

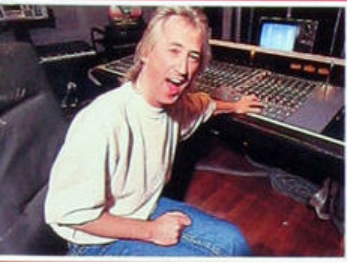

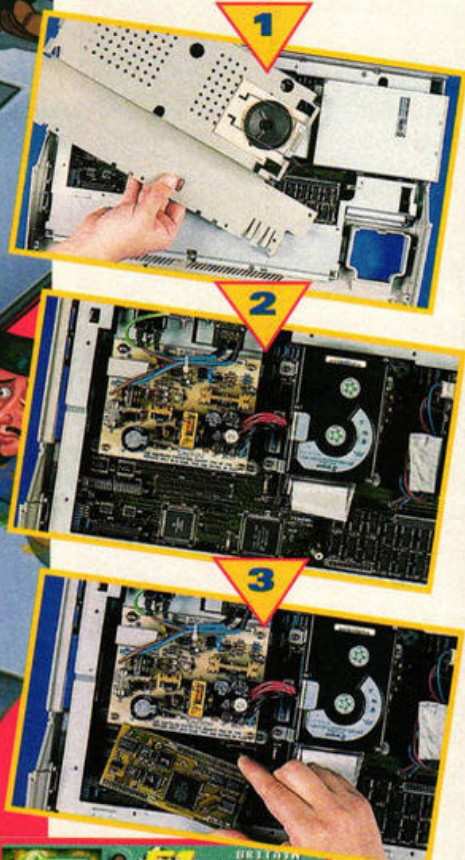

# CUBASE AUDIO BOOSTS FALCON

**T**he release of the professional quality music sequencer *Cubase Audio* from Steinberg has increased Atari Falcon sales by a ratio of up to five to one, according to close observers of how the machine is selling.

Retailer Paul Wiffen of Music Village commented: "*Cubase Audio* has helped sales of the Falcon immensely. Since the program was released we've sold about five times as many complete systems as the total number of individual machines we had sold before."

Music Village are currently supplying between 15 and 20 complete systems a month – a complete system being at least a 4MByte Falcon030, *Cubase Audio* and a 240MByte SCSI drive. "We sell the systems mainly to people who want the software," Paul continues,

"and happen to need a Falcon to run it on." Although the £2,000 price tag for the system might seem high, it is comparatively small when you look at the other options

available which start at around ten times that price.

Although the Falcon has been reasonably popular among musicians to date, sales of the machine have been very disappointing compared to the expected sales figures announced by Atari in the middle of

last year. The last available figures from Atari on Falcon sales (from the end of August 1993) estimate they have sold around 12,500 machines. Because of this, rumours have apparently been circulating that Atari are to drop the Falcon altogether. Atari stress that these rumours are unfounded, however, and with the release of *Cubase Audio* this would seem even less likely. Atari's Public Relations manager Peter Walker confirmed this with his remark to the effect that Steinberg are doing wonders for Falcon sales which are now reaching relatively high levels.



Joint ads with Atari and Harman probably helped sales.

Paul Wiffen is prepared for all eventualities, however: "If Atari stopped making Falcons I would buy as many of them as possible, because I know I can sell them. For a year or two, I can't see anything coming along for the same price."

# Games sales up over Christmas

**S**T games publishers are jubilant about the figures of their ST games over the Christmas period. There were only a handful of new full-price titles available, but together with the budget releases from The Hit Squad, GBH and Kixx XL, it seems Christmas 1993 was the best period of sales for some time.

Adrian Cale of Gametek, publishers of *Frontier*, said: "We're exceptionally pleased. Compared with the Amiga and PC it [*Frontier*] hasn't sold bucketloads, but it has

sold well above the minimum needed to keep its position at number one in the ST chart."

*Frontier* is an exceptional case, though – when the ST version was released, it crept in to number seven in the all-formats Gallup chart, which gives an indication of the high number of ST copies sold.

US Gold also report excellent sales of ST budget games over the Christmas period. "The range has gone really, really well," enthused Bridgett Hirst of US Gold. "We've had more releases this year than

last, so the Christmas period was very good." US Gold have a line-up of 60 titles for 1994, partly made up

from the Sierra On-Line catalogue released through Kixx XL – so 1994 could be even more successful.

## NEW SOFTWARE HOUSE TO SPECIALISE IN DEVELOPING ATARI SOFTWARE

Hey! Watch out! There's a new software house in town – and they're specialising in producing games for the Atari range of machines.

As Chris Dillon, Managing Director of the company, Caspian Software, explains: "We don't believe you can fully exploit the potential of a machine unless you concentrate on it specifically. We are different to other software houses because we are committed to producing the highest quality entertainment software just for the Atari range – no conversions, no ports, no compromises. And we are also the first software house to design games to use the features of the STE and Falcon to the full."

Despite their promises of BLITTER enhanced graphics, DMA sound, compatibility with Atari's joypad and smooth hardware scrolling, as well as enhancements if you use your games from a hard drive or have extra memory, you're only going to see joypad compatibility with their first release, *Rock 'n' Roll Clams*, due out within the next couple of months. Chris describes it as a cutesy platform game but is at pains to point out that it's not really the sort of game they want to concentrate on, especially since it isn't enhanced for the STE, although it is compatible with the Falcon. They're more interested in bringing PC-style games to the ST

# STES DECLARED A SELL-OUT

STEs were in such demand over Christmas that many retailers sold their entire stocks in December and now have a backlog of orders with Atari for new supplies. This effectively foils claims that the ST is a dead machine which no-one would dream of buying these days.

The demand for the STE surprised many people considering the way that sales of the machine have dropped off over the last year; Atari reckon they sold about 10,000 STEs up to Christmas 1993, clearing out UK stocks. Retailers have between 1,000 and 3,000 STEs on order from Atari, who say that stocks are to arrive in February.

Brian Cobby, general manager of First Computer Centre, told us that they ran out of STs early in November and have been unable to get any more in stock: "It's a great pity because there has been a lot interest in the STE this Christmas, we could have sold a lot more if we could have

got some stocks in." Andy Leaning of SDL, also suggested they were unable to get stock in for Christmas leaving potential customers disappointed. Darryl Still of Atari was keen to emphasise the company's continued support of the STE, explaining that they would supply anyone who wanted any of their machines. He puts the demand down to the competitive price of the machine, and confesses that perhaps Atari failed to notice the interest in the machine because their minds were "on other things."

How they're actually going to fulfill the demand, however, is a matter of some debate. Darryl Still reckons they're going to replace overseas machines with UK TOSs, whereas PR Manager Peter Walker maintains Atari have gone back into production of STEs in Taiwan.

Practicalities aside, if you're still after an STE you should be able to get hold of one by the end of February.

## TEST OF ENDURANCE

A game of human survival and endurance comes to the ST courtesy of Silmarils, creators

of the excellent *Ishar* series of adventures.

*Robinson's Requiem* puts you on a distant planet, where you are held prisoner by horrid monsters and aliens. Although your original mission was to investigate the planet, you find yourself having to escape from an alien prison, and then survive in a dense and hostile jungle using only your wits and a small survival kit.

Silmarils reckon they've built an entire eco-system into the game, so you have to battle against all manner of ills: disease, sunstroke, food poisoning and malaria. Also, you have to keep an eye on your own health, and even perform

The demonstration, running throughout all three days of the show, is arranged in conjunction with Compo Software. Neal O'Nions told *ST FORMAT*: "We've got a pretty large stand, so there's plenty of space to show off Atari's gear. We've put together several music packs, aimed at musicians who want to buy a whole setup including MIDI leads and stuff, and we'll be selling them at prices which music shops won't believe."

Sponsored by *Making Music* magazine, MEMS '94 is aimed at both professional musicians and beginners, offering seminars which try to demystify MIDI alongside demonstrations of the latest and best MIDI music gear.

Called the MIDI Music Show for the past five years, MEMS is being touted as the premier MIDI event. "It's the only show which is aimed at electronic music," said Julie Collins of Westminster Exhibitions, the show's organisers, "whereas the British Music Fair is aimed at all areas of music. We always aim the show at the forefront of technology. Whatever's exciting happening at NAM in the States, and the Frankfurt show, the exhibitors bring to our show."

As well as the Atari/Compo combo, other seminars include a demonstration of *Cubase Audio*, and a demo by Yamaha of their CBX-D5 Hard Disk Recorder in conjunction with *Cubase Audio*. 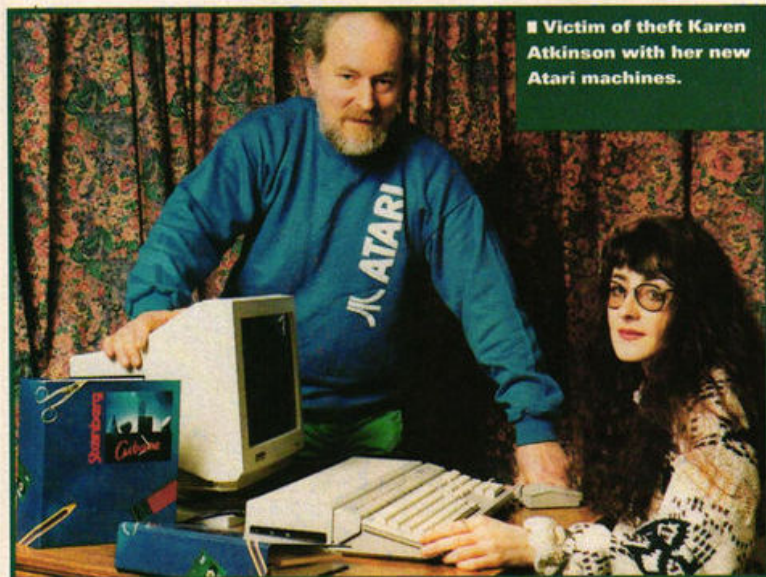
### Buggy DSPs? Not

Following last month's news story about the apparently buggy DSPs in the Falcon, Atari would like to point out that in fact the DSPs are not faulty. They do, however, agree that there are some software incompatibility problems between *Cubase Audio* and TOS v4.1. They comment: "It is more easily fixable by a small hardware modification and Atari, together with Steinberg, have authorised System Sokutions to make this amendment without infringing warranty." Well, that's their story, but it still seems strange to us that it's easier to fiddle about with the hardware than to produce a software patch.

### Self-indulgent tale of woe

As *ST FORMAT* struggles to meet its deadline, tragedy struck our Falcon's hard drive partition D, it contains programs to preview and pictures we were going to use to illustrate our features. We were not happy, especially since partition C still had an extra MByte of space and we weren't using Atari's hard drive software anyway. # ATARI SHOW ORGANISORS TO THE RESCUE

Compo Software, CGS and Titan Designs, the organisers of the recent Atari shows, donated over £1,000 worth of ST gear to the victim of a computer theft.

When music student Karen Atkinson had her entire ST setup, keyboards and sequencer stolen from her home in Newcastle on Boxing Day, she was rather fed up, to say the least, particularly since she was in the middle of a series of 25 radiotherapy sessions to treat her case of cancer of the womb. When the organisers of the Atari

Shows heard about her plight they offered her a brand new setup including an ST, a monitor, *Cubase* and a Roland JV 30 keyboard, which she was happy to accept so now she can make music again to her heart's content.

Atari Shows announced for this year include a small tour of the north: the first's at Newcastle's Eldon Leisure Centre on Saturday 16 April from 10am - 5pm and the second's at Glasgow's Central Hotel, Gordon St, Glasgow on Sunday 17 April from 10am - 5pm.

## RAIDED? NOT US!

**New Age PDL has fallen foul of the copyright laws concerning sound sampling, according to industry rumours.**

They were visited after a complaint was made concerning their disks. This follows the closure of the South West Software Library following a raid and a lengthy legal case in 1992.

Caroline Price of New Age was contacted by the Mechanical Copyright Protection Society

(MCPS) who are concerned about PD disks containing sampled sound files of songs, in effect complete songs copied from CD using a sound sampler. After inspecting some of the disks they have been removed from the New Age catalogue at the request of the MCPS. Some other disks containing still images digitised from video tape have also been removed from sale.

Caroline commented: "We would like to stress that we have

not closed down and we are carrying on our business as usual; we have not been raided. Some disks have been withdrawn from sale and we apologise for any inconvenience caused to any of our customers who have ordered any of these disks. No other action is being taken against us."

It is the actual act of sampling music from CD or tape without prior permission from the copyright holder that is illegal. The MCPS told us that, before it is legal to sample music from records to use in your own compositions, you must get permission from the owners of the copyrights of the piece, these are the sound recording copyright, normally owned by the record company, the work copy-

right, normally owned by the publisher of the music and the moral right, normally owned by the composer or author of the music.

Even when you have permission to sample, you may still have to pay royalties to any or all of the owners of the various rights.

It's technically illegal to sample sound from any copyright source - CDs, tapes or videos - for your own use, but as long as the samples are not distributed or sold for profit, then the MCPS say that it is unlikely that they would ever take action against an individual for breach of copyright unless there is a specific complaint made.

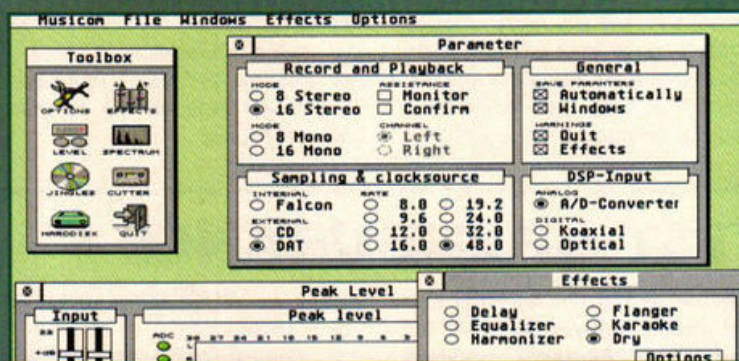
## PREVIEW: MUSICOM 2

Compo's new version of *Musicom* for the Falcon, snappily called *Musicom 2*, is almost totally different from the original direct-to-disk recording program.

Neil O'Nions of Compo said "*Musicom 2* provides powerful digital audio for the non-professional."

The original version of *Musicom* is a simple to use program with a couple of main option screens and some basic DSP effect functions. In contrast, the new version has a full range of drop down menus and an on-screen set of toolbox icons that triggers the main functions.

A full range of sampling frequencies are available using either the Falcon's internal hardware as a clock source or external CD and DAT clocks can be input through the DSP port. Each clock source supplies a different range of sampling frequencies, the Falcon's own top rate is 49.2KHz, externally clocked DAT samples at 48KHz and CD samples at 44.1KHz. The original DSP effects

module is still present along with ability to switch between sampling stereo, mono, 16-bit and 8-bit modes. A much improved hard drive management tool has been added along with full sample editing, on-screen signal levels, spectrum analyser and a jingle player enabling different samples to be strung together on a playlist. The pattern

editor is a more powerful playback feature than the jingle player, enabling total control over sequencing of samples in any order. *Musicom 2* is priced at £79, but if you buy the first version of *Musicom* - which only costs you £49 - you get a voucher for a free upgrade to *Musicom 2*. What a bargain.

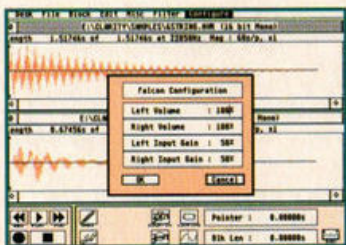
## PREVIEW: CLARITY FALCON

Get your Falcon groovin' with Clarity Falcon, a stereo sound sample editor that uses the computer's built-in sampling hardware to perform direct-to-disk recording.

Essentially it's the updated and improved version of Microdeal's Replay 16 and Replay Stereo, comprising software, a hardware clock card and a phono to stereo-jack adaptor lead. It's the first sampling system developed by AVR that doesn't use the company's

own external hardware to perform the sampling. This has given them much more leeway to concentrate on developing the software side of the system. If you're familiar with any of the AVR sample editors used on the ST you're going to feel right at home as soon as you run Clarity, the main screen is virtually identical to that of Replay 16. Everything works in exactly the same way so if you've moved up from the ST to the Falcon you can get straight to work.

Clarity consists of two different versions of the editing software. Superficially they both look exactly the same, the difference is that one version of the program uses the Falcon's memory to store samples that it creates while the other version is the D2D variant of the program.

While other D2D systems for the Falcon have all followed each other down the path of DSP special effects, Clarity has concentrated on more functional sampling functions such as filters. The DSP effects are still there, Microdeal just haven't made a fuss about them. The Drumbeat MIDI sampling drum machine software is included as part of the package. At £99.95 for the complete package, it looks as though Microdeal are onto another winner. Watch out for the full review in *ST FORMAT* next month.

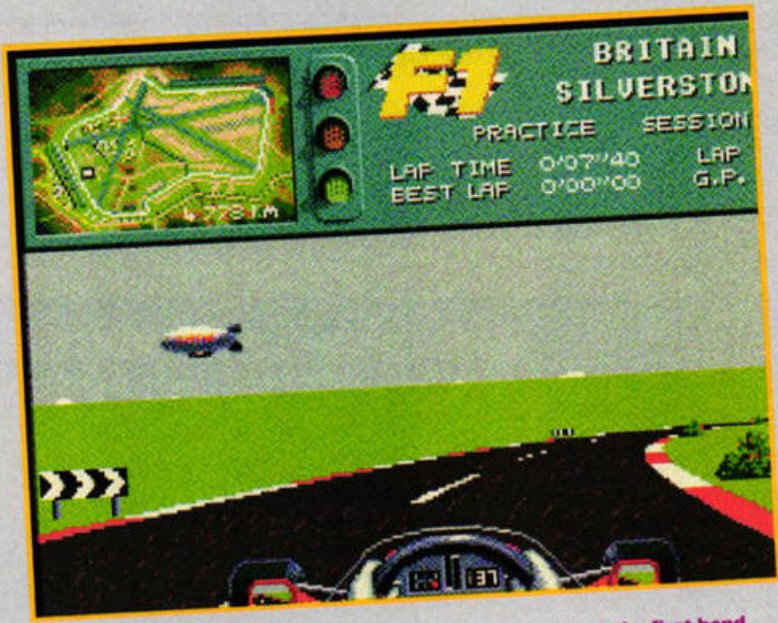

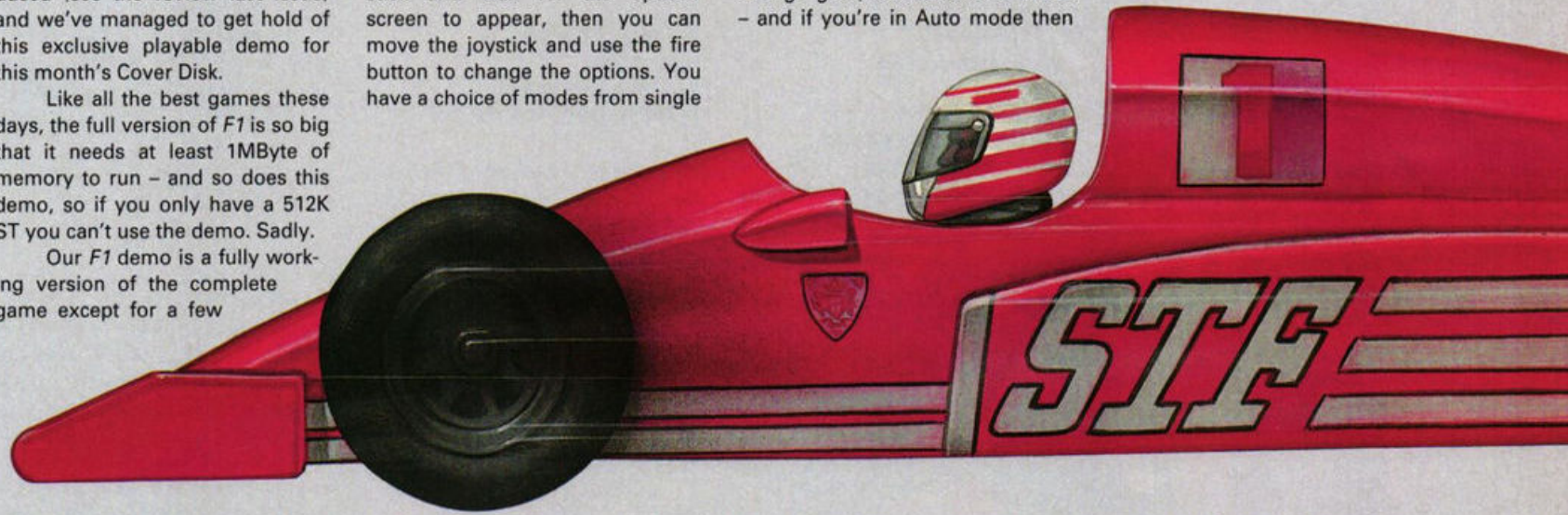

you don't even have to change gear, it's all done for you.

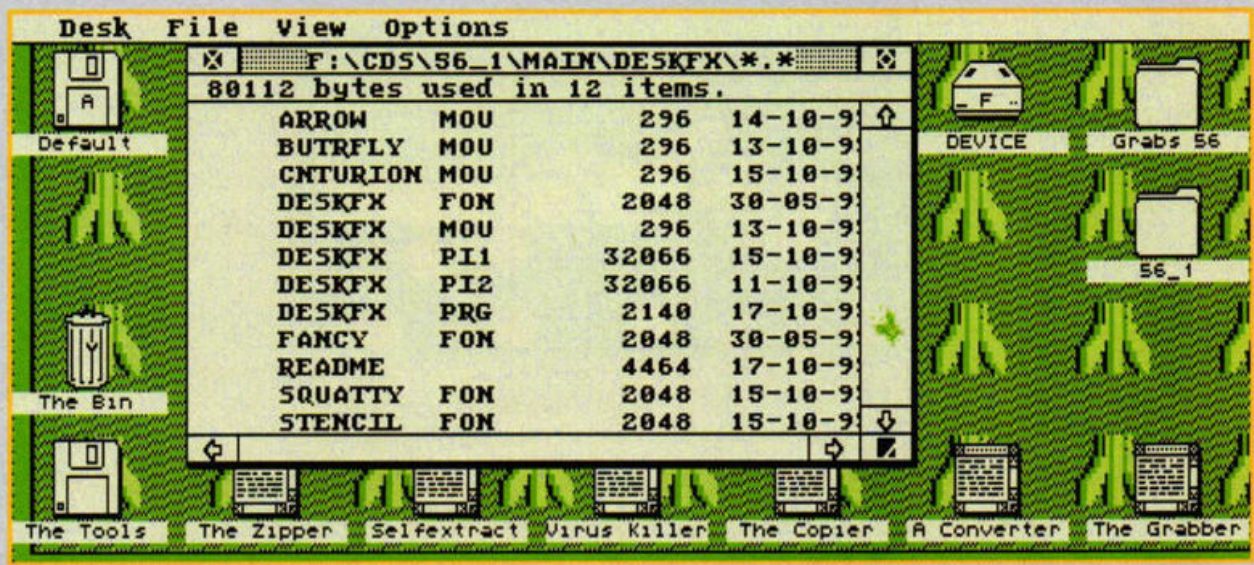

*The Never Ending Colouring Book (NECB)* has been designed with younger children in mind, it's

a simple-to-use art program that enables large line drawings to be coloured in using a simple point-and-click menu. As you get better at colouring in the pictures there are ten workscreens available enabling your own pictures to be designed and saved to disk that can be coloured in later.

The whole program is laid out in an easy to follow way, with large icons that even very young children can select easily with the mouse; it really is the ST equivalent of a colouring book and a lot less messy. Each picture you load triggers a different piece of background music, this is OK at first but soon begins to grate on your nerves after a time.

You can design your own pictures using *NECB* - there are ten screens left free for this purpose - using the two main drawing options, brush and pencil. Using the brush is the same as using the fill option on a conventional paint program to fill enclosed areas and you can use the pencil for finer detail. When you are designing on the workscreens it's best to use pencil mode and black ink to draw your pictures, but remember that when you save a new picture to disk, it over-writes the previous picture using the same file name and number. It's a good idea to get a collection of disks if you are going to produce lots of pictures.

## WHAT'S WHERE IN THE PICTURE

■ **Palette colours:**  
The currently selected colour is indicated by a white box around the chosen colour.

■ **Load picture:**  
Load a previously saved picture from disk.

■ **Look:** Display the current picture full screen.

■ **Brush:** Fill in enclosed areas of the picture with solid blocks of colour.

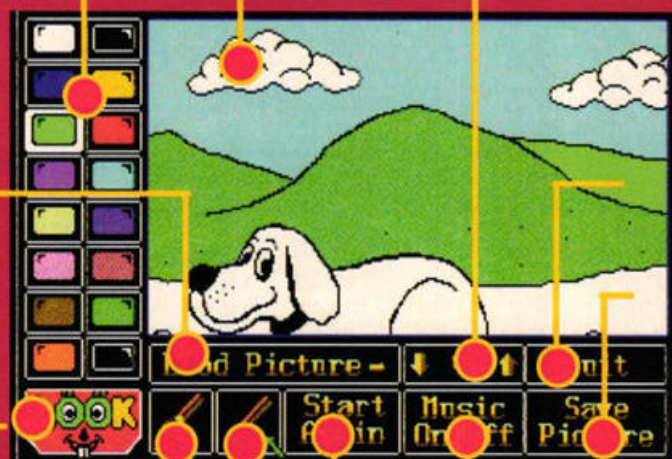
■ **Work window:** You can see the loaded picture through the square window.

Using *Boot 60Hz* enables you to run all your programs – including games – at 60Hz on most colour monitors and TVs. So what? we hear you cry. Well, running a monitor at 60Hz instead of the standard 50Hz reduces screen flicker and increases the height of the display on your screen resulting in a bigger picture. You don't get any extra pixels or increased screen resolution, the picture is stretched so that it fills the screen.

Some TVs may not be able to cope with the increased display frequency; a good rule of thumb is to check if your ST is connected to

your TV using a SCART socket, if it is then it should work without problems. Using 60Hz on a TV that can't cope with the higher frequency won't harm the TV, the picture just scrolls constantly until you reset your ST.

You must install the 60Hz boot program on a blank formatted disk, just follow these simple instructions. Run the BOOT60HZ.PRG on your backup copy of the Cover Disk and then wait for an alert box to appear. When the alert box appears put the blank disk in the drive and then click on the Understood box and the disk is modified. Click on OK to return to the Desktop.

To use your 60Hz boot disk put it in the disk drive and press the reset button, after *Boot 60Hz* runs eject the disk and insert your game disk and press <Return>. Your game now loads at the higher screen frequency.

**ST FORMAT warning: never use BOOT60HZ.PRG to modify any game disks because it destroys the game's boot code. You should only ever modify blank formatted disks.**

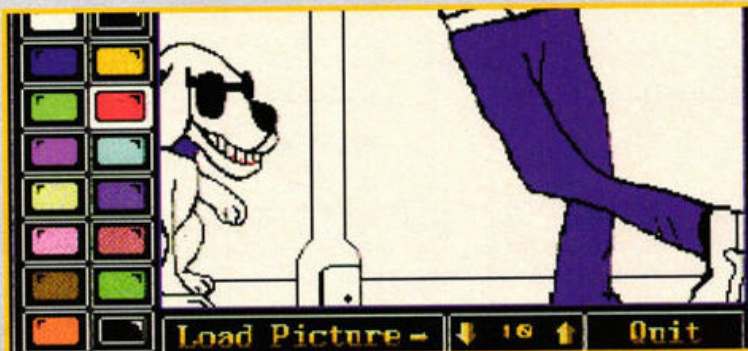


■ Screens one to ten are pre-designed pictures ready to be coloured in, screens 11 to 20 are blank work screens for you to create your own pictures.

To use the *Never Ending Colouring Book* copy the COLOUR folder, COLOUR.PRG and COLOUR.DOC from your backup Cover Disk to a blank disk – the program doesn't work if it's inside a folder so make sure you copy it directly to the blank disk. All you have to do now is double-click on COLOUR.PRG to

run the program. Everything is mouse controlled, use the left button to choose options and the right button to exit from the drawing screen to the main menu.

It's all very simple to use and – as long as you turn off the music option – provides hours you with of peaceful entertainment.

## EXTRACTING COMPRESSED PROGRAMS

*These decompressing instructions assume a single drive setup set to medium resolution*

- 1 Format a blank disk and mark it as Disk B. This is the destination disk.
- 2 Get your backup copy of your Cover Disk, mark it as Disk A then put it into the disk drive. This is your source disk.
- 3 Click on the Drive A icon, a window opens with the folders on the Cover Disk displayed within it. If you can't see the Drive B icon, move the window so you can see it.
- 4 Double-click on the folder containing the file you want to copy so you can see the contents. Click on the file you are going to copy and keep the mouse button pressed, now drag the file over the top of the Drive B icon.
- 5 When the Drive B icon turns black release the mouse button. The Copy Files dialog box

appears, click on OK to start the copy process.

- 6 An alert box appears telling you to put Disk B into Drive A. Do so, and click on OK. Your ST now tells you when to swap disks, follow the instructions on-screen and don't mix up the disks.
- 7 When the file is copied over completely, put the Cover Disk away and close all windows on screen. Put Disk B into the drive and click on the Drive A icon.
- 8 When the window opens double-click on the TOS file to start the extraction process, after a few minutes a message tells you to press <Return>. Follow the instructions – it knows best, you see.
- 9 You can now delete the TOS file from disk B. Follow the instructions in the magazine for the particular program you are using and read all doc files on the disk.
- 10 Repeat as necessary for any other self-extracting TOS files on the Cover Disk.

Many two disk games need loads of disk swapping during the game, resulting in long pauses while you swap disks and the drive re-reads the disk. Even if you have two disk drives you are normally stuck with using drive A because the programmers haven't bothered

to write any drive B code into the game. *Tandem* is a small program that fools your ST into thinking that drive A and drive B are a single disk drive, when it looks for a filename to load into a game your ST automatically searches both disk drives as if they were one, in effect creating a single superdrive.

*Tandem* enables you to use most two disk games – but not all of them – with both drive A and drive B with a disk in each drive, *Tandem* doesn't work with games that autoboot.

All you have to do is run TANDEM.PRG in drive A and then run your game as normal by double-clicking on its program icon. Now you can sit back and enjoy your game without all that tedious disk swapping.

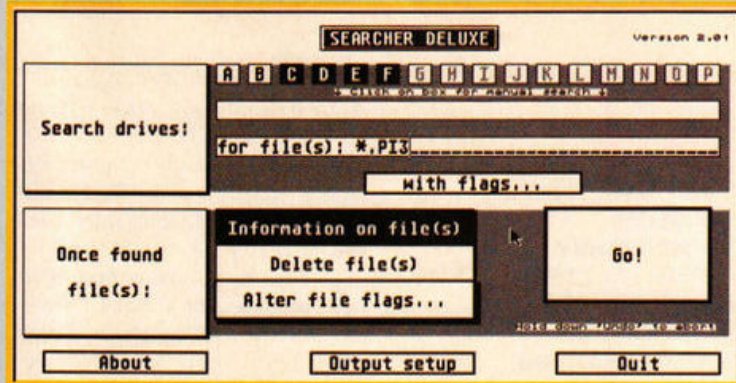
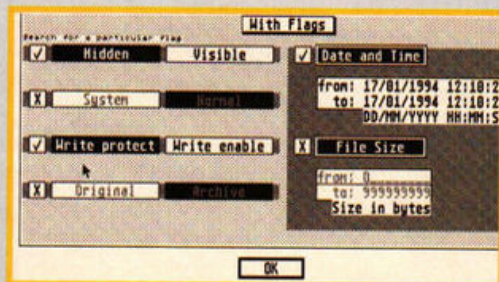
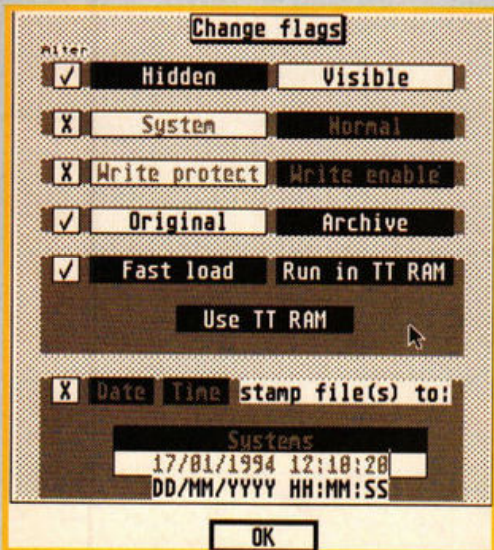
*Searcher Deluxe* is primarily designed to be used with hard drive systems but it can be just as useful to use it when you're working on your floppy disk files.

Apart from its file searching abilities, *Searcher Deluxe* has many more useful functions and utilities tucked away within itself, it's not just a standard file search utility. You can use all of the usual file searching wildcards, substituting <\*> and <?> for letters in the file name to find all possible matches. More useful than this is the ability to search by specific file attributes such as the date and time of a file, its size, if it's hidden, write-protected, a system or an archive file or any combination of all of these attributes.

As an example you could look for all files with the file extender .STF created between June 1 1993 and July 1

**You don't just have to view the files on-screen when you've found them, *Searcher Deluxe* enables you to delete files or change their attributes. You can hide files, write-protect them, enable them to use TT RAM with an Xtra-RAM +8 board fitted or modify files to the current date and time.**

**Search parameters can be entered using the program's flags screen, you can search for files created between two specific dates, look for files of a specific size or look for hidden, visible, system and normal files.**



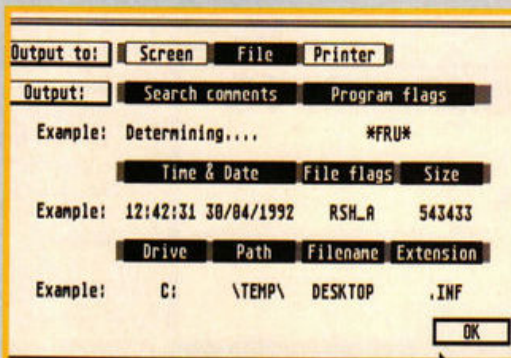
1993 that are between 5K and 10K in size. You can also use *Searcher Deluxe* to alter the attributes of any file it finds, you can update any file with a new set of attributes automatically as the program finds it. You could set up *Searcher Deluxe* to hide all *Degas* files created before 1 January 1994 leaving just the current files visible when you open a drive window. Another way to use *Searcher* is as a disk catalogue program, simply set up the program to output all the file and path names to disk or printer.

*Searcher* is compressed so we could fit it onto the disk, copy SEARCHER.TOS to a blank disk and then double-click on it to decompress it. *Searcher* automati-

cally unpacks itself ready to run, double-click on SEARCHER.PRG to run the program. Detailed instructions for using the many options are contained in the SEARCHER.TXT file that decompresses along with the program.

Remember, though, that *Searcher Deluxe* is a Shareware program, so if you find it useful send some cash to the author of the program; full details for registration are in the SEARCHER.TXT file on the disk.



**You can either view the output on-screen or send the data to a printer or a disk file for a more permanent record. You can use it as a disk catalogue utility, a file modification tool or just to search for files and programs, it's up to you.**

- Never run software directly from the Cover Disk except the *Back-Up* program, and always use your backup disk.
- Never try to decompress self-extracting TOS files on the Cover Disk, always copy them to a blank disk.

- If you can't load, copy or back up your Cover Disk programs then you may have a faulty disk - it happens sometimes.

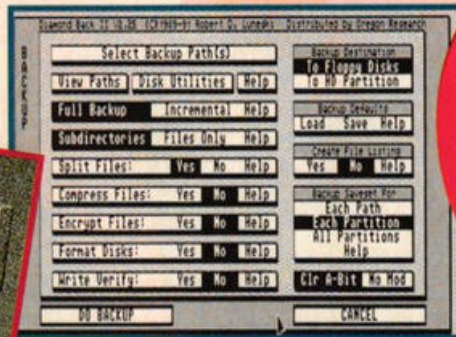
## ACCELERATORS

If you're using your ST to run serious software in a business then you really should install an accelerator of some kind, it speeds up your ST saving time on almost every application you use. The TinyTurbo series of hardware accelerators and the NVDI software accelerator are just about the best you can get, they are both available from System Solutions.

■ Sent under plain cover, NVDI is stuffed with fast routines to make your ST zip along.



in case your disk box is struck by lightning or some other unexpected tragedy. Once important data is damaged it's very hard to reconstruct it.



■ Making backups is the most important and the most ignored method of keeping your software safe from harm.

## BASIC

Learning BASIC is the easiest way to get started in programming, once you've learned how to structure a program in BASIC you can move on to learn C or assembly language.

## BOOT DISK

On a floppy based system it's a good idea to have different boot disks for different tasks, it's best if you use different Desk Accessories and Auto folder programs for graphics, DTP, word processing and MIDI.

## BOOT UP

Start up your ST by switching on the power (cold boot) or by pressing the reset button (warm boot). For safety reasons disks shouldn't be fully inserted in the drive for a cold boot because there is a chance that a power surge could cause a blank spot on your disk.

## CAD

Acronym for Computer Aided Design. There's only one CAD package around to speak of, which is GFA Draft Plus 3. ST FORMAT gave this away on the Cover Disk of issue 34, so you should be able to pick it up for a song. Contact GFA for further details.

## CHEAT

If you can't beat a game on your own, why not cheat? Try Gamebusters and Captain Blunder every month in ST FORMAT, or if you're really stuck in lots of games buy the Cheater's Digest from PJH Publishing.

## COMMS

One of the best ways of ensuring continuing massive profits for British Telecom, using a modem enables you to keep in contact with other ST enthusiasts around the world. If you want to access any of the larger networks (AtariNet, FidoNet) then always use a local BBS that is a node for the net you want to use, this helps keep the phone bill down.

## COVER DISK

Stick the ST FORMAT Cover Disk in your ST every month for the very best game demos and

serious software that can be found on any ST magazine.

## D2D

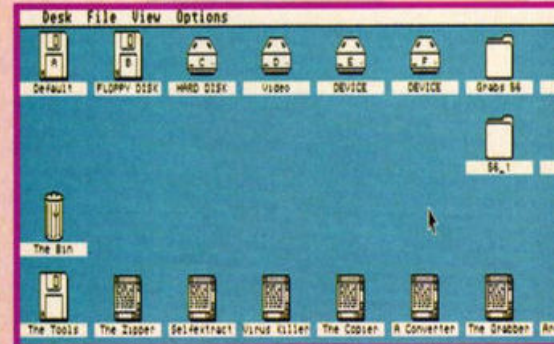
Acronym for direct-to-disk recording. The best package simply for D2D is 4T/FX by, er, D2D Systems. For £299 you can record up to four tracks of digital sound, just like a digital multi-tracker.

## DESK ACCESSORIES (DAS)

You can only load a maximum six Desk Accessories into memory at once, even this may be too many on a 520ST because each DA takes up valuable memory leaving less room for other software. Only load as many DAs as you need for a session; using a manager program like Superboot from the ST Club enables you to pick and choose the ones you need.

## DESKTOP

On versions of TOS above 2.05 you can customise the Desktop to suit your specific needs. A neat trick is to save many differently configured NEWDESK.INF files to disk and then edit their names to suit the particular setup. You could have DTP.INF, SAMPLE.INF, WP.INF setups and load them when you want them using Read INF File in the Options menu.



■ Installing your most used programs on the Desktop makes your ST easier to use.

## DIGITISING

To create good digitised images, you need a good quality video image to grab in the first place. If you grab from a slightly shaky video, you get a blurred image. Use a video player with a good freeze frame, or a video camera for the best results.

## DTP

Professional desktop publishing packages cost loads of money - the best is Calamus SL from JCA Europe but it costs £575. A slightly cheaper, but nonetheless excellent, option is Pagestream 2, available from Silica Systems for £169.

## EDUCATIONAL SOFTWARE

For 11 or 12 year olds, teach them maths and English using the ADI range of programs from Europress Software. Younger kids also

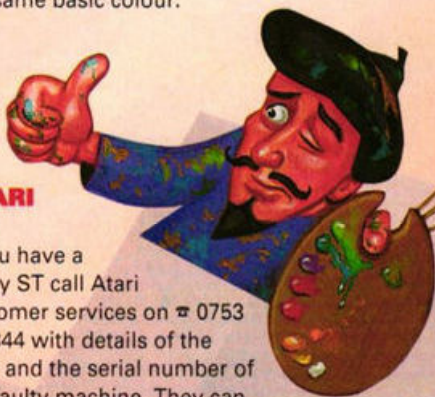

## ART

Best package: Degas Elite (First Computer Centre £24.99). You have a maximum of 16 colours with a standard ST, but striking effects can be created especially when using a combination of the same basic colour.



## ATARI UK

If you have a faulty ST call Atari customer services on 0753 533344 with details of the fault and the serial number of the faulty machine. They can provide you with a returns number and quote you the maximum cost of the repair.

## ASCII

ASCII (American Standard Code for Information Interchange) is an acronym to describe the accepted method of transferring text between different platforms. If you want to transfer text to a PC or Mac from your ST, then you must save it in ASCII format.

## BACKUPS

All your software should be backed up on a regular basis

get the full treatment from Europress with the *Fun School* range, starting from five years old. Both sets of programs cost £25.99.

## EMULATORS

You can run PC business software on your ST using a PC emulator. Remember you can't play PC games using an emulator; they're only designed to run business software. The PC Speed range from Compo Software includes one of the most reliable PC emulators you can get anywhere.

## FALCON

When choosing a Falcon get at least 4MBytes of RAM and a hard drive, a 1MByte Falcon without a hard drive is virtually useless.

## FLOPPY DISKS

Don't store any magnetic media near a television, monitor or audio speaker. The magnetic signals from these units can damage the disks.

## FLOPPY DRIVES

It's a fallacy that floppy drive heads should be cleaned using a head cleaning disk on a regular basis - the abrasive material used in cleaning disks can cause wear on the drive heads. Normal use keeps the drive heads clean.

## FORMATS

Fonts are more files that use up rakes of memory; only install the fonts you need for a particular document and you have more room to create multi-page masterpieces.

## FORMATTING

If you want to get more data on a disk then you need a special formatting program, *Fastcopy Professional* available from the ST Club enables you to create customised disk formats. Never try and format a disk beyond the capabilities of your disk drives - most drives have trouble with more than ten sectors and 82 tracks.

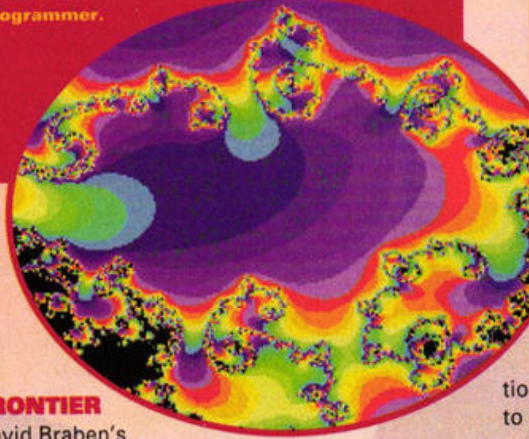
## FRAGMENTATION

After you've been using your hard drive for a few months, you see that data files takes longer to load and save. This is because when a drive starts to get full, big files may not be able to be stored as one long consecutive file but split into a series of chunks. This is called fragmentation. You can use *Diamond Edge* which costs £49.95 from Hisoft to fix a fragmented disk.

## FRACTALS

Fractals are mathematical equations which can be used to create beautiful graphic effects. For artists, this is a great way of creating new, original images - and it's amazing how easy they are to make. Try *Fractal Landscape* (see *ST FORMAT* issue 43) or a reputable Public Domain company for more inspiration.

Use mathematics to create beautiful fractal images such as this. Don't worry if you failed maths at school - all the hard work's done for you by the programmer.



## FRONTIER

David Braben's excellent space trading game is difficult to play at first. Increase your chances legitimately by selling your ship and buying a cheaper one, thus making lots of credits so you can buy and sell more goods. Call Gametek and have £29.99 ready to part with.



## GAMES

Play them. Lots of them, preferably until your eyes go square.

## GDOS

Only install GDOS if you intend to use it immediately because it uses up

valuable memory and is very slow.

SpeedoGDOS is fast but uses up even more memory and needs at least 2MBytes to run.

## GEM

The latest version of GEM still only permits a maximum of seven windows to be open. You can add a PD patch program to your Auto folder called *WINX* that enables you to open up to 40 GEM windows at any one time.

Just look at the state of this drive. File operations become very inefficient when a drive gets into this bad condition.

## GRAPHICS

Your ST is fairly limited with just 16 colours, but you can squeeze more out of it with the right art package. *Spectrum 512* at £31.19 from Silica is a program which gives you a palette of 512 colours, and a good range of features.

## HARD DRIVES

Treat hard drives with respect; never move them while they're running because you can cause a fatal head crash and destroy the disk platters inside. Yet another reason to back up your hard drive.

## HIGH DENSITY DRIVES

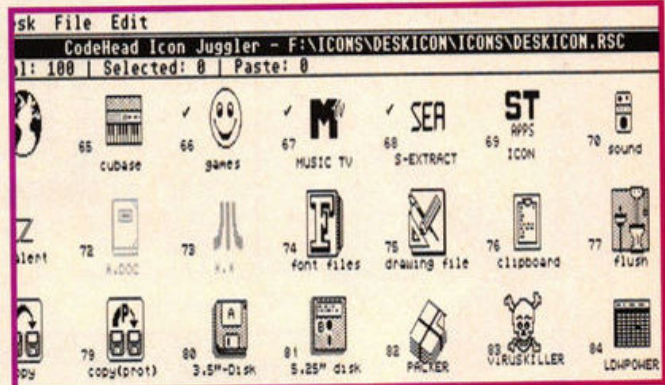
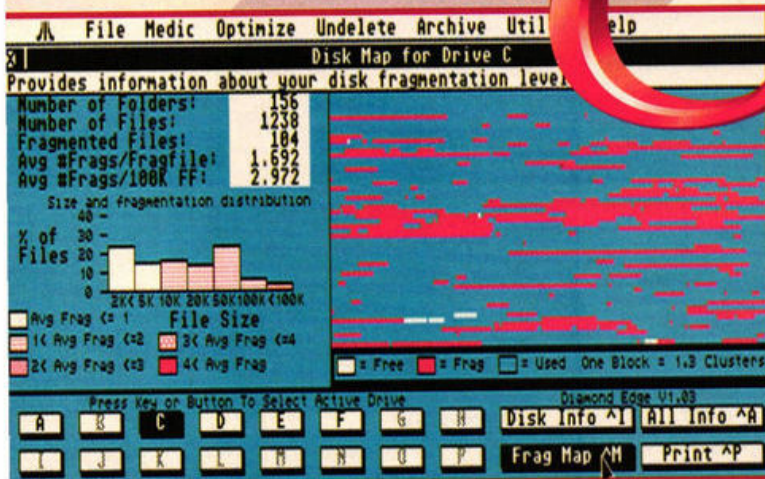
With file and program sizes getting bigger it's a good idea to add a high density drive to your ST, you can get twice as much information on a 1.44MByte high density disk compared to a standard 720K floppy. Analogic Computing supply a complete DIY HD drive kit for £69.95.

## ICD PROFESSIONAL

Hard drives deserve the best formatting and partitioning software available, and this is it. The *ICD Professional Hard Drive Utilities* (£39.95 from System Solutions) are the most comprehensive hard drive tools you can buy; using them you can format practically any SCSI drive and, combined with an ICD host adaptor, you can use your ST with optical, floptical and CD-ROM drives.

## ICONS

You can design your own screen icons for the TOS 2.06 and *NeoDesk* Desktops by using *Icon Edit* and *Make Icon*, two smart utilities both available from most PD libraries.



The ultimate in customisation, design your own unique Desktop icons to enhance your display. If you're stuck for good designs there are hundreds of icons available from PD libraries.

## IDE DRIVE

The IDE (Intelligent Drive Electronics) drive is the compact internal hard drive found in the Falcon. When you buy a Falcon get the largest capacity drive you can afford because you definitely need the space.

## JAGUAR

Buy one if you like games. Buy one if you don't like games, just in case you might one day.

## JIMMY WHITE'S WHIRLWIND SNOOKER

You can get Archer MacLean's great snooker sim to constantly make 147 breaks by using this cheat. On the main menu select Trickshot, then hit <F7>, <F4> and <F1> in sequence. Now go to the options menu, and select 147 break.

## JOYSTICKS

A good joystick is important if you're serious about games. Power Play produce the best range, including the Competition Pro 5000 (£13.99) and the Zipstick with autofire (£14.99).



**You must have a good joystick, but there are so many of them around where do you start? Try our tip for two of the best.**

## JPEG

Acronym for Joint Photographic Expert Group. One of the most efficient methods of compressing images, used by ST packages such as GEM View and True Paint.

## KBYTES (K)

Almost the same as a Megabyte (MByte) but 1,024 times smaller. One KByte is equal to 1,024 bytes of information.

## KNIFE ST

If you're trying to recover damaged or erased data then you need Knife ST (Hisoft 49.95), it's the most comprehensive and powerful disk recovery tool you can buy.

**Knife ST tells you everything you need to know about any disk, whether it's a floppy or a hard drive. Be careful though, it's dead easy to destroy data with a disk editor.**

## LANGUAGES

Learning a programming language is hell, all that GOSUBing and GO TOing really gets you confused. The best way to learn a language is to use subliminal tapes at night with a pillow speaker, the language is unconsciously absorbed by your pre-frontal cortex while you sleep. When you wake up you find you can program perfectly. With any luck.

## MAINTENANCE

It is important to look after your ST gear, so that it gives you years of trouble-free computing. The bits that need most attention are the moving parts

such as floppy and hard drives, and printers. Give your printer a spring clean every couple of months with some compressed air (£4.75 from Maplin's). Don't use disk head cleaners too often - floppies don't get dirty very quickly. If you have a hard drive, give it a once-over every few months using a program such as Diamond Edge.

## MBYTES

The more MBytes of RAM in your ST the better. You can run bigger games, more powerful applications and make bigger sound samples.

## MICE

Mice are nice but the original ST rat is sooooo slooooo. Get yourself a 400dpi mouse and the mouse cursor zooms across the screen, especially in high resolution mode. Gasteiner, Analogic, WeServe and First Computer Centre all sell quality 400dpi mice for under £20.



## MIDI

Acronym for Musical Instrument

Digital Interface. Connecting a MIDI-compatible keyboard to your ST is pretty easy, but if you connect both MIDI In and Out, and you play a note on your keyboard, the ST echoes that note back to your synth, so playing it twice. Make sure that you set the Local Echo option on your sequencer to Off.

## MODEMS

The best advice for you if you're into comms is to buy the fastest modem you can afford and to log on during the cheap rate periods - this keeps the cost of your calls down.

## MONITORS

Using a TV is fine if you only play games on your ST, but for graphics or word processing

## ON-LINE

A variety of games are available which you can play using your ST linked to other users by a modem. They are all provided by On-Line Entertainment, but it costs lots of money. You can connect two

STs together and play games such as *Vroom* from UBI Soft and *Populous* from Bullfrog, though, which is fun.

## PALETTE

Choosing your palette carefully is important to create good pictures from your art package.

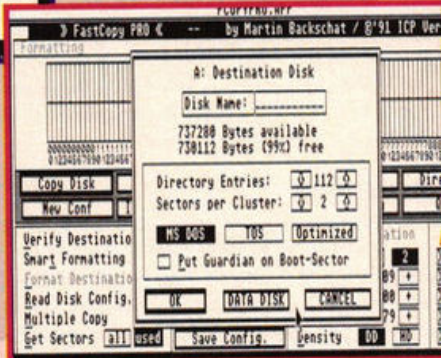
You only have 16 colours, so you must make sure that you have necessary colours before you start to create your basic drawing. Then you can choose your secondary colours from the remaining palette.

## PARASOL STARS

The thing to remember in this game is that gold rods change dead creatures into magic coins, while yellow lamps change secret food into magic coins. Collect both items when you can.

## PC FORMAT

If you want to transfer files to or from a PC you need a PC formatted disk. You can either use the Desktop formatting option on TOS versions 1.4 and higher or use a special formatting program like *Fastcopy Professional* for £24.95 from the ST Club.



■ Probably the fastest way to back disks, up *Fastcopy Pro* formats to PC standards.

## PIRACY

Copying ST programs and giving them to other people is illegal. If you want to make a-backup for yourself then that's fine, but piracy of games has all but killed off the ST games market so don't be tempted. If somebody offers you a pirated program, tell them to get knotted!

## POPULOUS 2

To cast lightning without using any mana, move over your target, press your mouse button, then

hold down <1> and then release the mouse button. The lightning continues until you press a mouse button again. Hold down <F9> to increase your mana.

## PRINCE OF PERSIA

Press <Shift> and <L> to skip levels.

## PROGRAMMING

When you start writing a program in any language you can't just start typing in data at line one and hope everything works out OK in the end; you've got to sit down and plan the program from start to finish before you enter a single line of code. Dedication's what you need. Oh, and lots of coffee.

## PUBLIC DOMAIN

A great way of getting cheap or free software, including games, utilities and demos. Contact a reputable PD house for a catalogue, such as ST Club, Goodmans and 16/32 - check out our list on page 35 for more libraries.

## QUADRALIEN

## QUIT

Usually the last thing you do when running a program; always make sure that you've saved your work before you select the Quit option otherwise all your hard work vanishes in a big puff of logic.

MultiTOS is too large and too slow to run on an ST because it's designed for 68030 processors. If you want to multi-task with your ST then get *Geneva* (£59 from Compo), it's the new ST compatible multi-tasking operating system.

## MUSIC

There's no more enjoyable hobby than creating music using a computer, because it requires very little music knowledge. Your ST is the best equipped computer there is for making music, so buy yourself a MIDI keyboard and a sequencer, and get composing!

## NETWORKING

Using a network in your office can save you money because each ST on the network can use the same hard drive, printer or modem.

## NETWORKS

Not to be confused with office networks, comms networks link

thousands of BBSs together all over the world enabling you to get the latest ST PD and Shareware software almost as soon as it's available.

**RAM**

Random Access Memory is where programs and data files are stored while a program is running; when you turn off your ST any data in RAM vanishes – including viruses. If you add a memory board upgrade to your Falcon, make sure the SIMMs you use for it are rated at 70ns or faster.

**RAYTRACING**

If you're interested in graphics and art, raytracing is a great area to explore. However, creating a raytraced image is a complicated procedure, so it's useful to get a basic program to get your started. *Realistic Raytracer*, a Public Domain program from LAPD, is a great introduction. If you want something more advanced, try *Xenomorph* (£79) from 16/32 Systems.

**RESOLUTIONS**

On colour systems you sometimes need to boot in low resolution and at other times in medium resolution. It's a good idea to have separate boot disks handy with low and medium DESKTOP.INF files saved on them.

**RETOUCHING**

You can retouch your scans and digitised images using an ordinary paint program, but if you're serious about it you might want to go for *Retouche* (£299 for mono and £499 for colour packages including *Didot Professional* from CGS Computerbild). This package contains the usual painting features, but also some image processing functions such as blur and sharpen, to really get your images looking good.

**ROM**

ROM stands for Read Only Memory and is where data is permanently stored; the TOS chips in your ST are ROM devices.



**SAMPLING**

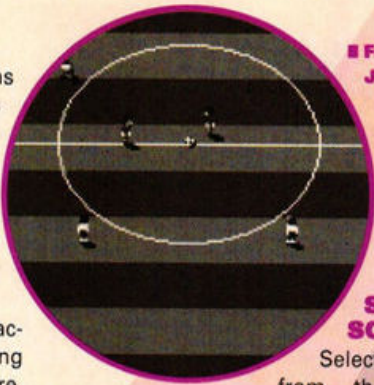
If you need a sampler for use with a tracker program to create demos, then choose a cheap 8-bit stereo sampler such as *Stereo Replay* from Hisoft/AVR (£89.95). For more professional quality there is *Replay 16* (£129.95), also from Hisoft/AVR, which gives you CD-quality sampling but it's mono only. With *Replay 16* you can transfer samples to and from a professional sampler such as the Akai S1000, for easy sample editing.

**SCANNING**

You can get great scans from a hand-held scanner such as the Golden Image Scanner from Gasteiner (£119), as long as you take your time and keep a steady hand. This scanner is quite small so for larger images you may have to do several scans, or you could go for the Daatascan A4 from City Beat, which is larger but costs a whopping £499.95.

**SECRET OF MONKEY ISLAND**

**SENSIBLE SOCCER**

Select Custom Teams from the menu, then choose England and West Germany for a friendly. Start the game, and be prepared to warp back in time to 1966...

**SEQUENCER**

The ST is the most popular music sequencer, so there are plenty of programs to choose from. *Cubase* from Steinberg is the musicians' choice, but it sets you back £399. The excellent budget-orientated *Sequencer One* from Gajits can be picked up for around £40, but for real value-for-money, buy issue 54 of *ST FORMAT* from our back issue service on page 60. That way you get the *KCS Omega* sequencer, worth £275, for just the price of the magazine!

**SIM CITY**

Type MONEY while playing for an extra \$10,000. Keep typing it for extra money, but enter it too often, and you suffer an earthquake.

**SIMMs**

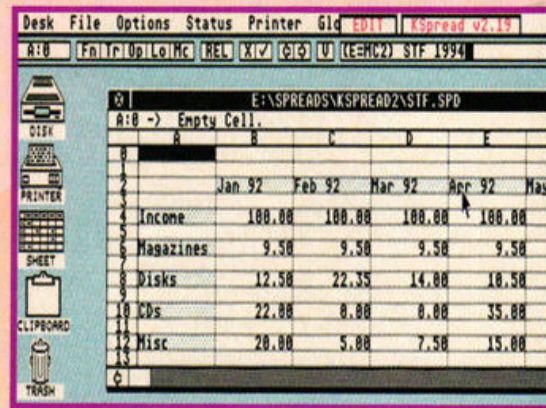
Your STE has SIMMs (Single Inline Memory Module) sockets so you can just plug in any extra memory you need. Shop around for the best prices for 1MByte SIMMs because prices fluctuate wildly.

**SPEEDBALL 2**

From *Speedball 2*, make a saved game of the league or cup on a blank disk. Load up *Knife ST* (from *ST FORMAT* issue 42), and insert your saved game disk. Select Read from the menu bar, and select Physical Sector. Press <Return> when you're given the choice of sector. Go to the Commands menu and select Edit Buffer. Now change all 64s on that page to FFs. Select Save Buffer again via the Commands menu, then press <Return>. Now load up *Speedball 2* and load in your tweaked Save Game.

**SPREADSHEETS**

Using a spreadsheet can get very confusing especially if you accidentally over-write a previous version of a calculation; always save important documents with consecutively numbered filenames every time you make an alteration or an update.



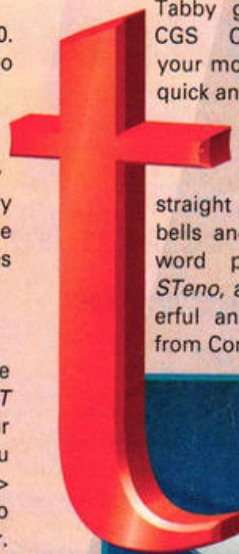

**TEXT EDITORS**

If you need to produce straight ASCII text files without all the bells and whistles associated with a word processor, then you need *STeno*, an inexpensive (£17.95), powerful and well designed text editor from Compo Software.

**TOS**

If you have an older STFM then it makes sense to upgrade to at least TOS 1.4 for its improved file handling abilities. Another alternative is to add TOS 2.06 and a TOS switcher enabling you keep your old TOS for compatibility and reap the benefits of the latest ST version of TOS. Both Compo Software and Analogic Computing supply STFM TOS switcher boards. Prices start at around £69.95.

**TRACKER**

A tracker is a mini-sequencer, which you can use to link together samples to make a tune. Available from the Public Domain, they are a great introduction to computer music, and you can use the tunes in your *STOS* programs, games and demos. Contact a large Public Domain library for details.





## UPGRADING

While the ST is a powerful computer in its own right it still makes sense to upgrade the memory, add a colour graphics card or add a hardware accelerator to really exploit its potential.

Today's professional standard software demands maximum hardware capabilities from your ST.

## UVK V6

The *Ultimate Virus Killer* at £9.95 from Douglas Communications is the best virus protection program you can get and it's just been completely re-written. Our tip is "buy this program today."

## VIEW 2

If you've ever wanted to view picture files just by clicking on them, then *View 2* (£14.95 from the ST Club) is potentially the most useful little utility you can add to your system. Taking up no memory at all on a hard drive system and about 64K on a floppy system, *View 2* enables *Degas*, *Neochrome*, *Spectrum 512*, *Cyber* sequences and sound samples to be accessed by a simple double-click.

## VIEWERS

Use the Shareware program *GEM View* to convert brilliant graphics from other platforms to file formats suitable for your favourite ST art program. It's the most versatile picture converter you can get for your ST or Falcon.

## VIRUSES

Dangerous viruses aren't as common on the ST as they are on other platforms, but it still makes good sense to write-protect all disks and make regular backups of important data. Always check out any PD or Shareware disks you are sent with your virus killer program.



## WIZKID

On the first round, in Head mode, get as much cash together as you can. When you get to the shop, buy a star but don't treat yourself to any other goodies. Pull the joystick down to summon the shop balloon, and once again buy only a star. If you still

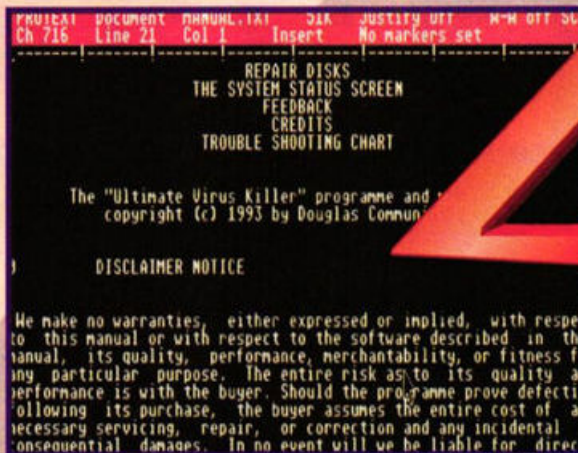

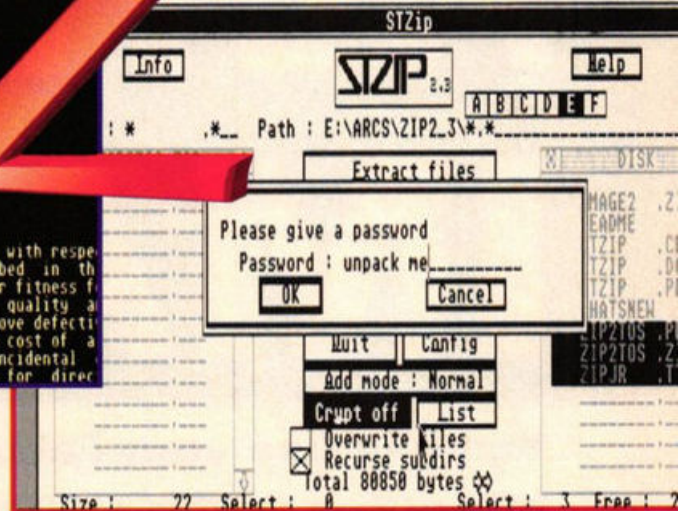

When using the Public Domain program *ST Zip* you can use a special encryption routine to protect your archives so they can only be unpacked with a secret password.

## ZMODEM

Just about the most intelligent comms protocol there is; if it's available on any BBS you contact then use it - it's practically automatic.

## ZOOL

looks pretty outdated already with every other TV commercial or new science fiction series using the latest morphing techniques. The technology is now advancing so quickly that the amazingly life-like computer generated dinosaur effects used in the film *Jurassic Park* were considered to be impossible to achieve when the film was in the early planning stages just one year previously.

Obviously the Falcon and ST aren't up to *Jurassic Park* standards when it comes to image processing, though you can still produce some brilliant results using the 24-bit colour packages now appearing for the Falcon and even the ST can generate and process some pretty damn good mono graphics.

#### Falcon processing

The Falcon is the graphics flagship of the Atari range of computers, its 32MHz, 24-bit DSP enables it to cope with highly complex graphics calculations in a fraction of the time that even 486DX PCs take to process information.

The basic setup you need for a good graphics workstation is a Falcon with 4MBytes of RAM, at least a 100MBytes internal hard drive for all the software you're going to need, SVGA monitor and a standard Atari monitor. You need two monitors because some Falcon true colour screen resolutions are only possible with the standard

# ALTERED IMAGES

**You can use your Falcon or ST to generate top-notch professional standard images, Clive Parker takes a look at what's on offer**

**S**tunning graphics are what people want to see on their screens, and the Falcon's true colour mode provides exactly that.

The ability to display high resolution photographic quality pictures from floppy disk, hard drive and Kodak Photo-CD brings graphic workstation style power to a home computer for the first time. With its built-in hard drive, DSP and optional 68882 co-processor, the Falcon is just the machine to take advantage of a gap in the market for a medium priced graph-

ics engine. All that's needed to make the most of this potential market is the imaging software to show off the Falcon's abilities – and that's now starting to arrive.

#### Image processing

In its simplest form, image processing is just taking a picture and altering it in some way using a specially written program. The modification may be as simple as changing the colour of the palette or something more complicated such as treating the image so it looks as though it's a water-colour

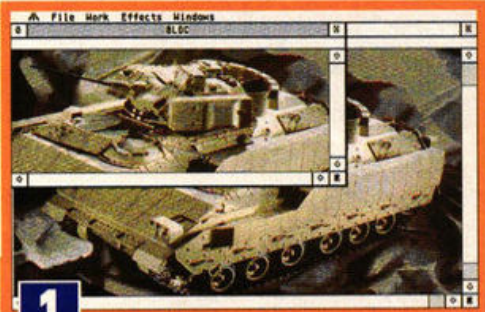
painting washed with water to give a smeared effect. These kind of effects – and hundreds more – are used by professional graphics artists and studios to produce the brilliant images we see daily on TV, films, in magazines and in advertising. You get so used to seeing these amazing images that your mind takes in the impossible and accepts it as normal.

The morphing effects used in *Terminator 2* were impossible five years before the film was made because computers just weren't powerful enough then – and it



# HOW TO MAKE A TANK LOOK MORE ATTRACTIVE WITH THE FALCON

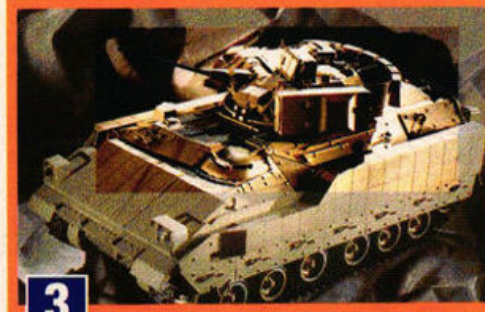
Just to show you how easy it is to use an image processing program, here's a simple example using Compo's Studio Photo to alter a picture to give it much greater impact. Almost any image can be improved in some way



**1** Load the picture you're going to work on and select the area you are going to modify, this appears in a separate window ready to be manipulated.



**2** Choose the effect you are going to use from the Effects menu, some functions have sub-menus offering extra parameters to change the strength of the effect.



**3** We've chosen a contrasting option for the area worked on, and pasted the modified area into the original position on the picture so you can see the difference.

Atari box. If you bear in mind that true colour graphics files can be up to 1MByte in size you can understand why you are likely to need an extra external hard drive for more data storage.

A small graphics tablet like the Tabby (£49.99 from CGS ComputerBild and JCA Europe) is a big help when creating freehand graphics, and some of the new processing software being developed needs a 68882 co-processor installed, this just plugs into a socket beneath the power supply.

All this power adds up to a workstation almost powerful enough to take on a professional Silicon Graphics Indy Workstation at its own game but at a fraction of the cost. The Falcon is obviously more versatile than the ST when it comes to image processing and the range of functions and effects found in the various packages

## HINTS 'N' TIPS FOR IMAGE PROCESSING

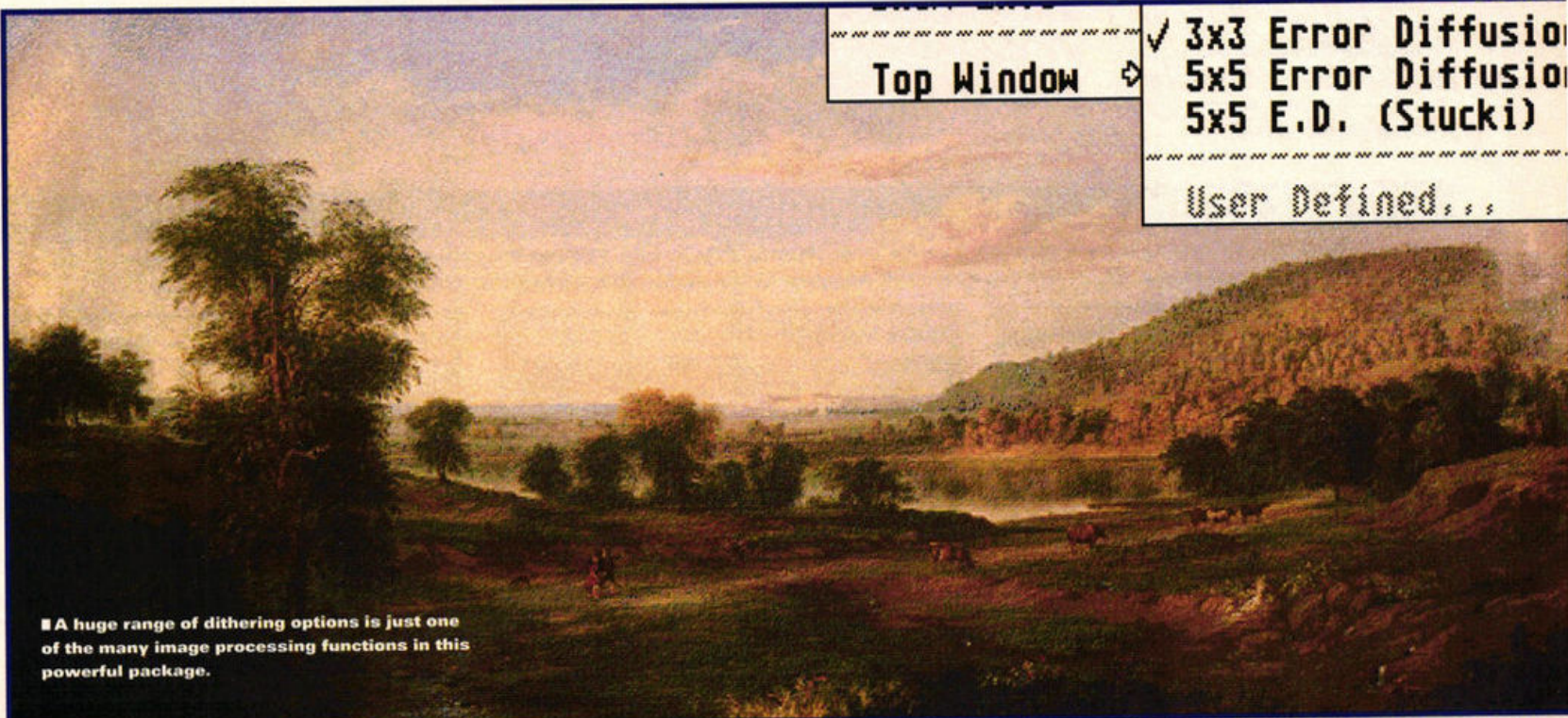
- 1** Get the best system you can afford, it's false economy to get less RAM or a smaller hard drive just to save yourself a few pounds.
- 2** You need both VGA and RGB monitors to use the full range of screen modes possible from your Falcon.
- 3** Register your software, this ensures that you're always kept up to date with the latest version and get full technical support.
- 4** Don't try to be too ambitious when you are modifying an image, if you go too far you could ruin the image.
- 5** Always work on a backup image, never modify an original. It's not worth the risk.
- 6** Using *Imagecopy 2 Colour* (£20, from the ST Club) you can print full colour images on a colour printer even using a mono ST.
- 7** Some software can only use a limited number of image formats, check which ones are supported by a program before you buy it.
- 8** Using contrast and darken functions is a good way to clean up dithering in a colour GIF or JPEG image converted to mono on the ST.
- 9** If you haven't got NVDI (£49.95, System Solutions) then get it, the increased screen update speed is a real time saver when working with graphics, especially on an ST.
- 10** For freehand work you can't beat the Tabby graphics tablet, for £50 you get a brilliant graphics tool and you can still use your mouse.

reflect this. Obviously different packages have different functions and features ranging from simple lightening and darkening of a pic-

ture to morphing effects and texture mapping an object or shape.

The ST isn't powerful enough to be a true image processing

workstation in its own right, but there's some good software around that enables the ST to perform excellent mono image pro-

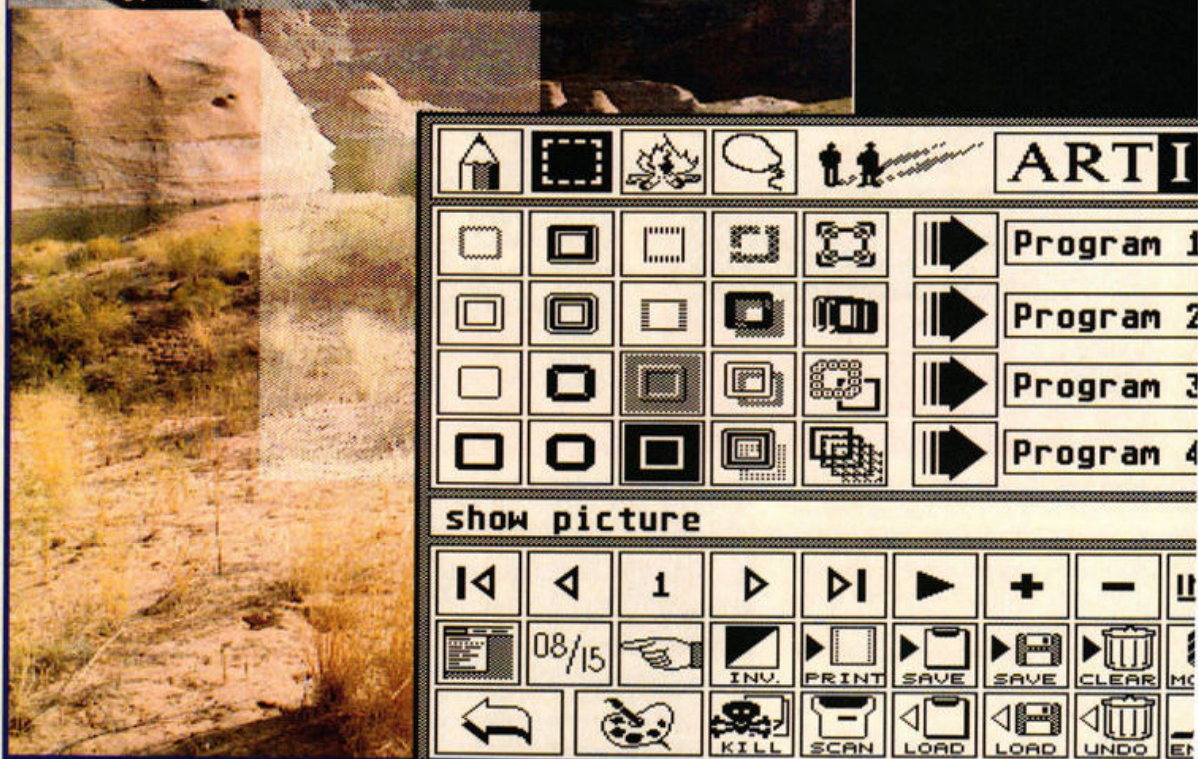
cessing. Some of the new Falcon programs available like *Prism Paint 2* and *Studio Photo* work well on the ST too. To use your ST effectively for image processing you can get by with a surprisingly basic hardware setup. A minimum 1MByte of memory is recommended if you intend doing any serious work on your ST, a high resolution mono monitor and a hard drive are also necessities to image processing. You can just about manage with a pair of floppy drives but your work rate is dramatically slowed down by the irritating length of time it takes to run software and load or save images.

Because the ST can only really work with high resolution mono images you may think that there's not much call for this kind of setup. In fact, many professional and semi-professional artists use mono ST systems to produce their artwork (see the feature in *STF* issue 49, turn to page 58 if you missed it) because mono graphics provide great visual impact, mono graphic design is still just as popular as colour and works out a lot cheaper for the graphics artist.

Apart from the standard graphic functions, image processing software adds many more exotic functions to the artist's toolbox. Images can be darkened, lightened or smeared with water effects to soften harsh outlines. You can use other effects such as charcoal, brushes, masks and block functions to alter complete images or use zoom functions so you can concentrate on specific areas of the picture you're working on.

With new versions of *Retouche Professional* and *Didot Professional* promised soon by CGS ComputerBild, and both *Prism Paint 2* and *Studio Photo* available now, it looks like there's still a bright rosy future ahead for ST image processing. **stf**

Some programs have greater control over a function than others, *Prism Paint 2's* lighten function simply changes every other pixel to white. To be fair, it is designed more as a drawing program than an image processing package.



## JARGON BUSTERS

**8-bit graphics:** Picture files capable of using up to 256 colours.

**24-bit graphics:** Picture files capable of using up to 16.7 million colours.

**Blur:** Alters an image to give a soft focus effect.

**Contrast:** Increasing the contrast in a picture can reduce dithering effects for a sharper picture.

**Darken:** Makes an image darker.

**Despeckle:** Gets rid of pixels, to make a cleaner image.

**Diffuse:** Another method of softening an image.

**Dither:** A method of reducing the number of colours in a picture.

**Emboss:** Converts an image so it looks as if its outlines have been embossed onto paper.

**GIF:** Graphic Interchange Format, file format created by CompuServe to transfer graphic files between platforms.

**JPEG:** Joint Photographic Expert Group, compressed file format agreed internationally.

**Lighten:** Makes an image lighter.

**Mask:** Method of overlaying patterns or graphics over an image, but still letting the original image show through.

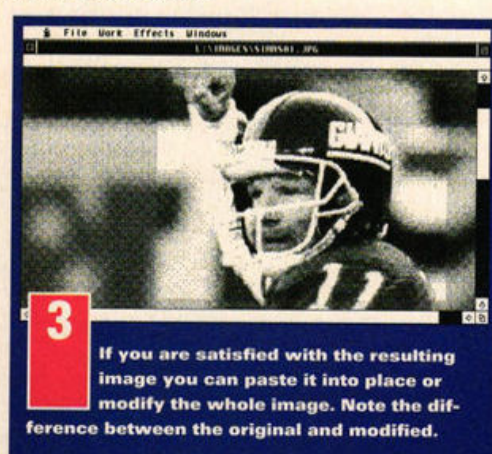
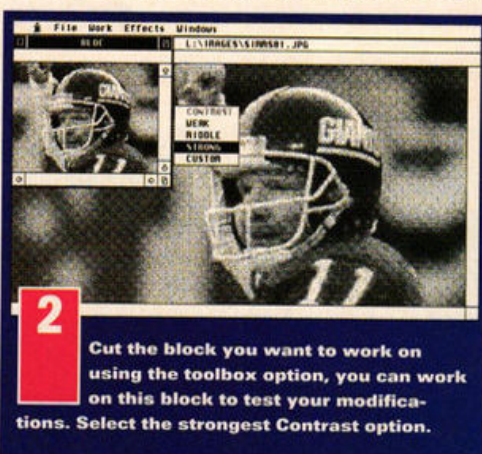
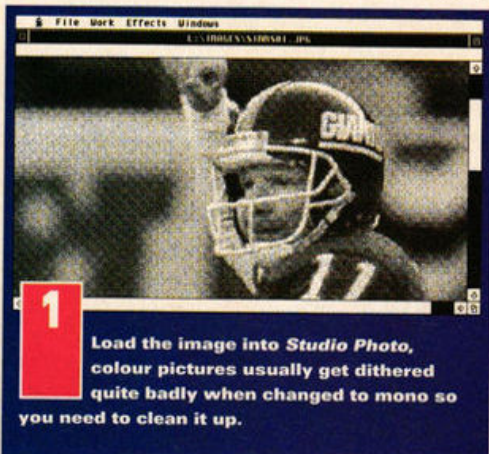
**Mosaic:** Expands the pixels in an area to give a blocky effect.

**TGA:** Truevision Targa format. Created by Truevision in the USA, Targa pictures can be up to 24-bit.

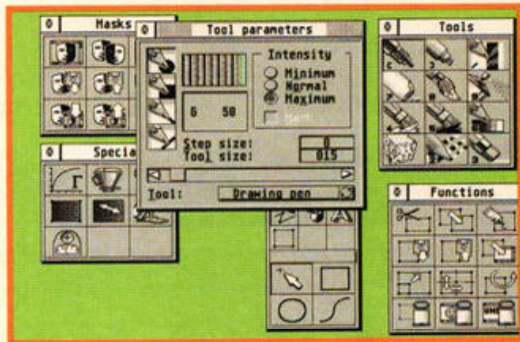
## CHAGALL CGS ComputerBild

*Chagall* is the long awaited 24-bit image processing program from CGS ComputerBild. It has a comprehensive range of functions and add-on modules that makes it just

about the most powerful image processing package around for the Falcon at the moment.

One of its more powerful functions is its masking abilities; you can define a specific mask and paint it over an image to give it a window effect. *Chagall* works on the Falcon and STs with colour graphic cards. Reviewed next month.

■ You can call up *Chagall's* toolboxes and dialog screens at any time while you are working on an image, most tools have a range of sub-menus available.



## TRUE IMAGE Hisoft AVR

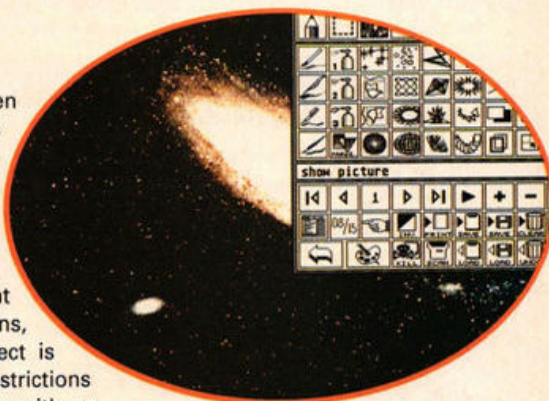

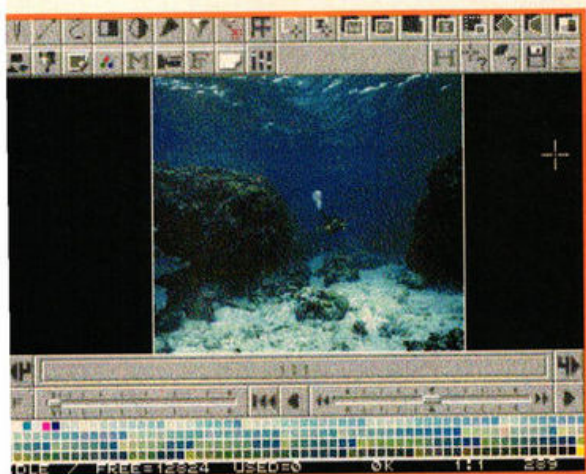

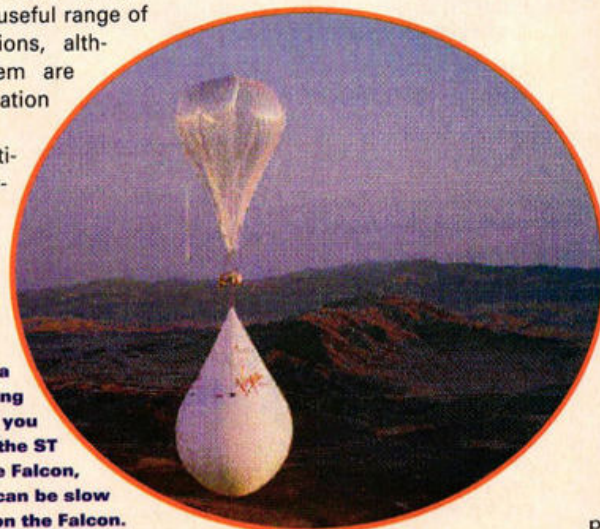

# PUBLIC SECTOR



**Four pages of PD are yours, folks, as we discover just what PD is and review the good, bad and ugly programs from this month's free batch...**



**P**ublic Sector is the section of the magazine where we take a look at the best and worst of the new software available in the Public Domain. PD veterans should already know all about Public Domain software and how it works, but the the subject can be a bit daunting for first-timers. So, further down the page we blow the lid on Public Domain, and explain the jargon.

and the rest pays for the company's overheads and expenses.

Later, some programmers considered that they should be paid some money for their work, but they didn't want to sell their programs commercially. So, they put a clause in their Public Domain releases which said if you use their program, then you are obliged to pay a small fee directly to the programmer. This became known as Shareware.

is not to be scared. It's merely a collection of music, graphics, utilities and games which hobbyists throughout the world have written and chosen to distribute rather than sell. The concept is very simple: if a programmer, artist or musician creates something that people might want, but wouldn't necessarily pay for, then the Public Domain is a good way of distributing it to a wider audience.

It's because of this that such a broad range of programs can be found. If you want a patch editor program for a specific synthesizer, say, then contact a PD library and the chances are they've got the program for you. Go into a shop to buy one, however, and you probably can't get one at any price. Similarly with music and graphics - if you want some music to play, some graphics to look at, or some programs to create them, then PD is the place to find them.

Most PD libraries are more than happy to help you in your search for a particular program; while of course *ST FORMAT* review a few PD programs every month. Take the first step by ringing or writing to a PD library from our PD Directory on page 35, and you may wonder what you did without it. Read on for the latest reviews of the PD releases. **stf**

### What is PD?

Public Domain libraries have been around since the early '80s covering all sorts of home computers, so it's only natural that several were set up to cover the ST market. The idea of Public Domain is to distribute programs at no cost, so that swapping all your programs with your friends is perfectly legal. Public Domain libraries charge a small fee for their programs, but the majority of the money pays for the floppy disks,

Now, many years later, we have four different types of program which still reside under the Public Domain banner, albeit loosely. Freeware programs are distributed for absolutely no cost; PD authors can ask for some money from users, but it's not obligatory; with Shareware you are obliged to pay a set fee if you find the program useful; and Licenceware programs are sold as commercial software by some PD companies. Phew! You generally find that Licenceware games and programs are better quality than the others, but even so don't expect commercial quality - after all, we're still only talking about a few quid for each disk.

## AT-A-GLANCE JARGON

### Demo

A collection of demonstrations showing the ST's capabilities. Sometimes music, graphics, occasionally both. There are hundreds of demos available which run on all models of ST and Falcon. Sometimes demos of full-price software are available.

### Freeware

Any program which may be distributed freely within the Public Domain, with no profit made from sales is known as Freeware.

### Licenceware

A kind of budget range of commercial software, Licenceware is distributed by some PD libraries.

### Shareware

Programmers sometimes include a clause with their programs which asks that people who like and use their software should send them a small fee.

### Virus

Something to beware of when using Public Domain programs. Occasionally

nasty people put viruses on their or other people's programs, which are then distributed into the Public Domain. It's worth making sure that you switch your ST off for around 30 seconds or so before and after using programs, especially Public Domain ones. By doing this you're simply trying to make sure that the memory is completely clear. There's nothing to lose any sleep over. As far as we know, there has never been a damaging ST virus, but it's worth taking this precaution just in case.

## BOBBY NESS CLIP-ART LAPD, DISK A 83

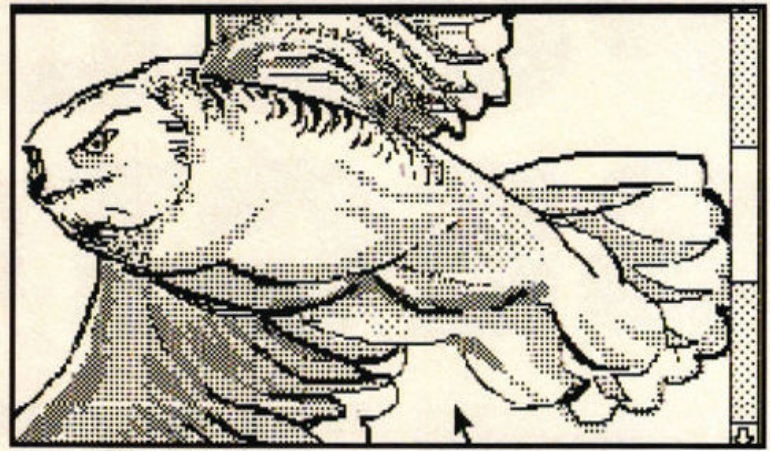
Creating a poster or a newsletter can be problematic if you can't draw successfully. However great your layout and word content are, if it doesn't look good the chances are it won't get a second glance, for example, just imagine how this page would look if was just filled with words.

An excellent solution to this problem comes in the form of clip-art. Several disks are available from most PD libraries, containing several pictures of everyday objects, which you can use to brighten up your cre-

ation. This particular disk contains getting on for 100 images, all in monochrome only. Subjects range from girls to fast cars, animals to, er, nude girls. It's a little bit like buying a copy of *Playboy*, actually (that is, assuming that the copy happens to be in black and white and all the pics are hand-drawn.)

Although the images of women are absolutely atrocious (opinion has it that an orang-utan armed with an Etch-a-Sketch could do better), the inanimate objects are not bad at all. If you require a monochrome picture of a night owl or a 1940 V12 Aston Martin Lagonda, then look no further.

## KCS OMEGA UTILITIES CALEDONIA, PDL DISK MU-60

Caledonia's *KCS Omega* Utility disk contains a set of programs and files designed to be used in conjunction with *KCS Omega* (*ST FORMAT* Cover Disk 54). The first of the two utilities, *Decitala*, contains a complete set of the rhythmic motifs used in Indian music, you can load the file DECITALA.ALL directly into the

SongEdit module of *KCS Omega*. A full description of the structure of Indian music is supplied in the accompanying text file.

The other folder contains files for Microtones, Temperaments and the Programmable Variations Generator, when decompacted the contents of this folder fills four double-sided disks. Using these files enables you to use alternative scales to the familiar 12 note octave found on a keyboard, in effect creating your own scales "between the keys" of the keyboard. Several scaling systems are included for you to use including puretone and Pythagorean scales. Full – and we mean full – explanations of the scales and how they are created are contained in a huge manual, along with instructions for using the scales on your synth. This is one set of files that appeals to theoretical musicians but not many others, and an enormous amount of work has gone into creating the data on this disk.

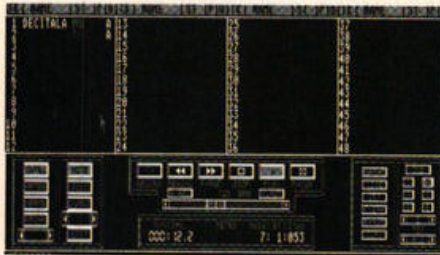

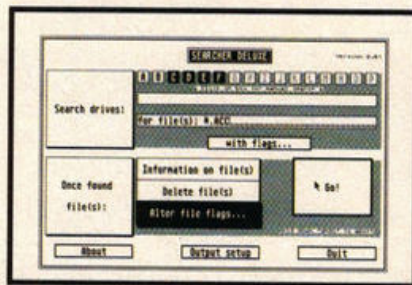

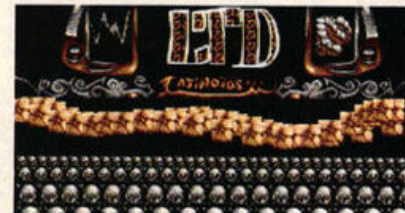

## PLUCKED GOOSE FLOPPYSHOP, DISK DEM 3796

Another motley collection of mini-demos, this time put together by Cybernetics. The usual stuff: spinning bobs, plasma effects, tinkly music. There are three features worth noting, though: the Hemoroids (sic) section contains a series of bobs (moving circles) which move in a tight spiral, with more and more bobs being added in to the screen until the entire screen is filled. With no slow down, this is a good little piece of programming – especially, as it is claimed, the entire demo was programmed in either *GFA Basic* or *C*.

Next, the Latinoids section is rather interesting. Five rows of chrome skulls scroll past in parallax (the ones nearer the back are smaller

and moving more slowly), while an odd mix of gold shapes moves frantically above them. ## IMPERIAL CONQUEST LAPD DISK G 324 SHAREWARE

Serious Games incarnation of the age-old game of *Conquest* sets 16 ancient Mediterranean civilisations in a war to survive and conquer.

There are five powerful nations, including Rome, Carthage and Macedonia, which were voted the countries most likely to succeed out of the 16 in their class. The others include Gaul and Greece, which are reasonably-sized, but couldn't really fight their way out of a paper bag, and others which are so small that they are lucky to see out the day without being overthrown. Your job is to see

one of these nations through its most difficult times, arranging both offensive and defensive armies, like an ancient Mediterranean 'Stormin' Norman, if you like.

Play can be viewed in three ways: the entire Med map; the Unit map, which shows an area in some detail for moving your armies around; and the Battle area, which is a kind of chess-style strategy scenario where two armies position their units to gain advantage over the other. This is the nitty-gritty area, where the game can be won or lost. Not only is the game good, but the instructions are excel-

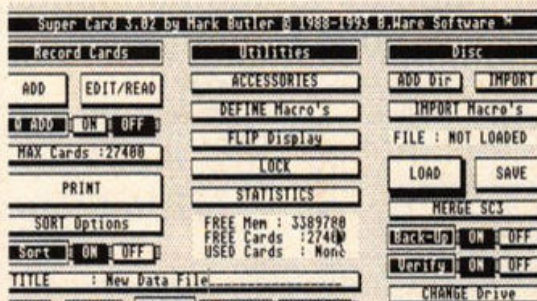
This is the latest version of *Supercard 3* and is fully functional in every way. Though you are just limited to the number of entries you can make and recurring "please register me" messages at various intervals. So

The convertor program is a superb complement to *Supercard 3* and makes this disk well worth getting.

Not long ago, somebody wrote in to *ST FORMAT* asking why there have been no reviews recently of chess programs on the ST. Well, here's one. Before you send of your cash, take note – *Chess-mate* is a chess analysis program first and foremost. You can play chess with it, but only human against human – there's no chess-playing ability in the program.

The analysis side of things comes in with the ability to input the positions of the pieces anywhere on the board, then resume play from that position. So, you could take a position from, say, a game from the recent Kasparov vs Short championship, and play some alternative moves – perhaps create a situation where Short wins! The positions can be saved to disk, so a library of chess positions can be created – indeed, a

short time limit for each shape. Score is accumulated depending on the value of the tiles in each row, including several types which multiply or divide the value of the row by two or three. It's an extraordinarily difficult

game, difficult even to complete one level, but it has an immediate appeal which makes you play again and again to improve your high-score, which is saved to disk after you play.

Blimey – a *Street Fighter 2* clone in the Public Domain! Well, not strictly a clone, but certainly an attempt, which is quite a brave move for the author. *World Fighting Championship* features three different characters

(Ben, Danny and Steve from Britain, USA and Australia respectively), who look mean, unshaven and extremely hard. A bit like a streetfighter, really – the type you would get in real-life as opposed to the more fantastic characters in the coin-op game.

It's worth pointing out that while the idea of the game is strong, and the presentation is excellent, sadly the game itself is, well, kind of like *International Karate* without the knobs on. The moves are sound enough, as is the collision detection, which is more than you normally expect from a PD fighting game, so it's not at all bad. But keep it to yourself and don't show it to your friend who owns either *International Karate* or *Street Fighter 2*, for fear of being laughed at. Not a bad attempt.

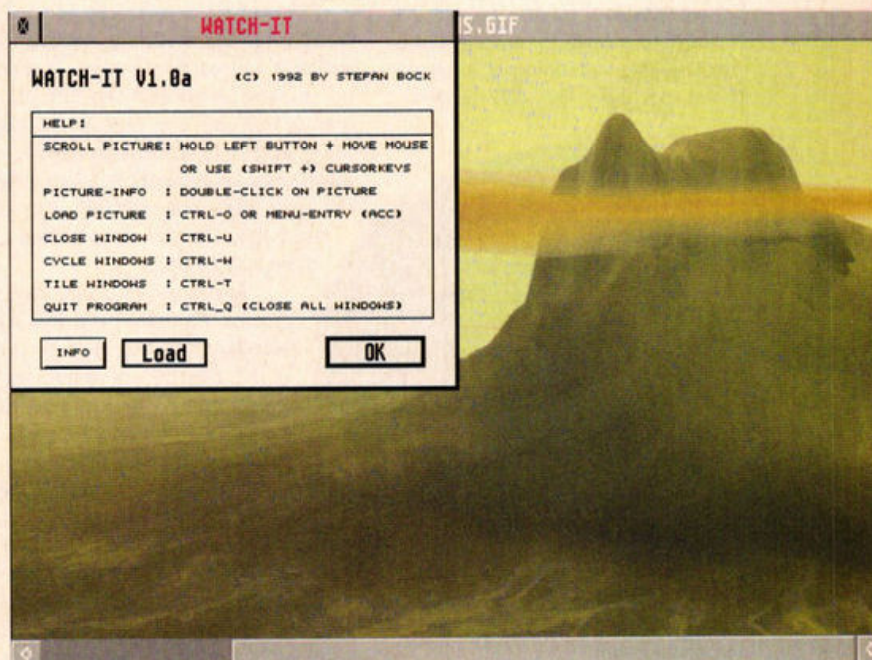

and add objects, descriptions and examine options in your game. The games you create are pretty standard text affairs with static still graphics, the demo game provided has little graphic content apart from a title screen to inspire you. The game creator is easy enough to use and the

example game provided gives you some helpful hints. A comprehensive text manual on the disk is an invaluable guide to planning and creating text adventures, if a few more options were added they would turn this good program into a great one.

# RAYSTART

**Another raytracing package joins the market and jumps about to attract your attention**

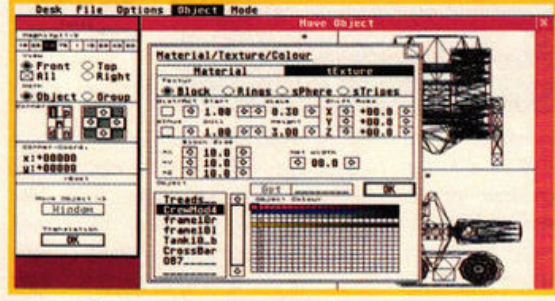
**W**hen it comes to the cutting edge of graphics there is little that touches raytracing. The flash special effects in films like *Jurassic Park* show what is possible – images so close to reality it's breathtaking. Raytracing on the ST has been around for a while, but is now enjoying something of a revival. Recent packages like *POV Raytrace*,

*InShape* and *Xenomorph* prove that the ST can raytrace with the best of them. Joining the new wave of renderers is *Raystart* from Lexicor, purveyors of some of the finest graphics software available for your ST.

*Raystart* is a complete package, it has a full 3D modelling section as well as the rendering engine. There's no mucking about with separate programs. You can load objects created using *Sculpt* or *CAD-3D2*, so there is a huge range of compatible 3D objects available both commercially and in the Public Domain, if you need a little inspiration.

Raytracing is a two stage process. First you need the 3D objects which you then throw in the direction of some deliciously complicated maths to produce the final masterpiece. The 3D objects are built from wire-frame models. These are twisted, rotated and mucked about with until you have the shape you first thought of. They are then assigned colours and surface properties. You then give your scene one or more lights and set the viewing angle before setting the rendering process going. Although even reflective spheres on a chessboard pattern floor look good, the secret to seriously smart raytraced images is good 3D shapes to start off with.

As all the best software should, *Raystart* runs in any resolution on any



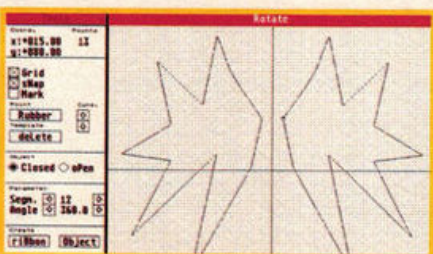
Each object can be given a simple patterned texture in another colour. These can then be affected by either a random or sine wave distortion. Effects like marble are possible.

of the Atari range, including true colour mode on the Falcon and the new Nova graphics cards. Obviously the higher resolution the screen the easier it is to design your objects. The interface uses the familiar GEM environment of windows, menus and dialog boxes. There are plenty of

keyboard short-cuts to speed things up. Along with the menus are tool-boxes – which one is displayed depends on what mode you are in. The main window gives you a view of your object, it only shows currently selected objects, which can get irritating. The first thing you have to do with any object is go to the Object menu and select all the elements of the object before you can see it. It does mean you can render parts in isolation which is very handy.

**The object of the matter**  
Creating complex 3D objects is never going to be a doddle and however

good a modelling program, it still takes considerable practice to create detailed objects. Basic objects are built from either rotated or extruded templates.

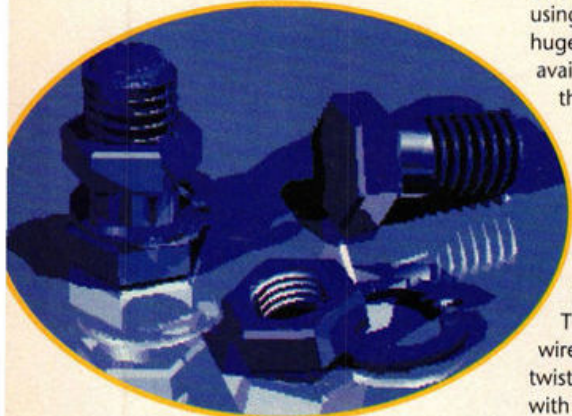
*Raystart* has some powerful modelling tools including functional objects created using mathematical formula such as Sin and Log, some amazing shapes are possible. Unfortunately, the manual gives few clues as to how to go about it. You might find it easier to use the option of loading objects as text descriptions, similar to *POV* script files. No hint in the manual as to the syntax of the description language, though.

One very powerful feature is analytical objects. Instead of being generated as a series of flat polygons, these are created as single objects. These are raytraced much, much faster and produce smoother surfaces. There are four kinds, spheres, discs and open and closed cylinders.

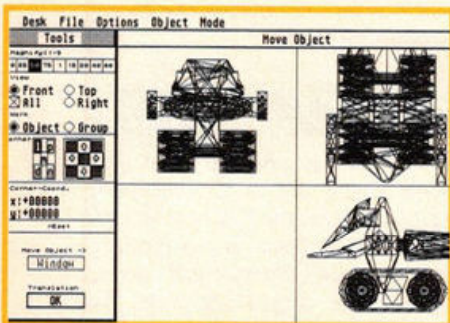
If you are already familiar with *Sculpt* or *CAD-3D2* then you're better off sticking with them and importing your objects into *Raystart*. Apart from some the ingenious mathematical and analytical objects, *Raystart* isn't nearly as good at building 3D objects.

Once created, objects can be moved, scaled and rotated on all three axes within your scene. Instead of the more usual method of assigning an object a base colour and letting the raytracer work out any available shades, *Raystart* assigns each object a set of shades, with up to eight or 25 shades in each set. This limits the number of available colours. There are more than enough for decent 256-colour pictures, but it falls

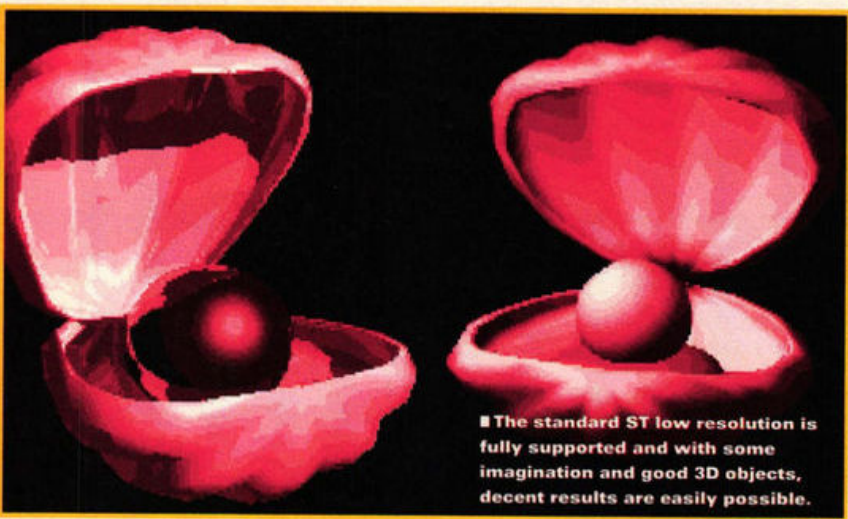
short of the standard required for really detailed scenes, although it makes for quicker rendering. Objects can be given



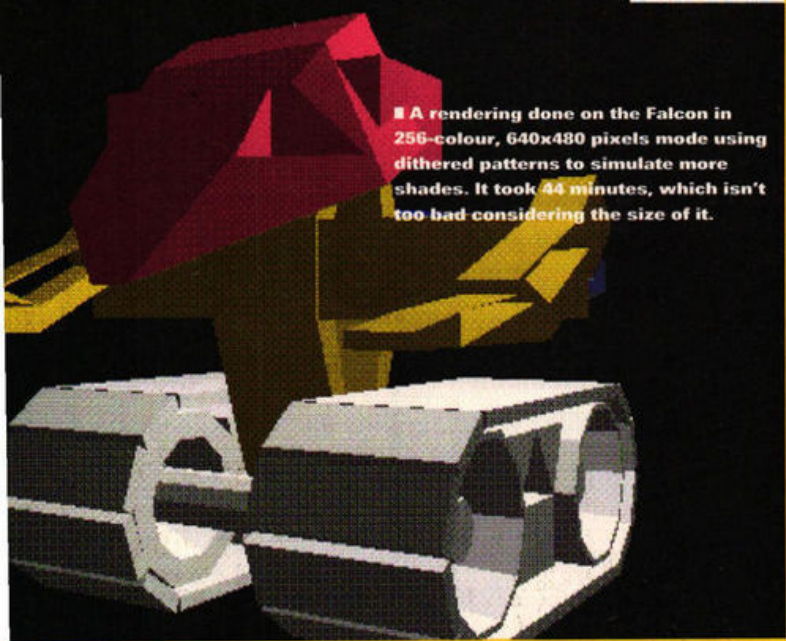
Above - Even limited to 16 colours *Raystart* can produce some nutty pictures. Er, sorry about that.



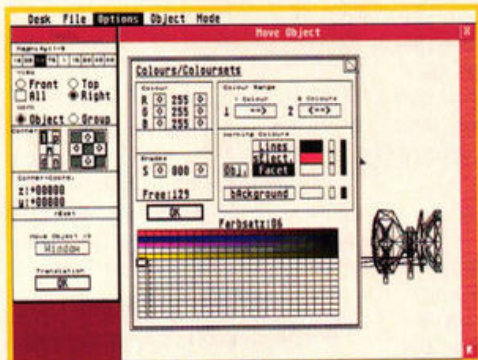
High resolution on an ST, ideal for creating and editing your objects and scenes. You can even render in monochrome using dithered patterns.

a transparency, surface shine and reflective qualities as well as textures. There are simple patterns such as rings or blocks which can be distorted, randomly or with Sine waves. The effects are fairly good and refreshingly fast. You can't texture-map another picture onto an object, so very detailed surfaces aren't possible.

**A view on the world**

You can have up to six lights as well as an ambient light. Each light has a variable intensity and can be a parallel light, spotlight or ordinary lamp. All that's left to do is set up the camera. This can be moved in all axes using either an object, the camera or the universe centre



■ Left - The sort of quality Raystart is ultimately capable of. This example scene is supplied with Raystart. You can dissect the objects and settings to see how a professional does it.

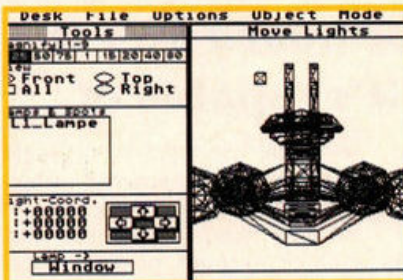

colour TIFF. These give the very best results. Programs like *Photochrome* do an excellent job of displaying 24-bit

pictures on a standard ST.

to move relative to, so any angle is possible. The degree of control you have over the final rendering process is impressive. You can stop raytracing at any point and resume it again later, something all raytracers should be capable of.

*Raystart* can either render in the screen resolution you are running in,

even monochrome, or to disk as a TIFF file. When running on a standard ST in low resolution you are limited to 16 colours, good but not quite jaw-dropping. You can render in either hidden line, scanline or full raytracing mode. You can also turn the textures, interpolation, shine, shadows, reflectivity and more on and off. There is also anti-aliasing. Colours can be dithered, taken strictly from the set of shades assigned to an object or set to get the best possible results. You can do quick, rough renderings to see how things are going before committing yourself to a final long tea break. Rendering times are quick, even with the complex functions enabled. Unfortunately you can't render screens bigger than the resolution you are running in. Finished pictures can be saved as *Neochrome*, *Degas Elite*, XIMG, PIC or TIFF formats.

To get more colours than the resolution you are running in enables, you can render to disk as a true

**Final analysis**

*Raystart* is undoubtedly a good program, it's designed to get the most from any system. Anyone who has left machines running overnight to render *POV* scenes can appreciate its speed. The object editor isn't the friendliest ever and it can be difficult to be accurate, but it does have some useful functions. The control over the rendering process is excellent. It lacks the outright power of the big league raytracers, but is quick and relatively easy to use.

It is badly let down by the manual, which covers each area briefly, and not very helpfully. Some functions are only referred to, leaving you to figure them out for yourself. This is a worrying trend with many new programs, particularly those translated from other languages. Many of *Raystart's* features are fairly advanced but leaving the user to guess and experiment is unforgivable.

For the same money you could have *Xenomorph*, a more capable package altogether, with its 24-bit texture mapping, and just as easy to use. *Raystart* is fast and pretty damn good at 16 or 256 colour rendering, but it doesn't pack the same punch.

# FALCON

Like your ST, your Falcon is a very versatile and powerful computer. We plug Compo Software's 286 PC emulator board into the Falcon and take a look at what it's capable of...

**S**o you think there's no software around for you to run on your Falcon? Well you might be surprised to know that there are potentially over 100,000 different PD and Shareware programs available that run on your Falcon right now - with the help of a PC emulator.

So what's the point of getting the Falcon with its brilliant sound and graphics processing hardware if you're just going to run PC software on it? Well, while more

and more direct-to-disk (D2D) and image processing software is becoming available for the Falcon, many of the more mundane types of software such as accounts programs, label printing utilities, spreadsheets and databases have been largely ignored. The major exception to this is *AtariWorks* which is bundled with the Falcon in the US and is available in the UK from Hisoft (☎ 0525 718181, £129.99 including SpeedoGDOS).

The point of using a PC emulator is that the PC is the most popular computer in the world and has the most software written for it, so why not take advantage and use all this stuff with your Falcon? The other main rea-

son for using a PC emulator with your Falcon is that you can now use the same software on your Falcon as you use at work - you're unlikely to see an office lined with Atari Falcons just yet, so you can pop the disk into your drive and carry on with what you were doing without losing style, font and formatting information in a word processing document.

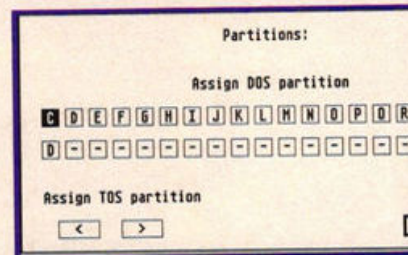
### Speeding up

For a piece of hardware that turns your Falcon into a 286 PC, the Falcon Speed board is a remarkably compact piece of kit, just 6x15cm long. The board is fitted to the internal expansion port of the Falcon and simply plugs into position, the complete operation takes about 20 minutes from start to finish.

To get going in PC mode is a matter of running the Falcon Speed software and putting a DOS system disk in the drive when requested, press <Return> and you're ready to run your PC software.

Once you have some PC software you can experiment with different setups and configurations, some

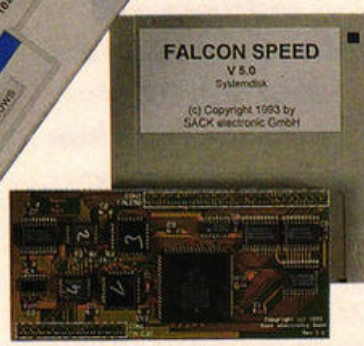
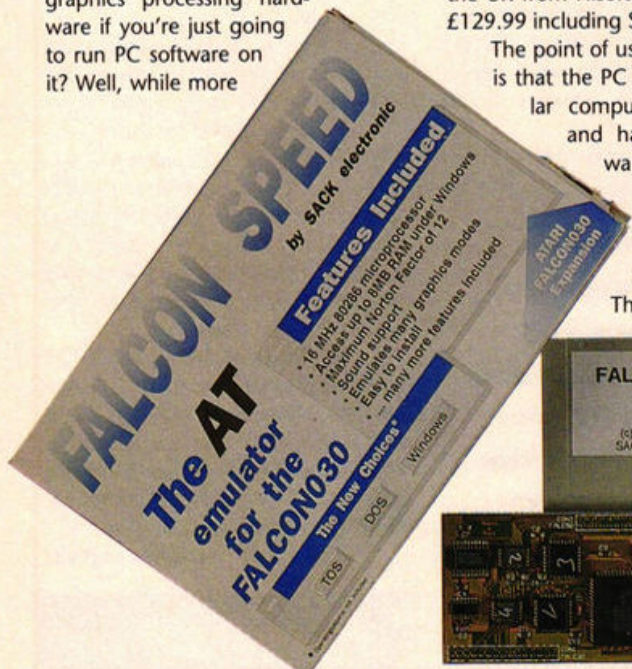

of the modes only work with specific hardware connected. For instance, CGA 16 colour mode only works on a TV or standard Atari monitor and not on a VGA monitor, while *Windows* only works in 16 colours on a VGA monitor. You should be able to

achieve the best looking results in mono VGA mode on a VGA monitor.

You can use *Falcon Speed* without a hard drive but there's not much point really, all PC software - including games - can run on a hard drive and many programs actually need a hard drive to be viable in operation. Because of the way *Falcon Speed*



## INSTALLING YOUR EMULATOR

If you open your Falcon your guarantee is rendered null and void. If you are not sure about opening your Falcon contact

Compo Software to locate your nearest authorised dealer. If you're not worried about your guarantee, this is how you do it

**1** Disconnect all peripherals from your Falcon and turn it over so you are looking at the underside. Find the seven fixing screws that are located in square holes, there are four along the back edge of the Falcon and three along the front edge. Remove these screws with a cross-head screwdriver.

**2** Carefully turn your Falcon over and remove the top half of the case by lifting it and sliding it to the right. Now lift the keyboard and unplug it from the main board of the Falcon taking note of the position of the plug in relation to the pins, two pins are not used in the connection to the keyboard.

**3** The next step is to remove the shielding over the power supply, this is fixed in place by several small screws and some twist tabs. When you remove the shielding you must make sure that you disconnect the loudspeaker connection to the main board, it's a simple plug and socket arrangement.



# SPEED 286

## PC GAMES

It's a general misconception that installing a PC emulator on an ST or a Falcon enables you to play PC games. This is untrue. PC games are totally unsuitable for use with emulators because they tend to use hardware not found on an emulator board, such as analog joysticks, SoundBlaster cards and 256 colour VGA graphic boards. While the Falcon has a 256 colour resolution, you can only use up to 16 colours in the PC VGA emulation mode. Emulators are also too slow to run games software efficiently.

works, one of your Falcon TOS partitions becomes transformed into a PC DOS drive C partition and you lose all Atari compatibility. Compo recommend that it's easiest to use the Falcon's drive D as the DOS C partition, this partition must be between 4MBytes and 16MBytes in size to work with DOS. For the best results you have to format the partition specifically to a PC format, you can't use the partition for Atari compatible software. Remember that DOS and Windows software tends to be on the huge side, with many programs typically coming compressed on half a dozen or more HD disks.

The emulator enables you to use the Falcon's peripherals as if they were connected to a PC, the Atari mouse can be used or you can connect a serial mouse to the RS232 port of the Falcon, all Falcon hard drives can be assigned as DOS partitions,

lasers and other printers can be used as normal. All setups can be modified using the installation program supplied with the emulator.

Games software isn't intended to run on an emulator like this so it was no surprise that the games we tried didn't work. Although it emulates a 286 PC you shouldn't expect to be able to run anything which requires more than 16 colours, soundcards or any of the other multitude of PC specific hardware, especially any software written in the last five years. Realistically, a 286 emulator is limited in the amount of professional software it can run because the 286 AT is so old, in fact, we couldn't get anything to run on it without problems of some kind.

### Verdict

Falcon Speed tries hard to do exactly what it sets out to do, that is to run DOS and Windows business software on your Falcon at a reasonable price, but a 16MHz 286 processor

## GETTING HOLD OF DOS

The Falcon Speed hardware and software make up the basics of a 286 PC, the actual operation system - MS DOS or PC DOS - is disk based and needs to be run before you can use any PC software.

The Falcon Speed manual advises you to get a friend to make you a DOS system disk, this is inserted into the Falcon's drive at the prompt and installs the DOS

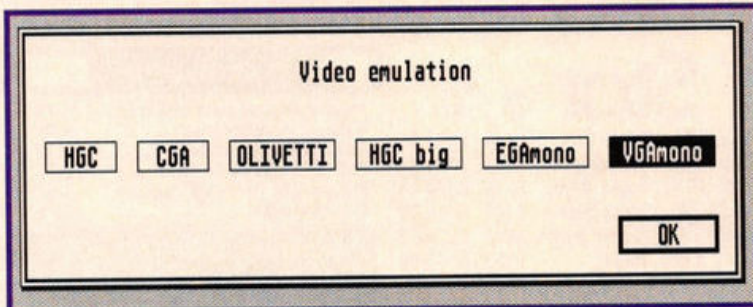
operating system into memory. Any DOS version above 2.0 works with Falcon Speed, although later versions are recommended if you intend using Windows 3.1 with your set up.

You can usually get boxed copies of slightly older versions of DOS through the second-hand adverts in many PC magazines, you don't normally have to pay any more than about £25.

just can't run modern PC software very effectively.

If you have a Falcon and you want to use 286 compatible PD software and Shareware on it, then by all means buy Falcon Speed, but remember that you can pick up a complete second-hand 286 PC with VGA colour monitor and hard drive for around £300. You may be better off waiting for Compo's promised 486 emulator.

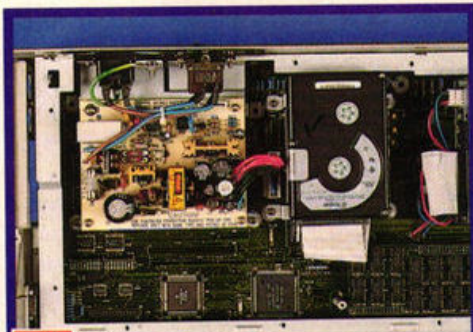

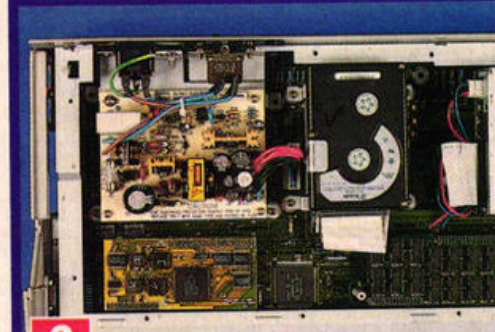

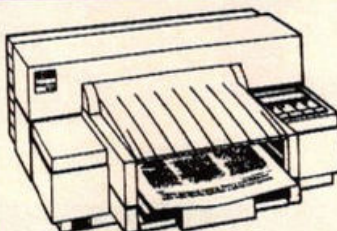

# PIXART

## A new art package written in BASIC. Can it bring out the creative flair in you?

Art packages seem to be like those "Hello Mum" programs written in BASIC – at some point everyone writes one. The latest contender in the ring is *PixArt* from German programmers Omikron, and distributed in the UK by The ST Club. It's an all-resolution package capable of working in all modes.

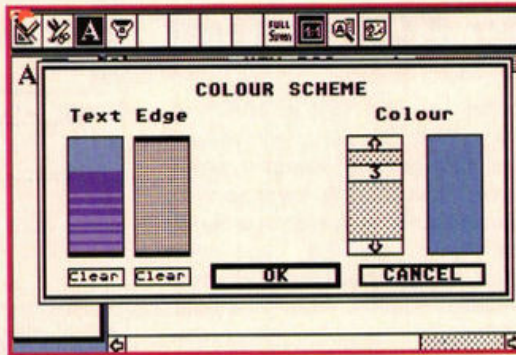
*PixArt* comes on two disks – the program and fonts on one, and full

example pictures to mess around with on the other disk. There's no installation at all and you can use it straight away. The manual is very well written. One of *PixArt's* strengths is it's easy to use right from the start. The program makes full use of GEM, with the critical screen display routines written in assembler for very fast updates.

### All those resolutions!

*PixArt* is written in a way that's useful whatever ST you have. It runs in any mode, from 16 colour low resolution up through the TT modes and on to 24-bit true colour on the Falcon. Whether you want to use it to create screens for games and demos, process digitised true colour images or just idly doodle, *PixArt* can happily do it. You can load as many pictures as memory permits, and the palette switches automatically as you move between windows.

The block functions are impressive – each block has its own window, and you can twist and distort them with a wide range of effects before pasting them back to the image. Transferring blocks between pictures is simple too – thanks to the use of windows. A grid is overlaid onto the block and you can drag points on the grid to distort the block – producing some bizarre effects. Distorting a digitised picture is great fun, and you can render someone unrecognisable in

minutes. Not true image processing by any means, but useful and fun. A collection of preset grids is at hand with shapes like tubes, loops and balls to squeeze your picture into.

Adding text to your picture is different from most other packages,

as *PixArt* gives you a mini text editor in a window. Text can be styled exactly as you want it before you paste it, and you can even load text from disk. *PixArt* only uses the *Signum* font format and comes supplied with nine faces each in two sizes. There's a wealth of these fonts available in the PD. Fonts can be swapped at will, so if you're short on memory you can dump a font after you've added the text to the picture.

*PixArt* gives you the usual set of drawing tools, with lines, brushes, pens and airbrushes all being fully configurable. All tools are selected via the menu, the icon box, or a special pop-up toolbox. The icons are clear and easy to understand, and the tools all work without any hitches.

Two zoom modes are available – you can close in on the whole picture, and zoom in on a specific part which then pops up in its own window. The fine editing is a joy to use

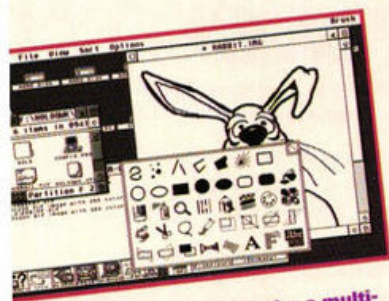
as all tools are available, not just single pixel editing. Printing is catered for in colour too – if you have one of the Hewlett Packard Deskjet models which supports this, with a choice of dithering modes for images with more colours than your printer can handle. Even with a 9-pin dot matrix you can produce acceptable results.

Support for image formats is comprehensive, with *PixArt* loading IMG (including extended X-IMG), all *Degas* PI files (including extended PI4, 5 and 6), NEO, Targa TGA, BIG, ESM, TIF, IFF and the PC format PCX. *PixArt* detects the file type automatically by reading the extension, trying to load an unsupported file type results in a dialog box telling you it can't load the picture. The lack of support for the GIF and compressed JPG formats is disappointing as a lot of PD libraries supply images in these formats, so you need a separate converter.

### Verdict

*PixArt* is versatile, fast, and it performs admirably. As a vehicle for true colour image work it beats the limited opposition with its full range of drawing tools. Well worth looking at.

# COMING DOWN

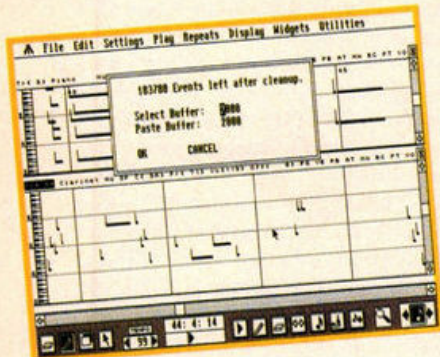
**This month Chas Stoddard takes a look at some of the problems you might have using KCS Omega**

**D**id you know that the frequency at which a cat scratches its ear is exactly the same frequency as a human laugh? Strange but true. Er, which brings us rather nicely to *KCS Omega*.

You may have found that when you record, you can only

record on the lowest numbered track. Well, this is, in fact, deliberate. *Omega* never makes assumptions about musical form; as such, you are completely free to organise data your way. Also, and more importantly, you can get your material down quickly without stopping or worrying about how the data's organised - you can, after all, go back and sort it out later. You should also bear in mind that there is no correlation between channel and Track number - you set the MIDI channel yourself either from your master keyboard (use

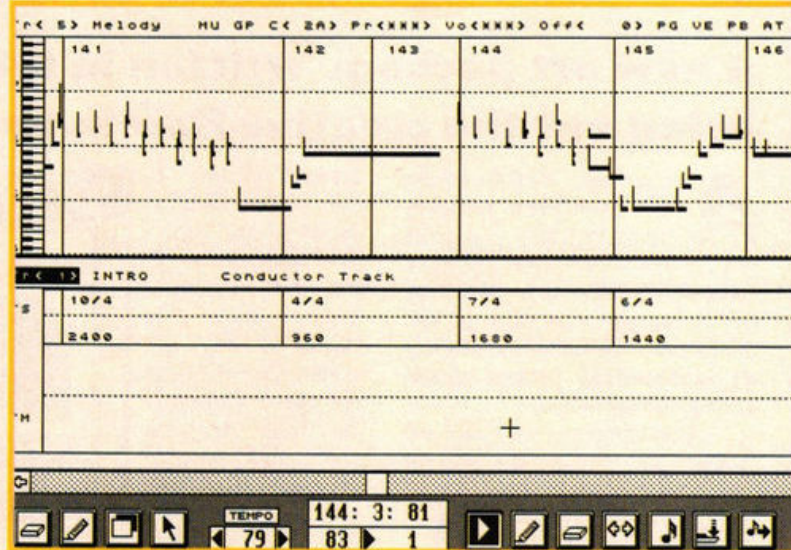

Merge for this) or from *Omega* by using the RECH function.

This drum-machine style of recording becomes particularly useful when overdubbing a solo line - say, for example, that you want to add an eight-bar solo line from bar 31. Set a Cue Point starting at bar 31 (to give yourself a lead-in) and ending at bar 40; now go to the Options menu and make sure that Auto Loop, Auto Record and Mute New Tracks are switched

on. Press the Tab key to activate the loop and when you get to the appropriate point, start recording. When *Omega* reaches the end of the loop, it puts the track you've just recorded into Mute, jumps back to bar 31 and starts to record again. This is an excellent way of recording several takes of the same solo very quickly without stopping - you can then audition your efforts at your leisure and select the best bits of the tracks you've just recorded for editing into one master version.

### Ground control

Several of you have asked about using Control Sequences to chain together various sections of music in Open Mode. The examples on

last month's Cover Disk show you some of the simpler ways to do this but there are a few others.

## TEN TIPS FOR USING OMEGA

**1** Start off by building a click track. If you have a specific musical idea, writing a click track that incorporates the "feel" is a lot more satisfying to work with.

**2** Use the Cue points; these are an effective way of isolating different sections of your piece. You can recall a stored Cue point by pressing <Alt> <1> to <Alt> <6> - the Tab key duplicates the Cue button.

The numeric keypad handle the remaining ones. You could now route the MIDI Out of the ST back into the MIDI In (a technique known as loopback recording) making sure that both Merge and RECH are both turned off. Turn Record on and start playback - by muting and unmuting tracks of your choice, your new performance can be recorded on the next track. If you're daisy-chaining several modules, just take the last MIDI Thru back to the MIDI In of the ST to accomplish this or route your patchbay accordingly. This creates a multi-channel track which you should send to Open Mode by using Track to Sequence. You can de-mix this new sequence into its relevant channels by using the Sequence to All Tracks function.

and use the Calc function to correct it if necessary. All sequences must end with a Deleted Event event otherwise Omega has no idea of when to stop playing it. In particular, if you try and loop and Control Sequence of length 0 and there's no programmed Wait command or the Deleted Event is before the "logical" end of the sequence, Omega tries and spews out events as fast as it possibly can.

**3** If you're not happy with a particular take, you can erase it by pressing the Undo key, provided you haven't reached the loop point. If you have, clicking on the X-REC button just above the tempo bar erases the last take whilst R-REC erases the recording but leaves Omega playing.

**6** A similar technique can be used in Open Mode - once a sequence has been started, it can be muted by holding down a Shift key and pressing the sequence's start key. Because of differences between American and UK keyboards, sequences two and three can be muted by pressing <@> and <#> respectively. Loopback recording can be a useful technique for recording an improvised performance in either Mode.

**8** Sometimes you can get stuck notes; this can happen if you hold a note down and then change MIDI channel without releasing the key. Pressing <-> sends an All Notes Off message on all channels and usually cures the problem.

**4** Copying sections out of a track or tracks is much easier to do in Tiger. Selecting a range and then using either Track to Sequence or All Tracks to Sequence to copy the appropriate material to the next available sequence.

**9** If your loading MIDI Standard files into Omega, Type 0 files are loaded into Open Mode even if you loaded it from Track Mode. Type one files are loaded into Track Mode but because not everybody saves MIDI files the same way, you may find that Omega seems not to play. In this case, check the length of Track one and correct the final Deleted Event.

**5** In Track Mode, with the Mute button lit, the keys on the main keyboard (one to nine, A to Z) mute and unmute the tracks - one to nine control tracks one to nine and A to Z control tracks ten to 35; keys on

**7** If sequences seem to be looping at the wrong point, check the final Delayed Event

**10** Make sure that you experiment! Half the fun of using this kind of software is that you can mess around with it and try things out.

**The Map - it's a good idea to label everything you do especially if you don't come back to the piece for a few weeks.**

Chorus, Bridge, Middle Eight, Verse four. Take a look at the Control Sequences boxout. With the first example, it seems at first glance that everything starts off at the same time but the "W" under the Duration column makes Omega wait until that sequence has finished playing before starting the next one. The number under the Note column is the sequence to play (we know it's a sequence start because the Type is an ST Event); under Velocity is the pitch transposition in semitones, so a two here would mean play the sequence up a tone, while three would mean the

sequence plays one and a half tones lower. The Duration column is the number of times that sequence is to play - so if, for example, 99 is entered here, the sequence plays forever.

**Living by numbers**  
Using the W command at the end of the line means that you can quickly enter the sequence numbers and how many times each one plays - let Omega worry about when to start them. In order for this to work correctly, each sequence must end with a Deleted Event and it must be at the right point; if sequence one was eight bars long but the final Deleted Event was at

bar 16, then our example above would play the first eight bars and then "wait" for another eight bars before repeating it.

You could, of course, specify the exact time each sequence is to start by typing the start time directly into the Time column and this is shown in the second example (hint: just enter the sequences you want to start in the right order without worrying about the time and then place the cursor on each sequence in turn and use the Calc feature to correct the time of the sequence as desired).

If you've spent the odd evening using Omega over the last few weeks, you can appreciate that it is impossible to cover all aspects of the system's use. # Jaguar

**T**he Jaguar has picked up five top awards at the world's biggest consumer electronics show, the CES in Las Vegas.

Just three months after its US release, the Jaguar caused a storm at the show, being voted the industry's Best New Game System (*Video Games Magazine*), Best New Hardware System (by *Game Informer*) and the 1993 Technical Achievement of the Year (by the magazine *DieHard GameFan*). Also, *Video Games Magazine* awarded a Jaguar advertisement 1993's Best Print Advert, and *Electronic Games Magazine* (*EGM*) voted *Tempest*

2000, in its unfinished state, the Best Game of the Show.

The Best New Game System award was created specifically for the Jaguar system. Chris Gore, editor of *Video Games Magazine*, said "[Jaguar] eclipses 3DO as best bang for your buck."

*Game Informer's* editor Andy McNamara said, "Atari has a winner on its hands... It will need great software, but if... *Cybermorph* set the standard, Atari is definitely on its way."

Sadly, as we know from our reviews of *Raiden* and *Crescent Galaxy* (pages 50 and 54 respectively), *Cybermorph* has set a benchmark for other games to be judged

## STOP PRESS

If you have a UK Jaguar, you may encounter some problems when you're using American cartridges, according to an official Atari source who requested we didn't reveal his identity.

Two cartridges which are currently on sale via grey importers, *Raiden* and *Evolution Dino Dudes*, are NTSC only. This means that black bands appear at the top and bottom of the screen, occasionally obscuring some of the action. This doesn't cause any problems to the general running of the games, but you may find it annoying. Atari assure us that *Cybermorph* and *Crescent Galaxy* are not affected, and when the software is officially launched in the UK all cartridges will work worldwide.

# Grey import successes

**I**mported American Jaguar consoles are selling well in the UK, despite the high demand for the machine in the US, the small number of UK consoles on sale before Christmas – and the price tag which has been reported to be as high as £400 in places. Stunning considering the official price for the machine is expected to be around the £156 mark.

ST FORMAT spoke to several grey importers, so-called because the machines are imported without the consent of the manufacturer. In general they report that business is good for Jaguar and its games. Nigel Levin, manager of Zap Computer Games in Leeds, said: "We've sold about a dozen American Jaguars. We're selling them for £300, and £55 per game." Phil

Turner of Crazy Consoles in Halifax explained: "We've had a hell of a lot of interest in the Jaguar, but not much in the NTSC machines because of the cost. We've sold about 30 imported Jaguars at £299, and we sell the games for between £39 and £45 each."

Darryl Still of Atari UK is cautious, however: "The huge interest in Jaguar means that UK supplies will be tight for some time to come, right up until the middle of the year. These are problems borne of success. The uptake of interest in Jaguar has been amazingly fast, and while we initially thought we'd be dealing only with enthusiasts, the press coverage and word of mouth has carried us right into the middle of mass market demand."

## WHO SPENDS ON GREY IMPORTS?

We asked Nigel Levin of Zap Computer Centre just who buys American imported consoles and games. "We tend to find that people who are knowledgeable about games buy imports," he told us. "Generally people know what they want, and they know they can get it from us."

Zap's primary market is in importing Sega and Nintendo games, even though US and Japanese SNES and Megadrive cartridges don't work on UK machines without a special adaptor. Atari cut out this incompatibility by making the American and UK cartridges identical, which can only help the importers. "Occasionally with SNES and Megadrive we get people phoning back, saying 'This is

an American cart, I wanted a UK one,' even though it hasn't been released in the UK yet. Atari have helped us by making them compatible."

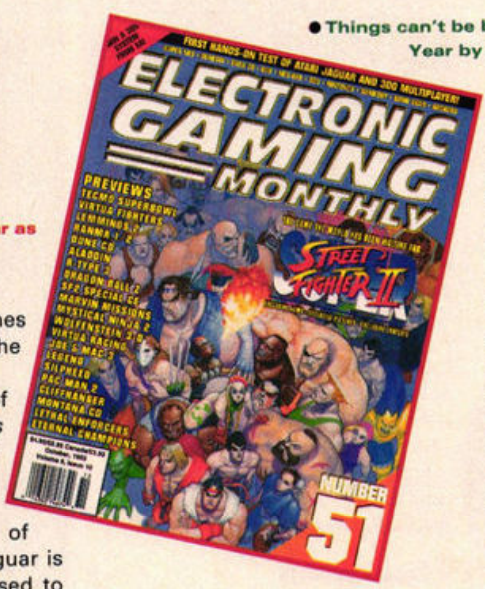
If you're thinking about buying an imported Jaguar, though, be careful – the unit will not work with some UK televisions. Zap supply US Jaguars with a UK power supply and a SCART lead – so make sure your TV has a SCART socket before you buy.

against, but these other games certainly haven't reached the same standard.

The next batch of games includes *Alien vs Predator* and *Tempest 2000*, both of which are expected to be brilliant, so hopefully within the next couple of months we can say the Jaguar is a great machine, as opposed to just a powerful one.

Unsurprisingly, Atari were jubilant, Darryl Still remarked: "We're really pleased with

these awards, especially the Best Game award which is developed by the UK's own Jeff Minter. This is further evidence that this console will be the product of 1994." Atari are not only enthusiastic about their success in

terms of awards which are a fairly academic measure of how it's going to perform commercially, they're also getting hot and bothered about the number of machines they're expecting to sell. Over Christmas they sold 27,000 machines, including fewer than 1,000 for the UK, and by the end of the year they anticipate being well on the way to having shifted a million units - up to three quarters of a million in the US and around 120,000 in the UK. At the moment they're concentrating on supplying the US because of the hefty demand, although there is to be a trickle of PAL machines into the country until it reaches full capacity around May. They still appear to be having a few production difficulties, however, one rumour being that Toshiba, the chip manufacturers, aren't turning out enough chips that pass the quality control standards.

## ALIEN VS PREDATOR

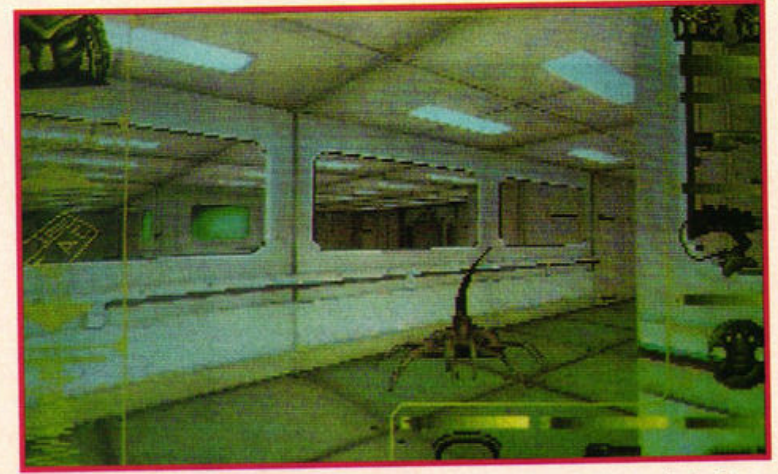
The game that's on everybody's lips... *Alien vs Predator* (AvP) by the UK developers Rebellion Software, caused quite a stir at the CES in Las Vegas. These screenshots are a little old, having been taken around November, but they give you some idea of how AvP is shaping up.

The story is based around a space station, where two ships have docked, one carrying Predators and the other Aliens. You take on the role of a Predator, an Alien, or a Colonial Marine - just like in *Aliens*, you see. The seven

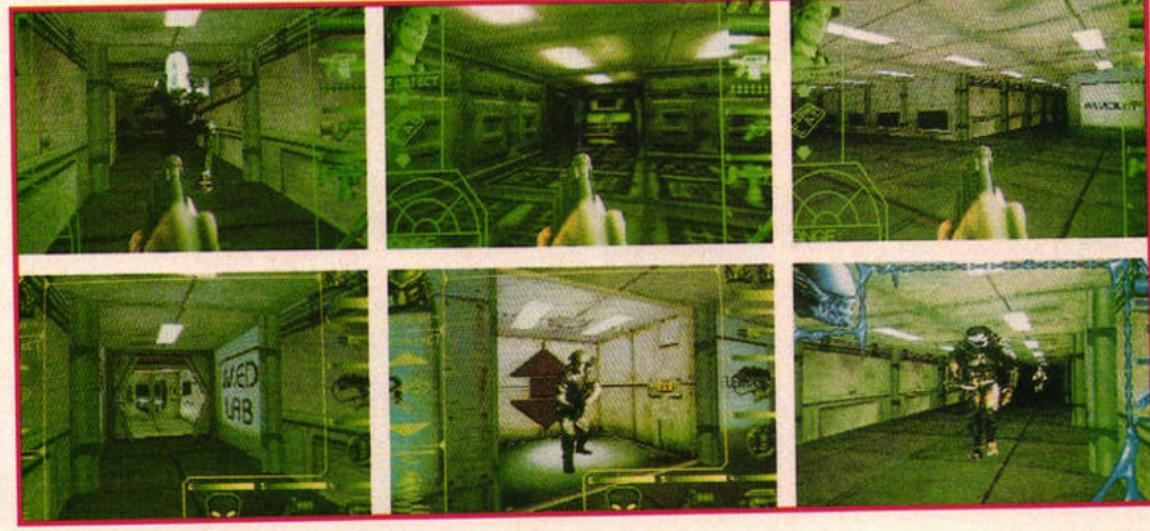
large levels were created using texture-mapping techniques, which involved building models of the space station and digitising them before putting them in the game.

As you can see, the walls, floor and ceiling are all texture-mapped, and yet Rebellion have still managed to keep the frame rate above 15 frames per second - so everything moves much more smoothly and quickly than you might expect. As in *Cybermorph* all the background graphics are created

We've seen AvP running, and we're very impressed; especially by the rumour that it could be the game in the next Jaguar bundle. That would be very impressive.

*Alien vs Predator* is in the final stages of completion, and it should be available in April - when, incidentally, we should have plenty of Jaguars hanging around in shops waiting to be snapped up. Watch out for a full and definitive review soon in *ST FORMAT*.

## MORTAL KOMBAT

*Mortal Kombat* is a conversion of the cult smash beat-'em-up released by Acclaim for the Mega Drive and SNES late last year. The game features digitised footage of

real fighters going through their moves, so it all looks realistic; there are lots of different fighters with hundreds of moves.

*Kombat's* claim to fame is its range of "death moves" - that is, specific moves which are designed to finish your opponents off. These include ripping off the head of your enemy, along with other somewhat unpleasant atrocities. Should be fun. Watch out for *MK* on the Jaguar in June, released through Iguana.

## FLASHBACK

A classic platform puzzling game comes to the Jaguar from US Gold in July. *Flashback*, which has already been released for the Amiga and the major consoles, features rotoscoped graphics -

that is, animations which are created using film of real actors. This creates some really incredible animated scenes, and a realistic main character who runs, jumps and climbs his way around seven futuristic levels.

## SOCCER KID

Another platform game, but with a difference. *Soccer Kid* from Krisalis follows the story of a small boy who's intent on recovering the world cup which has been stolen by aliens. This takes him on a trip to lots of countries around the world, facing enemies including a huge Luciano Pavarotti!

Instead of a weapon, Soccer Kid dispenses with his enemies using his trusty football, which makes for some incredible displays of skill from the boy in the boots. Watch out for *Soccer Kid* in August.

# RAIDEN

The first wave of Jaguar games are now available on grey import, and soon to be officially released in the UK. **ST FORMAT** takes a look at Atari's new babies

# A

fter the excellent *Cybermorph* (STF 55, 87%), which is packaged free with the Jaguar, you'd expect the first games that you have to pay for to be even more excellent. Sadly, this isn't the case with either *Raiden* or *Crescent Galaxy*, a review of which you can find on page 54.

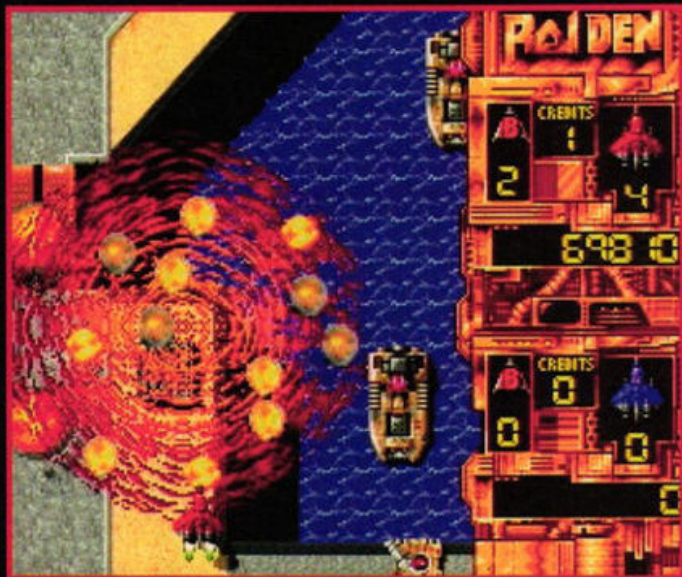
Actually, *Raiden* isn't that bad a game. The problem with it lies in its age - it's a conversion of a late '80s coin-op shoot-'em-up. Admittedly, the coin-op

was a very good one, and the Jaguar conversion is as near as dammit perfect. But heck, this is an old game, and we're expecting much more from the new arrival from Atari.

What do we have, then? On a basic level, it's a vertically-scrolling shoot-'em-up - very fast, very frenzied, and rather difficult to boot. As a pilot of the *Raiden* Supersonic Attack Fighter (simply rolls off the tongue), your job is to fly upwards while shooting and bombing everything that moves. Right, that's the plot over with, now let's investigate the game.

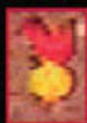
**Sixth sense**  
*Raiden* is based around eight areas, five of which are on a single planet, while

most basic enemy. Arcade tradition says that there must be pickups available in mid-flight which, when touched, never fail to affix themselves perfectly to the front of your ship, so increasing your fire power. Hurrah! These change colour from red to blue, and depending on their colour when you touch it, you get a corresponding weapon. Blue for an extra laser, and red for a more-powerful pea-shooter. Lasers are definitely the one to get. Oh, and if you pick up a P symbol, you're given the most powerful weapon possible immediately.

For the enemies with more armour, your ship is equipped with three energy bombs. When dropped, these cause havoc in a huge area almost covering the screen. However, three isn't really enough for some levels, so thankfully the odd Bomb pickup is released when you shoot specific targets on the landscape.

The enemies are many and varied, ranging from small, quick semi-kamikaze ships that race down the screen, hoping to crash into you rather than aiming to shoot you down; to large, metallic hulls with firepower to match their size. Each enemy has its own set movement path,

## AVOID THESE...

### ROCKET LAUNCHERS

so it's possible to learn the attack formations in each level. On-screen everything moves incredibly smoothly, with no let-up in the action - at least, while it lasts.

**Infinitely hard**  
And here, we've hit upon *Raiden's*

major problem. The game itself is not bad, but there's just not enough of it. Having finished all eight levels within a few hours of beginning play, it could be considered that the game is a little too short. Either that or there are too many continues (a choice of three, five or eight, presumably to give different levels of difficulty), but even so it's relatively easy to finish all the levels.

When the eight levels are over the game repeats itself, but becomes more difficult than the first time. Apparently there is no limit to the number of difficulty levels, but there is a limit to the tedium of going where you've been before. What we need is more levels, not



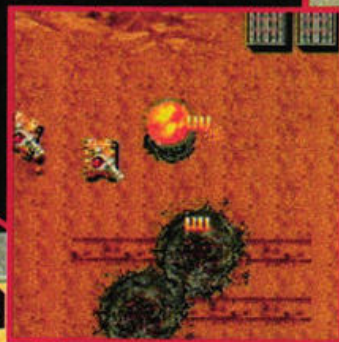

the same ones over again. Just another four would have done – some incredibly difficult stages to really test your mettle.

You see, arcade coin-ops have a difficulty which is weighted to rake in the most money. The games normally begin hard, then get harder – and the only way to continue is to stick another fifty pence piece in. *Raiden* is typical of this type of game, and this conversion is so accurate that you almost feel like putting money into a slot just below the Jaguar. To work correctly in the home, the difficulty level should have been turned down slightly, and fewer continues made available.

True to the coin-op (again), *Raiden* offers you a two-player simultaneous mode, which really adds to the gameplay. You need an extra controller, obvi-

ously, but there's no slowdown in the game's movement, and the action gets suitably harder and faster to cope with the extra fire power.

You control two separate ships each with its own weapon, but line the two ships up vertically, and the top ship amplifies the lower ship's fire, giving a special super-weapon.

### Complex parallax scrolling?

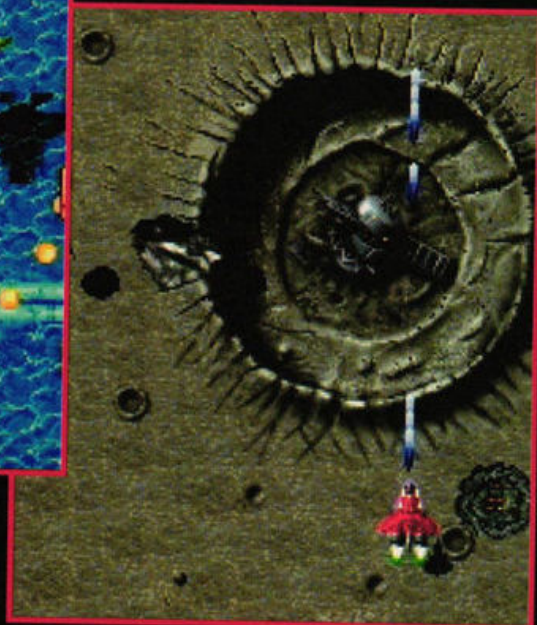
If you're new to shoot-'em-ups, it's possible you may be frustrated by the difficulty of *Raiden*. However, if you're reasonably proficient you'll relish the challenge of finishing the eight levels, then maybe have a go at the second wave of eight, and then get bored with it very quickly. So, just which type of gamer is *Raiden* aimed at?

*Raiden* surely uses just a small amount of the Jaguar's power. It requires only one level of parallax scrolling (defying the box blurb's claim of "complex parallax scrolling,") and the palettes are pitifully small in comparison with Jaguar's capa-

bility. There are loads of sprites moving on the screen at once, though, with no noticeable slowdown, so as we said the game is arcade-perfect. The one curiosity is, as with the arcade game, the side panel is huge, covering over a third of the screen. Sometimes ships appear on the screen, but they're hidden behind the panel so they can easily ambush you from three o'clock, so to speak. Why isn't it smaller?

This Jaguar conversion is certainly many times better than the versions of

*Raiden* for Sega and Nintendo's 16-bit consoles, so perhaps we should be singing the praises of Atari for giving us such a good conversion. Then again, we're expecting conversions of some of the later coin-ops as well, which would push

Jaguar's features – take, for example, *Tempest 2000* which adds in stacks of features to an ageing coin-op, bringing it up to date.

*Raiden* is an interesting taster for what's to come, a good blast which keeps your interest for a couple of days. By then you may want to move on to something else, so let's hope the next offerings from Jaguar's stable are better.

# CRESCENT

Graphics alone do not a good game make. Let's find out why, with Atari's latest Jag-baby

**T**revor McFur in *Crescent Galaxy* is shallow. Let's not be sad and pretend that what we have is a good game, because what we have is a shoot-'em-up which is so bog-standard it might as well be made of porcelain and have a seat. As exclusively predicted in *ST FORMAT* last month, *Galaxy* has very little depth, and apart

● Balls, and plenty of them. These are some of the least interesting enemies from any game ever. Yes, they're rendered; yes, they're pretty; but they aren't animated and they have no intelligence.

from the excellent graphics and quality sound effects we have a game which stems from the very early days of videogaming.

*Crescent Galaxy* could be a CD game, actually. That's not meant as a slur on CD, which is, undoubtedly,

a great medium in which to store games, but merely a reflection on the majority of CD-based games which have appeared to date. *Dragon's Lair*, *Road Avenger*, *Mad Dog McCree*, *Microcosm* – all games which are astonishingly pretty, sound great, but contain very little in the way of an actual game. Is this what we really want?

**The good...**

Hey, let's talk about the good bits first. *Crescent Galaxy* (CG) is a sideways-scrolling shoot-'em-up, and as you can see from the screenshots the graphics are second to none. Each of the enemies, asteroids and spaceships have been expertly raytraced, and move beautifully. Top marks to the designers.

Likewise the sound. A minimal tune marks the theme, with pleasant sampled instruments plinking out an ambient soundtrack. The effects are atmospheric with a crackling, electrical-sounding sample when you fire a laser, and great explosion sounds.

Uh, right. They're the good parts. So on to the rest. Oh, dear...

# GALAXY

## ... the bad...

Let's begin the downturn with the presentation. There is no presentation to speak of. Yes, there are introduction screens and little messages that come up to tell you when you're dead, but very little thought appears to have been taken about real presentation.

In fact, it's almost as though the developers have been asleep for the last eight years, and they haven't learned any of the tricks and features which endear games to the players. Take dying, for instance. Nobody likes it, and everybody who plays a game tries to avoid bullets and enemies making contact with their ship. That's the point. However, you come to accept that dying is part and parcel of playing a shoot-'em-up, and you take it (reasonably) gracefully.

*Crescent Galaxy* is slightly different, because when you die there's an explosion, and then you return immediately.

## 1 CYBER CHERUBS



"Chromed cuties with guns of steel. Watch out! Their arrows aren't full of love." Hmm. Guns which fire arrows? I don't think so. And what a terrible idea, anyway. 0/10

## VERDICT

So the trophy goes to the Cyber Cherubs. A likeable bunch, but sadly a nightmare in the hands of the copy writers.

● Let the eyes have it... lots of pea-shooting fire power, that is. The eyeballs explode with a disgusting "pop" noise, and then become smaller eyeballs. Urgh.

There's no break, no animation, no let up in the action for a while so you can compose yourself for your next attempt: you're just there.

And, when you've used up your life quota of five ships, *CG* asks you to "Press

fire to continue." You have no choice: you press fire, you continue. After three continues, you die. It's all very clinical, that's the problem.

The background graphics are invariably beautifully-drawn, but they scroll

past a kind of wallpaper. It's very two-dimensional, and even the odd parallax object which scrolls past doesn't help. The potential must be in the Jaguar to produce multi-layer parallax scrolling, so why wasn't it used here? It wouldn't have upped the gameplay, but it would have made it even more pretty.

Also, we have the utter travesty that is the high-score table. Like any average high-score table, CG's proudly displays the scores in order of greatness in front of a pretty image. But, it won't let you enter your name. Nope, no way. Let me ask you, Mr Developer, what's the point? Why have a high-score table at all, if you can't enter your name?

**... and the average**

The idea of the game is to take Trevor McFur in his spaceship and wipe out the enemy. The foe in this case is a vile entity known curiously as Odd-It (for reasons only known to Atari). The plot's all based around a planet called Cosmolite which, along with its four moons, has been overthrown by killer Starbots, deadly Gundinos and savage Cyber Cherubs. Er, right. Yes, more oddly-named entities gang up on you and fire lots of bullets in your



soldier; but even so this trite collection of puns should never have made it into a finished game. The Americans may like it, but we don't. Disgraceful.

general direction. "This doesn't sound too bad, really. What exactly is wrong with *Crescent Galaxy*?"

Er, it's just all a bit sad, really. There's a lot of potential in sideways-scrolling shoot-'em-ups, as proven with coin-ops such as *Nemesis*, *R-Type* and the like, and the fact is CG takes the game back to its very roots. It rather lacks polish, refinement, atmosphere; but most of all it's not addictive. The difficulty level is high, but it doesn't have enough appeal to bring you back again and again in an attempt

to better your high score.

Sorry to point out the box blurb, but it's just so fitting: "A 64-bit gaming experience like no other." Thank God, I say.

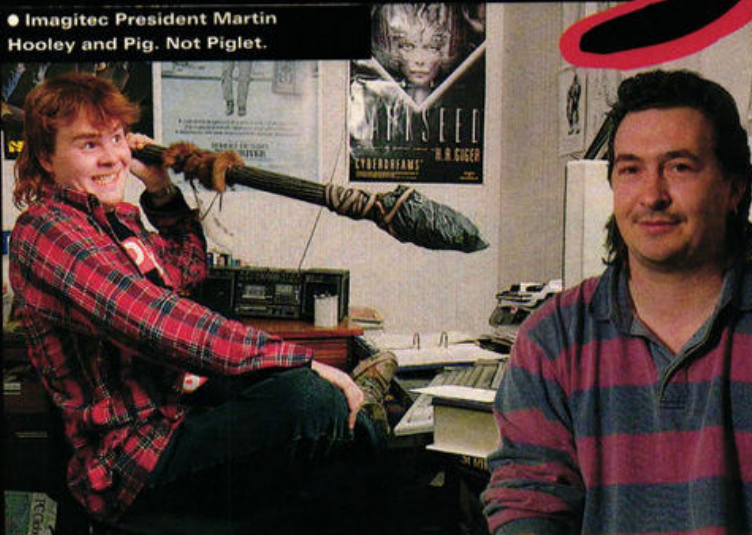

## IMAGITEC

**Why have Imagitec ventured into depths of Atari's machines where others fear to tread?**

● Imagitec President Martin Hooley and Pig. Not Piglet.



● Check out our review of *Raiden* on page 50, then sit back and wait for the sequel.



● *Evolution Dino Dudes* is out on the Falcon now and for the Jag next month.

● First has to be because Imagitec reckon Atari are "a very good company" who "have their head together with the Jaguar... they are on a better footing now than they have been for years." They describe their working relationship with Atari as "awesome."

● Following on from this, they reckon they can make money out of developing games for Atari's machines, along with those of Sega and Nintendo - after all, they "develop for anything that will make us money."

● As well as such honest financial considerations, Imagitec obviously relish working with advanced technology. They reckon the Jaguar is "brilliant" and "amazing," there being very little technically that they would like to do with it that they can't since the custom hardware that's in the machine reduces all the limits.

● Although in some areas of the computer industry there is still some scepticism as to whether Atari can compete successfully in the console market, Imagitec are happy: "Atari have been slightly low-key, but we had the advantage of knowing about the Jaguar before most people, and once we knew what was coming we were pretty confident about it."

● And as to the competition...? Piglet reckons "the Jaguar's better than 3DO and will wipe the floor with it - the price difference alone will see to that." And as for Sega and Nintendo 64-bit contenders? "The Jaguar will compete on an even footing with them, at least. It will have a very big user base, which will give it a headstart and the prices of the new machines will affect the market then. It depends how much Nintendo can sell their 64-bit hardware for - they'll sell it at a loss anyway, but how much of

a loss can they sustain? It depends how much they spend developing the hardware."

● Imagitec was formed seven years ago, employs around 45 people and works out of a former newspaper office in Dewsbury, West Yorkshire. They do everything in-house so they can finish everything faster.

● They have done lots of work for the ST including developing *Zone Warriors* (38%, STF 28) and converting early games from the Ultima series like *Suspicious Cargo* (79%, STF 31).

● Imagitec specialise in creating music for the rest of the computer games industry, having worked with the Bitmap Brothers, Virgin, Core Design as well as having created music for the Jaguar's *Tempest 2000*.

● As to their own Jaguar games, specifically *Raiden* and *Evolution Dino Dudes*, Imagitec comment "Neither is stunningly revolutionary but they're good games - better than other versions simply because the machine's more capable. *Raiden's* better than the arcade version but we are constrained by conversions - *Raiden 2's* presumably going to be released on the Jaguar so we don't want to upstage the sequel before they are done."

● And as for their own aims when they're busy producing games? "We want to get the most out of the machine. The Jaguar is new and people aren't fully aware of what it's capable of yet we're trying to push it with our games. It's fully capable of exploiting the stuff we've used for other platforms and we've already made mistakes on those which we've learned from, so by the time it comes out on the Jaguar we'll have perfected the technique to make some really good games."

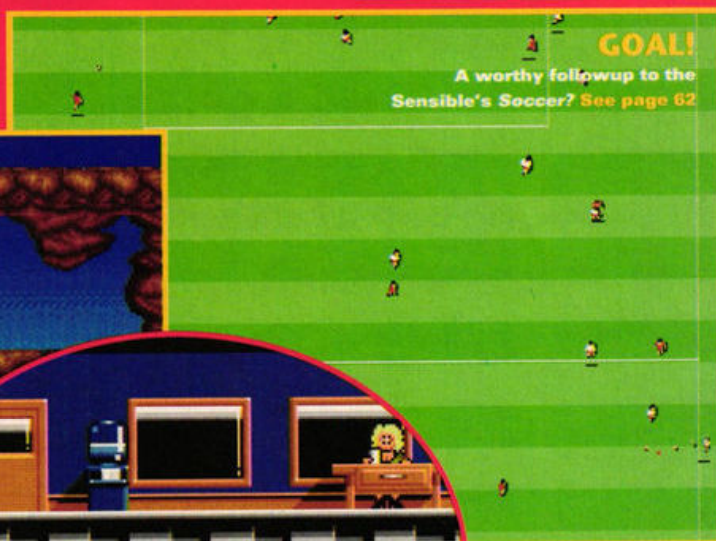

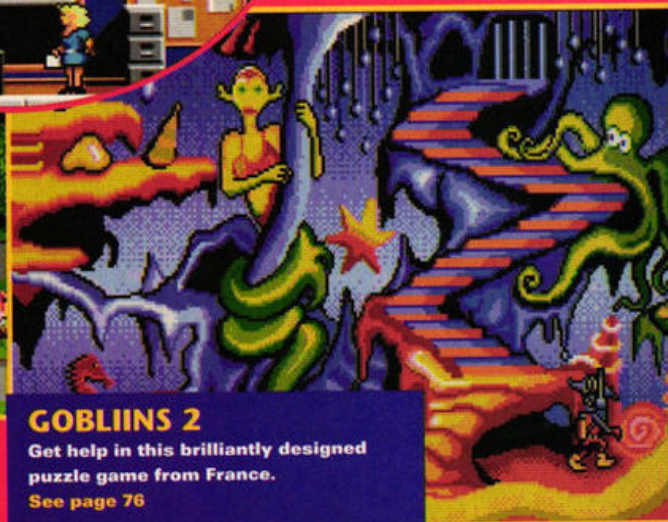

# GOAL!

Hello, and welcome to **Dino Dini's Goal!**, a game which Virgin touts as leagues ahead of other footie games. Yeah, chinny reckon...

The ST sure has its moments. Despite being seen by most gamers as a second-tier machine, we're still treated to some of the most excellent titles seen on other formats - if a little later than others. Last month we reviewed *Frontier*: a hugely-hyped game with gameplay to match. Now we have *Goal!*, Dino Dini's much-publicised sequel to *Kick Off 2*. Not bad, eh?

Let's review the scene so far. Most ST footie players belong to one of two camps: the *Kick Off 2* camp, and the *Sensible Soccer* camp. *Sensible Soccer* was

released in mid-1992, and is generally acclaimed to be the best football game on the ST. *Kick Off 2* was an earlier game, but still some players insist that the earlier game pips the newcomer to the post. Just to

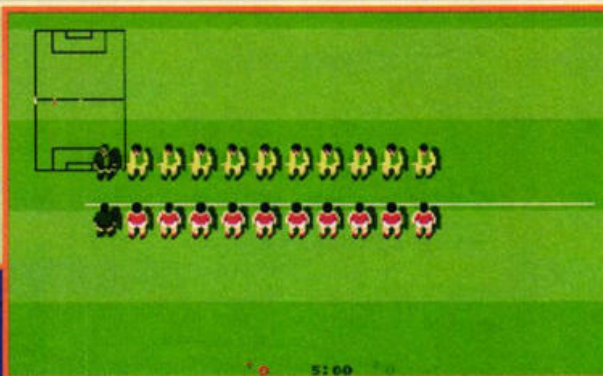

help redress the balance, though, the aforementioned author of *Kick Off 2* has redesigned his game and

released it through Virgin under the name of *Goal!*. The *Kick Off* games had one distinct advantage

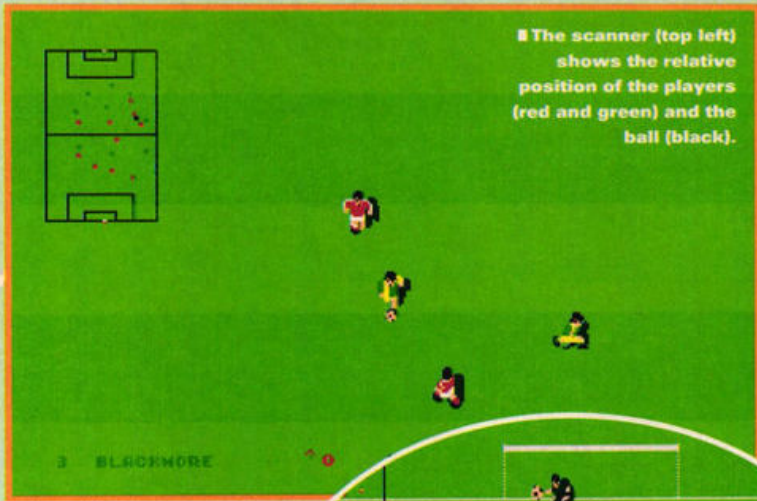
The most noticeable difference between this and the previous game, in fact, is the difference in size of the sprites. Each player is significantly larger than its *KO* counterpart, so Dino has been able to give them more human features and animation. Because the scale is quite large, you view the pitch from just above the players, only able to see a small amount of the pitch at any one time. This doesn't make for easy strategic play, but you're given a scanner which tells you the position of the players and ball on the pitch. The scanner sits in one corner of the screen, moving to a different corner if it interferes with play - an attention to detail feature which earns it some credit.

*Goal!* also features a horizontally-scrolling pitch as well as the more usual vertical. This seemingly frivolous addition actually gives the game extra appeal, if only because in two-player mode nobody really has an advantage (whereas in vertically-scrolling mode, it's generally considered that playing downwards is something of a handicap). There's no net in the goal-mouth, but more about that later.

over *Sensible*, and that was the ability to trap the ball.

By holding the fire button down, your player would hold the ball under his foot, giving you plenty of time to look for that special cross to the right winger before letting rip. *Goal!* keeps this feature, along with many of the other good bits from *Kick Off 2*.

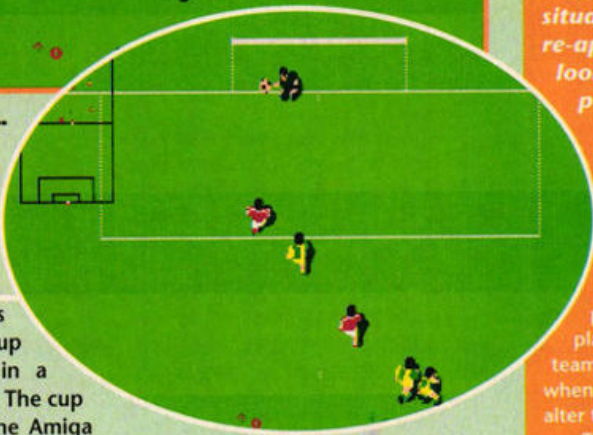
**...there's even a cup...**

As well as playing single games, all the usual competitions are lurking around the options screen. These give you and some friends the chance to pit your wits against each other and up to 63 computer teams in a league or a cup challenge. The cup is something that even the Amiga version didn't contain, showing that being rather late on the list of developments can sometimes have its advantages.

The teams are chosen from around Europe. Sadly, although real-life teams are on offer, the team lists are way out of date. For example, in Liverpool Irvan Kozma is still playing in the first team, whereas in real-life he's hanging around waiting to be deported. Similarly, Mike Marsh and David Burrows both went to West Ham some months ago. The world of football transfers is never easy to follow, but a little more thought would have been good here.

Also, team colours are a bug-bear. Taking Liverpool again, both home and away kits feature white shorts. Come on - when have Liverpool ever played in white shorts?

On the positive side, *Goal!* is very easy to pick up and play. The

## THE SENSIBLE OPTION?

*The benchmark for any football game to be released for the ST is obviously Sensible Soccer. The original aim of Sensible was to better Kick Off 2, which was at the time the best football game around, and just about everybody considered it to have done its job.*

*Now Goal's here, though, we reckon the situation deserves a re-appraisal. Let's take a look at the good and bad points of both games:*

### SENSIBLE SOCCER

#### Good bits

This is the most thoroughly-researched football game in history. Not only do we have all the main teams from European football, but also the player names, managers and team strips are very accurate. And, when the teams change, you can alter the players' names accordingly.

The players are small, but the pitch is quite small scale as well - so it's easy to build up team strategies. Oh, and there are bags of atmosphere, lots of sampled crowd effects, whistles and chants. It's the easiest football game to play. Even

total novices can pick it up and play against seasoned pros immediately.

However, although it's easy to play there's plenty of depth, making it possible to build up your own style of play - just like real-life footie.

#### Bad bits

Very little. The players' small size might make it a bit hard on your eyes after a few hours, but that's about all.

### GOAL!

#### Good bits

You can trap the ball, which is a great bonus, but it does make control slightly difficult at first. Once you've mastered the controls, both trapping and one-touch passing are possible, making for some spectacular displays of football skills.

Large, realistic players, much bigger than in *Kick Off 2*, which are well-animated.

#### Bad bits

Very little in the way of football atmosphere. There's not much sound, no net in the goal and the pitch graphics are a joke. The glitches and bugs affect almost all areas of the game. A shame.

### CONCLUSION

Heck, *Sensible Soccer* wins it hands down, really.

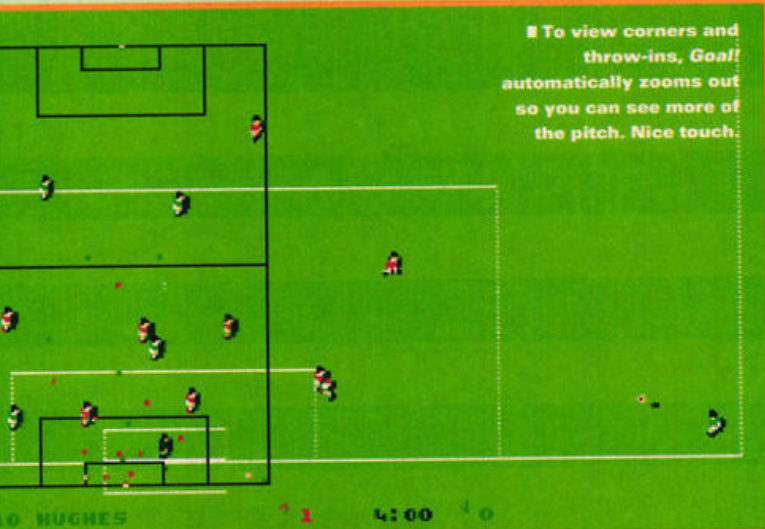
your player running at top speed immediately, he accelerates. When you change direction, the player still has some momentum making fast 180° turns difficult. So, running with the ball and dribbling are possible, without needing to touch the fire button. Great touch.

### ...but the onion bag's gone

The lack of a goal net is extremely off-putting. Yes, just like *Kick Off 2*, sadly the goal is entirely bare, giving the impression that it's more of a rugby pitch than a football ground. Presumably the goal posts' nakedness has something to do with difficulty in keeping the keeper, so to speak, behind his net; but surely a net of some sort could

have been fashioned. As it is, it just looks ridiculous.

Then, just to add insult to injury, *Goal!* delivers another crashing blow to those who believe the ST to be as capable as any other machine to run games. Get this: despite there being four different types of pitch - dry, wet, muddy and Wembley - there is only one pitch graphic. So, when recreating a lovely, sunny day in Wembley, *Goal!* displays a gorgeous, well-rolled green pasture, with no blemishes to spoil the uniformity. But

select a muddy pitch, to create a dirty, soiled, damp scene of football at its most moist, and your eyes are treated to a... gorgeous, well-rolled green pasture, with no blemishes to spoil the uniformity.

Also, the green stripes of the pitch have a tendency to drift up and down, regardless of your or the ball's position on the pitch. This is worse when playing horizontally, where the stripes of the pitch go lengthways along the pitch. The horizontal play, incidentally, is so bug-ridden and glitchy that it's not even worth mentioning.

**Going down...**

Even the one pitch here seems to have no, oh, what's the word; atmosphere? There's no advertising hoardings lining the pitch, only the odd crackly sampled crowd. And there's only a very limited range of sound effects. Why, why, oh why? Perhaps to conserve costs in only requiring one disk instead of the Amiga's two. Perhaps because of time constraints. Surely, though, for no other reason.

The Amiga version of *Goal!* was criticised for not having enough detail, but this really is just

taking the mickey. Loads of tweaks have been made to the gameplay which make it great to play, but

sadly the lack of pitch variety or sound effects spoil the presentation. The large number of competitions, tactics and teams are great, but again it's slightly marred by lack of attention to detail, especially in the team lists and colours.

**... and down**

And the bugs... well, they spoil it entirely. Sometimes you can't even get through a single game without it crashing, never mind an entire competition. It took us an entire day to grab the images of the game you see in this review, because the damn thing kept hang-

ing up. And even if you do manage a game, your players disappear occasionally, and then magically reappear elsewhere, or the movement slows down horribly and your players jerk around. Sorry Virgin, but the polished finish of *Sensible Soccer* still does it for us, even a year after the event.

It has been said that for a while the ST games market is wilting. To that group of steadfast ST believers who strongly perceive that there are many companies out there are still willing to plough money and time into creating top-quality games for the ST (and, we might add, a group to which *ST FORMAT* subscribes), Virgin Interactive Entertainment (Europe) Ltd waves *Goal!* And laughs, no doubt.

It's all very well producing the games, bringing big names such as *Bart vs the World*, *Goal!* and the forthcoming *Cannon Fodder* to the ST, but if they're not willing to make them any good then, quite frankly, VIE (E) Ltd might as well not bother. Take the travesty of *Bart* reviewed in last month's *ST FORMAT*. This disastrous game, programmed by the over-rated Acclaim and bought by Virgin, should never have seen the light of day in its current form.

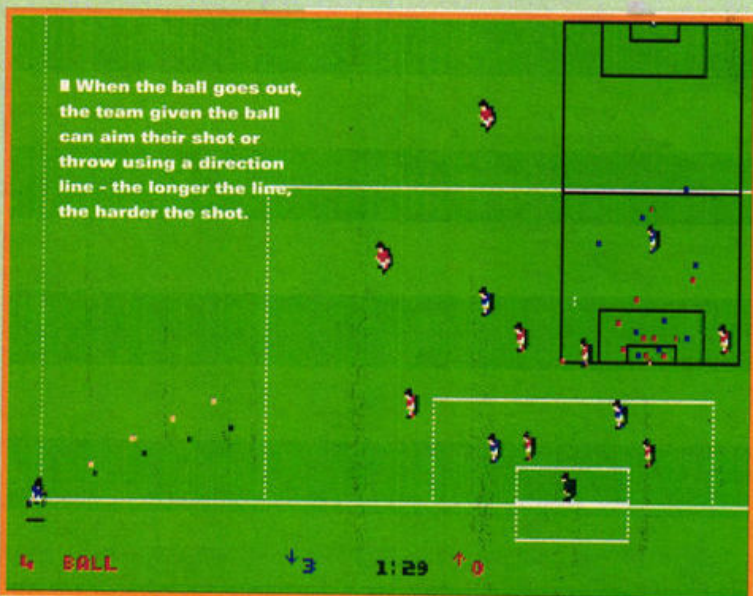
Sensing this, Virgin slipped *Bart* out of the back door without telling any of the magazines, ensnaring as many innocent wide-eyed children, grasping weeks of patiently-earned pocket money in their hand, as possible. This Dickensian scenario goes on, there's no denying that, and

now, with *Goal!*, they've done the same thing again. Actually, *Goal!* isn't that bad. It's not great, but it can hardly be compared with the utterly awful *Bart*. Yet still the second full-price game from Virgin in less than a month smells of slashed budgets and rushed deadlines. There are so many bugs and glitches in it that there's no way it should have passed through quality control.

So, the ST is stuck in a self-fulfilling prophesy, which states: "ST games shall continue to be shoddy and poorly-produced, which in turn shall continue the ST's decrease in popularity with the game-playing masses. This reduces the number of games sold, which decreases the amount of resources pushed into the games, which reduces the quality of the games." Gasp.

This is exactly what's happening to the ST. Piracy may be one reason for its failing, but poor-quality games are a second thorn in the side. I'm not saying that the salvation of the ST lies entirely on Virgin's shoulders, but on all producers of ST games. David Braben's *Frontier* proved that the ST is still a markedly capable machine, and if more effort was spent on creating quality games, the situation might get better.

Virgin's next, and possibly last, offering for the ST is *Cannon Fodder* from the golden boys Sensible Software. Surely nothing can go wrong with that release? ST games are now at an all-time low. The time has come to start looking upwards again.

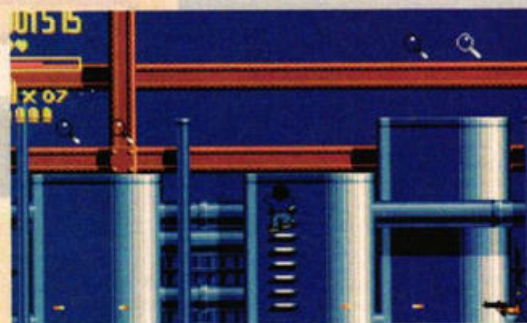

Since the early days of *Frankie Goes to Hollywood* – the platform game on the C64 – Ocean platform games have generally had a typical look about them. The backgrounds and sprites are polished and the action is smooth – nothing wrong with that. Occasionally, though, you feel that you're playing the same game as the last one, but with different graphics.

*Lethal Weapon's* like that. The plot's based around the third in the series of films, with three separate missions to complete before you



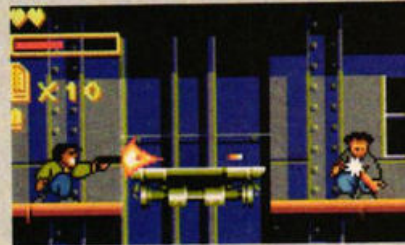

The point-and-click interface is rather slow and tedious especially with the addition of inputting text.

The next batch of *Quest* games contain *Police Quest* and *Space Quest* games, and then we move on to the second game in each series. As each sequel came along, the games got better – so we have some reasonably decent

stuff to look forward to later this year. Don't wait for them, unless you're really desperate for another adventure, that is.

# INFINITY ONE - THE SECRET OF THE FIRST DISK

## Factasy - a new game genre or education software in disguise?

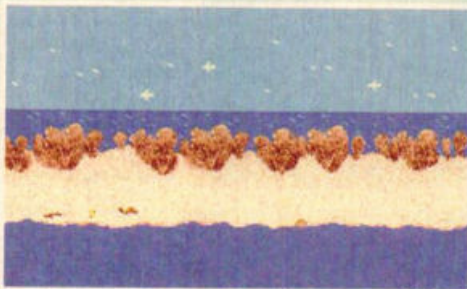

ward puzzles they can be quite entertaining in a sort of I-can-do-The-Times-crossword way and just ending up somewhere completely different can be quite interesting - on a later level you get to travel through time and end up in different places with different snippets of information.

The graphics consist of a series of static screens, often including digitised pictures in colour, though trying to show human faces, clothing and background in 16 shades isn't the easiest task so they do tend to look rather peculiar. Occasionally there are small animations which liven things up slightly - such as a seagull flying to pick up some food from a beach scene - accompanied by some really abysmal sound effects. The car-chase sequences are very well done indeed, with a real sense of speed and masses of excitement as your quarry (you're told who to chase by your ST) rushes away from you.

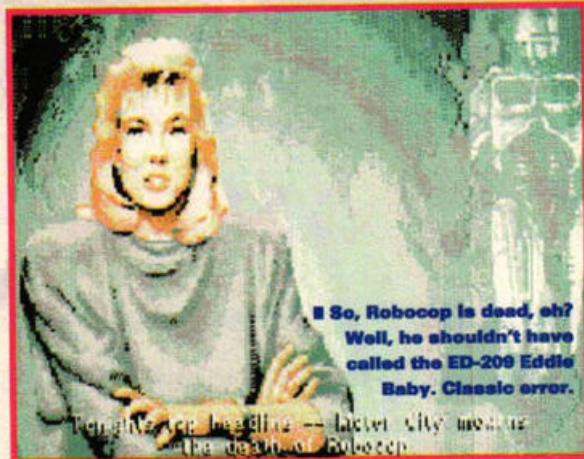
But the flying sequences, although pretty similar, are great to get into as well. So are the walking bits. In fact, the whole thing's rather great.

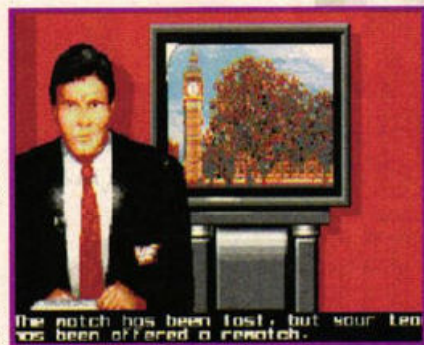
cartoons act out their unholy charade. Unholy isn't the right word, actually. Crap is.

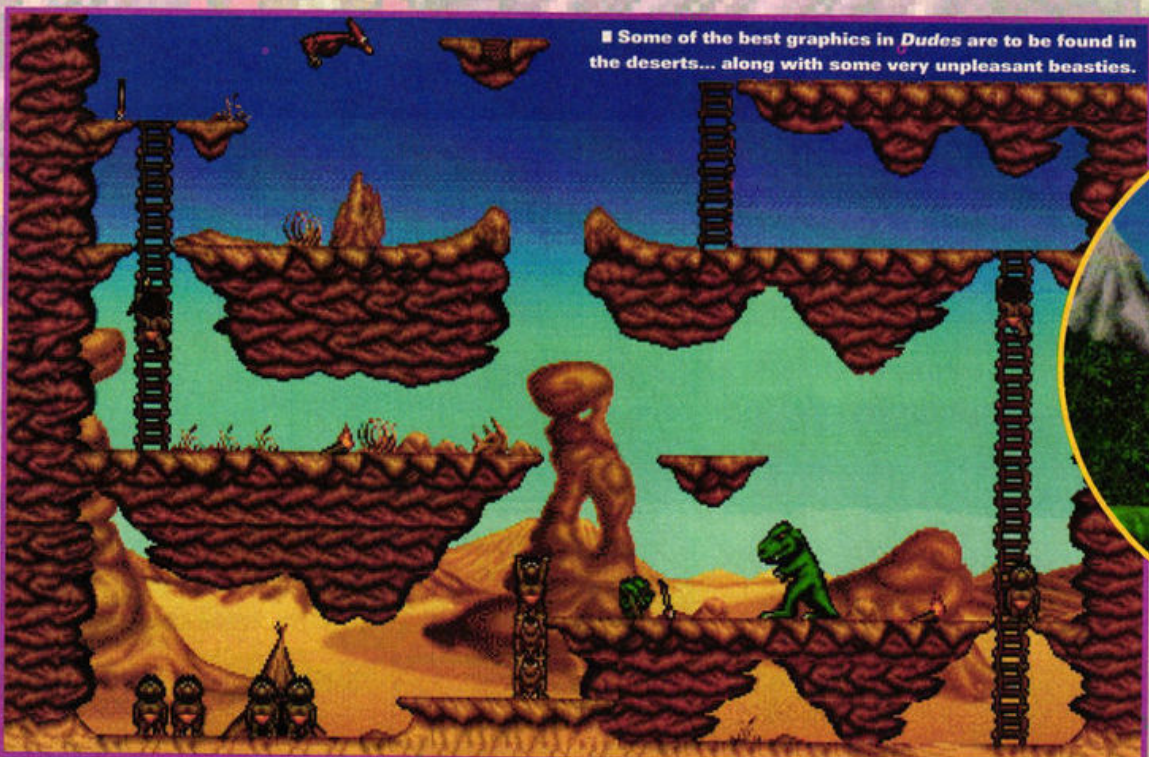

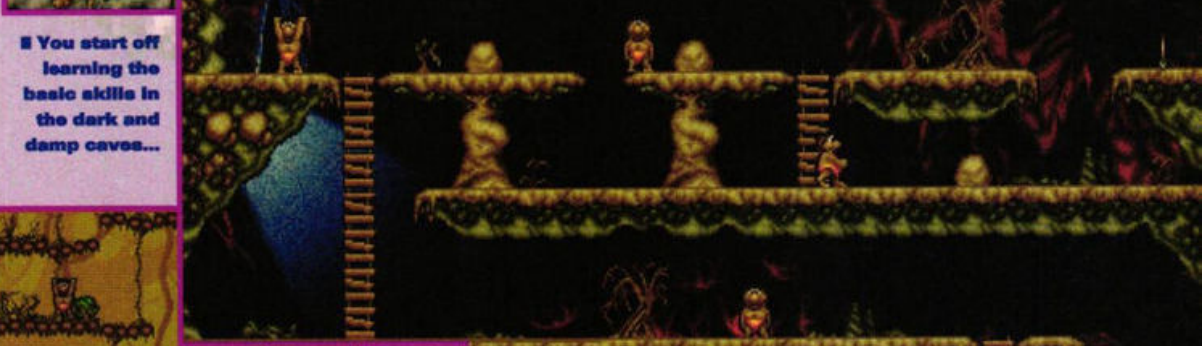
**Variety is the spice...**

There are six different sets of scenery you get to play against which adds quite a lot of choice – summer, winter – caves, swamp, forest and desert and your tasks can range from meeting your friends to learning how to use the wheel, so although you're doing the same moves and ultimately continuing to strive for the goal of evolving, it doesn't get too tedious because it's so addictive. At the same time it can be pretty hard and therefore frustrating so you might get sick and tired of doing the same thing time and again.

The effects in the game are quite brilliant – it looks gorgeous throughout, and the attention to detail is incredible – look at the tendrils of twine hanging down in the swamp level for starters. 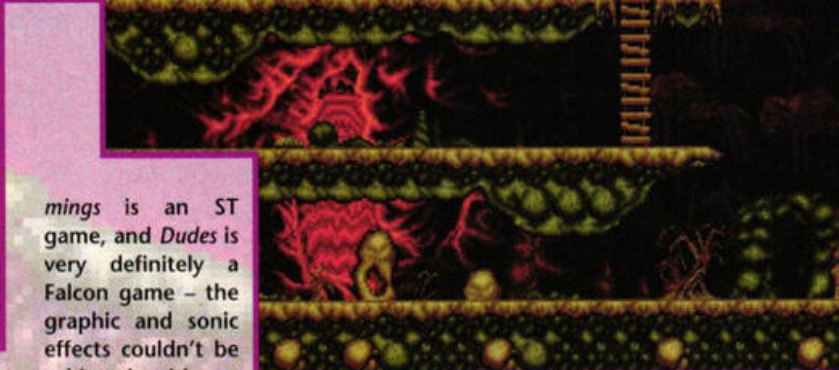

**Verdict**

David Braben's excellent game is undoubtedly difficult to get started with, but ST FORMAT readers Christian Payne from Plymouth and Iain Reeve from Winchmore Hill have conquered it and sent in their tips if you're stuck. Here are the best of them...

● Start in the Ross 154 system, because you get the best ship on balance, and you get an autopilot which is essential at first. Do as it suggests in the manual: buy Animal

Meat and fly to Barnard's Star, buy Heavy Plastics there, then fly back to Ross 154 and sell them. Continue this for a while, until you get a fair profit.

● To get a bigger profit, you could try taking Robots from Barnard's Star to Sol, then Luxury Items from Sol to Barnard's Star. You won't be able to afford to do those journeys until you have over 10,000 credits, though.



● Don't save your position immediately after hyper-space, because there may be a whole load of baddies waiting for you there, and you may run out of fuel. You then have no way back.

Since the ST is meant to set the standard of music in computers today, how come we rarely get sampled music and sound effects in games?

My friend has an Amiga on which we've played games that both he and I have - *Monkey Island*, *Chaos Engine* and *Sensible Soccer*. When loading up *Monkey Island* we are greeted by excellent sampled music on the title screen. Throughout the game there is sampled music. I cannot tell him how sad the chip music is on the ST version. *Chaos Engine* is next up. During gameplay there is a real funky tune and the samples are well up to standard. Us ST owners miss out once more.

The final straw is with *Sensible Soccer*. The crowd chants are fantastic and samples such as "come on you reds" are just a joy to listen to. The crowd sample on the ST is just pathetic. I know that fewer games are being made for the ST but that must surely not prevent us from enjoying top class sound in games. So, come on programmers, get your act together!

**stf:** I totally agree with you, Thomas, and the worst of it is that really it is down to the programmers' laziness that we don't get sampled sounds in ST games. The

thing is, games are generally written for the lowest common denominator of machine - in this case, the STFM. Although STEs have sample playing hardware built in, so it's comparatively easy to include samples in games, the same is not true of STFMs which lack this hardware - it is possible to do it, but it's much more difficult. There are some games which are enhanced to take advantage of the STE's capabilities such as *Zool* and the *Chaos Engine*, although sometimes the difference between them is difficult to distinguish, but doing this means coders have to create two sets of instructions... and they just don't seem to bother.

### Life goes on

I believe that the ST's future is progressing but that it could still reach a higher level with the support of European companies achieving, maybe in some people's views, the impossible. Despite the fact that I have a Super Nintendo, a Gameboy and a Game Gear, the ST is the machine to which I refer time and again because it's so easy to use and I've got some really good software for it. During the past few months software companies have been led astray from the ST, but many have stayed. Software support has increased with the introduction of foreign suppliers and the help of software companies like

the Bitmap Brothers who showed the real potential of the ST's graphics capabilities with the *Chaos Engine*, and games such as *Gods* and *Magic Pockets* showing the machine's excellent graphics and sound capabilities. However, I believe software companies are too lazy to use the ST's hardware to the full. I reckon that software com-

panies should persevere with the machine, going into it in more depth to discover its full potential rather than automatically assuming it's a waste of time.

**stf:** Software companies face a dilemma - should they stick with the markets and the machines they know and get as far into them as they possibly can at the cost of not moving with the times and ignoring new and probably more profitable formats? Many have taken the latter course, looking, as businesses do, for the greatest returns on their investment. I do not believe that it has anything to do

with software houses being too lazy to get into the hardware. New software developers such as *Binary Asylum* (featured last issue) believe there are still profits to be gained with the ST, especially as the bigger softies leave to concentrate on other projects - they, and software houses like them are in a prime position to make the most of the ST's hardware.

### Not very useful?

The quality of your second Cover Disks seems to be deteriorating, not in terms of quality but in terms of their usefulness to the average user. How many of your readers are musicians and proficient enough to use *KCS Omega*? If you know that over half your readers can really find some use for it then you are justified in putting it on another disk and increasing the price of the magazine. If you can't, well, you know what I'm getting at... what's up for next month? Another word processor?

## BRAIN DAMAGED? A PROGRAMMER RESPONDS

Dunces Cap Software and *Brain Damage* haven't gone down very well in the ST press... oh dear what a shame.

Reviews by their very nature are subjective, but if the reader is to base his judgment on what is being reviewed, then a full and accurate description should be given - reviewers should show a competent understanding of what they are reviewing. It is apparent that your reviewer didn't read the accompanying files given with the program. If he had a lot of the so-

called bugs reported to exist would be found not to be bugs but a different way of presenting a game that uses this platform.

For example, *Brain Damage* only accepts one word answers so you don't need a space, this is fully explained in the text file. You can also correct any spelling mistakes by using <Backspace> as long as you haven't pressed <Return> or <Enter> or by entering the last letter of an 11 character answer. This too is explained in the text file.

Your reviewer also failed to mention that the question and answer section has no time limit imposed on you so you can take as long as you like to answer a

question - you can even go and look up the answer in a reference book - and that you can pass on up to five questions by pressing <Escape> with no penalty. It is also important to note that there are another eight sub-games to be played which are completely different from the question and answer section.

The closing comments of your reviewer were "Come on, Dave, give us a break..." Well, if your reviewer cannot even manage to read a text file and find out how a program actually works and what it fully has to offer, then how about his neck?

**stf:** Andy, as the reviewer, replies. "While your comments are noted, we

would like to point out a couple of things in return. Because of the nature of entering single-word answers, in our view it is essential to provide some form of correction to your answer. Not just <Backspace> which, as you quite rightly point out, deletes your typing, but a facility to adjust your answer if, say, your spelling isn't up to scratch. To us, it seems unfair to penalise a player if they can't spell, or if they make a typing error.

"And, call us picky if you like, surely the point of a trivia quiz is to test your knowledge of trivia, not your ability to go and find the answer in a book. Maybe a time-limit would be a good thing. The last thing we want to do is to tell you how to program, but surely you can accept criticism of your work in the spirit in which it is intended."

# ST ANSWERS

Your top ten questions of 1993 answered along with more hints, tips and solutions

## Get powered up

**HARDWARE** I use a four-way adaptor to run my ST, monitor, printer and hi-fi from the only power socket in my room. I want to buy an external disk drive, is there one available that is powered from the ST and not from the mains?

Ian Smith, Staffs

**A** Power Computing used to supply external floppy drives powered from the joystick port but these are no longer available. It's not a good idea to power a drive in this way because the keyboard circuitry isn't designed to cope with the higher power requirements and could cause problems with your ST.

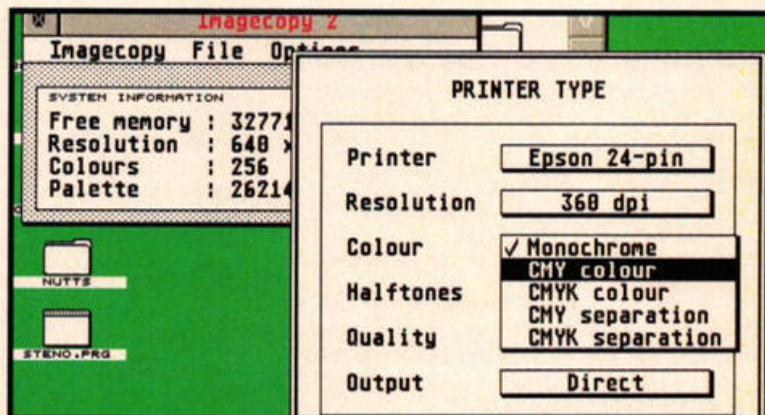
This leaves you with a couple of options. Either tell your dad to call an electrician and get a double socket installed in your room or unplug your hi-fi while you are using your ST.

## In living colour

**PRINTERS** I am having the age-old problem of getting my Star LC24 200 printer and my ST to work together correctly. I can print text without problems but I have been unable to do any colour graphics screendumps from any of my graphics programs. I have tried using Epson drivers and setting the printer to Epson LQ 860 emulation by setting the dipswitches but it doesn't seem to work. I read your feature on *Imagecopy Colour 2* and it sounds very good but I'm a bit concerned about spending £20 on something else that won't work.

**A** You should be aware you can only generate a colour printout from an art program if it has a colour printer driver, most older ST programs don't have colour drivers. Using a normal Epson LQ driver just gives you

mono output. The dipswitches do work on your printer if you set them properly. Take a look at your printer manual and set the switches to Epson mode then switch the printer off then on again, your printer is now in Epson mode. If any of your software has an Epson LQ 860 driver then it now works. Don't be

concerned about using *Imagecopy Colour 2* (ST Club # 0602 410241) with your printer, all the printouts used in our colour printer feature in issue 51 were created using *Imagecopy Colour 2*. Isn't it worth investing £20 to finally get the most from your printer?

## ASSEMBLY POINTERS

**Tony Wagstaff explains some of the finer points of machine code programming**

### Hip, hip, array

Is it possible to have arrays in assembly as you can in BASIC?

G Mill, Kent

**stf:** Assembly doesn't have any commands like the DIM command, since unlike BASIC, where the compiler takes care of memory storage, storage has to be organised entirely by the programmer. Luckily, arrays are quite simple to arrange in assembly, once you know a few tricks of the trade.

In order to store or access data, you need to state where it is, in a data or address register, or a memory address for instance. There are different ways of pointing to the data, known as addressing modes. An important tool we can use with arrays is an addressing mode with the grand title of address register indirect with displacement and index. It's not as complicated as it sounds, it simply means we add the contents of a data register to an address register, and then add a further figure to that to locate the address where our data is stored, all in one command. It looks something like this:-

```
8(a4,d3.w)
```

which translates as, add the signed word value of d3 to the contents of a4,

and then add 8 to that to obtain the address we want. To set up the array, declare a storage area the size of the array, and load its address into an address register.

To access or store data from the array, load a data register with the element number, and multiply it by the size of each element, two for a word for example

```
lea array,a3
move.w #5,d3
asl.w #1,d3
move.w #8,0(a3,d3.w)
```

```
bss
array ds.w 8
```

places 8 into the fifth element of the array.

### Lost mouse

I'm having problems with one of my programs in that the mouse pointer sometimes disappears. Do you know what's wrong?

N Manley, Southend

**stf:** It's difficult to say for certain what's happening without seeing the code, but there are some common problems which may be causing this. Check that each time you switch the mouse off with a `graf_mouse` call, there is a matching call switching it on. In addition, make sure you call `wind_update` with `intin`

set to `BEG_UPDATE`, or zero, before you switch the mouse off and commence screen redraws.

### Stack 'em high

Please can you tell me how and why a7 needs adjusting after a trap instruction?

K Hart, Swindon

**stf:** The stack is an area of memory used to hold data. The stack pointer, or a7, initially holds the address immediately above the stack. When you push data onto the stack, a7 needs to be adjusted to hold the address just below your data, to stop it being overwritten. Generally this is done automatically with a command like

```
move data,-(a7)
```

The minus sign instructs the processor to subtract the correct number from a7. To set a7 to its previous value, simply add up the data used, allowing two for 1MByte (the stack pointer always contains an even number), two for a word and four for a long, and add this to a7. As a matter of efficiency, use `lea x(a7),a7` when x is greater than eight, otherwise use `addq`. Since the stack is also used to store the return address after a `jsr` instruction, failure to keep it tidy may result in it attempting to return to the wrong address, almost inevitably causing a crash.

## Monitor wizard

**HARDWARE** I run my ST through the SCART connector of my TV and I am very pleased with the results. I have just been given a Goldstar 1453+ VGA colour monitor, is there any way I can get it to work in medium resolution colour with my ST? I'm sure that there's a device available that enables a VGA PC to be used on a SCART TV.

**A** There is no device that enables an ST to be used in colour on a VGA monitor, although Ladbroke Computing (# 0772 203166) sell an adaptor for £20 that enables you to use the VGA monitor in high resolution mode. The only PC compatible monitors that enables you to use the ST's colour modes are multi-sync monitors, they start at around the £400 mark for a 14inch screen.

## Accessory problems

**FALCON** I am having problems accessing the Desk Accessories on my new Falcon030. I have an IDE hard drive installed and I have put the .ACC files in the Auto folder on drive C but they don't appear under the Desk menu. The MultiTOS quick start manual

# THE ST ANSWERS ANNUAL TOP TEN

We often get the same questions asked over and over every single month, here are some typical examples of the most popular questions you've sent us over the last 12 months

**1** I recently bought an Apricot XEN computer with a colour monitor and a 20MByte hard drive. Can I connect the hard drive to my S20STE?  
**A Mylnek, Lancs**

**stf:** Generally the answer is no unless the hard drive is a SCSI device, but you need a power supply, case and host adaptor to connect it to your ST. Most older PCs do not use SCSI drives so it's unlikely that you can use the hard drive.

**2** I want to connect my ST to my SCART TV and video recorder. Can you tell me where can I get the correct leads from?  
**Allen J Hynek, Wilts**

**stf:** You need to contact Meedmore (☎ 051 521 2202), they can supply any lead you want as long as you provide the make model number of the TV, monitor or video you want to connect your ST to. You should also specify which type of ST you have.

**3** I've been told that I could play PC games on my STE if I bought a PC emulator. Is this possible and, if so, which is the best one to buy?  
**Timothy Good, London**

**stf:** No, you cannot use a PC emulator to play PC games. PC emulators are designed to enable PC business software to be used on an ST, usually using a maximum of 16 colours in CGA mode and running slower than a 286 PC.

**4** I have bought a second-hand printer at an auction. It's a Digital 4205 serial printer from a mainframe. How do I connect it to my ST?  
**Ernest P Worrall, Derby**

**stf:** You can't! Serial printers are old and outdated and you won't be able to find a printer driver in any software to run it correctly. You should only buy Epson compatible parallel printers - also called Centronics - to use with your ST.

**5** I know the ST can read PC disks, so does this mean that I can run PC software on my 4MByte STE?  
**Jim Doohan, Canada**

**stf:** No it doesn't. All it means is that you can read the information on 720K disks formatted on a PC, this means that you can transfer ASCII text files, graphics and spreadsheet data but you cannot run PC software on your STE.

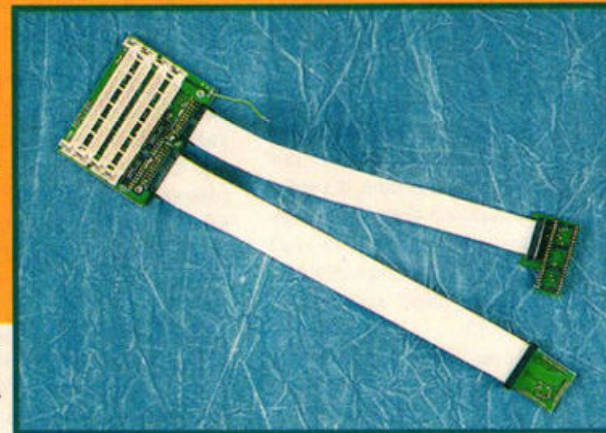

**6** Can you tell me if it's possible to use Jaguar games cartridges in the cartridge port of my STE, when they are released?  
**Avery Brooks, USA**

**stf:** You cannot use Jaguar hardware with any version of the ST or Falcon because it's designed around a completely different hardware architecture. Besides, Jag carts don't fit into the ST cartridge slot.

**7** I want to upgrade my STFM to 1MByte, what's the most reliable memory upgrade available and where can I get it?  
**Matthew Hill, Isleworth**

**stf:** The best - and easiest to install - memory upgrade for the STFM is the Marpet Xtra-RAM Deluxe kit. It's available direct from Marpet Developments (☎ 0423 712600) for £44.99 including the RAM.



also states that you can run a Desk Accessory by double-clicking on it but all I get is the message "you can only show or print this file." I don't know what am I doing wrong! Can you help?

**A** Desk Accessories do not load into the Desk menu because they are in a folder, you must copy them from the Auto folder to the root directory of your boot drive. All other files connected to a Desk Accessory - .INF and .RSC files usually - must also be in the root directory.

MultiTOS must be running before you can load Desk Accessories by double-clicking on them, they then load into the Desk menu in the same area as any other applications in memory. If MultiTOS isn't loaded then you get the error message you men-

tion. There's no need to load Desk Accessories in this way if you use some kind of boot management program like Superboot 8, a PD program which enables you to choose the Desk Accessories and Auto programs you wish to run when you boot-up the system.

## Training course

**BEGINNERS**  
I have just bought myself a 1040STE but I am having a bit of trouble getting used to the TOS/GEM operating system. I don't have much experience of STs as I've only ever used PCs before. Are there any books available that can help me discover more about using my ST?

**A** There are a few of good books you can get that teach you a

little more about the ST. The Atari ST Explored costs £9.95 from the ST Club (☎ 0602 455250) and is a good introductory guide to using your ST. Another popular beginners book is Your Second Manual to the Atari ST, which is also available from the ST Club for £8.95. This book takes a more light-hearted

approach to the subject and avoids too much technical jargon.

**stf:** Yes, you can call the file selector in GFA Basic using the following program;

Where on entry to the loop a\$ holds the pathname, n\$ holds the name of the file you wish to look for (this may be left empty n\$=""). On exiting the fileselector a\$ still holds the pathname

(this could have changed), n\$ now holds the filename that you wish to load (but not the pathname). So we have to put these two (a\$ and n\$) together to give us our path and filename to load.

Because a\$ returns "A:\\*.\*", we have to remove the wildcard so the line

does this for us, while adding both strings together so that we end up with

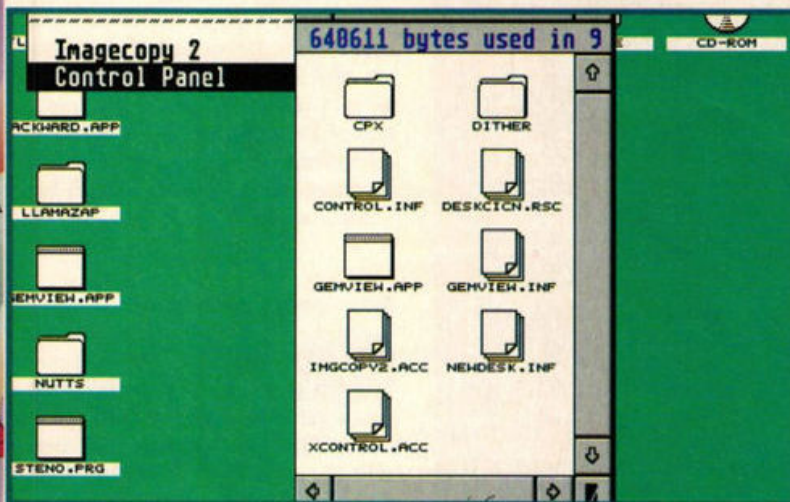

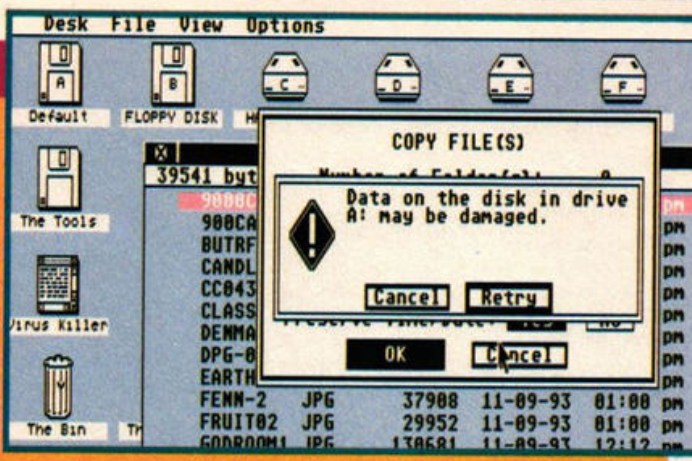

**stf:** No, you cannot use high density disks in a standard disk drive in an STE. To use 1.44MByte disks you must install a high density adaptor kit and a high density drive, you can get the complete kit from Analogic Computing (☎ 081 546 9575) for £79.95.

**9** I am keen to use the new image processing software for the Falcon on my STE, what do I

have to add to my system to be able to use programs like InShape?

**stf:** Falcon software like InShape only runs on the Falcon because it relies on the Falcon's own internal hardware. You could spend lots of money and add all sorts of hardware to your STE like a 16.7 million colour graphics board, hardware accelerator, loads of RAM and so on, but this would work out to be more expensive than buying a Falcon in the first place.

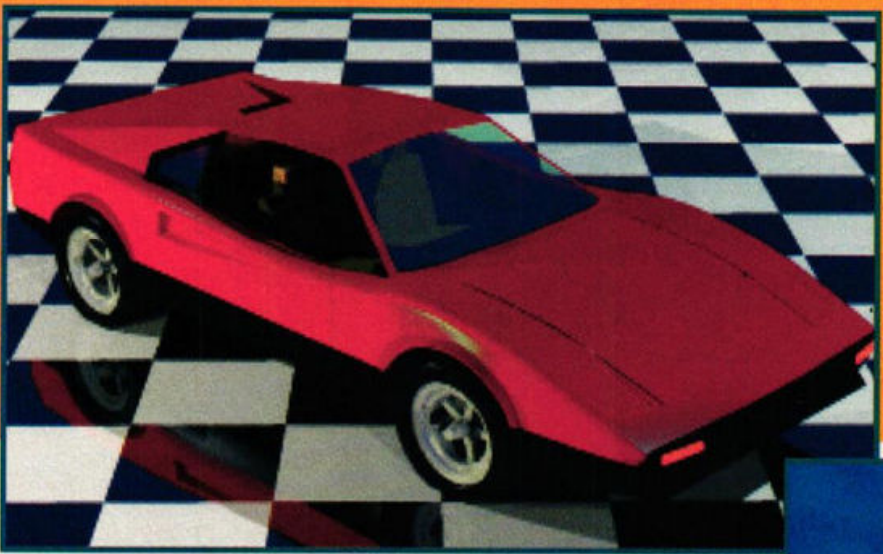

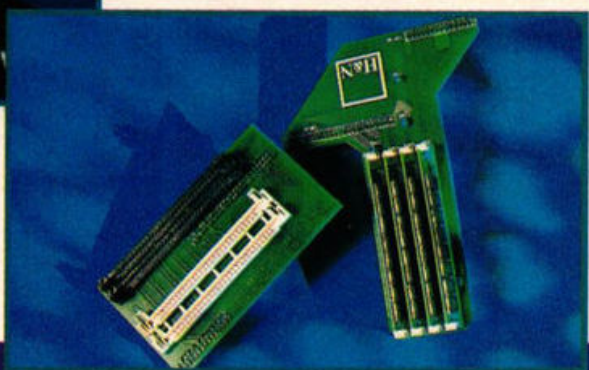

Detecting an error uses the same format as the <Control> <Shift> <Alternate> key combination. Type in the line

ON ERROR returns your machine to its normal error trapping state, where, if a fault arises, the appropriate error message appears and brings about an abnormal program termination. Both ON ERROR and ON BREAK can be used in the same program listing.

**Timed out**

Is there any way in which I can pause my programs or at least delay the operation of them so that a person using my program cannot just press a key to short cut the delay routine?

**stf:** If you use the command -EVNT\_TIMER(xxx), where xxx is the required delay in milliseconds (hundredths of a second).

For example, I would like to display a picture on the top third of the screen and let her draw on the bottom two-thirds of the screen. Do you know if there is any way that I can do this?

**stf:** The EVNT\_MOUSE command enables you to do just this.

Where a% and b% are the top left co-ordinates of the area where drawing is excluded, and c% and d% is the bottom right co-ordinates, x% and y% is the position of the mouse pointer, u% is the mouse button state and k% is the state of the <Shift> keys when an event occurs.

Program operation - while the left mouse button is held down and the mouse co-ordinates are outside our no go area, a point is plotted on the screen. To exit the program hold the <Control> key down while the mouse pointer is within the drawing area.

The variables a%, b%, c% and d% in our example have been set for low resolution and have to be altered if another resolution is to be used. The variable "flag," if set to zero has the opposite effect, enabling you to draw on the top third of the screen and leave the bottom two-thirds untouched.



## Music and MIDI

**More musical musings from Andy Curtis and his MIDI therapy group**

### TCB update

I've just been given ten disks full of TCB Tracker MODS but they won't load into my copy of Audio Sculpture. I asked a friend to check them and he says they are all OK but they won't work on anything but TCB Tracker. I don't think this is true because they load into my copy of the ESION tracker OK, just not Audio Sculpture. Is there something wrong with Audio Sculpture?

**Anthony Simons, Dorchester**

**stf:** TCB Tracker uses a slightly different file format to the other sound trackers but it is easily convertible. The ESION sound tracker was specially designed to load TCB Tracker MODS and convert them, when saved, to standard format. The program doesn't tell you it is doing this, but it is.

You were very near to solving your problem, save all the .MOD files when you have loaded them into ESION and then they work with Audio Sculpture.

### MIDI expression

I have been MIDI sequencing for quite a while but I am running into problems with the quantise feature of my sequencer. I like to play pieces with a lot of expression, that is, slowing down and speeding up so I don't like to use the metronome. However, when I come to quantise the pieces that I have done the music comes out all garbled. I thought quantise was there to help me to clean up my music, so is it really working?

**Christine Brown, Cornwall**

**stf:** What you need to understand is that the quantise feature of your sequencer is not a magic wand! If only it were. For quantise to be of use you have to play the original music as close to the beat as possible, this means having a metronome ticking away in the background. In simple terms, quantise "rounds up" notes to the nearest beat. If you are doing a quaver quantise (also known as eighth quantise) all of your notes are moved to the nearest quaver beat of the bar. If you have played without a metronome then your notes won't be anywhere near the beats of the bar at all - particularly if you are speeding up and slowing down, this is why you are getting problems.

When working with MIDI it is sometimes necessary to achieve results in a slightly different way, this means playing the notes in strict time and then changing the tempo throughout the piece afterwards. If you work at it you can produce music with a great feel. If you are convinced that you cannot work this way then simply use your sequencer as a multi-track tape recorder, just don't expect the quantise feature to work.

### Fade to grey

I give up! I've tried everything and the only way I can get my MIDI music to fade out properly is to edit each individual note velocity using grid edit. It took me a whole afternoon to organise a nice smooth fade on my last piece of music. There has got to be an easier way. I use Cubase and I'm going to get v3. Please can you help!

**Bill Titterington, Rosendale**

**stf:** There are several different ways of going about this. A quick way to get a fade-out is to use the "baton" in key edit and simply paint the values on. Click on the "CNTRL" button and a row of controller information

appears at the bottom of the screen. Move your pointer over the top of the bar until the hand appears and drag it upwards. You should now be looking at lots of vertical bars representing velocity. Select the "baton" using the right-hand mouse button and now you can paint the values you desire very quickly indeed for each part. Not only fades are possible, but swells and all manner of expression. Have fun.

### Tuning samples

I have been collecting samples for quite a while now and I'm trying to make a complete collection so I can produce soundtracker music to order in any style. I have bought many samples from Public Domain libraries and also commercial ones. My problem is that so few of them are in tune with each other. When I load them into Audio Sculpture and play the same note with each sound, different pitches come out. Do you know if there's a way that I can rectify this?

**Julien Deville, Hants**

**stf:** This is a tricky little problem and one that needs patience to solve. The real trick is to use a reference tone, record a stable note on a tape recorder and have the tape handy. Using Soundlab (or any good sample manipulation package), load in the sample. Go to the tuning section and move the sample's pitch until it matches the tone on your tape. Now, click on the "Convert" (or whatever) button and the sample locks at the required pitch. Do this with all the samples you wish to use and they work well together.

You may need to play around a little with the pitch of the reference tone initially but, once you have it worked out, this is a foolproof method.

### Unblock those nozzles

The nozzles on inkjet cartridges have a nasty tendency to become clogged with dried ink resulting in streaky printouts, this usually happens if the printer hasn't been used for a while. A quick and easy way to clear the nozzles is to steam-clean them, boil a kettle and pour a small

quantity of boiling water in a mug. Hold the cartridge half an inch over the hot water for about 30 seconds or so then wipe the cartridge dry with a tissue without touching the nozzles. Install the cartridge in the printer and try a test print, all the dried ink clogging the nozzles should have been removed. If it doesn't work the first time then you

may have to try a longer exposure to the steam.

**Mark Jones, Bournemouth**

**A** Thanks for the tip Mark, there are a couple of points we should make regarding your advice. First, it can be very dangerous to mess about with boiling water, it's dead easy to scald yourself if you're not

careful. Second, make sure that there is no moisture on the electrical contacts when you replace the inkjet cartridge back into the printer.

### Data glutton

I am writing a database program, but it takes for ever to load or save the data using OPEN, PRINT # and similar commands. Is there a faster way of accessing the data?

**stf:** There is a quicker way to do this. By copying the data from the array it's originally stored in into a memory bank then using BSAVE to save it, or conversely, use BLOAD to load the data to a memory bank then copy it back into the array. This listing should give you the general idea.

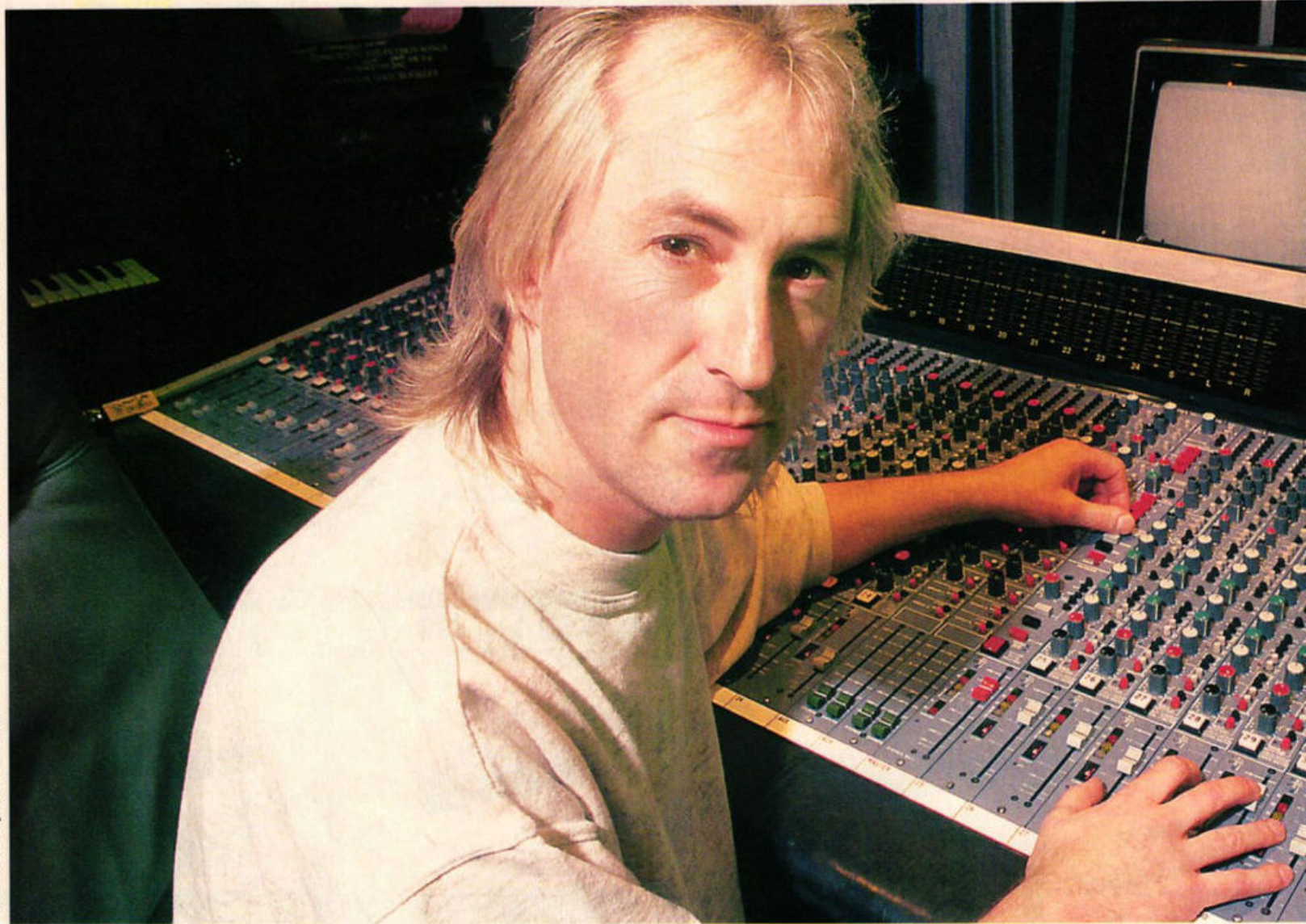

**D**oes the song *Always Look On The Bright Side Of Life* mean anything to you? How about *Every Sperm Is Sacred*? *One Foot In The Grave*? Ring any bells?

Well, they have two things in common. All were written in conjunction with members of Monty Python (who are they? Get a life), and all three were written by André Jacquemin. André, who has been producing and recording music since the early '70s, runs his own audiovisual production company in London. He's an avid Atari fan, owning three different STs, and he

has used *Cubase* professionally for several years.

Having written the odd article for our sister magazine, *Future Music*, we thought that André was per-

fectly placed to review *Cubase Audio* on the Falcon for *ST FORMAT*. He agreed, so we let him borrow our Falcon and a 1GByte (1,000 MByte) hard drive over Christmas for him to play around with. Now we've received his review, which starts on the opposite page, we thought you might like to know something about the man himself before you read it. So, here he is.

#### Presenting...

"At the moment I do a fair bit of work for TV companies, composing and writing music." Since 1970

André has been working with Monty Python, sometimes composing sometimes producing varied work such as *The Lumberjack Song*, the soundtrack for *The Life of Brian*, and the ground-breaking *Matching Tie and Hankie*, a record which contained three different grooves - which one played depending on which the needle hit first.

Since then he's done the odd bit of work for the ex-Pythons, such as the *One Foot in the Grave* theme with Eric Idle, and the soundtrack for *A Fish Called Wanda*.

"Last year with Dave Howman I co-wrote a 13 part cartoon series

a few hours he packs it up and looks for something else. That's one reason why he found *Cubase* to be so good.

"*Cubase* is very easy to use," enthuses André. "My first sequencer was *Pro-24*, and I couldn't get on with that. After living with it for about two days, and then reading the manual, I sold it. I'd rather not bother, because it was so quirky to use. When *Cubase* came along, within an hour I had a 30-second commercial written on it. It was brilliant."

André's studio is already equipped with an 8-track D2D recorder – a Dawn system running on an Apple Quadra 950. "It's slightly different to *Cubase Audio* – I paid £24,000 for it, which is quite expensive," André told us. "But, you do get eight inputs and eight outputs, so it's slightly more serious. Having said that, in a sense I thought *Cubase Audio* was just as good value for money but I couldn't do as many things with it. Eventually, you will be able to, I reckon. One day you'll be able to buy a box add-on with eight inputs and outputs."

"I think *Cubase Audio* is going to follow where *Soundtools* was about five years ago. *Pro-*

called *Rubbish – King of the Jungle*, for HTV," he says. "I'm doing a bit for the Cartoon Network at the moment – the satellite channel. I do a lot of their promo music. Generally my work is with records, though."

"I produced the music for Mike Leigh's last film, *Naked*," André continues. "That was quite good because it was in Dolby Stereo. I like to do a bit of everything, really, as long as it's audio work. I've just finished a film for Eric Sykes called *The Big Freeze*. That's sort of like *The Plank*, a silent farce with Bob Hoskins playing Tommy Cooper."

## Getting to grips

What makes André such a good assessor of new products is that he is incredibly impatient with manuals. He doesn't like reading them, and if he hasn't got to grips with a piece of equipment within

*tools* now goes up to 16-tracks, and I think *Cubase Audio* will soon have to meet that kind of criteria. In a sense it's a shame that Atari didn't get the Falcon together a little earlier."

After looking at the Falcon, André's even considering buying one for himself. "I'm going to leave it for a few months, but I would consider buying one. Even just for doing my master mixes, because DAT is all very well but you still get error corrections which cause problems. The incompatibilities between the error corrections in Sony, Otari and Fostex DAT machines is horrendous. So, a Falcon would be good to store all my mixes."

**D**espite the many things Atari have got wrong over the last decade, the one major thing they gave ST users, and got right, was to put direct MIDI access onto the ST keyboard. It's not quite industry standard, but it works and works well. This contributing factor has opened the doors and given access to everyone with an ST who wishes to turn their dreams of producing music into reality.

We have been fortunate enough to be supplied with countless programs to run on STs, from sound editors for synths to sequencers for composing. Notably, *C-Lab* and Steinberg's *Cubase* have been picked up in the professional market-place and have revolutionised the way we put music tracks together. It was difficult to see, up until now, how things can be improved. After all, you can compose and conduct a full symphony orchestra from your living room. You can even compose music to film running in sync and hitting cue points accurately with your video recorder.

Well, yet again there are major developments going on in

the way we put music and soundtracks together with direct-to-disk recording. One of these packages has been developed by Steinberg and it's called *Cubase Audio*. If you are familiar with *Cubase* as a sequencer, you know that it's friendly and easy to use. Add a facility to turn your computer system into an 8-track recording system to your MIDI set-up and you

can now become your own band, engineer and producer.

I was very pleased when *ST FORMAT* contacted me to see if I'd be interested in doing this review of *Cubase Audio*. As a professional *Cubase* user I was keen to check out the system which has been developed on the Falcon.



# THE LOW-DOWN

### Does it crash?

All computers have their bugs and unfortunately crashing is the worst, so continually saving is an absolute must. However, in the time I had the pleasure of using this program it performed without any problems.

### Ease of use

If you like *Cubase* as a sequencer you're going to love using this!

### Flexibility and versatility

As a user friendly program you can get to grips with *Cubase* fairly easily but make sure you

have a sufficiently huge hard drive with lots of memory and quick access times. Occasionally when loading existing programs they can become fragmented, that is, corrupted. This is not too big a problem with *Cubase Audio* and a decent defragmentation program rescues any problem files. So when you buy this program ask your dealer for recommendations of packages.

### Is it worth it?

Well, if you are a musician and you demo tracks at home D2D systems are definitely worth

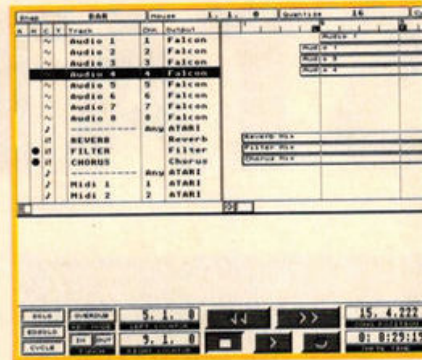
checking out as the amount of flexibility is astounding. If, however, you just like to dabble with sound it's probably not worth the financial outlay.

### Number of tracks

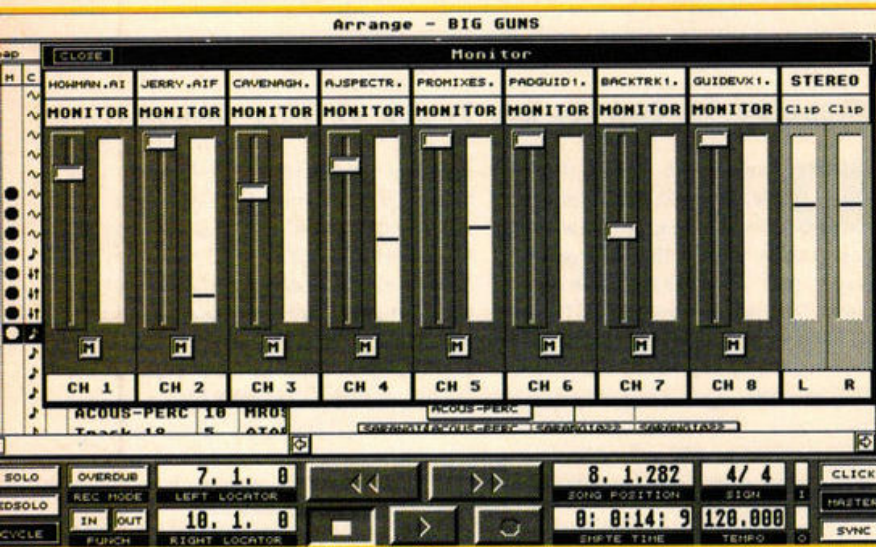
There are eight tracks - but the downfall is that it only has two inputs and two outputs.

### Recording Quality

*Cubase* uses the processing power of the Falcon so we're looking at 16-bit digital audio record and playback with up to 50 KHz sampling rate.

### D2D, or not D2D?

With direct-to-disk recording (or D2D recording) you have the capabilities and potential to record to the state-of-the-art technology. A simple analogy would be if you could imagine word processing with sound. After recording a track you can cut it, copy it, paste it, stretch it, loop it... I could go on but I guess this is where the art bit comes in.

There are many systems on D2D recording, with many more in development - from computer-based to specifically-built dedicated systems such as the AMS Audiofile and DAR sound station. These dedicated systems have been around for some time, but in the last three years or so computers have been able to cater for the

complexities that D2D recording demands. All of these systems use the same process for recording, which is to store the audio onto large memory hard drives.

If there's one thing you need a lot of, it's disk space! To record

one minute of mono sound you need 5MBytes of disk space, that's 10MBytes in stereo. So for 20 minutes mono or ten minutes stereo recording you need 100MBytes. This disk capacity is shared across all the tracks, so you may have four minutes recorded across four of the tracks and 16 minutes on another single track, which means you need 100MBytes of disk space.

This is the only major area of huge financial outlay, and considering some of the systems that are available can cost you well over £25,000, the Falcon option has got to be worth looking at. Or do you get what you pay for? Well, *Cubase Audio* does have some shortfalls but it also has some surprising extras too.

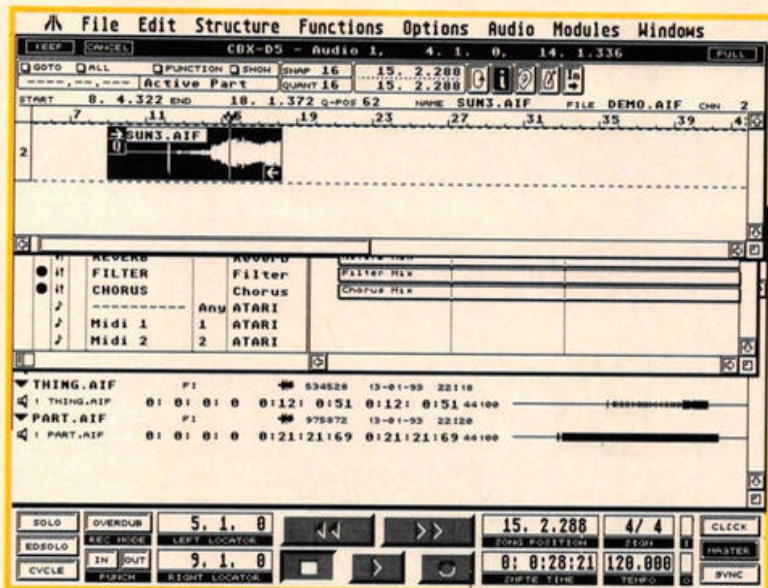
### Modes of operation

To get started you need a Falcon with at least 4MBytes of RAM. This isn't ideal because the *Cubase Audio* program takes up the best part of this memory, but at least it's enough to get you going. Eventually you should look to get 14MBytes on board to get any satisfactory results.

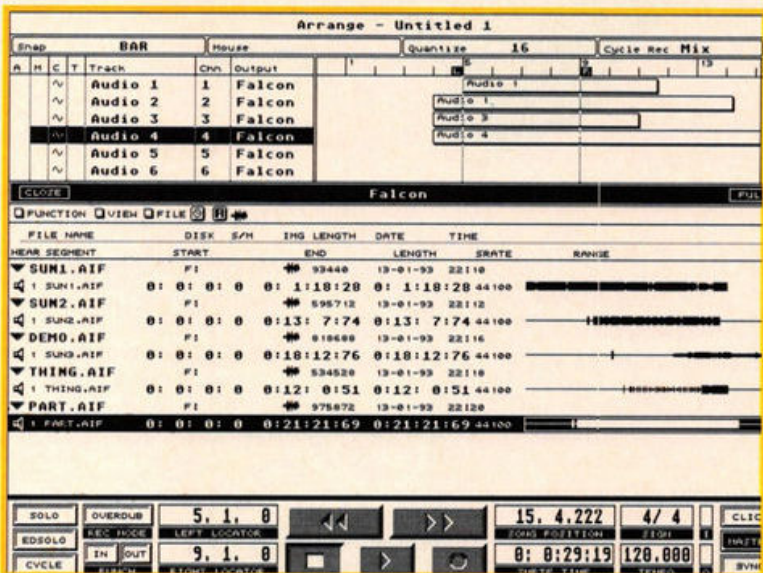
*Cubase Audio* is unique in that it can choose three ways of

Each individual track can be analysed in sections on the Segment page. This displays your recorded audio as one or a series of many sections, which don't actually contain any audio, but point to a particular area in the main audio file. When looping and joining samples to create a song, this conserves valuable disk space.



The Pool screen enables you to view the audio tracks on the same screen, information such as length and sampling rate, and a graphical representation. Clicking on the speaker icon plays the individual track.

using the eight audio channels, each of which uses a different amount of memory. In the normal operating mode you would select the Hard Disk option which means that the audio channel reads its files direct from the hard drive once when recorded and then again during playback.

#### In RAM

In the RAM operating mode the chosen channel can record and play back from RAM, and the recording is automatically recorded onto the hard drive as well. One advantage of this type of recording could be that before an extensive editing session on a piece, you could save this to the internal drive or even a floppy, thus saving valuable memory.

The third option is to use Sample mode. There are a few drawbacks here as the sampler

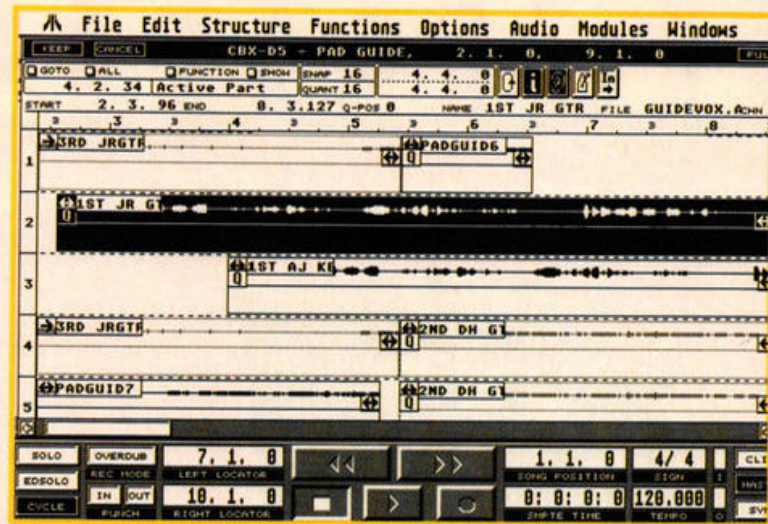
channels store audio in RAM and can only be used for mono sound files. However, you can assign various sampler channels to receive

MIDI triggers, and these assigned MIDI triggers can be recorded onto a separate dedicated track and played back. You can also trigger several audio files simultaneously.

#### Limited I/Os

Although the Falcon has eight separate tracks to record and playback

from, it has only one stereo input and output. Unfortunately, this limits its use in many professional applications such as the need for separate balancing, moving pans and audio sweetening (adding effects) during mix down. But look at it this way, with more outputs you would undoubtedly need a larger mixing desk and an extra add on processing box to access the separate channels, and it would cost a hell of a lot more to buy.

On the positive side, you can automate a mix internally by adjusting the volume, doing channel mutes and panning; even adding reverb, parametric filtering and chorus effects. It should be noted though that the effects can only be produced one at a time, but as you are in the digital domain you can copy and add as much as you like without degrading the original recording.

Once you have done all the treatment you want on each track, the channels can then be recorded directly onto one mono or stereo track. Again, once you've completed the mix you can mute and keep the originals for safety or use them for new recordings.

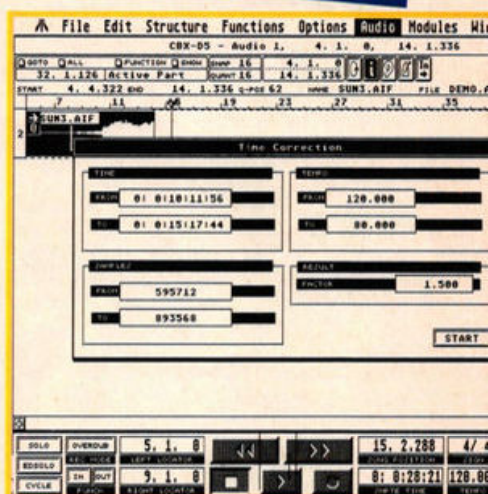
#### Verdict

Cubase Audio retains all of the original features and user friendliness that made Cubase one of the most popular sequencers to date - but with the added advantage of built-in recording. All the facilities for copying parts, editing and moving tracks around are really straightforward if you're already a Cubase user. Even if you're relatively new to sequencing the visual aspect to Cubase makes it a very intuitive program to operate.

If you are using your ST for music, and you're thinking of upgrading to the Falcon with all its faster advantages, then definitely check this package out. **stf**

An important and powerful function is Time Stretch. This enables you to mark out a section of audio, and stretch or squash its length without affecting its pitch. So, if you have a breakbeat that doesn't quite fit into your loop, you can make it slightly longer until it does - and it won't affect the sound.

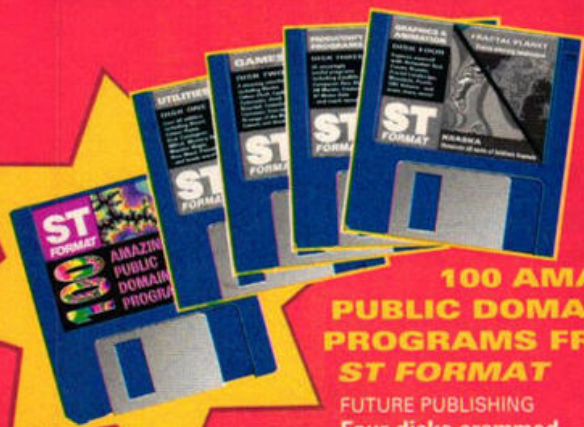

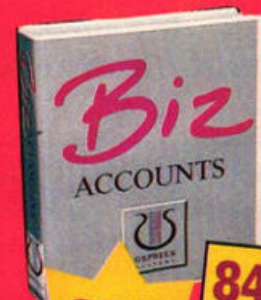

# UNDERSTANDING



**Although the Falcon looks superficially similar to your ST, its operating system is very different. Clive Parker takes a look at the major differences between these two machines**



■ The Falcon looks like your ST but it's a much more powerful piece of kit altogether.

**Y**our Falcon is a radically different machine to your ST. Apart from a few extra ports and some cosmetic colour changes, it looks almost exactly like a standard STE or STFM. If you've just upgraded to a Falcon, or added a Falcon to your system then you've probably noticed a few big changes in the main operating system and in the look of the Desktop as well.

The Falcon's Desktop is much more colourful than the ST's, and if you're in VGA mode, it's much larger too. A coloured version of the TOS 2/TOS 3 Desktop icons are included enabling you to install a more pleasing Desktop layout on your screen. If you haven't used TOS 2.06 on your ST then you won't be used to the idea of installing program icons on the

■ Left - Ah, this is much better. The Falcon's Desktop has a completely different look, it's colourful and you can customise it to suit yourself.

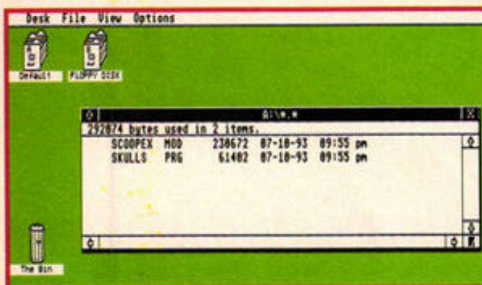
Desktop, the more modern versions of TOS enable you to drag a program icon from a drive window and place it anywhere on the Desktop in exactly the same way as a drive icon. When you save the Desktop the position of the icon is saved and you can run the program by double-clicking on the Desktop icon whenever you boot up your Falcon.

### Using ST software

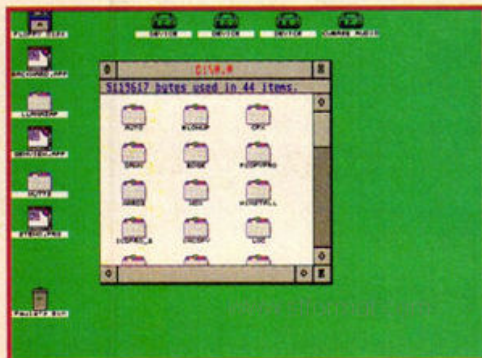
One of the biggest problems with the Falcon is that a lot of ST software simply doesn't run on the new machine. There are several

reasons for this, these simple guidelines should enable you to find out what software works on your new machine.

Almost all GEM based software runs happily on the Falcon as

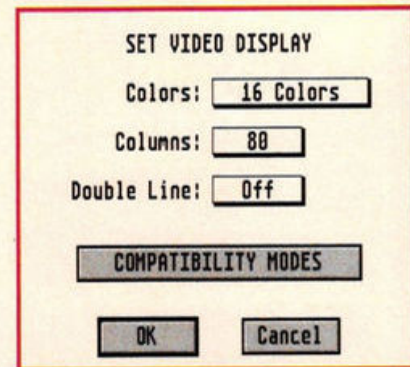

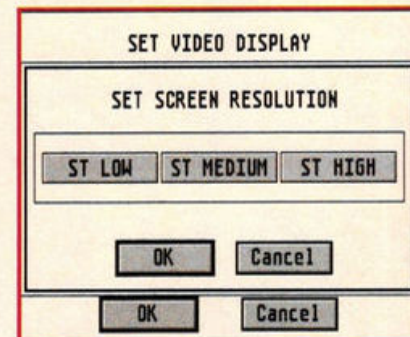

long as it has been written correctly following the official Atari programming guidelines. You can identify GEM programs because they use the drop-down menu bar at the top of the screen, provide access to Desk Accessories and output all screen data in GEM windows.

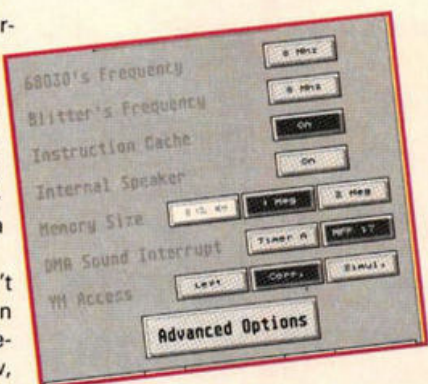
Some GEM programs won't work in any of the Falcon's screen modes because they look for a specific ST screen resolution - low, medium or high - and exit with an error message if they don't find the right resolution. None of the Falcon's own resolutions is an exact counterpart of the ST's resolutions.

To get around this problem the Falcon's video operating system has ST screen modes built in, to access them you have to select Compatibility Modes from the Set Video function in the Options menu. This enables you to run ST low, medium or high resolutions on any type of monitor. Running one of the compatibility modes usually enables a GEM program to run on the Falcon, and most TOS programs also run under the compatibility modes.

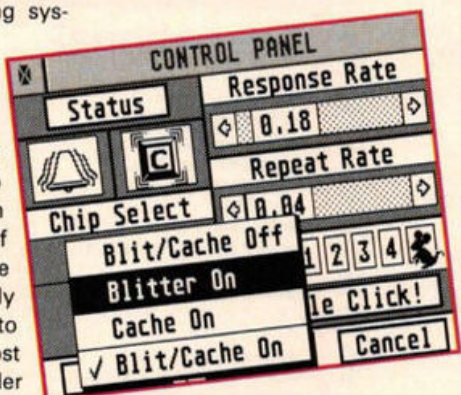
### Other options

If you find your software still doesn't run then there are a couple of other options to consider. The Falcon has a hard drive cache which some ST software doesn't like, the latest version of the XControl Panel enables the cache to be disabled by clicking on a button in the Chipset CPX. Other software may not like the 16MHz clock speed of the Falcon's 68030, there is no way of changing the processor speed to 8MHz using a CPX at present although there are several PD utilities that set the processor speed from the Auto Folder.

Games are a big problem, ST games just aren't designed to run on anything but an ST. To enable some ST games to run you need a program called *Backwards*, it's an ST emulator for the Falcon and enables about 70% of ST games to run. It's available from most PD libraries and was also featured on *ST FORMAT* Cover Disk 55 (see page 60 if you missed it). The program's stuffed with options enabling your Falcon to be configured, but it's worth noting that different games need different setups so it's basically trial and error. **stf**



Games are more difficult to run on your Falcon. The excellent *Backwards* ST emulator fools your Falcon into thinking that it's just a humble ST and enables about 70% of ST games to run.



Disabling the Cache sometimes enables some ST software to run on the Falcon, the Blitter doesn't usually make any difference.

## Ten ways to get more from your Falcon

- 1 The internal speaker of the Falcon is included because VGA monitors do not have speakers, an external set of powered speakers connected to the headphone socket is a useful addition if you are using sound sampling software.
- 2 If you don't have a hard drive then always use High Density (HD) disks, Falcon sound and graphic files tend to be on the large side.
- 3 If you are using VGA resolution or 640x400 with interlace on a standard monitor then it's a good idea to set your Falcon to 16 colour mode, this improves screen scrolling in text based applications.
- 4 Your Falcon whizzes along at a respectable 16MHz, adding NVDI (System Solutions) to accelerate the system makes the already fast Falcon seem turbo-charged.
- 5 If you don't have a hard drive already then get one. Almost all Falcon software relies on a hard drive.
- 6 All of the major Public Domain libraries already have reasonable Falcon sections. Most software seems to be either demos or graphics programs but some good utilities are mixed in.
- 7 If you have a standard Atari (or Philips) colour monitor then you can emulate VGA mode for using serious graphics software.
- 8 If you intend to use the Falcon for D2D recording then your best bet is to get an external SCSI hard drive - the larger and faster the drive, the better. Use the internal hard drive for the software and the external drive for the files.
- 9 If you have a 1MByte RAM Falcon then upgrade it to 4MBytes. There's very little Falcon software available that just uses 1MByte.
- 10 If you can't afford a 16MByte RAM upgrade - typically costing £700 or more - then use a virtual memory program like *Outside* available from 16/32 Systems. This program enables you to use an area of the hard drive as if it were RAM and only costs around £70.

## THE ALL IMPORTANT FALCON JARGON

**32-bit:** The 68030 is a 32-bit processor, this means it can process twice as much data as a 16-bit processor in just one single operation.

**68030:** The main processor in the Falcon, a 32-bit processor that is a direct descendant of the 68000 found in the ST.

**68882 Co-processor:** Also known as a floating-point processor, this chip copes with complex mathematical operations at very high speeds leaving the 68030 processor free to concentrate on other tasks.

**CPX:** Control Panel eXtension, the Falcon uses a special Desk Accessory called the XControl Panel to load small utilities called CPXs. These can be unloaded when they are no longer required.

**D2D:** Direct to disk recording, the Falcon's DSP system enables CD quality recordings to be

made and stored on a hard drive. Basically, direct to disk recording is a very advanced form of sound sampling.

**DSP 56001:** Digital Signal Processor, this is the chip that enables the Falcon to run such powerful applications. The DSP is a parallel processor that enables digital sound and graphics data to be processed at very high speeds.

**HD drive:** 1.44MByte high density drives are fitted as standard in the Falcon, enabling twice as much data to be stored as on a standard floppy disk.

**IDE hard drive:** Falcons come supplied with an internal IDE hard drive. This is fitted as standard enabling software to run at high speed.

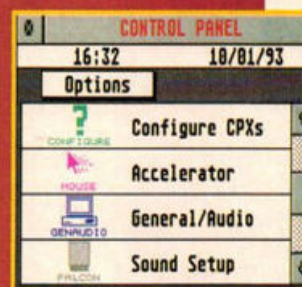
**MultiTOS:** Hard drive based multi-tasking operating system enabling more than one program to run at once.

**SCSI2:** The SCSI2 socket is the external hard drive connection of the Falcon, enabling CD-ROMs, optical drives and other SCSI devices to be used.

**True colour:** A bit of a fib here by Atari, the Falcon screen mode should really be called high colour. True colour means any pixel on the screen can be any colour without any palette restrictions, the Falcon is in fact restricted to 32,000 colours.

**VGA:** Virtual Graphics Array, VGA mode is 640x480 pixels using up to 256 colours.

Atari's XControl Panel enables as many CPX utilities to be loaded as memory permits.







# THE INSIDE STORY

**So how do the various cogs and gears mesh inside your keyboard to produce what you see on-screen? Clive Parker gets out his tools and probes gingerly within...**

**D**isaster! Your ST seems to be broken, it's died – or at the very least it's severely depressed – and you fear you may never get the chance to nuke a level of *Lemmings* again. In most cases of "sudden ST sleeping syndrome" there's no need to fret

be confronted with a totally unresponsive mouse, a dead keyboard and continuous beeping from the speaker. You begin to panic and feel all warm and a touch sweaty. Nothing you do seems to work even when you turn off your ST and start again, you fear that you may have to take your ST for an expensive trip to the repair man.

In fact, the solution to this particular nightmare is nothing more difficult than turning off the auto-fire button of your joystick. The continuous signals sent to the joystick port by the auto-fire button swamp any signals that are sent from the mouse or the keyboard, and because your ST can't get any instructions it appears to be dead.

**An intelligent keyboard**  
As you pound furiously away at your ST keyboard you may imag-

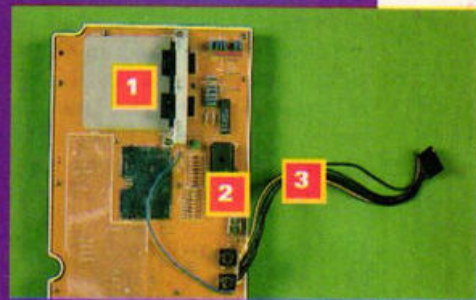

too much because there's usually a perfectly simple solution.

This typical example happens to all of us at some time. You turn on your trusty old ST and go through the warm-up delay, you finally get to the Desktop only to

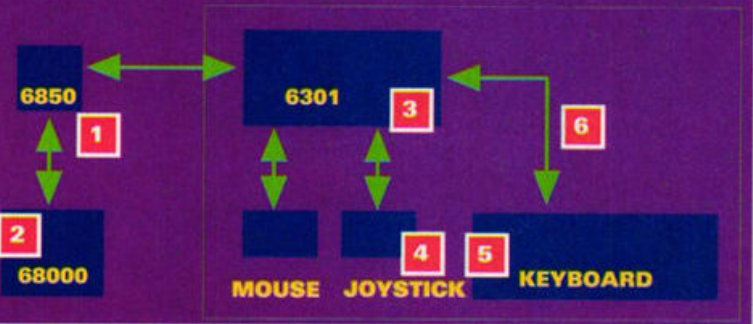

ine that the information generated by each key is instantly entered into the program you are running. Well it's not. In fact, a very complex process takes place between you pressing the key and the character appearing on the screen.

The keyboard is controlled by a special keyboard processor chip called the 6301. The 6301 is known as an intelligent processor

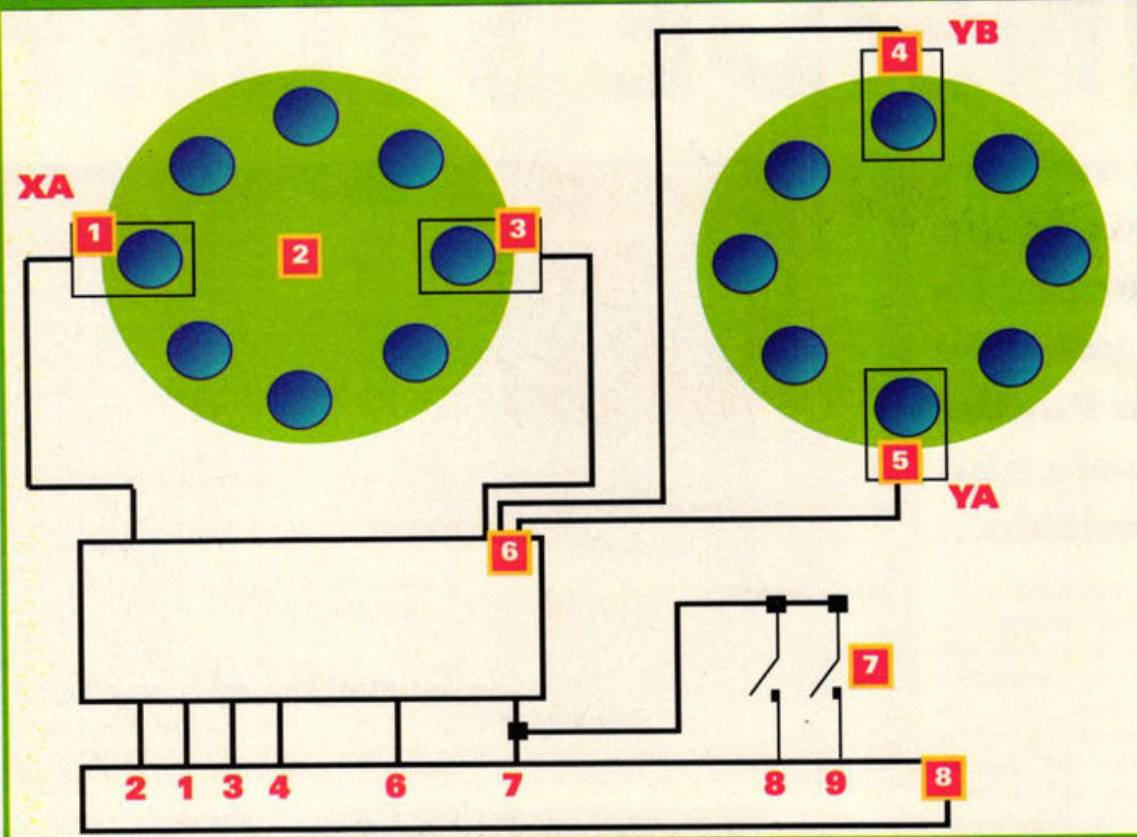
because it can receive data as well as send it, in fact, it's a complete single-chip computer in its own right. It contains 128 bytes of RAM, 4K of ROM, I/O lines and a serial interface for communication with the main 68000 processor of the ST. The ST's real-time clock is also part of the keyboard processor.

All of the information generated by the keyboard is dealt with by the keyboard processor, including data from the mouse and joystick ports, which means that the main processor doesn't have to keep an eye on the keyboard.

The 6301 lets the system know of any activity taking place in the keyboard including working out which key has been pressed, joystick movement and calculating the mouse position. Only the actual X and Y co-ordinates of the mouse pointer are sent to the 68000, leaving the main system processor to get on with running the current program. The last link in the chain between the keyboard and the

**IT'S DEAD, JIM**  
There is another cause of the ST "dying" which is connected to the keyboard processor that can cause you needless worry. If you have the mouse buttons pressed when you boot your ST then the processor tries to enter a special mode of operation not supported by the ST's hardware and everything "locks up" completely. The only way to remedy this is to reset your ST and make sure you don't play with the mouse buttons when you boot up.

# A CLOCKWORK MOUSE



**There are all kinds of bits and pieces tucked away inside your mouse, here's how they all link together to move the cursor**

main system is an ACIA 6850 serial interface chip that controls the flow of information to and from the 68000. Data from the keyboard is sent to the main circuit board of the ST where the 6850 ensures that keyboard data is passed on a complete byte at a time.

### Inside your mouse

Your mouse is one of the most vital parts of your ST, without it you wouldn't be able to use any of your software except auto-loading games. So how does it actually work? The internal construction of

the mouse isn't very complicated at all considering the precise positional information that has to be sent to the main processor to control the mouse cursor on-screen. The basic components consist of two encoder wheels, four light barriers, which detect the movement of the wheels, and a drive mechanism - that's better known as the rubber ball.

The mouse sends information to your ST about the cursor position on-screen and the mouse button status. Movement information is broken down into direction in the

X-axis, direction in the Y-axis and the distance travelled.

When you move the mouse over your mouse mat, the rubber ball turns the drive axles of the two encoder wheels, set at right angles to each other, and the direction of the mouse movement determines which way the wheels turn. Each encoder wheel has a series of holes in it, the light barriers detect the movement of the encoder wheels by the interruptions to the light. Every time the light is interrupted a pulse is sent, by counting the number of pulses the amount of movement can be calculated.

Determining the direction of movement is slightly more complicated. Each encoder wheel has two light barriers that record pulses slightly out of step with each other so they don't send pulses at the same time. The keyboard proces-

sor senses which of the two barriers on a wheel sends the first pulse first, this determines the correct direction of movement. A small amplifier chip in the mouse cleans up and strengthens the pulses from the encoder wheels so that they are strong enough to be analysed by the keyboard processor.

### Joysticks and trackballs

Joysticks send the same left and right and up and down information to the keyboard processor as the mouse. Instead of the slightly more complex system used in the mouse a joystick sends its directional information by simply completing a circuit or closing a microswitch, there's no messing about with calculating pulses. Trackballs work in much the same way as the mouse, moving the ball drives a similar set of wheels and detector. **stf**

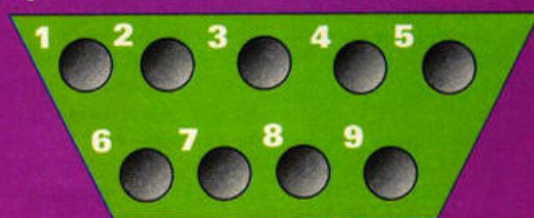

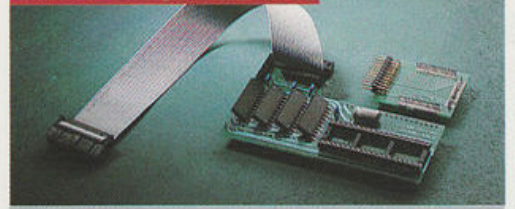

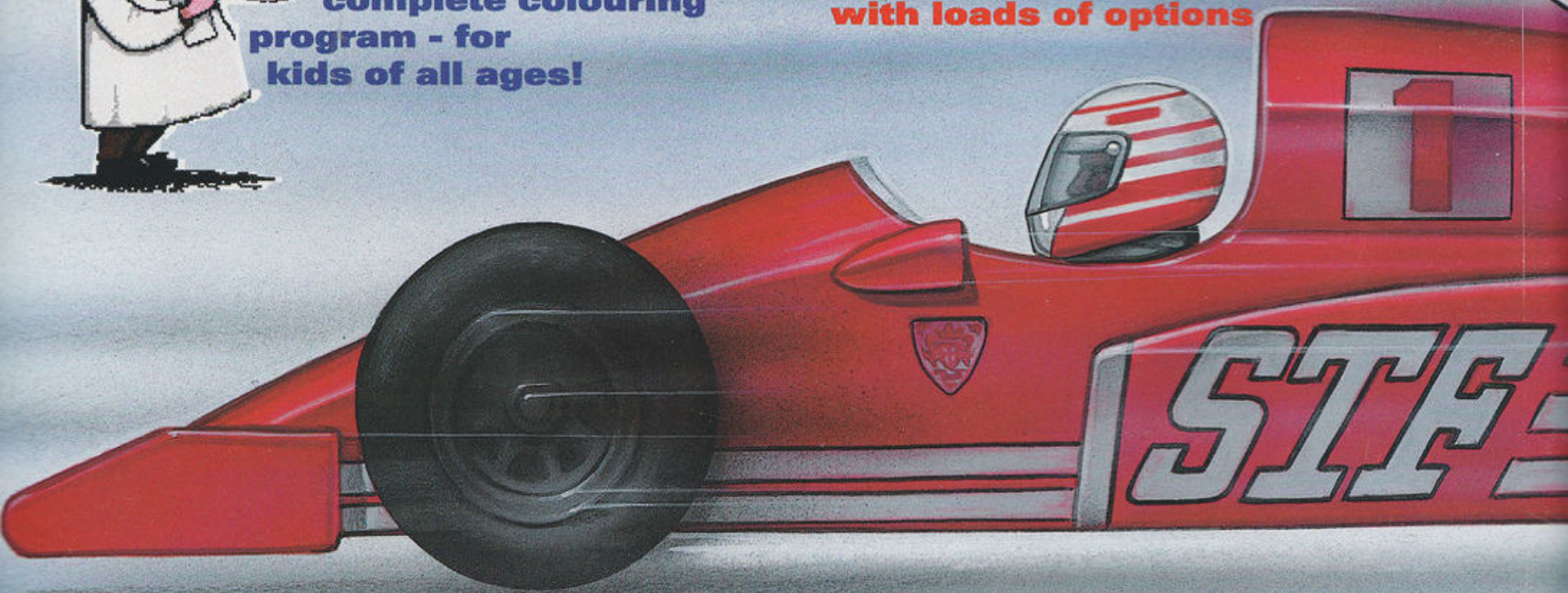
