





GAME PRICES GOOD NEWS AND BADE

When will our suffering end?

et's start with the good news. Nintendo (bless 'em) have decided to set a standard game price of £39.99, which they plan to apply to as many of the games they publish as possible from now on. Their list of up-coming releases includes: Bubsy, Nigel Mansell's World Championship, The Lost Vikings, Battletoads, Mystic Quest, and Vegas Stakes — all due out in October — and Yoshi's Safari, out in November, all of which will cost — yes! — £39.99. The only exceptions to this rule will be Capcom's Goof Troop and Super Mario All Stars (due on 24 September), which will both be priced at £49.99, and Street Fighter II Turbo, for which no price has yet been fixed. Hurrah!

What about the bad news? Well, although Nintendo have been buying the rights to publish all sorts of games recently, the majority of the games you buy in the UK are released by third-party publishers – people like Ocean, Konami and Mindscape. And for their games there's no price drop on the horizon.

The frustrated publishers say it's not their fault, citing the inflated prices charged by Nintendo's Japanese wing for manufacturing carts (all carts, if you remember, tend to be manufactured in Japan, as it's not economic for publishers to do it themselves), along with the poor performance of the pound against the yen (which makes the carts even more expensive still). In fact, many are finding that the only way of getting games onto the market at reasonable prices is to hand over the rights to Nintendo and simply let them get on with it.



erhaps the best outcome of all this is that Street Fighter II Turbo won't be going for anything like the £65 Bandai charged for the original game. A definite price hasn't been set yet, but if Nintendo can sell the 16 Mbit Super Mario All Stars for under £50, we reckon they ought to be able to sort you out with 20 Mbits of Turbo for about the same. The release date's been put back to November, though, unfortunately.

In Japan, meanwhile, where Turbo's on sale already, thousands of people queued outside the country's games shops on 10 July - loads of people braved the rain to get the game the split second it came out. Maybe Capcom's

lavish TV ad had something to do with it...

ore good news (for those who haven't yet bought a Super Nintendo at least): a Super Mario All Stars pack has been announced, containing the game and a SNES. It'll go on sale in October, priced £129.99, alongside the existing Starfox pack. Given that we gave Mario All Stars 96% in issue 11, our joint highest score ever in the world, this seems like a bargain. Meanwhile, the Super Mario

World, Street Fighter II and Super Scope packs are being phased out.





What Super NES Games Secrets Greatest Tips (or SNESGSGT) basically is, is a compilation of every scrap of gaming knowledge the GamePro team possesses tips for something like 100 games.

We are talking tips, here, though, and not solutions. Most tips books featured previously in this column have gone into great detail over games like Zelda and Super Mario World; SNESGSGT, on the other hand, sticks to little

tips and cheats, like how to get 99 lives in the Forest of Illusion 4 on the latter. It's basically like Mode 7, only a lot bigger. (And not as brilliant, obviously. And it only has tips for games that've come out in America. And they're all for the US versions, although they mostly apply to UK games as well.)

And that's about it. All the tips work. They're well laid out, and illustrated with lots of pictures. The only thing I didn't understand was the choices of little icon used to decorate each entry. A hexagon for Super Bases Loaded? A molecule for Space Football? Somebody crossing a road for Paperboy 2? What's going on? 





Logipad

The Phantom joystick, however, is a different sort of beast altogether. Obviously, its sticklike properties make it a

Inside, there are more of those cheeky closed micro-switches. The stick is eight-directional, and you get six fire buttons. There is also an autofire speed control, a slow motion switch and an overgenerous 8 feet of cable.



SUPERPLAY KELLY SUMNER, Gametek eW

Though you may have only heard about it recently, the Gametek label was actually one of the very first third party licensees, formed in 1987. In the States,

Kelly Sumner believes that Gametek is about to be one of the most important Nintendo publishers in the world.

GAMETEK IS AN OLD NAME WITH A NEW ATTITUDE -AND A **PHENOMENAL GROWTH RATE. BUT WHY? WE SPOKE TO UK** DIRECTOR **KELLY SUMNER** TO FIND OUT

Your first SNES release will be American Gladiators. Why? Isn't it a bit of a stinker?

Yes, that was announced, but now A we've decided that's not going to be our first release. It was very much a product of the old Gametek - American Gladiators was commissioned and developed before myself and other new members of staff joined, and we've since decided that the game is not of suitable quality for the European market.

It's certainly not the sort of product that you'll be seeing from us in the future.

O So when does the 'new' Gametek come into play?

A The first product that we release in '94 will be Pinball Dreams, and that will be a true indication of what is to come. It's already been a huge hit on the Amiga, and it's simply the best pinball game ever created. (Amiga reviews actually bear this out - it's number 54 in Amiga Power's All-time Top 100 Games -Ed.) Indeed, I believe it's even more suited to the SNES than it was to the Amiga.

O So is cherry picking from home computer hits a tactic you're keen to pursue?

A Oh, absolutely. A lot of excellent creative ideas first see the light of day on machines like the Amiga. Take another game we've signed up - Nick Faldo's Golf - which, again, has a tremendous pedigree on the Amiga.

It's obviously endorsed by the number one golfer in the world, but it's also a very realistic game. It's not just a question of getting the direction right and giving it a whack. You have to take account of the wind, address the ball correctly, get it all just right. I think if anyone's interested in golf, this is the game for them.

We're also signing up Alien Breed, a

Actually, we're looking at a total of over 20.

20! That's more than most publishers Q 20! That's more than most particular manage in three years. Don't Mintendo stipulate how many games you can release?

Yes they do. Like most leading Apublishers, we were given six slots per year, but that has already been increased to 10. On top of that we also want to sign on affiliate labels, ie pick some of the best publishers in the world that don't have European offices and bring their product to market for them.

So how do you see yourselves fitting in to the Current crop of SNES publishers – the Acciaims, Oceans, and Konamis of this world?

A If we get our quality right, then with just our own games we're going to be major league, but with the affiliates also, I'd say we must be in line to be one of the top three SNES publishers in the world.

And how will you ensure you get the quality right?

A By being on top of the creative process at every stage. Before we just used to let it happen. Now we either next Spring... that'll have develop in-house, or oversee third parties and we highly incentivise our

> teams, so that if their games are given a high mark by Nintendo's evaluation team, they earn much more money.

As someone with a hardware background, how do you see the SNES' future mapping out - particularly with reference to CD?

I reckon Nintendo are playing a A waiting game. I think they'll come up with something spectacular, but they're in no hurry because there's nothing in the market at the moment to worry them.

Do you think they'll come in with a drive for the SNES or a stand-alone machine?

It should be a 32-bit CD playing stand-A alone. (As, indeed, we now believe to be the case - Ed.) That would put the cat amongst the pigeons.

Square Soft • 16 Mbit • Out now

Not only is it produced by Square, the people behind` the Final Fantasy series (anything by them sells like hot cakes in Japan), but the game lets three people play simultaneously with a Super Multitap, each player controlling a different character. ention fantasy role-playing games to the average Western player and their immediate thought would probably be something along the lines of Bards Tale, Ultima or Dungeon Master - basically maze games where you get to make use of that graph paper left aside from your maths homework to map out the locations. Alternatively, RPGs are associated with raving students locked in a room at lunch time, huddled around a board and throwing strangely shaped dice. It's no surprise that RPGs haven't exactly taken off in this country, and publishers haven't been falling over themselves to get them into the shops. The Americans have been more enthusiastic, however - Square Soft's Final Fantasy II spent several months in the US top 10. (And, as UK publishers are beginning to realise. once a game's been translated into English for the US market, bringing it to these shores is a mere formality.)

It's Japan where RPGs are big business, though, especially on the Super Famicom. And in the last few years, the nature of Japanese RPGs has changed significantly. We explained the basics in our special Realms Of Fantasy feature in SP7, so now we'll explain the three different brackets into which Japanese RPGs are beginning to fall these days. Depending on your tastes, you'll probably find you prefer one sort over the rest...

THE TRADITIONAL RPG

These usually involve guiding small characters around a giant map, travelling through towns and cities, talking to people, buying useful equipment, and being attacked by monsters out of the blue, as well as taking on evil bosses. Traditional RPGs are the most common sort on video game systems (as opposed to computers), and include the top selling Dragon Quest and Final Fantasy series. The style hasn't changed much since the first of these series appeared years ago, but they still sell millions, so the formula must work.

THE ACTION RPG (A-RPG)

This sort's more popular with arcade players, as you get to control the game's hero fully. Here, the graphics are much more polished, and, instead of mucking about with probabilities and hit points, you can get down to earth and fight it out with the bad guys, so skill and reactions are more likely to win a battle than strategy or luck. These games also provide more puzzles to solve. Examples of action RPGs would be the highly successful Zelda and Y's series. Who hasn't played these?

AND THE STRATEGY RPG (S-RPG)

These are relatively new on the Super Famicom, combining strategy wargaming and role playing game elements. Although strategy games aren't that popular in the UK, they are as big as RPGs in Japan. In fact, the Japanese computer game top 10s generally consist of half strategy games and half RPGs. Two of this sort of game have recently appeared on the Super Famicom: Ogre Battle and Albert Odyssey. Although both are S-RPGs, they're each very different.

Ogre Battle is more of a strategy wargame, very much like Bullfrog's Powermonger, with RPG battle sequences. As with all wargames, you have to conquer each of the opponent's strongholds on a giant map. It's great fun, and has had us playing solidly for a couple of weeks, although anyone considering buying it when it's converted to English, should be warned that a single game can take between two to three hours to complete... or lose! And you can only save when a game's been completed!

Albert Odyssey is the opposite of Ogre Battle, being a traditional RPG with strategy wargaming-style movement and battles, although it's played in a neat 3D perspective. To move around, you and the computer take turns', with the usual wargame hexagons appearing on the landscape, and, depending on the character you control, you can only move a certain number of steps. The game itself isn't too hard, and probably best suited to beginners, although we rather enjoyed it.

Right, that's the three sorts of RPG explained. Although, thinking about it, there's actually another sort - the 3D maze-style RPG that gives you a first-person perspective on the action. In Japan, these are very scarce. In fact, the only one we've ever seen (apart from the Japanese version of Dungeon Master) is probably Wizardry by Ascii

- Silva Saga II by Seta is the sequel to one of the first Super Famicom RPGs - one that was pretty good but again never translated.
- · Torneco's Great Adventure, due in September from Chun Soft, is a fairly ordinary-looking 12 Mbit number with the distinction of a plump, grey-haired (or, more accurately, blue-haired) hero who wanders around in his nightgown.
- * T&E Soft's Sword World won't impress Japanese artwork fans - the adverts carry photographs of odd-looking people dressed in funny clothes. But the in-game graphics look pretty nifty, and the game's heavily based on statistics, which'll be good news if you, er, like statistics. And there are lots of swords in it, obviously, as our pictures reveal.
- Or, continuing the sword theme, there's Soul And Sword from Zamuse, which is coming out towards the end of the year. It's a pretty traditional Final Fantasy-style affair, with wandering about bits and stats-orientated battles, and features a nice picture of a ship in the intro sequence.

And, of course, there are lots, lots more where those came from (ie, Japan).

THE SHAPE OF THINGS TO COME

Although the RPG's evolution has generally been steady, rather than dramatic, one of the major breakthroughs was a Mega Drive game called Land Stalker, produced by Sega. This huge A-RPG is played in 3D isometric perspective - it's similar to Solstice II, but with a full complement of RPG elements. Already a number of games have appeared on the Super Famicom with isometric views during battle sequences (Breath Of Fire and Ogre Battle, for example), so it's likely that before long someone will produce a full action role playing game using this perspective all the way through.

And now that the two original Dragon Quest games have been updated for the SNES and packed into one cart, it seems likely that Nintendo will do something similar with the first two Zelda games, especially in the light of the Super Mario Collection. As the games were released on disk format in Japan (requiring a separate Nintendo disk drive), not many people actually played them. Keep your eyes peeled!

The other eagerly awaited announcement will be of the first RPG to use the Super FX chip. After the launch of Starfox, Nintendo announced that they had at least two more games planned for the chip. One is a driving game - FX Trax, which we've already seen - and the other, it was hinted, may well be an RPG. Quite how you get 3D polygons whizzing about in 3D, though, Nintendo weren't saying. Unless they did the

statistics in 3D, but that might make them rather harder to read. Especially if they kept spinning round.

THE BEST GAMES TO TRY

If you're new to RPGs, the best place to start would be Zelda. No doubt about it. Being an action-based game it's easy to get into, and it'll give you a good idea of what to expect later from more complex games.

More adventurous players, who want to tackle a proper Japanese-style RPG, should go for Final Fantasy II. (The American translation of Final Fantasy IV. Don't buy the Japanese version unless you're completely mad. Or Japanese.) Although the graphics aren't exactly stunning, the game's extremely playable and there's masses to it. Less brave players should check out the slightly easier and rather shorter Mystic Quest instead - it's due for a UK release in October anyway.

And for the avid RPG fan who wants a real challenge, as we said before, Breath Of Fire is a must. Although you can only get the Japanese version at moment, it's perfectly playable as long as you keep your mind on the job which won't be hard, as it's great. Ranma

BUT HOW ABOUT US?

It's all very well for these Japanese. But what do you do if you want to play an RPG here in the UK?

Well, up until now you've had four choices:

1) Seek out one of the limited selection of games available on American import – Final Fantasy II or something like that,

2) Take a crash course in Japanese and a very deep breath, and try one of the millions of Japanese import games, or 3) & 4) Play either The Legend Of Zelda or Drakkhen. (See below.)

THE LEGEND OF ZELDA

(Nintendo)
An absolutely brilliant game – you can't go wrong with it. In fact, after Super Mario World, it's probably the most played Super Nintendo game in the land. That's the power of RPGs. Don't mess with it. Zelda is very much an Action RPG, though – Link wanders around hacking people up, talking to other people and getting mysterious objects from others, and that sort of thing – so you shouldn't expect much in the way of hit points and attack phases. 93%

DRAKKHEN

This is a French RPG. Of course, we at Super Play know that this doesn't have to mean that it'll be weird. But Drakkhen does, however, go off at a bit of a tangent. First there are the graphics, which scroll around smoothly in 3D. (Except when you go into buildings, whereupon they switch to some attractively-drawn stills). And then there's the plot, which is sort of Scandinavian. But there's too much wandering around getting lost with nothing much going on for Drakkhen to really grip the imagination.

And that's about it for English-language RPGs. Except! Turn the page and you'll find reviews of Lagoon, a translation of a well-known Japanese RPG, and Dungeon Master, a conversion of a classic Amiga/PC game. And! A little further on in this issue are previews of even more RPGs, all of which are coming out in the UK. It's going to be all right after all!





GOOD, BAD OR UGLY?



You're the type of person who knows your way around the Dark World of Zelda better than you know, say, the

bedroom, or where you keep the biscuit tin. It's just precisely your 'bag' to sit back with your Super Nintendo, and enter a dark and brooding land of fantasy, peopled with strange, ethereal entities and delightfully mystical hermit-types—all shape-shifting, spell-casting, and novowels-in-their-name-having. You really enjoy the thrill and challenge of torturously hacking 'hit points' from ogres and, oh, I don't know, goblins. Perhaps. You're ecstatic in the belief that, in some way, it may well be possible to project your identity onto a small, anime-type sprite waddling around a multi-scrolling playfield. You really ought to get out more.

The Japanese love their RPGs. It should, therefore, follow that they know a good one from a bad one. Strange then, that, prior to its recent translation, this distinctly empty and unsatisfying game enjoyed so much popularity. Let's make it clear what we're working from, here. In this country, Super NES RPG fans will have played and enjoyed Nintendo's own Zelda: A Link To The Past. The ingredients that made that game so heart-stoppingly wonderful (magnificent quest elements; convincing, non-linear game design; superb graphics; Marioesque explore-equals-reward philosophy) are all sadly absent here, and, in some respects, it's difficult to see the logic behind the translation at all.

But let's not be too harsh. No, actually, let's. Let's be really, really, really harsh. This is a dreadfully linear, depressingly uncomplicated and extremely uncompelling game, with some dodgy graphics and very little in the way of unpredictability or excitement.

unpredictability or excitement.

From what I could gather, you play a chappie by the name of Nasir. The story?
Well, the water supplying a certain village has become a little dirty for, erm, some reason. You then spend the first half of the

'quest' wandering around a village, talking to suitably cute citizens, becoming drawn into the inevitable 'Bow wow' conversation with a nearby dog (brilliant, eh?) and, supposedly, piecing together the hideously jagged sections of the answer to the question, 'Why has our water become dirty?'. Which is roughly as intriguing and stimulating as attempting to enter into a discourse on the role of the mundane in psychosomatic hypotheses on suicidal tendencies. With a small maggot.

It doesn't get any more challenging, either. After the first section, I spent a brain-numbing amount of time attempting to locate a single door in an enormous, tediously-designed (hundreds of long corridors leading to dead ends) maze. This undertaking consumed approximately 45 minutes of my life and, afterwards, I was completely drained, confused, frustrated and, I don't mind admitting, a teensy bit angry. And I still didn't find the damn door.

Oh look, just picture Lagoon as a tiny, naive, badly-adjusted child looking up to its big brother, Zelda. It has the enthusiasm and the style, but it simply doesn't have any of the slickness or playability. If you've decided your mission in life is to collect every single game which contains 'hit points' and bigeyed, shakily translated anime-type characters, this one just about qualifies. Otherwise, forget it.

GOOD, BAD OR UGLY?



It's been said a millions times before, but I'll say it just once more. Dungeon Master is truly a classic game. Okay, it's not everyone's cup

of R-PG Tips (er, geddit?) (I thought you'd been fired - Ed.), but it's one that's unfortunately taken an eternity to appear on the Super Nintendo. Sixteen-bit computer owners have had the game for anything up to six years, and the Japanese have been playing the Super Famicom version for almost two years, but Super NES owners over here either haven't a clue what it is, or had just about given up hope of it ever appearing. Oh, and some couldn't actually care less about it, but I doubt they'll still be reading this anyway.

And that's the problem with Dungeon Master. People forget just how clever and inventive the game is. In fact, on the SNES it's unmatched in the following categories:

- . Interaction: This is simply the most interactive game on the machine so far (ie, it feels the most like you're actually there). And it's probably the first proper role playing game. Sure, compared to the latest Ultima games on the PC, Dungeon Master is old news, but next to a multitude of Zelda and Final Fantasy clones, DM is an entirely different interactive experience.
- . Detail: It's astonishing just how many interesting features the game contains. Things like the management of your party's

health, stamina and magic levels directly affecting your progress; storing their belongings economically to save space; creating potions to attack, heal or protect; ensuring there are enough torches to keep the light up... It just goes on and on.

- Atmosphere: What Dungeon Master has that few other games manage is tension. It's geniunely scary. Walking around a corner and finding an enormous monster right in front of you can really make you jump. (Although you'll need to be on your own in a dark room to get really scared.)
- Challenge: This makes it all worthwhile. No-one can race through Dungeon Master. It's too big and tough, and the puzzles are too ingeniously crafted. Set aside a couple of months and you might just do it.

So, Dungeon Master may be unconventional for the Super Nintendo, but it has qualities that many SNES games are completely devoid of.

- Speed: Even with a DSP chip in the cart to help out, the Super NES still can't cope properly with all that number-crunching. It's slower than the 16-bit versions, and the screen update can get horribly slow when your characters are weak.
- Control: While the programmers have done sterling work in translating the complex control system to the joypad, it's a shame the mouse isn't supported, as it can get a tad clumsy and slow moving.
- Focus: (And this is a problem that original suffered from, too.) In stark contrast to the linear approach of most SNES games,

Dungeon Master sprawls wildly. Some of the levels have been tightened up a bit since the original, but there's always going to be a fair bit of wandering around and - yes - getting lost. Map-making is essential in places which might put some people off.

Dungeon Master is definitely an acquired taste, a classic game best recommended to people who love to immerse themselves in atmosphere, detail and challenge. It's hackneyed by computer RPG standards, but in a league of its own on the Super Nintendo. Just don't take it too lightly - there's a fair amount of work in this one.

when we heard that there was a game called Yoshi's Safari coming out. 'Oh no!' we gasped when we

discovered that it was for the Super Scope. 'Phew!' we rallied when we finally got to play the game, and realised that it isn't actually too bad at all.

That fact that Yoshi's Safari is okay is more a reflection on Nintendo of Japan's infallible team of programmers than the Super Scope itself. All you get to do in the game, as ever, is point the Scope at the screen and plug away at the sprites that whizz about all over the place. And, unless anyone suddenly comes up with a completely brilliant idea that for some reason no-one's thought of so far, that's all you'll ever be able to do in Super Scope games. And the Scope is still as hopelessly unwieldy as ever. But there's enough going on in the periphery of *Yoshi's Safari* to keep your interest up till you've played the game through (even if that isn't a particularly long time, as we'll discover in a minute).

For one thing, there's the fact that you're riding along on Yoshi. So the scenery's always changing, and you really feel for the little fellow when he gets clobbered by a Koopa. There are the attack patterns of the baddies, and the designs of the bosses, which are far more varied than anything we've seen in a Scope game so far. And, perhaps most importantly of all, Yoshi's Safari is a Mario game, and is

neatly tied in with Mario mythology. You'll recognise all the baddies, along with lots of other bits and pieces – the way Yoshi loses a couple of coins when he goes off the road, for example (just like in Mario

Kart), or the power-ups, which are all faithful to previous Mario games

The graphics are good, too. They're in the curious pastel shades that all Scope games seem to have to use, but Nintendo's up with some gorgeous backgrounds. And the Mode 7 scrolling looks as impressive as

The only real snags are that a) as I said, all you're doing is shooting things, and it's questionable how long it'll be before you get bored of it, and b) it's only short, and takes no time at all to complete. I'm not trying to sound like some sort of gaming hero, but I played all the way through it on my first go in about half an hour. So, if you've got a Super Scope lying dormant under your bed, this could be just the pick-me-up it needs. But it's still no reason to go out and spend £60 on one. (By the way, in Japan, *Yoshi's Safari* sells for about 3/4 the price of an ordinary SNES game, probably because it is a little on the insubstantial side. So you're entitled to feel miffed if Nintendo UK charge you £40 for it.)





The scenario is a clever pastiche of all the horror movies you've ever seen, from supernatural Hammer ham efforts to the rubber-suited alien invasion shockers of the McCarthyite era. In fact, part of the fun of Zombies lies in spotting the genre references. The game knowingly draws on George Romero (Them), John Carpenter (Invasion Of The Bodysnatchers), Roger Corman (Friday The 13th), and the works of less respected directors. Your weapons are common or garden

objects (although the bazooka has yet to become a popular household commodity). Plates, cutlery, ice-pops, footballs and the garden strimmer can be used to dispatch the unholy abominations. This can cause problems when you're fully tooled-up: a werewolf might appear and you'll have to run away, rapidly cycling through your weapons to find the silverware.

It's not all shooting, though. You have to

locate and rescue at least one neighbour on every level or the game's over. Some levels have but one poor lost victim to save, and unless you approach via the correct route, then the monsters will get to them first. This is where the game gets really tough usually just before another password is revealed, too - and you'll be cursing as you

try to work out where you're going wrong.

Zombies has elements of Super Smash TV and Operation Logic Bomb, but it surpasses them through the stylishness of its oozing graphics and eerie tunes. Watch Julie trampolining, or the Gillmen explode, and you'll begin to appreciate the attention that LucasArts have lavished on this game. There are over 45 levels to crack, but you'll be struggling from password to password long before the half-way stage. At the same time, the game's easy to start playing and has that cathartic shoot-'em-up action

which keeps you coming back for more. The two-player game isn't that remarkable, as you have to work close together within and beat each other to the special items, but at least the option exists





How many times have you been playing a racing game such

as Super Off Road, say, and thought 'This is great fun, but what I really need to increase my enjoyment level to bursting point is a car with lots of big guns'? In my case it's over 107, so when Rock 'n' Roll Racing came along, I was so excited that my head caught fire – literally. (He exaggerates – Ed.)

Interplay's latest owes a huge debt of gratitude to Super Off Road, in that it's basically the same game, only with knobs on. But, whereas Off Road got samey quickly, this one whipped us all into a 'just one more go' frenzy. Why? Well let's see shall we?

For a start there's the silly intergalactic setting, with different planets to race on, each with different scenery. This in itself makes it more playable, as one minute you'll be sliding through snowdrifts in a hovercraft, and the next you're tearing round what looks like the set of the next Alien movie in a tank. The choice of six different vehicles gives you a range of handling characteristics, and they really do make a difference, with off-road 4x4s suiting the slidier tracks and speedsters for the more open roads. The races are short, wild and

frequently brutal, with mines, lasers and rockets flying all over the place, which makes whoever's out in front feel like a sitting duck. Exploding puts you out of the race for only a few seconds, but that's still enough

time for the other drivers to take the lead.

The hype surrounding the game is increased by the rock and roll sound-tracks of screeching guitar riffs (arranged by top games composer Tim Follin, trivia fans), and by a hyperactive commentator who really should lay off those blue Smarties. Every time a new person takes the lead, or you 'unleash hot fury' on another player (his words, not mine), Larry's there to shriek about it.

The only down side is that in the two-player split-screen mode, it's very hard to anticipate corners since the playing area's so small, but with these lush and gorgeous graphics, and a sound-track to match, I'll forgive this small defect. Only this once, mind.

me. Fortunately, Sunset Riders has NOTHING to do with the recent, rather lacklustre. Mega Drive conversion of the same name. In fact, this is an accurate translation of the 1991 Konami coin-op original, and jolly good it is too. No, I mean it. Jolly, jolly good. Rather splendid, in fact.

In order not to be too lavish with my praise, however, I must point out the few problems with the game - although Konami have reproduced the exact level layouts, cow for cow and tumbleweed for tumbleweed, there are a few nice little touches which should have been retained.

For a start, the coin-op's two-button control has been transformed into three buttons on the Super Nintendo. This confused me somewhat, because I didn't really want to be mucking around with a third button during crucial moments. And when you shoot the guys in the barrels, they just die, rather than splitting the barrel open with their mangled bodies. And on the second level, you can't duck close to

your horse to avoid overhead shots, like you can in the arcade.

But listen. I'm a real expert at the arcade version, so I'm bound to find loads of minor discrepancies. The point I wish to make is the Sunset Riders is outstanding. It's a thoroughly enjoyable two-player blast and you'll love it. It's damn tough, though. Tougher than the coin-op, in fact (the bosses rank as some of the trickiest I've ever encountered), and there's that 'one last go' thing to keep you playing for ever. This is another winner from the Konami stable.

From the screenshots you'll have noticed something fairly special about some of Claymates' graphics. That's because, as the title suggests, a

selection of the sprites have been created from animated clay figures. You'll already have seen the Claymation technique used to breathe life into Morph, and the same process appeared in Nick Park's awardwinning Creature Comforts, from which those clever TV ads (with the talking plasticine animals) are derived. As you'd expect, though, it looks more impressive when you see the things actually moving.

Claymates is essentially another platform game, but it's beefed up with plenty of bonuses and lacey frills. The numerous levels present a different challenge to each particular clay animal, so you'll need to change forms to explore everywhere. The strong point of the game is that there's always a lot to do - clouds to explore, keys to find, boxes to reach - which holds your attention and keeps things moving along. As a straight platformer, Claymates would have been unremarkable: instead, the variety stops it ever getting dull.

This isn't to say that Claymates doesn't have its problems. Take, for example, the Pachinko Ball bonus level, which you reach by collecting all the letters to spell CLAY: my advice is, er, don't bother. Controlling the direction of the little clay blob is tiresomely difficult, and the screen jerked about in a really irritating fashion. Even so, I managed to accumulate 12 extra lives - quite by accident - making the next few levels far too easy. With infinite continues available on top of that, experienced players will probably find the challenge rather ephemeral.

Another problem is that the clay sprites, in their fulsome three-dimensional loveliness, sometimes look slightly incongruous against the more commonplace 2D platform backgrounds. I suspect the technique will find its real potential in Interplay's forthcoming and much-awaited Clayfighter, but here it's used rather sparingly. Some additional attractively

animated features, like the cloud platforms, might have compensated for the simplistic graphics used elsewhere.

But above all, what's very reassuring is that innovative and original developments as in this game are still being tried out on the Super Nintendo.

The mouth bit is again a classic example – real skill is needed to make it back out once you've nobbled Stimpy and the giant mouth is closing. Humour? (It *is* based on a cartoon, after

all.) Er, not really. At least, I never actually laughed as such. But I suppose there are one or two gently amusing ideas in it.

But is this really a sensible way to spend £45? Of course not. When it comes down to it, all you're actually doing is running from left to right, or occasionally from right to left, and jumping over things. And, after doing this for about half an hour, you'll have finished the game.





We overcome our fear of phones and talk to the people at the other end of the Nintendo Hotline

tuck on Starwing? Muddled by Mario? Foxed by Final Fight? Who you gonna call? Well don't call Ghostbusters: 1) Their area of expertise was primarily related to the disposal of poltergeists and ectoplasm, and 2) They're fictional characters - they don't actually exist. No. Your best bet in times of gaming crisis is the Nintendo Hotline, Britain's own SNES Samaritans.

Based on an absolutely mammoth organisation in the States, the UK's Nintendo Hotline started in 1991, and had five 'counsellors' answering around 5,000 calls a day between them.

America's equivalent is staffed by a staggering 350 counsellors, and they've answered over 30 million calls since the service started in 1986. As you'd expect with anything American, some of the questions the Hotliners have to field can't be answered with just a simple cheat code. One caller actually tried to use the service for marriage guidance, explaining that: 'If I don't stop playing The Legend Of Zelda, my wife's going to leave me.' The eminently sensible advice from the stunned counsellor was: 'Just stop playing the damn game, then.'

However, in the UK, things haven't grown quite so big or got so weird - not yet anyway. But the operation, under the able guidance of Jane Shipperley, is growing steadily, and looks set to become big news.

How many so-called Nintendo counsellors do you employ now?

We've got 10 full-time Hotliners now, and A between them they take around 20,000 calls every single day.

Which Super Nintendo games are most commonly asked about?

Zelda and the Super Mario games, lots of RPGs and puzzle games, and, more recently, Street Fighter II Turbo, Starwing and Mario All Stars. Once a game appears in the magazines, we start to get asked questions about it.

What are the three most common questions you're asked?

That's pretty cut-and-dried. The top three questions are: 1) Where's the Black Hole in Starwing? 2) Where's the blacksmith's partner in Zelda: A Link To The Past? and 3) Where's the 96th level in Super Mario World?

What sort of support material do the Hotliners have to cover any question on any game? How, in other words, do they get their expertise and gaming knowledge?

Every single game, when it's first received as a prototype ROM, is fully mapped out by the counsellors - all the tips, tricks and cheats are tested and recorded at that stage. These gameplay

manuals are then all kept in the office and are used as constant reference. Also, it's amazing how much information the counsellors actually remember without having to look anything up. Some just seem to 'know' things, as if by magic!

Are they ever completely stumped?

No, never!The nearest they come to being A flummoxed is when they have to look up a tricky code or work out a particularly knotty problem. But stumped? Never!

Do people ever phone up for anything other than tips? Sure, they ask for details of Alocal stockists, prices, release dates, questions about what they've read in magazines, all sorts of things. Parents also phone us for recommendations for their children's presents.

And this is where it's at. You're looking at a hive of gaming knowledge.

A veritable think-tank of Nintendo know-how. In fact it's a load of geezers who happen to be a bit brainy about your favourite games. And if you look closely you can see a copy of Super Play - in the corner, on that desk. See it? No, well it's sort of hidden behind a pile of various objects. Er.





Do you give tips on games from third party publishers, other than Nintendo?

Yes, we have very good support from third A parties. They'll happily supply us with the information we need. Obviously they realise that we're just trying to provide a helpful service, and it's better that people are talking about their games than someone else's.

Do people ever phone up with questions about Sega games? Yes. It's rather unbelievable A but they do. More often than you'd expect, too. Which customers are a crossis utterly baffling.

What's the strangest request you've ever had?

Well, questions about Sega games A have to be pretty weird. It seems strange to me, anyway. Do they really think we'll be able to solve Sonic or something for them?

Do you have a time limit on calls?

We do, yes. But the average call time is under A a minute. Obviously, it's best to deal with all the enquiries as quickly as we can, in order to keep people's phone-bills down and to reduce the waiting time for people who might be trying to get through to us.

How do you get to be a Hotliner?

We only advertise for our staff in the local A papers, and every time we do we're innundated with applications from excellent games players. It's then just a process of selecting those who are best at communicating the required information across on the telephone.

Is the job really as much fun as it sounds?

1 can only tell you that we have very few staff A changes. The guys do seem to enjoy the job immensely. Of course, they do get to play all the games before anyone else gets their hands on them, and they get ALL the best hints and tips, which of course they need for their work.

Do any of the Hotliners specialise in any type of game?

ised

No - they like to play them all. They're very A fussy though, because I think they're a bit spoilt by having access to every single game. Obviously, everyone has favourites, but that's the same for any group of games players. We like to think that our staff know as much as it's humanly possible to know about every game, as well as every variety of game.

What's the age range of your callers?

From 3 to 90 years old. The average is somewhere in the teens, as you'd expect. But, of course, there are so many Nintendo

players that we get a really diverse crowd phoning us for help.

> And the people who call, are they all male? Not exclusively, but the A majority definitely are. Our Hotline customers are

pretty much a cross-section of the gameplaying public. Old and young, male and female; we talk to them all. And we send them away with all the information they need.

But aren't we missing something?

Of course, there is one nagging doubt underpinning the whole Hotline operation couldn't it be described as, well, cheating? Nintendo games are supposed to be challenging, tough and character-building. You're supposed to use your own skill, cunning, perseverance or whatever to defeat them. It's meant to be you and the game, alone in a room, locked in combat to the death (sort of thing).

So phoning someone with the answers all laid out before them seems rather to defeat the games' very purpose. Like filling in the crossword with the answers written next to the clues - okay. you'll get it done a lot quicker, but aren't you missing the point a little bit?

Well, the Hotliners, of course, don't see it as cheating at all. The way they view it is like this they offer a service - and after all, you don't have to call. You make the decision to pick up the phone and ask them the questions.


And another thing. In this very magazine (gasp!) there are Super Player's Guides to games that make the challenge of the games slightly less, er, challenging. Aren't we talking about much the same cheaty things?

So, if you find yourself wandering cluelessly about the Valley of Bowser for the fourteenth time in a row, and you feel that you're well on the way to losing your temper, simply wrestle with your conscience for, oooh, about a third of a second, and decide to phone the Nintendo Hotline for a little inspiration. And afterwards,

Getting Technical ith Nintendo

his Hotline business is all very well for those who are slogging through the latest games and need a bit of advice, encouragement or maybe just a friendly shoulder to cry on (Get on with it - Ed.). But what about those hardware-orientated questions which crop up in every users mind from time to time. Can they answer those?

The answer is no. They don't actually need to answer technical questions, because Nintendo has a Technical Services Department. The number is (0329) 243300, and in standard office hours, there will be someone who can answer your questions regarding PAL, SCART, NTSC, power supplies, edge connectors, ports and so on.

In fact, one of the things the Department is asked about the most is adaptors and power. So to save you ringing them with the same queries and forcing them to give the same answers loads of times a day, here's what Nintendo say about adaptors.

'Contrary to popular opinion, adaptors, convertors and other unlicensed Nintendo "accessories" can damage your favourite games machine.

'For the budding Super Nintendo "Mr Fixit", Nintendo Consumer Services have a word of caution. There is no safe way to troubleshoot adaptor damage, as you actually risk causing more problems.

When an adaptor is used or mishandled, both the games and SNES, are at risk. An internal fuse can blow, and the power will cut off to prevent further damage.

'However, if you try to fix it yourself, you can seriously damage the health of your Super Nintendo system. If the fuse is not replaced professionally (using a 1.5 fast-blow 20mm fuse), it could result in a short in the circuit board, which will ignite and give off acrid furnes. The casing of your SNES might melt and, if touched by a young child, could cause severe burns from molten plastic.

Therefore, stay away from the potential danger and leave repairing adaptor damage to the professionals.

would no doubt say.)

This collecting business is easy enough
until the concentration starts to wane. Then the screaming starts. It gets amazingly difficult to grab those bleeding carrots or snaffle a damned onion, without making a tiny slip and being killed by the pursuing

salmonella or botulism, or whatever.

And all this is before there's trouble with transporters, bad mushrooms or le Chef Noir. If Pierre takes too long collecting his grub, the evil chef will release all the vegetables you've already bunged into the cage.

It's an annoying game. I mean annoying. If you avoid all the baddies, you die falling off a stupid platform. If you do the platforms right, the blasted Chef Noir lets all the veg out. Arggh! Kill him! Kill him! He must pay!

Still, let's be fair. It's a good game. It looks the part and there's plenty of cuteness wandering around. The healthy size I've already mentioned; and there are fruitmachine sub-levels occasionally to break up

the veg-catching. Yeah. This is pretty good. It lacks the edge to be a truly incredible experience, but is nonetheless as enjoyable as a trip to the park or maybe a go on the dodgems. Bear it in mind.

The first thing you'll notice about Mario is that he's somewhat vertically challenged at the start of the game. This condition needn't prevail, however, as he can find objects which alter his condition and affect his abilities. Let's run through some of the finer points:

The Head-Butt: This is great for bumping off' an enemy standing above him. It can also deflect a powerup as it slides overhead.

The Jump: Use the joypad to hook left or right in mid-air - dead handy for

If you find a block that's almost, but not quite, within reach of your jump, try a short running jump and push into the block - Mario will 'climb' up on top of it. Usually. The Shell Kick: Stomp a Buzzy Beetle or a Koopa, and it'll retreat into its shell. Stomp or kick the shell and it'll slide away, hitting everything in its path. A good point-scoring tactic is to dash after it, keeping it on-screen: you can take out hordes of enemies with one shell, and may even rack up an extra life. Be prepared for it to ricochet back at you, though.

Remember - it's Nintendo's policy that you never get 'stuck' on any screen. If you think you've reached a dead end, then you've missed something.





Dashing under them when they jump is the best method, but expect them to follow. If you die here, go all out for the power-ups when you restart the level.


At the very least, you want to start World 8 Level 4 as Super Mario and stay that way.

It's another maze level: take these pipes in order. Stay low for the water level, ducking the bloopers and playing safe with the fire bars. When

you reach the Hammer Brother, stay behind the pipe and wait for him to walk towards you. A running jump from the pipe will take you over him. Then it's another jump to the real, genuine, bona fide Bowser who, as long as you're Super Mario, shouldn't give you any problems. If you're not, there's a fire-

bar and a Podoboo to avoid. as well as the hammers, the fiery breath, Bowser's spikey bits...

Still, these problems aren't insurmountable. Just follow the

The sequel to Another World is on the way! See Super Express... 3351X TV with SCART so I could use my US Super Nintendo on it. However, when connecting the two up, I found that no picture could be obtained, only sound.

I presumed, then, from various magazine reports I have read, that my TV couldn't detect the 60Hz signal from my Super NES. But, tinkering about with the SCART lead, I discovered that disconnecting the wire to pin no 16 – blanking signal (RGB switching) – gave a black and white picture.

Encouraged by this, I connected an LED (negative side into the TV) between pin no 16 and the wire and – hey presto – I now had a full colour picture – not even any glitching. I used an LED, but any diode should work. Sorry, but I don't know its rating. This should work with anybody else with a similar TV, and it saved me 25-30 quid on a PAL booster.

(which adaptors can bypass). But now, with game imports posing more and more of a threat to Nintendo's regional sales plans, most publishers are starting to use it, including Nintendo themselves - import versions of the Super Mario Collection and Yoshi's Safari won't run on a UK machine, even through an adaptor. There's no way round the problem as yet, so things do look a little bleak for import games buyers. We've just got to hope that games start coming out a bit faster over here - something that does seem to be happening. 2) Because generating 3D polygons is a tough enough job in itself, before you start adding detail. The Super FX chip can manage texture mapping a bit - that cube thing at the end of Starfox, for example - but not as a general rule. 3)-Dunno - see the useless reply to Paul Rowland's letter.

4) Because making a Super NES switchable like that involves messing about with the insides of the machine - it's not something you can achieve simply by plugging something into the back. 5) They probably will, seeing as how Mario All-Stars has been hugely successful.

6) Don't get the idea that games always come out first in Japan. Japanese games might do, but games that originate in the US and Europe tend to come out in the US and Europe first, and the Japanese have to wait just as long for them as we do for their games. In fact, WWF and Alien3 still aren't out in Japan, and neither are lots of other big games like Pugsley's Scavenger Hunt, Bubsy, Mortal Kombat, Shadowrun... loads of them. 7) An average price for a game in America would be \$60, and in Japan about ¥9,000. Dear Gamefreak,

I've been reading your mag ever since issue 1. However, there's one thing that's been bugging me for ages. Firstly, we all know (well most of us know) what Mode 7 does, but I was reading that in Elite they're using Mode 6. What the hell is Mode 6, and what does it do? A mate also told me that the Super NES has Modes from 1-7. Is this true, and if so, what do they all do? 'Cool Dude Nik', Bexleyheath.

Your mate's absolutely right. Nearly. The Super Nintendo's actually got eight graphic modes, numbered 0-7. Each mode provides a different trade-off between the number of colours on the screen and the number of parallax-scrolling backgrounds. Mode 0, for example, only lets you have 32 different colours on the screen, but it gives you four backgrounds all scrolling about behind each other at different speeds. Mode 5, on the other hand, lets you have up to 128 colours on the screen, but only two backgrounds. Modes 6 and 7 are a bit different, though. Mode 7 you already know about - it only gives you one background, but lets you zoom it in and out and spin it around in 3D. And Mode 6 - the one you're interested in is a version of Mode 5 that does away with parallax scrolling altogether. Instead it 'interlaces' two images together by flipping between them at high speed, doubling the apparent number of pixels on the screen (and hence giving a higher definition display), but looking a bit flickery at the same time. You'll have seen this effect if you've ever played the first Ranma 1/2 game or RPM Racing. (It was worth answering that just for the ironic

name/address juxtaposition.)

RPM Racing - one of a few games that use flickery Mode 6 graphics. Ranma 1/2 is another one.

Will Nintendo ever make conversions of the Metroid and Zelda games that already exist on the **NES and Game Boy?**

Given the inscrutable secrecy that surrounds everything Nintendo do, one can only speculate. But with the massive success of the Super Mario Collection they must be thinking of doing something similar with Zelda, and possibly Metroid too.

Are there any RPGs in the form of Monkey Island for the Super Nintendo? James Wigglesworth, Leeds.

Not really - weird Japanese game Kunio Ken would probably be the nearest thing. The trouble with Monkey Island-style games is that they come on 10 or 15 disks on the PC and Amiga, thanks to all the graphics. It would be pretty tough packing that lot into a cartridge, so we'll probably have to wait for CD ROM for anything similar.

I recently bought a set of audio/visual leads to let me connect my SNES to my stereo system. Having made sure the leads were connected properly I found that the sound only came out of one speaker instead of both as expected. Can you explain why? David Mortimer, Peterborough.

No idea. Maybe it's the old 'wrong lead for your system' problem - US, Japanese and UK machines use different leads - or maybe the lead's simply faulty. Check with whoever you bought it from.





NINTENDO CD ROM:

Should we all sell our SNESes now? Or could Nintendo have got it right after all?

'I WANT TO LEAD'

Sega's slogan for the American and Mexican market. Hmm, not very inspiring, but apt anyway.

It seems to me that Sega have always held the lead over Nintendo. Their 16-bit console came out a year before Nintendo brought out their Super Famicom and, just as Nintendo's machine is finding its feet here, Sega bring out a CD console, far better than any cartridge-based machine. Nintendo's 'much better' CD console will reputedly be out in three years' time, and by then no doubt Sega will have something far greater to keep in front.

I bought a SNES after I read Total!'s article back in issue 2, because I wanted a console that would be better than any other. But now I see I would have done much better by buying a Mega Drive. The games are cheaper and easier to get hold of; they aren't always cute and cuddly (something I hate about SNES games); they aren't all computer conversions, film licences, coin-op conversions and sequels. And now that the Mega CD is out, the SNES' hardware is banal and oldfashioned. The Mega CD produces much better 3D (Slipheed easily beats Starwing), it now has a sixbutton joypad, better sound and graphics, and it has many new original games in the pipeline.

You said yourself in the CES report that: 'The Big N has rather lost its momentum and doesn't quite know what to do next. Oh dear.' Really, I want to lead the pack instead of following it, so can you give me one good reason why I should join the innovators and leave the imitators?

'TAKE NO NOTICE OF MATT BIELBY'

Firstly, I'd like to say that I know I'm maybe in a minority. but if Nintendo have cancelled the CD ROM for now, I'd like to say well done for having such sense. You only have to look at the Mega CD. Despite a lengthy and expensive (and pretty crap) advertising campaign, there are still very few games available for it, and none of the major software houses support it fully. I'm in no way knocking software houses here, but I don't think they know how to use it effectively, due to the very nature of the machine.

I also think that it's too soon to be introducing a 'new format' machine onto the market. After all, in the early '80s, 8-bit machines were the market leaders. Then came the Ataris and Amigas – for five or six years, they were the leading machines. I mean, for goodness sake, the SNES has only been in existence for three years – one in the UK!

Nope, CD ROM will have its time, and you only have to look at games like *Starfox* to see that the immense possibilities of cartridge based games, on the SNES at least, have only just begun to be utilised. So take no notice of Matt Bielby's rather downhearted CES report, and look forward to the next wave of brilliant carts. Because, as the ad says, *Starfox* is only the first of a new breed. 'HORRIFIED'

The Super NES CD is only going to be released (at the earliest) in late 1995 or early '96! That's at least 18 months! Taking into account that elsewhere in your magazine Matt Bielby said: 'In this industry six months can be a very long time indeed', that gives the 'opposition' ages to bring out decent software and get a massive lead over Nintendo.

Secondly, you point out that Nintendo is going to release a 32-bit console with a dedicated CD drive. Does this mean that the existing SNES won't be receiving a CD drive, and that I will have to fork out for a new system?

defence of Nintendo's decision to delay the launch of the SNES CD until late 1995. Many people (including some at Super Play, it seems!) doubt Nintendo, saying 'Won't Sega and 3DO have too much of a lead in the software market?' and 'By choosing to do nothing for a bit and so avoiding a short-term risk, aren't Nintendo making a long-term mistake?'

I think Nintendo know what they are doing. When you look at how successful the company is, it's hard to believe they would delay the release of the SNES CD without a good reason. I'm pleased that the CD system won't be coming out for a few years because, having just bought a SNES, I would hate to see all the good games coming out for the Super CD while I had to put up with a slow stream of bog-standard games on the SNES itself. Let's not forget that the SNES is the best games machine out at the moment, beating anything Sega has to offer. Yours Super Playingly, Matthew Hart, Southwold.

Arthur Smyth seems to have an over-inflated opinion of Sega, and the Mega CD in particular. The SNES may have appeared later than the Mega Drive, but while the Mega Drive was based on proven (tired?) technology, the SNES had features that hadn't been seen before, even in expensive computers. As for the Mega CD, even Mega Drive mags would acknowledge that the system can't be much longer for this world. All it adds to the Mega Drive is a) huge amounts of storage, which is great for doing full-motion video and CD quality sound, but adds nothing in terms of gameplay, and b) a few bits and pieces that just about bring the system up to a par with the SNES - one without a Super FX chip added to it, that is. Slipheed might look smart in magazine pictures, but those 3D polygons aren't generated in real-time like Starwing's. They're pre-drawn and move around passively, and look the same every time you play. In fact, the only really impressive Mega CD game we've seen is Thunderhawk, and even that could be done with a SNES plus Super FX chip. There's no need to spend £350-odd on a Mega CD system. Significantly, the Mega CD has sold zilch in Japan, where most of the best games come from.

Given all that, what would we gain from Nintendo launching a similar add-on system now? CD technology can contribute a lot to games, but only if, as Nintendo now realise, it's designed into the system from the start. A tacked-on CD drive adds little more than pose value.

So Matthew Hart is right. The SNES still has loads to offer, and will be with us for years to come. It would be a shame to see it snuffed out in its prime. Stick with it, folks!



ELFARIA (JAP) Hudson Soft, 12 Mbit + BB player, RPG Great character graphics make this game more appealing than most, but the heavy use of Japanese text may cause

major problems. Impossible to judge.

EVIL SWORD (JAP) Datam Polystar, 8 Mbit 55% I player, platform, SP7 A colourful, bizarre, very Japanese and not very good slice-'em-up, featuring a girl running around swiping things with her sword.

EXHAUST HEAT II (JAP) 83% Seta, 8 Mbit + BB

1 player, driving, SP8 With more tracks than the original game, lovely parallax scrolling, and plenty of speed, this is great fun – like a more realistic F-Zero. No two-player mode though, and some juddering

EXTRA INNINGS (US) Alternative name: Ganba League Baseball (JAP) Sony Imagesoft, 8 Mbit + BB 1 or 2 players, sport, SP2

Baseball's tricky to translate well to a games machine, but this makes a good job of it, with cute characters and slick action. The sequel, Pro Baseball League 93, is even better.

Based on an obscure American cartoon, this Home Alone-alike is funny in places, but the gameplay is a real dog.

THE FANG OF EDO (JAP) 49% Micro World, 8 Mbit

l player, action, SP9 Odd scrolling slash-'em-up looks okay (when it's not slowing down), but lacks

FATAL FURY (JAP/US) Takara, 12 Mbit 76%

1 or 2 players, beat-'em-up, SP4 One of a growing number of Street Fighter II lookalikes. Looks okay, plays fine (though the controls are very awkward), and worth considering.

FINAL FANTASY II Alternative name: Final Fantasy IV (JAP) Square Soft, 8 Mbit + BB 1 player, RPG

In Japan this is the fourth in a popular series. This is the first version for the Super Nintendo, and while it's graphically basic, the lovely music and the involved quest lift it way above lesser RPGs.

FINAL FANTASY V (JAP) Square Soft, 16 Mbit + BB 1 player, RPG A huge-selling RPG to be translated and retitled Final Fantasy III in the US. Buy

that one, unless you're fluent in Japanese. Impossible to judge. FINAL FANTASY: MYSTIC QUEST (US)

79% Square Soft, 4 Mbit + BB player, RPG, SP3 A spin-off younger player's version of the popular Final Fantasy RPG series that's a fun and involving quest for roleplaying beginners. It's also cheaper than

FINAL FIGHT (JAP/US/UK) 86% Capcom, 8 Mbit I player, beat-em-up, SP1
The best walking-along-beating-people-up game on the SNES. Brilliant graphics, varied opposition and great moves. But it lacks a two-player mode, and gets dull.

FINAL FIGHT 2 (JAP) Capcom, 10 Mbit 1 or 2 players, beat-'em-up, SP10 Lovely graphics, a much-needed twoplayer mode, some good tricky bits, and slightly more depth than it first appears make this probably the best scrolling beat-'em-up yet, but it's still very easy.

FINAL FIGHT GUY (JAP) 83% Capcom, 8 Mbit

player, beat-'em-up A pointless new version of Final Fight, where the best character, Cody, is replaced by Guy. A poor game-music CD is included. It's easier than the original.

FIRE DODGEBALL (JAP) 45% Sunsoft, 8 Mbit 1 or 2 players, sport A cute, anime version of an extremely weird game (see SD Dodgeball). The graphics are good, but the game itself is too simple to be particularly rewarding.

FIRST SAMURAI (UK) Kemco, 8 Mbit I player, platform, SP11

GOLDEN FIGHTER (JAP) 42% Culture Brain, 12 Mbit 1 or 2 players, beat-'em-up, SP1 A very ropy Street Fighter II 'tribute'. The graphics are rubbish, the gameplay's rubbish, the sound's rubbish... Avoid **GP-1 (US)** 62%

Atlus, 8 Mbit 1 or 2 players, sport, SP10 The only motorbike racing game on the Super Nintendo, but it fails to do anything much to recommend the sport.

GPX CYBER FORMULA (JAP) Alternative name: Cyberspin (US) Takara, 8 Mbit player, driving, SP1 A top-view scroller, and another case of yikes-was-that-a-corner? But anime based this time, with some very smooth scrolling. Average, but enjoyable

GRADIUS III (JAP/US) Konami, 4 Mbit 1 player, shoot-'em-up milar to the coin-op and all packed onto a 4 Mbit cart. It's an early title, so slow-down is a problem – it scuppers the otherwise beautiful graphics and fab sound. Still, it's more impressive and playable than Super R-Type.

GUNFORCE (JAP/US) Irem, 4 Mbit 1 or 2 players, shoot-'em-up, SP4 Similar to Super Probotector in many respects, but not half as good in any of them. The 'respects', that is. (Sorry, that was a bit confusing, wasn't it?)

MAGICAL GUY ADVENTURE (JAP) 62% Bandai, 4 Mbit player, platform An jolly platform game combining wacky Japanese humour with cute sprites and backdrops. Not in the class of Super Mario World, but entertaining anyway.

MAGIC SWORD (JAP/US/UK) 58% Capcom, 8 Mbit player, platform, SP7

Capcom's winning streak is let down by this dreadful slash-'em-up. It slows down badly, and the animation's awful.

MARIO IS MISSING (UK) 70% Mindscape, 8 Mbit 1 player, edutainment, SP11



Luigi travels around the world replacing bits stolen from famous treasures. His mission: to save Mario from his abductors. It's informative, but more for younger players.

MARIO PAINT (JAP/US/UK)55% Nintendo, 8 Mbit + BB

player, art package, SP6 A limited, crude paint package - and one where you can't print out your results! Some nifty features, admittedly, but the

best thing about the whole package is the mouse that comes with it

MECH WARRIOR (US) Alternative name: Battletech (JAP) Activision, 8 Mbit 1 player, shoot-'em-up, SP9 Sort of like *Battle Zone* (well, a bit), but

this time placing you in an armoured mobile suit, jumping around blasting things. Okay, but lacks imagination.

METAL JACKET (JAP) 20% Atlus, 8 Mbit 1 player, platform Atlus aren't doing themselves any favours

Initially, the nicely shaded backdrops give it the look of a Ninja Spirit clone, but when you watch your hero mincing about, twiddling his stick, it palls.

1 player, platform, SP4 The cartoon's atmosphere is captured perfectly, with fab cartoony graphics and hilarious intro and outro bits, but the game itself stinks - it's a simplistic. poorly-executed platform game.

1 player, action Lovely graphics, but that's about it. This consists of watching a string of minigames in which you don't really get much say - it's just luck if you proceed from one game to the next. Awful.

ROBOCOP 3 (US/UK) 50% Ocean, 8 Mbit 1 player, shoot-'em-up, SP2 A neat Robocop feel, but gameplay-wise this is severely wanting. It's really difficult, and perseverance is rewarded by an unimaginative shooter with little connection to the film.

ROGER CLEMENS' MVP BASEBALL (US) 73% Acclaim, 8 Mbit

l or 2 players, sport, SP2 Baseball games don't come much better presented than this. Fab animation and action viewed through different camera angles make this thoroughly enjoyable.

ROMANCE OF THE THREE KINGDOMS II (JAP/US) Koei, 8 Mbit + BB 1 to 12 players, strategy Interlocking ancient Chinese kingdoms make alliances, split up, then make other alliances, lots of people get killed, and we can't make sense of any of it.

The US version reveals a simple game under all the maps and text-boxes, but still not recommended. RPM RACING (JAP/US) Interplay, 4 Mbit + BB

1 or 2 players, driving RPM stands for Radical Psycho Machines – ridiculous trucks with big tyres that fascinate Americans. The scrolling's rough, you need clairvoyant powers to anticipate corners, and it uses flickery interlace graphics to no obvious effect. But good fun.

RUN SABER (US) 59% Atlus, 8 Mbit

1 or 2 players, platform, SP10 A few pretty backdrops don't save this failed Strider wannabe

RUSHING BEAT RUN (JAP) 60% Jaleco, 12 Mbit

1 or 2 players, beat-'em-up, SP5 The original Rival Turf, although fine as beat-'em-ups go, was never brilliant, exactly. And this sequel isn't much better. The graphics aren't bad, but it's very repetitive and too easy to finish.

SD DODGEBALL (JAP) Banpresto, 8 Mbit + BB l or 2 players, sport

Based on an imaginary sport which involves knocking out the opposing team with the ball, this is one of a series of Dodgeball games (Fire Dodgeball's another), and the worst.

SD GREAT BATTLE (JAP) 38% Banpresto, 6 Mbit 1 player, shoot-'em-up

Japan's popular Super Deformer series has spawned a lot of Super Famicom spin-off games, and they sell, no matter how bad they are! This was the first of the genre, and isn't great, being a crusty arcade adventure with tedious gameplay.

SD GREAT BATTLE III (JAP) 63% Banpresto, 8 Mbit 1 or 2 players, beat-'em-up, SP9

Cute characters and nice graphics, but it lacks variety and depth of gameplay. SD GUNDAM (JAP) Bandai, 8 Mbit + BB

1 player, RPG This game stars a 'Super Deformed' version of Gundam, the most popular 'mecha' robot character in Japan. The format is traditional Jap RPG, but the crappy graphics, sound and Jap text make it unplayable. Impossible to judge.

SEPTENTRION (JAP) 90% Human, 8 Mbit l player, platform, SP10 A very original and atmospheric Poseidon Adventure-style disaster game. If you can work around the heavy use of Japanese text it'll last you ages

SHADOWRUN (UK) 85% Data East, 8 Mbit 1 player, RPG, SP10 A brilliantly-presented, scrupulouslydesigned adventure game, packed with puzzles and simply oozing atmosphere.

SHANGHAI 2 (US) Alternative name: Super Shanghai (JAP) Activision, 8 Mbit 1 or 2 players, puzzle, SP9 A very simple puzzle game – based on the ancient Chinese classic – that becomes strangely more-ish.

SIM ANT (JAP) Imagineer 1 player 8 Mbit An ant simulator. In Japanese. That says it all really. Impossible to judge.

SIM CITY (JAP/US/UK) Maxis/Nintendo, 4 Mbit + BB 1 player, strategy, SP1 Build the city of your dreams... then bring it to its knees! The SNES version of this all-time great is probably the best yet (more user-friendly) but it doesn't push the SNES to its limits.

SIM EARTH (JAP/US) 34% Imagineer, 6 Mbit + BB 1 player, strategy, SP9 A follow-on from Sim City that tries to bite off more than it can chew. You're basically put in charge of the entire planet. It manages to be both a good simulation and a very tedious game

SKÜLJAGGER (US) 58% American Softworks, 8 Mbit 1 player, platform, SP4 A lacklustre piratic game that's very easy and won't take you long to finish. With some weird bubble gum bits.

SOLSTICE II: EQUINOX (US/UK) Sony Imagesoft, 8 Mbit + BB 1 player, platform, SP8 Polished and addictive isometric arcade adventure, with brill graphics and fab sound. Highly recommended.

SONIC BLAST MAN Taito, 8 Mbit

1 or 2 players, platform A monkey called Spanky? Bouncing bubbles? You just wander round lots of similar-looking screens, killing baddies (with bubbles) and collecting keys. Crap.

SPIDERMAN & THE X-MEN (US/UK) 72% Acclaim, 8 Mbit 1 player, platform, SP3 A multi-character platform romp that loses its appeal fast. Unattractive graphics are only saved by imaginative music. Fun for a bit, but somehow it looks dated already.

SPINDIZZY WORLDS (JAP/US/UK) 69% Ascii, 8 Mbit 1 player, puzzle, SP2 Spindizzy's sparkle seems to have dulled since its heyday on the Spectrum, partly thanks to the game's shift of emphasis from exploration to puzzle solving. A neat little thing all the same.

STARFOX (JAP/US) 93% Alternative name: Starwing (UK) Nintendo, 8 Mbit 1 player, shoot-'em-up, SP7 What can we say? This is brilliant. It's the first game to use the new Super FX chip, it's got some of the most spectacular and well designed 3D bits

ever, it's very smooth and fast - it's the bee's knees, basically. STREET FIGHTER II (JAP/US/UK) 94% Capcom, 16 Mbit

1 or 2 players, beat-'em-up, SP1 This is the game that's selling SNESs by the bucket-load. It's 'streets' ahead of other beat-'em-ups, and a near-perfect conversion of the coin-op. A must-buy, though expensive on official release.

STREET FIGHTER II TURBO (JAP) 96% Capcom, 20 Mbit 1 or 2 players, beat-'em-up, SP11



A faster, better-looking version of SFII. Quite simply, the best beat-'em-up ever.

STRIKE GUNNER (JAP/US/UK) 65% Athena, 8 Mbit 1 or 2 players, shoot-'em-up, SP3 Average vertical blaster, with poor and unvaried backdrops, but okay sprites and some nice explosions. A dull game

that only works in two-player mode. STRIKER (UK) Elite, 4 Mbit 1 or 2 players, sport, SP10 The best SNES football game so far, this comes equipped with easy-to-use controls and a nice replay mode. Brilliant.

SUMO SPIRITS (JAP) Takara, 8 Mbit 1 or 2 players, sport, SP9



The most realistic, and so best, of the two sumo games we've reviewed. It's all a bit limited though.

SUPER ADVENTURE ISLAND (JAP/US/UK) 75% Hudson Soft, 8 Mbit 1 player, platform, SP2 Simplistic, Wonderboy-style gameplay in

this third instalment of the series made popular on the NES. Aside from the ugly Master Higgins, the bright backgrounds and impressive Yuzo Koshiro dance tunes make this an attractive game. A bit confusing, but otherwise fab.

Fab sprite handling (Mode 7) and no slowdown mean it's more a technical feat than that well-designed, and it's a bit weapon-mad. An excellent buy anyway.

SUPER BASEBALL SIMULATOR 1,000 (JAP/US) 49% Culture Brain, 4 Mbit

1 or 2 players, sport, SP2 A middling baseball game. The pitching and batting are good, but the fielders are unco-operative and the graphics poor, with pointless Mode 7 whizzing about. The music's good, though.

SUPER BASES LOADED (US) 55% Alternative name: Super Professional 55% Baseball (JAP) Jaleco, 8 Mbit 1 or 2 players, sport, SP2 This works okay, but it's just as limited in scope as other baseball games on the SNES, and the graphics are jerky.

SUPER BASES LOADED II (US) 63% Alternative name: Super Professional Baseball II (JAP) Jaleco, 8 Mbit 1 or 2 players, sport, SP2 Extraordinarily and uncannily similar to Super Bases Loaded I. (See above.)

frame graphics of the original, and it has some good explosions and exciting link sequences, but, frankly, it's still boring. SUPER BIKURI MAN (JAP) 18% Interbec, 8 Mbit

1 or 2 players, beat-'em-up, SP7 Far too easy. Possibly the second worst beat-'em-up ever (after PitFighter).

SUPER BIRDIE RUSH (JAP) 76% Data East, 8 Mbit + BB 1 or 2 players, sport, SP3 Cute cartoony-looking golf game with nicely drawn fairways and greens. But, this isn't as playable as *Hole in-One*.

SUPER BLACK BASS (JAP) 42% Hot B. 8 Mbit l player, sport, SP10 Er... do you really want to pretend you're fishing on your SNES?




