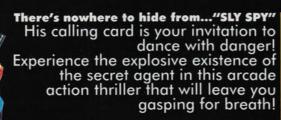

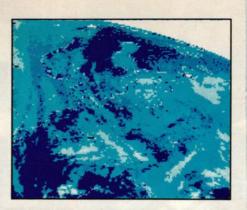

Taiwan factory raid uncovers theft

Atari faces piracy charges

tari's Taiwan subsidiary has been charged with copyright infringement. The Business Software Alliance (BSA), which represents leading American personal computer software companies charges that Atari engaged in unauthorised copying of software in their business operations, a practice said to be widespread in Taiwan.

Atari President Sam Tramiel responded with a strongly worded statement criticising the action and accusing the BSA of wasting its time: "Atari has a long standing corporate policy against the copying of software," he said, "and does not permit unauthorised duplicates of software to be used for corporate functions or any other purposes.

"While we support the ideals of BSA," he explained, "we believe that they are misdirected and have blown this matter completely out of proportion." He also stated that any copyright infringement had been carried out privately by workers at the Taiwan plant.

Brother Jack, chairman of the Atari board, joined in the counter accusations: "It is highly unfortunate that time and effort

He claimed that Atari loses millions of dollars in revenue each year through piracy, and accused the BSA of failing to act.

World's best ST forum hits UK

The world's largest on-line information service for users of personal computers (that's you!) has arrived in the UK. The US-founded service, which boasts over half a million users in 40 countries, provides over 160 special interest bulletin boards – including ones for the ST which our American contacts say are the best there are. Customers can access over 95% of the US services, including the 27,000 public domain and shareware programs that can

be downloaded from the data libraries of technical forums. The cost of UK access

has been slashed by more than 50% thanks to new network access methods. Costs, still calculated in dollars, are \$22 an hour (about £13) at all speeds up to and including 2400 baud.

"The three Atari forums of interest to ST owners," says Andrew Gray,

CompuServe's UK Manager, "are the Atari Productivity Forum, a developers' converence which connects people all over the world; Atari Arts and Entertainment Forum, which has message boards and public domain software for downloading; and the Atari Vendor Forum." This last section provides access to US companies such as Codehead, Grafix, Gajits by Small, SoftLogik and dozens more. CompuServe **# 0800 289 378**

One of the great things about *Trash*, and indeed *Shades*, is that as you play you can directly affect other players. Up to 64 people can take part in *Trash* simultaneously, with control in the hands of the very capable creator of the game, Matthew Ward.

David Rosenbaum, BT Marketing Manager for Microcomputing and Games, predicts a great future for *Trash*. "Its addition to our games list," he said, "strengthens our position as Europe's leading vendor of quality on-line multi-user computer games."

I mean we are talking 1024x768 resolution, non-interlaced, in 16 colours here, and 1024x768 "Duochromatic." in Yes indeedy, we're talking Image Systems' new Colour (or "Color" as these Americans insist on calling it) ISAC Board. It costs \$800, and assuming it becomes readily available here I think it's safe to assume that the dollar sign will be replaced with a pound sign. 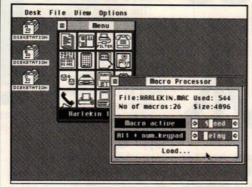

At the heart of Harlekin, however, is a very smart scrapbook that enables you to create cards and notes of unlimited size. Each card has its own optional icon and can be displayed as a list or as a calendar. In fact, according to HiSoft, it's a "complete information management system which you tailor to your own needs and methods of working."

Harlekin works on 1040s and upwards, and as yet only on

FORMAT MUSIC SPECIAL! Don't miss next month's ST FORMAT, on sale on Thursday 14 June The ST's dominance as the musician's favourite machine continues. Besides such fans as Madonna, Kraftwerk (before your time – and mine) and Fleetwood Mac (before your dad's time – and mine), the ST, or more precisely the Stacy, was used recently in the Oscar-nominated Born on the Fourth of July. Apparently the system used was Hybrid Arts' Adap II, a new set-up that enables high-quality recording of sound direct onto a hard or optical disk.

Don't get too excited, though, because the memory requirements of such systems are gargantuan – something like 10MBytes to record a minute of 16-bit stereo sound!

Recent implementations of this new technology unveiled at the massive Frankfurt Music Show include Son from Dutch company Mopro (£1,650) and Sound Tools from US-based Digidesign (£2,000). This latter is a spin-off from a very successful Macintosh version, so the result ought to be polished and stable.

Staying with ST musical innovation, but straying very much towards left field, is the Jimmy Hotz MIDI Translator, a device reportedly financed by Mick Fleetwood of Fleetwood Mac (hence, I guess, the name) that you strap to your body and play by tapping the touch sensitive pads (told you it was odd). Fleetwood reckons it's going to lead to a "revolution in the way we make music," but since it's currently being offered in the States as a bundle with the Stacy at an eye-watering \$8,000, it seems likely the revolution will have to start without most of us.

Roland have launched a veritable flurry of new projects. Such as? Such as a £100 ten track entrylevel sequencer offering score-editing and drum programming functions; an £80 stereo amplifier and speaker module; and a £200 converter that translates pitch and volume of an analogue signal into MIDI data. Roland **=** 01 568 4578.

Remaining in the music domain, but coming down the financial scale a few notes (get on with it – ed), Quartet, Microdeal's very well received ± 50 MIDI sample sequencer, has just been released in an STE compatible version that takes advantage of the upgraded ST's custom chip to offer true stereo sound. Microdeal \pm 0726 68020.

Atari have been showing their wares at the enormous CeBIT show in Hannover. Don Maple was there to bring you all the latest ST news

he CeBIT show in Hannover, West Germany, is now officially the largest computer show in the world. This year, CeBIT was host to more than 3,500 exhibitors from over 40 countries, with a total number of visitors easily surpassing the 500,000 figure.

Atari's presence at CeBIT took the familiar "village" format and was situated in Hall 7. Unlike most exhibitors, Atari chose to combine business with pleasure and hold their press conference after regular show hours at a hotel. In addition to Alwin Stumpf, general manager of Atari Germany, the panel featured Sam and Leonard Tramiel, Richard Miller (VP R&D) and Greg Pratt (VP Finance).

Atari cagily announced new Portfolio-type machines based on both MS-DOS and ST range. "I will not promise and describe the machines, but there will be further developments in our hand-held LCD market place," said Sam Tramiel, though confusion has since surrounded this statement.

Speaking of the TT Leonard Tramiel explained, "TT cheats - it uses 150K of video RAM as opposed to ST's 32K, so to move five times as much memory we use a 64-bit wide data path." Additional speed is also achieved with "burst fill" mode. New VME card expansion will be automatically recognised by the operating system, while the big news on the software side is the "cookie jar" for inter-program communications. Sam Tramiel stressed the international nature of the TT with the USA, UK, France and Germany participating in its creation.

The main Atari stand was buzzing. Exhibitors generally displayed improved versions of existing products with new items only occasionally appearing. This is probably because of the "everything-has-already-been-invented" syndrome prevailing as the ST market in Germany matures. However, with the TT upon us, the creative juices will soon start flowing again and there should be many new products before the Dusseldorf show in August.

One company exhibiting a

brand new product was SED-DOC. They displayed their *Silent Drive* box. Although concentrating their sales pitch on the quietness of the drive, what is most impressive is that the drive is removable. In addition to hard disks ranging in capacity from 80 to 250 MBytes, the same box also accepts removable floppy and tape-cartridge drives! The company also showed *Ctree Server*, an accessory for distributed DB applications running across different systems (Apple, VAX) on a LAN.

GRAPHICALLY SPEAKING

The most impressive hardware on display must have been the interface to high resolution, large screen, colour monitors by Maxon. *MGE* (Maxon Graphic Expansion) has long been providing this service for Mega owners. With *MGE II* an ST owner can now drive an array of impressive Matrix monitors. Depending on the model the monitors range from 14" to 21" in size and display up to 16 million colours. The crisp beauty of these displays has to be seen to be believed.

TmS, the graphic programming giant, showed TmS Cranach, an image processing system supporting 24-bit colour pictures on large screen multi-sync monitors. Its older brother TmS Cranach Studio is the professional version with pictures up to 40MBytes (!) and a 3D simulator. But the real magic is achieved with TmS 2.5 which converts pixel drawings to vector graphics.

Technobox displayed their professional Drafter and CAD/2 programs. Already translated into English, these are professional tools aimed at designers and architects.

A company called Richter Computer showed off Sherlook, a powerful character recognition program supporting both monochrome and colour scanners and automatically recognizing up to eight fonts. Also on the Richter stand was *Chili*, a sophisticated video digitizer working with 65000 colours. Mixing any two video signals, it enables the user to define the "see through" window in any regular or irregular shape down to a single pixel level.

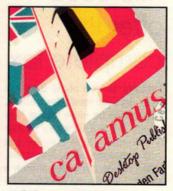


The multi-national sleek new TT keyboard which eliminates the rhomboid function keys

BioNet 100 by Biodata is a network running on a number of different configurations. Using BioNet 100 an Atari ST user can get access to MS-DOS, Unix, DEC, NFS, Novell and TCP/IP systems.

Omikron, who wrote ST Basic for Europe, ventured into hardware with their professional disk copier, *Copystation*. The hopper takes up to 100 disks with automatic master recognition. The device reads a write-protected disk and

then copies it to all subsequent floppies until another WP disk is encountered. Omikron also showed *Easy Base*, a database with fast search – 0.2 seconds for 1000 addresses.

In the software field, GFA were well-represented. GFA-Basic 3.5e enables usage of STE specific features such as hardware scrolling. The same program runs on all machines by adapting itself accordingly and there is now a new library with extended sound and graphic commands. Converter-to-C translates GFA Basic source into C, while GFA-Assembler, the integrated development package, is now up to version 1.5.

Calamus SL is the colour version of the well-known DTP program, supporting full cyan, yellow, magenta and black colour separation. DMC in cooperation with Atari Germany have shown the package, but it's not yet available for sale.

1st_Card by LogiLex is a Hypercard-like, expert system sporting artificial intelligence. Graphics, text and buttons are all easily linked with the built-in editor.

Weide Elektronik, famous for their RAM expansions and other hardware add-ons, are venturing into software. Address Direct is a database written specifically for mail order companies. It supports both networks and GDOS, while the mail merge is possible with Tempus, 1st_word and Calamus documents. ■ BRITAIN'S BIGGEST SELLING SPORTS HIT IS ABOUT TO HIT THE WORLD

Falcon was one of the best ever, but even lesser examples, such as Fighter Bomber and Afterburner still managed to climb the charts. Now Microprose have come up with their answer to the flight sim competition with the impending release of F-19 Stealth Fighter.

It was attention to detail that made Digital Integration's game so popular, and Microprose are applying the same care to this one. There

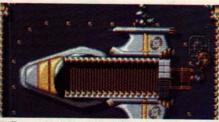


are to this one. There are hundreds of missions to complete – combining training modes, air-to-air and strike missions with different levels of war from the Cold War to conventional warfare. In the Cold War you need to sneak stealthily in and out of enemy territory, but conventional warfare

Microprose's F-19 aims high (as at £30 it should!)

is a non-stop blast. The views are represented as 3D polygons which move at a startling speed of 13 frames per second. Microprose are claiming that F-19 runs at 30-40% faster than Falcon, and they're so convinced they've got it right that they're hanging a £30 price label on it.

■ PARADROID 90 (Hewson) This is the first Hewson game we've seen since last year's Stormlord, but don't expect anything too original. It's a typical space game which sees you jaunting through space stations, avoiding space pirates, picking up objects and so on. The idea is as old as the arcade game, but at least the visuals promise something new: robots are shown in glorious 3D and scrolling is fast. Paradroid is in the capable hands of Graftgold, the team behind the chart-topping Rainbow Islands: read next the full review in next month's ST FORMAT.

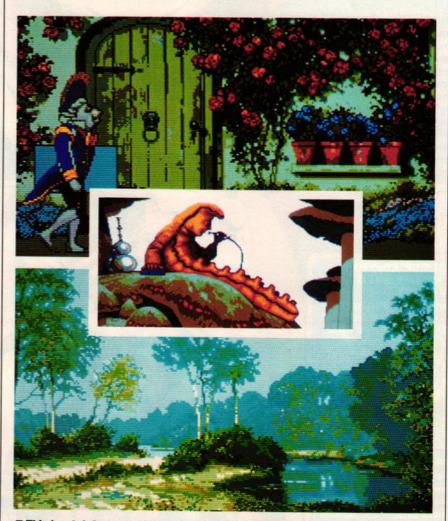

Dynasty Wars is eight levels of action, played with a choice of four characters. Each has different skills and weapons and when you get bored fighting by yourself, you can find a friend and enjoy the two-player mode. ■ PROJECTYLE (Electronic Arts) The last big futuristic sports game was Cyberball from the Bitmaps – a manic combination of steel balls and fast-paced action. It was an enthralling game, but it had its limitations. You couldn't, for instance, smash your best friend round the head with a cannon ball. Projectyle

aims to satisfy that primeval urge by enabling you to compete against two other friends at the same time and eight others in a full match.

Each game is played on a pitch of five sections – a centre one, surrounded by four others. The puck is set in the centre section and must be knocked into any one of the other four. In three of these, one player defends while two attack and in the fourth, each team has a goal to defend.

With eight-directional scrolling and eight different soundtracks, it's guaranteed to leave you starry-eyed and dripping with sweat.

You sit at your ST and drop your favourite wargame in the drive. It loads in an instant and an atmospheric introductory screen appears, setting the scene for what follows. You watch, goggle-eyed as enemy troops advance and you respond quickly by arranging your own armies to maximise the strength of your front line. The war is on and

you aren't just watching it, you're a part of it. The enemies aren't tiny pixelated characters appearing on a monitor screen – they're real. You're facing an opponent who lives and breathes, who can adopt new strategies at any time, and who you deserately need to wipe out.

It sounds an absorbing scenario, but wargames have sadly fallen short of this mark. The designer of *Imperium*, Matthew Stibbe, believes he's recognised the problems in other strategy games and has solved them all. "I looked at other wargames but received only negative influences from them... I wanted to write a game to follow on from the rest."

Of course he would say that, but when you listen to Matthew talk about *Imperium* and compare it to other big hits of the same genre you begin to get the impression that it really is more than a standard strategy game.

"Balance of Power was very linear. There are about ten different things you can do to get even, and after that you can keep applying the same rules over and over again and win." Nevertheless, Stibbe still rates Balance of Power highly, and although he doesn't think it hit the mark he does praise designer Chris Crawford, calling him his "hero."

Imperium isn't your typical wargame. For a start it's set in space. Being something of a historian, Matthew considered giving it an historical past. "Space has been done before, but you can write your own rules," he explains. The objective of the game is to build up fleets and use them to invade new planets in search of the life-preserving drug, Nolstrum. Unlike *Elite* and *Starflight* which sets you up as the divine leader, *Imperium* gives you elections to face and even the prospect of rebellion by your underlings. You can influence taxation levels, set trade embargoes or even subsidies planets. The user interface has been one of the hardest sections of the game, occupying considerable programming time. Special routines to handle windows have been developed, with the emphasis being on reducing any delay encountered by the player. In *Reach for the Stars* you have to wait a

full minute for the AI (artificial intelligence)

routines when the computer takes its turn. But in *Imperium* the AI routines are very fast, even when making movements which affect the trading between hundreds of planets.

One surprising bonus is the way it can be played on a monochrome monitor with the graphics looking even more impressive than they would on a Mac.

Matthew hopes that extras like these will lure people away from the traditional action game. "We've really tried to give something to everyone." Find out if he's succeeded when ST FORMAT reviews the full game next month.

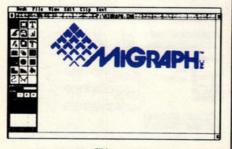

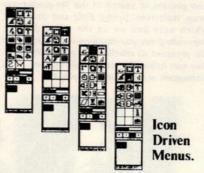

what price this disk?

Despite the high profile of the Federation Against Software Theft, illicit copying of ST software remains rife. Neil Jackson and Steve Carey report on the extent of the problem and new approaches to solving it

he advertisement, in the classified section of a well-known magazine, looked innocuous and contained nothing obviously illegal. "ST contacts desperately wanted," it read. "Definite 100% reply. Send game list." Checking the rest of the page showed nearly 50 similar ads, all with the same basic theme.

Innocent? Maybe. A letter, an SAE and a not altogether successful attempt to write like a 14 year old told a different story. The list was immense, but by no means untypical: hundreds of programs available for no more than you'd pay for public domain software. Only this wasn't PD, but cracked copies of everything from the very latest games – downloaded from bulletin boards, often before the games were even on sale – right up to DTP and CAD packages costing hundreds of pounds.

Facts and figures are of course virtually impossible to discover: it's an underground crime. "I think we would probably sell three times as many games as we do if there were no piracy," estimates Domark boss Dominic Wheatley: others put that figure even higher. It is clearly a deeply rooted problem that is not about to go away.

Pirates fall into two main categories. The first category is the organised cracking team. Most are groups of seasoned hackers and crackers working together for long hours breaking protection systems, adding fake loading screens which name themselves as the authors, and the familiar scrolling messages. Some even go so far as to duplicate entire packages to be sold off as originals.

The second is the casual copier and swapper who passes hacked copies of games to friends in return for more of the same. These small-time pirates usually work from home, breaking into their latest ST games and perhaps adding an infinite lives mode, before taking the now copyable disk to his school or club. The disk is copied by friends, or swapped for another.

The two groups have differing motives. The casual types do it for fun or to save their pocket money, whereas the sole desire for the organised groups is to make money. >

Free modem offer available in the UK only to new members while stocks last. Despite their fundamental difference, however, the effect, and in some cases the operating methods, are the same. Both groups deprive the industry of its income, and both use various forms of deception to achieve their objectives (see box, "How pirates get away with it").

But if money isn't the sole motive, why don't such people put their creative energies into writing original programs, instead of ripping off other people's – fellow programmers' – work? Dominic Wheatley of Domark stresses the wasted intelligence and work of pirates and hackers: "If they have aspirations, they should not do it illegally, they should do it legally: come

along and be published if you are that clever! Do not spend your time hacking – write your own. After all, it's not a difficult industry to get into."

Attempting to discover just why people do crack and copy software, ST FORMAT, by promising anonymity, was able to track down a man who termed himself an exhacker - but then, he would say that, wouldn't he? (By the way, most of the "interviews" you read magazines with in hackers and pirates are made up in the office: this one is genuine.)

Mr E, as he shall be known (Mystery – geddit?)

first started pirating about six years ago as part of a small club, using the "Group Purchase" idea. "We justified it by declaring the software we bought as the property of the club, so it followed that we were entitled to copy it." E's involvement in what started out as a small-time operation is worrying, as this is precisely how many, and maybe even most, young hackers begin.

Once a group is formed there is a great deal of internal pressure to be the best hacker in the team. This can lead to more and more hacking, and often takes over as the main motivating factor. "It's an unbelievable challenge. That's the whole thing about software protection: if there's something there it's just got to be mastered. If someone else in the team is unable to crack the code and I can, then it's a wonderful feeling, a buzz. It's like doing a giant puzzle, a huge logic problem. If someone can be bothered to create a really difficult protection system, then it makes me all the more eager to try and take it all out."

THERE IS NO COPY RIGHT LAW

Contrary to popular belief, there is absolutely no automatic right in law to back up copyrighted software, even for archival purposes. Some publishers allow you to do it, others recommend it and some expressly prevent it. You have legal rights if disks are damaged or won't work, but these do not include copying unless the copyright owner states that you may, in writing. But E claims that many pirates have other reasons for wanting to break protection. "Lots are out to get the software houses," he says. "They see publishers as yuppies, rich kids and fat cats, and are basically just jealous. There's a running battle, a rivalry between them. The worst thing a publisher can do is to hide a rude message to the hackers in the protection code. It's like waving a red flag at a bull – one hell of an incentive to pirates."

But Activision's head man in Europe, Rod Cousens, dismisses this fashionable argument. "It's nonsense. The real losers in this situation are the developers, the programmers, artists,

musicians and designers who work so hard to bring you new and exciting games. This industry has lost a lot of creative talent, because they know they are not being properly rewarded when their works of art are being abused by pirates. Developers see the efforts of their last year instantly wasted, and as a result some cannot consider this a viable career any longer, and are lost to other industries."

The exodus of talent may seem an odd one to blame on the pirates. It revolves around the amount of money a de for developing a pro-

publisher can put aside for developing a program, and that in turn is based on the projected revenue said program could generate. If the danger of piracy hitting sales is high it follows that publishing budgets are reduced. The ST suffers, like most computers, because of the lack of adequate protection that can be implemented. So if a large, well-organised software company like Activision estimates sales of about 15,000 copies of an ST game (generally regarded as a good quantity – but still tiny compared to the 250,000-plus STs in this country) then the development cost is worked out accordingly.

"Clearly that puts a constraining influence on the amount any developer working on a project can earn," explains Cousens. "We can't attract new talent unless we can guarantee sufficient reward for their work, so piracy also affects quality as well as price." Cousens believes that in some cases as much as £25,000 is being indirectly stolen from developers (and five times that from the publishers), on an ST version alone. In an industry where developers are dependent on future royalties from a product to keep their team or business afloat, that kind of loss cuts very deep indeed.

The software industry, says Cousens, is only making about half its expected turnover (not profit), on the ST overall. This is because the sales are decimated by piracy, at home and abroad. "We'd like to think that reducing the ST game retail price to £14.99 or £9.99 would increase sales to around 50,000," says Cousens. "But some have tried it, and found that the volume of sales does not increase significantly at all. 10-20,000 is good on the >

HOW PIRATES GET AWAY WITH IT

ONE OF THE OLDEST forms of piracy is falsely thought not to be piracy. A group of users club together to buy a game which is then hacked and distributed around the group, arguing that the sale of the first disk would not have happened had it not been for the pooling of the group's resources. But it has been estimated that for every single disk sold, 10 pirate copies are made. If this figure is even anywhere near accurate – and statistics are notoriously difficult to come by on the subject – then "Group Purchase" does at least as much damage to the software industry as the commercially organised cracking teams.

PERHAPS THE MOST spectacular operation of all is the copy party. A relatively new invention, they involve large numbers of infamous hackers assembling at secret locations. Such copy parties were held late last year in the Netherlands, for example, and earlier this year on a small island off the coast of Denmark. Crackers are invited from all over Europe and spend an entire weekend cracking and copying software. At the Danish meeting, competitions were organised for cracking the largest number of programs, and prizes awarded to the winners. After the party, which offered bed and board to the pirates, the organisers and those who attended had amassed a huge collection of compressed, hacked and generally well dodgy software, ripe for distribution to users only too happy not to ask questions. Such a party could cost the software industry £1,000,000 in lost sales.

THE SCALE of such operations means that the pirates have to be well-organised to prevent discovery. Distribution of vast amounts of software is something which won't go unnoticed, especially if conventional routes from country to country are used. Customs officials require import documents for goods, and software is no exception.

THE RESULT IS the use of telephone lines as a distribution channel. Using secret telephone numbers, modem links and bulletin boards, pirate networks can access a wide area using only one version of an illegal program. The recipient, who may be in another country, is then able to mass produce his own copies without arousing any unwanted interest from the port authorities.

THIS IS POTENTIALLY the most damaging operation, as it is hard to detect, and even harder to eradicate. The law enforcers have to be at least as able to hack into the networks as the hackers themselves. This takes time – enough time for the damage to be done. But it doesn't stop there. Some network operators include the telephone systems as further targets in their quest to make money. The fact that international computer to computer calls can cost a great deal of money has led to the invention and use of specially-made devices which prevent the call-metering systems from operating.

ST, so we shall be keeping the prices where they are until we know we can reach all the market directly. Piracy is keeping prices higher than necessary, and that keeps this industry a minority interest."

Yet, according to pirates, the majority of hackers are just out for a good time, and besides, investigating programs is the best way of increasing your knowledge of complex systems such as the ST. "I didn't set out to do any damage," asserts our Mr E: "just to test my brain and learn the ST as quickly as possible.' That may be so. Yet the fact remains that copying and swapping games is costing someone a great deal of money. How can this be justified? "Most hackers don't have the time to distribute large amounts of cracked software, they're too busy hacking. But if a hacker gives a copy of a game to a friend, especially one who is not a programmer, then that's often the beginning of the pirate chain. These people don't understand the skill involved, either in the original creation, or the hacking job. They're the worst kind of people, the real philistines, especially if they make money out of it. Even I think they should be stopped."

But surely this doesn't make the original hacker any the less guilty? After all, the theft started with him. But E denies that piracy is theft. "Theft means to take an item from someone, so you can't call it that. Software isn't an object, it merely exists on one – the disk. If I give someone a disk, and it just happens to contain a game I've cracked, then it can't be termed theft, because I gave them the disk."

The sheer idiocy of this argument has done little to prevent its widespread currency as an argument in favour of copying. After all, on the same basis it's hard to see how electricity could constitute an item, and the entire concept of

intellectual property and copyright – which protects songs and books, for example – depends on the notion that theft extends much further than mere physical objects.

And, of course, the law does not accept the cracker's argument either. Illegal distribution is specifically precluded under the criminal provisions of the new Copyright Act. Despite E's attempts to justify his actions, either he really has no idea of the extent of the damage he is causing, or he does not care.

The task of tracking the crackers and bringing them to justice falls to FAST (the Federation Against Software Theft), a nonprofitmaking organisation funded by the software industry. The funding is done on a pro-rata basis, with the more modest companies paying less than industry giants like IBM. Its role is to uncover piracy and amass enough evidence to bring about a legal prosecution, assist software companies in formulating a case and provide them with legal advice. FAST is also charged with the task of publicising the anti-piracy cause, using adverts and leaflets, and providing helplines to enable the public to take an active (and anonymous) role in the hunt for pirates. The organisation gets information from magazines, from the software industry itself and from the

general public.

A vast amount of piracy occurs in foreign territories, and makes its way over to the UK via networks. Malta, Germany, Sweden, Holland, Italy and Denmark all have major problems with piracy, and most have no organisations like FAST to clean up for them. Consequently FAST has become something of an international watchdog, and has very good contacts in Europe, the USA and even Saudi Arabia. "The first problem is the lack of legislation in some of these countries," says Bob Hay, the man in charge of FAST. "In Italy, there has been no copyright law covering

software, and so the situation is literally out of control there. So much so that the US Government has threatened to take reciprocal action against the Italian industries by denying them Favoured Nation status, and therefore access to the US markets. In Italy the news vendors on the streets are the sellers of illegally copied software, and it's properly packaged, sometimes in compilations which make no reference to the original copyright owners."

As evidence, we were shown two copies of Afterburner on the ST. The disks are indistinguishable, the documentation has been incredibly well reproduced, and only tiny, but unmistakeable, tell-tale marks give away the fact that one is an illegal copy. The box artwork is exactly the same, in full colour, and even the promotional Afterburner sticker had been reproduced and placed in the box along with the disk. This is no casual, small-time copying operation. But Hay is optimistic. A new European Commission directive comes into effect soon requiring member governments to introduce legislation to deal with criminal breaches of copyright in the software market. When these are in place, FAST should become more effective.

As well as the low sales that result from piracy, there is also a "cost of prevention" effect too. Almost all ST software is protected in some way, and it costs. Cousens believes that interactive packaging is one way forward. This technique, pioneered by Infocom in adventure games, requires the disk user to possess all the original packaging, badges, leaflets and so on. But although this may be effective in keeping out the pirates, it also pushes up the cost of the game. This is not good news, not only because this hits sales, but also because high prices are an incentive to copy.

Currently, the most cost-effective defence against piracy is to use low-level disk technology to literally "encode the code" and tie the program up in knots, squeeze it out of all recognition, and generally make it as unreadable as possible to a hacker and his copy systems. The man most widely acclaimed in this field is a man ST FORMAT readers know: Rob Northen, creator of the disk format for the Cover Disk now nestling in your drive. He has also designed ST protection systems for almost all the UK's top publishers at one time or another. "Protection has to be changed, modified and constantly improved," Northen explains. "There's always going to be someone who can hack it out. I feel sad when I see so much effort spent on removing protection, when it could have been spent on more constructive tasks, such as writing new software." The real task is in making the protection as difficult as possible to find, let alone hack. This takes a great deal of time and cooperation between protectors, programmers and disk master-makers, and is therefore an >

A UNIVERSAL PROBLEM

THERE'S A TENDENCY to assume that games are the pirates' only object of desire, and there's no doubt that games are widely pirated. But serious software graphics, DTP, programming languages, utilities - also fall victim to the thieves, as HiSoft's David Link is aware from bitter experience. "Yes, our products are pirated - and fairly heavily, I suspect." But his problem is that he cannot take the simple step of protecting disks: the user of a language or a utility simply won't stand for it. "The way we try and minimise the problem of piracy," he explains, "is by providing high quality manuals and upgrades. We make sure that each copy of the software bears a unique serial number, so that only those people that register are entitled to upgrades and technical support. So we encourage people to register officially to get all those extras: we're adding value to the software.

LINK FINDS THAT he does not need to go looking for evidence of piracy. It comes to him. "People ring us up saying, 'Did you know the company I just left has 20 pirate copies of *Devpac ST*?' Or, 'My mate next door (who I've just fallen out with and I want to beat up) has a pirate copy of *Devpac ST*."

HISOFT HAVE EVIDENCE too of the kind of blatant mass piracy that occurs overseas and which, in the absence of tough legislation, is virtually impossible to control. "It was a company called Ofites in the north of Spain, San Sebastian, about 18 months ago. We licensed software for sale to them - and they then promptly disappeared! We couldn't contact them, and then a customer in Spain sent us a Spanish copy of the program with the Ofites logo all over it which he'd bought in a store! We never received any royalties, and we never managed to trace them. They were selling it in fairly large quantities in stores in Spain. If they still exist, by the way, we'd like to track them down!"

A COMPANY IN ITALY licensed Devpac ST and never paid HiSoft a lira in royalties. "Those sort of things are very difficult without using expensive solicitors," Link sighs. As to how much such losses might amount to, Link can only guess: "I suspect in Italy we must have potential sales for Devpac of quite a few thousand, at a licence figure of anything between £2-£10 perhaps, so it's thousands of pounds it's costing us. It's not hundreds of thousands, though if you look at the total number of household products that are not bought from us in the world it could be up to five figures."

AND AS LINK points out, the only way a company can keep going is by selling software: it's no good people using what they have not paid for. "For our sort of software it's not as big a problem, because most people, if they are going to use it seriously, want to come back to us, for a new manual, an upgrade, support or whatever." expensive process. "If you can keep most of the hackers guessing for three months," Northen estimates, "there might be enough shelf-life in the game to make it pay for itself."

Zareh Johannes, programmer of Super Hang On ST, has dealt with protection from all angles. He not only creates games, but uses little-known hardware tricks to protect them. "You cannot stop a hacker," he admits. "All I aim to do is stop copiers. If protection wasn't such a problem, then it would possible to play games from hard disks more easily, or multi-task them. But it's just too dangerous to leave any operating systems in place."

An important new player in the anti-piracy war is the rather grandly titled European Leisure Software Publishers Association, ELSPA. Last Christmas you may recall having seen a number of advertisements. all placed by ELSPA and claimed to be worth over £100,000. Now another campaign of similar scale is about to break: you're going to be seeing a good deal of Smithy, Mr Jones and company (see page 21).

The new campaign is aimed very much at what the computer industry calls the "young home

user." Dominic Wheatley, the Dom in Domark, who is leading the ELSPA initiative, explains the thinking: "FAST have managed to clamp down on most of the commercial pirates – the chaps who have spun off thousands of disks, held them in warehouses and sold them all over the place. It has taken a while, but it is beginning to bite now. Where we have been less successful has been in preventing people from pirating from home, and I suppose small time pirates."

But aren't the new ads, well, just a little childish? "I think if one can appeal to the eight, nine, ten year olds and give them a sense of this thing being wrong, they will carry that through. I think it is pretty tough to try and tell a 15 or 16 year old who has been pirating games for three years that he is a naughty boy and he should stop it. I mean it might have an effect and you can try, but really and truly we should talk to the younger kids, who are impressionable and who want to be good, and they are not yet at a rebellious age where they have to go out and prove things.

"We need to get them before the age of 14, so they do actually believe as they grow up that it is a bad thing, a wicked thing to do."

So how do the ads work? "One is at the school, one is in a street market and one is in the changing room after football, when two kids are reading a magazine where there is a small ad offering tapes for sale. So each of these ads is showing them an absolute example of where they might find piracy so that they can become watchful in those areas." The kids depicted in these ads are not bespectacled, goody-goodies who sit at the front of the class.

The objective is also to put off street

traders and schoolteachers – the latter group "very, very big pirates," according to Wheatley: "they encourage pirating among youngsters, people who put in small ads and so on."

Despite the obvious lack of subtlety of the campaign, Wheatley is optimistic. "If I was a market trader and I saw those ads, and saw that there was £1,000 on my head, I might think twice about being obvious about the thing. I might lower my profile, because I do not want some snotty-nosed kid coming up, looking at me, remembering the ad, going off and making a phone call that will result in a visit from the police. Good! We have achieved something

> immediately. As soon as they lower their profile, so they lower their business. And that is the objective of this campaign."

> Are you angry yet? You should be. The tired old arguments "Everybody does it," "I don't do it, so it doesn't affect me" - just don't wash anymore (and that's why they stink). High prices, delayed release dates, low quality: these are all symptoms of the disease. Piracy is theft, and in the long term the pirate is stealing from your pocket. We are all of us ST owners and games players, and we are all of

us missing out on a world of excellent, cheap ST software.

Think twice before you accept that dodgy version of *Degas*, or writing a scrolly message to go in front of *Midwinter*. And then, don't do it. Instead, put your creative effort into original work of which you can be genuinely proud. Once you do, you'll understand even more clearly why everyone of any note connected with the ST – *ST FORMAT*, software houses and above all programmers – despise pirates.

If you're still not convinced, just consider for a moment the implications of two recent advances in computer technology, CD and consoles using cartridge software. Both formats, unlike the ST's disk-based software, are difficult if not impossible to pirate.

And ask yourself why software houses should bother to waste their effort on the ST, knowing that their sales could be much more effective on CD and console-based hardware. We are facing a future, in fact, in which the ST is considered too dangerous to write and sell games for...

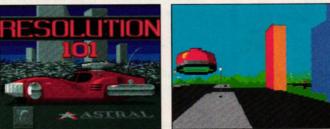

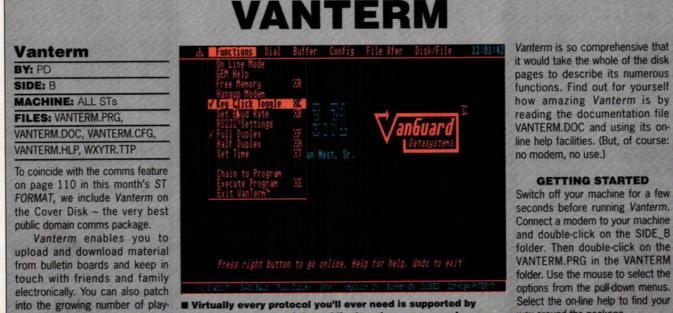

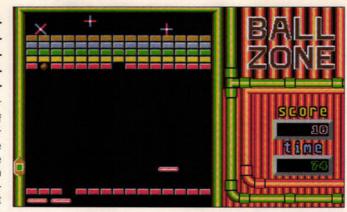
The mouse supplied with the ST requires you to traverse acres of desk space to move the pointer from one side of the screen to the other. This is because the mouse has relatively low resolution. In addition, the mouse's linear characteristic (cursor displacement directly proportional to hand movement) is not necessarily the most comfortable.

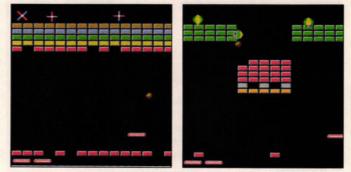
By far the best arrangement would be a combination of pixelfine resolution when the mouse is moving slowly, and much larger steps when you want to cover larger areas of screen. Short of buying a special mouse you'd be stuck – if it wasn't for Anthony's excellent utility!

Not only does it make the pointer whizz across the screen, but the pointer actually moves in small steps when you move the mouse slowly and in large steps when you move the mouse quickly!

GETTING STARTED

Before you can use Mouse Tools you must copy it onto another disk as it will not work while inside a folder. Prepare a blank disk by formatting it – make sure it's a blank disk and not the Cover Disk!

Insert the Cover Disk in drive A and double-click on floppy drive A icon. Double-click on the MOUSEY folder that subsequently appears. 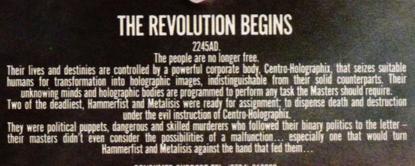

BACK UP YOUR DISK!

Because the oh-so-delicious *ST FORMAT* Cover Disk is nonstandard and squeezes in a whacking great 400K plus of data per side, the back up procedure is not simple. Follow these steps, though, and you won't encounter any problems. Do it any other way and you could knacker your Cover Disk.

- Format a couple of blank disks – single-sided if you've got a single-sided drive, double-sided if you have a double-sided drive.

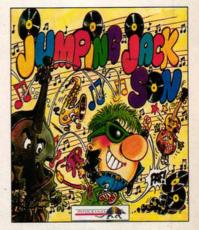

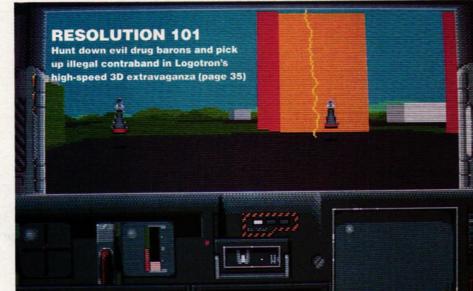

OK so it hardly sounds earth-shattering, but there's much more to this game than first meets the eye - load up the playable Cover Disk demo and see!

ames such as Populous, MidWinter, Gravity and Space Ace are constantly proving that the 16-bit arena in general – and the ST in particular – is where it's all happening. Just when you see a game you believe can't be bettered, another comes along to prove you wrong.

Programmers are constantly surpassing past achievements. A few years ago it was games like *Virus* and *Falcon* which were considered state-of-the-art, but now they're archaic and forgotten.. They're certainly not in the same league as *Resolution* 101.

Defying any neat categorisation, Resolution 101 is an all-action romp in which you spend your time squashing iniquitous drug barons.

Shrouded in mystery ever since Logotron first showed off demos late last year, Resolution 101 boasts the fastest 3D routines *ever* seen on the ST. Speed freak Mark Higham dons his helmet, climbs into his skimmer and signs up for the war on drugs. But is this baby really any more than just another good-looking ride?

Resolution is played in a city. As you advance through the

game and more areas of the city become available to you, so the challenge gets ever harder and the drug barons fiercer. Can you hack it?

Set in a city, the objective is to pick up parcels of drugs and blast the drug runners from the skies. However, this is no excuse for an unremitting attack on the local bovver boys. For you play the role of a convicted criminal suddenly offered the chance of freedom because of a new article of law -Resolution 101 (hence, I suppose, the title: Mode Depeche have a lot to answer for!).

To earn your freedom you must blast the drug runners and pick up their illicit contraband before it can be used for illegal purposes.

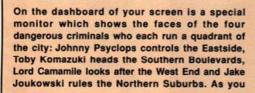
The city consists of houses and shops, represented as 3D rectangular blocks. The city is divided into four quadrants with each controlled by master criminals, who fly above the city roads in distinctive red/orange craft making city-wide drug runs and setting up deals for illegal consignments of contraband. As with any self-respecting drug ring, it's not Mr Big who gets caught with the nasties. Instead, he has a series of minor criminals working for him who

When Resolution begins you have the full range of dashboard accessories, but these can be destroyed when you come under attack from the drug barons, often putting you out of action for a time.

stocks you need to visit the shops where, apart from dashboard gadgets, you can also pick up additional weaponry to help in your quest transport the contraband around the city. Your duty is to follow them and do your utmost to steal the drugs. The contraband is represented in the game as coloured balls. Hit a criminal carrying drugs and he drops his stash: quickly you drive over it to pick it up before anyone else does.

Occasionally the drug runners drop contraband from the skies. In the first few levels of the game this is confined to standard red packages which are inert and can easily be picked up, but in later levels they're more of a problem. Boobytrapped bombs (represented as black and grey consignments) are the most dangerous and can kill you on contact. If you see a consignment like this, wait for another drug runner to come and pick it up. Now blast that runner, and when he drops the consignment it's transformed into a safe package. Bonus packages are represented as yellow balls. Collect four and you gain an extra life.

A score on the dashboard keeps you informed of how much contraband has to be collected before you can go after the drug barons. The barons are protected by a host of intelligent bodyguards who roam all over the city pursuing their dastardly deeds. If you try to attack their leader, however, they quickly return, lasers ablaze. They usually ignore the occasional potshot from you, but start making serious attempts to wipe out the leader and they descend on you like a plague of armed locusts. If you succeed in killing the leader, all the bodyguards turn on you. The answer is therefore gradually to take out the bodyguards until only the leader remains - he's easy prey when he's in such a vulnerable position. In later levels the bodyguards themselves have craft assigned to protect them - so you can be in for some major headaches!

To move around the city you have a skimmer which comes equipped with a whole host of expert gadgetry designed to make your job easier. In the beginning, the weapons system and the engine type are fairly basic models, but by picking up drugs and making money, you can visit shops located in the city to buy extra supplies.

The craft comes equipped with a shield to absorb hits from the drug-bearing enemy craft. If you're

attacked or crash into buildings, your shield starts to deplete. It can be restored at the shop with a shield booster pack, but if you allow it to sink too low, you lose a life. If the shield is functioning at less than quarter strength, you may lose one of your dashboard gadgets. This can mean kissing goodbye to your radar, shield gauge, pointer or map - any of which causes massive probs and may be missed so much that you lose a life. Once lost, the gadgets can be replaced at the shop always provided you have found enough contraband to give you the necessary cash, of course!

EFFECTS

Start sweeping the mouse from side to side and the first thing to grab you is the speed of response: this game isn't fast, it's bleedin' supersonic! All the action is played through a small window, your view out of the skimmer's windscreen. The landscape and buildings are represented as flat areas of colour, with planes effectively shaded to give the impression of depth. When you start steering your craft through these buildings they hurtle towards you at lightning speeds keeping the action immensely challenging.

With a host of extra touches such as the digitised faces on your dashboard monitor and the frustrating enemy craft, you are convinced that enormous effort has gone into giving Resolution 101 a polished and sophisticated feel.

version we reviewed (last minute problems inevitable in finishing such a vast project - hence the silent Cover Disk demo), but spot effects and a musical track using the ST's sound chip are promised.

VERDICT

Until now Logotron - or Millennium, as we must now learn to call the haven't ever produced a really big game. They've had success with Eye of Horus and Kid Gloves, of course, but nothing which you could say, with your hand on your heart, that was really state-of-theart. Resolution 101 has put them right up there with the big boys.

Although Resolution 101 is aimed at the action enthusiast, it defies any standard game category and that's part of the secret of its success. It's utterly original in appearance, scenario and gameplay. Couple this with breathtakingly super-fast 3D routines and you have something which is not only uniquely enticing but also enormously, sickeningly addictive.

Marry these factors with a huge amount of variation between levels and Resolution 101 is without doubt one of the games of the year. Don't miss out!

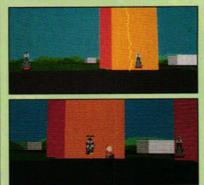
As Resolution 101 begins you are presented with the front option screen. From here you choose whether to load an old game or start a new one.

In this example you're preparing to move into level one. This is a relatively easy level, designed to teach you much of the theory behind the game



before meeting the more ferocious drones of later levels.

At the start you have only limited weapons but as you build up your score by blasting drug runners, so more cash becomes available to buy new armoury.



Here you're facing three enemy drug runners. Initially you have a shield which protects you from their firepower, but it doesn't survive too many direct hits. You send out a shot and instantly hit the centre runner. He explodes and then drops a package which you need to pick up by driving your skimmer over it. If you wait too long, another drone

comes along and picks it up. You cannot go after the main drug runner until you've retrieved ten of these packages.

Having defeated these characters and accumulated points, youre next step is to track down a shop. Shops are an orange colour but you don't need to scour the entire city to look for them. The directional compass in the bottom left of the dashboard can be used to track down either shops or the master criminal. Simply select your target and then steer your craft so that the red arrow points north. As you move around, so the arrows shift. Always keep it facing north and you get there in no time

With extra weapons in your possession you can collect the remainder of the drug packages in no time and then go out after the master criminal, using your radar once again to locate him. In this case you amassed enough points to buy the heat-seeking missiles in

the shop and then go after the master drug baron. With these you stand a great chance of success. Simply fire a couple of shots at his tail and eventually he explodes into a million different pieces.

In later levels you need to beware of the drones who act as

bodyguards around the master criminal and protect him from your fire. Here you are so successful at wiping him from the city that a message appears informing you of your success and leading you into





the next level.

As you advance through each level more of the city becomes available to you, and the game becomes progressively harder. The drug barons are trickier to locate and are protected by more bodyguards. And the red packages can become booby trapped.

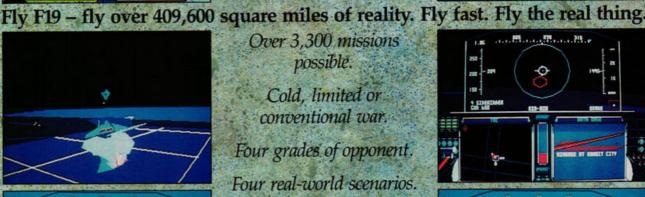

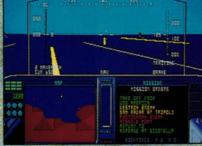

irrorsoft came up with a winning formula when they released *Tetris* several years ago. The aim of the game was simply to line up different shaped blocks. Graphics were primitive and sound was paltry, but the simplicity of the game and the ease with which early levels could be mastered, introduced droves of new people to computer games.

Klax has made some gargantuan leaps forward in the graphics department, sound has been enhanced, and though the game style has undergone radical alteration, the theory is still the same. The objective is to catch tiles and arrange them in a certain way to advance to the next level. Tiles roll towards you down a coloured track and you move a baton left and right to catch them. There are five different bins and by hitting the spacebar you can throw the top tile into the bin underneath the baton. A maximum of five tiles can be held on the baton at once and then dropped into the bins at will.

The purpose of collecting the coloured tiles is to build up a Klax. This is defined as a set of three identically-coloured tiles laid vertically, horizontally or diagonally. As you toss the tiles into the bins they form coloured rectangles, laid top to bottom. When you've laid three of the same coloured tiles and formed a Klax, all three are removed. Any tiles which lay on top of these drop down to fill in the gaps.

At the start of a level you're presented with a title screen which informs you of the objective for that level. In the beginning the objective is just to build up three Klaxes, but later on you must build diagonal Klaxes or amass a speci-

fied number of points. Diagonal Klaxes are worth the most points, but they are also the hardest to create. Fulfilling the objective of creating 13 Klaxes in the level printed alongside can be almost impossible – at least until you learn to think fast enough to keep pace with the game.

EFFECTS

It's the special effects which make Klax so much fun to play. There are three levels of action which become increasingly more difficult. As you advance through these levels, you're treated to three different backdrops, each illustrated on this page. The movement of the tiles down the coloured track is the same in each level with an increased range of colours for the harder levels. The movement isn't particularly realistic, but it's convincing enough to keep you returning for more. Sound effects are limited to lively tunes and the noise of rolling tiles - all achieved with the ST's sound chip.

VERDICT

Drop Klax into your disk drive, switch on your ST and launch yourself into one of the most challenging and addictive games released this year. The different objectives for each level constantly keep you on your toes. Some are easy, others insanely difficult, but there's always the feeling that if you're a little faster or a little more perceptive, you could complete the level. It's that kind of feeling which has you returning to the game over and over again.

Klax doesn't have enough variation to rival Tetris and there's just too little depth to make it a longterm classic, but that's going to make no difference to the immediate appeal of the game. Klax is fiendishly addictive and you won't be putting it down in a hurry.

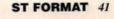

Unlike many big games released now, Theme Park wasn't written by a big team of programmers, sound men and artists. In fact just two people were involved – Brian Howarth (programming) and Teoman Irmak (graphics). Howarth started programming adventure games on the Tandy in 1981, creating an impressive 11 titles. In the middle of the 1980s he teamed up with Irmak to produce games such as Spiderman, Robin of Sherwood and Gremlins. His last game before Theme Park Mystery was the AD&D game, Herces of the Lance. Recently he's composed and recorded music for audiovisual projects, including an editor program for the West German company Steinberg, of Steinberg 12 fame.

Teoman Irmak has a fine art background and became involved with computers after tinkering with paint packages. He's done graphics for *Gauntlet*, *Black Tiger* and *Personal Nightmare*.

cean were the first software house to develop games made up of completely unrelated levels. Batman and The Untouchables consisted of a series of levels featuring generic game types all tossed into one package. Whether this was to achieve maximum variety or the result of an incoherent narrative is up for debate. The levels were so different that separate programming teams were even used to code them. Nevertheless, their meteoric rise up the charts proved that it was a successful formula. Theme Park Mystrery has been programmed by only one team, but each of the four levels is still a game in itself.

You've inherited the Magic Canyon Theme Park from your grandfather. The park is haunted by a ghostly presence that not only made your grandfather lose his marbles, but has also sent the entire staff and customers packing. Your job is to solve the mystery and make the park safe again.

Although categorised as an adventure, this is much more of an action game that requires thought to overcome the problems.

The four levels are split into Yesterday Land, Dragon Land, Dreamland and and Future Land and you must visit each one in turn, solve the mystery, and pass onto the next.

Yesterday Land is the first to be tackled. Set in a railway station, it consists of three arcade games dating back to the 1900's. Before you can leave the station and proceed, you must collect a pass from Zoltan who is found in the first of the machines. You can't collect a pass without inserting a token into the slot. The question is, how do you find the token?

Theme Park comes with only very limited instructions because the objective of the game is to solve these puzzles for yourself. In this case, you go to the second arcade machine which has a series of tokens waiting in the reject slot. You can opt to play the machine or simply take the token back to Zoltar who, after some dramatic visual effects, offers you the pass. If you play the bagatelle machine, you can collect extra tokens which come in useful later.

Complete this problem and you take your pass to the station plat-

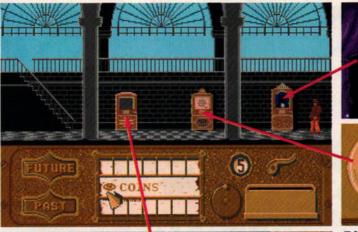
form where a train comes to take you to Dragon Land. This is a horizontally-scrolling platform arcade section where you collect the fire and water demons and a casket. To proceed onto the next level you require the sleeping potion and though you don't need to have collected anything else to continue, you cannot complete the game without the extras. You spend a lot of time in this level avoiding a series of apes perniciously tossing balls. Once you find the sleeping potion you sink into a deep sleep and drift off to Dreamland.

In **Dream Land** the tokens collected in the first level become important because they're used to buy you sleep time. Without them your visit is so brief you might as well not have bothered.

This level is an animated adventure which takes place on a chessboard. The aim is to collect two demons. You need keys to succeed at this level and they can either be brought with you from Dragon Land or purchased by tossing gold coins to entice Origami birds to lay eggs and leave keys. As you scour the land you come across the ticket to Future Land.

Reach Future Land and you're straight into a non-stop blast. This is an unashamedly trigger-happy shoot'em-up section where you need to blast everything that moves while trying desperately to collect the floating balls and deposit them in the storage hold.

At any point in the game you can catch a train back to Yesterday Land and pick up a hint card from Zoltan. Since instructions are very limited, these provide cryptic clues to help in your quest. Zoltan can even hand out the occasional extra life, but you have to weigh up your need against the nuisance of replaying other levels.





EFFECTS

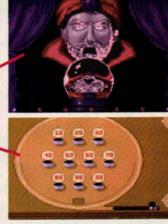
There is enormous potential for exciting visuals in a game set inside a theme park, and to a large extent this game delivers. Special effects such as the gradual, magical appearance of Zoltar and the unusual and varied playing sprites in Dreamland are certainly a visual feast.

In other areas, the game is severely lacking. In Yesterday Land and Dragon Land, for example, the playing sprites are tiny and poorly animated. That's not to say they affect the gameplay to any great extent, but considering what might have been possible, it's a big let down that more hasn't been achieved. Using a technique known as palette switching, more than the standard 16 colours appear on screen at once, but the effect hasn't been used to any great advantage so the visuals don't exactly blind you with colour.

Any failings in the visual department are more than compensated for by the stirring soundtrack. The programmer of the game was also involved in creating music for the West German company, Steinberg. As a result he has put considerable effort into making sure the sound effects are atmospheric and impressive. The game opens with a long sampled intro tune and special effects appear profusely throughout the game. There's even a crack of electricity as Zoltan makes an appearance in Yesterday Land.

VERDICT

While early demos of the game showed off some promising visuals,

it was always difficult to see just how the levels would slot together to form an addictive and exciting challenge. The long months of delay seem to have been worth it, because whereas Ocean's Batman and Untouchables were disjointed, Theme Park Mystery is a very coherent and unusual challenge.

Nevertheless the combination of adventure type problems with traditional arcade style levels seems strange. The average arcade freak is going to find the lack of help frustrating, while the adventure enthusiast may well be annoyed by having to tidy up his joystick technique. Its hybrid heritage could be the start of a whole new genre of action adventures or the kiss of death to a game that no-one feels at home with.

any computer programmers have dreamt of providing travel hungry games players with a complete and fully explorable universe - witness the immense popularity of Elite and the countless commercial and public domain attempts to simulate the adventures of the Starship Enterprise. Unfortunately, the only "boldly go-ing" that most of them achieve is straight into obscurity. Limited graphical displays, a tiny universe and only one or two species of alien don't make for thrilling space exploration. The release of Starflight from Electronic Arts is set to push back the frontiers of the known universe by billions of miles, for Starflight is a game with incredible depth.

The flight of fancy begins at a wagon wheel-shaped space station orbiting your home planet of Arth. A small, private research group, Interstel, have created several spaceships capable of traversing the universe and you've been chosen as a ship's commander.

With a space craft all your own and 12,000 MUs (monetary units) to outfit it and purchase a crew, you dally between the outfitters. fuel stores and personnel department, trying to stretch limited resources. Once suitably equipped, you're ready to begin the journey. But where should you go? What should you do?

Not for you a mere joyride buzzing the wonders of the universe. You've been assigned a top secret mission to locate other civilisations and discover what happened to the original inhabitants of the Old Empire (a conglomeration of races now long since gone).

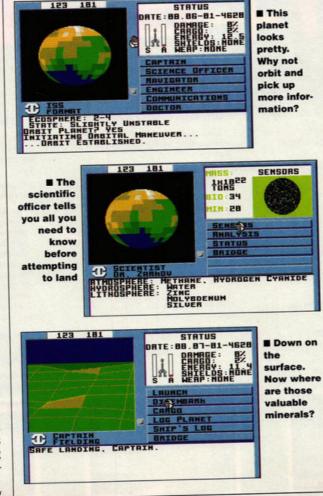
VERDICT

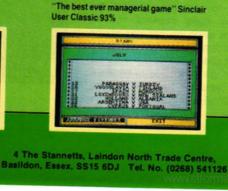

ootball is big business. TV coverage of the World Cup Finals will have viewing figures in the hundreds of millions; half a million people in England support their local football team, rain or shine, every Saturday afternoon; sums reminiscent of telephone numbers change hands for top players; lucrative sponsorship deals plough even more money into the game.

It would be foolish for the software industry to ignore a pastime with such a high profile and committed audience. This influence goes some way to explaining why

such a high proportion of computerised sports games are based around soccer. The impending World Cup is prompting software houses to release football games galore, no matter how tenuous the World Cup link may seem. What better time than now to take a look at ST soccer simulations?

In the days when the ST was a young machine, and Swansea fans could still remember the first division, Microdeal's International Soccer was the first ST football game of any note. Unlike many 8-bit International Soccer games.

enabled the player to alter many of the game conditions (weather, tactics, and so on), giving the game more variety than usual. Unfortunately, the game suffered from the "uncooperative player" syndrome, making the going tough unless a few unfair moves were learnt.

Football Manager II, the next notable soccer sim, adopted a more tactical approach. The original was never released on 16-bit, and despite the sequel's mediocrity compared to recent management games, there wasn't anything else like it on the market at the time and success ensued.

Taito's successful coin-op World Cup was the first overhead view football game and it inspired Sensible Software to come up with Microprose Soccer. It was hot on action, but sadly lacking in tactical realism.

As World Cup fever threatens to swamp the lot of us, unaligned Welsh pundit (uninvolved, more like) Maff Evans casts a cold eye over soccer sims on the ST where the real action is likely to be this summer! funny

As the market matured, endorsed products began to appear which cashed in on the superstar profiles of particular teams and players. Leading the way was Peter Beardsley's license from Grandslam and later the Kenny Dalglish series from Impressions, neither of which realised their full potential.

Arcade conversions of football games aren't seen that often. Activision's Fighting Soccer conversion (nothing to do with the terraces) was a mile off target, simply relying on the large sprites taken from the coin-op to wow the humble software punter into a false sense of security. The gameplay was truly appalling – about as close a simulation to football as schoolyard knockabouts are to the FA Cup final.

Without doubt the king of them all is Kick Off. For a relatively small company like Anco, the game's success must have been like winning

the pools. The small sprites gave the impression of a huge pitch (unlike many games) and the sheer speed had soccer fans eyes popping. Never before had such pace and realism been seen in a football game. The game was deservedly crowned king of ST soccer games and confirmed that playability is what counts. Everything subsequently released has been judged by its standard. If it ain't as good as *Kick Off*, it doesn't stand a chance!

As the World Cup Finals approach it's hardly surprising that

Although stars like Gary Lineker had already endorsed 8-bit releases, Grandslam used Peter Beardsley to start the ball rolling as far as name tie-ins go on the ST. Kenny Dalglish Soccer Manager took a more strategic appproach, but Impressions later followed up with Kenny Dalglish Soccer Match (imaginative, eh?). The former was a fairly competent management game. but Soccer Match was dismal – an overpriced, unplayable attempt at a match day simulation.

Grandslam managed to scoop up the Liverpool licence to lead the race in team licences, and it was a good effort. Manchester United

from Krisalis started off with good intentions, but failed to improve on *LFC's* gameplay. Still, Liverpool fans are hardly likely to buy a Man United game and vice versa. The question is, when are we going to see an Accrington Stanley FC licence?

"Accrington Stanley! Who are they? - Exactly!"

a lot of games are in the pipeline ready to throw down the gauntlet and compete with *Kick Off*. There are, for instance, no less than *four* direct tie-ins with the international competition in Italy!

One of the most notable releases comes from Microprose in the shape of International Soccer Challenge (not to be confused with Microdeal's earlier International Soccer). Steering away from the current trend of manager-oriented games, Microprose have gone for the straight matchplay simulation adding extra realism by giving every player artificial intelligence. This apparently enables each player to develop his own skills and interact with others in a more natural manner. The view is a shifting 3D perspective which gives a good impression of being on the pitch. It all sounds promising, but you'll have to wait for the full review in next month's ST FORMAT to get the full story.

Kick Off 2 is bound to cause a stir when it's released shortly. Retaining all the features that made the original such a success, the sequel boasts abilities such as editing and saving a customised team and recalling them later to use against your friends.

Rather than producing their own football game to tie-in with the World Cup, Entertainment International have put together World Cup



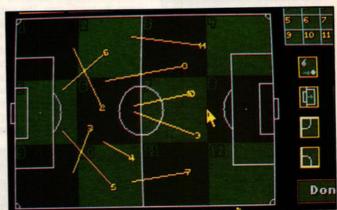

Bursting with menacing monsters and full of enough frustrating obstacles to render a person certifiable, Ghouls 'n' Ghosts was the most prodigious cutesy action game ever. Now that ole devil Mark Higham risks hell and high water to report on an intriguing variation to a winning scenario



here's a certain kind of New Zealand Story have it; and hits game that is just so addictive. It's nothing to do with eye-popping visuals or brilliant sound effects, it's all about that "just one more go" magic, addictive ingredient. Shoot'em-ups the same vein. The only way it such as Xenon II have it; platform games like Rainbow Islands and

like Ghouls 'n' Ghosts, Onslaught and Verminator have proved time and again that horizontal action games have it as well.

Fire and Brimstone is in exactly differs from Ghouls is that the hero isn't planted in the middle of a

smoothly scrolling landscape. Instead, Fire and Brimstone is played as a series of static screens. You start on one side of the screen, battle your way across to the other, and then advance to the start of the next adjacent screen.

Your character in this perilous jaunt is Thor, who must confront

and defeat the Goddess Hel - the personification of all evil. She lies at the end of nine levels of iniquitous creatures who ceaselessly try to turn you to dust.

You begin with two types of weapons, a fireball and a mace. As you progress, other forms of weaponry such as the magic ice ball and the hammer become available. When fired, the ice ball and fireball continue horizontally off the end of the screen, wiping out everything in their path. The other two weapons are projectiles. You can only hold two weapons at once so it makes sense to carry one of each type. Tapping the spacebar toggles between the two weapons currently in your possession. If you pick up a third weapon, you drop the one that's currently active.

You always have two weapons available and these are essential to pass through most levels. You can survive a limited amount of contact

with aliens because you start the game with a high energy rating. This drops as you come into contact with the bad guys until it reaches zero and you lose a life. At the end of a level you confront more daunting enemies who can instantly rob you of a life if you try to pass. Savaging triffids, mutant gravestones and fire-spitting statues are just some of the end-oflevel monsters you need to defeat using a mixture of joystick technique and cunning. Work out the best place to stand and they instantly become vulnerable.

The objective of each level is

PULL OUT A POTION

What makes Fire and Brimstone more of a challenge than other similar games is the addition of magic potions and keys. Without the potions, you'd be hardpressed to get far into the game because some of the menacing monsters just appear too frequently. Potions can be found at strategic points along the way or appear as a reward for overcoming certain creatures. There are four types of potion, denoted by coloured bottles, and these are used to achieve different effects. Blue builds a magic bridge over obstacles such as quicksand, gold enables you to jump higher, white illuminates dark rooms and red fires a bolt of lightning which kills all the awesome creatures on screen



You wait, but the boulder is teetering dangerously on the edge. You're going to be squashed for sure

to locate four parts of a key. Three parts can be found in the screens towards the end of the level but the fourth part is held in a secret room. Unless you can find all four parts you cannot proceed to the next level.

Along the way there are four extra treasures which benefit you: a magic book, a chalice, the Ankh and a watch. These give you powers such as invincibilty, extra lives and even temporary magic powers.

Unfortunately, all the extra bonuses in the land won't do you one iota of good unless you have

the cunning to work out the best places to stand and the most devious routes to take.

FFFFCTS

There is a mythical, ancient aura about Fire and Brimstone which springs from the convincing visuals. Because the game is arranged as a series of screens rather than a scrolling landscape, far more action seems to occur on each screen. For example, alarming fire pits, rolling boulders and a stockpile of minatory monsters abound, and all of these appear before a diverse variety of colourful and lively backdrops. Character sprites are small, but effective and detailed. The only criticism of the graphics is that they look particularly dark on a standard Atari colour monitor.

The sound was written by David Whittaker who composed the haunting music in Populous. This effort isn't as dramatic, but is certainly in keeping with the fairytale atmosphere of the game. Music can be switched off or left to run throughout the levels with additional sound effects blasting out over the top. These effects occur each time you throw a weapon, pick up a potion or use a magic spell.

VERDICT



You decide to fire at the ball, but find passivity pays off. Fire and you die as the ball passes - ignore it and you live

It's easy to get obsessive over this type of cutesy game and Fire and Brimstone certainly has all the ingredients necessary to make it a sure-fire hit. The fact that it isn't a scrolling adventure in the Ghouls 'n' Ghosts vein is actually to its credit. Since no processor time is used handling sophisticated scrolling techniques, far more can be achieved on the static screens. The resulting look of the game is much more electrifying than Ghouls ever was.

Confronted with an evil combination of nefarious enemies and a glut of brain-teasing obstacles, you battle through nine levels of heart-stopping, rabid action to save the world from the Goddess Hel.

Despite the lack of novelty and daring programming skills, these elements are so addictive that you just won't be able to stop yourself returning for abuse over and over again.

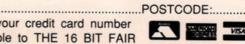

t's tough being at the front. Bullets whistling overhead, shells exploding just feet away and you're still expected to storm the enemy positions. War, as they say, is most definitely hell.

Frontline is a wargame simulation similar to wargames of the board variety. If you've ever played a board based wargame then you'll know just how complicated they can be. Frontline tries to get round this by letting the player get on with playing instead of wasting time messing around with dice, looking up endless cross-referenced tables, and working out horrendously complicated formulas to decide the outcome of every event.

There's a choice of six varied scenarios and you can place yourself in the boots of either British, German, Russian, Japanese or New Zealand troops. The game concentrates on the use of infantry and small artillery in the field. You command army units and must carry out military objectives within specified time limits.

The first decision to make is which side you're on. All the scenarios allow you to take control of either the attacking or defending force. Then allocate leaders and support weapons to each unit. It's important that you allot your leaders carefully because the game puts heavy emphasis on the quality of leadership to keep up troop morale. Make sure that units taking the brunt of the fighting have maximum support. Support weapons cover anything from radios to heavy machine guns. There are generally less good leaders and support weapons than troops, so be careful how you distribute them!

First select your battle scenario...

Cuadalcanal - 1942 For two nights the warines defending what was to become known as 'Bloody Ridge' had fought off determined Japanese attacks. Once everything is distributed, it's time for battle. The game screen is split into three main areas. A scrolling map takes up most of the screen, acting as a window onto the battlefield.

Unfortunately the scroll rate is extremely slow, and it's infuriating moving from one side of the map to the other. An area at the bottom of the screen relays messages and controls movement around the screen. The left-hand side of the screen is occupied by a panel. The information here is changeable, but generally covers the options available to

from your position. The control system is fiddly at first, but you soon get used to it. Two of the scenarios are reserved for training, and introduce you to the game concepts gently. The computer plays so profession-

ally that you're practically guaranteed to lose the first few times you play, though it's definitely easier to defend than attack.

EFFECTS

The game certainly doesn't make the most of the ST's graphic abilities. It emulates the board game style sucessfully, but who wants an ST release to look like a board game? The battle area is represented from an overhead viewpoint with the troops and artillery under your command merely depicted as crude coloured squares.

Sound is mediocre and

restricted to the usual monotonous rat-a-tat-tat of machine guns and the occasional interesting explosion.

VERDICT

Frontline is a wargame simulation far more obsessed with simulation than gameplay. It doesn't attempt to stretch or even make use of the ST's capabilities, relying instead on the trusted board game approach that we've already seen a zillion times in, er... boardgames.

Suffering from formal schizophrenia and content with mediocrity, it's of minor interest to wargame buffs only.

n the beginning, long before Powerdrift, Chase HQ and Stun Runner were awarded their own corner in the Grievous Bodily Arms, in the days when the only noise at the local hostelry was the slurp of beer on lips, the one form of electronic entertainment available to revellers was the pinball machine – a wooden table featuring various electro-mechanical rebound devices and a steel ball

careering this way and that, running up points and providing thrills. In the days when your Mum and Dad went two up on a Vespa and hung around coffee bars, pinball machines were all the rage.

Today we get our kicks from computer generated foe. Not content with the simple klaxon signifying a "tilt," we're blasted with a series of sophisticated silicon screeches that tear the eardrums of anyone not issued with a chestmounted government hearing aid. All this is about to change because French software house Loriciel have just released a pinball simulator that brilliantly mimics the behaviour of those archaic steel balls.

Pinball Magic is a faithful representation of pinball's coloured lights, crazy sounds, and addictive action. Beginning with a relatively straigthforward pin table, you flip frantically to light sequences of lights, score points and progress to further levels. Twelve all-different tables make up the game, but you'll be flapping your flippers for a long time before reaching the final screen.

EFFECTS

Incredibly accurate graphics ensure a pinball table display which is virtually indistinguishable from the real thing. With Buddy Holly on the hi-fi and an espresso on your desktop, you'd swear it was 1959.

Pinball Magic features super colourful graphics and true-to-life spot sounds. Add an authentic rolling ball sound and you've got a game that's as close to being there as, well, being there! And when you tire of the pins, there are fiendishly difficult *Arkanoid*-like screens that are almost impossible to overcome.

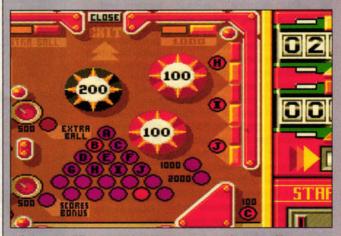
VERDICT

Classic pinball machines are now an endangered species. They don't exist outside a couple of enthusiasts' spare bedrooms. Even if a classic pin table could be found, you'd be filling the thing with pocket money for the privilege of playing. *Pinball Magic* provides you with the closest pinball simulator yet available (it's so close you can almost smell the burning of the electro-mechanical innards).

For a little under twenty quid you can journey back to the halcyon days of the fifties and sixties and have free replays for months to come.

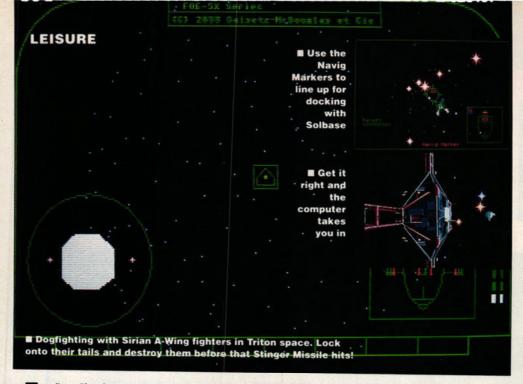

been completed, it's time to put the craft through its paces in real combat situations.

Solbase monitors messages throughout the surrounding galaxies and passes mission orders to the FOE 57 when it's needed. Occasionally the missions are just reconnaissance flights to patrol tricky areas of space, but there are more than a few distress calls from cargo-ships that have come under attack from marauding Sirian forces. Can they be stopped this time?

EFFECTS

If Warhead's appearance were any more polished, the surface shine would blind you. The Heads-Up Displays are very effective, giving the impression of having masses of military hardware at your disposal that's just begging to be used. The 3D visuals use a strange fish-eye lens technique, making it seem as though cameras have been used instead of the slightly dubious window view. The navigation screens are superbly implemented with accurate pitch, yaw and zoom modes used while keeping the planets in proper relation to each other. The presentation is far superior to that normally seen in shoot-'em-ups.

The soundtrack uses surreal sampled sounds to create an incredibly atmospheric theme. Unfortunately, the sound in the rest of the game isn't so hot. The computers ping, the alarms whine and the weapons fizz. Not really super science fiction stuff.

VERDICT

Warhead is an atmospheric and immensely playable space adventure. The plot and feel of the game are very futuristic, perfectly setting the tone for the missions ahead. The battle scenes are superb, packed with action and calling on FOE pilots to stretch their spacehero reflexes to the limit.

Some thought is needed to carry out the science missions successfully, so it's not just blast-blastblast all the way through. If you liked Starglider 2 and Elite, but have begun to find them too limiting, then you'll love Warhead's diverse missions. It's good to see a game at last worthy enough to take over their crown.

infestation

omputer games have been inextricably linked with films ever since software houses discovered the money that movie licences could make. Infestation doesn't draw its name from any popular film, but it's closely based upon the Aliens scenario. Set in space, it tells the haunting story of research station Alpha II which is studying possible life-forms on a nearby planet. After an alien intelligence penetrates Alpha II, strange eggs are discovered, computer systems fail and suddenly all transmissions from the planet cease. Typically, you're the only man who can save the planet, and possibly the universe, from the threat of alien attack.

The game is played through a window showing your view of Alpha Il as a series of 3D polygons. Surrounding the window is a set of icons and control keys. Your main objective is to search for alien eggs and destroy them. You can't achieve this by wandering in with guns ablazing, you have to cunningly trap them inside incubation areas and poison them with cyanide gas. When all the eggs have been obliterated, head for the centre of the complex where the power source is located. Power comes from the centre of the moon and you need to work out how to set it to achieve critical yourself with a pen and paper and plot a map to the game

As you wander through the 3D labyrinth you encounter various features such as lifts, shuttles, radiation areas and blast doors. Shuttles carry you from one place to another at high speeds and blast doors are air-tight doors which cannot be opened once shut. It's features such as this which keep the game entertaining and challenging.

EFFECTS

When 3D visuals are done well they're still something to admire, and like all Psygnosis games, Infestation looks great. The main playing

screen is constructed as a daunting control panel, with an irregularshaped oval window providing your view of the planet. It's within this window you see all the 3D polygons making up the action. As you steer through the 3D universe the graphics scroll very fast, but when there are lots of objects on screen at once this movement tends to become jerky. Colours in the game look grim to start with but liven up as the action proceeds.

Sound effects are unimpressive. There's no atmospheric music to accompany play, instead you have to make do with the occasional spot effect.



This might sound like a straightforward arcade-style shoot-'em-up littered with aliens and eggs for you to search and destroy, but Infestation is really a combination of adventure and action.

In typical adventure style you need to have an extra save game disk and a sheet of paper to map out where you're going so that you don't get lost. This means that the game takes some considerable time to get to grips with, but if you're prepared to invest effort in the challenge, you're going to find it rewarding.

Admittedly it takes time, but tracking down eggs and negotiating ventilation tunnels, radiation areas and blast doors eventually becomes extremely engaging and at times exciting.

If you can tolerate the jerky screen movement and can afford to turn your full-time job into a parttime one, go for it. Otherwise, give the aliens a miss this time.

t's 2062 and the world's population has grown to such an extent that both the economy and ecology of our once green and pleasant planet is seriously under threat. The colonisation of Mars, to

ease the pressure, is progressing too slowly. A rocket-building complex constructed on the moon, capable of building rockets to fly people and resources to the red planet, may be too late to prevent

earth's destruction.

These global concerns are pushed to the back of your mind as your shuttle comes in to land at MoonBase. You've no idea why you've been summoned to the Mars rocket factory: your only instructions are to report for work at clerical office five, and who are you to argue?

On arrival in the ClericDome your first objective is to find your accommodation block before the 10:00 pm curfew takes affect being caught walking the Plastipavement after this hour could get you arrested.

Small but perfectly formed, your accommodation features a

huge Vid-Screen, shower, bed and pet parrot. Pressing the flashing green pad under the Vid-Screen plays a message from Security Guard Thompson who requests a meeting with you in one of the Dome's many parks tomorrow. Perhaps he can shed some light on your being here.

Written using STAC, A Dark Sky Over Paradise is an odd adventure. Even though it's set in the future it has an air of antiquity about it. Moon bases, hovering security cameras, Vid-Screens and Plastipavements all have a whiff of 1930s Flash Gordon.

Messages, people pushing past you as they rush to work and PA announcements of curfews and other goings on (such as the arrest of terrorists) help create an intense atmosphere, but the repetitive location descriptions kill it.

One technical annoyance: although the parser recognises IT, it doesn't acknowledge HIM/HER, so whenever you need to ask something of a character (a regular occurrence) you're required to type their name with every question.

You need a good imagination to get into A Dark Sky Over Paradise. And don't expect too may pretty pictures to help you visualise the MoonBase, there's only two in the whole game.

The true adventurer will find Dark Sky interesting enough, though even the most easily pleased will regret the lack of graphics. In this day and age, it's hardly going to win awards.

INTERACTIVE ZEN

Boss of Interactive Technology Martyn Westwood has been writing games for the last three years. His first release, Dead End, was well received by reviewers but didn't find a distributor. On the back of this frustration, Westwood decided to form his own company to publish adventures.

Interactive Technology has been in existence since March 1989, since which time Westwood has written and released two games for the ST. The first was Dead End, a sleuth adventure in the Philip Marlowe style where you track down the killer of a businessman found floating in the river.

The second is a moon-based futuristic adventure called A Dark Sky Over Paradise (reviewed above). Both were written using Incentive's STAC. IT's next adventure, Weird Tales, is to be released this month and uses Zen, basically an enhanced version of STAC. Westwood explains: "STAC is used as a shell for the Zen system. Zen is made up of a set of routines which utilise the normal STAC operations, but turn it into something comparable to the Infocom system used for Shogun and Zork Zero. Its spec includes intelligent characters, various types of container, surfaces and portals, a map and hint function plus a host of artificial intelligent routines."

Carl Cropley (responsible for the much praised graphics in Hound Of Shadow) was to work on Weird Tales, but until Interactive can secure distribution. Weird Tales remains text only.

The numbers located in the hallways indicate that you meet a guard patrolling the area. Follow the tip correctly and you should have no trouble racing through the castle in record time and emerging unscathed. Good luck!

here must be thousands of ST owners looking for guidance, from novices overawed by high powered silicon to experienced users who want to stretch their highly-tuned technical skills. The problem is where to get good advice. You can either listen to your friends passing on third-hand gossip or try reading Atari's ST Owner's Manual from cover to cover – neither of which is particularly foolproof or fulfilling. Your Second Manual, written by Andeas Ramos, is a comprehensive 170 page textbook solely dedicated to helping you get the most out of your ST.

Divided into 13 sections Y2M has substantial coverage of the whole gamut of ST related activities, beginning with a basic introduction to computers (ie, what they are) and going on to consider everything from the keyboard, the mouse and desk accessories to word processing, the public domain and ST User Groups.

Promoting a philosophy of robust exploration and high-tailed good humour, the manual offers to fill in the gaps left by the official Atari Corporation's ST Owner's Manual: "If the ST Owner's Manual, tells you how to turn on the machine, this one tells you how to use it... This is not a technical manual; my experience is that most users don't need technical material, they need help."

Setting itself up as an alternative owner's manual, Y2M takes great pleasure in telling you all the things the official manual conveniently glossed over. From its unsanctioned perspective it pulls no punches in its criticisms, calling badly designed features exactly what they are ("crap") and teaching you how to live with them, avoid them, or where to buy an alternative.

Just as importantly it strives to make you master of your machine. It cajoles you into exploring, testing, dismantling and generally being unafraid of your ST. "Take a look inside. See what goes on in there. It is a simple process of removing 20 screws. The machine can easily be put together again – they are designed to be put together in the Far East by 14 year old girls."

The manual thoroughly covers the peripheral stories that bring your ST alive. The soap opera history of Atari, corporate wrangles with Commodore, Sam Tramiel's nepotism, the ST's ultraquick development and the absurd personalities behind your favourite computer ("Jack Tramiel is to business what Rambo is to peace").

Vour Second Manual: an amusing variation on the dry techno-prose of other user guides

The ST Owner's Manual is not generally ranked as one of the world's great literary achievements. Now help for technophobes is at hand, as David Collins explains

Apocryphal stories about punching horses in the face and postmen with fishing fetishes abound – some instructive, some genuinely funny, but most of them of the tedious funny ha-ha variety. The problem is that Ramos writes with an insider's jocularity and a cavalier attitude to imparting crucial information to beginners. Though the laughter and chuckles keep the prose zipping along, it hides a serious loss of perspective.

This is not a logical step-by-step guide to the ST, but an irreverent, confusing pot-pourri of advice and tips (great, if you're biggest concern is how to cut up your wet suit to make a mousepad). Divided into disorganized chunks and lacking coherence, the manual continually misplaces emphasis.

The public domain section, for example, begins with a six page definition of the legal terminology of copyright laws, when what you really want to know (what's available and from where) is quickly skimmed over in only four pages. A half page in the word processing section is devoted to a straight-faced recipe for Tennessee Bar-B-Que Sauce (wacky, eh?), but only three pages are put aside for graphics.

The manual assumes readers unfamiliar with technical jargon only need to have the terms defined to progress to the next stage. What technophobes require is not a definition of terminology but a hands-on guided tour of what all these strangely named grommits actually do and how you can benefit by using them.

The step-by-step "how to use" sections are posited within each chapter as mere hasty asides and alternative curios, when they should in fact be the basic central tenet of explaining a difficult proposition to a beginner terrified of RAM disks and BIOS functions.

This manual may make your ST more interesting, it may give you some idea how the ST works and the kind of tricks you need to maximise its potential, but it's not a hands-on users guide. ■

f you've been following our Cyber tutorials you'll know the creative potential of each component in the Cyber series (available from Electric Distribution **±** 0480 496666). Cybermate is an animation language enabling you to manipulate and combine Delta Animation (.DLT) files created with CAD or Cyberpaint. The latest version of Cyberpaint has many of the modifications previously only available inCybermate. There are, however, still features unique to Cybermate – such as sound.

A storyboard is always a good starting point if you want to produce a professional looking animation. Good organisation at this stage can prevent you having to fudge things later on. A storyboard helps you break down the whole story into individual scenes. These can be animated separately and then merged by the Cybermate code to form the finished piece.

Unlike the Cyber Control language, which is based on BASIC, Cybermate is both written in, and based on, the FORTH programming language. You don't need to know how to program in FORTH to use Cybermate, but those who do could add their own commands and features.

Data is always accessed as an "object" in FORTH. When a block of data – such as a picture – is loaded, a name for that data is defined. When you want to use/change that picture you refer to the name that you gave it. When the basic picture data is loaded and the name is defined, variables are also defined. These include parameters, which are dependent on what type of data you're using. Four data types are recognized in *Cybermate*:

Sound: G.I.S.T. format sound data; Image: pictures in PI1 Degas format;

Sequence: animation in Delta – DLT format;

Seq-loop: animation in Delta – loaded as a looped sequence.

The difference between a looped sequence and the standard type is that while a standard sequence can only be run from the start to the end frame, a looped sequence can run either forwards or backwards and can be started at any frame. These advantages are gained at the expense of memory.

Timing is crucial to any good animation. To enable precision control over time, *Cybermate* gives you *Cybertime*. The units of measuring are "ticks" which are approximately a 1/60th of a second. I say "approximately" because the length of a tick varies according to the complexity of the task you set your ST to do. So what use is a variable time measurement? The purpose of ticks is to synchronize events within an animation. Even if 20 frames of animation takes longer to display than the set number of ticks per frame defined, the sound that you wanted to hear of frame 20 can still be coordinated.

To manipulate the data in Cybermate, various words and commands are employed. These can be broken down into five types:

■ Defining: opens a data file and determines what type of data it is. There are four data types so four defining words; SOUND, IMAGE, SEQUENCE SEQ-LOOP. They are used like this; IMAGE HELLO

This loads the picture file HELLO.PI1

■ Objectname: this is the name given to the object in *Cybermate*. In the above example the OBJECTNAME is HELLO

Operator: all objects can be controlled and have parameters. The OPERATORs are the means to change the parameters and affect the objects. An example: 10 BEEP VOLUME sets the VOLUME to 10 for the sound BEEP Set to 10 for the sound BEEP

■ System: these commands effect the Cybermate environment, timing and display modes. An example: STEREO ON

puts the system into stereo

■ Procedure: is a program module defined as a COMMAND. You may, as in FORTH, make up your own commands. These usually consist of commands, functions, data and operators. This is the form they take:

: EFFECT1 10 BANG VOLUME BANG PLAY; Here a procedure EFFECT1 is defined, and when called, it sets the volume on a sound file called BANG to 10 and plays that sound.

To work with Cybermate I needed a small piece of Delta Animation. I used a 20 frame digitized scene from *The Running Man* which I'd produced for the opening sequence of the game. The frames had all been shrunk in *Cyberpaint* to save space, making the animation area a quarter size screen. This was convenient for *Cybermate* experimentation.

When you run *Cybermate*, the screen clears, a prompt appears – and nothing else. Don't panic! *Cybermate* is an experimental language and isn't as sophisticated as other coding you may have used. Enter the interactive mode. From here you can do the following:

Load files from Disk; Open new Cybercode files; Save your own Cybermate progs;

Change object parameters and variable; Enter Cybercode.

You can also test ideas – most of the commands in Cybermate can be typed in directly in the interactive mode. Their are also three other modes:

 Text Editor: create, edit and save Cybercode
 Preview Editor: see animation at different speeds, step through a frame at a time and monitor the colour palette

Display: see your animation and check the final results

If you've created all the data before entering Cybermate you should not have to leave this environment to test the production.

I devised two simple routines to show off my animation – I typed these in on two separate screens.

Here's the code:

: TV

After entering the code I compiled each screen with n LOAD. Where n was the screen number.

The program showed my quarter screen animation in each corner successively. When I first ran it offset, three animations did not look right. This was because they expected a start image that was in the top left corner to be in all four positions. I used *Cyberpaint* to fix the start PI1 and the resulting animation was fine.

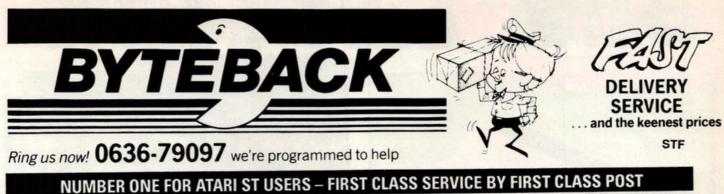
The procedure to get this far is pretty complicated. The TV routine has to be compiled first because it's referred to in the SETV code and the animation has to be loaded with the SEQUENCE command. Once all these requirements are satisfied both SETV and TV become new commands in the FORTH language. If the SETV command is entered at the prompt, the animation is displayed.

This is an involved process and I had some problems getting what looked like good code to run, but as with all the other examples in this series, if you persist long enough things eventually click into place.

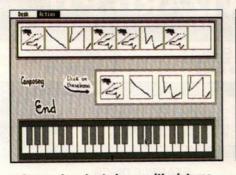

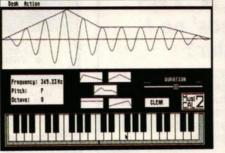

usiCAL is a set of five specially designed beginners' programs that start at a gentle pace and aim to teach novices to be able to listen to, compose, and eventually perform, music of a high calibre. CAL standing for Computer Assisted Learning.

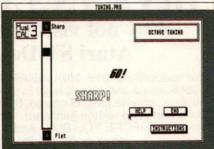
Full documentation accompanies the dongle-protected software. Not only are there comprehensive instructions for the teacher, but each chapter is organised as a lesson and there's a separate worksheet for each of the five modules. It even suggests music you should listen to, complete with descriptions of the piece and its composer.

Each lesson is broken down into sections with icons in the margin to indicate the type of activity; individual or group, information or listening. The documentation is far superior to anything one would expect for music software and comes complete with blank worksheets and progress forms.

Unit One is a simple composing program that uses an external MIDI keyboard. The idea is that you make up little short patterns of music in four on-screen boxes. These can be as short or as long as you like. You then draw a shape in each box to give it graphic representation. Across the top of the screen a set of blank boxes are provided so you can copy the graphic boxes in whatever order you like. You can record, either from the instrument or the three

octave keyboard on screen, and play back.

The text puzzlingly refers to "sounds" rather than small music patterns. I tried different sounds, but the software doesn't recognise program changes. Apart from these slight irritations, the concept is excellent.

Unit Two uses the internal voices instead of MIDI and is an excellent way of showing the physical shape of sounds and soundwaves. You have five preset sound shapes which you can

SHOWTIME IN FRANKFURT

Music education is a rapidly expanding field and the Frankfurt Music Fair was showing off the best of the exciting new packages.

■ Several French and German software houses have released complete ST music education systems that teach not only how to play an instrument, but also how to play in different styles. The best French system is called *Live* and the top German package is *Midipack*. Both teaching systems are built around excellent sequencers and both have libraries of songs and styles and include material by Janet Jackson and Phil Collins. Sad to say, these systems are not available in the UK yet.

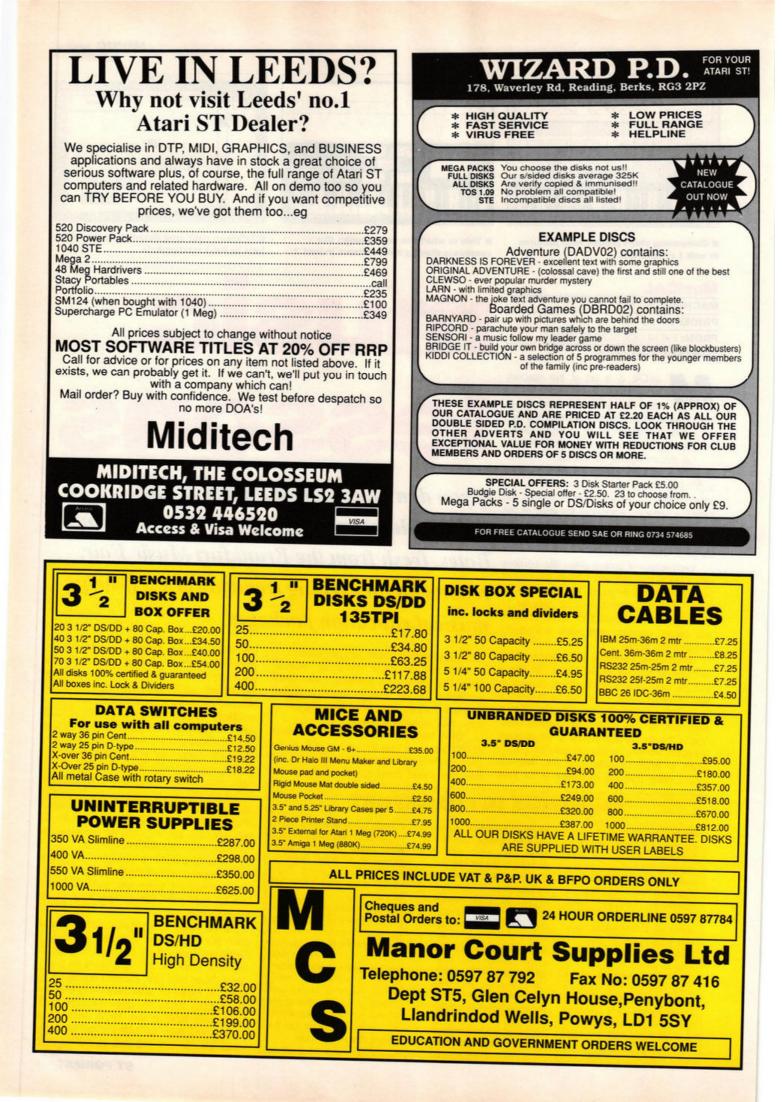
■ C-Lab, ± 0462 480000, have a reputation for producing expensive state-of-the-art software, so it's surprising that they're launching two software packages under the umbrella of an education system, the cheapest of which retails at a mere £40. This is a "teach yourself" MIDI package called *Midia* which has an extremely graphic screen with moving icons and a piano keyboard. The keyboard reacts to any MIDI files played through it and acts as a basic sequencer. It explains the nuts and bolts of the data generated and would certainly help students using MIDI systems as part of GCSE

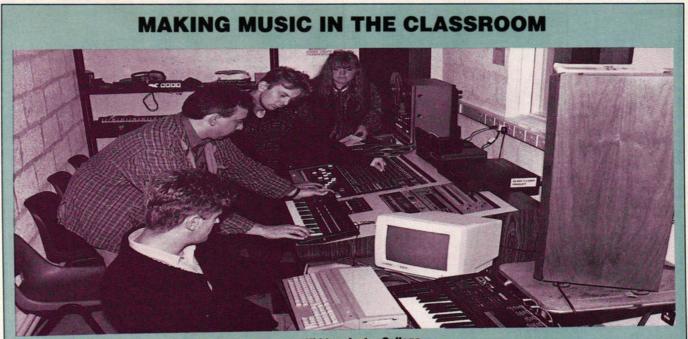
music. ■ C-Lab's Aura costs £70 and plays games of increasing complexity to teach you to copy rhythms, notes and also to recognise patterns and pitches when they're written down. It works on many levels, teaching scales and chords, and covers five or six grades of music education. All patterns created can be loaded into a sequencer. use. When a note is played, it sounds, and the waveform frequency fills in the sound shape. You get a display of the number of frequencies per second and also the pitch and octave when you play the note on the lower screen keyboard.

Unit Three doesn't use external MIDI either. This section tests your ear by giving you notes and asking you to tune another note to it. There are varying degrees of difficulty with or without on-screen help. The note is altered by a large slider, but you don't hear the note change as you adjust it. You have to click on the up and down arrows in order to hear the note change pitch as you move it. There are examples to help you if you get stuck and the program only continues if you tune the note correctly.

The documentation is very good here, but a few refinements to the software such as the previously mentioned slider, and perhaps a time limit on finding the correct note would spice things up a bit.

Unit Four is a simple composing program that uses what is technically known as a Pentatonic scale – that's five notes arranged in the same order as the black notes on a keyboard. These have been chosen because it's far harder to create an aural monstrosity with this set of notes. You're also restricted to two note values, one beat or two. Using conventional notation you enter the notes in the bars provided. You can load and save your efforts and





Musical education with the ST and C-Lab's Creator at Kidderminster College

I am a lecturer in Music and Music Technology at Kidderminster **College in North Worcestershire** and have recently noticed an increase in the number of music education packages for the ST.

The decision concerning whether a school or college has STs in music classes is usually made at county level - either by the area music advisor or the information technology teaching advisor.

The problem with most schools is that they have a stock of aging BBCs. There's little provision for changing or upgrading them and the music software for the BBC is now very, very ancient.

Some schools have computer called a Nimbus which is a PC compatible, but not a lot of good for music. Many authorities are computer shy and know even less about the music aspect of the ST. One advisor told me that although he would willingly push the ST and its software into any school, the official line was to promote BBCs as the county had invested so much money in them

in the past. At Kidderminster College the ST is used primarily for sequencing. Students taking either GCSE Music, our unique 'A' level in Music Technology or BTEC Audio Visual Commun-ications get lectures and hands-on instruction about using the software and the techniques of recording and mixing sounds. The major software is Creator and each student comes armed with a floppy or two for their song files. Creator is not an entrylevel program, but I can't think of any real problems that have occurred while teaching students how to use it.

The ST and Microdeal's Replay Pro are used to explain sampling. DX Droid and CZ Android, both Hybrid Arts voicing programs, are used to explain the concept of sound synthesis. It's a lot easier to display wave forms and sound shapes on screen, so you can simultaneously see and hear the changes, than any other way I can think of.

Since the ST has the widest range of up-to-date software available at a reasonable price, it's the most obvious choice for musical education. Unlike the PC there are no problems with add-on interfaces, some of which are not compatible with other music software.

> also print them out so they can be played from the ST. You're restricted to 4, 8 or 16 bars and 3 or 4 beats in a bar. Although you're instructed to connect a MIDI instrument to the ST, the unit uses the internal voices as well. All composi-

tions can be uploaded into any sequencer that accepts the universal MIDI file format.

Unit Five involves percussion only. You write in drum patterns using three lines of music - one for each instrument. Note values are dragged from the menu at the top of the screen and placed in the staves. To play them back you have to transfer them to the full score

Putting a drum pattern together in unit 5 of MusiCAL. The top three staves are the separate drums and the bottom stave is them all together stave at the bottom of the screen.

Your finished work can be printed out and the text gives helpful ideas on how several pupils could play the rhythm away from the ST. I would have like this information presented the other way round. That is, rhythms could be played on the instrument and the result displayed.

There are drum maps in the software for most common single keyboards and drum

machines, because there's no agreed standard on which note plays the snare drum, which note plays the bass drum and so on. If your instrument is not featured then you have to work it out and enter it on a MIDI window. For some daft

reason the drum maps have the same file suffix as the drum patterns themselves.

MusiCAL is a very well thought out package, particularly the accompanying text. It would have been an advantage to make all the units work without the aid of MIDI instruments, something that is not too hard to do, because it would free up

one more MIDI instrument for the classroom if necessary. There's no doubt that at this price it's a bargain and it could even suit mature pupils who wanted to start on a computer assisted music primer course.

Completing our desktop publishing series in party mood, Simon Williams takes a look at the more unusual applications of DTP

he techniques described in the last three tutorials are all you need to design and print a wide variety of different documents. They can range from a humble business card right through to a complete novel. The way of making up the page is fundamentally the same.

One aspect of layout that we haven't covered is multiple items on a single page. The idea is to produce a single design and duplicate it several times before printing. This technique is ideal for tickets, invitations, compliment slips and a host of other documents. Once printed, you need a guillotine to cut the individual items out of each sheet.

If you're using a laser printer, which is essential for serious work, you can pass thin card through the machine as well as paper. This must be done using a straight-through paper path. In other words, the paper has to pass straight through the printer without making a Uturn to be fed out on top, face down. Different printers can handle different weights of card and you must be sure not to exceed the maximum weight, or you risk jamming the machine and possibly inflicting internal damage to its engine. The HP LaserJet series can handle paper up to 135 gm/sq m, which is suitable for business cards and the like.

The techniques covered in this series are really the basis of a whole area of computing which extends into computer art and digital scanning techniques on the one hand and typography on the other. I hope you're tempted to have a go; the satisfaction of producing your own brochure or booklet is quite intoxicating.

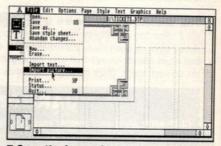
Two sample documents are included this month, both using multiple image techniques to produce several items on a single sheet of paper. The first is a set of six tickets to the opening of a new nightclub. The layout is extremely simple.

Start by opening a frame of roughly the right size on a blank page. Turn "clip to guides" off for this and all other work this month. It can be a useful facility, but in many cases it just gets in the way. The size of any frame can be adjusted using the Size and Position window. This can be called up in *Timeworks* by doubleclicking on the frame in question.

The page is going to have six tickets on the A4 sheet, so you might think you could divide the dimensions of the page in two horizontally and in three vertically. It's not quite as simple as

that, because the printer driver enforces a margin of around half a centimetre on either side of the page and 1cm top and bottom. Take these dimensions off the size of an A4 sheet and then divide up the page to get the required dimensions of a single frame.

You can save a lot of time and effort in your designs by investing in a library of clip-art. Clipart frames and corners are widely available and can be imported and rescaled in one go to fill a given page frame. This example uses a clip provided by HD Designs. They specialise in clips for two well-known PC products, but they can be converted to IMG format using other software. Similar clips could be used directly.

Once the frame has been imported, it can be copied another five times. This is done by selecting it, clicking on Copy and then on Paste from the Edit menu. A duplicate of the frame, with its contents, is placed slightly offset from the original and may be dragged into place by eye, or using the Size and Position window.

A text frame is then opened within the graphic frame. To make sure the text fills the frame of the ticket, you need to switch the text frame's tint to "clear" from the Options menu. The graphic frame design can then show through the corners of the overlaying text frame.

It's easier to adapt styles provided with *Timeworks* than create new ones. On a ticket you can make the style jazzy by using lots of typefaces. Three different faces are used here, but still look acceptable together.

Once the text has been typed in, the text frame can be duplicated as the graphics frame was earlier. It would be a great advantage to be able to group frames in *Timeworks*, as is possible in most other ST DTPs. Grouping enables >

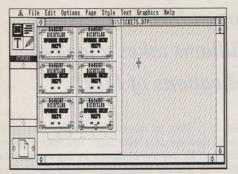

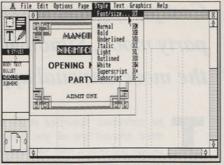

each slip and all must be offset by hand, so the lack of a group function makes hard work of it.

The illuminated letters on the slip are imported clip-art and are scaled to different sizes to show that you can use similar graphics at a variety of sizes for effect. The dividing lines between each slip are produced as a frame with only the top edge printing. This is a useful technique for all sorts of rules, as it saves all the hassles of creating frames before using *Timeworks*' own line drawing facilities. ■

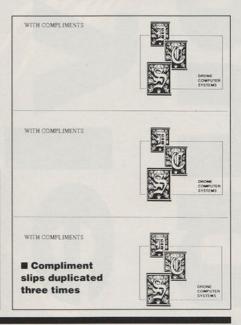

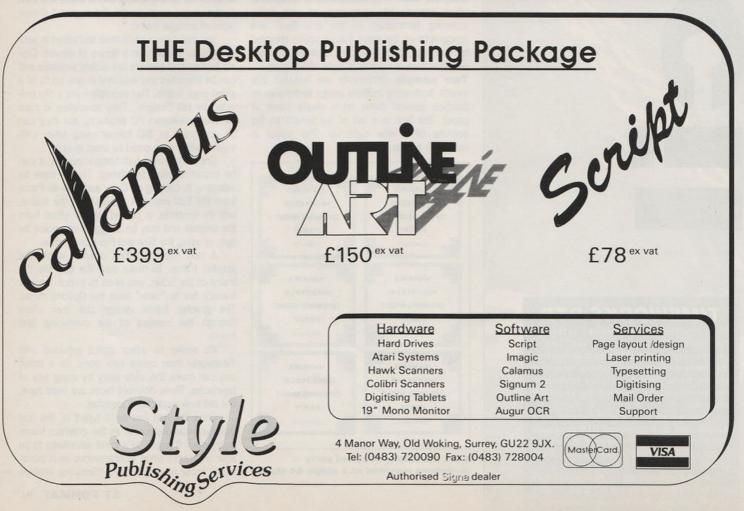

You don't need to spend a fortune to pick up interesting software. Richard Monteiro avoids black holes and plays international soccer, all for the price of a disk, in the public domain

INTERNATIONAL SOCCER MANAGER Advent Software AD060

With a plethora of football games – Player Manager, Football Manager II, Liverpool FC, Liverpool, Italia 1990, Italy '90, Emlyn Hughes International Soccer, Kick Off II, Manchester United, Subuteo '90, World Soccer and Footballer of the Year II – set to kick off on an ST screen near you, you're doubtless in a quandary over which to blow the whistle on.

The best advice is to dribble past the lot of them and have a shot at *International Soccer Manager*. For little more than the price of a disk you could be playing in the World Cup Finals.

The idea of International Soccer Manager is to manage the English team and prepare them for the World Cup. You pick your team from top first division clubs, train them thoroughly and take on international opposition. Just getting through to the first round is difficult enough because you have to score 12 points in only four matches.

Vou need a solid strategy to become an international soccer manager

As far as strategy goes *ISM* is fine, but it falls down terribly when you get to match highlights – all you're shown is a picture of the goal area and a counter which ticks away the minutes. If a goal is scored, you see the culprit's name. Considering the game is written in STOS, it should have been easy to include animated graphics. $\star\star\star$

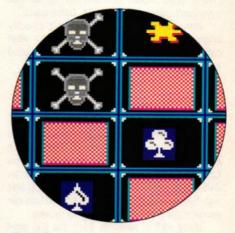
TRAX Advent Software AD061

After all the excitement surrounding the launch of *Talespin*, Microdeal's graphic adventure authoring system, nothing of any consequence seems to have been written using the package. Until now, that is.

While a trivia game is hardly the sort of thing you'd expect to be produced using *Talespin*, Mike Ireland has put together a very convincing number called *Trax*. There are 12 levels to play through, and two types of level: questions and *Trax* bingo.

Question levels are set on a four by four grid. Behind each square on the grid is a symbol which is revealed if you answer the question associated with that square correctly.





Get four matching symbols in Trax and you're through to the next level

Get the answer wrong and, after a high-pitched wail, a skull and crossbones replaces the symbol. One square simply reveals the symbol on contact. To complete a level you must find four matching symbols – fail and the game ends.

Trax bingo has 15 bingo cards and each card has a question linked to it. If you answer correctly the card is placed in the grid. Progression to the next level is accomplished by completing a row of four bingo cards.

For Sun readers there's a page three level; answer all the questions correctly and you see a young lady wearing a smile.

Trax is a fun trivia game guaranteed to provide you with a challenge. It's certainly as good as many commercial games of this type. Sadly the questions on each level don't change, so by a process of elimination you'll eventually be able to get through to the end. $\star\star\star\star$

THE BLACK HOLE Beimar PD

This seems to be the month for games written with utilities; The Black Hole is written using Palace's Shoot-'em-up Construction Kit (SEUCK).

The Black Hole is a three-level vertically scrolling shoot-'em-up in which you have to blast everything that moves, and almost everything that doesn't. Hordes of alien craft travel towards you with lasers firing. You respond in a similar manner and attempt to do unto them before they do unto you. The game >

gets its name from the black holes that occasionally drift down the screen. Black holes don't destroy you, but they do destroy your bullets. Unfortunately missiles fired by the bad guys don't suffer the same fate. Damn unjust.

Although The Black Hole isn't exactly original, it does give a fair indication of what can be done with Palace's SEUCK and is good for a blast. $\star\star\star$

AVS

The Other PD Library

We're only a few months into 1990 and "multimedia" has already made a strong bid for "The Most Over Used Expression Of The Decade Award." Audio Video Sequencer (AVS) lets you combine sound and music in a rolling demo. AVS allows you to link together Cyber .SEQ files with Replay 4 digitised samples so that you can produce your own demos and mini movies.

Using AVS is simplicity itself, but you need Cyber and Replay 4 to exploit the system to its full potential. Of course, you could just take samples and sequences from other sources and put them together with AVS, but it's better to be able to do it all from scratch. You also need at least a megabyte of memory.

AVS comes complete with its own example movie featuring a (ahem) promising band. If you have the two required programs, AVS is well worth getting hold of. *******

TYPIT Softville PD WP55

Hands up all two-finger typists. If you have problems typing quickly or can never remember where a key lies on the keyboard, *Typit* is just what the doctored ordered.

You must have heard of *Protext* by now; it's used by most of us on *ST FORMAT* to produce copy for the magazine and, if Arnor are to be believed, is the bestselling word processor for the ST.

Arnor have now released a working demo of the program into the public domain. The demo version is restricted to a maximum document size of only 2K – approximately 300 words – and lacks spell checker and most of the printer drivers.

Printer drivers for the more common printers – Epson compatibles, for example – are included. There's also a rolling demo of the program which shows off what can be done with Protext.

The Protext demo comes on a double-sided disk drive. It's a great word processor, but be sensible and check it out before parting with your money. $\star\star\star$

here's an old adage that in this country we don't have a climate - we just have weather. But these days it seems we've progressed to the point where we only have freak weather - hurricanes, floods, droughts, even the odd typhoon. It would appear that even the experts don't have a clue what to expect next. Of course, it all gives a new lease of life to the favourite British conversation, but if you depend on up-to-date analysis of the elements then you need something more than the four hour old TV and radio reports. Farmers, seafarers, building managers, civil engineers and mountain rescue teams all require up to the minute data. There's also legions of amateur meteorologists for whom the weather forecast is an obession rather than a necessity. Whatever the need, downloading your own weather forecasts is now an affordable possibility with long-time communications specialists ICS's geostationary weather satellite receiver the MET-2. For £690 you can now pick up live images on your ST's monitor.

While nearly £700 might sound a tad expensive, ICS claim a comparable system would knock you back £5,000. The kit consists

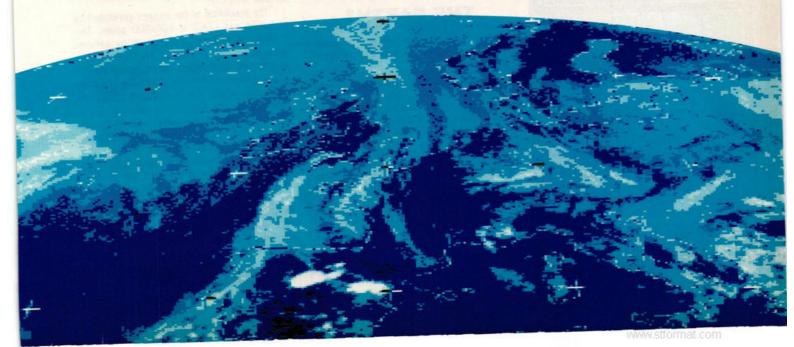

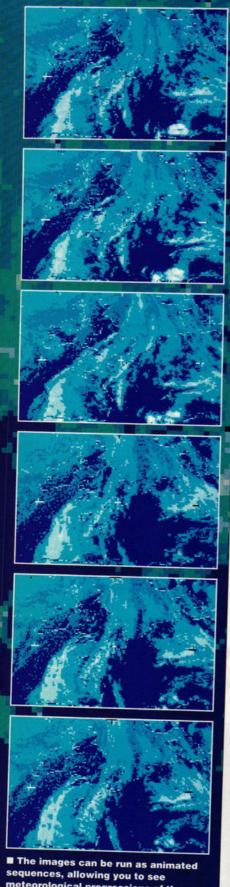
In Europe and Africa images are taken from the Meteosat satellite positioned some 23,000 miles above the Greenwich meridian and the equator. The satellite is in geostationary orbit where it monitors the same view of the globe twenty-four hours a day. It's also possible to download pics from the US GOES satellite serving the American continent. These are the main two satellites, but you can also try your luck at two Russian ones and the NOAA satellite orbiting at only 450 miles, which takes 100 minutes to complete an orbit and passes the UK three times a day.

A ZOOM WITH A VIEW

The first fully operational weather satellite TIROS, standing for Television and InfraRed Observation Satellite, was launched in 1963 and superceded earlier attempts with low-orbiting satellites jettisoning film from conventional cameras down to Earth!

Believe it or not, picture transmission has remained the same ever since then. You could download TIROS images even today. Satellites have two types of sensors on board – visible light and infrared sensors. The former, though perfect for natural photography, are only really useful during summer as they're entirely dependent on reflected sunlight. Infrared images are better because they look at emitted heat values and give good pictured regardless of daylight conditions. Clouds are high up and cold and therefore appear as white, while the land being hotter apears as grey or black. If you animate a 24 hour sequence you can therefore see the heating and cooling of areas of the Earth's surface. By looking at cloud cover and knowing the wind direction, accurate predictions can be made.

An animated sequence of half hour weather pictures enables you to interpret the speeds and times of arrival of weather systems much more accurately than TV and radio forecasts. This is because you can look out into the Atlantic where our weather comes from and by viewing several frames gauge the nature and timing of its impending arrival.

➤ The antenna used to collect the images needs to be mounted on the side of a building and pointed in the rough direction and elevation of the satellite you wish to access. A coaxial cable links the mast to the receiver to enable fine tuning and a lead connects this to the ST's parallel port. Since the downloads are infrared images appearing as mono, it's best to view the material in grey scale resolution. For this purpose, ICS supply an optional converter sitting between your ST and monitor which strips out colour signal information and relays the results as grey scales for live display. However, since

NEED IT COST THE EARTH?

If you're after your own shots from space then there's two ways you can go about getting them:

1. Buy a Maplins Parts Catalogue from your local newsagents which contains information on building your own satellite receiver/decoder for use with your micro. For around £160 you can receive weather photographs from various orbital and geostationary satellites.

2. Alternatively, if you have a modem, you can join Microlink (\pm 0527 64295) and download images from its Weatherlink service for £7 a month. This standard fee enables you to access all Microlink's other Telesoftware services at local call charge rates. All micros are catered for and images are reported to be of a very high quality.

it's possible to save the download images as Neochrome files, you can recolour the images and assign RGB values to different areas of the image to highlight particular features.

The supplied software is dead easy to use. There's GETPIC.PRG which reads in the transmitted pictures to screen and DISPLAY.PRG which enables you to look at previously recorded "archive" pictures.

GETPIC can also be configured to run in "framestore mode" so that continous updates of satellite images can be displayed on screen and saved to RAM Disk for later replay as animated sequences. For this reason it's best to use *MET-2* with a 1040ST since 32K files eat up RAM in no time.

The resolution of the images generated by Meteosat and GOES is 800x800 pixels. This consists of information picked up by infra-red sensors looking at emitted heat values. The images are transmitted to an earth station, either at Darmstadt in West Germany or Lanion in France, where they are processed and rebroadcast to the satellite for dissemination to anyone with the equipment to capture the signal. At the earth station, the processing involved adds coastal outlines to the map.

The pictures are composed of 2,500 lines, which are broadcast at a rate of two or four a second; thus it takes nearly four minutes for a complete image to be read on to your monitor. Depending on the machine you're using, you can animate the various images – if you have 4MByte of RAM it's possible to store up to 64 frames of data while with a more down-to-earth system offering 640K you can store eight frames or four hours of weather data. ■

Running a small firm can be a taxing business, but welcome help is at hand. Bob Cowan looks at a program that offers instant information

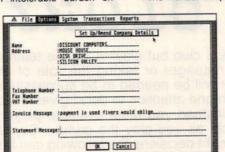

here's a lot to think about if you're running a small business. You have to process the orders, dispatch the goods, keep a check on your stock levels, invoice the customers and balance the accounts. No wonder people who run such businesses either spend all hours of the day carrying out administrative tasks, or buy an expensive software suite to do it for them. Both these options put an intolerable burden on

businesses, small but now a new way through the paperwork jungle is available in the shape of System 3, from Digita International.

System 3 takes care of most of the day-to-day tasks of any business. It produces impressive looking invoices to bill the customer, and items of stock

detailed on the invoice are automatically deducted from the stock list.

The package enables you to enter credits and debits for cash and bank accounts, and produce financial reports. These operations integrate with the Invoicing module, so that just one entry of data interacts with all the other operations of the program.

System 3 consists of three separate programs and comes on just one single-sided disk. The programs are the Stock Control module, the Sales Invoicing module, and the Cashflow Controller module. A well-produced, 42 page, A5 size manual is supplied, and the whole lot is

Having entered all the various items that your business sells, you can print out a bewildering array of reports - all without further work

packaged in a smart plastic case.

The first thing the manual instructs you to do is to make a working copy of the program by backing up the master disk. No problem here because there's no copy protection. You also need to format two new disks ready for use in holding the data to be generated.

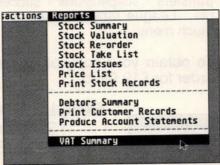
To get up and running, double-click the Drive A icon which opens up a window displaying the contents of the disk. Selecting either INVS-TOCK.PRG or CASHFLOW.PRG quickly loads and presents you with a blank desktop with a number of Main Menu options along the top of the screen. The whole package runs entirely under familiar GEM control, making it very easy to learn and use.

The manual adopts a tutorial approach and

if you go through it with the program running, it guides you through the steps of setting up an example system which illustrates all the features of the programs. The process is short, and it's easy to set up the dummy example or a real one designed for use with your own business. System 3 enables you

to define a stock list of 999 items. Each item is

given a part number, a description and a price. When including a stock item on an invoice, all you have to do is enter the part number and all the other details you've defined are automatically filled in, ensuring accuracy and saving loads of typing!

SBA EXTRA: £99.95

Small Business Accounts Extra is twice the price of System 3, allows more customer accounts than System 3, but does not include the stock control facilities. Equinox Business System Ltd = 071 729 0990.

PERSONAL FINANCE MANAGER: £29.95 Handles all your personal financial transactions. Michtron = 0726 68020.

Similarly, you can set up 99 Customer Accounts. If you assign each client a reference number and include details of their name, address, phone and credit limit, these automatically appear whenever you punch in their ref.no. However, any company with 999 different items on their price list is very likely to have more than 99 account customers. This is the only real weakness of the program. If Digita improve on this, they have an unbeatable product on their hands

Space does not permit a full run-down of the very impressive financial management reports that System 3 produces for you by analysing the data you've input. Suffice to say you get a lot out without putting much in, and you don't even have to understand a lot about what you're doing because the program is so capable. The manual is well written, easy to follow, and assumes no knowledge on the part of the user.

The only addition you need is a printer. System 3 is set up for an Epson compatible machine, but can be configured for any other type from within the program. And you'll be needing to get yourself a Small Business!

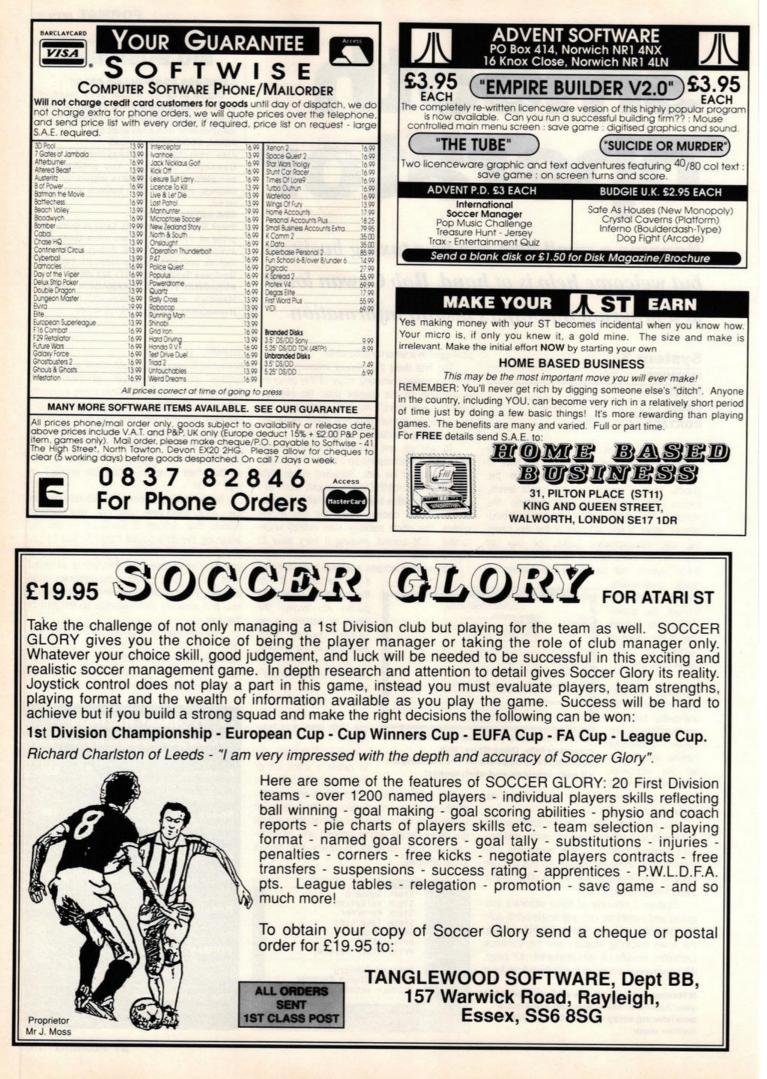

Master of ceremonies

If you own a copy of Mastersound you may be finding it difficult to play samples within your own software. The process is not particularly well explained. Now **Stephen Long** from Swindon has come up with the code required to play samples within STOS.

To initialise STOS ready to play the sample:

INIT=start(7)+28 SPEED=INIT+4 REPLAY=INIT+8 REPLAY=INIT+12 SYNC=INIT+16 HALT=INIT+20 Call INIT

Now to set up each sample:

SAMPLESTART=start(*BANK*)+12+ *BEGINNING* AREG(0)=SAMPLESTART DREG(0)=*SPEED* call SPEED AREG(1)=*SIZE* DREG(0)=*LOOP* call REPLAY

Substitute numbers in as follows:

BANK	1-15. Memory bank
	containing sample
BEGINNING	Bytes from beginning of
	bank to provide start of required section
SPEED	1-4. Speed of replay
SIZE	Length of sample (in bytes)
L00P	0 = loop off, 1 = loop on

You still need STOSPLAY.PRG from the Mastersound disk to be held in memory bank 7 for these routines to work. Have a subroutine such as this for each sample and use a GOSUB command to call the sound you want to use.

Leaving the 8-bits behind

Many ST owners have upgraded into the heady land of 16-bits from 8-bit micros. **Erick Shammas** from Surrey previously owned an Atari 600XL and wants to load his 8-bit software onto the ST.

The first problem is finding some way of transferring the programs from one machine to another. The ST cannot read cassette tapes and the XL has a non-standard RS232 port so data cannot be sent straight across. However, Page 6 sell the Atari Talk serial lead for £19.95 and this is the answer to all your troubles. Using some communications software (such as Uniterm on the ST and BOBTERM on the XL), you can download all your software from one machine to the other using the lead.

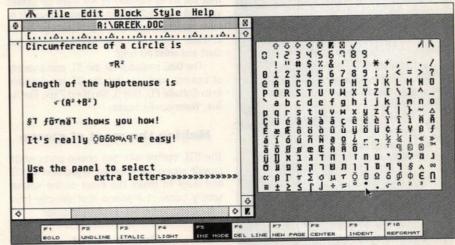
First words in Greek

Alan Brand from Fife is rapidly losing his hair over a 1st Word foible. He wants to know if there's any way of accessing the Greek character set to allow him to print out mathematical formulas and the like. The answer is relatively simple, but not immediately obvious. All you need to do is to scale down the document window using the resize box in the bottom right-hand corner and underneath you find a large rectangle containing all kinds of heiroglyphics. If you make sure that the block cursor is still visible in your resized window, you EPSON.HEX driver (using 1st Word) and then using INSTALL.PRG to create the 1STPRNT.DOT file which 1st Word needs on the root directory. You may need to move it there yourself, and then get rid of the old one.

If this is not something you feel you can handle, panic not, for there are several PD disks available containing 1st Word (and 1st Word Plus) printer drivers for all the Star range of printers, as well as many others. Where from? Those amazing guys at the ST Club, 49 Stoney St, Nottingham, NG1 1LX have everything you need on disks numbered PTR01 to PTR08.

Split Personality

Occasionally a game appears with options for four players to play at once. Gauntlet II from US Gold and Microdeal's ST Soccer both featured this option, but to make use of it you need a

can use the mouse cursor to click on the Greek character of your choice. Lo and behold, it then takes its place amongst the normal scribblings in your document.

The program still allows input from the keyboard in the normal way, so you can add all those plus and minus signs while clicking on mu, lambda, theta and all those other algebraic letters most of us forgot at school.

Alan is using a STAR LC 24-10 printer, and he'll need a compatible printer driver to get these Greek characters printed out. This can either be done by modifying the standard special lead. Although Microdeal \pm 0726 68020 sell the lead for £4.99, **David Jones** from Dulverton would like to know how he can construct his own.

The lead connects to the parallel printer port and provides two external ports for the joysticks to plug into. Since dedicated software must be written to read data from the printer port, the leads are rarely used. Refer to your ST manual for the pinout diagram of the printer port. One joystick connector links to pins 1-5 and pin 19. The second joystick links to pins 6-9 and 11.

TECHNICAL advice

If you want to have two joysticks connected to your ST and be able to switch between the second one and the mouse at any time, Practical Solutions sell the Mouse Master which does just the trick. It's a small box with two leads coming out of the end. Each lead plugs into the mouse and joystick port on your ST. Three sockets are provided in the box for you to plug in your mouse and two joysticks. A switch on the top of the box then enables you to switch between using the mouse or the joystick.

TERMINAL DOSSING

AJ Hodges from Faversham has a problem using the VT52 Emulator functions with assembly language and wants to know how to access them via the operating system. GEMDOS contains a function called CONWS (meaning CONsole Write String), and this should enable you to send those VT52 Escape sequences without too much effort. The technique is to store the location of the sequence on the stack and then call CONWS. Any length string can be used, provided that the last byte in the sequence is zero.

In the case of the ESC Y command (used to position the cursor at any given location on the screen), the string must contain the following information: the ASCII code for ESC (27); the ASCII for Y (89); the line number you want the cursor to appear on (top line is zero) PLUS 32; the column number (left-hand column is zero) PLUS 32; and finally 0 to terminate the string. The string format needs to be altered slightly for other VT52 commands.

To make all this work from assembly language, use the following listing as a guide. In this example we want the cursor to move to line 10, column 20.

col equ 20 The desired column line equ 10 The desired line

move.I #text, (sp) Place the address of the string on stack move.w #9,-(sp) Stack the function number (9 is GEMDOS CONWS) trap #1 Call GEMDOS in the normal manner addq.I #6,sp Tidy up the stack

To use the other VT52 codes you must modify the sequence so that it contains the required information.

For example ESC A moves the cursor up, and no other data is needed except the terminating zero; ESC b (note lower case) selects the character colour, and requires a number between 0 and 15 to select the desired palette number, followed by the zero terminator.

A complete list can be found in programming books such as Atari ST Internals (Abacus Software). Mouse Master sells for just under £25 and used to be distributed by Bath Computer Shack. Practical Solutions are currently looking for another UK distributor, but meanwhile scour the ads in ST FORMAT.

Tuning in to the Beeb

Oliver Winfield from Harpenden wants to know if there is a way to emulate a BBC micro on his ST so that he can do his GCSE Computer Studies projects at home. Surprisingly enough, there is actually an emulator package available for the ST, and what's more, it's in the public domain.

The emulator attempts to create the BBC environment within the ST, and effectively enables you to write and run BBC Basic programs and have exactly the same screen output as you would on a normal Beeb. The drawback is that it's not entirely compatible because a few of the BBCs functions won't work. For example, it's impossible to poke the BBC's screen directly, because it's not in the same place on the ST. The good news is that the package includes the source code, so it could perhaps be modified if required.

The other problem arising is the complete incompatibility of the disk formats. There is no known way of reading a BBC disk with an ST or vice versa. In order to transfer files from the ST to the target Beeb you need comms packages running on both machines and an RS232/RS423 serial cable linking the two machines together. A comms program such as *K-Comm* or *FastCom* for the ST, and the Terminal Emulator ROM plugged into the BBC should do the trick, though there are many others available for both machines in the public domain.

Unfortunately this means that you have to take the ST to the BBC to link them up (unless you and your school are fortunate enough to have modems), and this might cause problems in itself. Check with your teacher before you start and enlist his help!

The BBC emulator for the ST, and a variety of comms packages for the ST are available from Softville PD, Unit 5, Stratfield Park, Electta Ave, Waterlooville, Hants.

Making the most of stereo

The STE comes with two phono ports which provide stereo sound output. If you own an STE and want to make the most of the sound, simply connect a phono lead directly from these ports to the AUX IN of an amplifier.

Colour burst

It can be tough getting colour out of your ST when using some colour televisions and **H**. **Whitbread** from Woodbridge has had particular problems using his STE with a Philips portable colour TV. If you're facing similar problems then he may well have the answer.

Atari offered him a new ST which they said might work okay with the TV, but he tried it and found that it didn't. When he examined the video signal produced by his STE, he found that the burst (the part of the signal that tells the TV to receive colour pictures) was only 6 cycles long instead of the expected 10. He removed the lid from his STE to look at the video chip – a Motorola MC1377 chip. The data sheet for this chip revealed that the burst duration was controlled by an RC time constant of 0.001mF and 50K Ohm connected to pin 1. Motorola recommend that this time constant should be a variable value but Atari choose to use a fixed value. The answer is to change the time constant, but it's not advisable to disturb the delicate circuitry of the board.

Instead, he achieved this by piggy-backing (on the component side of the board), the 0.001mF capacitor with a 150pF capacitor and the result was a burst of 12 cycles, enabling your ST to work with all colour televisions.

This is a delicate operation and should only be carried out by skilled people. Since Atari do not seem to recognise this problem, service engineers may be unaware of how to solve it. Refer them to ST FORMAT if they tell you it cannot be done.

FORMAT Health Warning: Do not attempt this modification unless you know what you are doing. Removing the cover of your ST invalidates the guarantee and if you make a mistake you may seriously damage your machine.

Plugging the holes

In response to *Desktop's* call for help on the subject of *GFA Basic* and the green holes it leaves when calling accessories, **Kevin Busby** from Eastbourne has very kindly sent in a solution.

Apparently, the key to solving this problem lies in the function Menu (9) which returns a value of 32 if the menu is inactive, and 34 if it is busy. So the method is to replace your normal menu-reading loop with:

In this example the screen is redrawn every time the accessory has been active for a count of 300. You can tweak this figure to your own taste: large values result in a long delay before redraw, and small values make the cursor flicker. Values below 4 cause the screen to be redrawn over the accessory as soon as it apppears!

The use of Sput Screen\$ copies the display which was most recently stored in Screen\$.

You must make sure that the line Sget Screen\$ is added at the end of any subroutines if they display data which is to remain on screen after returning from the menu-reading loop. In this way, if the menu-reading loop is entered, the display is always updated with the most current screen data. ■

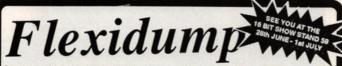

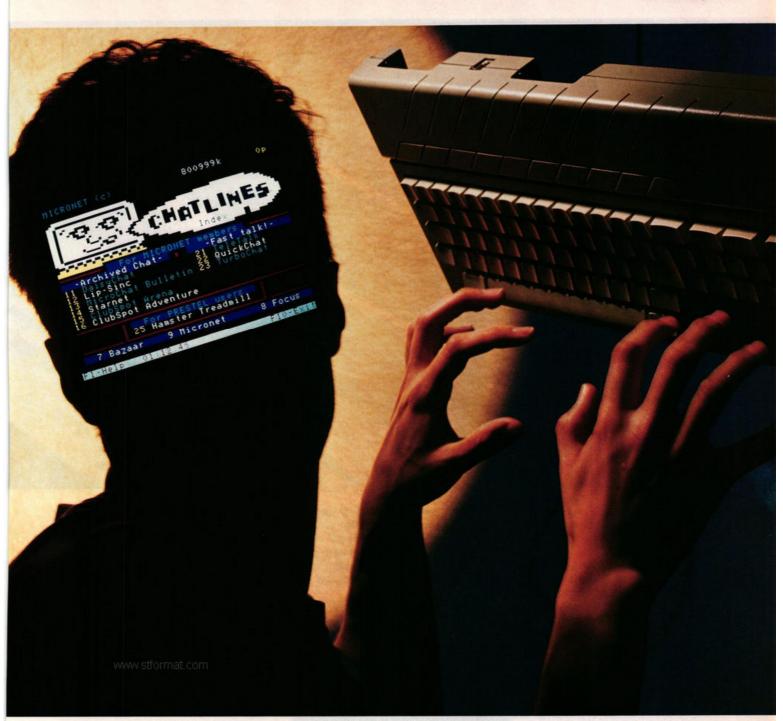

If you're not wired you're missing out. And so, for the benefit of ST newcomers, Jerry Glenwright debunks a few myths as he introduces the weird and wonderful world of communications





here was a time when computing was a solitary pursuit – the hardened enthusiast, huddled over a glowing monitor with only the tap-tap-tap of a keyboard to break the night silence. But nowadays, a thriving comms scene ensures much interaction between computer users. Across all machines in all areas, someone, somewhere is dialling into a bulletin board and using their computer and a modem to download software, play on-line interactive games and talk to other users. Fine. But for the uninitiated, comms is an arcane world impossible to penetrate. Baud rates, parity, file transfer – what the hell is it all about?

Comms – communications – involves the connection of two or more computers via telephone lines so they can swap programs and data and talk to each other. Telephone lines form a convenient national communications medium for personal computers: they're

already in position and can – just about – cope with the high speed signals generated by computers.

To effect the connection you use a box of tricks known as a modem (MOdulator/ DEModulator) which takes a raw signal from your computer and converts it into a form readily understandable by other modems. Your computer transfers the information to be transmitted to an attached modem, where it's converted to a common modem "language" and relayed across the public telephone network to a receiving modem and computer. The information is translated by the receiving modem and communications software into a form the target computer can use. In this way, computers of completely different configurations can swap data free from problems. Your ST can link up with Apple Macs,

games machines called Amigas, PCs – even mainframes and minis running exotic operating systems such as Unix, VMS and Pick!

But what about all this jargon, for God's sake? Baud rates, transfer protocols, RS232 – sounds hideous. But it needn't. The baud rate is simply a measure of the speed bits of data are transmitted between computers. Named after the inventor of telegraphy Monsieur Baudot (yes, really), baud rates started at 50 and 75 bits, quickly achieved 110 and 300 bits and moved through a variety of speeds until today, the upper limit for all but those with incredibly expensive, specialised equipment, is 2400 baud across standard telephone networks.

These bits of data are made up from the familiar old ASCII code with a couple of extra bits to mark the start and end and as a validation of the character trasmitted. (Although the slower speeds are a direct measure of bits >



 of information transmited per second, the upper speeds, generated using different algorithms, are not.)

The logic of this, fairly obviously, is that if you transmit at 2400 baud your data arrives at its destination faster than if it were transmitted at 300 baud. And rather than write these speeds as 300/300 (meaning that two machines are transmitting at 300 baud), 1200/1200 and so on, a series of shorthand symbols have been assigned to simplify the process. Now, 300/300 can be written as V21; 1200/1200 as V22; 1200/75 V23 and 2400/2400 baud as V22bis.

1200/75? Well, there's one more thing to learn about baud rates. Peculiar to the UK is a split baud rate known as V23 or 1200/75. Long, long ago in dim distant dawn of amateur computer communications (around the beginning of the 80s!), the GPO decided that the ideal would be for large mainframes and minis offering public dial-in services to transmit at 1200 baud and for home and small business machines to return the call at 75 baud. The split baud rate caught on and today, many services are entirely dependent upon this inefficient speed.

One of the advantages of dialling remote computers is that you can download or copy software from the host machine into your own. Unfortunately, telephone lines are prone to "noise" – squeaks and squawks merely annoying to voice transmissions, but the very devil when computers talk to one another. Transfer a program on a noisy telephone line and the chances are it is completely corrupted by the time it reaches the safety of your disk drive. So the computer equivalent of "Send reinforcements we're going to advance" comes out as "Send three and fourpence, we're going to a dance." And STs being somewhat literalminded, you can imagine the chaos that can cause!

To counter this noise, a series of transfer protocols have been devised to enable files to be transmitted without corruption. The first of

JARGON BUSTERS

Baud rate: the speed of data transfer between machines measured as bits per second. 1200 baud is 1200 bits per second (each character is equivalent to ten bits). Often abbreviated to:

- V21=300 300 baud V22=1200 1200 baud V22b=2400 2400 baud V23=1200 75 baud
- V23v=1200 75 baud viewdata

Hayes compatability: a US standard adopted by the majority of modems. Hayes codes are instructions understood by automatic modems. For example, the telephone number to dial and board speeds.

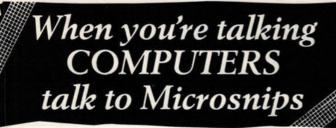
Modem: stands for MOdulater/DEModulator. Converts digital 1's and 0's into audible signals to be sent down the telephone line.

X-modem, Y-modem, Z-modem and Kermit: data transfer protocols used for sending large files down the telephone line. Z-modem is the fastest of the three and X-modem the slowest. Kermit is a file transfer protocol: extremely fast, but not supported by many boards. these, Xmodem, is a simple checksum program that breaks up a file to be transmitted into blocks and calculates the sum of its constituent bytes of data. This sum is transmitted with the block, the data value is re-calculated by the receiving computer and matched with the original total. If the two differ, the block is retransmitted. Ymodem, Zmodem, Kermit and all the other bizarre and outrageously unhelpfully named transfer protocols are simply variations on a theme, adding improvements to speed, validity of data and so on.

When computer communications began, most of the machines available didn't have a serial RS232 port to connect to a modem. RS232 interfaces had to be bought from thirdparty peripheral manufacturers at an exorbitant rate. Now's the time to smile smugly, for the ST comes complete with a built-in standard RS232 port, perfect for connection to all modems. And just as V21, V22 replaced 300/300, 1200/1200 and other speeds as a form of shorthand (remember? We did that bit about four paragraphs ago), RS232 is a shorthand name for "serial communications port."

Cost? Read on. In the beginning, your choice was limited to mushroom coloured shoeboxes from BT, or the Post Office as was, offering speeds of 110 and 300 baud. These modems were manual – you had to turn a dial at the front of the device to select a speed, answer or reply mode and so on. Then, around 1982, a complete "modem on a chip" became available. Bung it in a box with a power supply, status LEDs and a connection to the outside world and you've got a modem. Prices tumbled, and now you can buy a quality automatic >

modem offering a range of speeds, for well under £100.

The best modem you can buy probably contains the phrases "automatic," "Hayes compatible" and "V21/V22/V23/V22bis" in its description. Let's take those in turn. Automatic means that you don't have to turn dials when you want to select a transmission speed, answer or transmit mode and so on. All these operations can be selected via software commands from the safety of your computer – which leads nicely into Hayes compatibility.

In America, where comms has enjoyed a far greater popularity for many years (due to less stringent telephone restrictions and far cheaper call costs), the Hayes command language provided by the Hayes modem manufacturing company became an industry standard for modem instructions. In the same way that printers strive to achieve Epson compatibility,

modem manufacturers build in Hayes compatibility. Their modems then work with all software. The Hayes standard has also been widely accepted in the UK and wise modem buyers plump for this option.

All automatic modems contain several commands on ROM to enable them to be set up and to perform the actions you require. For example, to dial a number you might type "atd0225442244" into your communications program which instructs the modem to pulse dial the telephone number 0225 442244. Some communications programs have these commands built into them, so you simply type in the telephone number and the software does the rest. Many different modem command languages exist, however, and unless your software supports the language contained within the modem, you may have problems – at best it will be tricky to get the modem to do what you want.

So an automatic, Hayes compatible modem offering a range of speeds, preferably with V22bis, but with at least V22, is the ideal to aim for. A device of this standard will cost you around £120-£160, but you'll be able to access all bulletin boards, public information services such as Prestel and Telecom Gold, run your own bulletin board and up/download software quickly and accurately. If money is tight you should choose a V21/V23, automatic Hayes compatible modem: a device of this nature should cost around £100.

If you're a bit strapped for cash (saving up for your poll tax, perhaps), it's certainly possible to get on-line with a second-hand acoustic coupler costing £15. But you'll be

severely limited in choice and abilities, and it can't be said that this option comes highly recommended.

OK, so now you're all tooled up, your shiny new modem glinting in the phosphor glow of the ST's monitor (get on with it - ed). Communications software is up and running and waiting for a command - what now? Probably the best thing to cut your newly-acquired communications teeth on is the bulletin board. The BB, an electronic version of the cork tiles pin board hanging on a wall at your work place, school or college that performs in almost exactly the same way. You can leave and collect messages, exchange

software and interact with other users.

Bulletin boards are divided up into sections. An opening menu greets you with the latest news associated with the board, then you're presented with a main menu offering a mail section where you can send messages to the sysop or other users. There'll be a software section containing programs to download, special interest groups or SIGs providing support for those with unusual tastes such as machine language or C programing, hardware and the like. Some BBs provide on-line games to play and if you're accessing a board which can support more than one caller at the same time, you can cavort around in multi-player games battling against the computer and human players.

The enjoyment you get from a bulletin board depends very much upon what you put in. Sysops – the guys who run bulletin boards – consider it bad form if you log on, download lots of software, play games for half an hour and log off without leaving any messages, uploading (transferring software from your machine to the bulletin board) software or >>

HOW TO BEAT BT

What with BBs, public services and private computers to log into your fingers are going to have to be *prised* from the keyboard when it comes time to eat or sleep! But there is one thing that may stop your on-line adventures: BT's quarterly horror story. We've all read in the popular press about youngsters new to comms running up telephone bills the size of telephone numbers, and if you don't exercise care it could happen to you. So, with your best interests, as always, at heart, we welcome you to the ST FORMAT guide to keeping down the cost of comms...

■ DO use automated log-on procedures whenever possible. Mistype your password once or twice and you've wasted a good five minutes. Several times per week, and you could quite easily double your 'phone bill

■ DO look for and download any helpfiles when you first access a board. Read these offline at your leisure and apply the information. If you can navigate around a board quickly and efficiently, you'll need less on-line time, have smaller bills and leave the board free for other users

■ DO remember to switch to expert mode after you've been on a board a few times. This is available on most bulletin boards and enables you to use keyboard shortcuts, display compressed menus and the like – saving you precious moments. It adds up!

DO try to find bulletin boards within a local call charge rate of your part of the country. A local call costs a very reasonable 55p an hour or so

■ DO remember when performing file transfer: Y-modem is faster than X-modem, Z-modem is faster than both. Kermit is another fast and efficient file transfer protocol, though it's in common use

Finally, DO NOT log-on between 8am and 6pm, and particularly not during the morning, when telephone charges are at their highest.

helping some other user in need. Indeed, many boards restrict your access until you've actually done something other than indulge yourself. Remember, almost all bulletin boards are free – there's no subscription charges and the Sysop gets nothing for making his computer and software available to you. So log on, upload one or two public domain programs, help users with problems and immerse yourself in the board. In

this way, you'll be awarded more time and greater access to the board's many areas.

Logging on to a few bulletin boards enables you to test out your software and modem to make sure all is well and instills you with confidence. Doing the board walk is the best way to become familiar with the possibilities of computer communications. But what else is available?

Following the moderate success of public information services such as Ceefax and

Oracle, British Telecom decided to introduce their own on-line information system accessible via the newly emerging microcomputer and existing telephone network.

After a shaky, somewhat unenthusiastic start, Prestel became a success and an area specifically catering for home computer enthusiasts known as Micronet was launched in 1983. After almost seven years, Micronet has grown to be the largest information provider on Prestel with a current total of some 30,000 pages. Within Micronet you can find features, software and hardware reviews, hints, tips, programming articles and experts to solve your computer related problems, chatlines where you can exchange gossip with likeminded people, downloadable software and much, much more. There's also an on-line interactive game called *Shades* where you can explore strange new worlds, meet exotic and beautiful

people – and, of course, kill them. And after criticisms of the lack of user friendliness, Micronet has just been completely revised and revamped. It's now simple to log on and find your way through its multitude of pages.

There's also a completely new interactive game called *Trash* involving players skulking about the Universe cleaning up rubbish left behind by uncaring space travellers. Join Prestel and you'll spend many evenings at home at the keyboard (= 0800 200 700). And finally there's hacking. A few words of warning: if you so much as add a full stop to a file you can be prosecuted for criminal damage, and browsing through classified data at the Police computer in Hendon or MI5's silicon depository in Curzon Street, London is likely to land you in more hot water than you knew existed.

The rifling of Prince Philip's Prestel mailbox by Steve Gold (and cohort) provided the tabloid press with splash stories for weeks, and the recent uncovering of a ring of West German hackers who'd broken into American military and research computers and sold what they found there to the Soviets, prompted a bestselling book to be written by the man responsible for putting them behind bars (The Cuckoo's Egg by Clifford Stoll).

And there you have it. Comms is without doubt the natural progression for small computer systems. Mainframes and minis maximised power by enabling users to share knowledge. When you've found your way around your ST and know what you can do with it, logging onto a BB or public information service can give your machine a whole new lease of life. If you're not wired, you're missing out. ■

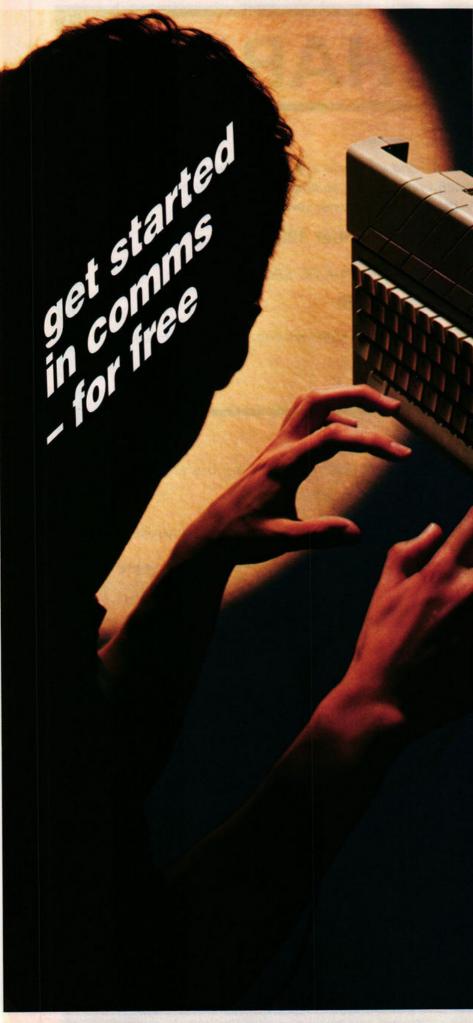

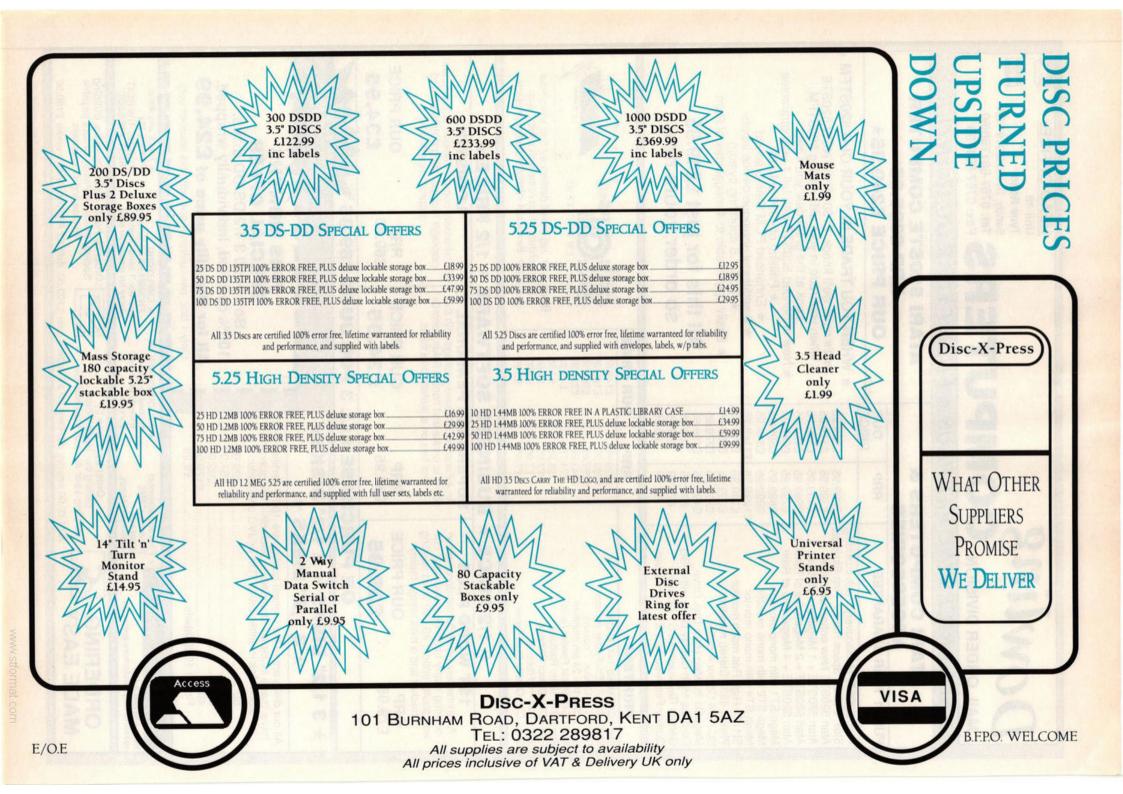

n my third tutorial I explained how the pinball program uses GEM to control the display. GEM has two levels: the Application Environment Services (AES) providing high-level functions, such as menus and forms, and the Virtual Device Interface (VDI) providing low-level graphics functions, such as line drawing and pixel level operations. This month I'll concentrate on the VDI level.

The VDI is built into the ST's ROM and is ready for use whichever language or compiler you use. VDI functions are accessible from within a C program by calling C functions (called GEM bindings). The GEM bindings pass on the parameters to the VDI in the irritating format that the designers of the VDI selected. If your favourite compiler doesn't have GEM bindings it's simple to write your own using the information contained in the Atari ST GEM Programmer's Reference, but it's also extremely boring.

At this stage, the pinball program uses a small proportion of the available functions. It uses the control functions to register the application with the VDI and to establish initial conditions. Thereafter it uses raster operations to display images encoded as pixels (pixels are coloured dots). Finally the program calls control functions to close the VDI.

You can't do any useful VDI work until you've been given a handle number. In theory, applications can have many VDI sessions active, each with its own context (pen position, colour of ink etc). When the application calls the Open Virtual Workstation function to establish a session, the VDI allocates a unique handle number and returns this to the application. On each subsequent call the application passes the handle number as a function parameter, thereby identifying the relevant session to the VDI. Take a look at the file named STRTUP.C on the Cover Disk to see how sessions are established and closed.

Very few ST books explain raster operations clearly, so if you're a serious C programmer don't lose this article! The ST's display is a raster display. Raster operations are pixel level operations, more primitive, but more flexible than the VDI geometric output functions (eg line drawing). The pinball program continually uses these functions, drawing, erasing, and redrawing the sprite while checking for collisions.



There's a lot more to writing a program like the embryonic pinball sim on the Cover Disk than drawing a Degas picture and lifting some C code: you need to know how the C code works. Warwick Grigg explains essential C coding techniques

Checking for collisions is simple: the file PINBALL.C on the Cover Disk illustrates the use of the v_get_pixel function call to determine whether the sprite's hot spots touch any pixels other than those the same colour as the background.

Displaying bit images is more complex. The VDI functions need to be told the location and size of a data area (called a Memory Form) used to store a "rectangular" pixel image. This information is stored in a C structure called a Memory Form Definition Block (MFDB), defined in the include file GEMFAST.H. The screen is one Memory Form (rectangular pixel image). The arrays holding the sprite's image, the sprite's shape (or mask), the portion of the screen obscured by the sprite are also Memory Forms all of which need MFDBs to define them. The function also needs to know the rectangular area within each Memory Form that is to be operated upon and the logical operation to perform.

Although you can select a smaller rectangular area than the total Memory Form, to display non-rectangular sprites you need to resort to clever tricks. The set bits within a mask Memory Form define the shape of the sprite. The NOT SOURCE AND DESTINATION operation is used to punch a hole of the right shape followed by a SOURCE OR DESTINATION to combine the sprite's image with that of the display. The file named SPRITES.C on the Cover Disk illustrates how these operations are used with the vro_cpyform function.

At the first stage of our program, the ball bounced off the sides of the screen. I've now added some rudimentary collision detection: as the ball moves across the screen the program checks to see whether the ball's edge has hit another object (such as a cushion). If there is such a collision, the ball's speed and direction are changed depending on the point of contact. In fact there are eight possible points of contact, called hot spots.

The top, bottom, left side, right side, topleft, bottom-left, top-right and bottom-left points on the circle are checked for possible collision. There is a fairly simple algorithm for working out the new speed and direction (but one which implements an element of randomness). I would encourage any budding games programmers to >>

improve this; after all that's why we put the source code on the Cover Disk. A useful improvement would be to make the bounce factor dependent upon the colour of the object in the ball's path.

So shake the dust off your C compiler disk, put your brain in gear and create your own major opus. Don't be disheartened if you have to spend a lot of time trying to understand how everything fits together and a bit more to try out some ideas: commercial programs on sale for £20 can take up to ten man years to develop!■

Next month I cover the C constructs I've skipped over, and address some of the problems that readers have written to me about. So if you're finding it tough going, stick with it and tell me what's causing you problems.

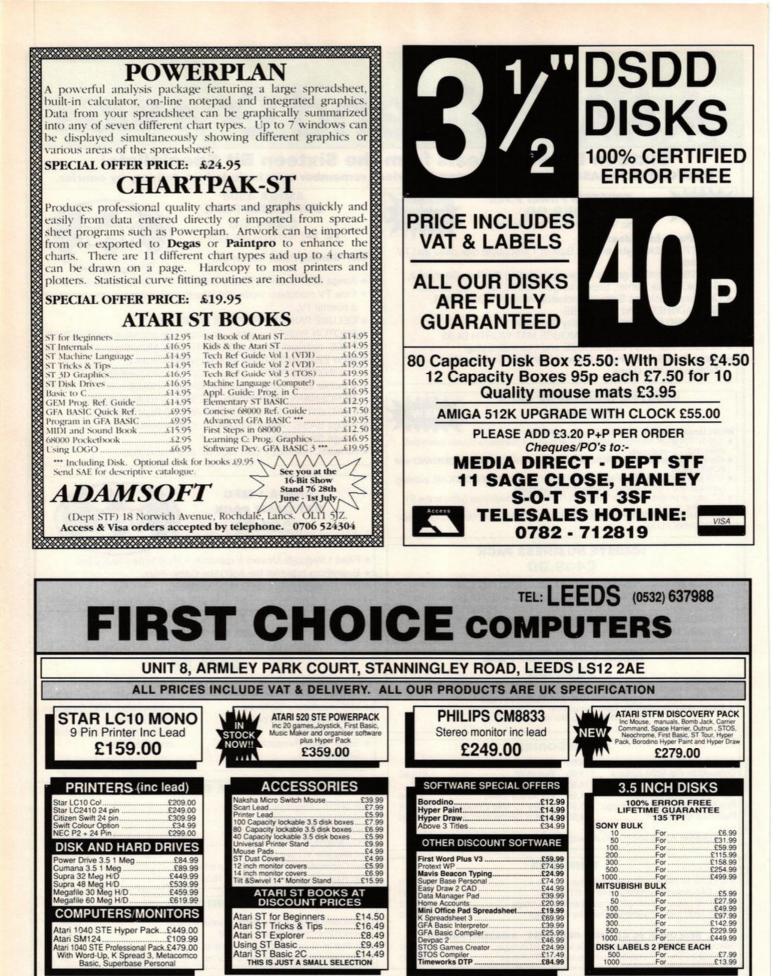

birth of a notion

irst shown at the prestigious CeBIT show in Hannover in Spring 1987, *Calamus* now has 10,000 registered users in Europe. The company behind the ultimate desktop publishing package, DMC (Design Marketing Communication), were founded in 1987 by Dietmar Meyfeldt. Formed after the *Calamus* project was already under way, they've experienced a meteoric rise. The big break for *Calamus* and DMC came with the introduction of the Mega ST.

Atari Germany were in need of a serious software package to support the Mega/laser printer combination. In addition to taking over the distribution, Atari bundled *Calamus* with each Mega purchased in Germany. In July 1988, each Mega buyer received a coupon entitling them to a free copy of *Calamus*. This worked very well Calamus is undoubtedly the best DTP package released for the ST. Don Maple visits Calamus creators DMC in Germany, where the ST is taken very seriously indeed

for both parties. Atari had a serious software package for its hardware and DMC had an instant installed base of over 1000 users.

The big impact in Germany was followed by expansion to overseas markets. A small number of industry figures got a sneak preview of *Calamus* at the PCW show in September 1988. Encouraged by the response DMC soon organised a UK release (see the full Calamus review in issue 6 of ST FORMAT).

The good news for UK users is that Signa, the British distibutors of *Calamus*, are bringing in new versions as they become available in Germany. There are slight delays due to the user guide translation, but in return British users actually get a better manual because it >>

THE BIRTH OF A PUBLISHING GIANT

The first program DMC released was *Multi Hard Copy* written by Harald Siegmund, the current system programmer. As its name suggests, this program produced hard copy, including colour output, and supported just about every available printer. *Laserbrain*, by Pierre Hansen and Klaus Garms followed next. This was essentially an FX-80 emulator for laser printers. Only after these two programs were released did *Calamus* itself appear.

The first gauge of market reaction to Calamus was at the CeBit show in Hannover in Spring 1987. The simultaneous introduction of the Atari laser printer at the same show was to prove instrumental to the future of both DMC and Calamus. Following the positive feedback, a demo version was prepared for the first Atari show in Dusseldorf in September 1987.

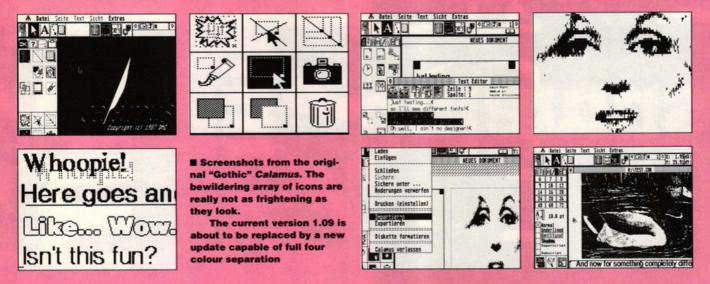
The response from the show was very encouraging. "We could have had a finished product as early as January 1988," said Pierre Hansen, " but at a meeting after the show we decided to do a major rewrite. This was mainly due to new improvements and changes. We did not want to introduce an unstable product. So we made a decision to do it right the first time around, even if it took longer."

The spiritual father of this new product was Christian Griesbeck. He had the initial idea, but a major software package of this size couldn't be handled by one programmer alone.

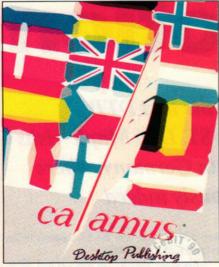

normally includes corrections and reflects any feedback obtained after the original German printing. Signa also supply British buyers of *Calamus* with three additional Compugraphic fonts and the vector font editor for free. In Germany, however, these must be purchased separately.

"It's hard to create a DTP program which doesn't use Postscript, and *Calamus* doesn't need Postscript! We have our own page

description language which is much more powerful. *Calamus* doesn't need an intelligent printer either: it makes every printer intelligent.

"When people program something like this they really have to believe in it. Producing *Calamus* was much more difficult than creating another

copy of Pagemaker or X-press. What made Calamus particularly attractive for programmers was that, at the very beginning, there were no restrictions. You could come into the office with your own ideas and we would discuss them. It was very democratic. It was also possible for programmers to pursue their own specific areas of interest."

Now that Calamus is established, the impetus has changed somewhat. "After the launch of the program the users were amazed at what it could do. But as soon as they started using it they got greedy. We got requests for a number of new functions. A lot of people are doing things with Calamus we never thought possible, so we get a lot of ideas from our customers. One guy even uses Calamus to print T-shirts!"

One reason for this wide use of *Calamus* is its flexible and open-ended design. "A very important part of our philosophy is to always try to avoid restrictions. For example, the for-

mula to define formats contains a list of standard formats and a box for the users to define their own. The worst thing a software developer can do is say: nobody is going to use that... You can be sure that two weeks later somebody will call and ask for it!"

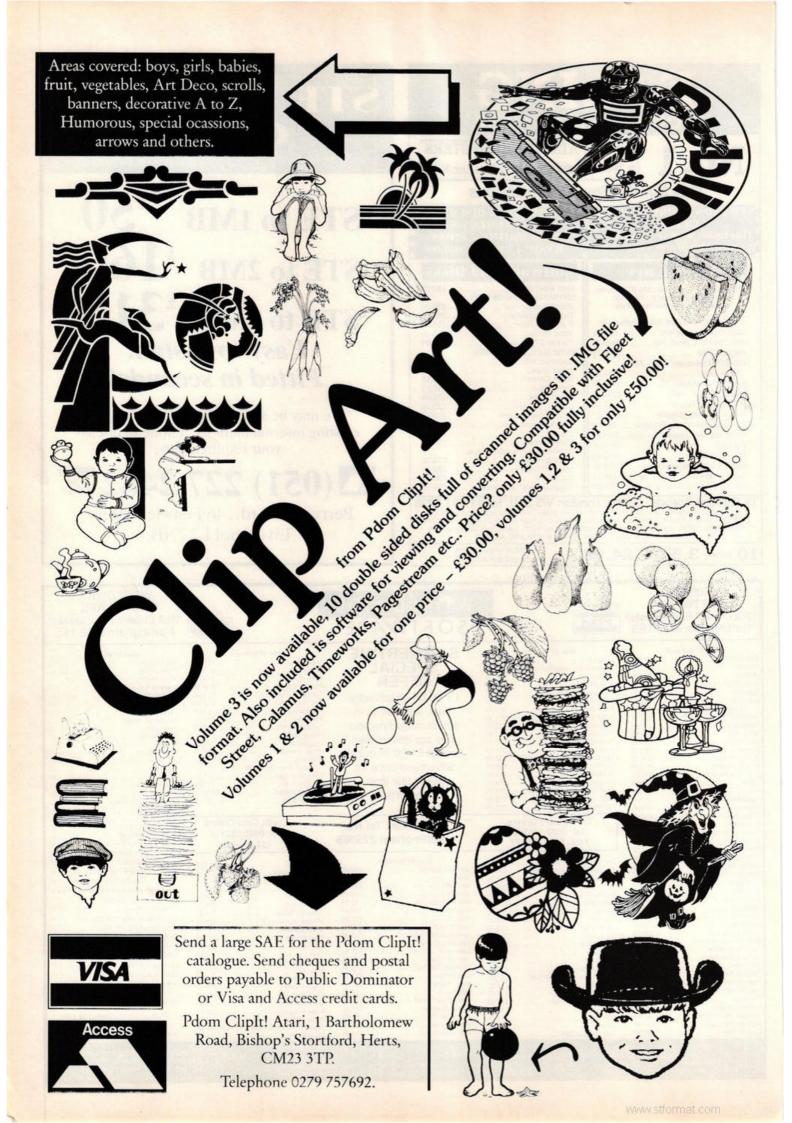
The future of *Calamus* is decidedly rosy. It now supports both colour monitors and colour printers. The new version is able to do a full four colour separation. "Possibly more," added Pierre, "because we aim for a true colour representation with built-in screen, scanner and printer calibration. The idea is to be able to scan an image, display it on the screen and print it out – yet maintain identical colours throughout the process."

There are also plans to expand the Page Description Language, but the most important change is that *Calamus* is going modular. "In the past it was essentially one big lump. What >>

we will do now is turn Calamus into a DTP operating system. The new version is completely open. In this way if we come up with a new pixel, vector, chart or text editor, the user can just replace the relevant module or add a new one."

The modules are not limited to the DTP

arena alone. A possible configuration may, for example, involve an automatic billing module which analyses how much time a layout takes, updates the customer record using the database module, produces an invoice using the accounting module and finally creates a cost pro-

jection for all objects in the layout by using the spreadsheet module.

The modules can hook up into the *Calamus* user interface directly for seamless integration. The *Calamus* event manager is then used by the modules for features such as hot keys or other user defined key combination. DMC wish to attract software specialists to create *Calamus* modules in their own area of expertise.

This change is to be reflected in the marketing as well. "There will be a basic package

PRICELESS

What made Calamus a real professional package was Linotype. For the noncognoscenti among us, the Linotype is a high resolution printer (2,000 dots per inch) with a price tag of about £30,000. This device is used throughout the printing industry to produce professional quality output - like ST FORMAT. So it's no surprise that a hardware connection to the Linotype was high on the priority list. The first Linotype interface was already up and running in July 1988. It was officially introduced at the second Atari Dusseldorf show to wide acclaim. The interface was so successful that it took DMC until late last year to catch up with back orders. Imagine, a humble ST driving a machine like that! Power without the price, indeed!

consisting of a standard version of *Calamus*. The individual users would then expand it according to their specific needs by adding various parts. In this way the average end user can grow with the system. The advantage for us is that the maintenance will be simplified by focusing on a particular module instead of having to

change the complete configuration."

Calamus' future now depends heavily upon the success or failure of the TT. As Pierre Hansen explains, "You can do colour on the ST, but you need a very large cup of coffee... Colour requires both raw processor

speed and large amounts of memory."

Dealers are high on DMC's priority list. Seminars and dealer consultations are held on a regular basis. DMC also plan a number of demo disks with ready-made solutions. The dealer can then show the hard copy and use the disk to explain how the document was created. This not only makes the job of the dealer easier, but provides examples which were professionally created at DMC headquarters instead of being thrown together, ad hoc, in the shop.

DMC are an excellent example of why the ST is so successful in Germany. They take the ST for what it is – a powerful, yet inexpensive computer. They develop reliable software and don't cut corners. Users recognise the power of the ST and aren't swayed by inferior solutions. ■

THE WHOLE FONTASTIC STORY

Font data was obtained from a company called Compugraphic, now Agfa-Compugraphic, and converted to *Calamus* under the name DMC Classic Types.

A program called VFE (Vector Font Editor) appeared around Christmas 1988 to expand available fonts by enabling the users to create their own.

Outline Art followed next in June 1989. This converts fonts into vector graphics. The fonts can then be processed and distorted, slanted, rotated, shadowed and even wrapped around various objects like spheres or cylinders. The utility's intended function was to create headlines, but users soon turned it into a vector editor in its own right.

The fonts continue to grow and there are now two new additions. DMC are just starting to support the Linotype fonts, received in the office late last year.

The second major new font supplier are URW. They digitise various font types and then supply them to all the major companies. Their own font system, called *lkarus*, uses a proprietary format to describe font shapes. Among others, URW digitised the logo for Lufthansa (the German airline).

Even though the actual font data came from a number of sources – Compugraphic, Linotype, URW – all *Calamus*' fonts are stored in a special, proprietary format. This extends to other data structure as well. "We have our own text format, picture format and vector format," explained Pierre Hansen. "When we started developing *Calamus* there were no DTP standards on the ST. GEM just wasn't powerful enough, so we had to develop our own structures."

nyone who's purchased educational software from a PD library must have come across at least one program by the ubiquitous and prolific D.A Brumleve. Her output includes the Kid-programs (Kidgraph, Kidpiano, and Kidstory) which are all of educational merit. They were distributed as shareware and profits went to a school in Illinois.

Kidpublisher Professional is Mrs Brumleve's first venture in the commercial market. V 6.0, under review, has evolved from earlier versions, one of which is available from PD libraries in this country (V 2.1 from Page 6 Publishing, Disk ST163 and ST Club, Disk EDU7).

All children are imaginative. Any facility which allows them to express their imagination in a novel way must be applauded. The obvious use of this package is to allow children to produce illustrated stories which can be presented in the form of a small book. The use of Kidpublisher need not stop there. It could be used to produce posters, class newsletters, magazines and so on. Teachers or parents could generate simple reading books which the child could later illustrate, or even pages of text containing missing letters or words which can be used to develop early spelling skills. Its versatility means it can be adapted to many early learning situations

EDUCATION report

TP is becoming an important aspect of both primary and secondary IT classroom teaching. As an optional topic it can occupy well in excess of 25% of GCSE IT syllabuses and lends itself to a variety of potential uses across the curriculum. Schools are also becoming increasingly interested in the use of DTP for the production of in-house documents - including that hot-bed of creative talent, the school magazine. It could be claimed that a good DTP package is the most important acquisition any IT department can make. Furthermore, such a package could boost any child's work at home. A "published" project has a lot more impact than the more traditional illegible hand-written type.

A DTP package used by children below the age of 14 must be of high quality, easy to use, and produce consistently high quality results. *Timeworks DTP* fulfills all these criteria (see on-going DTP tutorial on page 91).

I've been using Timeworks in the classroom for well over a year and not only does it produce consistently high results, but children respond enthusiastically to it as well. Apart from being simple enough to introduce to children as young as 11, it's powerful enough to satisfy all the relevant criteria of the GCSE and other IT syllabuses. It has a number of limitations, however, that make it of limited value for more advanced uses.

Pages are set out by creating frames. In the case of *Timeworks* this is achieved by a simple mouse operation. Frames are used as the templates into which you can incorporate text (either by typing directly or importing from another source), or pictures (drawn or imported). Text can be imported from a variety of sources including all of the most commonly used ST word processing packages. Frames can then later be manipulated to improve the final presentation of the document.

The size and type of text that appears in the document is called the font. *Timeworks DTP* has four fonts available. Although this is a disadvantage for many DTP applications it is (almost ironically) a strength where children are concerned because where there is less to use, there is less to learn about.

Pictures can be drawn directly within the package or imported from a variety of sources. A child's own pictures could be produced with any of the commonly used art packages (including some directly aimed at children, such as HAT's First Paint and Stage II = 0743 231763) and later brought onto a page. Pictures can also be incorporated from one of the many clip art disks available in the public domain or from commercial clip art packages such as Migraph's Scan Art (£39.95 = Electric Distribution 0480 496666). Photo-quality pictures can be produced using either a digitiser (linked to a video camera) or a scanner. We've obtained exciting results at school using Rombo's Vidi-ST and Kempston's Data Scan (see ST FORMAT issue 9).

> A picture imported into a frame is automatically scaled to the size of that frame. This is a major strength because it erases the need for pupils to become involved in complex operations to ensure that the picture fits the space available.

Any child can be up and running with Timeworks in a matter of a few hours. The manual contains a very good (although somewhat commercially biased) guided tour in the form of four stategically linked lessons covering the most frequently used concepts. Teachers and parents may wish children to follow these lessons or could easily prepare their own based on the tutorial.

Although a wonderful basic DTP program, *Timeworks* cannot rotate frames, text cannot be made to go around pictures and fonts are set to only a few pre-defined types and sizes. For most educational applications up to the age of 15, such limitations are not prohibitive. Beyond this, however, students become more demanding. They begin to experiment more and expect a package to be capable of more. Any demanding job where visual presentation is critical requires a more complex package than *Timeworks*. I'll be considering these alternatives next month. ■

I know there are owners of single-sided drives about, but surely it's about time software companies could start to give us a choice as to whether we want the game for double-sided or single-sided. I mean to say, your mag gives us that option with the Cover Disk and nobody complains to you about it, do they?

I'm inclined to agree with you, Martin. In our latest questionnaire (see page 142 for results), we found that only 15% of our readers own a single-sided drive. Yet many software companies continue to regard that as the standard they write for. Why? It's obvious, really: one includes the other. In other words, every double-sided drive can access singlesided disk software, while the reverse is not the case.

You suggest giving owners a choice, but that would mean producing two versions of the game, which is prohibitively expensive. It seems to me the more likely solution is the gradual phasing out of single-sided software in favour of double-sided. That's tough on the owners of older machines, I know, and I can't really offer them any consolation, other than to say that the end result is a much, much higher standard of game. Indeed I believe our time-travel correspondent has something to say on the matter. Over to you Paul (see "Back from the future" above)... So if people want to buy games and software for their computer, do just that and buy it! It's the pirates which are one of the causes for keeping the price of software high.

QUESTIONNAIRE results

Before we dazzle you with statistics, may we first put on our sincere voice to thank each and every one who replied to our questionnaire and offered suggestions on how we can continue to improve *ST FORMAT*. Your observations have been studied closely, and we intend to implement as many of them as possible, though we're not quite sure about the suggestion that we make *ST FORMAT* 300 pages each month, put four disks on the cover and reduce the price to 50p.

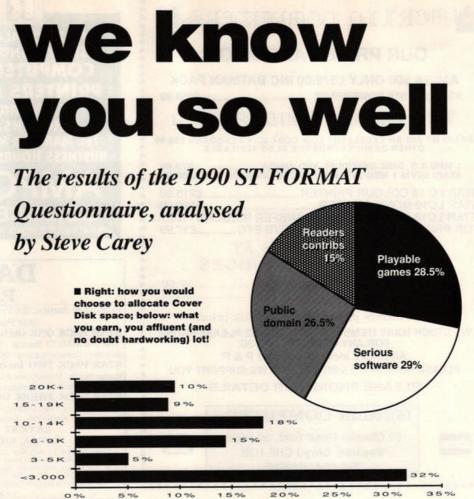
Now, to the results (note that each calculation takes into account those who, for whatever reason, didn't answer particular questions). 24.5% of you are under 16 years old; 32% are 17-24; 18% are 25-34; 17.5% are 35-44; 5% 45-59; and 3% over 60. Over 95% of you are male. You're an affluent lot, with a lucky or hardworking 19% plus earning over £15,000 a year, and 18% between £10-15,000. That should be enough to cover your Poll Tax.

Machine ownership results reveal that the number of single-sided drive machines is now down to 15%. Overall, 76% of you own 520s; 20% 1040s, and 6% Megas. Remarkably, 10% have the new ST upgrade machine, the STE, suggesting that at least one *FORMAT* reader in ten bought a new ST over or since Christmas.

As far as hardware is concerned, 90% own joysticks; 60% printers; 50% monitors; 33% second disk and 16% a sound sampler. One in ten owns a modem, while 14% have bought extra memory – the item top of your shopping list, incidentally (38% of you intend to buy extra memory in 1990, with 24% saving up for a printer and 27% for a second disk).

The results of question 6, "What software do you own?" are fascinating. While 90% of you own games – no surprises there – 63% own programming languages, 48% music software, 75% a word processor and 74% art programs. Most surprising of all, perhaps, is the 43% who own a spreadsheet. You're plainly not satisfied with using your ST just for games – or, indeed, just for serious work.

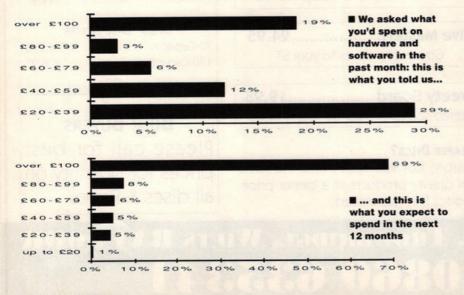
But what do we make of the fact that only 35% claim to be intending to buy games this year? Either you're overestimating the longevity of the games you already possess, or you are finding the Poll Tax quite a burden, or else the software houses are in for something of a shock! Still, your determination to make the most of your machine is clear enough, with a



whacking great 20% expecting to buy DTP software in 1990.

The success of *ST FORMAT* is founded on the conviction that you are neither "just" a games player or "just" a serious user: you're both. This is amply demonstrated in the figures on machine usage: 42% on games, 34% on serious (word processing, business, education) and 24% on other uses (art, graphics, music). Of course some of you are more interested in one aspect, and there was the occasional complaint that we had too many/not enough pages on games/serious software.

Spending shows an unexpected pattern, with nearly a third of you calculating that you



shelled out between £20 and £39 on hardware and software in the month previous to filling in the questionnaire. 19% spent over £100 in that period, many of them no doubt on STs.

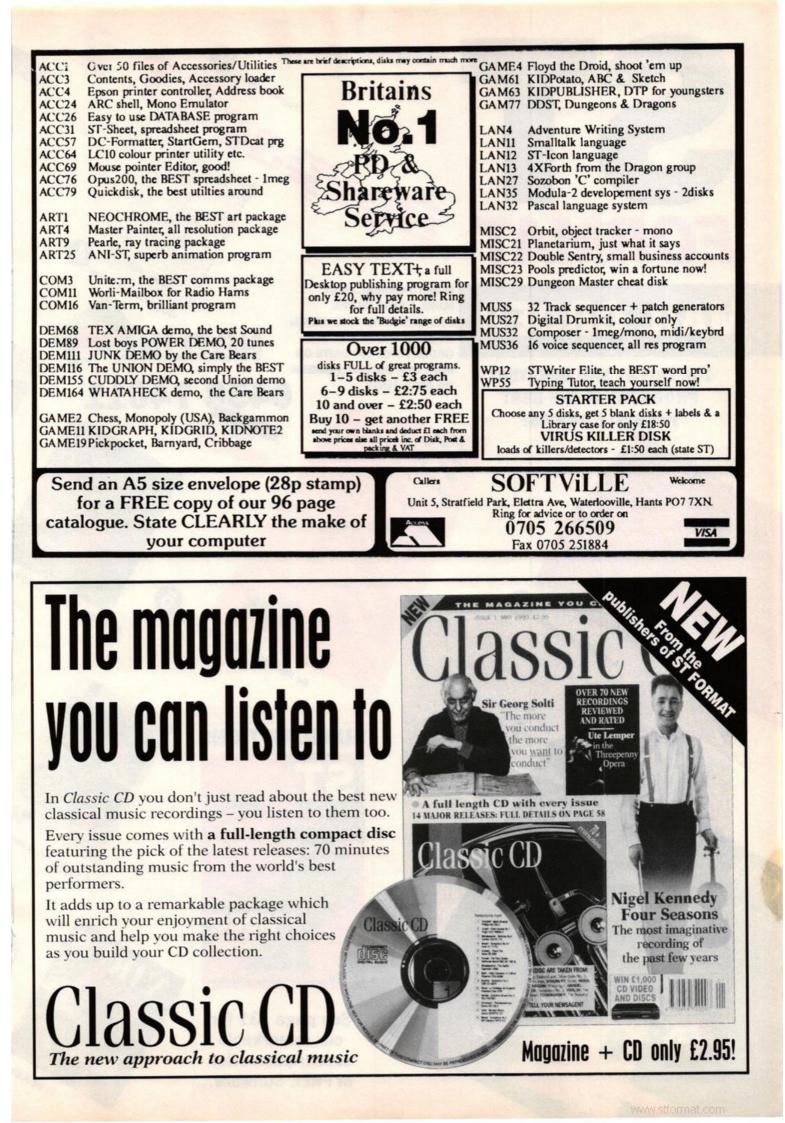
You rated ST FORMAT at 8.48 out of 10, well in front of any other computer magazine: a very healthy mark indeed, but one which suggests that there's still room for improvement. We'd like to be even nearer full marks next year. Four newspapers are each read by 12% of you: Sun, Independent, Mail and Mirror.

The Cover Disk is your favourite item (8.28 out of ten). The old-style *Game Busters* was your least liked section (5.8), and we've moved swiftly to try and improve those pages. It's now a regular three page part of the magazine, with a great deal more effort going into it (see page 72 if you don't believe us). We'd appreciate any comments you have on the subject. And *Desktop* (6.8) is next for the treatment, going up also to three pages every month from the next issue.

We asked you how you'd allocate space on the Cover Disk, dividing space into ten. Serious software, public domain and playable game demos all came out very closely (29%, 26.5% and 28.5% respectively). Reader contributions rated 15%.

Finally, a gratifying one in three of you (36.5%, to be precise) have a regular order with your newsagent for ST FORMAT. 12% subscribe and many more than that (16.5%) intend to. ■

We received over 500 replies to our questionnaire, and therefore we believe that the results give a reasonably accurate picture of your spending, habits and feelings about *ST FORMAT*.

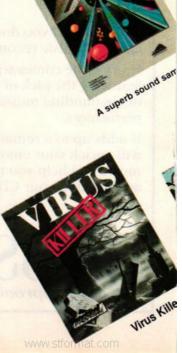

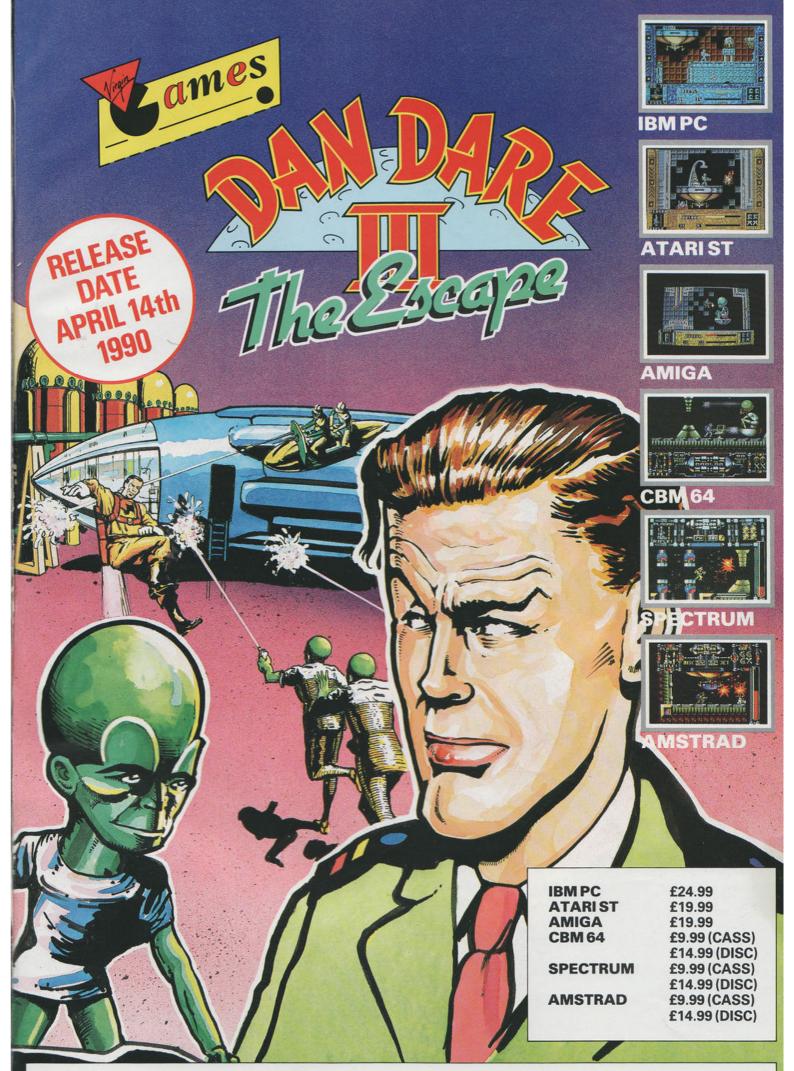
