## Accessing: The State of The Game

### PS2: The 128 Bit War Begins

March 4, 2000 PS2 launched in Japan.

March 5, 2000 SM received a Japanese PS2. The box comes packed with a PS2 system, a Dual Shock 2 controller, an 8 MB card, a utilities CD that contains DVD drivers (more on this later), power and AV cables. The box itself is a shiny, deep reflex blue with the phrases "PS2" and "PlayStation 2" smack dab in the middle. It's elegant first impression to say the least.

After five solid days of playing the Japanese launch games (we know it's a dirty job, but someone has to do it) even the hardened SM editors were fairly impressed, although not blown away. Ten titles were available at launch. Ridge Racer V, Kessen, and Street Fighter EX3 are the three games we enjoyed most. They are guaranteed a domestic release and are reviewed fully on page 6. Eternal Ring is a decent title, but is really little more than a 128 bit King's Field. Regardless, it will probably make it over here. The last six titles Take the A Train 6 (a train simulator), Mahjong Taika III (Mahjong, of course), Morita Shogi (a visually intense chess-like game), Stepping Selection (a dancing title), Kakinoki Shogi IV (chess-like and focused on gameplay, not graphics), and Drummania (a drum simulation) are sure to stay in Japan as they would not sell well stateside. Both Stepping Selection and Drummania will appear in future Wanted sections.

Rumors have been floating around that the backward compatibility with PSX is a mixed blessing. Sony has published a list of twelve PSX games that will not work on the PS2, and even then it isn't a huge issue since only Monster Rancher, Gallop Racer, and Wing Commander 3 are available in the U.S. We do expect a few more incompatibilities to pop up, but the number of problematic games will stay well below the 1% mark. One of the features we really liked was the enhanced

texture filtering the PS2 offers PSX software. We tested PSX games from Enix and Capcom on the PS2. In all cases the visuals were smoother, and the load times shorter than they were on the PSX. Overall, the upsides of backward compatibility outweighs any downsides.

While the Dual Shock 2 is exactly the same as size as the Dual Shock, it is a lot lighter in the hands and doesn't feel nearly as sturdy. On a positive note the action buttons are analog, although no game yet supports this feature. Still, being able to alter how hard a batter swings in a baseball game by varying the amount of pressure applied to the button, for instance will make for a level of interaction previously not seen. Additionally, the controller's cord is almost eight feet long, let's hope Sony doesn't change this. We also tested PSX controllers from Sony (Dual Shock) and Nyko (Viper) on the PS2 and both worked without a hitch with PSX and PS2 games.

The games themselves come in DVD cases as opposed to the CD jewel cases used with PSX games. Originally it was thought that CD based PS2 software would come in jewel cases, and DVD based games would come in DVD cases. In order to avoid consumer confusion, and make the PS2 feel that much slicker, DVD cases are the order of the day. Every case has a slot that allows you to snap in memory cards for transport. Also, PS2 CDs are a deep purple color, and DVDs silver.

The PS2 represents the high end of gaming technology, and it looks the part. While we were apprehensive at first about the angular design, but once we got it out of the box, the look began to grow on us. A few days later, everyone agrees that it's the best looking system yet. The reset and tray open/close buttons respectively have bright green and blue indicator lights that add a good deal of class to the system.

Right out of the box, the PS2 will

play DVD movies, and the picture quality is identical to that of a stand-alone DVD player. The version 1.0 DVD driver (which can be easily upgraded) is stored on the memory card. DVDs sold in the U.S. will not play on an import PS2 by default, but a few codes have been found to work around the lockouts. See Decrypted on page 20 for more information.

SM has heard reports of defective memory cards. (Sony even admits to some problems.) It should be noted that importers are taking a risk, as the warranty is not valid outside of Japan. The worst case scenario is that you'll have to wait a few weeks and buy a new memory card once the quality issues are cleared up. For the record though, SM's PS2 memory card is working perfectly.

PS2 was a very typical launch, not the revolution many other magazines had hyped it into. There were no major disasters and most importantly the system finally made it into consumer's hands. The launch titles had a "first generation" look and feel, but they are only the very tip of the PS2 iceberg. In Japan new systems don't need the mountains of software American gamers demand to take the "new platform plunge". The U.S. launch will not only have more software to offer, but the flaws in the currently available titles (all of which were rushed to make the March 4 deadline) will more than likely be fixed. Playstation 2 is a great piece of hardware, and with time it will really prove itself. SM's advice: Save your pennies for a PS2; it's a must buy. In the mean time go out and buy a Dreamcast (which has proven to be a very competitive platform). This is an exciting time to be a gamer, and in a very large part we have Sony to thank. 128 bit gaming is here!

## Noticed: The Details That Matter




Although no official statement has been given as to why the relationship between Microsoft and Sega was terminated, Microsoft's announcement of its competing X Box console (which will NOT play Dreamcast games) is

likely the reason.

DC still needs a mainstream operating system in order to coax computer game developers into porting over their software. In a surprise announcement, Sega stated that all future DC units will

have a version of Apple's Mac OS instead of Windows CE. According to Sega spokesperson Uno Piazza, "The Mac is a great gaming platform and we expect a lot of exciting Mac to DC, and DC to Mac conversions by Christmas."

## Dead Or Alive 2

**Platform:** Dreamcast • **Publisher:** Tecmo • **Release Date:** Now • **Stage:** 100%

Dead or Alive 2 is a game of extremes. Everything from its trademark bounciness to its exquisite look has caused heads to turn and pushes a limit somewhere.

Take, for instance, the graphics. Each character has been lovingly rendered down to the smallest nuance. With the power of the Dreamcast at its disposal, DOA2 does not have any harsh, sharp edges, but smoothes each character to almost human-like sleekness. When Kasumi, with the wind softly moving her flowing skirts, steps up to battle, it is hard not to be awestruck. Each fighter's movements impersonate the ebb and flow of real life with a deceivingly beautiful grace.

Little extras help to make this title a masterpiece. Things like, well, shoes. When we see how much care and precession has

been taken in rendering a small detail such as a boot, it really makes us appreciate the passion within this title. In one of Lei Feng's alternative outfits, she is dressed in black with a pair of matching black boots and red shoe laces. Not only can you tell that these are red shoelaces, but you can also see that they are tied, and you can watch each individual end of the shoelace move during a battle. Even a unique tread on the bottom of the boot has been rendered. These finer points prove that details matter to Tecmo.

In this case beauty is not skin deep. A fighting game cannot survive without a competent combat engine. DOA2 uses an engine that provides the almost perfect balance that most players hope for. Fighting at blazing speeds that Street Fighter II Turbo alumni will appreciate,

DOA2 gives you complete control over difficulty within every aspect of this title. A beginner can step up and after setting the game to Easy or even Normal and be able to stand a chance. Veterans can jump in and using the higher difficulty settings, and expect a challenge as they attempt to master the intricacies of the counter attack system.

The Dreamcast version of Dead Or Alive 2 is much more than a simple port of an already great arcade game. Along with the now requisite time attack, survival and versus modes DOA2 features a Tag Battle, that will allow up to 4 players to engage in the action or let 2 players work cooperatively against a computer team.

While no game is perfect, the list of problems with DOA2 is quite slim. The translation from Japanese to English is

confusing and some times just downright wrong. However, this has virtually no effect on the gameplay whatsoever, unless somehow the few chuckles it causes detracts from your skills. Also, the level lay out causes some objects to go semi-transparent when they camera swings past them in order for them to not block the view of the action. While not blocking the action is a good thing, it can sometimes be a distraction.

DOA2 will be one of those titles, much like the original Tecmo Super Bowl that will cause gamers a few years from now to pull out their "old" Dreamcast, dust it off, and fire it up for a couple of rounds. It is what we refer to as a Classic.





# Kessen

Platform: PlayStation 2 • Publisher: Koei • Release Date: Now • Stage: 100%

Kessen literally means "the last battle," and after playing this ground-breaking action/strategy title for the first time we didn't want there to ever be a last battle. This is the first and only launch title that really managed to get our blood pumping. It is also the first console DVD game ever.

Just like real war, Kessen is 80% planning, and 20% insanely, realistic



combat. If you are familiar with Koei's Romance games, then you know Kessen's interface. The main difference is that the battle scenes are anything, but orderly. Once we set up the armies where we wanted them, and tapped the attack button, utter chaos erupted. In one scene, we counted 50 soldiers on screen. Each and every one of them was doing



something different whether shooting the horse out from under a mounted samurai or running a foot soldier through with a sword. No game has ever conveyed the feeling of confusion so well or in such rich graphic detail. As a battle went on, the air got dustier and many soldiers lost their lives in a fairly graphic manner. Mixed in with the superb in-game visuals are CG



cinemas of the absolute finest quality we've yet seen (again this is a DVD, not CD). The great voice acting and gripping story of struggle in feudal Japan really brought the emotional aspects of this title home for us.

Kessen is a very special game. Kudos to Koei.

# Street Fighter EX3

Once upon a time, having a Street Fighter launch title would have been quite a coup. However, the days of the SNES are past, and so it seems is the ability of the SF series to knock our socks off. Don't get us wrong, SFEX3 is solid, but it fails to provide that great technological leap we expected.

We anticipated the graphics to be the best of any fighter yet. Simply put, they are not. While some points are excellently

rendered, they lack refined detail and ultra smooth motion. We acknowledge that SFEX3 is mostly a souped up arcade port and adding extra frames of animation would have thrown off its delicate timing, but it didn't stop us from expecting more. On a side note, the nauseating background scrolling and fluxing is irritating. Much like when someone points out an auto accident; once we noticed it we couldn't


stop ourselves from watching it, and getting sick.

The gameplay in SFEX3 is classic Street Fighter stuff. All of the combos work, all the moves were easy to pull off, and like a favorite pair of sneakers, we slipped into it quite comfortably. The player creation mode is a nice twist and the multiple character aspect gives it a shot of freshness. However, both the multi

character battles and the Final Fightsque battle during the ending credits suffer from noticeable slowdown.

SFEX3 is an enjoyable title, but if the PS2 is going to demand our undying devotion (which we believe it does somewhere in the instruction manual), it's going to have to come through with a little more.

# Ridge Racer V

Unless you have been living under a rock for the past year, SM is sure that everyone has heard all of the hype surrounding the PS2. Many media sources have stated "officially" that the system's hardware and software will be so much better than that of the Dreamcast that Sega should pack up shop and go home. The PS2 has now launched in Japan, and the cards are on

the table. So how does one of the launch titles, Ridge Racer V stack up? Like the PS2, it does some things well.

As expected, the first thing we noticed were the superb graphics. The detailed structure of the mountains and trees along the countryside tracks were nothing short of perfection. We also noticed little things such as moving


monorail trains along the city tracks; true reflections of the surroundings off of the car's back windshield, and flying seagulls along the beach were all great extras. Graphically, this game is amazing.

Gameplay is typical Ridge Racer. The modes include Grand Prix, Time Attack, Versus, Dual Mode, and Free Run. Car handling is similar to that of the old Ridge

Racer games. Choose from drift or grip style vehicles for the races. Unlike other RR titles, the music in RRV can be best described as annoying, and it just doesn't quite sound like racing music.

RRV is fun, looks great, and is a good quality launch title that just comes off as a bit uninspired.

# BUZZ: For The Insider

## From The Hype Is Over, The Playstation 2 Is There Department:

On Your Mark: On the first day of operation, [www.jp.playstation.com](http://www.jp.playstation.com) received over 100,000 pre-orders for the PS2 before overwhelming web traffic shut it down.

Get Set: Sony has released a list of Playstation games that are not compatible with the PS2 and the list contains a measly 12 Japanese titles. Of those titles, only 4 have been released in the U.S. Of course, the rumor Buzzing around is that the latest delay for Dragon Warrior VII was to ensure PS2 compatibility.

GO! : Rumor has it that Sony will be losing about \$20 on each Playstation 2 console sold. So, selling almost one million units (980,000 actually) in the first weekend has caused them to rack up a \$20 million loss on hardware.

Of course, the PS2 launch went off without a hitch. Yeah, right. It seems that Ridge Racer V and the DVD drivers don't get along, causing some PS2 memory cards to be corrupted. Don't worry; you can reinstall the DVD drivers from the disc that comes the PS2.

Interact has announced they will release a PS2 Basic Dual Analog Controller, PS2 Wheel, PS2 Fishing Controller and PS2 8MB Memory Card when the system hits the U.S.

In a surprise move, Game Arts announced Capcom would be releasing their first round of Playstation 2 titles. They are the sequels to Slipheed (the awesome Sega CD shooter) and Gun Griffon (the great mech simulation for the Saturn). The final game is Chen Wen's Romance of the Three Kingdoms. Expect all of these titles this summer in Japan.

Square and Disney Interactive will be joining forces to create a new Playstation 2 title (with the possibility of more to come). We can only speculate as to what type of game it is going to be, with rumors pointing toward an RPG or action adventure. We are sure it will be based on the Disney Characters. What next, Crave and Taco Bell getting together to make a run for the border RPG?

With Ridge Racer V and Gran Turismo 2000 going head to head at the Playstation 2000 show, who was the winner? The gamers, of course. Both look fantastic.

Sony announced a new Playstation 2 survival horror title called Extermination. It is being developed by the Deep Space development team, which has a few Resident Evil veterans.

Onimusha the Demon Warrior is scheduled for release in Japan this summer. It is being described as a mix of Tenchu, Resident Evil and Metal Gear Solid.

Square is rumored to be working on a PS2 version of Brave Fencer Musashi.

Electronic Arts has announced that their first Playstation 2 title in North America will be SSX: Snowboard Super X. EA is also working on The World Is Not Enough (a James Bond title that will use the Quake III engine), and a WCW wrestling title.

EA chose Newsweek to be the first magazine to run screen shots of the PS2 version of Madden 2001. Odd.

Konami PlayStation2 game support is shaping up to look like this: DrumMania, Gradius III & IV, Jikkyou World

Soccer 2000, Mahjong Yaroze, Jikkyou Powerful ProYakyu 7 Baseball, Reiselied, Track & Field, and the next versions of both the Silent Hill and Metal Gear Solid franchises. Also expect some sports titles and various Microsoft PC ports.

Tecmo announced that the PS2 version of Dead or Alive 2 would have 7 play modes, including a "Super Real Tag Mode" which allows 4 characters to battle simultaneously. Also, additional costumes and stages not found in the arcade will be present.

## From The Games Too Cool For The U.S. Department:

Konami has announced yet another new arcade rhythm game called Punch Mania: Fist of the North Star. Based on the awesome Anime, it will feature multiple punch pads, which will light up and require the player to hit them in the proper order to power up their fighter.

Namco announced that they would release a new sniper gun shooting game Golgo 13. It is based on popular Japanese series. This game features both "digital comic" (ala Snatcher) and sniper shooting action. Each mission will feature a full background story and a target, which can range from a person to an item.

A new Macross game titled Macross Plus: Game Edition is set to hit Japan this spring. It is a 3D action shooter with battles that will take place on ground, sky and outer space. It will also feature original movie sequences between stages.

Enix is working on a new music based game called Seirei-Songs. Resembling Parappa The Rapper, this title will hit in Japan this spring.

## From The Fly Like A Hawk Department:

Fire up the hype machine! Last years shred and grind bestseller, Tony Hawk Pro Skater, is just about to make its appearance on the N64 and Game Boy Color. Expect to see television commercials aimed at the younger male crowd (we guess that Activision assumes all the older gamers already picked it up for the Playstation) and special promos at some national retailers.

Of course, you would have to expect news of a sequel by now and here it is! Activision has announced they are hard at work on Tony Hawk Pro Skater 2. The sequel will increase the number of tricks and add the much sought after skate park editor and a create-a-skatepunk mode.

So, what was one of the first games announced for the X-Box? Tony Hawk Pro Skater.

## From The Every Game of Dungeon And Dragons Delays The Loss Of Your Virginity By 6 Months Department:

Breath Of Fire IV is confirmed to be coming to the U.S.

Crave has added the minds behind the PC titles System Shock 2 and Thief: The Dark Project, Irrational Games to their list of developers. What they are currently working on is top secret and will be revealed this year at E3.

Capcom has announced they will be following in the steps of the Shining Force 3 trilogy and release their continuing saga Eru No Monsho (the Emblem of Eru) in bi-monthly installments. Expect to see it on the Dreamcast later this year (in Japan, at least).

Hudson of Japan's RPG Rune Jade will use the network capability of the DC. Rumored to look similar to Blizzard's Diablo, the character design will be done by Yutaka Minowa, who also worked on the Anime Ninja

Scroll.

## From The Who's Been Dreamcasting In My Bed Department:

Sierra has made the official announcement that Half Life will be coming to the Dreamcast in an enhanced version that will feature more detailed characters and special effects.

Acclaim has announced they will be bringing the addictive Bust A Move puzzle game to the Dreamcast this summer. There goes all of our free time!

Just when we thought no one was going to pick it up, Activision swoops in and lays claim to Virtual On: Oratorio Tangram. No word on if the special controller will also make the trip from Japan.

Eidos has announced they will be bringing out more than eight new titles for the Dreamcast. Confirmed games include Legacy Of Kain: Soul Reaver 3 (or is that part 2, we forget), Disney and Olympic titles.

Sonic Adventure 2 is currently under development for the DC. What a shocker.

Sega announced that the Dreamcast version of Sakura Taisen 1 and 2 will include network support, enhanced graphics, and VMU mini games. A Sakura Taisen 3 Preview Disc will also be included in both the regular and limited edition Japanese versions. No U.S. publisher has been announced.

Genki will release Tokyo Xtreme Racer 2 in Japan this June. It will feature twice as many vehicles and twice as many rivals.

## From The Patience Is A Virtue We Do Not Possess Department:

Perfect Dark has been delayed- again. This time the projected release date is the end of May. The face-mapping feature has been removed from Perfect Dark for "Technical Reasons." The real reason is that Nintendo doesn't want people mapping faces of teachers, friends, or Pikachu on a character and then shooting them.

Having conquered the character-racing genre, rumor has it that Naughty Dog is working on a Crash Bandicoot Puzzle game. What's next Super Crash Brothers fighting?

Ubi Soft has announced they will be developing a game based on the VIP television series, which stars Pamela Anderson (or whatever she is calling herself now days). What next, a game based on Baywatch? (With super slow motion replays, of course.)

Nintendo announced that the Dolphin's launch date has been moved back until the first half of 2001.


# Blaster Master: Blasting Again




# Deep Fighter

# San Francisco Rush 2092



## Dreamcast

### I-Spy: Operation Espionage UFO Interactive

This is the type of title that gamers dream about. You are put in control of a collection of highly trained agents, controlling up to 4 of them at one time, and you infiltrate various facilities to steal information, artifacts, and create seven shades of chaos. What is not to like? I-Spy: OE is a true innovation in a world of stagnant genres. However, being on the vanguard of gaming has its pitfalls. A few points within I-Spy could have been better executed and more refined. The level of actual control over your agents is limited, so it ends up playing much more like a RPG than an action title. This may not sit well with gamers expecting hands on espionage like Metal Gear Solid. However, if you go into I-Spy expecting a RPG, you should be quite satisfied.

The graphics are respectable, but as you would expect with 4 screens running at the same time, they lack defining detail. The missions are varied, and thus, you never get the feeling that you are repeating the same task over and over. Earning ability points for completed missions allows you to enhance the abilities of favorite agents. While it is best to distribute these evenly among your agents, it does allow you to favor one agent above the others and make him or her into a super agent.

I-Spy: OE is a genre-bending romp that melts RPG, strategy, and espionage into one entertaining title.

For those still holding out for PS2, all the while foolishly whining, "I hate Sega and I'll never buy a Dreamcast," take one look at RE:CV. Witness game graphics so well done, it's like controlling CG. Check out the slickest character animation ever to grace a console. And notice the quickening pace of your own heart as the devilish plot thickens. It's time to bite the bullet and get a DC.

After sticking PSX owners with every type of RE upgrade imaginable,


Capcom has outdone itself and made up for its greed with this, the ultimate sequel. RE:CV outshines every horror game before it. Graphically superior to just about any other console game, this 2-disc adventure oozes realism. Touches like dripping water, swinging lanterns, and scattering cockroaches create the feeling of a living, breathing world.

Control is identical to the rest of the games in the series, and RE vets will feel right at home, but newbies will need some time to get a handle on them. Ammo is scarce, making conservative gamer's lives easier. The puzzles are as tough. In other words, they require serious thought and a lot of footwork. Also, it's important to "check" every item recovered, as answers to puzzles often lie in the items themselves.

Character interaction is a big part of the story, and at times control will be turned over to someone other than the heroine. Great voice acting carries the mood, even in the tear-jerking emotional moments of the plot, and is perfectly lip-synced to the on-screen action.

With this sequel, Capcom sheds the B-Rate Horror Movie stigma. Everything is so real, so detailed, and so downright frightening that the faint-of-heart need not apply. RE:CV is the real deal.

### Alundra 2 Activision

In the recent surge of RPGs hitting the shores of America, the action RPG has somehow become neglected. Luckily, Activision has stepped up to release Alundra 2 for the Playstation.

Showing a knack for translation that has somehow evaded many of the new kids of the RPG scene, Activision has done an admirable job of providing good voice-overs and competent storytelling. Alundra 2's step into the 3D realm has ended up being more of a stumble. It is plagued by the infamous 3D action camera syndrome (that assures you that Murphy's Law has found a place within videogames by giving you the worst

possible camera angle at the worst possible moment). The graphics made the trip to 3D and get the nod for providing plenty of action with no slowdown.

The controls are well laid out and only take a few moments to grasp. The only peculiar occurrence is that fact that the Action button also doubles as the Cancel button during menu commands. This leads to some odd moments when you will highlight "Yes" on a menu, hit cancel and have it register as a "No".

The main course of any RPG is the gameplay and this is where A2 does more than satisfy. It mixes a fair number of the puzzles found in the first Alundra with a portion of straightforward action that resembles Square's Brave Fencer Musashi. This title fills a void for RPG fans that are looking for a little less talk and a lot more action.

### Silent Bomber Bandai

Wow, talk about a sleeper. With a minimal amount of fanfare, Bandai has sprung an incredible action title into our midst. In an effort to try and describe this title, people have compared it to everything from Bomberman and Apocalypse to Trap Gunner. However, Silent Bomber defies comparison, presenting an inimitable gaming experience for the action seeking Playstation owner.

SB's gameplay is fast and furious. You start equipped with a standard array of bombs that you can simply drop behind yourself or place directly upon your foes. As the game progresses, you amass a collection of power-ups including extra bombs with more powerful explosions, and devastating specialty armaments.

As you engage in the assault, you leap and slide, dodging the incoming menace. Explosions rip through the screen at all times and highly intelligent enemies swarm at you from all angles (all of this without a hint of slowdown).

SB does not compromise when it comes to length or difficulty. It will put your twitch skills to the test for longer than any action title in recent memory. The negatives are few and far between.

Only the voice-overs and the somewhat near-sighted view subtract from an adrenalized experience.

Titles like SB are really helping to firmly establish Bandai as a force to be reckoned with in the gaming industry.

Graphics and animation are on par with the best, and the brats that make up the cast of characters are represented well. This racer has loads of personality, and that is where the real fun comes in. There's nothing like spoiling the race leader's trash-talking attitude by stopping them with a homing missile just before the finish line. Yep, cheating is the name of the game.

Control is loose, but this isn't Gran Turismo. Up to four players can compete, and, that's when SP is the most fun. There really isn't a whole lot of innovation here, but the game's attitude and speed make it a decent rental.

However, we will give Jaleco an "A+" for effort.

The view in Vanark is a 3rd person behind the ship affair. It sways minutely depending on which direction you are guiding your ship. While this provides a great view of most enemies and explosions, it is sometimes difficult to see certain areas in front of your ship.

The gameplay in Vanark is twitch heaven. It conquers the difficulty question by giving you 4 different difficulty levels. "Auto Adjusting" was the most intriguing as it grades your performance as you play and adjusts the enemy assault accordingly.

Vanark is the type of shooter that the U.S. has been without for too long.

Baseball season has arrived once again and so have the console baseball releases. High Heat 2001 is nothing like last year's dismal effort, and is the best baseball title we have seen by far.


Although HH2001 is not going to blow you away with amazing graphics or animations, it will blow you away with its unprecedented gameplay and superb AI. The AI sets the standard for all baseball titles to come. Watching the computer perform double switches, timely player substitutions, well thought out intentional walks, and smart lefty vs. lefty match-ups was simply amazing. The AI could out fox some of the real MLB managers. That's not to say that there

were not a few flaws. The pitchers rarely tried to execute a sacrifice bunt to move runners over and too many times the AI made bad decisions by taking risks on getting the lead runner instead of going for the sure out at first base.

The gameplay is also as solid as it gets. Unlike other baseball titles where things like runners scoring from second on a single or hitting triples were virtually impossible, HH2001 has perfected these important little nuances. Simulating games is a bit of a task. Although we liked the Sportscenter-style box scores, these games are slower than watching Mark McGwire leg out a double.

This is without question the most realistic baseball title available, and is one of a kind. We recommend HH2001 to all baseball fans.

The zombies have been ruling Survival Horror for much too long. There is a new evil in town and it is poised to take a bite (or is that a slurp?) out of the zombie dominated market. Countdown Vampires takes place in Las Vegas at the opening of a horror film themed casino. As you can imagine, things go horribly wrong. If this sounds like a script of a 1970's thriller to you, it only serves to reinforce what great production value this title has.

The opening CG animation is of extremely high quality. While it may not surpass some of the recent multi-million dollar offerings from other unnamed companies, it will gather quite a crowd around the Playstation. On the other hand, the voice acting makes massive strides in proving our theory that no matter how high quality RPG voice-overs have gotten recently, Survival Horror titles are always going to sound like a bad B-movie. Other aspects of CV's sound offerings vary. Most monster sounds are great, but the sound of a vampire dying quickly grates on the nerves.

The gameplay is exceptional. The movement is smooth and with the exception of an overly precise "pick up an item" requirement, the control could not be better. The translation is decent, with the exception that a few Japaneseisms

that remain (the holy water needed to destroy vampires is called white water).

CV uses an innovative storyline and solid gameplay to carve itself a niche in the crowded survival horror market.

WWF Smackdown redefines what you should expect from a wrestling game. It includes so many innovations that it is almost impossible to list them all. Unfortunately, some issues with the sound and options hold this title back.

The graphics are amazingly beautiful with the characters rendered down to the finest points. Every move is crafted with the utmost attention to detail, with unique movements like Road Dogg's punches and Austin's Elbow drop instantly identifiable and different from the default moves. On the other hand, the sound is a sore point for Smackdown with repetitive music and the almost total lack of voice-overs soiling the title a bit. Wrestlers like The Rock just are not the same without their mic presence.

New advancements like controllable guest referees, a season mode, and multiple camera angles set a new standard for wrestling titles. However, some of these modes suffer from frustrating oversights and a slightly unfinished feel. Season mode limits each human player (up to 4 players are supported via the multi-tap) to control of one wrestler. You are not allowed to switch wrestlers or take control of another one during matches. This leads to players skipping the vast majority of matches because they have no input in regards to their outcome. The create a player mode excels in the technical aspect by letting you learn new moves and adjust techniques throughout the pre-season, but comes up short in the player appearance department. Unlocking characters is also done in an odd way with you earning the ability to build each new wrestler instead of just adding them to the existing list.

WWF Smackdown is a must have title, but a few issues cause it to be merely great instead of a classic.

has the plan.

The Gameshark CDX itself will work plugged into either memory card port one or two, and the boot CD in the tray. SM's tests show that it does not support using the multi tap. By inserting the GS CD and starting the Playstation, the GS

engages. After choosing your codes, you will be prompted to remove the GS CD, and insert a game. The PSX will then boot normally. While a bit more cumbersome than the classic GS, it is actually much more reliable than the parallel port GameShark which didn't always

work every time you started the system. Easily upgradable (just get the latest CD) and plenty of room for new codes, The GS CDX is the result of years of tweaking and perfecting. Every Playstation owner should have one.

•SM- A great site to check out is [www.GameJobs.com](http://www.GameJobs.com). Most of the industry's HR departments post openings here, and you can often submit a resume on line. We'll state the obvious; have a well written resume on hand, and a open-minded attitude. One thing you'll quickly find out about the Games Business is that every company out there is always hiring, and a love of games coupled with an understanding of why the industry ticks will get you an interview.

Where you live will be an issue. If you're located in New York or California, you probably won't need to move as the majority of the industry is based in those the states, however to have any chance of getting a job, you will need to be ready (as you have indicated you are) to pick up and go.

Keep in mind that being a game tester is not just sitting around playing a lot of

games. Generally you will work on one or two projects, and play those titles eight hours each day for weeks on end. As you play you'll need to keep a bug report for submission to the game's production team. Once the code has been revised, you'll pay though it again, and again, and again. Also, testers don't get paid a lot of money. This is an entry level job. If you do it well, however, you can move up in the world. A number of respected industry figures started out as testers. So working through the system can pay off.

While it may be tough to get started and the entry-level jobs are none too glamorous (they are still a lot of fun), SM encourages you to move forward. This is a great industry to be involved in, and over then next five years it will move in directions no one has yet imagined. It's exciting, it really is. We wish you the best of luck.






