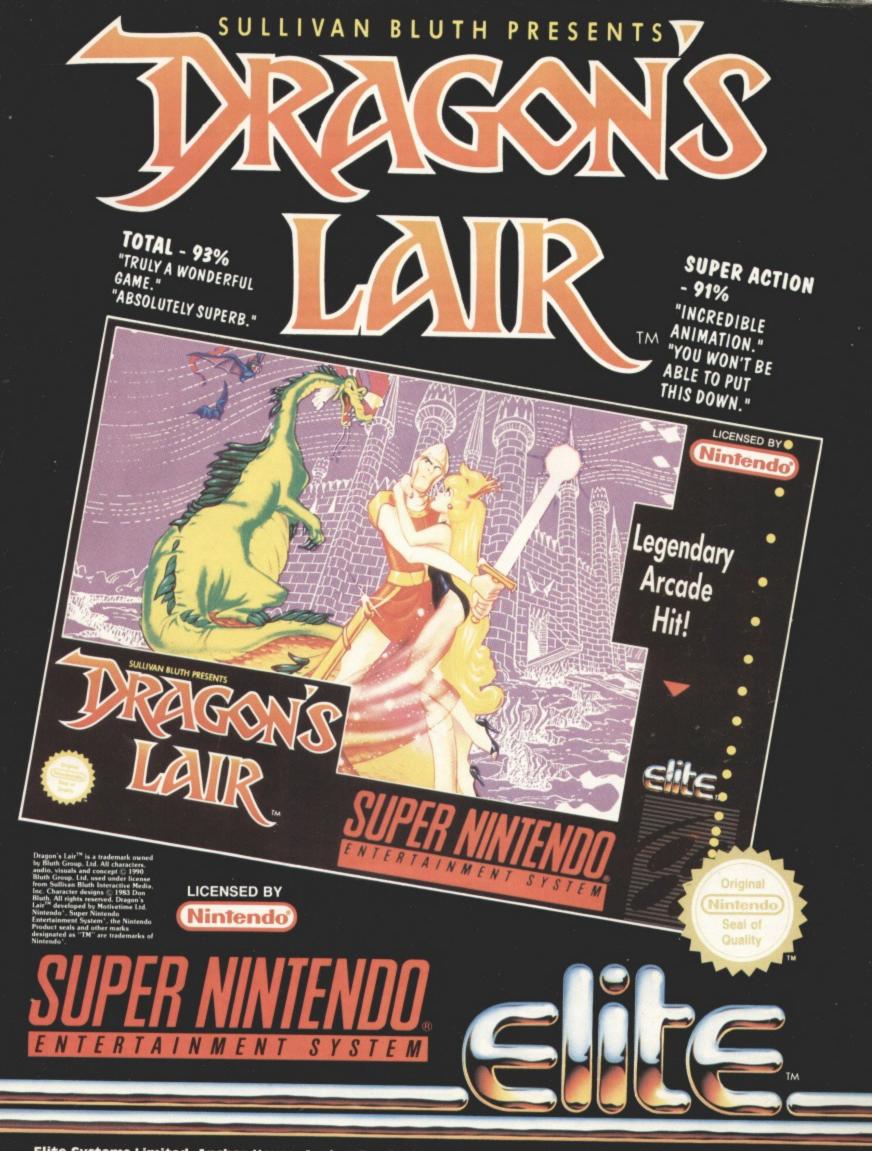

erhaps the most eagerly-awaited game at the moment is Super Star Wars. The NES Star Wars game was fabulous, but from what we've seen of the Super NES version we're in for something really special.

It's a multi-level job, in which you play top Star Wars characters (well, Luke, Chewbacca and Han Solo). There are quite a few walkingaround-with-light-sabres-and-blasters levels, interspersed with some beat-'em-up bits and gob-smacking Mode 7 3D levels. (The last level, where you fly an X-Wing down a trench on the Death Star, might be a bit of an anti-climax, but only in the light of the brilliant bits that precede it.) Plus, the game boasts what has to be one of the best SNES soundtracks we've heard. The Star Wars theme and incidental music are reproduced in all their orchestral

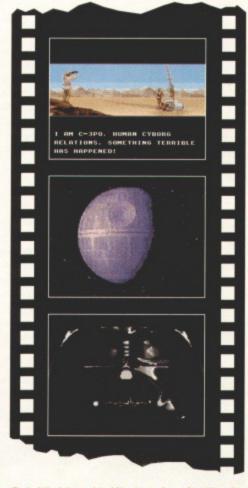

glory. With fab intro sequences and links as well, the Star Wars 'feel' is captured perfectly.

FOREIGN RELEASE PREVIEWS

Super Play's guide to upcoming games, this month concentrating on Japanese and American releases.

Check out Datebook on page 113 to see just how many SNES games are now being released in Japan and the US. Here we've selected a few of the more exciting ones for a closer look...

IMAGINEER

One of the new breed of games to use the SNES mouse is the classic *Populous II*. It's been a huge success across a wide variety of computer formats, and is to be released in Japan in January. It's by UK developers Bullfrog, who also have *Powermonger* due later in the year. Plus, Maxis' *Sim Ant*, again from Imagineer, is scheduled for March.

KONAMI

Easily one of the best producers of SNES software, Konami have three games lined up for release before March. *Tiny Toons* is the first, appearing in Japan on 18 December. Although only a 4 meg cart, *Tiny Toons* was one of the best things shown at the Famicom Space World '92 held in August this year in Tokyo. (See last issue for more details).

Conventional beat -'em-up action from Konami in Batman Returns? Find out next February.

Then there's the long-awaited Batman Returns game, expected in late February, and including some Final Fight-style beat-'em-up action.

Lastly, there's *NFL Football* in March. This looks stunning, with full screen 3D rotation of the pitch and detailed players. More news shortly.

MISAWA ENTERTAINMENT CO

These guys are in some way connected to Imagineer – Peter Molyneux wrote about their wacky horizontal scroller, *Columbus*, last issue. You take Columbus' ship, the *Santa Maria*, on a trip to America – shooting things all the way. It's a very odd concept – we can only hope that rumours that the game's been cancelled aren't true.

NAKAT

Right then, this is the one we're all waiting for – Naxat's Super Pinball, Anyone who's played Alien Crush or

Devil Crash on the PC Engine will know that Naxat have a knack for video pinball. This game's been in production for absolutely ages, but is set to hit the Japanese streets in December. We'll have to wait to see if it'll beat Pinball Dreams on the Amiga, but our hopes are high.

NCS MASIYA

The latest in a long line of Japanese mecha games is *Assault Suits Valken* from NCS. What's confused people is that Konami have the rights to release this in the US and UK as *Cybernator*. It's got smart graphics, some interesting effects, and is reviewed next issue. Also from NCS is the followup to the *Ranma 1/2* game, this time on a 12 Mbit cart. The graphics look far better this time. Out in December.

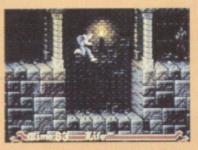
SETA

December sees the release of F1 Exhaust Heat 2, which includes a custom DSP chip developed by Seta to speed up the 3D capabilities of the Super Famicom three-fold.



People anxiously awaiting the release of Seta's Nosferatu will now have to wait until next year.

Prince Of Persia and Castlevania fans are in for a treat next year, when the extremely creepy-looking and overdue platform game Nosferatu finally appears. All Seta would tell us is that it's scheduled for the first quarter of '93. Be patient!

SQUARE

The biggest release in Japan now is *Final Fantasy V*, due on 6 December. Expect to see the US version (*Final Fantasy III*) next year. Incidentally, Enix's *Dragon Quest V* – the most popular Super Famicom release yet in Japan, on page 60 of this issue – is due next year in the US, to be released there in its *Dragon Warrior* guise.

SUNSOFT

Besides the ace *Road Runner* game, *Death Vally Rally* (which should be out by the time you read this), Sunsoft have something called *Puggsy* in development by UK software house Psygnosis. The graphics are looking fairly scrummy at the moment, but there's little else to report.

This one's got the lot: a SNES, a controller and the brilliant Street Fighter II (normally selling for an incredible £65). Bear in mind, though, that to really appreciate Street Fighter II you'll need a second controller so two can play.

Super Play's Advice

So which one to get? Well, we'd discount the Super Scope pack straight away. If you've read our review of it you'll know why: the Super Scope's a nice piece of kit, but the games are awful, and there's no prospect of any decent ones on the horizon. The basic pack with no game doesn't really make economic sense, either, when for an extra £20 you could have the Mario pack. That leaves the Mario and the Street Fighter II packs. Both feature games you've absolutely got to buy, so the deciding factor is which one you want first, and how much you can afford to spend. Best value of all, though, could be old stocks of the two controller Mario pack, now knocked down to £129.99 to clear. Surely an excellent buy.

You're unlikely to find anyone discounting the Super Nintendo itself, as Bandai, who distribute the machines, don't actually give retailers any profit margin on it to speak of in the first place. The money lies in selling games, and the more clued-up shops will try just about anything to gain your loyalty ...

Buy your Super Nintendo from Comet and they'll give you a discount card which gives you 10% off every game you buy there from then on.

BOOTS



For each £10 you spend on games at Boots you'll get what they call a 'Collect & Save' stamp, which you stick on a special card (above). Once you've collected five stamps you're entitled to a £5 saving off your next game. 10 stamps are worth a £15 saving. (They're running a similar offer on music and video items, and the stamps are interchangeable.) What's more, buy your Super Nintendo at Boots and you'll get five stamps to start you off.

Step into Dixons and you'll be bombarded with freebies. For a start, there's a 'buy 10, get 1 free' offer - each time you buy a game you'll get a stamp, and once you've collected 10 you'll get a free game. On top of that, spend over £50 on games and they'll give you a free LCD game, worth £9.99 - either a Bart Vs The Space Mutants or a Smash TV one. (Oh yeah,

and you also get given a copy of something called 'Game Zone'. Bins are provided in-store.)

MAIL ORDER: HOW TO WIN

One of the best ways of getting a good deal when buying new games is through mail order companies (see ads in Super Play) - especially if you want the newest imports for US or Japanese machines. Follow these simple rules, for trouble-free buying:

SUPER NINTENDO VS MEGA DRIVE

Which is best?

A foregone conclusion, you might think. Nevertheless, just so you know you're making/or have made the right decision, here's how the two machines weigh up

THE MEGA DRIVE

A 68000 processor running at 8 MHz, 64 colours on screen at once, 80 sprites, 7channel FM sound. The machine's been around for four years now, so it's a bit long in the tooth, but games-wise it has the advantage of huge UK software base, including some really impressive titles like Sonic The Hedgehog 2.

THE SUPER NINTENDO

A special 65sc816 processor running at a leisurely 3.58 MHz, 256 colours from a palette of 32 thousand-odd, 128 sprites, eight-channel PCM sound, 3D scaling facilities. The specs are superior to the Mega Drive's in virtually every respect The SNES' low-speed processor can be

a liability in the wrong hands - hence the infamous 'SNES slow-down' on some games. However, used properly, it can do things that wouldn't be possible on other machines. Just look at Mario Kart for proof.

The machine plays digital samples CD-style, making for great sound, too.

Super Play's Advice

Buy the Super Nintendo, of course. True, the Mega Drive's lower price (and lower cart price), arguably sexier looks and bigger software library make it seem like the better bet to the uninitiated, but when it comes to sheer game and hardware quality the SNES has it beat all hollow. And we predict that over the next few months the price and software numbers gaps will narrow significantly too.

ONLY IN JAPAN...

The more you learn about Japan – home of the Super Nintendo – and the Japanese themselves, the stranger, more different it all seems. For instance, a recent all-star wedding there has rocked the nation, yet nobody outside of the country has ever heard of either bride or groom...

SUMO WRESTLING HERO WEDS 'JAPAN'S MADONNA'

• In a shock wedding last October, sumo superstar Takahanada married model, singer and national sex symbol Rie Miyazawa – before any of Japan's normally bang-up-todate tabloid news hounds realised they even knew each other! When the news broke it immediately dominated every newspaper and news broadcast in Japan – even the Prime Minister, Kiichi Miyazawa (no relation to the bride), was stunned, saying 'it is an amazing thing.'

Takahanada, only 20 years old, won the last national sumo championship – despite weighing a mere 298lbs (which is tiny for a sumo). He and his 21-year-old brother, Wakahanada – both being young, good looking and, a quality much prized in Japan, modest – have recently been responsible for a massive upsurge in interest in the sport, especially amongst the young.

Ms Miyazawa, on the other hand, isn't modest at all. She's recently risen out of the obscurity which normally greets most Japanese aidoru (or 'idols') - good looking model/singers normally given short lived but glamorous minicareers by big Japanese record companies - by publishing a book of Madonna-style nude pictures. Despite the fact that the book was rather tame by Western standards, it was enough to send her popularity skyrocketing immediately afterwards. She's now one of the best known faces in Japan, and currently stars in a popular health drink commercial with Arnold Schwarzenegger.

 Takahanada appears regularly on Channel 4's sumo wrestling coverage. Ms
 Miyazawa has yet to be offered a recording contract outside of her native Japan.

The second, and far more important, advantage is that it's much easier to do tricky moves, mainly those that need accurate diagonal or 360° control. For instance, we've never been able to do Zangiel's 360° Piledriver move with any degree of consistency before – now we can do it every time.

Here's another aftermarket special joypad, an alternative to your standard Nintendo model. The extra features are neat, but not essential (though many Super Nintendo games have built in autofire, some don't – including *Cosmo Gang*, reviewed this issue – and that's where it comes in useful). 340 8565, it's a decent buy, but you'll have to work out for yourself if it's worth £2 more than a normal Super Nintendo pad for the number of times you'll need autofire.

COMPLETE SHOW REPORT By Matt Bielby

So, were you there or were you square? Actually, if you did go you're far more likely to be flat than square – the show was absolutely packed with people, on the Saturday and the Sunday particularly, with Earls Court quickly reaching peak capacity. Before someone had the smart idea of opening one of the outside doors to redirect the crowd, it was taking an average of 30 minutes to get the 20 yards from Hall One to Hall Two, such was the crush of people trying to get through the (actually fairly wide, but in the event woefully inadequate) connecting corridor.

Indeed, such were the numbers arriving at the show over the weekend that for long stretches at a time the front doors had to be shut, with nobody allowed in. Radio One broadcast warnings to stay away, the local tube station was shut for a time, a couple of scuffles apparently broke out amongst the waiting crowd, while inside some people fainted from exhaustion – it all added up to excited 'Mario Madness!' reports in at least six of the national Sunday papers, with Earls Court staff claiming the crowds were the biggest they'd ever seen!

The show was certainly a roaring success as far as attendance was concerned, then, which makes it very good news for Future Publishing, the show organisers, as well as the people behind this very magazine. After all, it's

the first event of this size we've ever held, so it's nice to see it so popular, and go off so (relatively) smoothly. We'll certainly be holding a similar event next year, when the show will not only be bigger, it'll be held at the far larger Olympia venue, hopefully allowing show goers a little more room to breathe.

But that's all yet to come – what we're really interested in here is this year's event. So what was there actually at the show to see?

Well, for a start there were an awful lot of people in very silly costumes. Prince Of Persia, over on the Domark stand, seemed to have

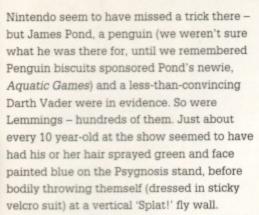

of most of Future's magazines did assorted seminars on our own stand (hi if we saw you there), and various gameplaying challenges were run throughout the show. You could win a leather jacket if you got over a certain score on Mega Drive Road Rash II at the Electronic Arts stand, you could win assorted goodies at Gremlin'if you did well at Nigel Mansell (Amiga version) - and then there were the National Computer Games Championships 1992.

This is, as you probably know, the biggest gameplaying event ever held in the UK - the only one to be worked out through heats organised up and down the country, and certainly the only one to ever offer anything like £10,000 in prize money! Even the second prize winner got £4,000, which isn't to be sniffed at.

So how did it go? Well, first off we had the semi-finalists from all over the country, who converged on Earls Court on the Saturday for the play offs. In the semi's our hopefuls went through Spiderman And The X-Men on the SNES (see review page 72 this issue), Tazmania (Mega Drive) and Road Rash (Amiga), showing off their gameplaying skills in front of massive crowds, commentated on by (amongst others) Super Play

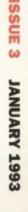

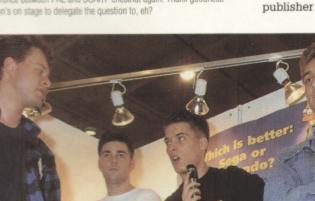

concentration total. In the end though there could only be one winner, and that winner was Allan – currently the richest (and almost certainly the most popular) 17 year-old in the North Midlands.

Not all the gameplaying going on at the show ending up with someone being presented with a mega prize, however. On software house stands up and down the hall, there was plenty of joystick-bashing going on just for the sake of it. Acclaim showed off stuff like *Spidey & The X-Men, Krusty, Alien 3, Terminator 2* (a Super Scope game taken from the coin-op), *Super WWF, Crash Dummies* and *George Foreman's KO Boxing,* while Ocean's massive video wall splashed things like *Lethal Weapon 2, Addams Family 2, Cool World, Pushover* (reviewed this issue), *Exhaust Heat* and *Robocop 3.* Over on the massive Nintendo stand they

had 18(!) Street Fighter II's lined up for you to play, as well as Top Gear, UN Squadron, Pilotwings, Blazing Skies (the US version of Wings II, reviewed last issue), Turtles IV, Super Aleste. Super Probotector, Super Mario Kart, Super Soccer, R-Type, Super Mario World, Paperboy 2, Final Fight, Zelda III, Rival Turf, Super Tennis, F-Zero, the first Addams, Super Adventure Island, Ultraman, Castlevania and more.

Then there was Electronic Arts with NHLPA Hockey '92, Desert Strike, Madden '93 and PGA Tour Golf, UbiSoft with Jimmy Connors Pro Tennis Tour and plenty of others dotted about

the place too. (Okay, I admit it – I gave up counting at that point.)

It wasn't all just looking, though – on many of the stands you were actively encouraged to part with your cash, and some of the bargains on view made it very difficult to resist. Datel offered £10 off their Action Replay cartridge, for instance, selling it for £39.99, while Virgin Retail had a fiver off *Street Fighter II*, and *Krusty's Super Fun House* for a special bargain £29.99!

Over in the second hall of the show, where all the retail stands were situated, there were even more bargs to be had – we saw UK Super

stuff on sale, crowds were four or five deep at the counter for much of the show.

Overall, then, this year's show was an unqualified success. Sure, there are lessons to be learned – we need a better PA for the video wall, we need a larger venue (this year the narrow passageways between the two halls turned out to be a major liability), and we need some way of making sure not everybody turns up at once (as happened on the Saturday).

Having said that, though, this show was excellent – well attended, with lots of good events organised, some excellent stands, and plenty to see and do. And next year's will be even better. Roll on Future Entertainment Show '93!

> The game, in case you're unaware of it, is loosely based on Operation Desert Storm (all that business with Arabs, oil and Scud missiles of a couple of years ago). In it you're given a massive, heavily armoured helicopter and a huge expanse of hostile desert to fly round it in. The ground is scattered with buildings, air bases, radar stations and baddies (everything from foot-soldiers to tanks), all of which want to be taken out with your machine guns or air-toground missiles. Watch out, though, for friendly forces and hostages (which should be rescued). And, of course, you can pick up extra fuel or ammo if you can find it. Each level brings a new stretch of desert and a new set of objectives. They start tough, and get tougher.

The Mega Drive game was spot-on, and from our brief foray the SNES version seems to be just as good. We haven't been too impressed by Electronic Arts' attempts to convert Mega Drive games to the SNES so far

(a real shame that, as games like Madden and PGA Tour Golf are works of genius on the Mega Drive) but Desert Strike should make amends - and some. Out now on import, over here in January and reviewed next issue.

If you've been following Super Play's complete solution to Zelda III, you'll know that it's an absolutely vast game. So huge, in fact. that if you listen carefully you can almost hear the cartridge creaking under the strain of it all. But, incredibly, even with big lumps of tiny print in two issues of the magazine, we've only really scratched the surface.

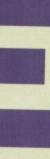

Top animator Nagai Go has an SD series devoted to his own universe, in which menacingly sexy characters like Devilman are sent up to devastating effect. SD versions excel in parodies, poking fun at the most unlikely characters and situations.

And, of course, Super Deformed characters are wonderful vehicles for gameplay. Keep a look out for those enlarged heads and squashed up bodies they appear in lots of Japanese Super Famicom games. Deformed they may

be, but the offspring of this unlikely marriage between massive fighting machines and wide-eyed, short-skirted princesses are definitely Super.

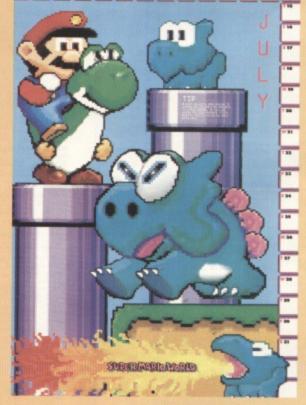

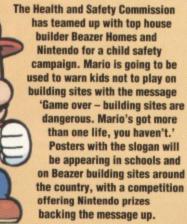

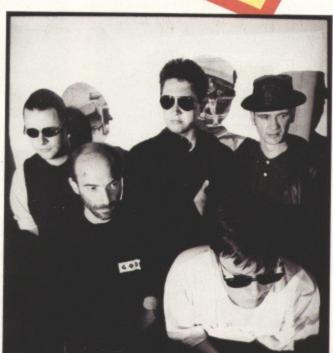

Eric Matthews is the most prominent member of The Bitmap Brothers, probably the best known UKbased programming team – the people behind successful Amiga games like *Xenon 1 & 2*, *Speedball 1 & 2, Cadaver, Gods* and *The Chaos Engine*. Now the Bitmaps are shifting some of their efforts to the Super NES, with at least two new games in development. Is it going smoothly...?

So, Eric, what SWES games are you actually working on? We've got Gods, which is Mearing completion, and we recently started on The Chaos Engine. Rob Trevellian, who worked on the Amiga Speedball 2, is doing the programming. He's more experienced on the SNES than



programming. He's more experienced on the SNES than some of the others here. Also, I

think it's good to get someone who'll bring a few fresh ideas to a project when you convert it to another machine, rather than just ask the original programmer to rehash what he's done before.

So what new ideas has Rob brought to Gods then?

A We've changed it quite a lot actually – it's now a faster, more arcade-like game. We spent a week just deciding how to change the controls to take advantage of the extra buttons on a SNES joypad – the game's now a lot less fiddly to play, and you can do things like change direction in mid air, which you couldn't on the Amiga. We've also increased the frame rate to get it faster, and I spent a while mucking about with the possibilities of the SNES colour palette

Q How did Mintendo react to the SNES version? Was it what they wanted?

A Yes. I think so, anyway! One thing we've learned from Nintendo is the importance of

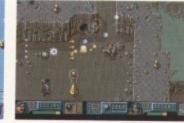
rigorous play-testing. When we'd finished a version we were happy with, we'd submit it to Nintendo Of America, who'd playtest it. We'd get pages and pages of suggested improvements back. One thing Nintendo won't stand for is the possibility that a player might get trapped on a level – there should always be a way forward. To make sure of this, we had to change some of our maps so it wasn't possible for you to put down the world key, say, on top of an inaccessible tower, and then never be able to get back up there to retrieve it.

Do you think this current practice of old Amiga games getting revamped for the Super NES is a good thing?

A If you do it right. We spent 10 months totally redoing *Gods* for Nintendo to make it a good SNES game. However, I think we're about to see a number of fairly poor Amiga games appear on the SNES which are basically ports from the old machine. The two systems are so different, you need to rejig it to make it work.

Is there any dream project you'd really love to do on Super Nintendo? And any chances of it happening?

A We'd love to do Speedball 2, or, rather, a SNES-specific Speedball 3, totally reworking the basic idea for the new machine. We haven't so far simply because nobody's asked us – probably because Speedball 2 is thought of as too old a game, and there were distribution problems with the Genesis version (American version of the Mega Drive – Ed.) which meant it didn't sell well. Though we

didn't do the Genesis version,

programmers, pushing their own image alongside the games. Do you think the same thing is about to happen with Super Nintendo programmers?

A I don't think we thought of ourselves as pop stars. It was partly a mickey take, and partly an effort to make the creative people a little more prominent. That's harder to do on Sega and Nintendo, though, where the brand is the most important thing, but I'd still like to think that SNES gameplayers will look out for any new Bitmap Brothers games because they liked the old one. After all, they're the same gameplayers who looked out for our stuff on the Amiga...

Gods will be available for the SNES on the Mindscape/Software Toolworks label in January. The Chaos Engine should be ready by Autumn.

CD ROME THE FUTUR

Commodore's CDTV bombed. Philips' CD-I system could be in trouble. Sega's Mega CD lacks decent games. Now Nintendo delays its CD system another six months. Is CD ROM technology really the future of video games?

C ince its introduction in the early '80s, CD technology has quickly become accepted as the norm for many types of media - music in particular. You'd think the notoriously hightech world of computer and video gaming would be quick to follow, but no - technical difficulties and a dire lack of suitable software has seen CD technology move forward, when it's moved anywhere at all, in a series of fits and bursts.

Certainly Commodore and Philips have had big problems convincing consumers that they really need a computer-based multi-media thingie plugged into their TV, while the dire quality of existing Sega CD software sees the Japanesemarket Mega CD currently dead in the water. To anyone familiar with Nintendo business practices, then, it can hardly have come as a surprise when the company announced it was delaying the release of its CD ROM system until August '93 at the earliest. Nintendo has never relied on cutting edge technology - remember how long the NES was forced to soldier on, in direct competition with the superior Mega Drive? - preferring to wait before releasing a new system until the software and the product is right. (And, equally, until they're sure there's a massive market for it.)

Nintendo went public with this delay at the Famicom Space World '92 Show last August - it was just one of two major announcements Hiroshi Yamauchi, president of Nintendo in Japan, made concerning the future of the Super Famicom. We told you about the other development last month the new cartridge based DSP2 chip known as 'Super FX', which will allow the machine greater speed and 3D capabilities. However, it's what the CD delay says about the future of Nintendo CD technology that concerns us here.

layers have been waiting for the Super Famicom CD ROM system since the launch of the machine, way back in November 1990. Not surprisingly really, as Nintendo announced the fact that they'd be doing one at the time - a tactic intended to take the wind out of the sails of Sega's much-hyped Mega CD, which was then well into development.

Despite this early announcement, we shouldn't be too surprised that it hasn't happened yet. Nintendo is far too cautious to make the classic mistake Sega have made - its great hardware rendered useless by a complete lack of suitable software, the few games that have been released taking virtually no advantage of the system's capabilities. (Indeed, most Sega CD games would have been substandard as cartridge software.)

We expect the Sega Mega CD to occupy a bit of a sales backwater until next Christmas, when decent software eventually arrives, and (more importantly) when the whole CD games market gets a massive boost from the release of the Super Nintendo CD ROM. That's when the battle begins in earnest

SUPER NINTENDO CD ROM: WHY THE LONG WAIT?

The development of the Super Famicom CD ROM unit has been plagued by more problems than Nintendo would care to admit. The high speed of technological advance in the industry is the main reason - for instance, the proposed specifications for the system had to be revised upwards when Sega unveiled its expensive and sophisticated Mega CD last year. As with the Super NES, Nintendo had to have a significantly better product than Sega if they were once again going to enter the market last.

As a result, at the Nintendo show last August the company claimed to be re-designing the whole unit to offer even more power to games players. Another reason this was needed is the new 'Super FX' cartridge enhancing chip, which will boost the capabilities of the standard SNES performance dangerously close to the dizzy heights the old CD ROM specification offered. A 32-bit chip is now at the heart of the CD unit, boosting its processing capabilities well above this new generation of game cartridges.

CD ROM: THE FAMILY TREE

Understanding the current state of the various proposed and existing CD platforms takes more than a little effort. To try and make things a bit

easier for you, then, here's the exclusive Super Play CD ROM Family Tree, showing exactly how everything inter-relates...

CD digital audio

Designed by Sony and Philips in the early '80s for storing sound in a digital format. CDs offer a high sound quality

and virtually instant access to all the tracks - unlike on a tape or conventional vinyl record.

CD-I

Philips was the first company to release a CD-I (Compact Disc-Interactive) machine in the UK earlier this year. Sony and Panasonic have introduced similar machines in Japan and the US. Rather than being accessories for consoles or computers, CD-I machines are stand-alone units with processing hardware built in. They are capable of full-screen Full-Motion Video (FMV) with text, graphics and audio. It's fairly impressive, fairly expensive - and fairly long in the tooth. The actual format was developed over five years ago.

CD ROM XA •

This is Sony's creation, and is currently the proposed platform for the Super Famicom CD ROM system (below). XA stands for eXtended Architecture, meaning extra hardware will have to be included for the simultaneous access of data, video and audio. Sony are to release a CD **ROM XA machine called the Play** Station (right), which was first announced in mid '91, but hasn't been released anywhere yet. An all-in-one unit, it was initially designed to run Super NES carts as well as special Sony game CDs, but Nintendo wouldn't



However, this appears to have changed now that Sony have recently



tied up again with Nintendo, with the Play Station being allowed to run Super Famicom/Super NES CDs too. (In this it will be much the same as JVC's 'Wondermega' machine, which crossed a Mega Drive with a CD ROM player.) Both cartridge and CD software will be compatible across the Sony Play Station and the Super Famicom CD ROM formats - which one you buy will be purely a matter of taste. Nintendo is continuing to work with Philips to develop a CD ROM XA 'bridge-format' which will make Nintendo CD software compatible with Philips CD-I hardware.

CD ROM

The first CD ROM was produced by IBM for use with MS-DOS standard PCs. Since then, various manufacturers have utilised CD ROM technology to improve the existing capabilities of their particular system. Various companies make CD ROM drives for use with PCs, and NEC and Sega already have units on the market for use with their own consoles.



PC CD ROM

Currently the PC has a wide variety of CD ROM drives available, with a rapidly increasing software base. To ensure compatibility across the board, PC CD ROM units are very similar to standard audio CD drives - great for mass storage, but quite slow at data retrieval. However, with PCs relying on high density hard drive storage, CDs obviously solve all the disc-swapping problems you traditionally get with graphically intensive games like Monkey Island II etc.



NEC PC Engine CD ROM

The first CD ROM unit ever released for a console was for the NEC PC Engine, way back in '88 in Japan. Since then, new CD versions of the Engine have appeared - the smaller, clip-on Super CD (above), and the all-in-one Duo (this was released in Japan one day after the Mega CD, and has sold far better). Both systems have improved CD drives and extra memory to cope with new Super CD software and music CDs with graphics (CD-G).



Sega Mega CD / **JVC Wondermega**

Released in Japan last December. the Mega CD initially sold very well, but Sega-Japan have had a terrible year. Software is still very poor and thin on the ground - Sega jumped the gun with this one, though it's certainly a system with great potential. Last month the American version was launched (under the name 'Sega CD'), but UK players will have to wait until next spring for the UK machine. The JVC Wondermega (above) is a redesigned combo unit that plays both MD carts and Mega CDs.



Commodore Amiga CDTV

Launched in May '91, Commodore's CDTV was initially presented as a home multi media station, keeping its Amiga origins well hidden. When this bombed (due to the high price and poor software), it was relaunched this year as the Amiga CDTV, with keyboard and disk drive pack turning it into a swish looking black Amiga with built in CD drive.

CD ROM FEATURE

Can it be true? It's... a pic of a Super Famicom and a... CD!!! Philips to develop the unit instead. New specifications were released at the Las Vegas CES in January 1991.

But since then a lot has happened. On 1 October 1992 Nintendo announced a revised deal with Sony, taking the project back to them. The new system is now said to be fully compatible

with the Play Station – this way Nintendo benefits from Sony's expertise in compact disc technology, while Sony gets a chance to unleash a video games machine with a huge potential market. It's not unlike JVC's involvement with Sega and the Wondermega (see the CD Family Tree).

The third reason for the delay you've

probably guessed by now – a lack of good software. Commented electronics analyst Chuck Goto at SG Warburg in Tokyo, 'Nintendo is still trying to figure out how to use the massive storage capacity of the CD ROM to create effective games.'

Additional details, however, are scarce. Sony aren't talking, while Nintendo have gone on record saying that the system may not even be launched next year if suitable games aren't ready.

Don't hold your breath waiting for the CD ROM system. However, *do* expect it to be stunning when it eventually appears – the technology is there, the talent certainly is and Super Scope aside, Nintendo have yet to release something that wasn't worth waiting for. Sega know this more than anyone.

SO WHAT CAN CD ROM ACTUALLY DO?

The exact specifications of Nintendo's newest baby are unclear, but here's the best of recent speculation...

These are the most up-to-date details of Nintendo's forthcoming CD ROM system, though they're subject to change. A schematic diagram from early '92 revealed the inclusion of a custom co-processor running at 21MHz, working alongside the SNES' normal three speed (and very slow!) processor. The co-processor has since been revealed to be a 32-bit unit (see diagram) – this has the potential to make CD ROM a real improvement over cartridges.

Indeed, the whole set up is now nearly twice as powerful as a standard SNES running a game on one of the new 'Super FX' cartridges, which include their own Digital Signal Processor. This degree of difference is deemed necessary if Nintendo is going to attract enough people to the new machine to make it the success they've come to expect...

More on the Super FX next issue.

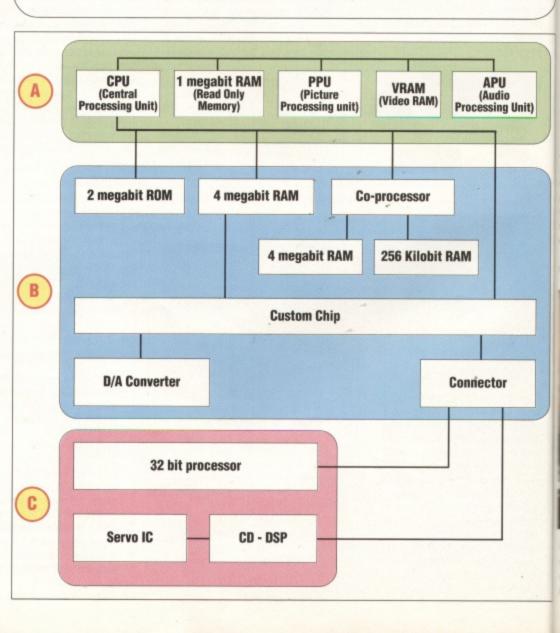

Panasonic/Taito

Although Panasonic already has CD-I systems available in Japan and the States, it has recently teamed up with top arcade game producer Taito to produce a dedicated CD games machine provisionally titled the 'Wowow' (don't ask us why). The cult shoot-'em-up Sagaia (also known asDarius II) and Rainbow Islands were both demonstrated on the system last year in Tokyo, but nothing has been heard or seen of either games or system since then. Could other coin-op manufacturers be planning on bringing out CD machines, too? Only time will tell.

SNES CD ROM: SO, WHAT WILL THE GAMES BE LIKE?

kay, we've established that the most nportant part of the equation for a successful CD system is Good Software. So what sort of Good Software will we get for the Super NES/Super Famicom CD ROM? Eh? Eh?

Erm, this is tricky. Here's the latest news of confirmed games, with plenty of speculation about what else might be possible thrown in.

One of the first games expected for the Super Famicom CD ROM is called The 7th Guest, it's from Virgin and looks set to become one of the scariest games ever (see above pics). It's such an unusual game because the graphics have all been cleverly rendered on computers, not unlike some of the impressive special effects you can see in the latest television commercials.

Rest assured, this won't just provide Dragon's Lair-style sit-back-and-watch gameplay - instead the game allows full interaction and freedom of movement, all the possible angles from which the scenery and objects can be viewed having already been calculated and beautifully displayed in 256 colours, with extremely realistic shading and special morphing effects, too. This is certainly one effective way to make good use of the additional space you get on a CD. (In fact, all this data takes up over 1,000 megabytes, or 8,000 megabits, of memory and currently uses up the



(due next year), and was originally scheduled for release with the Super NES version of the CD ROM in the States in January 1993. However, the previous specification of the system simply wasn't sufficient to cope with the graphics - something the new, uprated, CD ROM specification should change with a bit of luck. Certainly, from what we've seen of the PC version, this could prove to be one of the most stunning games ever.

While we're on

the subject of PC games, the landmark role playing game Ultima Underworld could soon be scheduled for Super Nintendo CD ROM conversion too. Sega already have it in development for their Mega CD, but it's

popularity might guarantee it the Nintendo treatment. More info when we have it.

Other games already in existence destined for the Super Nintendo CD include a number of laser disc games. Mad Dog McCree and Who Shot Johnny Rock? are both fabulous shoot-'em-up arcade games using live actors and extremely authentic settings. The producer of the games, ALG

(American Laser Games), recently signed an agreement with Nintendo to develop similar titles for the CD ROM platform. However, full or partial motion video on the system will have to be

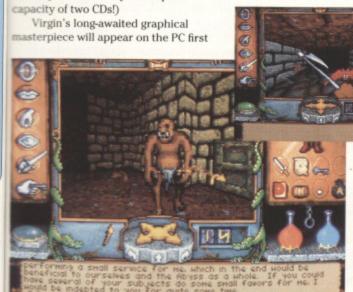


The Lawnmower Man - just one of the CD ROM titles set to appear on the SNES CD ROM.

possible to do these games any justice.

Storm, the developer of Super SWIV, is currently developing a SNES CD ROM game based around the popular film The Lawnmower Man. Naturally, the coding of the SNES version won't be started until the final spec of the unit is known, but the source material, such as digital footage and 3D model data, is worked on using high-end PCs. The movie footage is being grabbed in 24-bit colours and will be converted and slotted into the SNES version when the development system is available.

Nintendo's own product line up is just as secret as ever, unfortunately. This, of course, just fuels the speculation. Much rumoured is ancient classic Donkey Kong, the first game Mario ever appeared in, which was first announced as a Super Nintendo CD ROM/

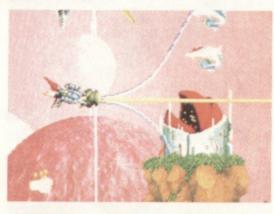

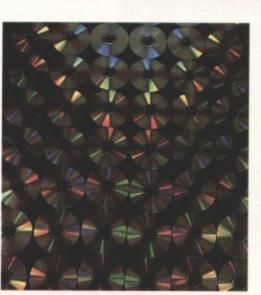

Sequels to *Pilotwings* and *FZero*, using both polygon graphics and Mode 7, are supposedly both on the cards, though the likelihood is that they'll appear as cartridge games using the new Special FX chip, rather than on CD ROM. Rest assured, however, that whatever Nintendo have planned for release with the CD ROM, it's going to be something special – Nintendo will be taking no risks with this system.

And what of the other top creators? Well, Konami has already shown a commitment to CD ROM, with a fabulous cyberpunk adventure called *Snatcher* recently released in Japan on the PC Engine Super CD ROM. Some of Konami's top Super Nintendo programmers were moved last year to a new development centre to concentrate their efforts on CD technology, so expect some stuff from them. We think a revamped version of the *Xexex* coin-op (complete with all its gorgeous intermission animations), an ultra-impressive *Axelay 2*, and, quite possibly, *Castlevania V* are also likely candidates.

Capcom are guaranteed to provide some CD thrills. A popular rumour at the moment is that Street Fighter II: The Champion Edition will appear

HOW DOES A CD WORK? IT'S SIMPLE...



If you look closely at these CDs - you may have to squint a bit - you should be able to see hundreds of tiny little pits on the surface (*Right, That's it, You're sacked- Ed.*)

ou all know what a CD looks like, of course – a small, shiny, metallic disk, not unlike a conventional vinyl record. The way it works is very different, though...

 While on vinyl records the needle works from the outside towards the centre, CDs work in exactly the opposite way.

• Only one side of the CD is used, not both, as is the case with traditional records.

• The head of the CD player reads the CD by projecting light onto it, then reading the reflected messages from pits made on the surface of the CD. These can either be a 0 or a 1, the binary system that should be familiar to all computer users.

 The pits on a CD surface are 1.6 millionths of a metre wide and 0.9 millionths of a metre long – pretty damn difficult to measure with your average ruler.

• Normal CD ROM systems are suitable for computer data, sound data and video data, though sound data is recorded on a different track. (Philips' CD-I, however, is different – the three signals are put on the same track.)

 Normal CDs cannot be recorded onto or erased from – what you buy is exactly what you get. Therefore, for instance, you can't save game data onto a compact disc.

• The way CD ROM systems for consoles work is that they read the computer and visual data from the disc, then store them in the unit's RAM for processing by the machine.

• The important thing about CDs for game players is the potential size of a game – a CDs memory capacity is massive. It's 540 Megabytes – 4,320 Megabits in cartridge terms (about 270 times the size of *Street Fighter II*.)

 There's another huge advantage CDs have over conventional storage methods – the high speed random access of information.

 And, finally, there's the fact that, next to other storage methods, CDs are incredibly fast, easy and cheap to make. How easy? See below...

HOW IS A CD MADE? EVEN SIMPLER...

Bet you always wondered just how CDs were made, didn't you? No? Well we're going to tell you anyway. (Don't worry, it won't take too long...)

Step 1

Make a Master CD out of glass, using lasers to carve out the tiny pits. Step 2

Now coat the glass with a thin layer of metal and you have your Master CD. Step 3

From this Master, a nickel stamping plate has to be made.

Step 4

Using this nickel plate, CDs are then pressed out of plastic. The process is quick and easy, each CD (after all) ony having one piece.

Step 5

A layer of reflective aluminium compound is then added to each one.

Step 6

A final layer of plastic is added to complete the process. Voila! One CD.

Doesn't sound that hard, does it? And, indeed, it isn't – the CD manufacturing process is cheap and easy (hence all the people who get annoyed at the high price of music CDs in the UK.) Indeed, CDs are *so* much cheaper to manufacture than carts that we should see a significant price drop for games as they take off – that old 'cartridges are expensive to make' argument goes straight out of the window. (Of course, we all know how likely *that* is to happen, don't we..?)

on CD, shortly after the Mega Drive cartridge version. However, we're not convinced – if a game's due to appear on the ordinary Mega Drive next March, surely Nintendo won't deem it good enough for their CD?

And beyond that it's pure speculation. Rest assured that at least some of these games will be absolutely spectacular, and some will be big names too. (*Star Trek: The Next Generation* from Spectrum Holobyte is promised, for instance.) Don't worry about missing out on any hot info, though. *Super Play* will keep you posted on any new developments as soon as we hear about them.

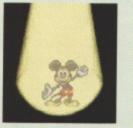

Goofy pitches at Mickey, and overshoots! Pluto rushes past to retrieve the ball, but mysteriously disappears - so Mickey chases after him, but falls over a cliff, landing in evil Emperor Pete's garden...



At first glance, ignoring the baseball bit for a minute, this game doesn't look that different from the Sega Mega Drive release Castle Of Illusion - both are set in very similar looking forests and castles. In Mickey's Magical Quest each level is divided into four sections - three main ones and a boss level. There's usually a mid-level boss to deal with, too.



LEVEL SIX: EMPEROR PETE'S CASTLE!

And finally, here's Emperor Pete's castle, where Pluto is being held. The game hasn't been that hard up till now, but things get a little tougher once you enter here.



LEVEL ONE: THE GIANT BEANSTALK Mickey has to fly if he's to get all the special bonuses on level one.



LEVEL TWO: TO THE WOODS!

It's dark here, and things start getting a little creepy and very weird - at one point the jumpingfrom-branch-to-branch action switches to an underwater bit, set inside a massive tree.

LEVEL FOUR: THE FIRE MOUNTAINS Possibly the best level of them all. As Mickey makes his way up into the mountains, he scales sheer rock faces and swings across gaping holes.

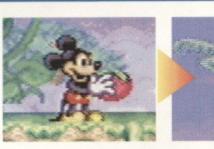

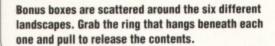

Fans of *Bionic Commando* (and Amiga *Batman*)-style gameplay will adore level four's swinging-aroundand-generally-climbingabout action. After the first three sub-stages, Mickey comes face-toface with a very large hungry bird.

Probably the briefest of the lot, level five is a slippery slidy ride through the snow. Mickey slides along on what look like a Fox's Glacier mint! The best thing about this level is the wonderful boss at the end – a cuddly rotating walrus-type critter that really takes some beating.

Here we are at the castle on level six: Mickey the fireman pushes a block with his water jet so he can use it to jump up onto the next level – just one example of the versatile gameplay tricks just waiting to be discovered.

Mickey's trying out his magic, before attempting to rescue Pluto from the clutches of evil Emperor Pete.

GOOD, BAD OR UGLY?



I was so excited when this game came into this office, I forgot to

order my double-sized bacon sarnie breakfast – something I normally take very seriously. Indeed, this is so good I played it right through lunch-time too when you're having this much fun with a game, little things like eating hardly seem to matter. Make no mistake, this is a gorgeous game, and one I insisted on showing off to everybody at the slightest opportunity. (I'll vouch for that. I can't tell you how irritating Jason was while reviewing this - he was forever dragging us over to look at the damn thing with words like "Wow! look at that sprite there, the one with its feet in the air. Great, eh?" One thing's for sure – this is the last cute game he gets to review ... - Ed.)

You see, I couldn't help it. This game looks so nice you just want to share it with everybody. After all, if you can take the people we've spoken to as any guide, Capcom is nearly everyone's favourite games company – to the extent that a major release from them is almost bound to do well. And they deserve to, if they can keep up the standards like this. While we can't guarantee that Mickey's Magical Quest will keep you occupied for as long as Street Fighter II, say, you'll get as much fun out of it while it lasts. This is an exceptionally well crafted game.

The nice thing is that looks aren't all *Mickey's Magical Quest* has going for it. It scores highly in gameplay too, and is far more original than I'd expected. The basic Mickey can turn tomatoes into helicopters, and throw and pull things, but the various outfits he acquires on his travels give the game the kind of depth usually only associated with Mario.

But it's the beauty of it all that puts this game in the super league - it couples some of the most radiant and colourful graphics yet seen on the SNES with some of the greatest sprite designs on any system. Sonically it's all a bit dreamy too. While there isn't quite the range of catchy themes as to be found in Castle Of Illusion, what's here is extremely impressive and

enjoyable. Perhaps I should just say that the music does justice to the original Disney cartoons. Of course, you know what's

Of course, you know what's coming now, don't you. That's right - the dreaded 'but.' What lets Mickey down is something that's becoming a real worry with new games - it's just too easy. Mega Drive games are plagued by this problem, of course, but it's starting to look like the disease is spreading over into our neck of the woods, too. Great graphics are all very well - and like I said, these are glorious - but you also need consistently challenging gameplay. This stuff's fun, and inventive, and varied - but you'll romp through it.

So how easy is this? Well, I completed Mickey's Magical Quest in a matter of hours on the Normal setting, not the Easy one. Sure, it's not without its tricky bits, but no game's so difficult that infinite continues (which is what you get here) can't get you through it. Time was when we used to find ourselves complaining that not enough continues and restart points were put into games, but now everything seems to have swung the other way. In its defence, Mickey has almost certainly been aimed at a slightly younger audience than most games, but even so ...

Is it worth buying, then?. In this case that's a tricky one to answer. The best guide I can give is this: If you're the emotional equivalent of a brick wall when it comes to cute games (ie you're too macho to enjoy them, which is your loss), then my advice is to give it a miss – you wouldn't appreciate it. If, however, you appreciate the finer things in life, and (perhaps more importantly, you've got enough money to throw around that you don't need to get two months of gameplay out of every game). then this is a must. It is, quite simply, another classic from Capcom, which is exactly what we've come to expect.

what's this crap?' was the usual comment, although I thought Stuart Campbell 'Why are you playing this, it's a pile of nob' was more succinct. In fact, I felt like replying 'Get lost you lot it's fab!', but then I just enjoy an argument.

Super Double Dragon may not have been my most eagerly awaited game ever, but playing it brought back all those memories of the first Double Dragon coinop game – it was about 10 times more fun than most coin-op beat-'em-ups because of the sheer variety of moves and things to pick up and whack people with (rather like Sega's Golden Axe). It had character too, and no other scrolling beat-'em-up ever tapped that elusive sensation of kicking the crap out of somebody so effectively (elusive for me anyway).

Super Double Dragon seems extremely basic at first, but the huge amount of different moves make for a progressively enjoyable game. It's far more fun than *Final Fight* for example, even in one-player mode, but sadly it looks a lot worse (except for some of the enjoyable character animations).

I would have liked more variety in the weapons and landscapes, and some use of the Super NES hardware might have encouraged a few of those cynics to raise an eyebrow or two. As a two-player game it can be quite good fun – there's such a good solid feel to the punching and kicking and some nice sound effects back up the action, especially the 'death burp' when an enemy bites the dust!

The thing that will put most people off is the 8-bit graphics. While *Super Double Dragon* has a couple of attractive sections, there's no denying it's a pretty poor attempt, with more of a play-it-safe style than anything else. There *is* some hidden charm here, but I find it hard to justify spending this much money on such a primitive game – it's fun and quite tough for a while, but don't you think the Super NES deserves better?

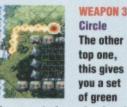

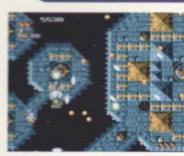

LEVEL 5: THE MINING CANYON

An even better Mode 7 background - this one rather like a swirling snake, though it appears to be representing a million-foot drop down a canyon - but it's the foreground stuff that makes the level. We're in some sort of futuristic mine, with giant grinding machines both opening up routes in the rock you can fly through and threatening to crush you at the same time. Great fun, and the end of level baddy is a bit of a corker too (just see left for details).

LEVEL 7: THE ASTEROID FIELD

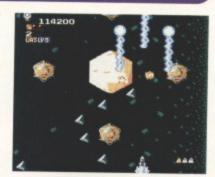
Packed with floating lumps of rock, this pesky level scrolls faster and faster as you go through it, the rocks coming at you at impossible speeds (it calms down after a bit though.) This is a tad boring looking and samey most of the way through, to be honest, but they've saved the best bit till last - a brilliant Mode 7 boss, the whole sprite warping across the screen in a manner which can only be described as stunning. A real Mega Drive-owner sickener, this, and one of the most impressive things yet on the SNES. Excellent.



A very impressive Alien (the crashed ship, not the monster)-type boss, this warps across the screen in a bravura piece of Mode 7 trickery.

LEVEL 8: ABOVE THE PLANETS

There's another space station taking up the bulk of this level, this time hovering in front of a backdrop of planets. The unusual thing here is that, at certain points, whole sections of the station move - we've seen this before (most notably in Final Blaster on the PC Engine), but that doesn't stop it being neat. A poor end-of-level baddy though - a simple hexagon with 'things' spinning around it.



This low quality boss character crops up at the end of level eight. He's not too tough to kill, and certainly ain't much to look at.

This time last month, when we'd first got Axelay in the office and were going ga-ga over that, its main frame of reference was Super Aleste. Was

Axelay a better game than that? A definite 'maybe' was the consensus of opinion. With time though, Axelay's charms have dulled. Sure it's spectacular, but is there much game to it? Super Aleste, however, has lasted the test of time rather better - we've found ourselves picking this up and playing it now it's on official release almost as eagerly as we did when we first saw the Japanese version.

Like all shoot-'em-ups this has a limited life-span. It's got loads of difficulty levels, but on 'Normal' (there's no 'Easy') Jason finished it in a couple of hours. In the long-term, it's main claim to fame is as a propaganda weapon for whenever there are potential SNES buyers around. Give them 10 minutes oohing and aahing over the action and they'll be down Dixons with a fistful of tenners.

Make no mistake, this is a top game, which deserves a place in any software collection. However, it's by no means perfect. It does come with a couple of obvious faults... Fault one: Because of hardware problems already discussed at length in Super Play, the UK version is some 17% slower than the game you may have played on US or Jap machines. That means it's also 17% easier – previously tricky sprites are now easy to dodge, and previously easy ones are a doddle. All in all, this ain't going to take very long to complete. Fault two: As with most shoot-'em-ups, the more you play the game, the less there is to it. You've seen all the good stuff by level five or so, and, as it doesn't get any harder from then on, the rest of it's a bit of a walk through. Fault three: As already mentioned, the ultrapowerful weapons dominate matters rather too much. It's a pity gameplay hasn't been as finely tuned as the graphics.

Still, there's much to enjoy. Some fab weapons, one of the nicer in-game tunes around, great explosions, inventive and spectacular end-of-level bosses (though they're a bit easy), lots of sprites and such a complete absence of slow-down that Super R-Type players will hardly believe it's the same machine. Arguably the SNES' best shoot-'emup to date - certainly the best 'traditional little space ships' one – and a must buy.

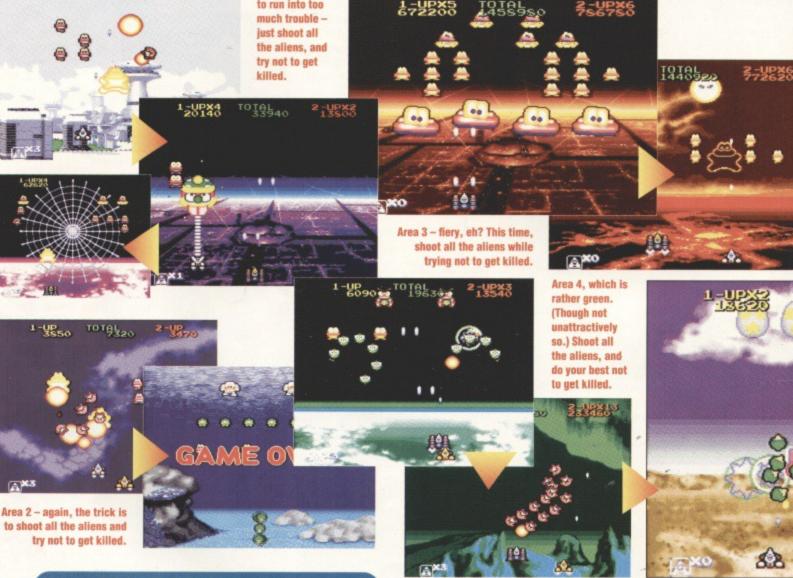

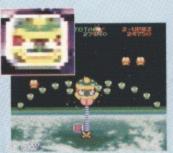

good? What was the attraction? That's something I think we'll have to put down to hindsight. Or experience. Or something.

Given that Cosmo Gang is firmly and undisputably based on *Space Invaders* (and don't give me any of this *Galaxians* nonsense, or start wibbling on about obscure PC Engine games – they're all Space Invaders rip-offs too), what steps does it take to bridge the decades, and give us something that'll keep your joypad in your hand for more than two minutes? Well, there are the graphics, obviously.

You've only got to look at the pictures on these pages to see how great they look. Everything whizzes around the screen at amazing speed, with no slow-down at all, and the backgrounds are smashing.

There's the two-player mode. But it's not much more fun than the one-player game, being of the soppy 'co-operative' variety. Competitive two-player games are the only two-player games as far as Super Play's concerned.

There are lots of pick-ups and add-on weapons. Some of them are brilliant, like the 'Shoot Me' thing. (It's not shown here, but when it appears you shoot your chum until he explodes, killing all the aliens.) But unfortunately, though it tries its

utmost, Cosmo Gang never really rises above Space Invaders' simple left-rightshoot formula. I can see the appeal of the idea, but I was bored of it in no time at all. It also didn't take me long to finish, with only 30-odd levels, none of them particularly difficult. But then, that perhaps isn't so much of a problem with a Space Invaders game

Right, with that said, I've a horrible feeling that the irredeemably overenthusiastic Jason is going to give you his point of view. Don't listen! Whatever he says, ignore him! *Cosmo Gang* is cute, sure. And it's nice to take a break from platformhopping every once in a while. But Space Invaders (or Galaxians, or Galaga, or whatever) is dead, and throwing bucketfuls of pretty graphics, humour and SNES flashiness at it isn't going to help.

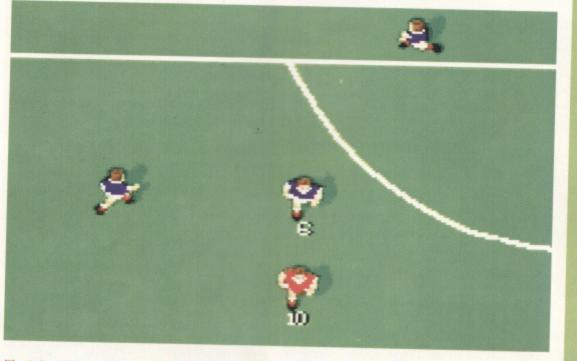

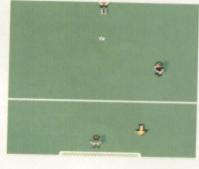

Remember the original Amiga Kick Off? Despite being very scrappy looking, it earned itself a hoard of devoted fans, back in the heady days of 1988. We've been waiting for a decent sequel ever since...



It's at about this stage – when you've got four or so players on screen – that *Kick Off* starts to have problems. Have another guy run on there and the slow down will get very noticeable indeed. Playing the game in 'normal' (ie high speed) mode is a big no-no too, at least for us. The ball is all but uncontrollable, and things get very frustrating indeed. Slow the game down, however, and it gets a lot more playable. Still a bit stupid, but playable.

Penalties are great. The keeper stands four feet off his line, and when the ball goes in the Super NES takes three seconds to notice before it makes the



crowd cheer the goal, with a brilliant sample that hilariously cuts dead after two seconds.



Part of the game's admirably compre-hensive, but dreadfully confusing, options screen set up. There must be a million better ways to organise this, you'd think.

This is a tricky one. As Kick Off is such a celebrated home computer game, most people in this country have already decided

whether they love it (reasons: high speed, computer control of the really tricky stuff allowing for great head-to-head action) or hate it (reasons: high speed, lack of control, fluky gameplay) already. Certainly, lots of people have been waiting for its first 'real' appearance on the SNES with great interest (Imagineer's less-thanbrilliant *Pro Soccer* was actually a first stab at SNES *Kick Off* in all but name).

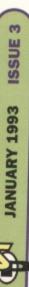
So was if worth the wait? Well, first off, there are a lot of things wrong with it. The ball sometimes goes too fast for the scrolling to keep up, for instance, disappearing off the edge of the screen. All your substitutes - of which there are an infinite number - have the number '12', meaning there can be up to four 12s on the pitch at once. The game tends to lock up when more than four players are on screen at once. The useless scanner and close-up view of the action mean you can rarely tell where you are in relation to the goal. The goalkeepers themselves are too good. It's too fast to be controllable. And so on. Perhaps worst of all is the painful inability of the joypad to cope with the sort of high speed 360° turns that have always been a major part of Kick Off. You'll definitely need a joystick to get the best out of this.

However, when all's said and done, this can be fun. First you'll have to fight your way through the ridiculous option screens to turn the speed down – essential if you want to be able to control the thing. Then you'll have to get yourself a joystick (as I said), and last you'll have to find a mate to play against. In this form you'll find yourself laughing and cursing the inadequacies of the game constantly, but having a great laugh all the same. Just like you did playing Amiga *Kick Off*, in fact.

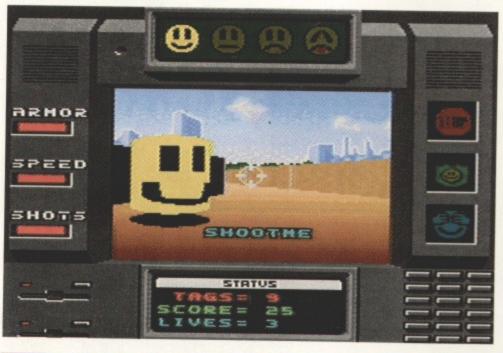

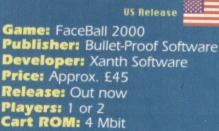

First, the graphics. The 3D maze is made up from lots of filled polygons – something the Super NES is crap at. So it moves around jerkily, and in two-player mode it's horribly slow. Player 1 is the same colour as most of the

baddies - player 2 keeps shooting him by mistake. The bullets move really jerkily, so it's hard to see which bullets you've fired, and which are about to kill you.

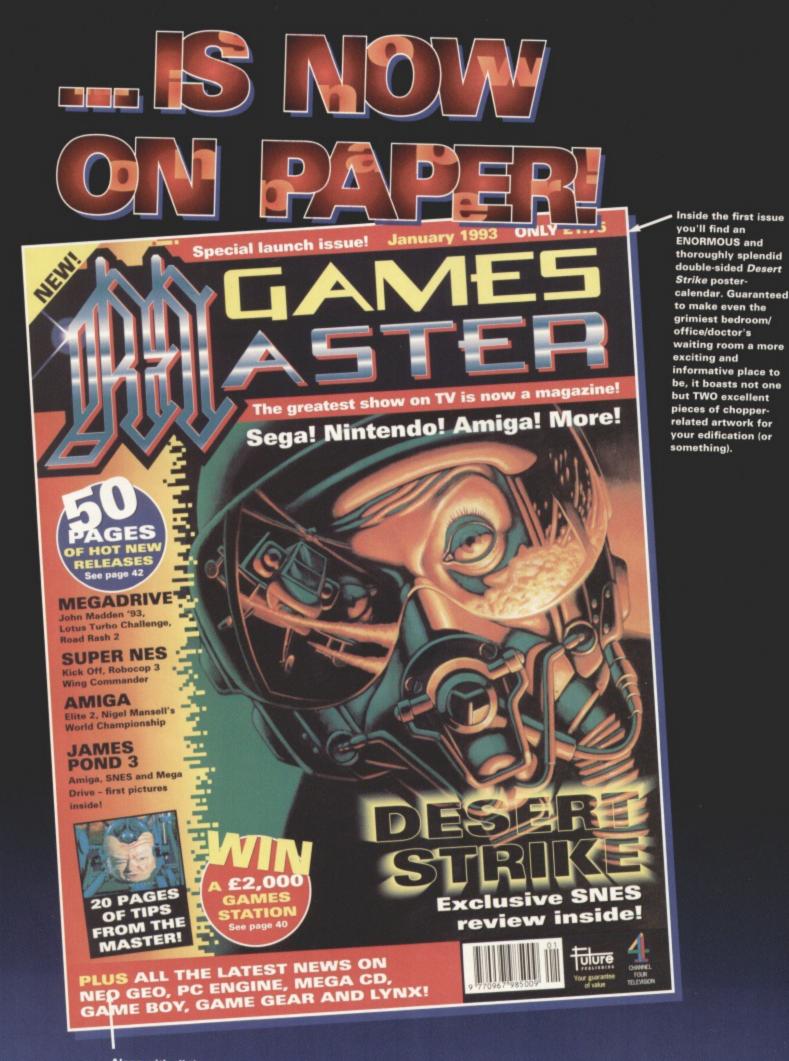

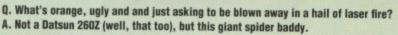

If you've played with the Super Scope at all, you'll know that, so far, all you've been able to do is point it at the screen and shoot

things. So what new ideas would they come up with for *Battleclash*? I was rather looking forward to finding out.

Battleclash is a game where you point the Super Scope at the screen and shoot things with it. Ho hum. Okay, so the things you shoot are quite a bit more impressive than the ones in the games that come with the Scope, and all sorts of stuff goes on in the background. But, basically, you're still just shooting things. What's worse, you only ever get to shoot one thing at a time. Tch.

But let's look on the bright side. You've bought a Super Scope, and you want to know whether *Battleclash* is worth adding to your collection. Well...

The graphics really aren't bad at all. They've got a distinctive Japanese look to them (even though the game's been programmed in America) and the backgrounds whizz about really nicely – though for no obvious reason.

The game also boasts a curious line in humour, generally during the conversations baddies have with you between bouts. The intentional jokes aren't really very funny at all, but for some reason, we were falling about laughing nevertheless, particularly when one baddy challenged us to scratch his 'big ST Ivan'. (That probably says more about us than the game, though.) (Perhaps you'd better shut up. – Ed.) Most importantly, though,

Battleclash is quite a bit better than the existing Super Scope games. You've got to be quite careful about what you shoot and when, and it's neat the way you have to keep swapping between defensive and offensive shooting.

But, having said that, it's still pretty useless. The Super Scope is too ungainly to swing about at speed, and shoulder ache inevitably sets in after a while. But worst of all, it's frustrating only being able to shoot at things. You want to duck and weave around them, jump over them and kick them. If you've already got a Super Scope, it might be worth picking up a copy of *Battleclash* by way of consolation. But if you haven't, this is no reason to change your Christmas list.

SCOPE (Gagh! - Ed.)

WHAT IT IS. HOW IT WORKS. WHETHER OR NOT TO BUY ONE...

Confused by all these 'Super Scope' references? What is it, exactly? With the recent release of the first Scope-compatible game, and the launch of the Super Scope Super Nintendo pack, we thought we'd better take a look. (Then we realised how daft we'd look sitting there with a gigantic piece of plastic on our shoulders, and so made Jonathan Davies do it instead.)

You do look incredibly silly peering through the Super Scope, it's true. (Maybe if they'd painted it black or something...) But extra bits of hardware for the Super Nintendo are pretty thin on the ground, so it's always exciting when a new one comes along.

Although it looks amazingly impressive and complicated, the Super Scope is actually very simple, and not nearly as dangerous as it seems. It connects up to your Super Nintendo in place of one of the joypads

COMPATIBILITY

An American or Japanese Super Scope won't work on a UK Super Nintendo, so don't bother buying a cheap import one unless you've also got an imported machine. On the other hand, import games should work fine with a UK Scope. However, *Battleclash* is only going to be £30 when it comes out over here in February, so you're unlikely to make any cost saving by buying the US version. (Confused? Me too.)



Each time you use the Scope you've got to calibrate your sights. (It only takes a moment.)

and lets you 'shoot' things on the screen. (Well, not actually shoot them, of course – that would break your television. But the effect's the same.)

Interested? Well, you can either buy the Super Scope separately, or pick it up along with a SNES in one of Nintendo's special packs. Either way, the Scope comes with a cart containing six games (which we've tested overleaf) and a special receiver unit that acts as a go-between for the Scope and your SNES.

HOW IT ALL WORKS

The Super Scope is a nifty piece of hardware, especially when compared to similar systems on other machines.

For a start, it works by infrared, which means there aren't any wires between the Scope and your Super Nintendo. Instead there's a little receiver thingy which sits on top of your telly and plugs into Port 2 on your SNES. When you press 'fire' on the Scope, an invisible infrared beam shoots out and tells the SNES where on the screen you're aiming.

As well as the fire button, there's also a pause button on the Scope, and one marked 'cursor' which is a general purpose kind of button.

The downside to all this is that the Scope takes six batteries – and you'll have to remember to switch it off when you've finished.

The Super Scope – tough, eh? SCOPE



BLASTRIS A



This is a version of the classic puzzle game *Tetris*, with two differences: a) it's played sideways, and b) instead of moving blocks into place you, er, shoot bits off them till they fit. It's a bit silly, to be quite honest, and very boring indeed.

.

BLASTRIS B



This time coloured blocks fall down the screen, and some change colour if you shoot them. If you make a line of three blocks of the same colour, all three disappear. Slightly better than *Blastris A*, but there's not much in it.

Only a couple of minutes' fun here.



MOLE PATROL



If you really twisted my arm, I'd probably have to admit that *Mole Patrol*'s a bit of all right. It's extremely simple – you just shoot the blue moles as they pop out of their holes, and leave the pink ones alone. It's actually quite good fun, and dead cute.

INTERCEPT



Missiles fly across the screen, and you've got to shoot them. The catch is that you have to allow a bit of time for your shots to reach them, which means aiming slightly in front. It's professionally done, but good for about oneand-a-half minutes tops.





Here you're chasing enemy aircraft around, trying to shoot them down while avoiding their missiles. It's a bit like the coin-op *Afterburner*, only even worse, and the ground doesn't spin round. Again: Nicely done, but good for about one-and-a-half minutes.

CONFRONT



Oh crumbs. This is just the same as *Engage*, only this time the aircraft become robots and they're coming towards you. It's been neatly programmed, and is probably stretching the Super Scope to its limits, but is still really very boring.

IS IT WORTH IT?

UPPERS

The Scope actually does what it sets out to do extremely well. It's well made, surprisingly accurate and pretty high-tech too – it's a real plus not having bits of wire dangling all over the place.

As for the six games that come with it, well, coming direct from Nintendo they're extremely well programmed. And the actual 'shooting' side of things is done so well it does actually feel like you're shooting things, rather than sending electronic signals to your SNES.

DOWNERS



The design of the Scope does have its disadvantages. For a start the sights are possibly *too* accurate – you tend to hit what you're aiming for every time. Plus it's too bulky to swing around quickly, and the weird position you hold it in makes your shoulder hurt.

The games are the real problem, though, because the 'scope' of the Scope is so limited – all you do is point it at the screen and shoot. To their credit, they do their best to take full advantage of the system. But shooting coloured blocks is much the same as shooting moles, missiles or planes, and it gets boring in no time at all.

As for alternative games, there's *Battleclash* (which doesn't get a UK release till February), but nothing else on the immediate horizon.

THE VERDICT

Judging by the software currently available for it, the Super Scope simply isn't worth the money – either on its own, or as part of a Super Nintendo pack. And, to be quite honest, it's very difficult to imagine a game that actually *would* be any good on it. Until somebody writes one, save your pennies.

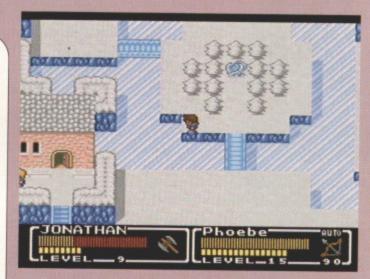

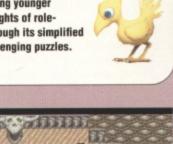
THE FINAL FANTASY STORY



Final Fantasy V, the next game in the series (after Final Fantasy: Mystic Quest) to be released.

Okay, this bit's incredibly complicated, and has taken hours of research. So a) listen up, and b) be jolly grateful. (Deep breath.)

Final Fantasy: Mystic Quest is one of series of Final Fantasy games that consists of Final Fantasy I and Final Fantasy II on the Game Boy, Final Fantasy on the NES, Final Fantasy II on the SNES - which is called Final Fantasy IV in Japan for some reason and Final Fantasy V, which is also on the SNES. (Or, at least, it will be when it's released, though much excitement surrounds it in Japan already - where the series is hugely popular - as it's the first 16 Mbit Final Fantasy game! You might be better off waiting for Final Fantasy III, though, which is the US version.) This one - Final Fantasy: Mystic Quest - doesn't actually fit into the series as such, being more of a Final Fantasy spin-off, aimed at introducing younger players to the delights of roleplaying games through its simplified plot and less challenging puzzles. (Wheeze.)

Like so many SNES games, *Mystic Quest* gives you this map which plots your progress through the game You can re-visit locations to pick up goodies and increase your Experience points.



While Zelda treats battles as simple sword fights, Mystic Quest complicates things a little more. When you encounter a gang of monsters, the action flips to this screen, which shows you facing the monsters. Each of you has a certain number of points, which are reduced each time you're hit. You can attack monsters with either weapons or spells, and your attacks will be all the more successful if you've accumulated lots of Experience points.

But what happens when you're completely outnumbered? Luckily, as you progress through the game you'll be able to team up with other characters, who'll fight alongside you. (Only one at a time, mind.) These characters will hopefully know some decent spells (life spells are particularly useful if you get killed), and will also absorb some of the flak from the bad guys.

GOOD, BAD OR UGLY?



If a game's described as 'aimed at the younger player', you can usually bet that not only will it be complete rubbish, but you'll have it finished

within minutes – even if you're barely out of nappies. This is set to change with *Final Fantasy – Mystic Quest*. At last our longsuffering Younger Players can enjoy a game that's been specially designed for them, rather than having to make do with an Older Player's hand-me-downs. The chronologically challenged (*Who? –*

The chronologically challenged (Who? – Ed) aren't the only ones who'll benefit from Mystic Quest's simplified approach, either. The vast majority of the population find fantasy role-playing games rather daunting – me included. But no-one could possibly be scared of Final Fantasy: Mystic Quest. It eases you gently into the swing of things, and never gets even remotely complicated and boring. It's neat the way the intro gently blends into the start of the game.

Given that the game lives up to its accessibility promise, then, how does it fare in the fun stakes? Well, the graphics aren't exactly fantastic. The colours are a bit drab, and the sprites rather small. (There are plenty of nice bits, though, and some of the baddies look great.) The music is brilliant, however, which helps.

however, which helps. But best of all, *Mystic Quest* is really nice to play. It's got a great line in humour – the bemused look your character gives you when something weird happens, for example, and I loved the bit where you discover a really important crystal, but your companion wanders off and starts playing with a telescopic arm or something. (Sorry, it's one of those 'had to be there' occasions.)

The only aspect of *Mystic Quest* that can't reasonably be excused is its size. Four megabits is absolutely nothing in RPG terms, and after about an hour's playing I was roughly a fifth of the way through the game. And if I can get a fifth of the way through in an hour, our Younger Player would probably be about half-way through after half an hour. (*Er, hang on: That's not... Oh yes. I was forgetting – Ed.*) But then, at this price (around £30 from most importers), who's complaining?

who's complaining? Final Fantasy: Mystic Quest doesn't quite measure up to the standards set by Zelda, Ys and the forthcoming Dragon's Quest V, but it's a really smart little game, and I enjoyed playing it immensely. It's also a great introduction to fantasy role-playing – just as its makers intended.

DRAGON QUEST **INSIDE JAPAN'S FAVOURITE GAME** By Matt Bielby and Tai Ono

Remember the queues for Street Fighter II when it was first released in Japan? They're as nothing next to the ones Tokyo saw for Dragon Quest V when it appeared back in September. This is the most popular game series of them all in Japan, and Dragon Quest V (the first on Super Famicom) is the most popular episode of the lot. But why then, if it's so good, have so few people outside that country

even heard of it?

t's almost impossible for games players in this country to realise just how popular the **Dragon Quest** series has become in Japan. Imagine the amount of excitement and media coverage we've had for Street Fighter II

Dragon Quest: the complete set of 8bit NES cartridges.

over here, say, then double it, and you'll still be nowhere near. After all, Japanese game shops were seeing queues of up to 12,000 waiting patiently outside their door to buy the game on its first day of release. It'll be a long time before any single game earns itself that sort of reaction in the UK ...

BUT WHY DRAGON QUEST?

That's a difficult one to answer. Certainly, it's hard to see the appeal from an outsider's point of view. The Dragon Quest series are fairly involved fantasy role playing games, laden with Japanese text - not unlike a hundred that get launched in Japan every year. Only those fluent in Japanese could hope to understand the reams of options and text boxes appearing on screen whenever you come across a problem, someone to talk to, or try to do anything complicated - as you can see from the screen grabs, we got stuck very early on in the game!

COMING TO AMERICA

So, the original Japanese Dragon Quests were never

likely to do well outside their native country, that's obvious. There must be more to it than that, though - surely translating the games into English can't be that hard?

Well, no, it's not. The technical details aren't tricky at all - indeed, the first four games, only ever available on NES, were translated, and sold in America under the Dragon Warrior label.

SLIME GOES TO TOWN...

... but he doesn't stay there for long. He doesn't get a chance - he's too damn popular. You see, the Dragon Quest characters, with the blue blob Slime leading the way, currently appear on just about every merchandisable piece of kit you can imagine - stuff which normally sells out immediately. We've

more important to the series than a quick glance at the screenshots would indicate. In many ways what really matters is not what you see on-screen, but the character designs, which are done by Akira Toriyama, one of the most popular Japanese comic artists. Akira's the guy behind Dragon Ball, the manga series which has since spawned a TV series and Super Famicom game. He developed the Dragon Quest character designs and series artwork from the start, creating a whole host of instantly recognisable characters. The blob-like Slime, for instance, is a big star in Japan.

Cute, appealing and unusual characters aside, the other main reason for the Dragon Quest success is simply that the Japanese like 'that sort of thing.' The games are big, can seem fairly slow moving, are packed with fairly repetitive battle scenes, and jammed full of text - just the sort of thing they love. They're a patient people, you see - as these games show, much

more patient than we are

seen mugs, pencils, collectors' cards etc - this thing you see here is a CD of Dragon Quest music. After Slime, perhaps the most commonly merchandised character is Dragon Kid, the tiger-like thing on this month's cover.

The thing is, something was obviously lost along the way. Indeed, the series is nowhere near as popular in the US as it is in Japan, where the admittedly lousy NES graphics (Dragon Warrior IV 'looks and sounds like lizard stew' said one popular

American games mag recently) have turned a healthy proportion off the series. The far less appealing American box artwork may have done its share to marginalise the games there too.

Which brings us to an interesting point. You see, graphics are rather

The big difference between Dragon Quest V and the previous games is that this is the first to allow you to recruit monsters to your side, not just boring old people. There are over 200 different types of monster in the game, but 40 of them have the potential for good - they can be won over to your side. You can equip them with weapons, and build up their power to help out in battle - not only are they often really powerful, the monsters are all so different that this game is much more variety packed than earlier ones.

That said, the monsters still fit into the same categories as human characters have done throughout the game

series

This pink elephant thing is another monster from the game.

You get your warriors, you knights and your businessmen. For instance, Slime is a cleric character, while Dragon Kid (the tiger-like creature) is a Knight.

The other big improvement recently added to Dragon Quest (it first appeared in the NES-only IV, and has been carried over to DQV) is Artificial Intelligence. In early versions of Dragon Quest you directly controlled all the characters in your party, but now you only handle the hero. The computer AI does the rest. In a fight your companions will decide which moves to use themselves - and they're meant to learn by their mistakes, improving in intelligence as the game goes on. (From people we've talked to, it's dubious whether you actually notice this as you play the game, but it's the thought that counts.)

DQV will be released as Dragon Warrior V in America soon. Look out for our review.

Also, in the section with the Koopas on the logs, float down onto a Wiggler with the cape and jump up onto another one. Providing you don't hit the ground in between (but float from the screen to reset the Wigglers to their original yellow state) your score will start to turn into weird symbols, and in under three minutes to the maximum value of 99,999,990!

FOREST OF ILLUSION 2

Grab the cape to kill the fish, and C use Grab Blocks to kill sea urchins and increase your speed. Keep to the bottom until you reach a small chamber - hit the third invisible block and wait for the extra life to fall. Near the end of the level, look for a single yellow exclamation block - the wall to the left is false and leads to the Blue Switch Palace. (You saw it on GamesMaster...)

FOREST OF ILLUSION 3

Two goals here leading to the Ghost House and Roy's Castle. This level also introduces bubblified

exploding bombs - best avoided. Don't forget to visit the second pipe and collect the pink apples, but ignore the large group of prize blocks (they all contain coins only). And the secret goal leading to Roy's Castle? Why, it's down the tall green pipe nearest the end.

FOREST GHOST HOUSE

Run to the right past the first section. Find the P Switch to the right, take it to the left of the brown door, then collect the coins and stamp on the Switch to reveal a blue door. Go through this door and run to the left. The first door is the main exit, but the door further along provides you with a lock and key.

FOREST OF ILLUSION 4

You have to find the second goal on this area, else you get taken back to area two of the Forest - it's down the small mid-air blue pipe shortly after the midway gate. To reach it, either use the cape or the cloud. Oh, and avoid collecting the 1-Up from the angler at the beginning or he'll start firing spiky things at you...

FOREST SECRET AREA

Er, apart from making you feel rather queasy, there's nothing much to this flying-platform level. If you've collected the cape earlier on then you can fly up and over the Giant Gate to collect the three Extra Mario Mushrooms.

In the second area, wait until both G Grinders in the pit are going to the left and leg it. This is another level to really learn your way through on your own - tips won't be of much use. That said, though, did you know that you can reach a secret second red door with nine extra lives by flying from the ledge above the first red door? Complete this and you'll open up another entrance to Star World.

ROY'S CASTLE

The Brown Block Snake is guite easy to get the hang of, but watch out for the fireballs and falling spikes. Oh, and you may find it helpful to initially jump on the green block to

CHOCOLATE ISLAND 2

A strange area, this, because your course changes depending on the number of coins collected and the time remaining. To find the key you'll have to complete the first two sections with at least 250 left on the timer. Reaching the normal goal is easy, but note that section two will change if you collect all the coins (including the hidden one below the prize block) on section one.

CHOCOLATE ISLAND 3

Hop along the spinning platforms to the first blue pipe for a bonus coin area. You'll need to find the secret area to advance - for this you'll nee the cape (from the Green Bonus Block) to fly underneath the Giant Gate to a 3-Up moon and Giant Gate number 2.

CHOCOLATE FORTRESS

Nasty, this. There are spikes, there are fireballs, and there are rocks waiting to squash you. And Reznor is waiting for you at the end.

CHOCOLATE SECRET

Don't bother with the green pipe on the first section, as it's a bit tricky (full of falling platforms and Hammer Brothers) and there's nothing to collect. On the

Obviously not taking too kindly to intruders, Wendy has littered her castle with undead baddies, spikes, Grinders and Sparkies. In some cases

(carefully) negotiate the sand maze to find the secret exit though. (Jump first from the extreme left of this section for a cape.) Then on section three, run quickly until the first sand bar is out of view, return (the sand will be gone) and use the platform as a run-up to fly up and left out of and onto the right side of the tunnel.

The sneaky thing is that this fortress is easier to complete without the collectable cape, which otherwise reduces your falling speed and makes the spikes harder to pass. (It might be a good idea to Power Up with red mushrooms from another level first, though.) You'll need to be running to survive the initial set of three spikes – the key to passing the set of quick spikes near the end is to run slightly before they even start moving upwards. Reznor is easy to kill (again) – you'll then be taken to The Back Door of Bowser's Castle.

THE BACK DOOR

There isn't really any great challenge to this level, as it mainly serves as an introduction to the Mechakoopas who - by jumping on, Fall down a narrow shaft and touch the green sphere to enter a new world...

you'll need to stand between two spikes and jump over the Grinder, but this shouldn't pose too much of a problem. Defeating Wendy is much the same as defeating Lemmy, only this time you have two fireballs to contend with as well as two decoys. Hopefully no problem.

SUNKEN CHOST SHIP

The second part of the ship is hard – very hard. The ghosts all appear simultaneously, but leave a gap sufficient for you to swim through every other time they form. So swim when the gap is there – hover while you're waiting (moving out the way of any forming ghosts). The next stage Is great – a huge fall leading to a platform (if you stay in the middle) with another Super Star on. (Why not come back and try this level with the Cape?) Swim to the bottom for two extra Marios, and hit the question mark to exit.

right). Steer the snake to form the sharpest steps possible to reach an entrance to a chamber. Only small Mario will fit through – Super Mario can slide through with a run up, but starting the snake as small Mario is heartily recommended.

VALLEY OF BOWSER 3

There's not much we can say about this bit, except, er, it's easy.

Go down the green pipe for Power G Up purposes and spin through the large shaft of Rotating Blocks (fall down the narrow shaft and aim left if you are small Mario). Beyond the Midway gate, stand to the left of the wall in front of Chuck, run and jump against the wall to avoid the boulder, then run and jump over him onto the platform. All the other Chucks can be run past, except the last which you should spring over. Using the cape (from the yellow Bonus Block) to pass the large lava pit is easier than jumping on the Koopa.You'll need Yoshi to eat the key to open up Star World.

LARRY'S CASTLE

You could try to fly section one, but to be honest, getting to grips with the brown snake really isn't that hard. (Keep standing on it as it moves upwards.) The Magikoopa makes his return here – you may need his shots to blast through the Rotating Block walls.

BOWSER'S CASTLE

From the initial choice of four doors, take door three (Koopa Camouflage) as this is the only section with a collectable power up (if a camouflage square has holes, you can jump through it) – the higher of the two furthermost camouflage squares contains a feather. Take door one of the next choice of four doors to the Spike Sprint – as soon as the vicious spikes start to rise, wait for the counter to decrease by two, then leg it. The third section is effectively the Back Door level – the only advantage of reaching Bowser via the front door is the chance to collect a feather on the way.

Star Road STAR WORLD 1

This entire world is a downwards trip through layers of Rotating Blocks. Every one of the Star Worlds has two goals – you need to find the hidden goal on each to open up the next Star World, but to register all 96 goals you'll have to go through both. Here, goal one is at the bottom, while goal two is found by breaking through the Blocks to the far right.

STAR WORLD 2

Star Road also introduces you to the coloured Yoshis – there was a hidden Red Yoshi to be found on the previous world, but here Baby Blue Yoshi is rather more obvious. Feed him the Super Star and he will grow instantly. Swim along off the top of the screen (if you're feeling really lazy) and enter the green pipe for goal one, or swim under it for goal two.

STAR WORLD 3

The normal goal shouldn't be too tricky to find (hem), nor should the hidden one. Feed Yoshi five dropping Spinys, use the Silver P Switch, collect the coins, pick up one of the Grab Blocks you're standing on (simply press X or Y), jump onto the high Grab

What? You want me to tell you how to kill him? And spoil all the fun? Okay, Bowser only requires six hits to kill and comes at you in three waves, switching after two hits. In the first he'll move left and right only, so your only road to death will be collision with the rotor blade or one of the baddies he throws out. Instantly kill the first baddy that lands (to avoid collision), stun the other and throw it so that it hopefully lands on his head. The subsequent fireball attack can be avoided by standing to the right of the screen and jumping as far to the left as possible when one is about to hit you. For this wave Bowser attacks in a two-boulder, two-baddy pattern. STAR WORLD 4

Pick up the baby Yoshi, feed him five Koopas, then use a blue Koopa from the quadruple green platform to soar to the right. Keep the platforms in view and by the time Yoshi swallows you should land on a green platform a short distance from a set of revolving platforms. Jump right until you reach the orange pipe and leave Yoshi by the keyhole on the exclamation platform below. Throw the red Koopa shell at the prize block, re-mount Yoshi, collect the key and away you go.

STAR WORLD 5

You'll need a cape and a run-up from

the start of the level to reach the second goal. Stay as high as you can, maintaining your altitude long enough to reach the ledge of yellow exclamation marks. Then just run right along the ledge, ducking with a run-up to slide under through the small gaps. Soaring through the level is the easiest method to reaching goal one as well.

TUBULAR

Consecutive balloons must be collected to make it through this level - the first from above the spring board, the second from a highly placed Prize Block to the right and the third (and very hard to

collect) from under the lower Football Player (kill him first, then hit the platform, avoiding the other Player's balls).

WAY COO

Take in Yoshi, hit the third switch off and the fourth on, and go down the pipe for Yoshi's Wings.

Collect a Blue Yoshi from Star World 2 and eat loads of Koopa shells – including the yellow one just before you collect the Star. The jump onto the final blue block, bouncing off a Koopa, can be avoided with the cape.

GROOVY

Throw the Koopa shell at the prize block for Yoshi. Don't kill the two Chucks at the end though - use your temporary invulnerability if you are hit and leg it.

The stranded fish are harmless, but the swimming ones deadly. Yoshi is available from the highest of the three Prize blocks, but more easily obtained from Groovy beforehand. The left blue pipe is a short cut, and there is a Power Up on the top row of Prize Blocks.

OUTRAGEOUS

(Aren't you bored of Super Mario World, yet?) Use the cape to soar through the whole level.

FUNKY

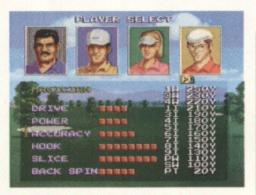

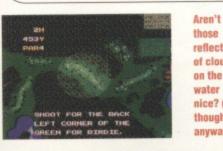

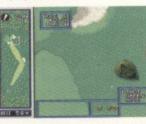

GOOD, BAD OR UGLY?



I think it's fair to say that you'll only ever buy one golf game. It's not that, having bought one, you'll never want to see

another one ever again. It's just that, unlike shoot-'em-ups, or driving games, or beat-'em-ups, all golf games basically do the same job, and having two would be largely pointless. What you want, then, is to buy just the one, but make sure it's the best one. So which *is* the best game?

Well, so far every SNES 3D golf game has suffered from the same problem: after you've hit the ball, it takes so long to draw the view from the ball's new position that you very quickly get bored of waiting each time. However, Irem Skins suffers no such problem. Each screen appears instantaneously, and, what's more, as you line up your shot the view rotates around really smoothly. It's a splendid effect, making excellent use of Mode 7. The graphics look really nice, too, especially the way the horizon is reflected in lakes and rivers. The only minor snag is that, as it is in Mode 7, there are no hills or dips, and bunkers look more like sandpits. Gameplay wise it's great, too. We had loads of fun with it. The fast pace really helps, and the controls are nice and easy to use. (Though not so simple that they make the game too easy.)

Irem Skins isn't quite perfect, though. For a start, the ball doesn't behave quite as realistically as it might – when you whack it onto the green, it just lands and stops dead, rather than rolling along for a bit. And only having one course might be seen as a little restrictive by some, though very few SNES games actually have more than one. PGA Tour is an exception (though not a very good one). And, speaking of which, PGA Tour Golf on the PC or the Amiga probably remains the king of all golf games – it's just a shame the Super NES version is so lacklustre.

So I think it's safe to say that *Irem Skins* is your best bet if you're looking for a Super NES golf game. We like the sheer playability of *Hole-in-One*, but *Skins* seems to strike a better balance between graphics, gameplay and that essential feeling that you're actually out there on the fairway, playing golf for real.

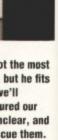

Still, at least a three storey fall doesn't kill him.

The second section - a building site packed with even more robots - is incredibly difficult. It's also one of those very annoying levels where you very nearly finish it but can't get to that crucial last baddy because the

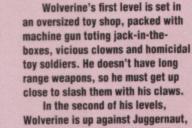

accurate he's now leader of one of two current X-Men teams (Storm's boss of the other). The outfit that we see here isn't his current one either (and the nickname quoted - 'Slim' hasn't appeared in the comics for years!), but at least they've got his abilities right. Cyclops can run, punch and kick, but his main power is to fire force beams from his eyes. (He's actually quite a tragic character in the comics, never able to take off his protective visor in case a stray optic-blast takes out someone he loves, but, needless to say, this doesn't come across in the game.)

Cyke's two levels are a battle through a series of mine shafts - apparently Arcade is mining ruby quartz, the stuff Cyclop's visor is made of, or something - populated by assorted evil robots and men in battlesuits. In many sections the floor is a lethal electrified rail - Cyclops is forced to travel these in the mine cars that come along every so often, giving the whole thing a feel not unlike the chase sequence from the film Indiana Jones And The Temple Of Doom.

In a tiny third level you face a giant Sentinel (mutant hating robots built by some nut to rid the world of 'homo superior' they keep cropping up in the comics on missions to destroy the X-Men). The Sentinel doesn't move but just fires various weapons at our hero.

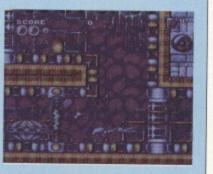

This is actually quite fun, with a nasty time limit factor - if Storm doesn't surface to breathe occasionally she'll drown. and often there's no handy air pocket to allow her to do it!

And here's the second bit more of the same, but packed with more vicious fish and other underwater bad guys. And that's about all these is to say.

GOOD, BAD OR UGLY?



Oh dear. I so much wanted to like this game (being a bit of a comic fan myself from way back), but nope, try as I might it's almost

impossible. Spiderman & The X-Men commits three cardinal sins - it looks crap (very much like a Sega Master System game, as many people have commented), makes very poor use of promising material (for some reason superhero games never seem to work), and, worst of all, proves boring to play.

Let's take these in turn, shall we? First off, the look of it. Well, the animation of our heroes is passable, for the most part, but flat colours and unimaginative backdrops render that more or less academic. There's no sense of depth (at all) to any of it, much of it is fairly dark and dull, and even the brightest, most interesting looking levels (like Wolverine's fight with the giant toys) hardly live up to expectation. Then there's the waste of material. Sure,

Spiderman gets to swing around the place in his individual style, but the other characters are very interchangeable. They don't do anything very distinctive, quite simply - that needn't be Cyclops there, any sprite with a gun could complete the level just as well. To my mind a real superhero game should make proper use of the character's abilities – it should give the player the sense that he actually is Wolverine (or whoever). With all the most interesting of our heroes' powers glossed over, Spidey fails here, that's for sure

And finally, there's the fact that it's boring. There ain't much more to say about this really – it just plods along. Yes, it's fairly hard, so you'll get a decent amount of play out of it, but the levels are either very simplistic or very repetitive. Things pick up a bit in later stages, it's true – Gambit's fight not to get crushed against the ceiling as his second level scrolls inexorably upwards is quite fun – but not enough.

And that's more or less it. Less demanding gameplayers - and dedicated comics fans – will get to like it, sure, but for most people this is a step backwards. This has got simple gameplay, lousy graphics, little real feel for the characters, and, on top of all that, you can't help getting that unmistakable feeling that this is just a production line job, one that nobody ever cared very much about. For shame.

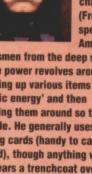

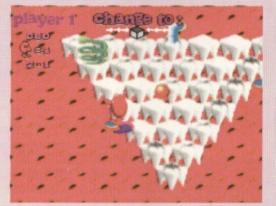
HOW TO DO IT

In case you've been locked in a wardrobe for the last 10 years (the original Q*Bert coin-op appeared in 1983), here's how it works:

You control an orange blob with a long nose and no arms. He's got to hop around lots of blocks, painting each a new colour. Initially you've only got to jump on each one once. Later on you have to do each one twice. And much later on you may well have to jump on each one exactly once - no more and no less.

There's a variety of baddies. Some hop around at random, while others home in on you. Needless to say, some of them change the colours of blocks you've already jumped onto.

One of the things I've learnt while playing Super NES games is that if a game's got really neat backgrounds, the chances are it

hasn't got a great deal of 'foreground'. Cameltry had some great backgrounds with fish swimming about, but the game itself was thin to say the least. Super Pang - that had some brilliant backgrounds, but playing it revealed quite a different state of affairs. And *Cosmo Gang*, which I've just reviewed, has some terrific backgrounds, which get better the further you get into the game, but they're simply there as a disguise for the *Space Invaders* gameplay.

The backgrounds in *Q*Bert 3* are brilliant. They do all sorts of weird and hypnotic things with colour cycling and Mode 7. And the 'Game Over' screen is absolutely amazing. I sat and stared at it for hours, completely transfixed.

Actually, that's not strictly true. I sat and stared at it for hours because I wasn't looking forward to writing this review. You see, Q*Bert is one of those unfortunate games that – yes – has got brilliant backgrounds, but not much in the way of actual stuff to play.

Don't get me wrong. Q*Bert 3 works absolutely 100% as it's supposed to, and is quite good fun for a while. It's also packed with really nice graphical ideas – aside from the backgrounds. I loved all the different things you've got to hop over, like teeth, and books, and suitcases – choosing the best ones for this review was pretty hard. But it quickly becomes apparent that Q^*Bert is no more than mildly amusing, however many levels you play through.

Sure, *Q*Bert* was a neat enough idea back in 1983. But, in 1983, jumping around pyramids was about all an arcade machine could handle. The Super Nintendo is capable of so much more, and that's what we've come to expect of it.

There are two sorts of puzzle games, I've just worked out. There are 'realtime' ones like Tetris, where you've got to think

on your feet. No really deep thought is required, just a constant stream of shallow but accurate thinking. (What are you talking about? - Ed.) Then there are ones like *Pushover*. These present you with the same series of problems each time you play (whereas Tetris blocks appear randomly), but they're much tougher problems and some might take you hours to solve. Er... so there we are.

Although the guts of Pushover are very simple, everything possible has been done to make the game worthy of the title, um, 'a Super NES game'. Your character, G.I.Ant (cringe), is really cute, and well animated. The backgrounds are all really well done, too. And soundwise the game is a gem, with lots of neat spot effects and some fab tunes. As for the puzzles, they've been lovingly designed and the difficulty increases at a sensible rate.

There are only really two problems with the thing. First, as I said before, it's 100% pure puzzling. No arcade skills are required at all, other than making G.I.Ant walk around the platforms. That means it's possible you'll find it really boring though most people will love it. And second, while in theory you could solve all the screens through sheer brain power, quite a bit of trial and error tends to become involved, which can be frustrating. And third (oops), there are only 100 levels. That might sound like lots, but once you've cracked them all (which will take you ages), the cartridge becomes redundant – you'll never want to play Pushover again.

A neat, enormously entertaining game, then, but one with a distinctly finite life.

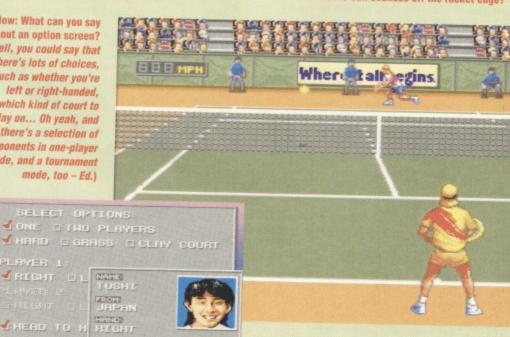

David Crane, eh? **Remember him?** That unseeded player who got through to the quarter finals of Wimbledon in 1976,

but then got knocked out, never to be heard of again. (You sure about this? - Ed.) Okay, so he's the programmer of Amazing Tennis, and may never have played tennis at all.

What's the game like? Well, anyone with experience of Super Tennis on the SNES will know what fab fun computerised tennis can be. Much of this is down to versatility of gameplay – in a good tennis game there's an almost infinite number of ways to take or return a shot. For much of the time Amazing Tennis is strong at this, but occasionally misses the mark quite widely on a number of points.

So what's wrong? Certainly not the graphics – the game is good looking and fluid in play. The animation is also great the players move well, hit the ball with flair, and run beautifully when chasing a ball. And to cap it all, the 3D ball movement is very accurate. Though it could do with more colour, this is a great looking game. Sound effects are tremendous too, boasting some of the best sampled ball-bounces ever, and the action replays are a treat.

The downside, however, is not only obvious, it could have easily been fixed. Because the action is viewed from behind the player, seeing where you've got to serve the ball to is tricky. What's even harder, though, is being the player who's at the far end of the court. Serving and receiving from that end is far too tricky – you can't see a damn thing.

Despite these shortcomings, this is still an enjoyable game – it's just that a better one is already available on official release.

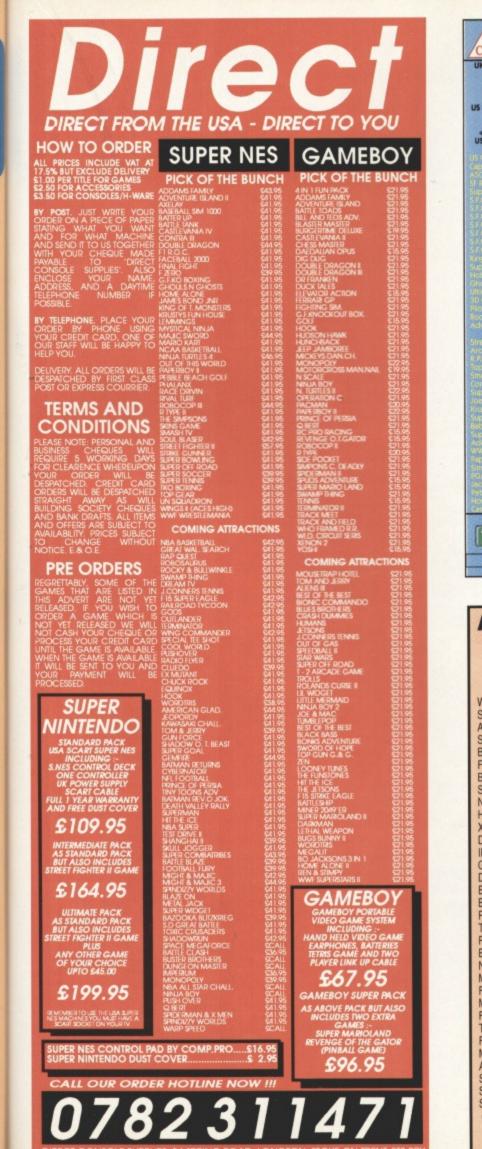

Part Two **Remember what** happened last month? No? Well, to recap, we set off on our quest. ran around a castle. rescued Princess Zelda, visited a town. met the Elder, went to The East Palace. fought assorted baddies, took on a boss character. collected a pendant, went to the Desert Palace, found the **Power Glove, collected** two more pendants. fought giant worms, got transformed into a rabbit, entered the **Tower Of Hera.** grabbed the Moon Pearl, discovered the Master Sword, fought the evil wizard Ganon and got ourselves teleported to the mysterious Dark World. All this, and we're only half way through...

Getting started on The Dark World You appear in The Dark World on

top of a strange tower, placed in the same spot as the castle of Hyrule once stood. Suddenly you receive a telepathic message from the Elder, telling you about the wizard's evil plan. After this, go to the eastern part of the map, where Dungeon 1 lies.

A new friend!

Along you way you will meet Kiki the monkey! Don't hesitate - pay him anything he asks for and he will open the dungeon for you!

Dungeon 1 When you first enter the dungeon, there are three doors to go through. Pick the left one. After going down the stairs, press the switch to make a chest appear. In the chest is a key – take it.

Now go through the right door, where there is a warp. Keep stepping on warps until you enter a room with a tile on the wall. Press this tile and Zelda tells you that she is being held at Turtle Rock. Step through the warp after pushing a block, and warp back.



This little blue guy is Kiki the monkey – he can easily be bribed into helping you



Now go through the middle door and through the next as well. Step on the ump plate and run on up the stairs and mp down, onto the middle platform. Knock the assorted creatures you find there off the edge with an arrow, and hit the ball with an arrow too. Run to the right and exit.

You'll find yourself in a room. Get rid of the set of skulls on the right, then push the top right statue onto the switch. Now quickly dash through and leave the room. You now face the reverse monsters! Shoot them with arrows and leave.

Run past the spike and hit the ball which will drop the wall, allowing you to pass. Where do you go next? Answers on a postcard to Super Play at the usual address. (No, I'm only joking!) What you should really do is shoot the

green statue in the eye with an arrow (nasty!). This will reveal a staircase.

Now you'll find that you're stuck, so run back up to the first floor, go to the middle platform, then push the lower block to the left and exit from the lower door. Then bomb the middle of the platform! No, I'm not totally crazy - just get on with it!

Jump down and jump down again, press the button, get the key and warp. Now go all the way back around again! This time don't jump but go through the door. Here lies the Big Key! Grab it, jump to the right and warp back to 1F. Now hit the ball with your arrows and go up back through the locked door. Phew!

Okay, now what you've got to do is run along the path and go right. Head down the right stair and get the key. Now go back up and go left twice. You should now be in a dark room. Head toward the far right of the room and blow up the wall with a bomb. Open the big chest and grab the Magic Hammer (yes, really). You can use this hammer to pound the pink things into the ground, so go all the way back down and whack those pinkies! Shoot the ball with an arrow while standing by the wall. Go left, head all the way round to get to the warp, then push the top right block down. Warp, and get yourself ready to fight the boss!

Crystal No.1

After the lizard boss you'll come across a merry little scene. You'll see a crystal - after grabbing it, the crystal increases in size, while a girl appears, thanks you and tells you where some other girls are being held captive. Venture onward to Dungeon 2.

Time for a quick

Dungeon 2 lies in the south of the map, and that's where you've got to go next. However, once you reach the Dungeon, do not enter at once. First, warp to the Light World, using the mirror, and release the water by pulling the left hand lever. Step into the mist to warp back and enter Dungeon 2.

Dungeon 2

As you can see, water fills the passageways of this dungeon. I hope you bought the flippers from the top right segment of the map in The Light World you'll be a bit stuck otherwise. Now climb up the broken ladder and head up. After killing the beasts, a chest will appear with a key in it. Open the door and head down to B1.

Straight away you'll see a secret passage on the left, down which lies a treasure chest which contains a map! Pick up all the pots and under one you'll find a key. Open the door in the bottom left of the room and exit.

In this next bit you'll be faced by a load of baddles. First kill them all, then head down the stairs and up into a room which contains a key. Go back and unlock the door. In this room is a secret passage, which contains a bomb and a rupee. There is also a lever. Push the lever from right to left and water will flood the passageway, enabling you to climb the broken ladder. Now you're in a room with the big chest in the middle. Head through the bottom exit.

Now walk all the way round clockwise, and push the bottom block left. This reveals a compass. Go back into the big chest room and through the bottom left exit. Run through this room and grab the key from the room above. Go back round to the big chest room and go through the top right exit. Hit the ball and push the switch. You can now swim over the unmovable blocks near the key.

After heading left, push the bottom block left and the middle block up. Head up the stairs to 1F. Here, if you fall down the top left hole, you will land next to a treasure chest containing a red rupee. If you fall down the top right hole, it leads to a passageway containing the Big Key! Now go get that chest!

Collect the Hook Shot!

The Hook Shot enables you to grab onto skulls (and various other things), this can be very handy for you to swing across awkward gaps.

Fire across to the right. In one of the skulls is a key which lets you open the door at the top of the room. In this room you want to push the statue onto the switch, then go through the first door on the right. Follow the passage round, then push the lever.

This drains all the water, and allows you to collect two treasure chests from the room below. In the room above, if you go through the stretch of water second from last on the right it leads to a staircase, taking you up a level.

Here you are very near to the end of this dungeon. There is a secret passage at the top of the next room which contain hearts, bombs and magics which will help you with the boss, so collect these. On the right is a key which will open the door to the boss.

Beating the end of Dungeon 2 boss

The boss is easy! Use the Hook Shot to grab his minions, then swipe at them to destroy them. After killing them you'll be able to attack the main body of the boss. When he's dead, grab the crystal and head for Dungeon 3!

Collecting the flut

Before warping back to The Light World, you may want to stop off at the grove near the town. Here a boy will give you a shovel. Warp back to the real world, and dig at the top left of the grove. You should now come across a flute. Play this at the statue in the middle of the town and a bird will appear which will take you anywhere you want!

Finding your way to **Dungeon 3**

To get to Dungeon 3 you must find the warp in the wood. It is under a stone near one of the entrances.

Dungeon 3 Right, you're almost in Dungeon 3. Shoot the worm coming out of the skull's mouth with the Fire Rod found in one of the other dungeon entrances in the wood. This will allow you to enter.

When you first go into the dungeon, you will need to go all the way round the passageway so you can collect the key. After getting the key, go through the locked door.



To get to the third dungeon, cross this river using the Hook Shot. Looks like it didn't work this time!

Now make your way slowly round the room being careful not to fall in any pits. To get out of this room you'll need to light all the torches with the Fire Rod, making sure none go out before you leave the room. To get out of the next room you'll need to hack at the vines at the top of the screen. The key you need to escape from this room is being held by the Mummy. Fall down the hole in the next room.

Defeating the Dungeon Boss

To kill off this boss you'll need to use the Fire Rod, and when that runs out, attack it with your sword. I found this boss very hard, so keep on trying!

Dungeon 4

Dungeon 4 is located in the town. 5 To enter the dungeon you need to pull the statue's pitchfork in the centre of the town.

Once inside, your best bet is to wander around a bit, collecting everything from the various chests dotted around B1. Then go through the



Find the statue in the centre of town, then pull its pitchfork to continue!

locked door using the BIG KEY. You should now be in a long corridor.

Grab the key from one of the skulls, and unlock the door on the bottom left. Now keep on going to the left until you reach the end of the corridor. Go up, collect a key, and open the locked door. Hit the switch on the bottom left and walk to the right. Place a bomb in front of the bar then pick it up and throw it over the bar so it blows a hole in the ground. (This allows light to shine through!) Now go all the way back down and through the door with the block in front of it, following the passage until you see some stairs. Go down them!

Now defeat all the enemies in the room (easy, eh?) and go left, turn down, then finally go right. Keep going right until you can see what looks like a prison. Simply walk into the locks to open them. BUT BE WARNED! The woman in the cell is not a woman she's really Blind the Thief, this level's boss character!

Now use the key in the cell to open the locked door which you saw on your way there. In there is the BIG CHEST! This contains the Titan's Mitt (yes, really) which enables you to carry heavy stones. Now go back up a level and enter the boss' room (you do have that compass, don't you?) where the cute, innocent, lovable little girl will mutate into evil villain Blind!

Defeating Blind the Thief

To defeat Blind, you must hit him in the head. He's really not too hard, so you should be able to finish him off pretty quickly! Now you've got to make your way to Dungeon 5.

Dungeon 5

Dungeon 5 is located in the bottom right half of the map. However, to enter it you must warp back to The Light World and pick up the dark stone in front of the Pool Of Happiness. Underneath the stone is a warp! Take it back to The Dark World and enter.

To pass the first room you need to



To get past this wall, teleport to the Light World, walk up, then warp back.

set fire to one of the ice monsters hidden on the wall - use the Fire Rod. One of the blue electricity creatures holds the key to the next room.

Press the switch to open the door in the next one after that. Then you'll need to push the middle block to the right to go down. If you defeat all the penguins (use the Hook Shot), a chest will appear containing the compass. Now push the block up to go to the right. Exit the room through the left door, pushing the block left so you can go up. In this room plant a bomb next to the ball, and run around the blocks quickly. Now bomb the centre of the room and drop through.

When the skeletons drop down, hit them with your sword and plant a bomb on the remains. After you have killed two skeletons the door will open. A blue creature holds the key to the next room - don't hit the crystal ball! Now go down the stairs, after passing through the next room, and kill the creatures with the Hook Shot. Make sure you watch out for the massive spiked ball in the next room, though!

Okay, go through the top door and fall through the hole, go through the door on the right, and use the Hook Shot to swing the gap. Go down and then up the stairs, use the

Hook Shot to swing across the spikes, then press the

switch and grab the key. Go up the stairs and destroy the skeletons with a bomb. Then hanmer the pink things and lift the block up, pulling the idol's tongue to open the door – the switch will reveal a chest. Go right and up the stairs. In that chest is the Big Key!

(Still with us?) Okay, now go all the way back to the spike room and through the door on the left. Keep on going left and down the stairs. Blow up the floor on the left and tall down. Grab the blue armour (great colour scheme!) from the big chest and go right. Now go through the locked door and down the stairs. Walk down and go right. Hit the ball and go back up to the door, which you needed the Big Key to open. Now move right – you'll find the switch to open the door under the top right skull. Go down, then left. Move up the stairs and through the door.

Right, from here you need to go back to the big chest so you can push the block in the next room down the hole. Now drop through yourself and push the block onto the switch. Go through the open door, pull the right statue away from the pink things and hammer them down. Underneath the big block is a hole. Drop down! (Honestly, this does all make sense if you're playing the game!)

Killing the Dungeon 5 Boss!

To defeat the boss you need to use the Fire Rod (very handy thing, that Fire Rod) to break it's shell. After that, hack at it with your sword! Now grab the crystal. Well done – you've only got three more to go!

Dungeon 6

Dungeon 6 is located in the Evil Swamp – this is in the same location as the desert in The Light World. To get there, use the bird to take you to the desert in The Light World, where you'll find a warp under one of the stones. To enter the dungeon you need to use the Ether Magic. (Which is to be found on top of Turtle Rock in The Light World.)

When you first enter the dungeon



Make sure you pick up some medicine Ut Life along the way! you'll need to Hook Shot across the hole. Kill the four wizards that appear to pass through the next room. That's all the help I'm going to give you on this level though – I think I've been more than generous with you so far, so let's see how you do trying to get through this dungeon by yourself, shall we? However, just to make sure you don't get *too* stuck, here are some handy hints to see you through...

• The big chest contains the Cane Of Somaria, a magical item which enables you to create blocks.

 The big key is in a chest located on
 B1. However, to get it you must fall from the room above.

• To make a certain passageway appear, four torches must first be lit. It's not as easy as that though – they're all in separate rooms!

• Create a block (using the Cane Of Somaria) to turn on the switch in one of the rooms on B2, but be quick about it!

 Always be on the lookout for a secret passageway on B2 – it's vitally important to complete the dungeon.

Getting the better of the Level 6 Boss!

This boss resembles, well, a sort of giant blob with eyes! What you have to do is kill all the little eyes first, and then attack the big one. You only need to finish it off with your sword, so it's not very difficult.!

Dungeon 7

So here you are, in the very last stages of the game, about to take on the evil Ganon (the big baddy from the game), and rescue (once again!) Princess Zelda. However, to do that, first you're going to have to get to Turtle Rock! (That's to be found at the top of the map.)

Before you set off, though, this is a good time to make sure you're completely ready for this final stage of the quest. First off, it's wise to buy two blue potions or (if you can't afford them) two green ones. They're essential to your quest. You'll also need the Quake Magic from the top right at the map in The Dark World.

To make the warp to Turtle Rock appear, you need to hit the stumps in this order: right, top and, finally, left. When you arrive at Turtle Rock, use the Quake Magic, and this will open up the Turtle Rock. Finally, make sure you pull the Turtle's left flipper for a good, healthy bonus!



Off to buy some potions to be ready for the final stage of your quest.

Inside Dungeon 7

Here are a few hints to get you through Dungeon 7:

 Cast blocks onto the question marks to make a massive block appear, which you can control!

• To open the door in the top right of 1F, you'll need to light some torches while riding the block!

• After going through that door, two chests, containing a map and a key, lie at the far end of the room.

Use the key to open the locked door in the first big room – you can get the key from the creature you'll find in that room (once you've killed him), of course. To get the key from the next room, stand away from the lowered wal). Now shoot the ball with an arrow, and then push the top block on the left to the right! Take the pipe on the bottom right and exit, take the right exit and then go out again.

Kill the bouncy creature and grab the key. Open the door and go through the pipe to the Big Key, then take the pipes all the way back round to where you started and take the left pipe. Kill the two bouncy creatures, go down and then left. Plant a bomb at the bottom of the room and go out.

Go to the right and enter. Place a block and grab the treasure from the chest. In there is a shield, which you can use to reflect the bolts fired by the eyes! Go up, through the locked door, take the pipe and enter the room. Blow up the passages on the right and top of the room and go through the right one. Inside is a pool. Throw your bow and arrows into it to receive the silver arrows! These will help you kill Ganon when you face him for the last time!

Beyond that, though, I'm not going to tell you what to do. (Ha ha ha!) Oh, all right then, one warning! Always try to keep the torches burning – you haven't got a hope of completing the game if you don't.

Anyway, after you defeat Ganon you'il receive the power of the Triforce! And that's about it – you've finally finished the game!

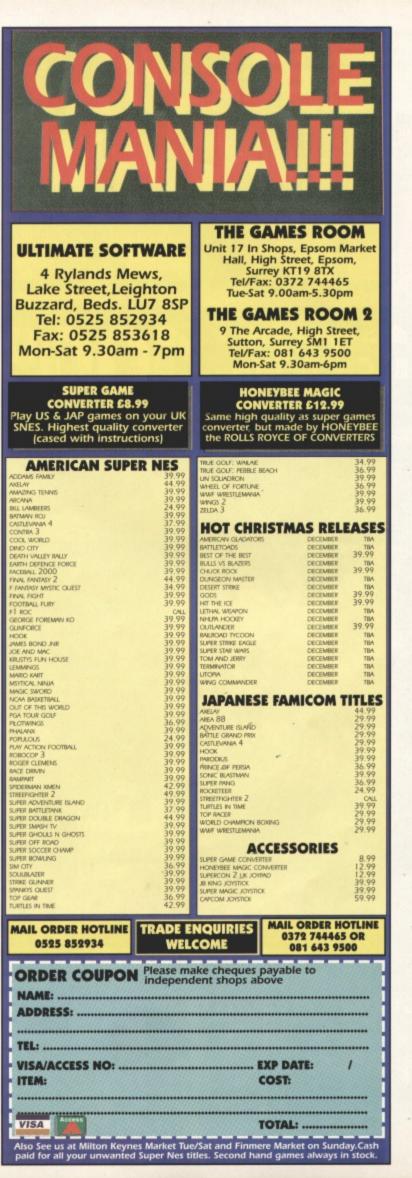

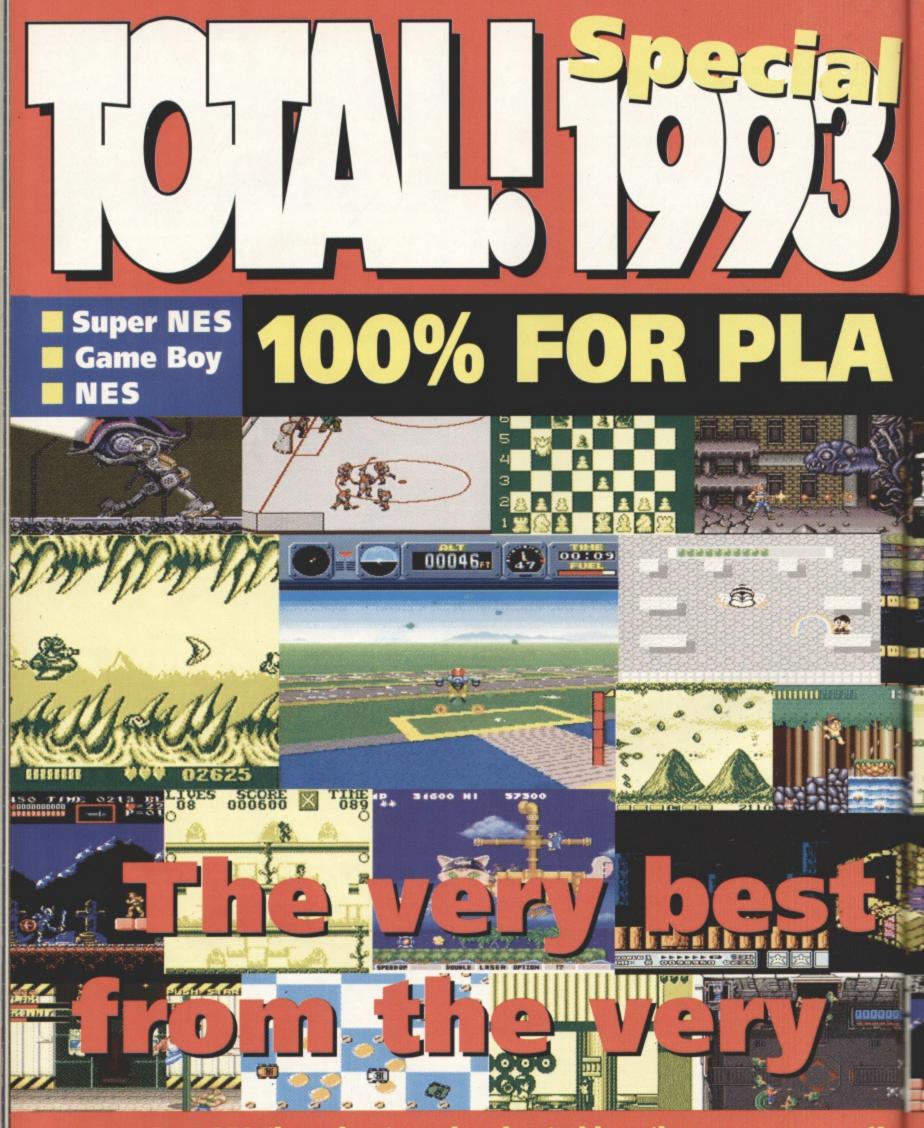

GAMEFREAK SNESTECH & GAMING ANSWERS

Rapidly getting more complicated than 'Techy's Anonymous' in *Everyday Electronics*, Gamefreak deals with the questions the man in Dixon's just didn't have answers for. Whether you're caught up in the great PAL and SCART fiasco, or simply want to know more about the SNES scene, Gamefreak's here to help.

Dear Super Play,

I'm writing to see if you can solve a problem that concerns my SCART television (21in). I own an imported Super Famicom (SCART), and when I play games on the TV I don't seem to get all of the background appearing (eg the face at the beginning of *Castlevania IV* only half appears.) I also get the borders associated with PAL Super NIntendos, but the speed expected of a SCART machine is retained.

I know that the fault does not lie with the Famicom, as on my friend's television (SCART) the borders disappear and the backdrops are clear. What causes my TV to do this, and what can be done to remedy it? **David Watts (15), Romford, Essex.**

Terry Snape from Macclesfield is having the same screen size problem, and while this isn't a common occurrance, it *is* true that some older TVs with SCART sockets only allow a narrow bordered PAL-type picture when used with a 60Hz imported SCART console. The display may not be full-screen, but the picture and sound *will* run at full speed – still better than on the UK machine. As for the backdrops on some of David's games disappearing – sounds strange to me (especially as I can't think of a face appearing at the beginning of *Castlevania IV*!). If anybody is experiencing a similar problem, let me know and I'll look into it.

Dear Super Play,

Before I start I have to say your magazine is excellent, real quality stuff and makes excellent reading. I especially enjoyed the Anime special and the story behind the launch of the SNES – well done everyone. I would be grateful if you could answer a few questions though: 1) Why do nearly all my games slow down? *R*-*Type* is the worst example but *Goeman Warrior* suffers, as does *Ghouls 'n' Ghosts*, and *Area 88* is pretty bad, too. Even *Contra* has problems at times. I might be sounding a little bit negative, but the whole thing is starting to get to me. Flicker is also a problem as *Smash TV* illustrates. Can the SNES have all 128 sprites on sceen at once without slow-down or flicker? I doubt it. What is sprite flicker?
 When will Irem learn to program the SNES properly? Look at *R-Type*!
 Will you include a problem page?
 Andrew Laggan, Cramlington, Northumberland.

1) That old chestnut eh? A combination of slow processing power and sloppy programming are the reasons behind slow-down. A really fast and busy shoot-'em-up without slow-down or flicker isn't impossible – look at *Super Aleste* for proof of that – but I can't envisage a day when all games will be this polished, especially with new programmers on the machine all the time.

The solution to this particular problem seems to lie with special cartridge coprocessors or digital signal processors (DSP's) that boost the sprite-handling capabilities of the SNES. As well as the Argonaut-developed Super FX chip, manufacturers like Seta have developed chips to improve their games - just as Nintendo did for the NES with its MMC chips in games like Super Mario 3. This is the direction in which things are heading. 2) Sprite flicker results when too many sprites appear on the same horizontal scan line on the screen. The Super NES can only handle 256 pixels of sprite data on one line before the graphics processor gets overloaded and switches off certain sprites. Unfortunately, a design flaw in the Super NES turns off the most significant sprites instead of the ones last added to the screen. Nintendo included a correction facility in the Super NES, but things aren't as user friendly as they could be. Again, DSP's could be the answer.

3) When these new chips solve all their problems, probably!
4) Yep, you're in it.

Dear Gamefreak,

I thought your complete guide to the Super NES was great but I still have a few questions: 1) Can the Japanese Super Famicom or US Super NES (SCART versions) be used on *any* British TV with a 21-pin SCART socket?

 Because of the voltage difference between the UK and US power supply, will a special power supply be needed to use a US SNES over here? 3) Is it true that adaptors can blow a fuse in your machine because two carts are used at once? Jason Wood, Warley, West Midlands.

1) No. Both machines output the same 60Hz signal, but a few problems have surfaced. While modern SCART TVs are designed to display a 50Hz PAL picture, they must be able to detect a 60Hz signal for a SCART machine to run on them. Sony and Philips TVs tend to be a safe bet, but many new models from manufacturers across the board are now incorporating this feature. If you want to find out if your TV can detect a 60Hz signal, check the manual first (if you can find it!), and if you're still not sure ring the manufacturer quoting the TV's model number (look on the back of the TV) and year of make, too, if possible. Remember - some modern TVs say 50Hz on the back, but also support a 60Hz picture.

If your TV has 60Hz technology built in then you can either run a SCART console through it. or a 60Hz PAL one that some companies specialise in. Advance Console Entertainment (ACE), (071) 383 0480, in London and DMC Consoles, (0225) 448253, in Bath convert UK machines to 60Hz (full-screen, full speed) for a charge of £50. They also deprotect the machine to allow Japanese and US carts to run without an adaptor (£30), and sell 60Hz PAL versions of the Super Famicom and US Super NES to order. 2) Importers of US machines currently attach the small purple plug from the US power supply (that comes with the SNES when you buy it in the States) to a standard 9/10 volt (around 1 amp) UK power supply. Unless you know what you're doing it's best to buy one of these modified power supplies from an importer give them the US plug in exchange and they might let you have it a bit cheaper (some importers can't get enough of these). 3) Adaptors encourage grey imports and so Nintendo (and its licencees) will probably tell you exactly that. While we've yet to hear directly from anybody damaging their machine by using an adaptor (apart from someone who reckoned he'd plugged a cart in back to front), if



you don't want to take the risk ACE in London,or Megacom in Nottingham, will deprotect your machine – see 1) above.

 Recently I was on holiday in the US and I saw SNES games for hire in some video stores. Why is this illegal in the UK? You can even hire the SNES itself over there.

2) When is Super Mario Kart due for its official UK release?

3) What exactly is the 'Super Magicom'?

 Why are games so dear over here? £50-£65 is just too steep.

5) Does Capcom plan to bring out the Champion Edition of *Street Fighter II* for the SNES? Christopher Fullerton (12), Paisley, Scotland.

1) The enormous NES market in the States demanded rental fairly early on – an example of the power of the customer there. The UK console market is relatively young by comparison and rental will take a lot longer to happen, if at all. Until then Nintendo will deflect the shots in order to maintain control over its sales and profits.

2) Some time in December. If you can't wait for it (and we understand if you can't) make sure you get one of the new adaptors that run the import version. (See Super Play issue 2.) 3) It's one of a variety of different pirating devices from Taiwan and Hong Kong that sits on top of the SNES and copies cartridges onto computer disks. Games can then be duplicated and played from disk. They are illegal, despite what some people may tell you, and like most forms of piracy have the potential to push cartridge prices even higher. Luckily the price of these gadgets (£200-£300) is high enough to prevent most people from buying them. Future carts may prove difficult to copy too, but there's no stopping the persistent pirate.

 We receive more letters about this than anything else and we sympathise totally. There is no real justification for games costing as much as they do in the UK. With the average cart in the States and Japan priced around £30-£35, and more expensive games like *Street Fighter II* only around a fiver more than that, why does the UK version cost £65?

Unfortunately the price of the import version in the UK has recently gone up about £10 across the board (to about £55) because of the exchange rate crisis, so at the time of writing there's *no* cheap option.

5) I wouldn't be surprised, but the standard version is *almost* like the Champion Edition so it wouldn't really be a worthy purchase for owners of the original. The 'Blackbelt Edition', now seen in some arcades, is one version you won't be seeing on cart – it's a rip-off arcade board from the Far East with some pretty fancy new moves built in! Needless to say, it's illegal!

Dear Super Play,

1) Our TV runs through our video but only the video has a SCART socket (Euro-connector). Could I run a US or Japanese SNES through that SCART socket?

2) If yes, would using the UK SCART plug that comes with the UK SNES make any difference to the picture quality?

I hope you are able to answer these questions and congratulations on the biggest and best SNES mag on the market. I loved the free badge. Ian Campbell, Paisley, Scotland.

Hmm, another Paisley reader. Friends by any chance? Anyway, to answer your questions:

1) The result is usually just a black-and-white picture I'm afraid. It *can* work with some videos, apparently, but don't splash out on the offchance it might.

 I doubt it, as the UK SCART plug gives a black-and-white picture with an imported SNES.
 A SCART lead for an imported machine doesn't work on a UK console either.



Dear Super Play, 1) When will the US SNES be available in the shops (not mail order), and how much will it be? Are US carts available in any shops to buy, or is it only through mail order? 3) If you play a UK game on a US or Jap SNES using an adaptor, do you still get the full-screen display? Is there a difference between a SCART TV, and a PAL TV with a SCART socket? I'm confused 5) In your review of Street Fighter II you said that the game had lost some of its arcade look because of screen borders. Is Street Fighter II better on a UK PAL machine or on an imported US or Jap SCART one? 6) Is the US SNES the best out of the three machines in terms of quality and price? Daniel Batt, Burgess Hill,

Dear Gamefreak,

 If I got a SCART US or Japanese SNES, and connected it to a British TV via the SCART socket, would I get a full speed, full screen picture with no borders?

2) Are there two versions of every game for the US SNES – one for the PAL machine and one for the SCART machine – or is there just one version which works on both PAL and SCART machines? Which ones do mail order companies sell? Michael Young, Buxton, Derbyshire.

1) Usually yes, but see both David Watts' and Jason Wood's letters above.

2) For the Super NES, each country's carts are available in one version only. Perhaps you're confused because imported US carts for the 8-bit NES used to be converted to PAL because no adaptors existed to get round the problem. While UK SNES carts are branded 'PAL version', they will work in any console with an adaptor, be it a Jap, US, PAL, or SCART machine. US and Japanese carts aren't made for the PAL system, but most of them work fine on it with an adaptor. Rest assured we'll let you know which carts are incompatible.

1) & 2) Many of the mail order companies advertising in *Super Play are* shops, and have been selling imported machines and games for ages. Some towns now have shops selling imported carts, but don't expect to find any in Dixons or Boots – stick to the small specialist computer or console shops to find them.

3) Yes – the machine determines the screen size, not the cart. (NB the odd game doesn't use a fullscreen image anyway, eg *Street Fighter II.*)

4) No – all UK TVs are PAL, irrespective of whether they have a SCART socket or not. All SCART consoles need is a SCART socket.

5) Street Fighter II suffers at the hands of a UK PAL machine more than most carts because the game already has borders when running on a full-screen imported Japanese or US console (the programmers needed to keep the speed up this way). Because the UK PAL console squashes the image, the display is especially narfow (and 17% slower too).

6) The US SNES (SCART) is selling large numbers over here because it is cheap and no adaptor is needed for Japanese games. It is currently the best buy if you have a SCART TV or a SCART monitor: The **Japanese Super Famicom** could soon be as cheap due to recent Japanese price cuts, but an adaptor is needed to run US games. It's worth bearing in mind that the first CD ROM system to appear late next year will probably be the Japanese one. If you intend to buy the Jap CD ROM it might be best to get a Japanese machine (Super Famicom) - the only one guaranteed to work with it.

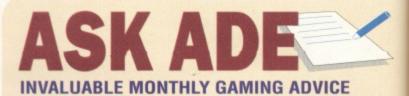

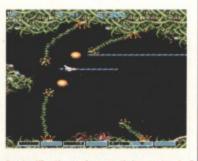

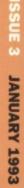

'COLD AND QUITE HOSTILE'

I recently saw an advert for the 'Super Magicom' and initially thought it was another console. I phoned one of your rival mags and asked them what it was. Frankly, I was surprised at the response. The magazine squad were cold and hostile, unlike the *Super Play* team who were friendly and informative, especially Jason who gave me advice about my Super Famicom and *Out* of this World. Thanks! After getting no help from the rival squad I found out from a friend that it was a cartridge copier and that they are perfectly legal. This fact sent me reeling with anger, as before I bought my console I owned an Amiga and left the market because it was dying due to piracy.

If piracy spreads to consoles they will probably die the same way, with game prices rising in price and dropping in quality. Your sincerely, Gary Jones, Harrogate.

I did a bit of checking up, and I don't think there's much to worry about for now. These cartridge copying devices most certainly aren't legal, and Bandai are clamping down on dealers that import them from the Far East. Even if the devices were freely available, they are complex, expensive pieces of hardware and would be unlikely to find a large market.

'EVEN A PHOTOCOPY'

I was very impressed with your first issue, and I hope future editions are of the same standard.

same standard. One of the major problems with the SNES is the shortage of UK releases. This is why I bought myself a convertor. My first two games were Hook and Super Ghouls 'n' Ghosts – the Japanese versions. It was only when I got home that I realised the manuals were in Japanese. Surely after paying £45 you'd think the importer or retailer would put an English manual inside. Even a photocopy would do. Instead you have to suffer hours of getting to grips with the game and not knowing if you have missed something important out on the playing side. Yours faithfully, Shaun Holden, Bolton.

Buying import games has both advantages like getting games ages before they come out over here - and disadvantages. Like you say, Japanese games have Japanese manuals. I'm afraid you're stuck with them - most importers don't know enough Japanese (and certainly don't have enough time) to translate the manual of every import game they get in for you. And there's no way an importer could get away with photocopying English manuals - such things don't usually exist for these games, for a start. The solution, if your Japanese isn't too hot, is to buy the American version of a cart whenever possible. Anyway, why do you want instructions for Hook and Super Ghouls 'n' Ghosts? Playing them is obvious...

'MY ONLY GRIPE'

First, I'm writing to congratulate you on the best Super Nintendo magazine on the market. I say that because your reviews are concise and to the point, and really helpful for a quick guide to what to buy. My only gripe is that you keep on printing maps. Maps are helpful, but if you're having a good time playing a game, and then you read the map showing you how to do a level or find a secret room, then it completely spoils the fun of the game. 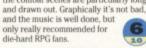

ARCANA (US) Alternative name: Card Master (JAP) HAL, 8 Mbit + BB

An RPG based around a 3D perspective (like Dungeon Master) sounds good, but t suffers from a very plodding pace the combat scenes are particularly long



ASTRAL BOUT (JAP) A-Wave, 8 Mbit or 2 players

A wrestling/fighting game, and not a very good one at that. Graphically not a complete disaster, but the sprite collision and playability are very ropy Fighters hobble around the screen like they've got stones in their shoes and, when you think you could buy Street Fighter II instead, what's the point?



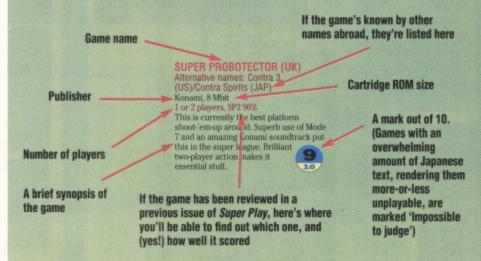
AUGUSTA MASTERS 3D GOLF

T&E Soft, 8 Mbit + BB 1 to 4 players The first 3D golf game on the Super Famicom, and still rather good despite Japanese text. Graphically, it's a mixture of bit-maps and polygons and it

works quite well. The screen update could be faster, though.

You wouldn't believe how easy What Cart? is to understand. Perhaps this diagram might go some way to convincing you, though:





AXELAY (JAP/US) Konami, 8 Mbit 1 player

Okay, so Axelay's a little thin gameplay-wise. But - ooh! - those graphics! They're quite possibly the most impressive ones ever! There are also some mind-boggling baddies, and the game alternates between horizontal and vertical scrolling. which is neat

BART'S NIGHTMARE (US) Acclaim, 8 Mbit 1 player, SP1 91%

The formula may not sound promising -lots of little sub-games rather than one big one - but this is absolutely superb, and very weird. Wonderful graphics and lots of humour, and it's challe

BATTLEBLAZE (JAP) Sammy Corp. 8 Mbit 1 or 2 players

An awkward game that's nowhere near as good as its contemporaries (in this case Street Fighter II and Ranma 1/2). Graphics are okay, the sound's okay, it plays okay and there's a reasonable range of moves, but you could do much better.

BATTLE GRAND PRIX (JAP) Naxat, 8 Mbit

1 or 2 players

Remember Super Sprint, the coin-op? Well, imagine a version of it (ie an overhead view driving game) where you can only see a tiny area of the track around your car, and have to rely on little signals to warn you of corners. We had a bit of trouble with this one. eventually coming to the conclusion that it's 'challenging'. Lots of babes in it, though.



BIG RUN (JAP) Jaleco, 8 Mbit 1 player

Alter a promising front end, and a couple of good tunes, the abysmal graphics and virtually non-existent gameplay make for what is surely the vorst driving game on the system. (Nothing like the original coin-op.)

BILL LAIMBEER'S COMBAT BASKETBALL (US)

Hudson Soft, 4 Mbit l or 2 players Originally an Amiga game called Future Basketball, this plodding speedball clone is a surprisingly poor release from Hudson Soft.

BLAZEON (JAP/US) Atlus, 8 Mbit player

A tacky horizontal scroller with anime style robots in. It's kinda different, but everything's so crude and jerky. That makes this game crap - there are so many better shoot-'em-ups to choose from

BOMBUZAL

Alternative name: Ka-Blooey (US) Kemco, 4 Mbit l player

You have to clear bombs from mazes of tiles by setting off chain reactions, without getting blown up yourself - the levels are well designed and take lots of skill to negotiate. But (sigh) the graphics are dreary, and, strangely, it's boring to play.



CAMELTRY (JAP)

Alternative name: On The Ball (US) Taito, 8 Mbit l player, SP1 52%

The idea of a rotating Mode 7 maze with

a ball bouncing around it is a good one, but Taito haven't got the most from it. The levels are too easy to complete, and once you've seen them all you won't return.



CB WARS (JAP) Banpresto, 8 Mbit

1 or 2 players A strange anime-scroll-along-and-wacknasties-with-whatever-you-can-find-type of game. RPG elements and lots of Japanese text render this a poor choice for most people Impossible to judge.

CHESSMASTER (US) Mindscape, 4 Mbit 1 or 2 players

If you're after a chess game you really don't have much choice. This plays a strong game (we, er, think), but there's room for improvement. It's really awfully presented, and the tunes after each move - ridiculous idea as it is - are more irritating than you'd belie possible. And check out that amazing menu!

DARIUS TWIN (JAP/US) Taito, 8 Mbit

1 or 2 players Lacking in levels for a Darius game – but this isn't all bad news. Good graphics, reasonable sound and not too much slow-down for an early title make it a reasonable buy, though it's not challenging enough in the first few levels.

D FORCE (JAP/US) Asmik, 8 Mbit

1 player An absolutely appalling shoot-'em-up with maybe the worst graphics, sound and playability on the SNES. Subtle use of Mode 7 gives the useless visuals a



'lovely' blocky appearance - not one to show off to your friends. Dreadful sound, too. Leave well alone!

DINOSAURS (JAP) Alternative name: Dino City (US) Irem, 8 Mbit

1 player, SP1 83% One of Super Play's very favourite platform games ever, this has brilliant graphics, cute characters and plenty of amusing moments. The snag it's miles too easy to finish. But we love it all the same.



DIRTY CHALLENGER (JAP) 8 Mbit

1 or 2 players Yet another dire wrestling game. This time it includes some very dubious 'grapples' – you could be mistaken for thinking it was all a bit, well, dirty.

DRAGON BALL Z (JAP) Bandai, 8 Mbit + BB

The original Japanese Dragon Ball anime series has appeared on the 8-bit Famicom (NES), but this new version is the first available for the Super Famicom. Basically, an RPG with combat scenes and enough Japanes text to scare away the most persistent gamer. Extremely 8-bit in look too. Impossible to judge.

DRAGON'S LAIR (UK) Elite, 4 Mbit 1 player, SP1 82%

This looks gorgeous, plays well and is far better than the straight conversion of the coin-op that other machines have suffered. But the frustrating difficulty level hides a game not as lengthy as it might have been.



DRAKKHEN (JAP/US) Kemco, 8 Mbit + BB 1 player

Based on a French 16-bit computer RPG/adventure, this has reasonable graphics but an awful combat system. Most people will find this a real bore even avid RPG fans - but if you are tempted, make sure you get the US version (obviously!).

EARTHLIGHT (JAP) Hudson Soft, 8 Mbit + BB

l player Based on a popular PC Engine game called *Nectaris*, this is an interplanetary space strategy affair, but there's enough Japanese in here to make it pretty tricky to work out. Avoid. Impossible to judge.

EXTRA INNINGS (JAP/US)

Alternative name: Ganba League Baseball (JAP) Sony Imagesoft, 8 Mbit + BB

1 or 2 players Baseball's tricky to translate well to a games machine, but this probably makes the best job of it, with cute characters and slick action. If you really must have a baseball game, then go for this one.

F-1 EXHAUST HEAT (JAP) Alternative names: F1 ROC (US), Exhaust Heat (UK) Ocean/Seta, 8 Mbit + BB 1 player, SP2 69% Your car looks a bit small. And you don't get much warning of corners coming up, so unless you keep one eye on the map, you'll keep crashing. But at least you get a proper 3D view of the track. Hardly a favourite, but some people love it to bits.

FINAL FANTASY II (US) Alternative name: Final Fantasy IV

JAP) Square, 8 Mbit + BB l player

A strange one this, as in Japan it's the fourth in a very popular series. This is the first version to make it to the SNES, and while it's graphically basic, the lovely music and the involving nature of the quest lifts it way above lesser RPGs.

FINAL FIGHT (JAP/US/UK) Capcom, 8 Mbit 1 player, SP1 86%

The best walking-along-beating-people-up game on the Super Nintendo. On the plus side are its brilliant graphics, varied opposition and devastating moves. On the minus side? It lacks a two-player mode, and therefore tends to get a little dull in the long-term



FINAL FIGHT GUY (JAP) Capcom, 8 Mbit

1 player A pointless new version where the best character, Cody, gets the chop, and Guy replaces him. A poor game-music CD is included. The game is slightly easier than the original.

FIRE DODGEBALL (JAP) Sunsoft, 8 Mbit

or 2 players A cute, anime version of a very weird game (see SD Dodgeball for details). The graphics are pretty good, but the game itself is a bit too simple to be particularly rewarding. The lengthy intro sequences before each game don't help, either.

F-ZERO (JAP/US/UK) Nintendo, 4 Mbit + BB 1 player, SP1 86%

The definitive Mode 7 racing game. Dead fast and dead smooth. And dead deadly too, if you don't watch out for the vicious computer-controlled hover cars. Bland scenery and an unlikely futuristic setting are unfortunate, but it's both a decent game and an impressive demonstration of just what the SNES can do.



GEORGE FOREMAN'S KO BOXING (US) Acclaim, 8 Mbit 1 or 2 players, SP2 18%

Boxing games are invariably awful - but this awful?

GOLDEN FIGHTER (JAP) Culture Brain, 12 Mbit

1 or 2 players, SP1 42% A very ropy Street Fighter II 'tribute'. The graphics are rubbish, the gameplay's rubbish, the sound's rubbish... This is one to avoid if you can possibly help it.

GPX CYBER FORMULA (JAP) Alternative name: Cyberspin (US) Takara, 8 Mbit l player Another top-view scroller, and another case of yikes-was-that-a-corner? But this

time, for a change, we've got anime characters racing in anime cars. And really smooth scrolling. Other than that - average



GRADIUS III (JAP/US)

1 player

Konami, 4 Mbit Similar to the coin-op and – astonishingly – all packed onto a 4 meg cart, this is one to check out. It's an early title, so slow-down is a problem it rather scuppers the otherwise beautiful graphics and powerful sound. Still, it's more impressive and playable than Super R-Type.

GUNDAM F-91 (JAP) Bandai, 8 Mbit + BB

l player A huge selling (in Japan) arcade/ strategy game, with Japanese text. Still playable if you are willing to persevere, but this is essentially one for real robot fans only.

HAT TRICK HERO (JAP) Alternative name: Super Soccer Champ (US) Taito, 4 Mbit 1 or 2 players A slick conversion of the coin-op Football Champ. It's incredibly fast, but

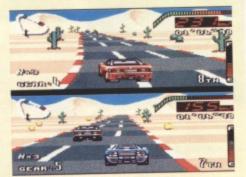

Very average JOE AND MAC (JAP/US/UK) Data East/Elite, 8 Mbit

HON. SHEET 722 A good conversion of the original arcade machine, with a few bits missing, and a few more tagged on. Graphically it's nice and colourful, but the tunes don't vary and the gameplay becomes very repetitive far too soon. Not much of challenge here, but younger players should enjoy it.

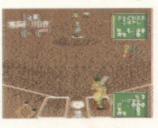

This one's been a huge hit on every format it's been released on. It takes a while to get to grips with, true, but Lemmings is one of the most original, ingenious and downright addictive games ever. Each level has a password, and there are loads of them (more than, lor example, the Amiga version). A bit of a Super Play favourite, so you've really got to buy this.

MAGICAL GUY ADVENTURE

Bandai, 4 Mbit

jolly little platform game that combines wacky Japanese humour with cutsy sprites and backdrops. Hardly in the class of Super Mario World but moderately entertaining nevertheless.



MAGIC SWORD (JAP/US) Capcom, 8 Mbit

Capcom's first disappointing release, though not so surprising when you consider how bad the original arcade game was. Instead of giving the conversion the UN Squadron treatment and improving the gameplay for the SNES version, the programmers have simply translated the original. And they haven't even done that very well - this is a bodge job on the whole, with mixed quality graphics and terrible slow-down.



MARIO PAINT (JAP/US) Nintendo, 8 Mbit + BB

A painting and music package that's really only for youngsters. It's very basic (only 16 colours? On a system with thousands?) and once you've drawn something, what do you do with it? It's free with the Nintendo mouse - but wait until that's on sale separately.

METAL JACKET (JAP) Atlus, 8 Mbit

A horrible experience. Atlus aren't doing themselves any favours attempting a platform game - a genre where you have to be really good to stand out. This is an E-SWAT clone with stilted animation, dire sound and inept gameplay.

MUSYA (JAP) Datam, 8 Mbit

One of the worst Super Famicom games ever - though it's up against stiff competition. Initially, the nicely shaded backdrops give it the look of a Ninja Spirit clone, but when you see

NOLAN RYAN'S BASEBALL (US) Romstar, 4 Mbit

Just as slick as Extra Innings, but without the cute characters, and it's slightly trickier to control. Still, not a bad game overall.

OTHELLO WORLD (JAP) Tsukuda, 8 Mbit

Plays a strong game of Othello (if you set it to 'difficult'), looks good, and has some cute touches. But why would anyone want to spend \$40 on a cartridge that plays Othello? Fine for brushing up your technique, but otherwise very sad indeed.

The graphics on this one are absolutely superb - playing it is just like watching a film. The action is varled, and there are

PARODIUS (JAP) Konami, 8 Mbit

An absolutely brilliant conversion of the coin-op, and one that easily ranks as the best of Konami's recent string of classics for the SNES. Superbly colourful sprites, a hilarious sense of the bizarre, and some excellent musical compositions are just the icing on the cake. Hugely enjoyable (though a little easy to finish).

PEBBLE BEACH GOLF LINKS T&E Soft, 8 Mbit + BB

The third addition to the 3D golf series and unsurprisingly very similar to the others. Accurate down to the waves on the beach, but the porn movie music is laughable.



PGA TOUR GOLF (JAP/US) Electronic Arts, 4 Mbit

Slick presentation (so-called experts talking you through the holes, etc), but it masks the fact that this is a fairly poor SNES conversion of an otherwise excellent sports game. On other systems PGA Tour is the golf sim, but here EA's lack of SNES expertise scuppers things. Still, you could do worse.



PHALLANX (JAP/US) Kernco, 8 Mbit er SH1 700

Horizontally scrolling shoot-'em-ups are two a penny on the Super Nintendo, and a new contender really has to do something different to stand out. This one has some decent graphics and challenging gameplay, but at the end of the day is pretty forgettable

PILOTWINGS (JAP/US/UK) Nintendo, 4 Mbit

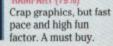

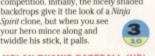

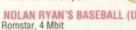

Final Fight's main rival. Not as 'together' as its opponent - more repetitive baddies and rougher animation are the main qualms - but it has the enormous advantage of simultaneous two-player

KUNIO KEN (JAP) Technos, 8 Mbit ll on 2m

An odd mix of beat-'em-up and adventure game. 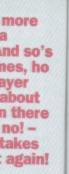

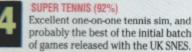

SONIC BLAST MAN (JAP) Taito, 8 Mbit

A scrolling beat-'em-up with a niftier central character than most - he's a superhero with a deadly line in punches. It's a beat-'em-up nonetheless, though, and consequently gets pretty dull.



SOUL BLAZER (US) Alternativer title: Saul Blader (JAP) Enix, 8 Mbit + BB

Slick, graphically gorgeous and not entirely unlike Zelda (ie an RPG, Japanese-style). Avoid Sour Blader, the Japanese version (unless you're Japanese).

SPACE FOOTBALL (US) Alternative name: Suger Linearball Uni Triffix, 4 Mbit

If you've played Ballblazer on the Commodore 64 before, that's probably the closest to this - football, played between two 'things' on a fast, 3D scrolling pitch. It's an idea that provides lots of thrills in the short-term, but it isn't really enough to justify splashing out this much loot on this game

a conversion of the PC Engine CD ROM game, featuring the exploits of lots of Japanese girly characters but absolutely no excitement. It's just far too contrived, boring and linear to bother with.

SUPER WAGAN ISLAND (JAP) Namcot, 8 Mbit 1 player

Funny, with cute graphics and likeable characters, this is a semi-arcade, semitext-based adventure for the younger player - we got a fair way into it without understanding what was going on. (It's all in Japanese!) Impossible to judge.



SUPER WWF (JAP/US/UK) Acclaim, 8 Mbit 1 or 2 players, SP1 74%

TURTLES IV: TURTLES IN TIME (JAP/US/UK) Konami, 8 Mbit

The Turtles themselves might long since have handed over their cult status to whatever the current craze is, but that doesn't alter the fact that this is a very good beat-'em-up. Brilliantly designed pseudo-conversion of the coin-op, and still one of the best games on the machine. Although it slows down in places, the action is still exciting. Sonically average, but graphically superb, and a Super Play favourite, 9



WAIALAE COUNTRY CLUB (JAP/US)

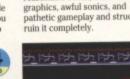

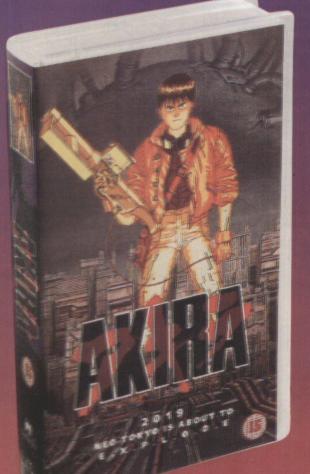

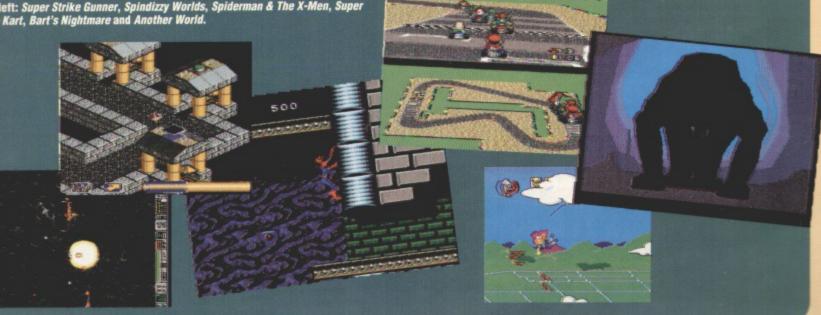

CARTOGRAPHY

If you find any jargon in *Super Play*, Here's the place to look it up.

Adaptor: These come in various forms, but their basic job is to let software from one country run on a SNES from another. (See 'grey import'.)

Battery back-up (BB): Switch off a normal cart and all your hard work will disappear. Switch off one with battery back-up, however, and it'll keep all your high-scores and saved positions tucked away.

Bit: A one or a zero. Stick lots of these together in the right order and you've got a game. There are about 8 million in the average cart.

CD-ROM: A method for storing huge games on compact discs rather than cartridges. The Super NES CD-ROM drive is due to appear next year.

CPU: Central Processing Unit, the chip at the heart of any computer. In the Super NES it's a 65sc816 running at 3.58 MHz, and it's in charge of all the graphics and sound chips that make your console so fab.

DSP: Digital signal processor. An extra chip included in a cartridge to provide improved 3D graphics.

Grey import: Nintendo don't release games in the UK until months after Japan and the US. If you want them sooner, you'll have to find a grey import version. See the mail order ads in this issue, but remember, to use an import cart on a UK machine you'll need an adaptor that costs £15-£20. (See Supermarket on p97.)

Mbit: Or Megabit. A million bits.

Megabyte: 8 megabits – the average cart size.

Mega Drive: (Get outa town! - Ed.)

Mode 7: A unique SNES feature: 3D screen scaling and rotation.

NES: Nintendo Entertainment System. The earlier, cruder console that came before the Super Nintendo. NTSC: The Japanese and US TV system. NTSC TVs are less flickery, running at 60Hz, but also less detailed, than UK ones, while NTSC machines run faster than PAL ones, and also use the full screen for the game image, without borders.

PAL: The 50Hz TV system used in the UK. Unless you've got an import machine, your SNES will use PAL, and plug straight into your TV's aerial socket. A foreign one won't, so make sure you've got a SCART TV.

PAL booster: Plugs into a Japanese or US SNES and allows the machine to be plugged into the aerial socket of an ordinary telly.

Parallax scrolling: The process where different parts of the background move at different speeds, giving the impression of depth.

RPG: Role Playing Game. One of those weird games with wizards, orcs and action points in. Occasionally called an FRP (Fantasy Role Playing game).

SCART: Posh TVs often have a SCART socket which cuts out much of the irrelevant electronics that deal with TV programmes. If your TV's got one, plug your SNES into it for a better picture. (If you've got an import machine, you'll have to plug it into the SCART socket.)

Scrolling: The process where the background moves across the screen, kind of like a movie camera panning.

SMES: Super Nintendo Entertainment System, aka Super Nintendo.

Super Scope: The bazooka-shaped light gun for the SNES, which can now be bought with it.

Sprite: Anything that moves around on the screen. Mario is a sprite.

Super Famicom: The Japanese name for the Super Nintendo.

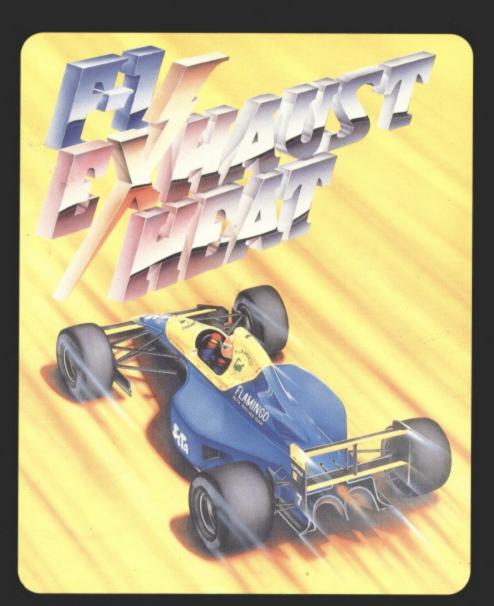
