



Type PX-2 Voltmeter



RADIO GOLF

For the benefit of some of our new subscribers who are not familiar with Radio Golf and its rules, a short explanation of it follows:

The game was suggested by Frank H. Jones, of Tuinucu, Cuba. It is a gentleman's game and each person keeps his own score. The method of scoring is as follows:

Let each person make a list of the stations he has heard, and opposite each station give the distance in miles from his location. The total score is found by adding up the miles thus listed. 





At the present time the 5th-string rello may be considered to be a successful accomplishment, both from the point of view of tone quality and mechanical construction. From a musician's point of view this means the following:

(a) Pieces of medium difficulty may now be classed as easy pieces.

(b) Really difficult pieces, which heretofore only a few masters of the instrument could attempt, have come within the range of pieces of medium difficulty.

(c) It is much easier to read a piece and to finger it properly because much of it is concentrated on the first four positions, including the fifth string, and the thumb is used much less frequently.

(d) A great many violin pieces can be placed on the 5-string cello by being merely transposed one octave lower, the strings being the same as on the violin. This opens to the cellist a vast store of high-grade violin music.

(e) In the orchestra or in a chamber ensemble, it becomes possible to play on the new instrument either the cello or the viola part.



Successful Opera Season Closes at Chicago

BY the time you receive this issue of RADIO BROADCASTING NEWS the Chicago Civic Opera Association will have finished one of the most successful opera seasons ever experienced in Chicago; a season devoted to popular prices which resulted in packed houses every night during the entire run of ten weeks. At the same time Radio broadcasting station KYW, one of the four large stations operated by the Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Co., and the only station in the world to broadcast grand opera, concluded the most important, instructive, and entertaining feature of its daily twelve hour schedule. During the entire opera season station KYW put into the air productions of the best known operas two nights each week, through the courtesy of the Chicago Civic Opera Association, whose hearty co-operation made this feature possible.

During this ten weeks run of the opera in Chicago thousands of letters were received at the Westinghouse office, bringing words of commendation and thanks from every state in the Union. This year radio has given the people of the United States who are fortunate enough to own receiving sets, an opportunity to hear the brilliant interpretations and singing of Chaliapin, the famous Russian basso, in the role of Mefistofele; Ina Bourskaya, as Amneris in Aida; Galli-Curci, in the role of Manon; and Claudio Muzio in the role of Aida, in the opera of that name. Picture yourself sitting comfortably at home in your favorite arm chair, listening to the beautiful voices of such internationally famous singers as those just named, and you are visualizing the principal cause for the popularity of opera as broadcasted by KYW.

Perhaps the most noteworthy fact in connection with this operatic achievement is that while the broadminded policy of the Opera Association made it possible for the operas to be heard by anyone having a radio receiving set, yet each night the theater was crowded with those who wished also to see these great productions.

No doubt many radio enthusiasts will avail themselves of the opportunity to attend some of these operas, offered by the post season tour of the Chicago artists to Eastern cities.


