case of this guy, a spare item.

TIP

This is the first opportunity you'll have to fight Wild Pokémon. The first time up and down this road, you won't have the use of Poké Balls to capture Pokémon or be able to buy a whole lot of Potions to heal you so you'll need to fight with care. If your Pokémon is getting low on health, use your Potion or stay out of the long grass and avoid battles until you can heal them at a Pokémon Center or your own house.

Viridian City

At first, you won't find much to do here since the Gym's closed up tight. But you will get to visit your first Pokémon Center and shop at a Poké Mart. It's a shame they're out of Potions, though.



1. My Pokémon Needs Help!



Whenever you enter a new city, one of the first places you'll want to locate is the Pokémon Center. Here you can heal your wounded fighters with the attendant, and she'll return them to you in "fighting fit" form. You can also use the computer terminal here to log into your personal Computer (to store items), Someone's Computer (to store Pokémon), and Prof. Oak's Computer (to have your Pokédex evaluated). A good Pokémon Trainer uses these tools wisely and often—especially since you can only carry twenty items and six Pokémon with you.

The counter to the right is where you'll find the Link Cable Club. Come here whenever you want to trade Pokémon with friends or just battle them head to head in the Coliseum!



Note

Whenever you go out capturing Pokémon, your six slots are filled up first. Then, any extra Pokémon are teleported into storage on your Computer account. Pokémon can be saved this way until the box you've currently selected becomes full. When you know you're going to be entering an area with a lot of new Pokémon, like the Safari Zone, it's a good idea to stop by a Pokémon Center and exchange for an empty box.

2. Delivery for Prof. Oak



Here at the Viridian City Poké Mart, you'll find not only shelves of basic supplies, but a post office as well. The clerk has a package for Prof. Oak that must be delivered immediately and his delivery boy's out sick!

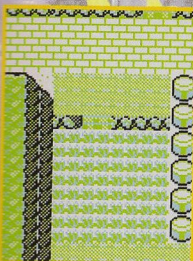

3. Pokémon Hunting on Route 22



Once you can buy Poké Balls and capture Wild Pokémon, you might want to consider hunting in the long grasses of Route 22. Here, not too far from Viridian City and the Pokémon Center, you'll find lots of low-level Pidgey, Rattata, Spearow, Nidoran ♂, and Nidoran ♀. Don't go too far though. Your Rival is lurking along the path to

the top and is dying to challenge you to another fight. Before accepting his challenge, make sure that you have at least two Pokémon trained to LV 9 or above. Your Rival will have two on his side: a LV 9 Pidgey and his default Pokémon at LV 8.

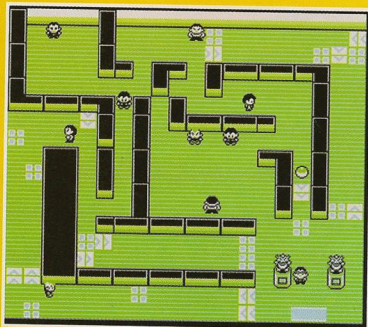
Note

Before you go up against any type of Trainer or Gym Leader, you'll want to make sure that you've spent some time fighting random battles and capturing Wild Pokémon. A good rule of thumb is to make sure that you have as many Pokémon ready to fight as the Trainer does and that they are all at least at the same level of experience if not higher! This may be overkill, but it will prevent you from fainting most of the time.

4. The Gym Is Closed?

Yup, and it will stay that way until you've defeated the other seven Gym Leaders. Sorry. Come back later.

Gym Leader Lowdown #8: Giovanni of the Viridian City Gym



We're jumping the gun a bit here! You won't battle this Trainer officially until the end of the game, so if you don't want to know about him mark this page and come back to it later.



Giovanni is the leader of Team Rocket, and boy is he mad at you! All the Junior Trainers in his Gym are dedicated to Ground Pokémon of the highest levels. When you do pay this Gym a visit on your way to the final confrontation at Indigo Plateau, make sure that you have your best Water, Grass, or Ice Pokémon ready to go and at least at LV 50.

Giovanni's Pokémon are mean, and the twisty corridors and transport pads at this Gym will ensure that his Trainers wear you down first.

If you win, you'll get the Earth Badge, which will compel Pokémon of any level to obey your commands and TM 27, the awesome skill Fissure.

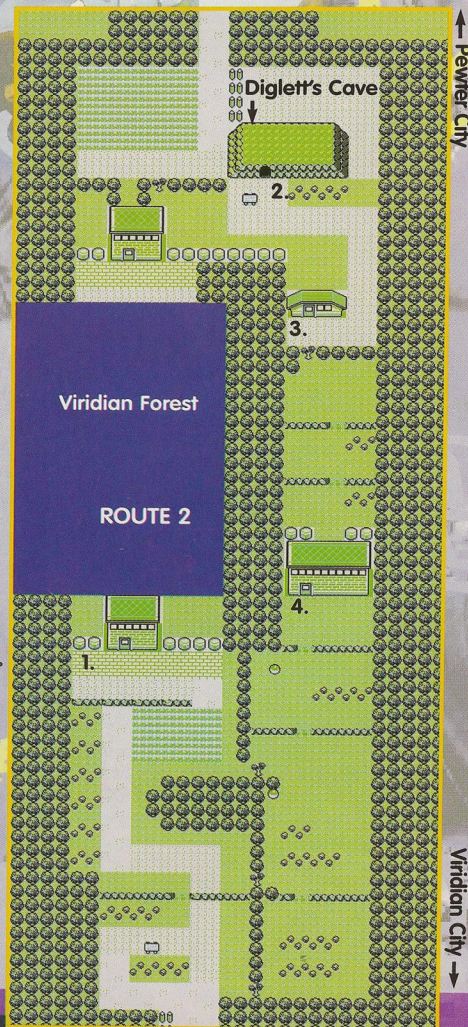

This little building leads into Viridian Forest. The people there will tell you a little bit about what to expect, but that's all. Make sure that you've stocked up on Antidote and Poké Balls before you enter. Healing your crew at the Viridian City Pokémon Center first is also a good idea.

2. Diglett's Cave

Until one of your Pokémon learns how to Fly with HM 02, you'll have to rely on Diglett's Cave to take you from the area east of Mt. Moon back to here. With the Cut skill, you'll be able to slice down the saplings blocking the path and go home for a quick visit!

3. Trader Alert!



The person inside this house is willing to trade you his Mr. Mime for your Abra. If you don't have one yet, write a note to yourself to come back when you do!

4. An Illuminating Visit



The people in this building are full of good information about Hidden Machine 05 and its skill Flash. Apparently Pokémon with this skill can light up whole dungeons. If you've captured

10 Pokémon by the time you reach this building, they'll give you your own copy of HM 05.

Note

There are five Hidden Machines hidden in the world of Pokémon that you must find and use if you want to complete your journey. These skill machines differ from Technical Machines in that they are reusable and the skills they contain can be used in battle or while you're traveling on the Field Map. That is, once you've gotten the appropriate Badge. One warning though—once a Pokémon uses a Hidden Machine, he can never unlearn the skill it contains.

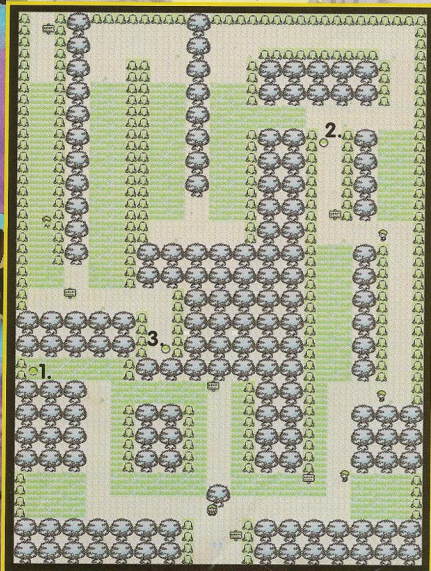

Trainer's Talk

You have three Trainers to deal with here in Viridian Forest, hidden amongst the labyrinth of trees. The three of them will try to attack you with Weedle, Caterpie, and a Kakuna between the levels of 6 and 9. The Kakuna will be the easiest to take out since he can only cast the skill Harden on himself. Try to use a Fire Pokémon like the Charmander or Flight Pokémon like Spearow or Pidgey against them for the best results.

Calling all Pikachu fans. Here's your chance to finally own a Pikachu! You won't find one very often in these woods, but when you do you should try to capture it. Electric Pokémon like Pikachu are great against both Water and Flight Pokémon and make great companions for Charmanders and Squirrels.

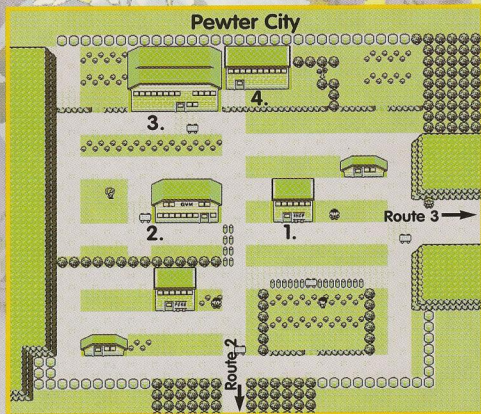

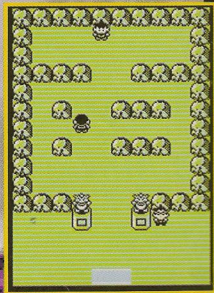

Note

Consider the Junior Trainers in each Gym a warm-up for the big battle with the leader. The Pokémon they use are of similar types and levels to what the big boss will use against you. Blowing through the Junior Trainers is usually a good sign that you're ready to go up against the Leader.

Gym Leader Lowdown #1: Brock of the Pewter City Gym



The time has finally come to face your first Gym Leader, and he's going to toss you a curve! Up to now, you've only fought tiny Bug, Bird, and Rodent Pokémon and I'll bet they've been pretty easy to defeat. Well, that's about to change.

Brock's Gym is devoted to the art of raising Rock and Ground Pokémon. These chunks of stone and precious gems are hard to defeat unless you have a powerful Water or Grass Pokémon on your side. If you chose the Charmander at the start, make sure that he's a well-seasoned warrior, accompanied by a Bug Pokémon that can help out if assistance is needed.

When you win, Brock will surrender the Boulder Badge and TM 34 as a reward. The Boulder Badge provides a boost to your Pokémon's attack strength and allows you to use the hidden skill Flash anywhere you'd like. TM 34 contains the skill Bide, which will be very familiar to you by the end of your battle with Brock's Onix.

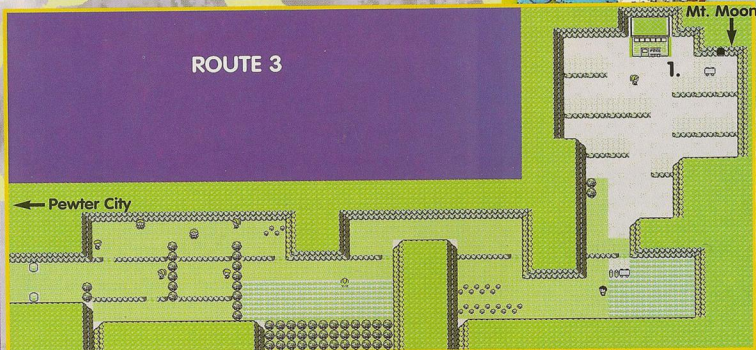

At the Pokémon Center outside of Mt. Moon, there's a man selling Magikarp for 500P. He'll make it sound like a good deal, but don't be fooled. Magikarp are not worth that much (until they become Gyrados), and you can catch them with a fishing pole almost anywhere. Save your money and wait until you get to Vermilion City!

Trainer's Talk

Along Route 3 you'll have to combat eight Trainers. This time, the Bug Catchers are back and they've brought with them stronger Caterpies and Weedles, along with a couple of Kakunas and Metapods. In addition to the Bug Catchers, you'll also run into several Youngsters and Lassies. These Trainers carry common Pokémon that you've seen and captured before or will be able to very soon. All of the Pokémon featured on this route range from LV 9 to LV 14. Your best bet is to be sensible and head back to the Pewter City Pokémon Center after every second or third battle. This is easier and, more importantly, less expensive than relying on Potions and Antidotes alone. You have a big dungeon coming up ahead, so you'll want to conserve your money for the Poké Balls and Potions you'll need while you're there.

Note



Before journeying into Mt. Moon, be sure to search the long grass for a Jigglypuff. These cute little balls of fluff and big eyes are extremely rare and can't be found in the wild anywhere else! If you're into magical and mysterious Pokémon, make this a part of your collection without fail.

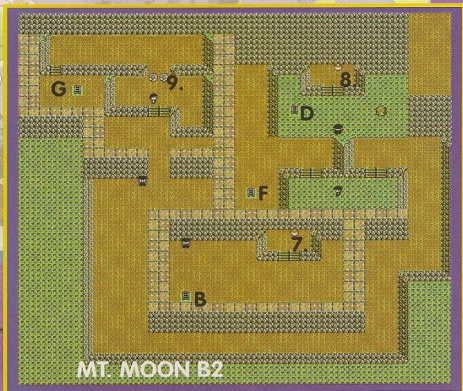
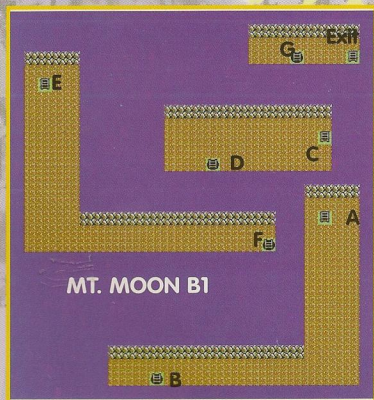
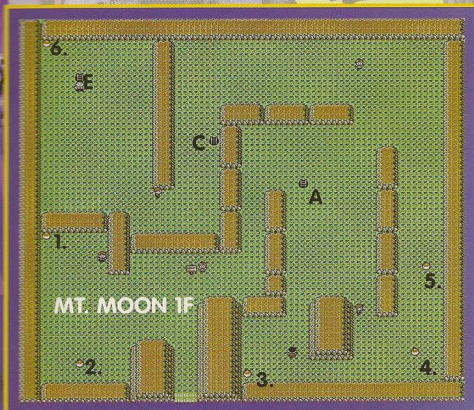

Trainer's Talk

Much like Route 3, the first floor is filled with Youngsters, Bug Catchers, and Lassies. Their motley assortment of Pokémon have grown somewhat and are now between levels 10 and 11. New Pokémon to look out for include a LV 14 Clefairy, an Oddish and Bellsprout duo, and a Super Nerd's pet Magnemite and Voltorb. Expect to battle seven of them before you've cleared the floor. And, as with Route 3, save your Potions and make good use of the Pokémon Center right outside.

Floor B2 is filled with Team Rocket members. These bullies are known for their evil crimes and the way they mistreat Pokémon. The Rockets in Mt. Moon fight with a variety of Normal, Ground, and even Poisonous Pokémon. There are five of them lurking on this floor.

Decisions, Decisions

When you reach the end of Floor B2, you'll find a Super Nerd guarding his find of two rare fossils. If you defeat him, he'll let you choose one of them. The Dome Fossil represents the lost species of Kabuto while the Helix Fossil carries the DNA of the Omanyte. Regardless of which you choose, put it in a safe place and don't lose it!

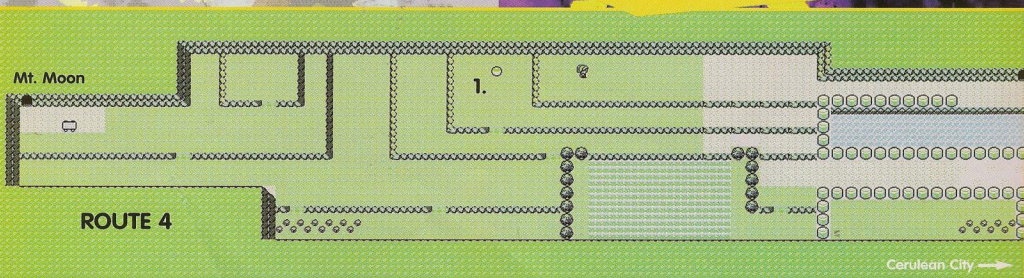

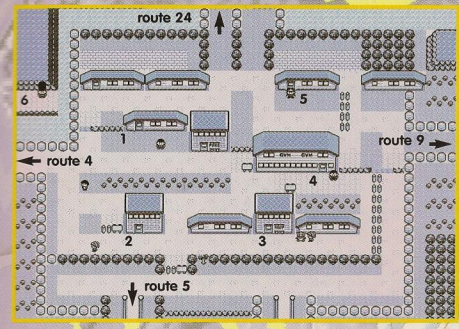

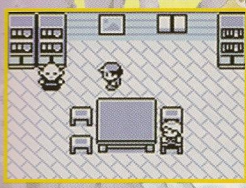

Gym Leader Lowdown #2: Misty of the Cerulean City Gym



She's cute, she's bubbly, and she always wears a bathing suit. She's Misty, and she raises Pokémon of the Water variety! If you haven't already experienced this with the Squirtle, a strong Electric or

Grass Pokémon is a Water type's worst enemy. Having a Pikachu, Bulbasaur/Ivysaur, or Paras on hand will make this bout go by quickly. If not, make sure that your Pokémon are pretty strong to begin with, around LV 25.

Defeating Misty earns you the Cascade Badge. This one makes all Pokémon up to LV 30 obey you without fail. This will come as a big relief to those of you with traded Pokémon who are misbehaving badly (as long as they're below LV 30). The Cascade Badge also makes it possible for you to use the Cut skill (HM 01) out in the field. In addition to the Cascade Badge you also earn TM 11, which teaches any Water Pokémon the skill Bubble Beam. If you have a Squirtle in your party, this skill makes a great addition to his repertoire.

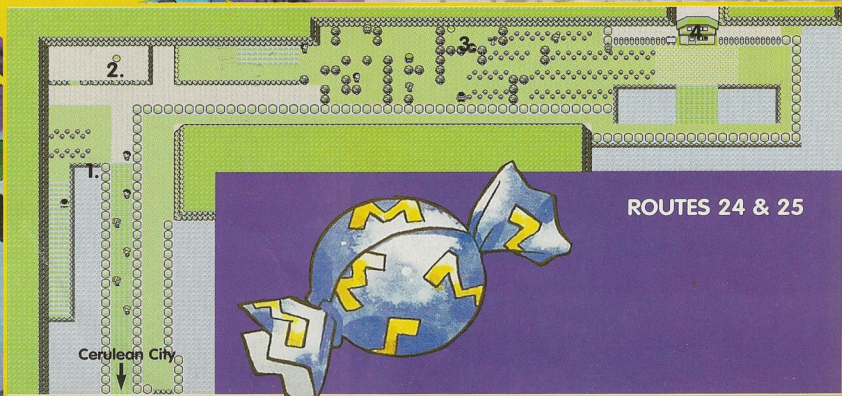

Routes 24 and 25

To reach Bill's house, you'll first have to defeat the 17 other Trainers blocking your path. The first one to come along is none other than your Rival. Now he's up to four Pokémon, including his starting monster, a LV 18 Pidgeotto and a LV 15 Abra. Hopefully you've been keeping up with him!



Nugget Bridge

Once you've defeated your Rival, a Team Rocket Member will challenge you to a duel. Defeat all five of his friends and he'll give you a Nugget as a reward. The hardest of these five Trainers will be the final one, who will attack with a LV 18 Mankey. Because you can return to town and the Pokémon Center at any time during this challenge, it might be a good idea to face this Trainer fully healed. Don't think that number five will be the final Trainer you face here. The Rocket isn't happy that you won and will try to compel you to join his organization with force.

The Practice Area

Right after you've completed the Nugget Bridge challenge you'll face another group of Trainers. The Hikers in this group rely mostly on Ground and Rock Pokémon like Geodude, Machop, and Onix. Be prepared and hit them with a Pokémon using the Bubble Beam skill that you won from Misty. A Pokémon equipped with the Mega Punch skill found in Mt. Moon will also survive against these tough creatures.

Bill's House

The rumors about Bill were right; he is a Pokémaniak. He's even turned himself into a Pokémon! Help him out by starting up the transformer machine in his house. Then, once he's back to his regular self, he'll give you a ticket to the Trainers' Party on the S.S. Anne. Don't forget to visit him a second time to check out his files on rare Pokémon. He has some interesting information about a monster called Eevee.

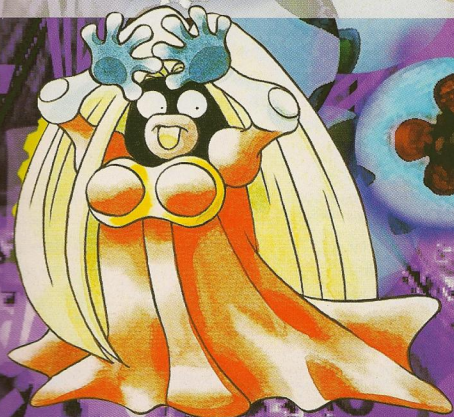
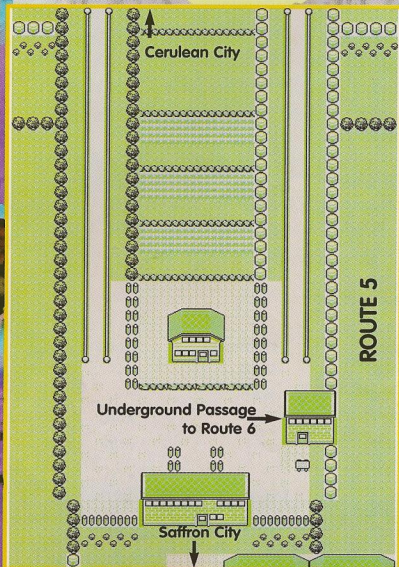

When you leave Cerulean City through the Burgled House, you'll find that you can't get back in the conventional way until you've found either HM 01 (Cut) or HM 02 (Fly). You can, however, get in through the rock wall on the side of the gym. Head south to the end of the road where you'll find a gatehouse and a small building.

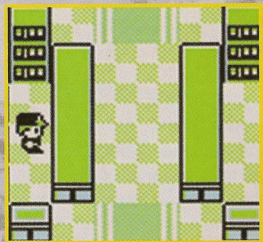
Daycare for Pokémon

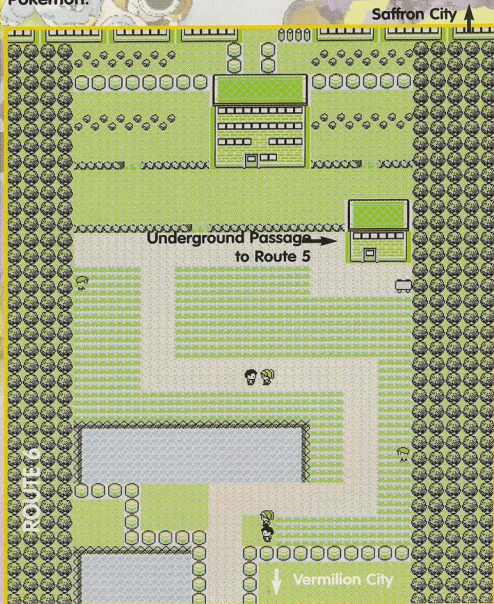


Underground Path

Gym Leader Lowdown #3: Lt. Surge of the Viridian City Gym



Before you can challenge Lt. Surge, you have to undo the electrical lock that he's used to keep people out. The Trainers will talk—once you've beaten them—and tell you its secret. You have to look in the garbage bins and when you find the first lock, the second will be in a neighboring can.

Lt. Surge is the leader of an order of Pokémon Trainers dedicated to Electric Pokémon. Only Ground Pokémon have a special affinity for defeating Electric Pokémon, so if you were able to pick one up during your travels, you might want to equip him with the Dig skill you picked up before leaving Cerulean City.

When you defeat Lt. Surge, you'll receive the Thunder Badge. This Badge allows you to use the hidden skill Fly in and out of battle. It also ups all of your Pokémon's speed. In addition to the Badge, Lt. Surge will also give you his TM 24. This teaches the skill Thunderbolt and is a handy addition to any Electric Pokémon.

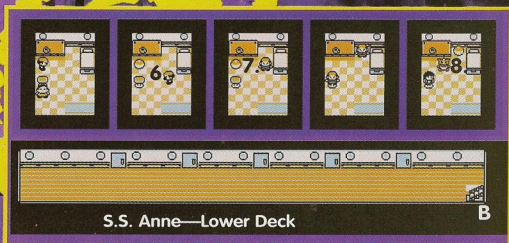

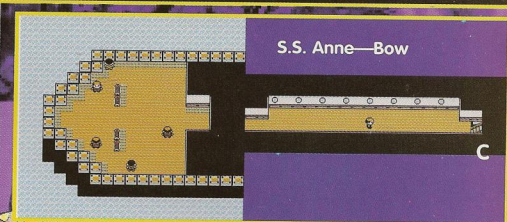
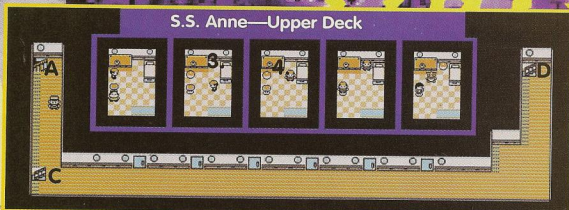

Trainer's Talk

Their Pokémon are also a mixed bag, but you can count on one thing: when you battle a Fisherman or Sailor, you can expect to see a lot of Water Pokémon. All of them fall within the LV 17 to LV 23 range of experience levels.

What's a Party Without Good Friends?

Well, I wouldn't exactly call your Rival a good friend, but he's here on the S.S. Anne. Use this battle to check your own progress. If you beat him easily, then you're doing a great job!

"Do You Have Anything for Seasickness?"

The Captain is suffering from a dangerous bout of seasickness. When you help him out, he'll give you your first Hidden Machine. This one teaches the valuable skill Cut, which allows you to cut down the small trees blocking parts of the path. With this skill, you'll be able to get into the Viridian City Gym and back into Cerulean City.

Note

Once the Captain has regained his sea legs, it's time to set sail. Leave the boat for any reason, and it will take off without you. If you want to fight all of the Trainers and pick up all of the loot lying around, make sure that you save your trip to the Captain's chambers until the end. This way you can fight and then run out to the Pokémon Center for some healing as often as you'd like.

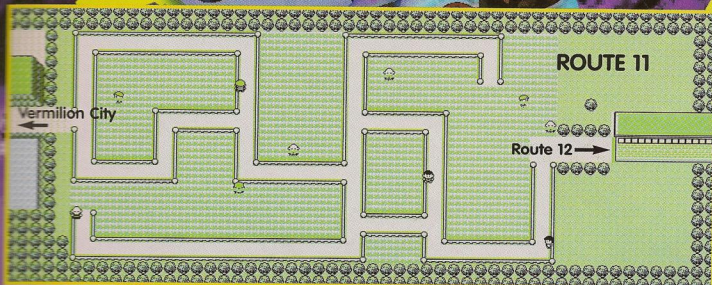
Route 11

Itemfinder

Once you've collected 30 Pokémon, Prof. Oak's Aide will give you a special item called an Itemfinder. Use this tool to locate hidden items. If the Itemfinder locates an item, you will find it on somewhere on that screen. Use it in areas like the Underground Paths or in blocked off areas that appear to have nothing in them.

Diglett's Cave

With the Snorlax blocking the road, you won't have any other choice but to take Diglett's Cave to the other side of the continent. This long and twisting tunnel, home to many Digletts and the odd Dugtrio, is a famous shortcut between Vermilion City and Route 2 near Pewter City.

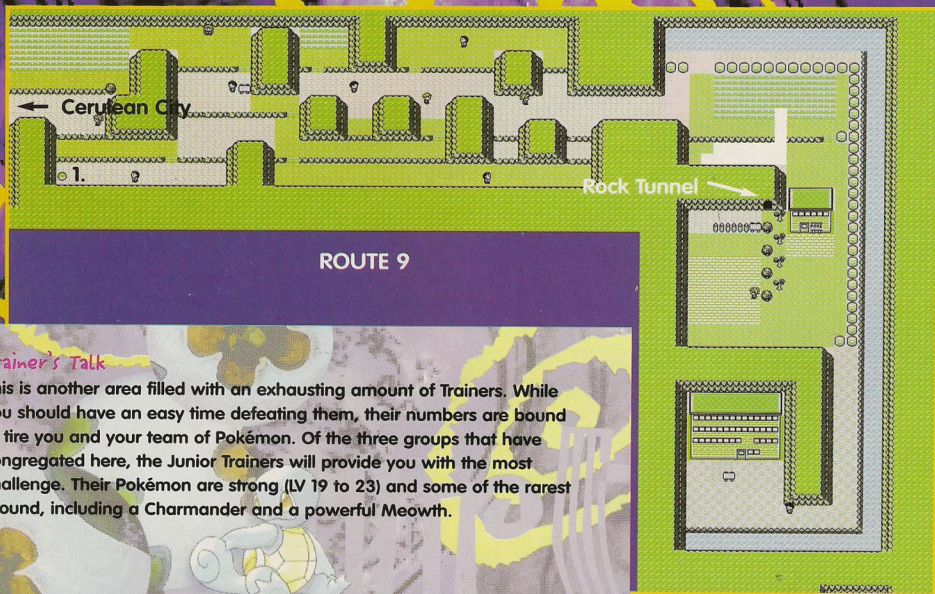

Route 9

Now that you have the Cut ability, you can take this route to Rock Tunnel and Lavender Town. The Trainers here are at about the same level as those on the S.S. Anne and Route 11, so you should have an easy time with them. If you find that your Pokémon are running short of steam, however, there is a Pokémon Center located right outside the entrance to Rock Tunnel.



Trainer's Talk

This is another area filled with an exhausting amount of Trainers. While you should have an easy time defeating them, their numbers are bound to tire you and your team of Pokémon. Of the three groups that have congregated here, the Junior Trainers will provide you with the most challenge. Their Pokémon are strong (LV 19 to 23) and some of the rarest around, including a Charmander and a powerful Meowth.

A Lovely Stream

When you get the Surf ability (HM 03), you'll want to come back here and explore the stream north of the Pokémon Center. An abandoned Power Plant that is inhabited by tons of Electric Pokémon is said to lie downstream. If you've been looking longingly for a Magnemite of your own, maybe this is the place to try.

Rock Tunnel

Make good use of the Pokémon Center west of the tunnel's opening. You have no idea of what lies inside, and the trek to the other side is long and treacherous.

already know are immune to Normal and Fighting attacks, and you have to get creative with them to defeat them. Psychics on the other hand are easily defeated by Bugs and their Ghostly friends. If you have either one in your possession, you might want to consider pulling it into the fray. The Marsh Badge that you receive as a reward makes all Pokémon LV 70 and below obey your every command and TM 46 (Psywave) is sure to please one of your psychically gifted Pokémon.

Teleport Pads and Key Cards

You will have an easier time if you get the Key Card before using the Teleport pads extensively. By the time you find this item on the Fifth Floor, you should have taken out about half of the enemy Trainers. If you clear out the rest of the levels before you start zapping around, you will have effectively taken care of any deadly situations before going up against the boss.

The Rest Ward

When you find the Silph Co. worker next to the bed, you'll know you're getting close to Giovanni, the head Rocket. Here you can rest and heal your Pokémon's wounds before going up against the boss man himself.

Didn't I Just Fight You?

Why didn't your Rival do anything to free the Silph Co.? Is he just here to taunt you? Defeat him again and then go on to the 11th Floor.

A Master Ball

To rescue the Silph Co. President you must battle with Giovanni once again. This time he's added some high-level Nidoran to his arsenal, so watch out for their poisonous attacks. With Pokémon in the LV 35 to LV 41 range, he's going to be tough to defeat. But if you found the battle against your Rival pretty easy, then this will be too. With Giovanni vanquished once again, you'll find yourself on the receiving end of a fabulous reward, the Master Ball. You only get one of these, so use it with discretion.

Note

It's highly recommended that you store the Master Ball away until you can enter the Unknown Dungeon. The Mewtwo there is fierce but a highly desirable Pokémon. Using your Master Ball on him is a very good idea!

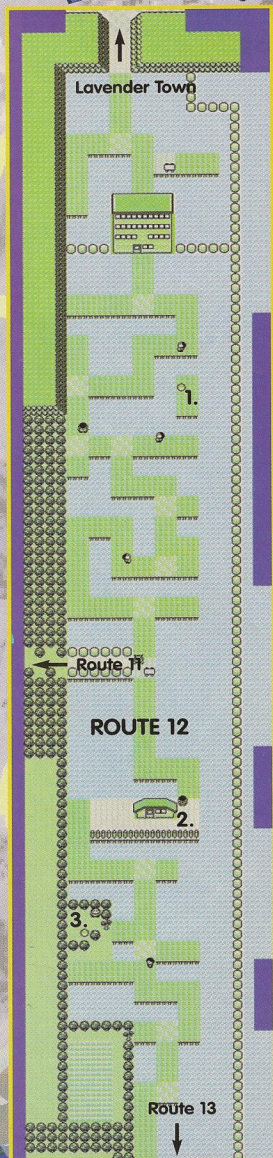

Route 16

You have roughly 500 seconds each time you're in the Safari Zone. In concrete terms you actually have 500 steps, since the timer starts whenever you stay still, fish, or get into a battle with a Pokémon. To check on your progress, merely bring up the Menu screen.
