VIRTUAL REALITY prototypes will be unveiled at this fall's AMOA Expo by the South San Francisco firm, Visions of Reality (VOR). Production is slated for December. Coin-op vet **Brian Duke** is taking the helm as director of sales/VOR Group for a marketing firm called the Black Diamond Group (Irvine, Calif.). Under prexy **Ken Stone**, Black Diamond will market VOR virtual reality entertainment centers worldwide. Brian, whose services were highly sought by some "prestige" coin-op factories, shared details with *RePlay* to back up his belief that VOR's product will be on the cutting edge of technology, quality and marketing (translation: "pricey goods but affordable deals for operators"). Keep your eyes open for this one!

MEXPO JULY 21-22 - The 1993 AAMA Latin American Amusement, Music & Games Expo takes place at the "Exhibimex" convention center in Mexico City later this month (Wednesday & Thursday, July 21-22). AAMA's fourth annual "Mexpo" will be their largest ever, judging by record preshow space sales. In a free seminar, Mexican operators and distributors can learn about new enforcement actions and policies by their government, and learn how to obey copyright and trademark laws. The seminar takes place at 1 PM on Thursday, July 22 in the Exhibimex. Admission is free, but a visitor's badge is required. Seminar panelists will include AAMA Exec VP Bob Fay; AAMA's Mexico City attorney David Shaw; and AAMA-AAG Latin American investigator Rhyn Tryal. For more information on the show, call William T. Glasgow, Inc. at 708/333-9292.

NAMCO TO CHINA — In 1992 Japanese firms from various industries signed 2,000 investment deals in China worth \$2.1 billion. Coin-op is among those getting into the act. Namco opened its first game center in Shanghai on June 8 and will start building games there next month. Namco provided 70% of the \$1.35 million budget. A local firm (owned the government of China) is a joint venture partner; it provided 30% of capital. Namco forecasts \$1 million revenue the first year. By 1997, with a total of 19 planned Shanghai game centers and more manufacturing, the joint venture's yearly earnings should top \$14 million, said Namco.

PCB THIEVES — At least three major operators in the St. Louis, Mo. area have experienced a rash of stolen PCBs from hit video games. The crime wave started

June 20 and several bowling alley locations were hit within a few days, according to **Barry Schraier** (Warehouse of Vending & Games). Similar crime sprees have plagued the Northeast, Chicago area and Southern California over the past 18 months.

TEE'D OFF is Premier's newest Gottlieb pinball. It's just out and not enough operators evaluated it for inclusion on this month's Player's Choice chart. But those operators who have it, gave the game super-duper high marks. If this pattern holds, Gottlieb could have a "sleeper hit" on its hands.

IN THE HUNT is the latest video from Irem America. Scoring nicely on our Player's Choice chart in this issue, the game offers two-player simultaneous sub warfare. "The best non-fighting game yet, earning in the street as well as arcades," raved distrib **Steve Levy** (Music Vend). Factory VP **Steve Blattspieler** says the game has broken all previous Irem monthly sales records, with help from operators like **Sean Layman** (City Games) who says "I'm buying one for every location I have."

TELCO BILL — Congressmen Rick Boucher and Mike Oxley have introduced a bill in the U.S. House of Representatives which would unleash America's big telephone corporations to build the much-discussed "information superhighways." The bill would lift telco/cable TV cross-ownership restrictions. Telcos would have to provide "up to 75% of equipped capacity" for competitors' use (i.e., a "video dial tone"). However, AMOA member operator **Bill Stone** points out that since fiberoptic info hiways may carry 1,000 channels, telcos could allow others to use 75% and they'd *still* have up to 250 channels to sell entertainment programming (like video games) in competition with our industry.

ROCK-OLA NEWS — Rock-Ola Mfg. Corp.'s new owner **Glenn Streeter** has amicably ended the firm's agreement with **Deith Leisure**. RMC will now represent itself in Europe. Prior management had granted Deith an exclusive on the Rock-Ola line over there, but the arrangement was somewhat "loose." Also, RMC has announced it will use **Dixie-Narco's** new "DBA" bill acceptors exclusively in all jukeboxes, including both the contemporary *Gala* and the nostalgia line. Streeter praised the acceptor's reliability and user-friendliness, saying it would help operators increase music income. RePlay the Players' Choice

B very time we think readers must be getting sick of seeing hi-tech stories in our pages, we notice another "straw in the wind" that says just the opposite. Lately, these straws have been piling up so fast we'll have to clean them out with a pitchfork. Item: Rubin Franco, a distributor in the Deep South, tells us virtual reality is a major topic of conversation in his region (where amusement operators are not exactly cash-rich to buy expensive new technology).

I tem: a leading Western operator was recently overheard worrying that in a year or two his company might be swamped by vidgame downloading by big corporations. "Maybe I should sell my business now, while I can still get something for it," said this normally super-optimistic fellow. Item: progressive operators from coast to coast are starting to ask RePlay what AMOA has up its sleeve to respond to all this. "Be patient," is our reply. "News is coming very, very soon." We could go on, but you get the idea. In the late '80s operators lost half their vidgame profits to home systems; in the '90s they're understandably worried about losing the rest of their video income to hi-tech.

The good news is that coin-op game factories are not going to abandon this industry. Most don't want to admit it yet, but leading video firms are quietly working on "networking" systems of their own for coin-op application. American and European jukebox factories, too, are quietly exploring music "downloading" technology.

Most factories are mum about all this future tech because they're worried about harming sales of current products...also because they want to keep rivals in the dark. A notable exception is NSM-America, which in this issue is franker than ever about its hi-tech "contingency plans." What may have looked like hype before, now looks like responsible reassurance to their operator customers. Maybe it's time more factories (especially the video guys) followed suit. Let the trade know you're not blind to the emerging threat of hi-tech competition. Let operators know you'll stand by them.

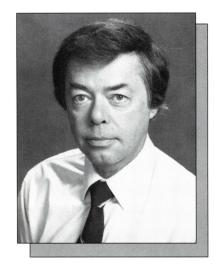

omeone recently said *"summer came early this"* vear." Funny, but we're amazed when this traditionally *quieter period once again looks* traditionally quiet. Don't sweat it...I'm not about to roll into one of those take advantage of the slack season to get your 45 library in shape editorials. Those interested in reading how operators should devote their energies in the summer (written by trade journalists who don't operate) can refer to practically every June issue ever published. Since most of

our readers are grownups, they'll know what to do.

No. I'd just lke to make one, small request of everyone...to spend a few minutes of that extra time you may find on your hands thinking about something that could become a hot potato, but in my opinion, hasn't reached the danger point yet. I'm talking about violence on video games which, left unaddressed, could provoke some really serious "violence" from outsiders one fine day.

A s a writer, I don't like censorship on principle. As an American citizen, I don't like it for additional reasons. But neither do I think video game designers should push that "violent envelope" until some public figure grabs onto it and turns it into a moral crusade. In case anyone out there has been asleep the psat 40, 50 years, we have enough public relations problems already.

w e all know that the industry quite naturally censors itself...be it a designer who pulls back from programming something really gruesome on the screen, to the distributor who takes a pass on something he feels is tasteless, to the operator who's in the best position to say yes or no to placing a machine before the playing public. The quandry always comes down to a contest of dollars vs. common sense (and, in many cases, moral sensibilities).

The same way I looked at the Three Stooges. I think it's funny, unreal, sometimes twisted but on the whole, a joke. But others (many others?) perceive this stuff rather differently...and they are concerned. I know you're thinking about this and that's all I ask (besides a decent shake for you all in summer revenues).

HI-TECH WORRIES

Dear RePlay:

New technology is about to change our industry forever. I've owned a small arcade (2,500 sq. ft., 60 games) for 12 years. It appears that the coin-op video game industry as I have known it is about to end. The new fiberoptic technology, cheap home computing power, compression techniques, home interactive gaming, and virtual reality headset displays will allow the current player to enjoy great entertainment from his own home.

I'd like to see more information on the above topics. New competitors that your magazine has not covered are the interactive dial-up gaming networks such as "Dakkar" and "Sierra On Line." These are two gaming networks that can be accessed for \$3 per hour via modem. The customer's home computer provides most of the graphics and gameplay, with a central computer providing information to all players currently logged on.

These games currently have no sound and are 2D graphics, but new products are coming which will make these networks as good as today's arcade games in two or

three years. They also have the advantage of being largescale interactive. The Dakkar game often has 50 to 75 gamers on line. These gaming networks are expanding their customer base by hundreds of new players every month. Imagine virtual reality headsets with high-quality graphics and sound in your own home for \$3 an hour!

Can we see articles on these new developments in your magazine? Is there a place in these new technologies and markets for the small arcade? These are questions that we need to have answered. Thanks for your time. I hope you can address these important questions in upcoming issues. Sincerely,

[Dear Troy: Your concern about hi-tech, fiberoptics, etc., is well-founded, and is shared by a growing number of operators. We've avoided writing about Sierra On-Line and other PC-based game networks in the past because we perceived them to be a different, non-competing market from coin-op. Now all these markets are merging, so you *will see more information about modem-based computer* game networks in future issues. As for the place of small arcades, nobody really knows. We'll give more details on hi-tech projects by AMOA and individual factories as soon as we can. Meantime, we agree with 3DO president Trip Hawkins: successful new media technology generally adds new markets while reshaping — not replacing — older markets. The survival of small arcades, like the survival of small radio stations and independent movie theaters, will probably depend on finding the proper niche. — RePlay.]

AAMA TO CHICAGO HQ



AAMA's new Chicago office will become operational July 12. The address is 450 E. Higgins Rd., Ste. 201, Elk Grove, IL 60007-1417. It's on the second floor of the First Chicago Bank building, just off the Northwest Tollway, about 15 minutes from O'Hare International Airport. Phone for AAMA's new site is 708/290-9088; the new fax is 708-290-9121. The AAMCF (American Amusement Machine Charitable Foundation) also has a new phone which is 708/290-9171. With so many major factories and dealerships in and near Chicago, the move puts AAMA closer to the center of industry action. AAMA President Steve Koenigsberg explained: "We hope that by being closer to our members, we'll be able to get more

people involved in our committees, making AAMA less staff-driven and more member-driven."

AAMA Exec VP Bob Fay will head a larger team, yet all under one roof, in the Chicago office. New faces will include associate director Elaine Kite; director of investigations Richard Trindle; PR/programs coordinator Angela Orlando; assistant/receptionist Michele Piazza and executive assistant Roberta Baird. AAMA's new site also puts it close to ACME show organizer William T. Glasgow, Inc. and PR firm Golin-Harris, both Chicago-based. Back in Washington, D.C. AAMA will be represented by three attorneys from its longtime firm (Arent Fox Kinter Plotkin & Kahn).

THE FUTURE IS NOW: "MULTIMEDIA" AT CES SHOW

The lid came off the "multimedia" world at the Summer CES (Consumer Electronics Show), which took place in Chicago from June 3-7. The big news is that The 3DO Co. (San Mateo, Calif.) is on track for a fall release of its \$700 "black box" which will play ultra-realistic CD-ROM vidgames and also allow interactive play over phone lines (some reports say it will even download games over cable TV lines). Strategy for this hoped-for "new standard" is being set by 3DO prexy Trip Hawkins, but the hardware will be built by the likes of Panasonic (Matsushita) and

Meantime, the list of 302 software suppliers (so far) for the 3DO machine reads like a "who's who" of tomorrow's hi-tech entertainment: Time-Warner, Universal, Spectrum Holobyte, The Software Toolworks, and Hawkins' own Electronic Arts, to name a few. By the way, Amusement Business (London) reports that Namco has invested in 3DO and intends to be a major software supplier. Inside this issue, vou'll learn more about 3DO, CES and some more digital networking ventures by major computer firms and telcos. Two related stories, starting on page 28.

JAMMA: SHOW DATES, NEW ADDRESS & PHONES

Various sources have offered conflicting reports on showdates for this year's Tokyo trade expo. We contacted the association by fax and got it "from the horse's mouth." JAMMA '93 officially takes place Aug. 26-28! By the way, the association moved to larger quarters on June 21 to handle its expanded duties (JAMMA plays a major role in the new, worldwide Anti-Counterfeit Advisory Group). JAPANESE VID FACTORIES REPORT STRONG EARNINGS

In the last half of May, seven major Japanese vidgame manufacturers announced 1992 earnings (their fiscal vear closed March 1). We took earnings reported in ven by Japan's Amusement Press magazine, and multiplied them by a figure of .009824 which Bank of America quoted for the June 17 dollar-yen exchange ratio. Nintendo's gross revenues were up 10.9% over fiscal 1991, to about \$5.5 billion. Apparently Nintendo's exit from coin-op didn't hurt them much, but competition from Sega on the home front slowed their momentum somewhat. Sega Japan recorded a whopping 62.6% increase in gross revenues,

to about \$3.4 billion, thanks to growth in coin-op and 16bit home system sales alike. Capcom Japan said revenue was up by a stunning 98.2% due to smash worldwide sales of Street Fighter II, resulting in gross 1992 revenues of about \$690 million. Namco Japan reported its '92 gross as about \$642 million. Konami reported sixmonth figures which would add up to a \$454 million gross for the 1992 fiscal year. Tecmo's \$141 million gross for 1992 was up by about half of one percent over the previous year, while Jaleco's \$133 million for fiscal '92 represented a slight drop from 1991 revenues.

WURLITZER PICKS PANKUS FOR ITS NEW USA PRESIDENT

Joe Pankus, an officer and director of the "older" Seeburg Corp., has been named president of Wurlitzer's USA operations, replacing **Joe Tedeschi** at the firm's Moonachie, N.J. domestic headquarters. Pankus reports directly to Klaus Telgheder, deputy managing director of Wurlitzer GmbH in Germany. Best known for his six years as a sales topper at Seeburg until it was sold to the present Nelson Carlo group, Pankus returns to the jukebox business after doing some consulting work with an outside finance firm as well as briefly with Capcom. He says there's a different spin to jukebox marketing these days and that "Wurlitzer will change some of its philosophies to match this changing environment. Aside from the basic issues of quick deliv-

ery response, equipment reliability, and competitive pricing," Joe added, "Wurlitzer will offer programs providing good reasons for customers to favor its products: long-term benefits rather than quick-fix sales offers."

Saving the industry has accepted CD technology, Pankus believes operators are seeking better ways to satisfy locations and players. "When a distributor or operator shops the market, he's looking for both financial and technical support. He wants to demonstrate certain advantages to his customers. Wurlitzer will attempt to satisfy these requirements, plus offer other programs that haven't existed before in this industry. I guess I might say Wurlitzer intends to make a little noise," he stated.

During his Seeburg years, Pankus was among those urging AMOA to establish its National Jukebox Committee, designed to preserve the 45 disk through promotions. He was one of the very last aboard the older Seeburg until its asset sale to the new regime. At Wurlitzer, his product line includes the popular One More Time 1015 reprise (available in vinyl as well as CD), the 100-disc New York. N.Y. and the 5-disc New Orleans.

PHILIPS SUES 8 COIN-OP MANUFACTURERS OVER VIDEOGAME PATENTS

N.V. Philips is the Dutch mega-corporation which invented CDs and plenty of other consumer electronics products and technologies. Their U.S. subsid, North American Philips, has apparently acquired rights to some old (1972) Magnavox patents on "digital circuitry" used in "microprocessor based TV game cartridges and consoles." Major U.S. vidgame firms have already been successfully sued in defense of these rights and have settled out of court, according to Capcom USA attorney Ian Rose. Mattel Toys was apparently also sued over the same patent rights, and lost its resulting court battle. Around June 1, Philips and Lockheed/-Sanders Corp. (also patent rights holders) filed suit against eight more U.S. coinop manufacturers. It seems Philips' intent is to recover infringement damages from the remaining major

vidgame factories which weren't sued earlier. Defendants include Capcom USA, Data East USA, Konami America, The Leland Corp., Romstar, SNK, Taito America, Tecmo, and TradeWest. For reasons which were unclear at presstime, plaintiffs also sued two leading Chicago distributors and one operator. Capcom's Rose said the suit covered vidgame revenues during a window of time through the late 1980s, during which the original patents were still active. Subsequent to serving defendants with the suit, Philips contacted them and indicated it was willing to discuss an amicable settlement, Rose added. At presstime, Capcom and other defendants contacted by RePlay had not yet settled on a precise legal response to the suits.

INDIAN GAMING REFORM: DON'T HOLD YOUR BREATH

With all the recent clashes between Native American tribes and state governments over Indian gaming, nobody seems terribly satisfied by the 1988 Indian Gaming Regulatory Act. That's why Congress is looking at "eventually" making changes in the Act. Talks and hearings are going on now, but don't expect results anytime soon. In the House, the Native American Affairs subcommittee took testimony from tribal representatives on June 7; a "field hearing" was scheduled for June 27 in Wisconsin with more hearings to follow elsewhere around the country. Over in the Senate, Sen. Daniel Inouye (chairman of the Senate Select Committee on Indian Affairs) has been shepherding behind-thescenes negotiations between tribes and state governments. Inouve hopes to build consensus between



major players before opening the IGRA law to amendments, according to reports. A reform bill has been introduced by two other senators, but the whole process could take well into this year or next, we hear. Meantime, Indian gaming is a growing concern for operators who say they can't compete. Learn more from our story on **page 43**.



TRADE MOVES TOWARD SELF-REGULATION OF VID VIOLENCE

The flap over media violence — including video games — continues. During public hearings in May and June, the U.S. Senate roasted TV producers because of violent shows and two bills which were introduced to regulate broadcast content. Producers promised to tone down the blood and guts this fall. Parent groups said it was "a matter of time" before attention turned to video games, as well. Accordingly, Sega of America (consumer division) announced May 23 that it will impose a voluntary rating system on home video games. Games will be rated suitable for all; suitable for 13 and up; or suitable for 17 and up. In Australia, operators are taking matters into their own hands. Faced with a major media outcry (mostly about Sega's violent live-action consumer game on CD-ROM, Night Trap) Aussie

ops have created a policy of self-regulation including a "seal of approval" for games that meet certain content guidelines. This news comes from NAMOA president George Campbell and powerhouse distributor Malcolm Steinberg (Leisure & Allied Industries, Perth) whose marketing director Chris Blackman helped the NAMOA effort. "They have made submissions to the relevant Australian authorities, arguing their case for industry self-regulation in respect to coin-op games," Malcolm added. "Indications are that government authorities favor industry self-regulation, providing that the industry and the companies involved can demonstrate their ability to perform that function in the community interest." In this issue, *RePlay* prints its policy statement on violent games, prompted by a query from *EuroSlot* magazine. See **page** 66

500TH FULL COURT FRENZY



Innovative Concepts in Entertainment (ICE) tossed an employee picnic to celebrate the May 28th shipment of the 500th unit of Full Court Frenzy. The popular game's moving hoop lets players shoot from every possible angle. At operators' request, a new "free game" option is now standard on all units (a retrofit is available for early models). "The current backorder almost equals the number of games shipped," said proud ICE prexy Ralph Coppola. "Order delivery is picking up steam as production has been doubled to

meet demand." Ralph quoted weekly location earnings that are simply awesome (we don't print these types of figures, but take our word for it). "The clearest indication of the game's success, is the number of reorders from existing customers," Ralph said. "Large arcade chains are starting to place the game in multiple sites." Beyond the impressive U.S. sales, samples have gone to 20 other countries, so obviously total sales potential is quite something. Congrats to this hardworking Buffalo, N.Y. manufacturer.

FACTORY NEWS & NOTES

At presstime Seeburg said its low-cost Blast! CD jukebox, which caused such a stir at the ACME Show last March, was slated to begin shipping from the Chicago factory in late June. "We're doing everything humanly possible to meet that target and are on schedule so far," execs said in mid-month... VR8 Inc.'s virtual reality vidgame, Virtual Combat, has been revamped and perfected since it sparked excitement and orders during ACME, said execs. At presstime, the unit was scheduled to start shipping June 30. Execs said the plant in Simi Valley, Calif. has been expanded by 15,000 sq. ft. to help expedite backorders... Japan's Amusement Press writes that Namco has sold its stock in Data East. Namco had owned a 25% share of DE...Gordon Smart (Smart Industries Corp.) has a daughter in the business who's hanging out her own shingle. Nancy Smart Singh is founder and CEO of Pur-

ple Star Inc., a new Urbandale, Ia. redemption game factory (515/276-7500). Former Smart employees Keith Ashbacher and Tod Bertram are Purple Star's VP and director of engineering, respectively. Their first product, Chase the Rain*bow,* is a kiddie-sized game (see New Products)...A Trenton, N.J. bankruptcy court issued a preliminary ruling on May 21 that trustees could sell assets and patents of Kramer Mfg. Co., Inc. to Zober Industries, with a proviso for an oral hearing on June 14 in case anyone objected. If it goes through, Zober will purchase said assets for "\$200,000 and other consideration, subject to better and higher offers" and trustees will apparently use the money to pay creditors. Kramer made video poker games for many years but entered Ch. 11 in 1989. Court documents said the reorganization was unsuccessful and Kramer entered Ch. 7 in 1990.

SEGA DEBUTS OUTRUNNERS; COIN-OP DIV. HIRES MORE STAFF

A new driving simulator called *Outrunners* will be the star attraction in Sega's summer game lineup, shipping by mid-July. U.S. coinop distribs previewed the game during Sega's June 24-25 dealer meeting at the Silverado Country Club (California). Outrunners is a racing game in the Sega tradition, featuring super-realistic digital stereo, System 32 polygon graphics, and interactive steering. Players can choose from eight vehicles, each with its own transmission, perspective, power and handling characteristics. Each car is geared to a different level of driving ability. Gameplay features a world tour via hairpin tours, dangerous detours and constantly changing road and weather conditions. Up to four two-player units can be linked for eight-way interactive play.

At the Silverado meeting, dealers met several new

On your Mark ...

Do you ever feel overwhelmed by all the stuff you have to read? If so, we sympathize. This magazine alone sometimes tops 300 pages. The load can reach staggering proportions if you

include valuable publications like PlayMeter, Vending Times, AMOA Location, Fun World, Star*Tech Journal. Family Amusement Center Quarterly. Tourist Attractions & Parks. Amusement Business, Gaming & Wagering Business, Interactive Update. Street Beat, Indian Gaming Monthly, Public Gaming International and probably several others I've missed.

Then consider foreign trade journals. In English, there's *Cash*

Box Australia, Leisure Line, Canadian Coin Box, EuroSlot, Coin Slot International, Amusement Business/Europe, Amusement Press (Osaka), Japan Amusement Monthly, and Fair Play. Several more are published in German, French, Spanish, Japanese, etc.

Next, you have a bunch of monthly newsletters from state operator associations. AAMA members also have two different internal publications. Coin-op leagues (and some individual coin-op manufacturers, distributors and operators) have their own magazines or inhouse newsletters. Local newsstands carry nearly a dozen consumer video game magazines, plus dozens of trade papers for related industries (movies, electronic media, consumer electronics, computers, advertising). Different classes of locations have their own trade magazines, too.

Talk about information overload!



Well, there's one good aspect to all this.



think you would want to know. By next month, we anticipate being on-line with the Prodigy service; this will doubtless open an entirely new universe of source material. In five years. everyone's cable TV and telephones may also be surging with billions of bytes of available information from around the world, around the clock.

Today, some U.S. operators are wondering if digital downloading is about to

outmode their routes and arcades. We understand this feeling, too, because we occasionally wonder where and how magazines will fit into the 21st Century world of instant electronic transmission. Somehow, we think operators will survive because the most important kind of "interaction" is not between a person and clever software. No, the most important kind of interaction is between real, live people...face to face...in public locations of all types. There is no substitute for reality.

We also believe trade magazines will survive because this industry needs inhouse research, reporting and advertising targeted directly at coin-op's unique market niche. But in 20 years — maybe 10 — you might find your locations are all serviced by games and music downloaded from your office. And you may be getting *RePlay* via modem, rather than in your mailbox.



How do you say "You're Busted" in Spanish? The phrase may come in handy, because a new day has dawned for copyboard dealers in Mexico.

On Friday, May 28, seven locations in Mexico City (representing five different businesses) were raided by federal authorities. Mexican prosecutors and cops were accompanied on the raids by investigators and attorneys for the coin-op industry. Over 800 counterfeit boards were seized from the various sites.

It was Mexico's first-ever crackdown on illegal video copyboards. Industry spokesmen said it won't be the last.

"We're delighted and very gratified," said AAMA Exec VP Bob Fay. "I see this as the start of liberating the legitimate market in Mexico. It's important to us. We've had a problem will illegal copies in Mexico for a long time. We had to take aggressive action because the problem was not solving itself. More action will follow," Fay promised, "first in Mexico and later in the rest of South America."

RePlay sent fax queries to four of the raided companies, but did not receive relevant replies from most by presstime. In addition the magazine attempted to contact the fifth firm, without success.

Under Mexican law, copyright infringement is a federal crime. Mexican law also permits private plaintiffs to file suits alleging criminal acts — which is what happened in these cases. After Capcom and Midway filed charges, federal prosecutors from the Attorney General of Mexico's office then assisted in the criminal investigation. The procedure began with routine verification that Capcom USA and Midway Mfg. did

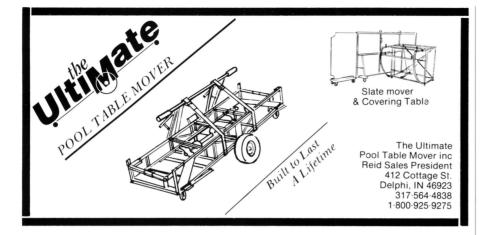
indeed control the copyrights as stated, verifying defendants' addresses, etc.

Next, plaintiffs' attorneys provided legitimate and counterfeit vidgame boards for government officials to use in expert test comparisons. Once the tests and other evidence made a case that counterfeits were indeed being sold from the defendants, prosecutors received a court order for the search warrant. The whole process took months. AAMA's Fay oversaw the general operation from his office in the U.S., while investigators and attorneys stationed in Mexico City did the day-to-day work of developing the individual cases and coordinating with local government authorities.

After this long build-up, warrants were suddenly issued on the morning of May 28. Federal authorities and the coin-op enforcement team instantly swung into action, raiding seven business addresses that very day. Industry representatives at the raids included David Shaw, AAMA's attorney in Mexico City; an investigator working for Shaw; and Mr. Maldonado, an attorney for Capcom.

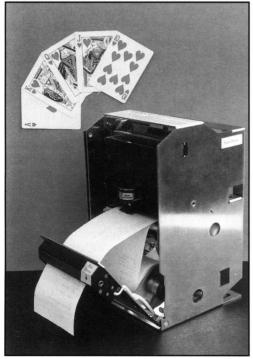
Running much of the actual investigation was former DEA agent Rhyn Tryal, who performed this task as part of AAMA's consulting agreement with Capcom. Tryal is expected to be named the Latin American Director of Investigations soon, when AAMA announces the formal launch of a global copyright "enforcement empire" funded by JAMMA. "We will actively pursue these counterfeiters," stated investigator Tryal. "We also want to congratulate President Salinas of Mexico on his country's first PCB copyright enforcement action," Tryal added.

AAMA's attorney David Shaw thanked the government officials who assisted in developing these cases. "We've gotten a lot of support from the U.S. Embassy, especially Mr. Ted Pitts from the commercial

area who has been closely involved and made some very useful suggestions. We also deeply appreciate the cooperation of the Mexican Attorney General's office."

Legitimate operators in Mexico have long begged government authorities and coin-op manufacturers to take strong action against counterfeit traffickers. AAMA's Fay told *RePlay* last spring that "we know who the guilty parties are, but we simply haven't had the resources to pursue action against them."

Starting this summer, AAMA is going to get all the money and manpower it needs. After months of careful preparation, JAMMA has now signed a contract with AAMA, agreeing to provide a million-dollar budget. The money will fund a two-year, anti-counterfeit campaign around the world. Former FBI agent Fay will supervise the effort from AAMA's new Chicago headquarters. The new organization will be called the Anticounterfeit Advisory Group, or AAG.

AAG should be up and running very soon, Fay indicated at presstime. In fact, the G-man-turned-association exec said it was possible his new group would start official operations by mid-June. AAG's global investigations team will be comprised of former Drug Enforcement Agency officers and/or other former U.S. federal cops. "They'll be all over the map of Latin America," Fay warned, "putting away the bad guys and opening up business opportunities for legitimate manufacturers and local operators. Once we clean up the illegal copies, Mexico will present a much more profitable market for the industry."

Meanwhile, in the wake of the May 28 raids, the legal process against the five defendants is continuing on course in Mexico's federal system. In due time, punishment will come to the guilty parties, said industry spokesmen. That punishment may take the form of very heavy fines or other serious criminal sanctions.

"We're already getting a lot of momentum from these raids," said Capcom USA attorney Ian Rose. "Many other distributors in Mexico are approaching us with a desire to cooperate rather than become the next target. We will do whatever it takes to defend our copyrights."

NYPD BUSTS COPYBOARD & GAMBLING DEALERS

Officer Peter Shanhai leads raids resulting in 45 arrests; AAMA's Bill Kidwell helps ID copyboards for felony charges

Some 45 people were arrested and a bonanza of cash and illegal equipment was seized in New York Police raids against shady private businesses, conducted on Wednesday, June 8. Confiscated booty included 1,400 illegal gambling devices; 270 counterfeit vidgame PCBs; and approximately \$170,000 in cash. Also seized were three weapons and two late-model vehicles.

At presstime, grand jury hearings were scheduled for June 14-15. Police said they were seeking criminal indictments, and eventual convictions, on copyright infringement charges. "We want to see some jail time for the people involved," stated the lead investigating officer.

Raided were companies and individuals doing business under the names Liberty Vending; Amuse-

ment Vending; PNT Amusements; and JAMMA Electronics (not connected to the Japanese trade association).

RePlay attempted to contact these firms for comment, but no listings were found under these company names by local telephone directory personnel. At presstime, police had not released names of individual suspects.

The simultaneous raids on five addresses in Brooklyn and Queens took place from 8-10AM. New York police officer Peter Shanhai (Organized Crime Control Bureau, Public Morals Division) put the case together over seven months of rigorous surveillance and investigation.



Officer Shanhai and his fellow investigators were accompanied by AAMA's Director of Investigations Bill Kidwell as they executed search warrants.

The case originated when the NYPD received a tip from U.S. Customs regarding possible illegal gambling activity. Officer Shanhai did surveillance at the address in question. Eventually he spotted a suspect who delivered PCBs to that site. Following the suspect led Shanhai to various other addresses, where more PCB deliveries occurred.

"From there it just mushroomed and I started doing surveillance daily," Shanhai said. "In a seven month investigation I gained enough probable cause to obtain a search warrant and we arrested them."

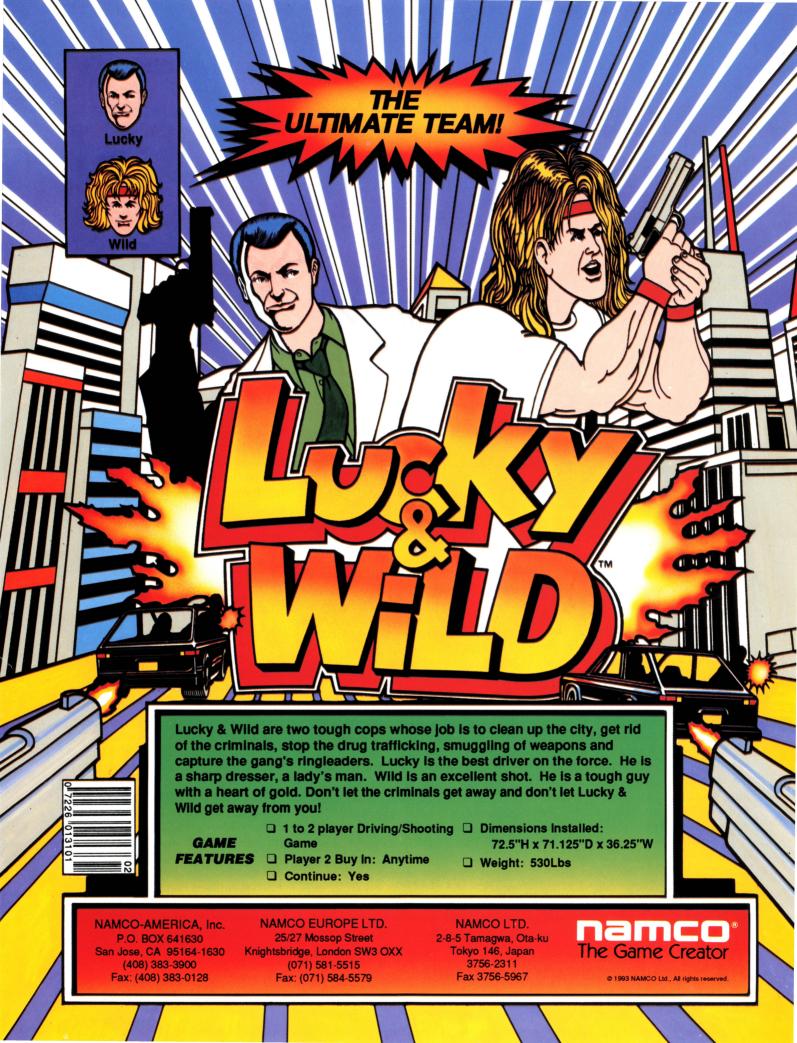
Trading in gambling devices is only a misdemeanor in New York, so Officer Shanhai decided to seek more serious charges that carried heavier punishments. "Since we could only charge the suspects with misdemeanors under state law. I decided to seek felony charges such as counterfeit and copyright infringement charges that could result in jail time," the officer said. "I called Capcom USA and they put me in touch with AAMA Director of Investigations Bill Kidwell.

"Kidwell was terrifically helpful," Shanhai continued. "Without him we could not have proved these boards were counterfeits. Kidwell and three technical

experts from the coin-op industry accompanied me on my raid on Liberty Vending's primary address. My fellow investigators hit the other addresses simultaneously so the suspects could not warn each other."

For his part, Kidwell told *RePlay:* "I feel the raids were very successful. The NYPD put a lot of time and work into the investigation and had exceptionally thorough preparation for these raids." Kidwell, who has taught seminars to NYPD regarding illegal video game counterfeits, testified at the Grand Jury hearings against the defendants.

HAPPENDE CONTRACTOR OF CONTRA

Multimedia and interactive networks are busting out all over — and both include a heavy dose of video games. Multimedia is the "content" and interactive networks are the "conduit." When you put them both together, these hi-tech marvels are ushering in a breathtaking new world of home-based entertainment.

Multimedia is the "latest and greatest" in hi-tech content: a combination of computer text, TV graphics and CD sound. New games coming out soon in this format will use CD-ROM as a platform to create, finally, the "interactive movies" which have long been the goal (that is, games with graphics, sound, plot, acting, etc. as good as a movie).

If multimedia is content, then interactive networks is the means of transmission...the "latest and greatest" in hi-tech delivery systems, using cable TV or telephone lines or satellite broadcasting to put games into people's homes. The same systems will let people in remote sites play games against each other.

Here's a rundown on just a few recent developments in both areas:

♦ At the Summer CES (Consumer Electronics Show), held in Chicago in early June, about 40 multimedia firms showed products, according to a reports. That's double last year's number. "An entire building [of the Summer CES show] is filled with CD-ROM, multimedia type of products just coming onto the market," said CES organizers. Show execs added that By 1994, the number of multimedia software suppliers with CES exhibits should jump another 50%, to about 140 firms.

♦ 3DO bowed its multimedia player (see related story in this issue) at CES. The firm previewed some incredible CD-based games for this system. Spectrum Holobyte's Star Trek: The Next Generation offers stunning computer-generated, animated graphics whose look is so rounded and lifelike, you'd swear an top airbrush artist had created every frame...except the player can control the characters. Crystal Dynamics actually hired real actors for its Crash 'N Burn game, which combines George Lucas quality special effects of sci-fi ships, planets, etc. with live actors whose images can also be controlled by the player. CD quality sound enhances both games...and many more of this caliber are coming to the 3DO system (and undoubtedly to competing systems as well).

◆ Starting next summer, AT&T plans to sell units that plug into existing Sega Genesis 16-bit home video machines, allowing interactive play via existing phone lines. The adapter units will cost \$100 to \$150, according to a June 4 story in the *Washington Post*, and will have a "slight delay" in transmission of "heavy action" games like *Street Fighter II*.

◆ Cable TV giant Viacom will work with AT&T to test interactive TV next year. The market test will involved 1,000 of Viacom's cable TV subscribers in Northern California.

◆ The Prodigy on-line computer services network, which currently lists two million subscribers, is joining forces with Sears and IBM to expand its access from telephone links to cable TV. Prodigy's TV link will offer interactive services like banking, shopping, and information. Prodigy also plans to link its phonebased setup to Sierra On-line service, which includes complex games.

◆ Apple Computers announced at the CES Show that it will join forces with three major telcos (AmeriTech, BellSouth, and US West) to offer telecommunications services to homes and offices.

◆ Time-Warner has chosen Silicon Graphics, Inc. to make a hi-tech "black box" for interactive cable TV programming. The unit will enable video games users in remote sites to enjoy interactive play.

◆ In the realm of software development, Disney is working with Virgin Games and Sega on a home video game version of *Aladdin*. Development costs could hit \$1.5 million, and the partners expect to sell one million cartridges by yearend — about four times sales for an average title, according to the *L.A. Times*. In another hit movie to vidgame crossover, MCA-Universal Pictures is developing an interactive CD version of *Jurassic Park* for the forthcoming 3DO player unit.

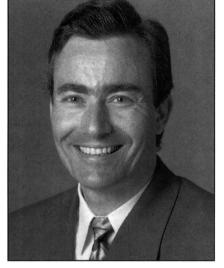


TRIP HAWKINS' BRAVE NEW WORLD Silicon Valley firm "3DQ" hows multimedia (D home player unit:

Silicon Valley firm "3DO" bows multimedia CD home player unit; some of the world's leading corporations are part of the action

What Nolan Bushnell was to video games, Trip Hawkins may be to the emerging multimedia market. He is visionary guru, business leader and industry spokesman all rolled in one. Hawkins, president of Electronic Arts and CEO of a sister company called 3DO, introduced his firm's new multimedia, interactive CD player unit and gave the June 3 keynote speech at the summer Consumer Electronics Show in Chicago.

Both the product and the speech pointed to an emerging industry that Hawkins thinks will reach \$20 billion in annual earnings by the next decade. According to the youthful CEO, multimedia will be a different market from video games, and it will also be different from the much-discussed "information superhighway." Further, said Hawkins, multimedia may not be a threat to either vidgames or the yet-to-materialize info

highway.

Backed by the world's largest consumer electronics firm (Matsushita/



Panasonic & AT&T will make 3DO's interactive hardware, which is expected to sell for about \$700.

Panasonic) and by America's biggest media giant (Time-Warner), 3DO (San Mateo, Calif.) is positioning it system as the "800 pound gorilla" of multimedia. 3DO and its heavyweight backers intend to scoop up a good-sized share of that anticipated \$20 billion per year through a remarkably open business arrangement that's intended to set up a "universal standard" for their new technology in record time.

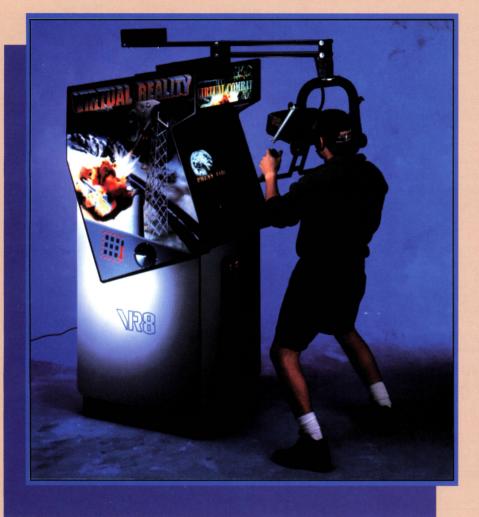
But what exactly is multimedia, if it's not video games or an information superhighway? As Hawkins sees it and as 3DO is selling it — multimedia is going to be a multi-use, interactive CD player that hooks up to your TV set, something like a Nintendo home system...but it will do much, much more. Yes, it will play games, but their quality of image, sound, acting and plotting will be more like a first-class Hollywood movie. It will also run educational software (and perhaps just about anything else vou can put on a compact disc). The Panasonic 3DO multimedia player is set to reach stores this fall, with a wide variety of software available for Christmas.

Citing 10 critical success factors in the past launches of the radio, TV, personal computer and video game industries, Hawkins predicted: "Multimedia...is going to be a certain winner and it's going to happen faster than any market we've ever seen." The bulk of Hawkins' keynote address listed those 10 factors and explained why they'll work in favor of multimedia.

The 10 factors are: 1. Multimedia has strong backers (3DO itself is heavily supported by Time-Warner, Matsushita, and others). 2. It represents a

big jump in performance over previous technology (3DO says its machine delivers 50 times the animation performance of personal computers and video games — i.e., realtime, full-motion, interactive graphics and CD quality sound). 3. Customers already exist (that is, all the people who are now in the home vidgame and personal computer markets will upgrade to the right product). 4. Multimedia has lots of software (3DO alone has signed up a total of 302 third party software suppliers, including MCA-Universal, Warner Bros., Paramount Interactive, GTE

MicroProse, Spectrum Holobyte, The Software Toolworks, etc.). 5. The 3DO machine is not "backwards compatible" (i.e., it forces a leap forward and instantly outdates its competitors by **not** playing regular CDs, regular vidgames, VHS or laserdisc movies, etc.). 6. It has low media cost (CDs now cost \$1 to make). 7. Ease of manufacturing

ImagiTrek, American Laser Games,



(computer chips, plastic boxes, CDs are easy indeed to make). 8. Multiple brands are available (a variety of firms will offer both hardware and software compatible with the 3DO system). 9. Hardware price is under \$1,000 (Hawkins pointed out that the first generation of black and white TVs would cost \$1,600 in 1993 dollars). 10. Multi-format software is available (you can play games, listen to music, and so on).

Hawkins predicted the muchanticipated "information superhighway" will pose little or no competition to multimedia. He said the highway be a hugely expensive, slowgrowing project, heavily regulated by government. "It's going to be a great thing for all of us," he smiled. "On the other hand, what are you going to do about the shopping instinct?"

By the same token, Hawkins' keynote speech implied what he has explicitly stated before: that a more powerful home media can actually strengthen the commercial market. Hawkins pointed out how this actually happened for Hollywood (VCR rentals and cable TV promoted and added to box office receipts, instead of killing them). The implication is that coin-op video could also profit from the explosive kick of multimedia (if our industry plays its cards right).

Despite Hawkins' reservations about information superhighways, 3DO does plan to link its users over phone lines for interactive play. The firm has a hardware licensing agreement with AT&T, the U.S.'s leading long distance telco. 3DO said the deal will allow "access to a wide variety of interactive entertainment and education services via the telephone network." AT&T will make and market its own 3DO player units as part of the agreement.

Oddly enough, 3DO will not actually make the 3DO CD player machine. As cited, AT&T will manufacturer the players, as will Panasonic, etc. Hawkins' own software firm, Electronic Arts, will be one of the hundreds of game suppliers, but 3DO won't make software either. Instead, 3DO is simply the central "matrix" of this ambitious scheme to realize the potential of multimedia.

Slam Masters merges 3-D sound, new gameplay & a national tournament

The company that brought you the Street Fighter video games has some nifty new moves up its sleeve. Capcom USA is knocking over the other chessmen to make way for Saturday Night Slam Masters, the first coin-op game to use the amazing 3-D "Q-Sound" process. In addition, Capcom is promoting this game with a nationwide, six-week Slam Masters video tournament. Also in release are The Punisher, a kit based on Marvel Comics' hottest character, and a modified version of the Capcom-polaroid Instant Memories photo booth which allows a \$3 vend price.

Capcom demo'd the new games and new technology to its distributing team at the posh Phoenician resort hotel complex (Phoenix, Ariz.) during a May 23-25 meeting. Present from the California manufacturer's leadership team were Chief Operating Officer, Mr. Kazushi Hiaro; newly-elevated Senior Coin/Commercial VP Joe Morici; coin-op VP Jeff Walker; coin-op national sales manager Jolly Backer; new marketing director Lee Kramer; and VP George Leslie.

quite a bit, and deservedly so. A sitdown demonstration of the audio process only (without a game attached) gave the incredible sensation of a helicopter circling 360 degrees around the player as he rotated the joystick. Patented by Archer Communications of Canada, Q-Sound is described as a "sound localization technique" to fool the brain into thinking it hears 3-D sound. Archer and Capcom have been working together on putting the process into video games for two years.

"We're very pleased and proud to be a partner with Capcom," smiled the director of Archer Communications. "It's to the credit of Capcom's chairman, Mr. Tsujimoto, to have recognized the potential of Q-Sound in the video game market." (Then the Archer chief jetted back to Hollywood, where several top recording stars and movie studios are incorporating Q-Sound into their products.)

Slam Masters begins shipping this month in three different dedicated formats, all with Q-Sound. A kit (without Q-Sound) follows sometime this fall. In all, that's four different formats. Here's the rundown:

1.) The largest version comes in a 50" Dynamo cabinet. 2.) A four-player "tournament edition" ships the second week of July (it's actually two dedicated uprights linked in a "modular" configuration that can later be broken into independent units, i.e. standard upright versions).

3.) A standard upright (one screen,

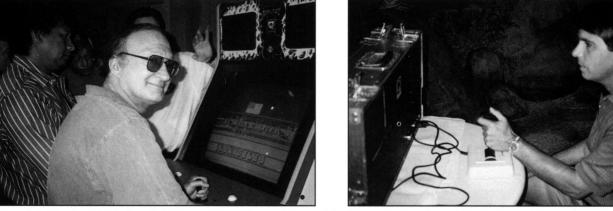
four players) ships the third week of July but is not eligible for tournament participation. 4.) Kits ship sometime this fall but as stated, they will not have the Q-Sound process, which requires stereo speakers. Kits will also not be eligible for tournament participation.

Jeff Walker told dealers that Slam

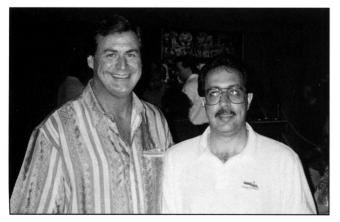

declared. "You'll get two or three credits pumped in, every couple of minutes."

Gameplay offers a video first: "team battle royale" where four players wrestle head to head, with two teams in the ring at once. The game also brings 10 new colorful new characters to the screen like a "flying Canadian" bad guy, a jungle wildman with a monkey on his back, etc.

Capcom's location testing showed the game as number two behind *NBA Jam* at Golfland Arcade in Northern California, but the game jumped to number one in earnings after a local "quickie" tournament promo. The national *Slam Masters* tournament starts Aug. 28 and will be publicized to players in *Game Pro* magazine. Operators will run their own locallevel qualifying events. Capcom will determine regional levels and sites according to density of game distribution, tournament participation and suitable arcade availability. Capcom itself will sponsor the finals, to be held at their Yellow Brick Road arcade in San Diego six weeks after tournament kick-off.

The age-old question about enhanced sound in arcade games is, can players really hear it in a noisy arcade setting? Capcom said yes, especially during tournament promos...and by the way, it may be possible for players to plug in their own Walkman headsets in a special sound jack on the game. At the Phoenix meeting, distributors also asked Capcom execs: "How much did earnings improve when you added Q-Sound to this game?" The answer: "Earnings rose substantially," said Jeff Walker. He added that as designers learn to best exploit the possibilities of Q-Sound, the incremental earnings from this audio process should continue to rise.

Also shipping is *The Punisher*, a two-player, action-themed video game. The title character from Marvel Comics teams up with "Nick Fury, Agent of S.H.I.E.L.D." to fight against Marvel's master villain, The Kingpin. The video was previewed at this spring's ACME show and is available

in dedicated upright and kit formats. Six levels of action offer graphics that closely resemble Marvel's comicbook drawing style.

While operators are promoting Q-Sound and *Slam Masters* with a national tournament, Capcom will be busy preparing still more "chess moves" for its 1993 business strategy. One of Capcom's biggest ploys will be the release of *Street Fighter III* this fall, Jeff Walker confirmed. We suspect we'll hear more about Q-Sound, about other hi-tech, about more national video tournaments, and additional intriguing developments from this ambitious company. Capcom, the "king" of street video, plans to keep dominating the coin-op chessboard!

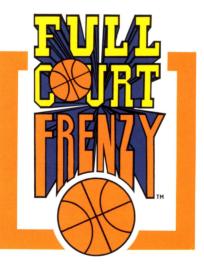

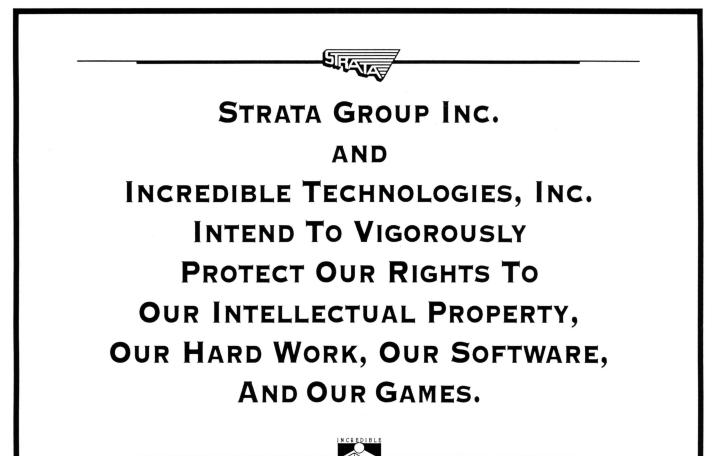

POW-WOW ON INDIAN GAMING

experts discuss legal & financial impact of Indian Gaming Regulatory Act

AMOA called some big chiefs together recently to read the smoke signals on Indian gaming. During the industry's Government Affairs Conference, held May 16-18 in Washington, D.C., tradesters were treated to a seminar on the subject. Panelists included leading operators, a U.S. Senate insider, and Donald Trump's attorney (Trump has filed a lawsuit alleging that preferential treatment for Indians is unconstitutional). The seminar shed some

light — and a reflected a bit of heat - on this controversial subject. Competition from tribal gaming is a growing concern for the coin-op industry. By one count, some 58 tribes across America had negotiated 74 compacts to allow high-stakes gaming in 18 different states by spring of 1993. Many more states have compacts "pending." A large number of coin machine operators say they have no way to compete.

About half the existing Indian gaming complexes are located in Wisconsin and Minnesota. Operator Gene Winstead (American Amusements, Minn.) explained that his state has \$750 million worth of Indian casino and resort developments including hotels, golf courses, etc.

Local hospitality and amusement industries were not consulted during the negotiations which resulted in Indian gaming compacts with the state, Gene said. "No one is taking responsibility for the regulations," he warned. "If there are negotiations for Indian gaming in your state, get involved early."

Tradesters also heard from Patricia Zell, from the staff of Sen. Daniel Inouye (D.-Hawaii). The senator runs the U.S. Senate Committee which has jurisdiction over Indian affairs, specifically the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act which unleashed this recent flood of casino gambling. Zell explained the major provisions of the IGRA as follows.

Indian gaming is divided into three "classes." Class I covers stick games and traditional tribal rituals or game activities. Class II covers bingo and similar forms of small-stakes games with a wagering component. Class III covers racetrack betting, casinos, video lottery, slots, etc.

The IGRA set up a federal agency which deals primarily with Class II. Responsibility for regulation of Class III is left up to the 50 states. This is where the law gets murky. Exactly what rights do states have, and what rights do tribes have?

U.S. Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt has reportedly interpreted the IGRA to mean that if a state government allows any form of Class III gaming (such as a state lottery), then Indian reservations in that state may have *any other* form of Class III gaming (including, in theory, everything

up to full-blown casi-

In practice, exactly what types of gaming are allowed on each reservation, are defined by state law as applied through a negotiated compact, Zell told the AMOA seminar audience. States "have to" negotiate with tribes on this issue. A later speaker added that if the state and tribe cannot agree, the Secretary of the Interior declares one side or the other's proposal as the "winner." That side's proposal becomes the state law on Indian gaming.

"Many members of Congress do not embrace gaming as the ultimate solution" for economic problems of Indian reservations, said Zell. But these same congressmen and women do admit gambling has provided more money for tribes than Uncle Sam ever could, she added.

At the moment, IGRA is up for review, so tribes and state governments are working with Congress on amendments which might be introduced this session. In addition, Sen. Inouye may hold hearings on the law (however, Gene Winstead said these hearings might not include input from private business).

As stated, casino mogul Donald Trump has sued over preferential treatment for Indians, claiming it is unconstitutional. His attorney Leon Friedman participated in the AMOA seminar, telling operators that "a Pandora's box has been opened." Indians are coming out of the woodwork, sometimes as few as 25 people claiming to be a "tribe" have rediscovered their roots in order to qualify for exclusive gambling rights, he said.

Lacking expertise in the casino industry, Indian tribes often turn to management firms to run their gaming business for them...but, said the attorney, many of these management firms have been turned down by gaming commissions in Atlantic City and Las Vegas because of "questionable backgrounds." Friedman quoted an FBI agent's estimate that "as much as 50% of Indian gaming has some or-



ganized crime connection," be it management, investment, or whatever.

Friedman further said a 1992 investigation by the Dept. of Interior showed that "an enormous amount of money is being siphoned off" between the gaming tables and the rightful tribal beneficiaries. "Talk about trickle-down economics!" said Friedman. "Even on its own terms, the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act is not working as intended."

Trump's lawsuit points to a recent Supreme Court ruling on waste disposal which established the principal that Congress can't force states to carry out federal policy. "If Congress wants to do this on a national basis, fine," said Friedman. "Then they'll have to pay for it, regulate it, enforce it, and take care of it in every way. They could do that, but Congress doesn't want to.

"So if Congress is going to force the states to get involved," Trump's attorney concluded, "they'll have to allow states some comprehensive regulatory authority over the whole program. If we win our lawsuit, that will be the result."

It should be noted that no Indian tribal representative was present at the seminar. There's no requirement for "equal time" at these affairs, of course. But if a tribal spokesmen had been on the panel, it's easy to guess what he or she would probably have said in response. Native Americans are quite defensive about their gaming operations. They say tribal casinos are well-run and claim there's no solid evidence of million-dollar swindles.

Further, tribal gaming reps usually point proudly to the housing, schools, hospitals, etc. which are funded by casino proceeds. "Indian gaming provides economic self-sufficiency and self-respect for native peoples which no previous government program or policy has been able to achieve," tribes typically assert.

At any rate, the AMOA seminar provided a useful introduction to this subject, which remains a growing concern for coin-op. AMOA president Craig Johnson and gambling law expert I. Nelson Rose have both predicted that states will eventually pressure Congress to put a damper on the unintended explosion of Indian gaming. Tradesters in some states are hoping they'll still be around to enjoy it, by the time that happens.

delivery, and other comforts and factors forecasted a bleak future for arcades, game rooms, street locations, and most coin-operated equipment. It was the end of the world and nothing could save us. However, we did survive the invasion of the "home bodies."

Now a version of the "four horsemen of the apocalypse" is threatening the coin machine world as we know it. The new "four horsemen" are all





united into one horseman, worse than the original Death, Pestilence, War, and Famine. And the new horseman is called "Gambling," especially poker machines, slot machines, gray area machines, casinos, riverboats, lotteries, pull-tabs, bingo, all forms of gambling politicians at all levels have found out to be the so called painless substitutes for the raising of taxes. While some of us were electing Street Fighter II Champion Edition the greatest game of all time, many gave the nod to Mortal Kombat. But at the time all of us were crying in our beer (or was it champagne?) and lamenting that it will be a long time before we would have another great game and that lightning does not strike three times. Up jumps the devil (or it might have been an angel) in the form of N.B.A. Jam and many critics revised their opinions as to what was and is the greatest video game of all time.

So, take heart you people of little faith, as long as we get such games as *N.B.A. Jam, Street Fighter II Champion Edition, Mortal Kombat,* guns like *Lethal Enforcer, Mad Dog, Crime Patrol,* and some other super kits from Capcom, Williams, Irem, Fabtek, Atari, SNK, and a few others, all is not lost.

Then there are the flippers. The amazing, astonishing, stupefying, bewildering, mind-boggling flipper games of today with more toys, gimmicks, and gadgets than F.A.O. Schwartz and Toys R' Us combined! Most of us can't wait to see what the ingenious boys at Williams, Data East, and Premier will come up with next! And what about the "new boy on the block" Alvin G.? He is proba-

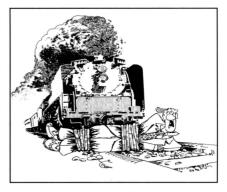


bly the only person in the industry who has royal flipper blood in his veins. And please let us not forget all of those interesting participation sports games like basketball, baseball, arm-wrestling, and punching bags, all having great appeal to sports-minded participants of young and old, male and female. As for the super milliondollar auto and motorcycle race games made by Sega, Namco, Jaleco, Atari and others, these are the Rolls Royces, Jaguars, and Cadillacs of the coin machine industry. These are the games that make the difference between a well-equipped arcade and just another game room.

Now we have the new world of redemption and what a world it is! This is a world all of its own, and its customers are for the most part youngsters whose parents would make any sacrifice, go without food and clothes, just to make their chil-



dren happy and let them play the colorful games and win a prize. And win they do, perhaps not every time that they put in a coin but almost every time. And one thing is for sure, the longevity of a good redemption game is five to ten times as long as a companion video or flipper. Like roulette wheels, slot machines and craps tables, the novelty and prospect of winning a prize is everything. A large casino on the Gulf Coast has in addition to a game room none other than a day care center with toys, trained attendants, cartoon movies, even cute floor pads for napping. So, the new motto is gamble to your hearts content and leave the kids to us. "If we can't beat em, we will surely join em,"and who knows. The combination of risk entertainment and coin operated entertainment may be a marriage perhaps not made in heaven but certainly a marriage of convenience and mutual prosperity.

A hit movie is the best possible advertising for a hit pinball. On June 12-13, Steven Speilberg's film "Jurassic Park" shattered all box office records for largest-ever opening weekend ticket sales (\$50.2 million). When all is said and done, ticket sales for the cinematic dino-thriller may top \$400 million worldwide. Related merchandise sales may provide *another* \$400 million in the United States alone.

Data East USA is one of the delighted "JP" licensees. According to EVP Paul Jacobs, *Jurassic Park* is the pinball division's all-time biggest hit. "We are racking up unbelievable orders worldwide," smiled company execs. "*Jurassic Park* is the top-earning pinball in all our test locations, solidly beating all competing titles in every single case."

During mid-June, the flipper got an extra boost from nationwide TV publicity on "CBS This Morning" and NBC's "Today Show." DE Pinball's general manager Gary Stern and pinball design chief Joe Kaminkow did the industry proud. Of course, distributors enjoyed their first look at the game during a May 15 gala preview dinner party in Washington, D.C. Photos from that event, hosted by Data East in the Smithsonian Museum's "Dinosaur Hall," accompany this story.

Paul Jacobs himself has been promoted to Executive Vice President and General Manager of Data East USA. The move, announced June 8, means Paul continues to oversee all coin and consumer sales and marketing; and he's now also in charge of other key operations (including production, purchasing, customer service, engineering and R&D). Additionally, Paul is a member of the DE Management Committee along with three other top execs.

"I'm extremely pleased by this new appointment and by the confidence which Dat East's president, Mr. Tetsuo Fukuda, has placed in me," stated Jacobs. "I look forward to many successful years with Data East."

FLEXES LEGAL MUSA & worldwide:

factory beefs up anti-counterfeit campaign in USA & worldwide; firm warns copy users: the "I didn't know" defense won't work

[Editor's note: two stories elsewhere in this issue give details about police raids on several businesses in Brooklyn, N.Y. and Mexico City, Mexico which were dealing in counterfeit video games. Those stories quoted sources from AAMA, the New York Police Dept., and Capcom USA explaining their involvement. Now comes official word from Midway Mfg. Co., a subsidiary of WMS, Inc., about how the Mexico City and Brooklyn raids fit into Midway's larger picture. The Chicago vidgame maker is pursuing an aggressive U.S. and worldwide enforcement campaign to defend its copyrights. The following is excerpted from a June 16 news release.]

Midway Mfg. has substantially extended the scope of its battle against counterfeiters of its video games in recent weeks. In a series of raids in Korea, Canada, Mexico, France and the U.S., with the cooperation and assistance of local authorities, Midway recently seized in excess of 1,000 counterfeit video game boards.

Midway also cooperated with authorities in order to obtain the arrest of two manufacturers of counterfeit game boards, and seized voluminous documentation relating to the manufacture and distribution of counterfeit vidgame boards in the U.S. and throughout the world.

The recent actions are part of Midway's continuing global efforts to strictly enforce its copyrights and protect its intellectual property. In February of this year, Midway achieved major success in seizures in Italy. In April and May, Midway participated in broad enforcement actions in Taiwan.

Here's a rundown on the latest

Midway efforts:

Korea: Authorities here have staged raids, arresting one counterfeit game manufacturer. A second is sought. "Continuing investigations in Korea and other Far Eastern countries are unearthing valuable leads in the complex web of worldwide counterfeiting," said Midway execs.

Canada: Here Midway's been working closely with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) in cracking down on a large network of distributors and operators of counterfeit *Mortal Kombat* game boards. Over 60 distributors and operators were implicated in which the Ontario Provincial Police and York Regional Police also assisted. The information obtained, which is still being developed, is leading investigators to other distributors of counterfeit game boards in the U.S.

Canada is believed to be a major channel for the distribution of counterfeit PCBs in the U.S., and the RCMP is "vigorously expanding its investigations" to cut off the flow of illegal goods, said Midway.

Mexico: Aided by the Mexican Attorney General's office, Midway has prompted a major civil effort against some of the largest distributors of illegal copies. Midway seeks substantial civil penalties and damages, and is "developing valuable information" on the Mexican copy network.

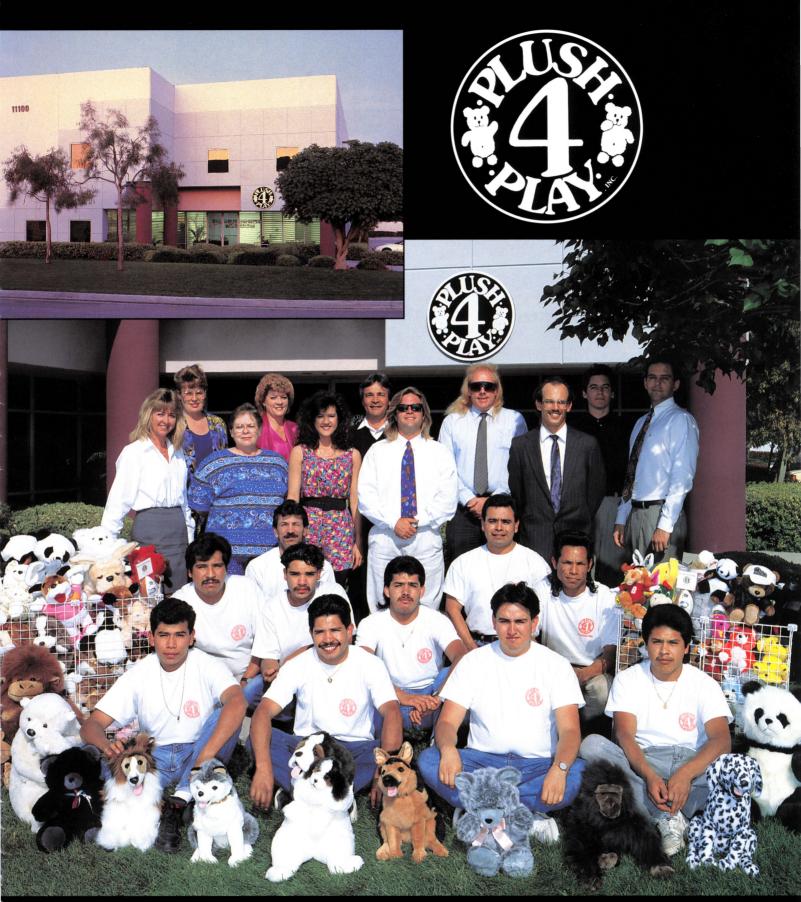
Europe: The enacted new criminal copyright laws on Jan. 1 to protect software, giving Midway the basis for enforcement activities in Italy which resulted last spring in raids on two major distributors of illegal copies. Midway says its enforcement campaign here is continuing in several additional countries.

The USA: Midway says it's been involved in several recent actions which "have developed substantial documentation and leads about the distribution of illegal counterfeit game boards in the United States.' Working together, U.S. Marshals and Midway have confirmed a "Canadian connection" in the copyboard pipeline into the USA. Midway has mostly targeted copyboard dealers until recently; but recent raids have vielded plenty of documents and other evidence leading to copyboard purchasers and users. Midway says it's "developing" this information legal lingo for "building a case against the crooks."

"It appears that most of the endusers have reason to know that they are profiting from counterfeit game boards," said Midway execs. "Midway is preparing to launch major actions now against these endusers. Expansion of the campaign will include arcades, convenience stores, bars and other purchasers and users."

Barbara Norman, VP and general counsel to Midway, addressed the issue of counterfeiting and theft of Midway's property as follows: "When we catch an operator profiting from a counterfeit game board, the typical response is 'I didn't know it was a counterfeit.' That response never worked and will not work in the future."

Midway's attorney continued: "Operators are hereby again on notice: you are responsible for making sure that you are dealing with an authorized dealer. When we catch you using a counterfeit game board — not if, but when — we will do everything we can to stop further illegal profiteering. We are very serious."

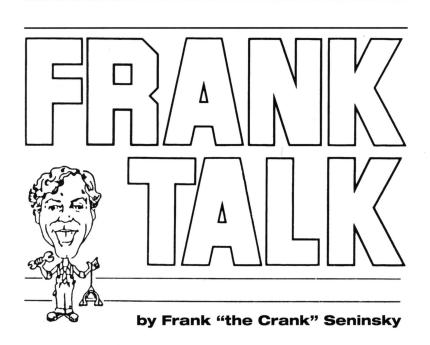

The player who sits behind the steering wheel takes the part of Lucky, a cleancut cop who's the best driver on the police force. Lucky & Wild gives a first-person point of view, as if you were looking through a car's front windshield. The game challenges players' road skills with driving obstacles like fuel trucks, moving vans, helicopters (some throwing debris on the road). Highspeed chases through city streets are followed by harrowing drives through shopping malls (don't hit those pedestrians, and watch out for the photo kiosk!). A highway race provides the ultimate road test.

The player who mans the machine gun plays the character of Wild, a long-haired undercover cop who is a crack shot. Targets include fast-moving enemy vehicles, incoming Molotov cocktails, etc. When the villains shoot at you, bullet holes appear in the "windshield."

The game runs through several stages and settings, including highways, shopping malls, city streets, and even desert canyons. Players pile up their score and get more time by avoiding driving obstacles, catching up to the crooks, and hitting targets. Between stages, the car visits "Pink Cat's Garage" where attractive female mechanics restore the vehicle to fighting shape. One player may play with the computer as his "partner," or two can play simultaneously. Buy-in and continuation features are included.

Needed: More Fun, More Excitement, More PR in Washington, D.C.

This year I took part in the trade's annual Washington D.C. conference for the first time since 1991. Why the twoyear absence? Well, two years ago I received a letter from AMOA thanking me for creating and running the Congressional Tournament program for its first four years. *[Editor's note: astute readers are invited to fill in the implication here.]*

This time around, however, we had a Standardization Committee meeting planned to coincide with the industry's Government Affairs Conference...so I came back. Well, it sure was different from the D.C. events I remembered. Several things caught my attention — some good, some bad.

The most striking change from previous years, was how many trade members betrayed a certain lack of enthusiasm. We've got our political routine down pat seminars, lobbying, congressional party with charity tournaments. It's slick, but stagnant.

Why? For one thing, largely the same group of industry folks have visited the same members of Congress and talked about the same issues for years. We need some creativity and excitement like the old days! This event should be the highlight of the year. Maybe we need some more dynamic, high-profile speakers from Capitol Hill to get our people charged up, too. At all events, the Government Affairs Conference is our chance to show the government and national press who we are, and how much fun we can provide. But trade members in Washington did not look like they were having a lot of fun.

Another observation: many members of Congress don't seem too high on dollar coins. One congressman told me that our industry is really the only dollar coin backer that actually shows up to make this issue its top lobbying priority. We are leading the charge, but look over your shoulder — where are the rest of the troops? I suspect the leadership of both associations has actually given up on dollar coins, but just hasn't publicly said so yet.

A positive highlight of the '93 D.C. conference was the presence of TV cameras from C-SPAN. Previous lobbying events banned the press — one of the worst decisions our industry has ever made. I'd like to see 50 cameras covering this event. Again, this is a priceless opportunity to "sell" our industry to the press. Let's make the most of it!

He stuck his neck out during a sometimes rocky-year, and he made it.

Finally, let me report that Washington, D.C. provided a good meeting place for the Standardization Committee's computer-modem protocol group. We're getting very close

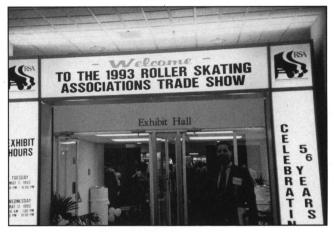

If you could have three wishes for your business or the industry, what would they be?

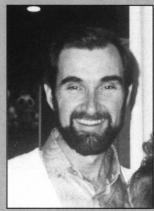


JIM MORGAN J&P Amusement Fresno, California

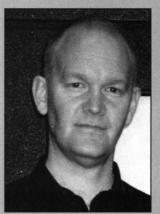


wouldn't get bored by the games so quickly!

LARRY ANKENY Po-Jo of Idaho Boise, Idaho

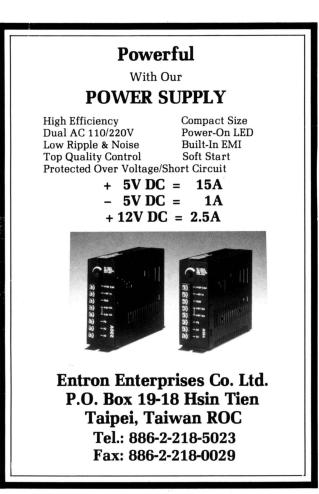
I want a widespread industry standard on the JAMMA har-

Number one is let's do something with the state taxes and the license fees our industry is subject to. Currently, that's what we're working on in our association and I wish our fight would turn out successfully. Ideally, I'd also like to see better commission splits and a rash of hot games!

Ideally, I want the manufacturer to have more personal contact with the technical layperson. I wish the time would be taken to understandably explain specific game electronics to the service person who may not have an extensive background in technical repair. Number two, I think I want what everybody in the industry wants: more creativity in game design and theme. There's a lot of repetition out there. The punch, kill, fighting games seem to be the norm, and every year they're just resulted and put out for sale again. The only difference is the price is maybe \$400 dollars higher than last time. My final wish is that the U.S. market be put before the rest of the world! Stuff shows up in Europe months before it does here, and I'd like to a chance to check it out first.

POLICY STATEMENT

RePlay supports industry self-regulation & vidgame standards but we won't evaluate games or censor ads based on vidgame content

Last month's issue included a guest essay on video game violence and RePlay's editorial reply. After the May issue appeared, the following fax was sent to us by David Snook, managing director of EuroSlot magazine in London.

"Dear RePlay;

"We are both under some pressure on the subject of violence in video games. Like you, we at *EuroSlot* are concerned about the possible impact of very graphic and/or bloody games on our industry and on society at large. I noted your publication of a letter from Jack Rodios of *Cash Box Australia*. He has similarly written to us on the subject.

"Jack is really asking the world's press to take the lead in cleaning up the industry's act. It is something of a hot potato, of course...not that *EuroSlot* has ever shown itself reluctant to juggle hot potatoes, and perhaps the issue needs an airing.

"For the moment, I am canvassing people like yourselves to see if you have an official policy on the subject (you can't sidestep it forever, guys!) and if so, what it is. I would like to quote you if possible, so please make it clear whether we are on the record or off it.

"Sorry to land you with a moral/commercial quandary, but Jack's landed us all with one.

"Best wishes,

Dear David,

Any or all of the following is on the record and may be quoted by *EuroSlot.*

After we received Jack Rodios's essay on vidgame violence, I asked

him if he was proposing that trade magazines adopt a blanket policy of banning advertisements for violent games. He replied that no, he was not.

Jack simply hoped for a statement that *RePlay* recognizes violence is a serious social problem; that violent movies, TV shows and video games may well contribute (or at least, are perceived by many to contribute) to the problem; and that our industry needs to examine this issue and consider changing its product accordingly. His hope is that if enough industry voices complain about violence, factories will soften the content.

We agree with many of Jack's points, as do a growing number of manufacturers, distributors and operators. For example, Sega has recently adopted a self-imposed rating system for its home video games. We support that. Australia's AMOA (National **Amusement Machine Operators** Assn. Ltd.) has recently adopted a "seal of approval" with corresponding content guidelines, such as that employed in the USA for the past 35 vears by the comicbook industry. We support that. The Champions arcade chain in the USA has announced it will not buy or use video games it deems excessively violent. We applaud their stance. If AAMA comes out with guidelines, a rating system, or code of ethics, we will support that.

We're happy to air this issue and to support efforts by the industry to regulate itself (and voluntarily tone down the bloodiest games before government does it for us). However, we do not believe it is the role of trade magazines to lead an anti-violence crusade. Accordingly, we do not propose to preview and evaluate specific video games, nor to accept or reject ads based on game content.

RePlay has maintained a policy for years of refusing to accept tobacco advertisements, strictly on moral grounds. Regarding game advertising, our chief requirement is that the ads themselves be in good taste — no explicit nudity in ads for striptease video games, etc.

RePlay publisher Ed Adlum's personal belief is that a morally sound person of reasonable maturity would not, and could not, be influenced to misbehave by viewing or participating in exaggerated fantasy action in video games.

At the same time, Ed, myself and others are well aware of the "copycat crime" syndrome, where morally unsound people are inspired to imitate acts of violence they see in mass media. As a result, RePlay is concerned about the industry's vulnerability on this score. All it will take is for one child in one country to commit some horrendous act, then tell police "I got the idea from watching a video game," and our entire industry will feel the repercussions on a worldwide scale.

Accordingly we have run numerous articles on this subject in the past few months. If events dictate, we'll run more. We're trying to take a common-sense approach and urge the industry to do likewise.

Editor's Note: Since writing this letter to David, one more thought has occurred. It would be strange indeed for us to publish a "Player's Choice" chart showing a certain game as Number One, yet at the same time refuse to accept advertisements for that very game.

COVESSORY **READY FOR TOMORROW** 1993 is Dynamo Corporation's 20th anniversary in coin-op amusements:

1993 is Dynamo Corporation's 20th anniversary in coin-op amusements; firm keeps the operator in mind while adapting to many changes

"When I started this company 20 years ago in a garage, I had no idea it would someday grow to this size," mused Bill Rickett, president of the Dynamo Corp. (Richland Hills, Texas). The firm is celebrating is "two decade anniversary" this year...and launching into its third decade with significant strengths and tremendous optimism.

"Today we have close to 400 employees and will break \$50 million in sales this year," Bill continued. "Thank goodness I was able to have really talented people associate with me and help make this happen, because there was no way I could do it by myself. It's a team effort and every job is important to make our products and our company successful."

Added Dynamo's exec VP Mark Struhs: "We feel the business has been good to us and we have a lot of friends in the industry. We are proud of our accomplishments so far; looking into the future, we see great opportunities for new growth. We're very bullish about the amusement industry today and tomorrow."

Dynamo concentrates on three major manufacturing areas. The company began 20 years ago with sports table games, and these remain its bread and butter. Contract manufacturing is another major component, while video lottery terminals are their newest product line — one that's teaching them plenty about hi-tech and high-pressure politics.

KEEPING THE OPERATOR IN MIND

What's most striking about Dynamo is a tremendous zest for new challenges and opportunities, while

keeping a firm emphasis on the "fundamentals." Yes, Dynamo is exploring computer communications, sales to China, and Total Quality Management programs with the best of them. Yet at the same time, Dynamo never forgets that its customer is the operator...and that all these new-fangled developments must serve the operator and make his life easier.

"We take the position," said President Bill Rickett, "that we've been serving the interests of the amusement game operator for 20 years now, and his welfare remains foremost in our minds."

"Our fundamental philosophy is that you have to keep your end user in mind," declared Mark Struhs. "Good products with good ROI: that's the filter for everything we do at Dynamo. We try to get closer and closer to the operator as we grow. We're beefing up customer service, doing lots of market research on operators and players to keep our prod-

ucts current, and working closely with our distribution team to get the input from the field to make our products better all the time."

"We're interested in finding out what kinds of problems operators have — not only with specific products, but with their daily business," Bill Rickett explained. "If we can design products that solve those problems, the operator will value that relationship. Our goal is to exceed the operator's expectations."

DOMESTIC SALES ARE GROWING

Dynamo must be meeting that goal, because sales in the U.S. contin-

ue on a steady growth curve. The company's market share in pool, air hockey, shuffleboard and table soccer are all growing. "The core products that we have now look real good and sales keep increasing every year," smiled Struhs. "Also we're developing several new ones that we're very excited about."

Pool tables are a bright spot, Bill Rickett said. "Operators look at pool with long-term investment in mind," he pointed out. "They look for products that give maximum appeal to the player for years and that is reliable, durable and serviceable. Price is probably the third factor on the list. We look at our tables after three years

in tough locations, see where the 'wear points' are, and design metal stops or other improvements to beef it up. It's a continual process of evaluation to eliminate problems. For example, our cash door is designed so that if you have a break-in, you can replace the cash door and entire frame quickly and easily. It's been a big hit. We're also proud of our universal cueball separation system, which can handle oversized ball, magnetic ball, Dynamo ball, etc. or any other cueball and it will work."

Dynamo Air Hockey remains a winner and led the firm's blending of electronics with classic table games. The overhead LED scoring, overhead lighting and (on one model) blacklight special effects all add zip and excitement to a game whose basic fun is never-ending.

Taking the same approach with shuffle alleys, Dynamo this year introduced *Bullseye*, which shortens gameplay down from 30 minutes to 8 minutes by using the "frame-based" gameplay (sort of like bowling). The game moves faster, players get more excitement, and money gets pumped into the cash box much more often. Operators will also like the tough new finish on this table which dramatically reduces maintenance and refinishing requirements.

Electronic glitz is even going to breathe new life into the soccer table - that humble product Dynamo began with 20 years ago. This fall, the company will begin production of Striker, featuring a pushbutton control panel for player's choice of three games; overhead LED scoring; adjustable pricing and many other PCBrun features. The classy white cabinet comes with transparent goal shields, too. Dynamo bowed the game at this year's ACME and has been painstakingly tweaking and refining it before actual production begins. Said Bill Rickett: "We consider Striker a true breakthrough product."

Dynamo is a big believer in promotion. Their air hockey tournaments are the stuff of legend, and the company belongs to the Bud Lite pool league which boasts 130,000 members. "It's fastest-growing such program in the country," declared Rickett. "It promotes pool effectively at player level to boost bar traffic and

table income. That makes the league a win-win scenario."

Later this year, Dynamo will increase its league efforts under a unified "sports marketing" program for its other products as well. The company will roll out the new program with much fanfare later this year, tying in the promo package with the introduction of new products like *Striker*.

CONTRACT MANUFACTURING VS. VLTS

As many tradesters know, American video game "factories" are sometimes little more than sales offices and shipping depots for PCBs. Where is the actual game assembly done? Often, it's done in Richland Hills, Texas, where Dynamo provides quality workmanship and allows its customers to enjoy an attractive low overhead. For example, Dynamo builds every Namco-America game that's sold in this country. Dynamo also builds many Capcom videos and, at times, games for Sega, Taito and several others. "We've experienced a boom in contract manufacturing," said Dynamo execs. "Our relationship with

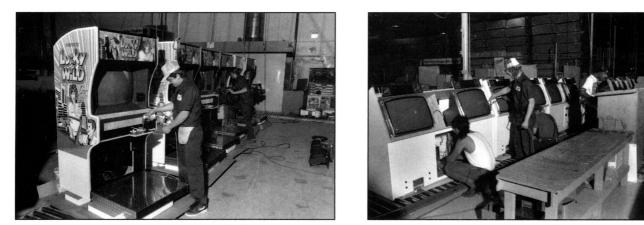


Namco-America is a very special one. The products we manufacturer for them today are much more sophisticated than those we built 10 years ago. Our growth in technical abilities are on a very steep curve. As video products become more and more hitech, we feel we'll be involved through our contract manufacturing."

Dynamo's also getting hi-tech experience with its video lottery terminals. "We're licensed in Louisiana and Montana and are quietly developing a very strong product there,"

Mark Struhs said. Added Bill Rickett: "Currently the most advanced player interface is touchscreen technology. We have that and it works very well. The other major hi-tech area is communications, and our VLTs are capable of communicating with central computer. So we feel we're on leading edge of both of these developing technologies. When hitech becomes a reality for amusement games, Dynamo will already be experienced with it due to our VLT line."

True, operators in many states have run into roadblocks on new VLT markets. But Dynamo remains convinced that regulated, smallstakes gambling on the European model will happen. Dynamo also

believes this emerging market can help or harm operators in a dramatic way...so operators must be involved in the political process of shaping gaming markets in each state.

"We prefer to help the operator become involved if video lottery becomes reality in his state," said Rickett. "We saw an obligation to start developing VLT product to serve the operator. No matter what, operators can't afford to back away totally from the VLT market. If they won't be involved, they'd better step in and fight it to keep it from soaking up income from other machines in bar locations."

"SHRINKING GLOBE" MEANS BIGGER OPPORTUNITIES

While Dynamo's VLT business is



primarily an American affair (for now), the company takes an aggressively global approach when it comes to amusement game sales. "Overseas sales are booming," smiled Mark Struhs, who concentrates on this area. "The export part of our business is growing at an even more dramatic rate than the rest of the company. Foreign sales account for about one third of our total."

Asia is the scene of today's hottest fire. "The entire Pacific Rim is moving for our business," Struhs declared. "China will be plum of the Asian market, and Taiwan seems to be a major gateway to doing business there so we're looking for ways to increase Dynamo's exposure and help satisfy that hunger for American amusements.

"The Latin American market is really growing for us," Struhs continued. "We're doing good business with four or five countries South of the Border, and we will attend AAMA's Mexico City show and the Salex show with major exhibits.

"A big chunk of our business is Europe," Mark went on. "We're experiencing a boom with air hockey in England. The Gauselmann Group is doing great with our pool tables in Germany and thereabouts. We're excited about business across the continent."

Effects of a more-unified European are prodding factories to upgrade all along the line, Bill Rickett said...and this will have a worldwide impact. "The world market is telling us not only do we have to meet their quality standards, but we have to prove that we use the right process for achieving those standards," he explained. "This involves a lot of testing and documentation. It's a big change from the typical American approach of 'the end justifies the means.""

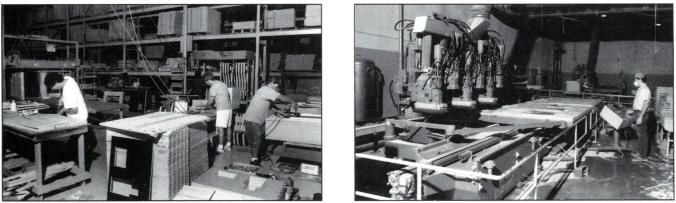

How Do You Tell A Legal Speed-Up Kit From An Illegal One?

Merritt & Hagen are taking a welldeserved "vacation" from the Legal Questions column for a couple of months. This month and next, we run a special report written for RePlay by well-known copyright and patent attorney Richard H. Stern. In it, he explains his view of the difference between legal and illegal speedup kits.

Capcom attorney Ian Rose has been invited to write a reply (or possibly an opposing view). If such is submitted, it will appear in this column in the issues immediately following Mr. Stern's essay.

Mr. Stern, a partner in the Arlington, Va. firm of Oblon, Spivak, McClelland, Maier & Neustadt, represented "Red Baron" Bill Beckham in the Double Dragon parallel importation copyright infringement litigation. That litigation led to Congress' passage of the law giving operators the right to "publicly perform" genuine parallel import games. Mr. Stern is also an Adjunct Professor of Law at The George Washington University's National Law Center.

Operators' interest in speed-up kits has greatly increased in the last several years as a result of several factors. One has been Galoob's unexpected success against Nintendo in gaining a federal court victory for Galoob's *Game Genie*, a speed-up kit variant for home video game equipment.

Another factor has been operators' increasing problems with their bottom line: how can you coax a few extra dollars out of an expensive dedicated game before it completely dies? To some operators, the promise of a slight increase in return on investment may seem like the differ-

ence between hanging in there and going broke.

Finally, the phenomenal success of *Street Fighter* in various editions and variations may have spurred some operators' and distributors' interest in seeing whether they, too, could participate in the bonanza, without running afoul of the copyright laws.

A major problem that this has raised, is how to tell the difference between legal and illegal speed-up kits. Although only a few speed-up kit cases have been decided, they do point to some guidelines permitting a judgment to be made about the most common speed-up kit situations.

The first question is, "What kind of speed-up kit is it?" Several very different things are called speed-up kits. They include simple hardware devices, ROM substitutions, and signal-interceptor circuits.

HARDWARE

At one extreme is something that isn't even a kit. It is more a video game hacker's trick. You cut the trace to the printed circuit board's block chip output pin. Then you patch in a wire from the main part of the trace to an adjacent output pin of the same chip, so as to double the clock speed. This makes the game run twice as fast. A more elegant version of the same expedient is to insert a two-pole switch, so that you can select between normal and double-speed operation by flipping the switch to connect one or the other clock chip output pins.

Is the double-speed version of the video game a copyright infringement?

As usual with legal cases, arguments can be made both ways. Doubling clock speed by selecting a different output pin from the clock is very much like one of the hypothetical cases that the first court seriously to address speed-up kits posed as a "thought experiment." In Midway Mfg. Co. vs. Arctic International, *Inc.*¹ to help it reach the answers to copyright questions about the speedup kit case actually before it, the Seventh Circuit (Chicago federal appeals court) asked itself this guestion: "Is playing a 45 rpm record at 78 rpm in a discotheque a copyright infringement?" The court answered itself, "No," on the ground that, because few people want to do that, the matter is one of little or no economic importance to copyright owners. Therefore, the court said, it is not a copyright infringement to speed 45 rpm records up to 78 rpms at your discotheque. That is not much of an answer, but it satisfied the court.

Should you say the same thing about doubling the speed of Street *Fighter* by fiddling around with the printed circuit board's clock chip's output pins? If a court believes that doubling the speed of a video game is equivalent to playing a 45 rpm record at 78 rpm, give or take 30 percent, it should give a pass to a speed doubler for Street Fighter. One may question whether it really makes sense, however, to try to decide questions like this by making dubious analogies between video games and LP records. It is also questionable that you can reach a sound result about whether some challenged conduct is copy-

right infringement, by asking whether many or few people want to engage in the conduct.

Questions like that may be selfdefeating, like the form of ordeal by water in which the guilty float and the innocent sink and drown. If few or no people want to do something, why would a copyright infringement dispute arise over it? How is the question relevant, then?

The cost of a copyright infringement lawsuit begins at about \$30,000 to \$50,000 and can easily run far beyond that. If a case before a court involves something challenged as copyright infringement, it is likely that somebody must be interested in doing whatever is being challenged. Unless that were so, neither side would be running up legal expenses. Accordingly, if parties get into a lawsuit over hardware modifications, such as speed-up buttons or extra fire power buttons, there has to be economic value at stake; otherwise, two litigants are making a big mistake or really standing up for principle. In any event, a court cannot sensibly decide such cases by making an inquiry into whether people really want to do what the plaintiff is suing the defendant about.

Another possible answer, not considered by the Arctic court, would be that hardware devices cannot infringe a software copyright such as that in a video game. On the other hand, video game manufacturers would maintain that the hardware just as well as software can infringe their copyrights. The question is arguable both ways, but I would think that most district courts would see nothing wrong with an operator's reworking the mechanical or hardware aspects of equipment that he purchased and owned. It looks very much like souping up the engine of your Ford, which a judge knows is not copyright infringement.

Speed-up buttons and extra firepower buttons probably will not be held to cause copyright infringement, either because they are hardware or because the changes that they make in the copyrighted aspects of a game are too slight to create any copyright infringement. Maybe splicing a whole new ending on *Gone With The Wind* is a copyright infringement (see *RePlay*, May 1993, p. 34), but for an owner of a copy to edit out a few frames of scenes to make the film's length fit an available time slot is probably innocuous.

DERIVATIVE WORKS

The actual speed-up kit that the court had to consider in the *Arctic* case was more complicated, and it was a software rather than hardware

device. The speed-up kit worked with the *Galaxian* video game (not the *Pac-Man* game, as incorrectly stated in the May 1993 issue of *RePlay*). The trial court's opinion² described *Arctic's* speed-up kit as a printed circuit board containing five EPROMs in which was stored a large amount of code copies from Midway's ROMs. The EPROMs also contained varia-

The Seventh Circuit chose not to focus on the copying of code from the original Galaxian game, which in itself would have furnished a basis for finding copyright infringement under section 106¹ of the Copyright



Act(1). That section of the law gives copyright owners the exclusive right to reproduce copies of their works. The court was also not concerned with any technical details about how the speed-up kit operated. It decided to base the outcome of the case on the question of whether or not a speedup kit cause preparation of a "derivative work." If it did, that would be a violation of section 106⁽²⁾ of the Copyright Act, which gives copyright owners the exclusive right to prepare derivative works based on their copyrighted works.

What is a derivative work? Under copyright law, derivative works involved such things as turning novels or plays into motion pictures; making drawings from statutes, or statues from drawings; and digesting and condensing articles. A further extension of the concept might include painting a moustache on a reproduction of the Mona Lisa, thereby producing a new artistic work. On the other hand, a really minor change, such as painting a sculpture of a horse a different color, has no copyright significance at all. How does all of that apply to video games? (Not very well. Is speeding up a video game really like painting a moustache on the Mona Lisa?)

The Seventh Circuit decided to answer the question of whether the speed-up kit caused a derivative work to be prepared, by focusing on the general economic value of speedup kits. Clearly, a speed-up kit generated new and added revenue, since it produced extra revenue for an operator, which he could no longer generated with the original equipment that

he had bought. The reason was that most players were too bored with the original game to want to play it any longer; other players would monopolize the use of the game for hours with a single quarter, because the game had become so familiar and easy.

The legal question was, "Who should enjoy th extra revenue that the speed-up kit generated: Midway or the operators?" Depending on the answer, the court thought, the speedup kit would, or would not, cause preparation of a derivative work.

The court said that the answer was that "video game copyright owners would undoubtedly like to lay their hands on some of that extra revenue and therefore it cannot be assumed that licensees [meaning operators] are implicitly authorized to use" speedup kits. That, in turn, meant to the court that there was an infringing derivative work. Therefore the speedup kit was illegal.

The problem with this kind of analysis is that operators, also, "would undoubtedly like to lay their hands on" the same extra revenue. The court failed to explain why Midway, rather than the operators, should be awarded first place in the race for laying of hands on revenue, or why there shouldn't be a compromise under which both sides shared the extra revenue. Maybe the question the court asked is the right one, but the court did not support its answer by anything but a "because I say so." That is the basic flaw in the Arctic decision.

For that reason, it is questionable that other courts, in other parts of the country, would follow the Seventh Circuit's legal analysis that a speedup kit causes preparation of an infringing derivative work. One court, in the *Galoob* case, discussed below, refused to follow the Seventh Circuit's reasoning and held that no derivative work existed in very similar factual circumstances. Another federal court simply avoided the question in a case decided right after Arctic. In Midway Mfg. Co. v. Strohon⁴, the Chicago federal trial court dealt with a *Pac-Man* speed-up kit similar to Arctic's Galaxian speedup kit. The defendant's speed-up kit produced a version of *Pac-Man* that

did not resemble the original; however, the EPROMs contained a large amount of copied code. The court therefore found that the defendant did not infringe the copyright in Midway's audiovisual work (the screens of the game), but did infringe the copyright in Midway's computer program.

Apparently, the court did not consider the visual aspects of the defendant's game to be a derivative work based on *Pac-Man*, because the defendant's screens did not look substantially similar to the screens of *Pac-Man*. That is probably sound. A derivative work is not just a work derived in some way from an earlier work. Rather, a derivative work also takes recognizable, expressive aspects from the original work.

ROM-SUBSTITUTION KITS

Regardless of the derivative work issue, and despite the Seventh Circuit's academic, economic-theory approach to speed-up kits, one guideline about speed-up kits emerges from these two Chicago cases. If a speed-up kit contains EPROMs in which a substantial amount of copied code is stored, then manufacture and sale of the speed-up kit will probably violate section 106(1) of the Copyright Act because there is an illegal copy. Use of the kit will likely result in an illegal public performance of the copyrighted work, in violation of section 106(4) of the Copyright Act.

You can usually recognize this type of speed-up kit by the fact that the user must remove some ROMs from the original printed circuit board and substitute EPROMs from the speed-up kit for them. Or, the user must remove a whole printed circuit board or other module and connect up another on in place of it. Such ROM-substitution speed-up kits involve the removal of code-containing ROMs and their replacement with other ROMs that may contain some of the same code as that contained in the removed ROMs.

In some circumstances, there may

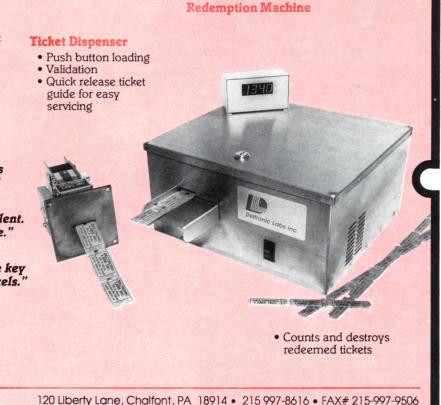

be legitimate justifications for doing this, but "trafficking" (as video game copyright owners like to call it) in ROMs containing copied code is risky. A wrong interpretation of the circumstances, or counsel's legal interpretation that a court decides to accept, may lead to civil liability for copyright infringement⁵.

NECESSARY ADAPTATIONS

Having said that, it seems to me that an operator may nonetheless have a valid defense, under section 117 of the Copyright Act, against copyright liability for use even of the ROM-substitution type of speed-up kit. Section 117 allows an owner of a computer program to make adaptations and modifications of the computer program that are necessary to the practical economic use of the owner's property (here the video game unit)⁶.

If the operator can persuade the court that speed-up adaptations or modifications of a "dying" game are necessary, given the market situation and the operator's economic circumstances, the court should excuse the use of the speed-up kit as part of the operator's right to prolong and maintain the economic value of his property. He should be entitled to do that, just as he would be entitled to prolong a truck's life by appropriate repair and, if necessary, modification. Furthermore, having profited from originally selling the game to the operator, the manufacturer should be "estopped" from asserting any copyright to keep the operator from enjoying full property ownership rights to benefit from the economic use of the property.

If the operator cannot persuade the court on this point, however, the court will probably hold him liable for copyright infringement. The *Arctic* and *Strohon* cases indicate that, in the Seventh Circuit (Illinois, Wisconsin, Indiana) the operator will face an uphill battle, to say the least, in persuading the court.

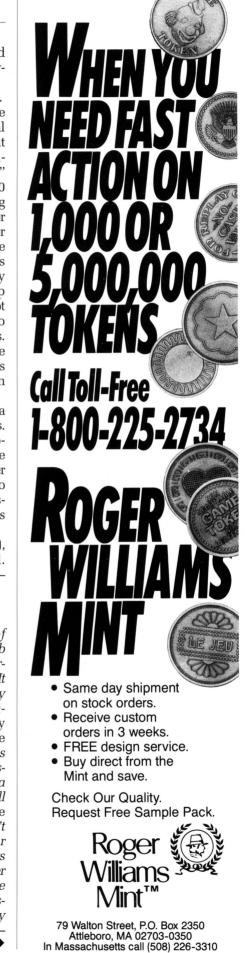

5. Distributors should be aware that the recently amended criminal penalties provision of the copyright law can apply, in some circumstances. A person who "willfully" makes, sells, and/or rents at least 10 copies of one or more infringing works during a 180-day period, "for purposes of commercial advantage or private financial gain" — where the total value of the illegal copies exceeds \$2,500 — commits a felony punishable by imprisonment for up to five years. This provision does not apply to operators, because they do not make, sell, or rent speed-up kits. Providing them for game players' use may be a public performance, but it is not a rental or other distribution under the copyright law.

6. The computer program of a video game generates visual displays. Modification of the computer program also causes modification of the displays. The adaptation right under section 117 specifically applies to computer programs, not visual displays, but the two must be viewed as a unit.

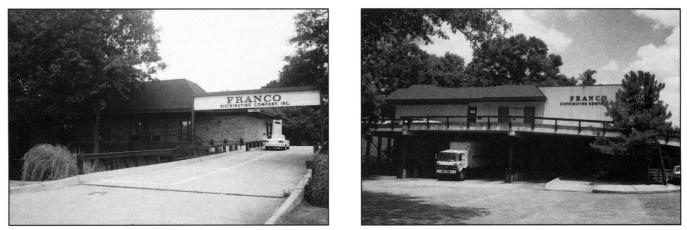

Rubin Franco offers wisdom gleaned from 64 years in coin-op; his Franco Distributing Co. plays fair and keeps current

"A good bit of a distributor's job is to be an educator," says Rubin Franco in a soft Southern drawl. "Sometimes you do it formally with a school, but you do it all the time in quiet ways over the telephone with a customer. Maybe it's something you've learned over the years, or maybe you pass along something you just heard, day by day. You've always got to educate and communicate."

The president of Franco Distributing Co. (Montgomery, Ala.) has plenty to teach. Rubin's father David founded the dealership in 1928, the year Rubin was born. The youngster grew up spending his summers and free time making collections and sales calls. "I was kind of born into the business," he smiled. "It's a lot of learnin' it by doin' it." He took over the dealership 31 years ago, along with his partners (and brothers-inlaw) Morris Piha and Joe Capilouto. Rubin's been providing sales and service to regional operators ever since.

The success of Franco Distributing prompted the formation of a sister company in 1964 when the three partners founded Greater Southern

Distributing (Atlanta). Morris Piha has run that ever since (with the help Rubin's nephews Rubin Piha and David Capilouto). Today the two firms are almost the "east and west divisions" of a family-owned business.

Today Franco Distributing covers

a 300 mile radius around Montgomery (except Greater Southern territory, of course). It's a full-service dealership with 30 lines of amusement equipment (covering the spectrum of top videos, pins, jukeboxes, redemption and sports games) as well as full lines of vending equipment. The firm does brisk business in used equipment, but a very solid majority of sales is in new product.

The dealership's 16-person team works in a strategically-located, 20,000 sq. ft. facility just a couple of miles from the intersection of the state's two major highways, I-85 and I-65. Key staff is comprised of office manager Mike Crew, accountant Carrie Saunders, salesmen Jeff Green and Craig Boyd, and parts manager Wayne Barwick. Providing service are technicians Travis Cheatwood, Harry Jinright and Bruce Dingman; while truck drivers Frank Hill and Otis McCall make pickups and deliveries in the Franco truck. Secretaries Melissa Traywick and Linda Levins help keep the office humming.

Designed and built 15 years ago specifically for Franco Distributing,

the firm's building boasts everything a dealer needs. Customers walk in the front entrance to a spacious showroom, with sales offices around the perimeter. Further back is the used game rooms, repair facilities, warehouse, and loading docks that were specially designed to handle big pool tables, etc.

After spending a lifetime in coinop, Rubin says the biggest constant is change. "Our business is fascinating because the equipment keeps changing," he observed. "I enjoy the day to day challenge this presents. Being alert to what's happening keeps you young, keeps the juices flowing, and keeps the activity going. It also helps our customers. We want to keep watching product, to be on top of whatever new and innovative equipment comes to the marketplace. We want to be well-qualified to understand, explain, and recommend it to our operators."

And yet, the role of distribution remains a constant, Rubin said. "Our basic philosophy is to help our operator customers pick out the best product for their marketplace, to maximize their profits. That enables them to spend more money with us, which enables us to maximize our profits."

The Deep South is a competitive market, but Franco Distributing cites experience, fairness and knowledge as its competitive edge. "We're in the middle of several other distributorships — always have been," Rubin chuckled. "We do whatever we can to keep our operators profitable and healthy. We've got 64 years experience in the business, which nobody else has. We place great value on always being fair and equitable with our operator customers and our manufacturer suppliers. We believe we've built a reputation for fairness, and they appreciate that."

Alabama and Mississippi's economy is stable, if unspectacular, Rubin observed. "Right now it appears to be getting a little better. As far as our industry's concerned, it's been moderately good because we've had excellent equipment for the last year — strong videos, strong pinballs, and solid jukeboxes. If we've got good equipment, the coin-op industry can be like fish a going upstream, enjoying success even when the national economy is awful. But you have to have good product."

As in the rest of the country, Franco's customer base is seeing mom and pops continuing to slowly drop out, while big operators keep getting bigger and new businessmen and women are entering the family fun center market. "There aren't that many customers in the region," Rubin said.

Area operators' financial position has been stronger the last year or two. "Collections and payments are both better," Rubin stated. "We help operators finance 50% of our sales. Most the rest are paying on 30-60-90 days, and a few are getting financing through their banks." Rubin also gives a nod to better management by factories. "Inventory is under proper control," he said. "I think everybody at all levels of the industry is managing inventory more astutely. It doesn't help factories when they overload distributors. I can't force my operators to absorb bad equipment, because then they can't buy the good equipment when it comes out."

Franco Distributing is also active in the vending market, but Rubin says "It's been soft. Vending goes right along with the rest of the economy. There was a burst of confidence when the new President took office, but that's faded. There's been no technological breakthrough since the glass front."

For the future, Rubin is eagerly anticipating new technology, but he knows the tried-and-true principles of coin-op entertainment will remain the foundation of the business. "There's an awful lot of conversation about virtual reality, for example," he said. "If we can get good product using that technology, the market will move in that direction. But it's got to be something entertaining for our customers!"

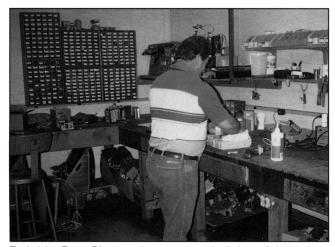
Short of a hi-tech revolution, Rubin foresees "moderately strong" sales for the rest of 1993. "I think we're at a crossroads. It's up to manufacturing to bring out solid new titles that can help us keep going with good video and pinball collections, or not," he said simply.

Whatever the future, Franco Distributing will be right on the cutting edge, helping its customers apply time-tested coin-op business strategies to new-fangled computer-driven equipment. And Rubin Franco plans to keep the firm on course — learning and educating, advising and communicating, selling and servicing.

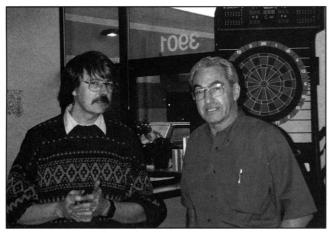

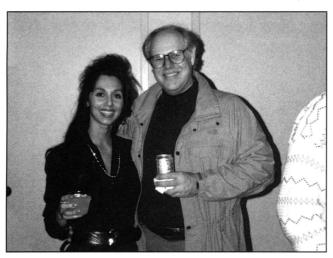

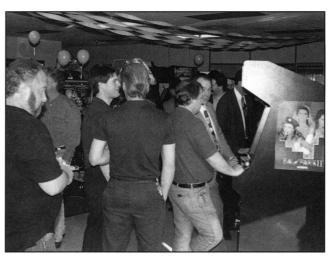

THE NSM FAIRY TALE...



IT ANYT NO FARY TALE. NSM-America's bedtime story keeps getting a happier ending; former "ugly frog" jukebox is now a handsome prince of sales

Somebody should put this story to paperback. After all, the old fable of the frog-turned-prince did pretty well. According to the gang at NSM-America, the story of their Chicago jukebox facility isn't all that different. Take one ugly frog (NSM's reliable but unglamorous old jukebox design that wasn't selling very well a few years ago). Add 67 magic kisses. (That's how many specific problems the firm identified and fixed.) *Viola!* Yesterday's frog is today's handsome prince...and the company sales charts look even handsomer.

"The difference is, with NSM the story keeps having a happier ending," smiled NSM-America President Rus Strahan. "Sales of our beautifully redesigned jukeboxes are soaring, and

NSM is working on an even more dramatic ending to the story. "If sales increases keep up their current pace," Strahan said calmly, "I predict we'll assume the number-one position within a year. Two years at most."

Bold talk, but consider the facts. NSM's German parent (NSM Aktiengesellschaft) has been making jukeboxes for nearly 30 years. Their product is the top-selling jukebox in almost every market in the world...like Europe, for example, and even Canada. Now that the factory has targeted the U.S. with a beefed-up sales and marketing team, beefed-up distributor network, and beefed-up production capacity, NSM believes the sky's the limit.

These days, NSM estimates it has

a "solid one-third" of the domestic U.S. jukebox market. That compares to 5-7% a few years back. The firm happily shares credit for this fairytale transformation with its American operators. After all, they're the ones who forgot about yesterday's warts and spotted the underlying value.

PLANNING A TRANSFORMATION

Still, somebody had to bring girl and frog together, and Rus Strahan played matchmaker. His Chicago subsid was originally charged with simply selling the German-made jukeboxes. However three years ago, with the parent firm's blessing, Rus decided to take a stronger hand in product design and development.

"We first had to find out exactly

why American operators weren't buying our product," Rus recalled. "Sure, we felt we knew a lot of the reasons, but we had to define them *specifically...*then cure them specifically."

Rus held up a very honest mirror to the comany and looked unflinchingly at what it revealed. The "mirror" included operator surveys, written questionnaires, and face to face interviews. And the results?

Strahan ticked off the findings. "Our jukeboxes were ugly. Our distribution system was weak. Our parts and service program was weaker. And our field training program was all but non-existant." On top, the offices and shop were understaffed, too small, and "a bit tacky," Rus recalled. Their marketing was poor. And the product had some features that were inappropriate for the North American market, while lacking some features of competing models.

In all, Strahan came up with 67 problems that had to be addressed.

He also noted an invaluable strength: NSM's 100 CD player mechanism was designed "from the ground up" to deploy and play compact discs. It wasn't a "field expedient" upgrade of an old 45rpm mechanism. It worked fast. It babied the discs. It sounded incredible. Operators loved it (when they tried it). Stereophonics magazines raved about it. Radio stations bought it, in

droves, for their disc jockeys to use.

"If we could just make the outside look as gorgeous as the inside performed, we'd have a winner," Rus said. "The American coin-op industry needs glitz and flash on top of reliable, advanced technology. We decided to provide it, and the sales and support team, and production capacity, to build it and move it and

give it the total follow-through it deserved."

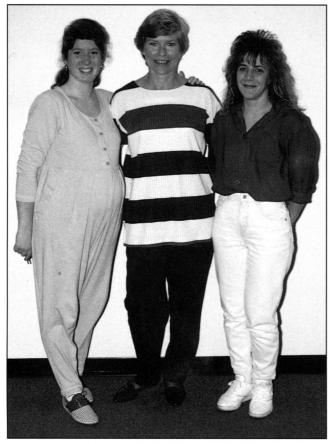
FIELDING A NEW TEAM/ DESIGNING A NEW LOOK

right way" ASAP. Rus brought in high-powered help to do the fixing. A new national sales manager, George Haydocy — an industry patriarch who is respected nationwide for his deep knowledge of jukeboxes. A new VP of marketing and sales, "Mr. Integrity" John Margold, an exceptionally savvy and enormously successful trade vet. A new, highly expe-

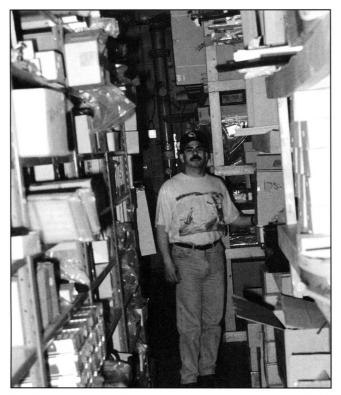

rienced, financial whiz named Jurgen Jost. A new national training manager, Keith White, who "tells it like it is" at service schools.

Rus also brought in a whole host of new support staff — Sue Davis, Lisa Geirut, Tony Lantz, John Tracy and Mike Reith. They pitched in to help long-time staffers like Mike Jablonski, Orlando Marrero, and accountant Carol Strahan (she also happens to be Mr. Strahan's missus).

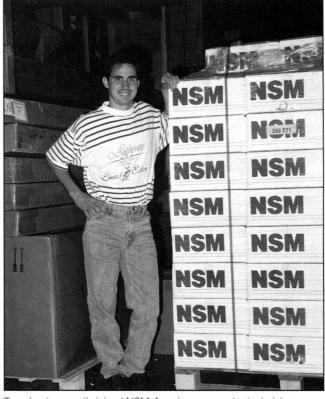
The new team went to work on that list of problems. And three years later, "there's no question about it," said Rus. "We've fixed those 67 things. We have a noticably stronger distribution system, with more and stronger distributors. Our marketing has improved dramatically. We adopted the name NSM-America in the place of our old monicker, Loewen-America. We remodeled our facility, added an entirely new parts and service department, and launched one of the industry's bestattended service school programs."

NSM-America also improved its product. They added in all the "missing" features and some unique new ones. Most of all, they supervised a total design makeover, coming up

Rus remains reticent about specifics (in America, a good marketer never unveils new things until they're ready to sell). But he does acknowledge that "things will be a lot different for successful music operators down the road. And those who are prepared will make more money from music than ever, with less time invested. Today music is really a bunch of digits — o's and 1's that are stored in computers. Those O's and 1's can easily be sent over cable, telephone lines, via satellite...or otherwise transmitted any number of electronic wavs.

"This digital data can also be stored on CDs as we know them, inside computer memory, or a whole host of other media," Rus said. "We're going to see a change within a very few years that's every bit as dra-



matic as the shift from 45rpm to CD technology was."

What's it all mean to jukebox operators? Should they hold up on converting their routes to CD, if everything's going to change?

No, says NSM. If it makes good financial sense for the location to have an NSM machine now, it will turn out to be a wise decision longterm, too, said the firm.

But Strahan strongly advised operators to pay attention to what's going on in the music and hi-tech world, and be ready to make a transition. For its part, NSM is doing likewise. "We've been building 'flexibility' into our jukeboxes," said Rus, "to assure operators that whatever technological changes come along, they will not outmode NSM product."

For example, look inside an NSM

jukebox and you'll see some features that "seem to have no purpose," Rus said. "Actually they do have a purpose, or will have in time. We've built in the capacity for operators to replace their 100-CD changer 'box' with another type of digital-technology 'box' sometime downstream, if needed. That could happen, or it may not...but if it does, we're ready.

"There's also some less-severe possibilities which are more likely," Rus continued. "The point is, we're making real, physical provisions for future changes...provisions that operators can see right now. It's part of NSM-Germany's long-term emphasis on cutting edge technology."

NSM BELIEVES IN HAPPY ENDINGS

Keep an eye on NSM for more news this summer. The parent firm's board of directors is visiting the Chicago site this month. On the agenda: new product development; a new, larger facility; and final prep for bowing a line of top-quality kiddie rides from a recently-acquired subsid.

All told, you can't blame NSM-America if they believe in happy endings. After all, they keep rolling them off their assembly lines and selling them to a growing number of satisfied operator customers.

And that ain't no fairy tale!

CALIFORNIA'S GOLD California's CCMA holds its tenth annual convention for Golden State operators;

event focuses on issues which could make or break the industry

You don't need us to tell you there's a lot going on in the industry these days. Most of it a cause for concern. The threat of fiberoptics, state and local taxing, video lottery legislation. What's a coin-op person to do? Common wisdom says join up with other coin-op persons to form a unified front, brainstorm together for solutions, participate in the everyday battle, so part of the credit for winning the war is yours.

No, you definitely don't need us to tell you that a group fight against industry threats is more effective than a one-man army (or worse yet, anapathetic soldier). That's what an association is for. Holding their tenth annual convention at the Monterey Plaza (Monterey, Calif.) June 10-12, the California Coin Machine Association (CCMA) focused on what's going on in the biz, its implications for operators (good and bad), and most importantly, what a coin-op person can do, if they're willing to fight.

"Your participation is a positive statement at a very difficult time in our industry," said CCMA outgoing president Rich Scherer in his message to the convention-goers. "This business of ours doesn't allow us to rest on our laurels. It forces us to keep up with change, or face extinction because we're stuck in a place where the same old things no longer work," he warned.

With that in mind, California operators listened intently to discussions ranging from the "Baby Bells as Big Brother" (local phone companies and their ability to offer information services) as presented by operator Bill Stone; "State Tax and Licensing" moderated by San Diego op Fred Gillmann; "Video Lottery and Gaming" (with IGT's Walt Hawkins); and business diversification advice from Randy Chilton. The common thread through all the talks: get involved in what's going on in our industry!

THE TELCO THREAT

"Telephone companies have the means to provide interactive informationservices through fiberoptic phone lines right now, as we speak," Bill

Stone told the CCMA crowd. "And, they're also actively trying to influence legislation to turn the fiberoptic revolution their way," he went on.

Specifically, it's the game networks that scare operators the most — the ability for games to be played on the television via phone line transmission. "Game networks can provide the same stuff as operators," Bill

in the right position to do that? "Support the AMOA," Bill suggested. "Lobby, get involved in joint/cross promotions where you are named the supplier of the games, and as a start, change your location contracts to cover networked info/entertainment devices that accept credit/debit and currency."

VIDEO LOTTERY

As with anything hitting coin-op right now, in the words of IGT's Walt Hawkins, "You either see it happen for you or to you." Such as with video lottery. Walt's report on the subject included a state-by-state rundown, showing that the majority of states are dealing with gaming legislation in some capacity.

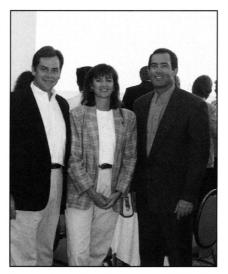

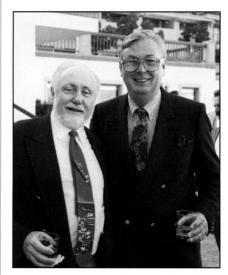

quickly," he said. "if you're not proactive, you'll be reactive."

WHAT ELSE?

Other portions of the CCMA meeting included additional superior speeches, the annual auction, and fun social events (need we mention golf?). The association's business sessions provided a platform for speakers from the crowd. Their chats yielded solid, useful information and suggestions. The majority of this "open forum" was spent on legislative issues, officer elections and CCMA membership.

In the latter, several members suggested beefing up membership by adding one-day seminars or CCMA business sessions offered periodically throughout the year. According to some operators, this would allow them to stay up to speed with industry/CCMA news, giving them the alternative to bypass the more expensive annual convention, if need be.

These one-day events could also be helpful in bringing operators together more often. "Operators have got to start talking again," said one member."If CCMA increases their exposure, and gets operators to meet with each other in a business forum where they can talk and share ideas, half the battle is won."

The CCMA staff listened intently to suggestions from the floor, and offered some of their own. Soon, a committee was appointed to put some of the ideas into action. And, speaking of committees...the new CCMA "administrative committee" is now officially in for 1994. Elected officers are Greg Stephens as president; Tony Parina, VP; Cindy Powell, secretary; and Russ Love as treasurer.

All CCMAers tried their best to provide members with everything needed for a stimulating and constructive convention, pointed out outgoing prexy Richard Scherer. "But," he reminded those present and those absent, "the rest is up to you."

TECHNICAL TIPS THE CLEVER SOUND OF REDEMPTION

by RANDY FROMM

Imagine playing a game that made absolutely no sound; none whatsoever! Can you conceive of anything so boring? The wild sounds that a game makes are as much a part of the excitement of coin-op as any other aspect of this entertainment business. The major manufacturers know this and hire talented musicians and sound effects engineers to give their

games the fantastic sounds we hear at today's arcades. The manufacturers also back up their sophisticated audio programs with high-powered amplifiers that will really knock your socks off if you "pump up the volume."

But what if you're really good at manufacturing redemption games but don't have the resources to develop your own sound system? You have a few choices here. One is to not have the game make any sounds at all. This, of course, is not really an acceptable alternative. Sound sells! when you ain't got sound you ain't got squat! Another alternative is to use a simple bell or buzzer that sounds off when a point is scored or a ticket is vended. Not too thrilling, huh?

Another alternative is to use a sound module made by someone else. That someone else is Clever Devices. Because Clever Devices spe-

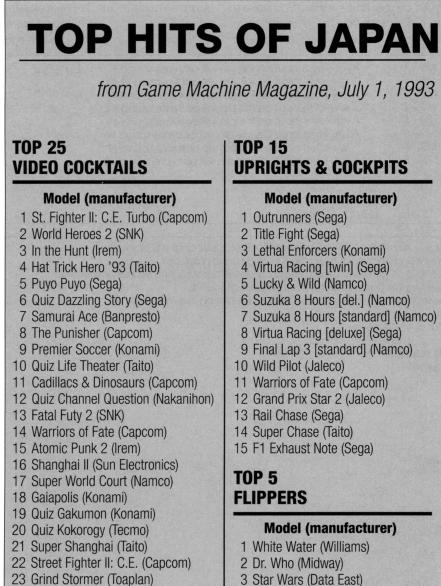
cializes in sound boards (A.K.A. Digital Audio Units) a manufacturer of redemption equipment can concentrate on what he does best and leave the sound system to the experts.

And experts they are. Not only in the design and manufacture of the Digital Audio Units themselves but also in the production and digital recording of both sounds and fully scored, full length musical compositions. All a manufacturer has to do is tell Clever Devices what sounds they want the game to make (for example, a "gribbit" sound for a frog game or a "crashing" sound when the player makes a hit) and Clever Devices will create the sound in their modern sound studio; a full production facility with a complete library of sound effects and music. In the motion picture biz this is known as the "Foley stage." Watch the credits of a movie some time and you will see a credit for the Folev artists.

Clever Devices also offers creative talent as well as being a technical resource. Production assistance also is available in any foreign language.

The recorded audio material is then converted into coded data which can be played from a Clever Devices audio system. This is called "Digital Sound Development." The conversion process assures that the original recordings are faithfully reproduced. A manufacturer can supply them with recordings or they can produce them in their own studio.

from analog or digital format into digitally coded data. This data can be edited to suit customer requirements. The digital code is then burned into EPROM memory and installed into the audio unit, resulting in crystal clear totally natural sounding digital recordings. Electronic storage is safe, reliable and permanent. If the need arises recordings can be easily changed by replacing the EPROMs.

Clever Devices manufactures a number of different audio units to satisfy various manufacturing requirements. Their top-of-the-line unit is model CD-30 which is a stand-alone unit that even includes its own, on board power supply!

THE CD-30 DIGITAL AUDIO UNIT

The *CD-30* is a microprocessor controlled, solid-state audio module. Since there are no moving parts, no maintenance is required. It will play back a digital reproduction of voice, sound effects or music. The CD-30 contains audio recordings which have been converted into digitally coded data and stored on EPROM memory. It then converts these digital recordings to an analog signal which is digitally filtered and amplified. The output of the unit is a full 15 watts and can be played through a standard 8 ohm speaker.

The microprocessor program determines the method of activation of the recording. There are three versions of the *CD-30;* identified by the suffix, A, B or C. The CD-30 can contain multiple messages of varying lengths with a total capacity of four minutes on 8 megabits of EPROM memory. Phrases can be constructed from a group of recorded words. The CD-30 can play up to four message units, words and/or sounds simultaneously which are mixed into a single output.

The CD-30 has another neat feature that has nothing to do with sound. The unit features two oneamp output drivers that can be used to control a relay, a lamp or any other external signalling. For example, a game can speak instructions to a player and flash a lamp to indicate where the player is supposed to attempt to toss a ball. This is known as "instructional communication."

Power hook-up to the *CD-30* is a snap too! The unit can be powered by 110 volts AC, 220 volts AC, 24 volts

Operation: Momentary activation of one of the message inputs causes the associated message to be played. If the input is continuously activated, the message will be repeated. If more than one input is activated simultaneously, the message associated with the numerically lowest input will be played. Operation: The *CD-30B* sequentially plays sounds stored in memory. Momentary activation of the message input causes the next message in the sequence to be played. If the input is continuously activated, messages will be played in order until the input is deactivated. During playback, any

Message selection 0 will stop the sound currently playing on the specified channel. Message selection 1 will clear all buffered sounds in the specified channels buffer.

WELCOME BACK

Sorry about the missed article last month. You know how it is when the important things in life come up, all within one week — a child breaking his toe, a wife with a bad hair day (cause for divorce in California), receiving that legal-size envelope in the mail from the IRS, and so on. It's a good thing we talk to a lot of people in this business: I think it keeps our sanity.

As we speak, the new live-action movie *Street Fighter II* is being cast. A full line of merchandise will be available soon, so ask your redemption supplier about it. If they cast the female fighter anything like the cartoon-drawn advertisements for the *Street Fighter II* pin game, I'm just wondering how the doll will fit through the crane slot. Anyway, I hope *Street Fighter II* plays better at the box office than *Super Mario Bros.* If any of you did like that movie, please let me know.

If you haven't yet heard, Washington, D.C. is now hearing from experts on the effects of television and entertainment violence on children. Please keep a close eye on the proceedings, as they could have a future impact on your pocket book. I'm sure our elected representatives will keep an open mind on the subject and not be pressured by special interest groups. Stop laughing, I can hear you all the way here in California.

AND NOW, ON WITH THE SHOW...

To begin, I'd like to thank all of you who responded to the May article on manufacturer play pricing. Many operators brought up some very good points regarding the subject, and asked me to bring them up in this month's article. With all of the responses by mail and through my travels, I'd like to touch on the subject again, focusing on the views I've heard.

As most of you are already aware, machines are now arriving on the market with set play prices. One of these is *Twilight Zone* from Midway. A great pin machine that is already very popular. Many operators I've spoken with have stated that the pinball is doing well, but several have received complaints from customers about the price structure.

In a Spotlight Special run in *RePlay's* May issue, Ken Fedesna (Williams/Bally/Midway VP and general manager) was interviewed and quoted as saying, "On *Twilight Zone* you cannot change it down to quarter play. It's 50 cents. That's it!" As you can see, Williams is testing set play pricing in the pin market. I think all operators will be eager to see the results of this test over time.

The following are some of the responses I received from operators throughout the U.S. One letter brought up the issue of token play instead of quarters. One comment: "Most customers in my establishments are used to inserting one token into all games. If they insert one token in a mandatory two-token game, and it doesn't start, they think something is wrong with the game. Small children especially have a hard time understanding which game takes two and which take one token." As you can see from this operator's dilemma, it would pose a serious problem having games with set play-prices alongside your quarter (or one token) games. Even if you displayed the usual sticker stating "2 x .25," how can a hyperactive, sugarhigh three or four-year-old (who can't even read) understand this concept?

Another operator I spoke with stated that she is afraid to buy a set price-per-play game. She asked: "What happens if my location won't approve the fixed price, and I can't change it at all? What am I supposed to do? Arcade games aren't like something you buy at Target, where you get a 30-day money back return policy for any reason. Four to ten thousand dollars is a lot of money to spend on a machine that you hope will bring the set play-price for the life of the unit. Wouldn't it be nice if there were money-back

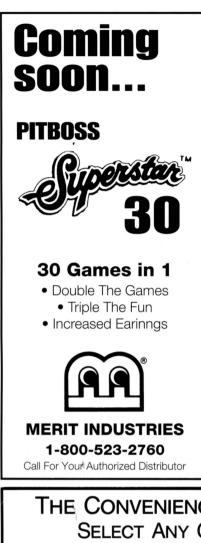

or trade-in guarantees on machines that don't perform well?"

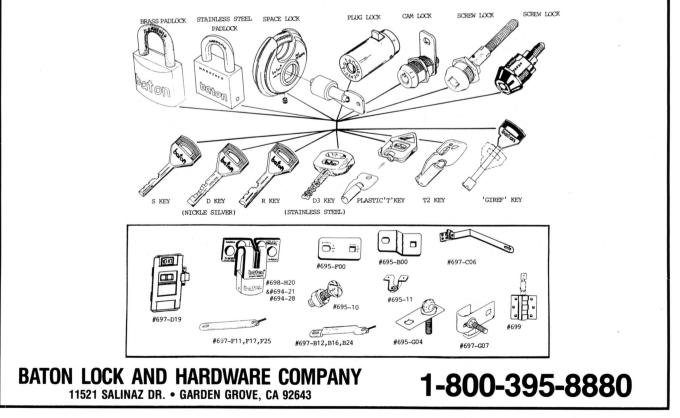
Hopefully, before any operator spends the money on a new machine they will do their research. But even research won't tell you how popular a game will be for any length of time. Several other operators I spoke with, shared the same concern. One in California stated that he "buys new machines and keeps them for several years." He went on, "Even with good care though, pins over time lose their luster. If I have a pinball that's not working 100%, I'll knock it down to a quarter. With set price-per-play, the manufacturer is telling me that this game will warrant their set price forever. How can they make that guarantee?"

Another route operator stated, "I'm in favor of set play prices. If I buy such a machine, I know the bowling alley down the street from my location isn't going to put the same machine in for less. We would all have to compete on the same merit, keeping our machine up so customers will choose a good location and clean machine over play price. The only thing I worry about is that the manufacturer will feel we're going to be making more money on these machines, so they'll charge us more for them." A good point, but manufacturers will rebut by saying that to obtain the set 50-cent price, the machines are being designed and built to attract the price over a long period of time.

Only time will tell how set priceper-play will affect our business. You've read some points and concerns other operators have regarding the subject, but many more weren't addressed in this column. Regardless of how you feel, please talk with your fellow operators and business associates to voice your opinion. I feel manufacturer price setting is here to say.

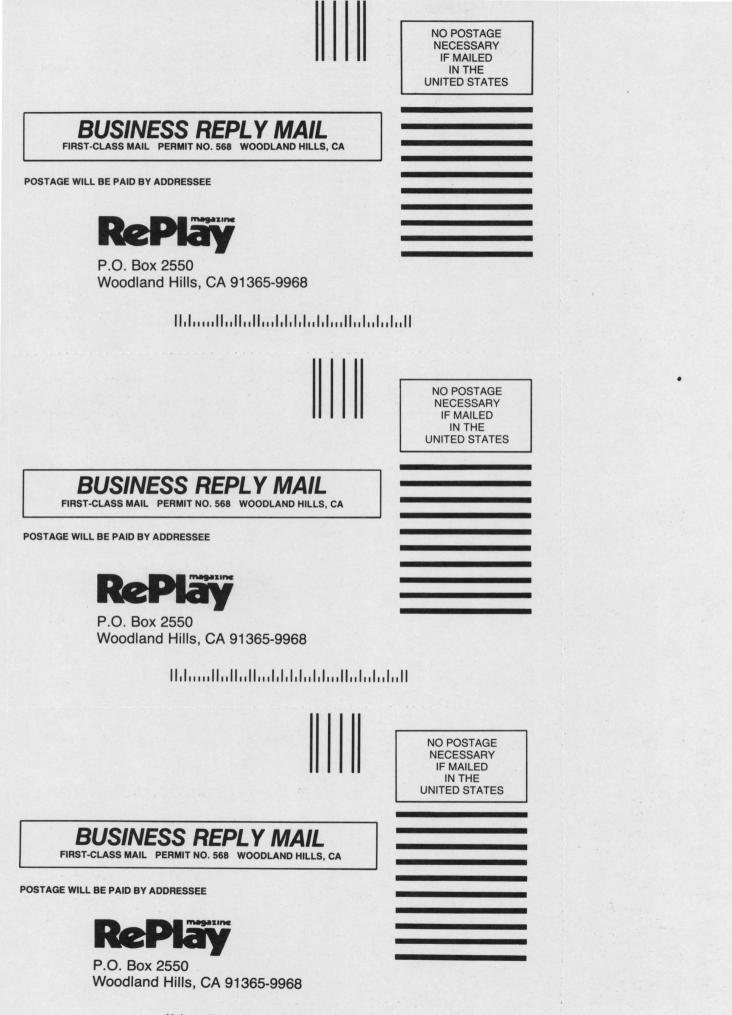

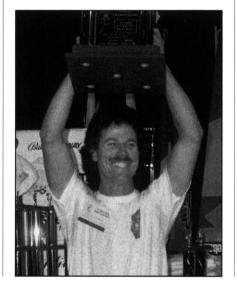

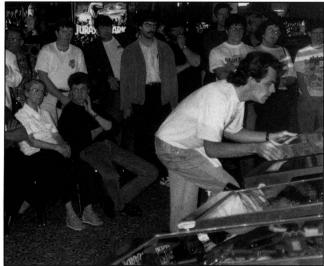

Those competitors come from hundreds of local league programs



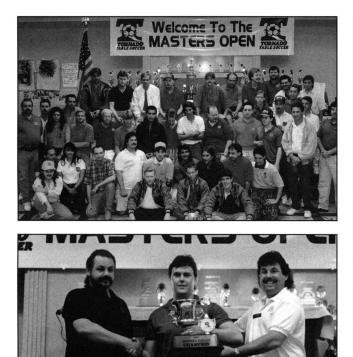

FRED BRITT

ttirB derF (Fred Britt) claims he can spell any word backwards quicker than most people spell it the right way. "I'm a memory man," he smiles.

The memory has served him well. The owner of Britt Music in Albemarle, North Carolina says he's been "around the industry a long time." And today, he's running his own business the old-fashioned way, with equal parts courtesy and service. As he'll be the first to say, he's running it the way a business should be run — as in the days when big business wasn't so big.

"During my time," Fred began, "I've seen business operations go through various stages. I started out as a truck jobber, where we'd go from store to store seeing what merchandise was needed and re-stocking the shelves with our supplies. That was very personal service. Now," he went on, "it seems everything is centralized. Instead of suppliers knowing who you are, you're just a territory or location. But not so at Britt Music. We steer clear of that, and do business in the earlier tradition."

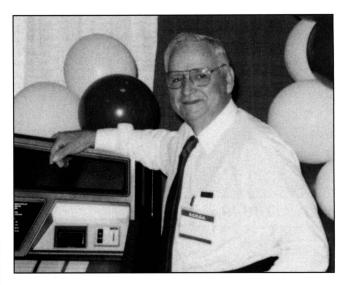
Fred got his coin-op start after helping a shop owner load a jukebox onto his trailer. "I helped him out of a tight spot," Fred recalled, "and a couple of days later, he asked me to join him in the jukebox business. We came to an agreement, and financed four jukeboxes together." Not too long after, the gentleman passed away, Fred took over his business obligations, and Britt Music was born.

That was over 25 years ago. "It started as a small company," Fred told *RePlay.* "It's still small and we like it that way. We don't want it any larger. Each and every one of us keeps sight of the friendly service that marks a true family organization."

Britt Music is run mainly by Fred's adopted son Merle, the proud pop is quick to point out. But it is obvious that Fred set up the guidelines of the business, and keeps the company philosophy on track. "We're there for our customers," Fred said. "That's what Britt Music is all about."

Another very important part of Britt Music is Fred's wife of 52 years, Hazel. "She's the woman behind the man," he joked. "In days past, she covered pool tables, made deliveries, and generally did whatever needed to be done. Now, she is our finance lady, and puts our money to work for us." The company is also staffed by Merle's son-in-law Mike and part-time runners David and James.

Together, the staff comprises a company which takes



great pride in its "mom-and pop" business status. "Business changes all the time," Fred reminded. "But in any kind of business, it's mandatory to stay on a friendly basis with your customers and even your competition. I always tell my son, 'When you deal with someone difficult, turn your courtesy up one notch, and if that doesn't work, turn it up two notches.""

Fred elaborated: "Sometimes we deal with unhappy, frustrated locations who want something we know won't profit them. We want them on our side, but we also need to do our job. I don't want to tell them how to run their tavern or whatever, but I know the coin machine business, and sometimes these two sides clash. I just try to compromise, still do the job, and be nice about it.'

Britt Music basically runs a street route, counting convenience stores and even some taverns among their locations. The company operates all kinds of equipment, from pool tables to poker machines (operated within North Carolina legal limits), and always buys their machines outright. No financing!

"I haven't financed a single piece of equipment since the first four jukeboxes I ever bought," Fred proudly noted. "I discipline myself to pay the bill immediately, and I'm very successful at it."

This is the same discipline that's kept Fred a regular attendee at his state association get-togethers. A member of the North Carolina Amusement Machine Association (NCAMA) from day one, Fred's has also served two terms as president. "I've never missed more than a couple meetings in 25 years," he smiled. "I stay involved."

Also a member of AMOA, Fred faithfully attends its meetings and annual Government Affairs Conference in Washington D.C. Currently, Fred's major political concerns are the federal tobacco tax under discussion and proposed North Carolina video lottery legislation.

As for the overall business climate in his home state, Fred reports he isn't listening to the doomsayers who say the economy is still sluggish. "Everyone's talking about the recession going on," he said. "Well, I want them to know that the Britts aren't going to participate! After the recession is over, the people who survived will be those who kept their business first-class."

Fred summed up: "Clean machines, primo service, a disciplined operation. The businesses that make this their motto, are the businesses that will stick around long after the recession."
